Report of the President and Secretary.

In closing the work of the past year, we find much continuance in well doing, especially among our smaller branches, and some new growth in the formation of new branches in parishes where none had heretofore existed; but, also, the sad story of discontinuance of branches in some parishes, because, feeling they had but one talent, they hid that one in the earth.

The Auxiliary will never be the power that it should be until we realize that what the Master requires of us is, not only the large gifts of those to whom He has entrusted wealth, but the gifts of each one of His children according to the ability with which He has blessed them—the ability to give of their little with a glad heart—the ability to keep themselves posted as to missionary progress and needs, and to pass on this knowledge and interest to others; and greatest and most important of all, the ability to earnestly and faithfully ask our Father's blessing upon His work and His workers.

I am aware that we can never be the banner branch of the Auxiliary in the matter of money gifts, but the Dioceses of our dear old Virginia have been the pioneers in all the earlier missionary fields, and have sent and are still sending a large number of her sons and daughters into all the missionary fields of our Church—thus taking a most prominent, if not the leading position in this most important branch of missionary work.

Yet, there is no reason why we may not be a leading branch in the gift of prayer for this work, and this is my ambition for the Southern Virginia Branch. There is no parish in this Diocese so poor, so weak, that cannot form a branch of at least a few faithful women, who will meet together at regular times and pray that our Father, in His own good time and way, would move the hearts and minds of others, whom he had more highly blessed, to supply the needs of His work, with means and workers, which they themselves are power-

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less to contribute. O, my fellow-workers in the Auxiliary, if we would but use this key of prayer as we should, God would indeed open the windows of heaven and pour out upon us and upon His work, such a blessing as our imagination can hardly conceive of. The China Inland Mission, which has accomplished such wonders in Central China, was founded upon and has always been supported by means of prayer alone.

Has He not promised that when two or three are gathered together in His name, He will grant their requests? Can any parish say it is too poor or weak to help in the bringing in of God's kingdom when it has this power of prayer, waiting only to be used. Let our aim be, in the work of the coming year, to utilize to its fullest extent, this power of prayer; and then watch for the blessing that our Father will surely send upon His Church and His work, in answer to our prayer of faith; and then bless Him for this privilege vouchsafed to us His children; take courage and go forward.

Our fall meeting in Lynchburg was a great success, though we missed the inspiration given and received, from being with the members of the Council.

Owing to circumstances which we could neither foresee nor control, we meet again this year in the fall. We can thus test the relative desirability of meeting apart from the Council; and should the question of making the fall the regular time of meeting come up again, we can all vote more intelligently upon it.

Our pledges for the coming year will, I suppose, be the same as in previous years, which were as follows:

It is hoped that each branch, in addition to these pledges, will send a contribution for the Central Fund, which is used for printing, postage, and the expenses of missionaries to our annual and Convocational meetings.

I would call the attention of the branches to the fact that, large as was the united offering, reported at the General Convention in Cincinnati last fall, it is only sufficient to pay the salary of the women workers already in the field and is insufficient to meet the call for any new workers; so I trust you will faithfully lay by your united offering in the coming year, realizing the great need of its being a large one, in order to keep an adequate number of women workers in the field.

I cannot close without making special mention of the branch at Keokee, a small mining town in Southwest Virginia.

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This branch of 11 members, under the leadership and inspiration of Deaconess Adams, has given to Missions this year, at the rate of about \$6 per member, thus setting a splendid example of self-denial and sacrifice, in order to be able to give to the Master's work.

St. Paul's, I Circle, Norfolk, is the banner branch this year in giving, both as to the total amount given and the amount, \$17 per member. Hot Springs comes next, with \$12.51 per member; and Smithfield third, with \$11.08 per member; whilst Franklin did splendid work in the matter of sending missionary boxes. The branch at Stuart Hall has the largest number of members, and I am glad to be able to commend it highly for its large and liberal offerings year by year, and for its wise and judicious distribution of them amongst the Diocesan, Domestic and Foreign fields—thus giving a training in missionary work and interest, to these young girls in the formative period of life and character, which must tell for good in their home parishes, when their school days are over.

The Auxiliary has 78 branches, with 1,737 members. The Junior 54 branches with 585 members. The Babies' branch 38 branches, with 625 members.

With the earnest hope and prayer, that during the coming year every branch will so zealously read and study about Missions, that each individual member will be led to *pray* earnestly for Missions and to *give* faithfully and liberally of their time and means to Missions, I am,

THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN
VIRGINIA BRANCH OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY TO
THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, May, 1910-1911.

There is something glad and something sad in looking back over a year's work. Something sad, because there are opportunities lost for doing the will of our Lord; carelessness on the part of those who should have led and those who should have been led in the wonderful work of getting ready for the coming back of our Lord to receive our "talents" loaned us by Him. If we could only realize the greatness of saving one soul for Christ we should work hard to help save the millions yet unsaved. But for fear of discouragement, there are those of the faithful ones who have realized it all, and have been teaching young people in the Diocese to "pray, learn and work" for missions—which only means being so thankful for one's own salvation that one cannot help thinking of others who have had no chance like ours.

In November last, in Lynchburg, there was a meeting of Junior Leaders; and on the day following the meeting of the Women's Auxiliary—Juniors' Day—delegates from ten branches represented the girls and boys of the Junior Auxiliary—sixteen representatives besides the sixty of Grace and St. Paul's, Lynchburg. Two manly boys from Bedford City, read their report, which told of work well done in their parish for those outside of their borders. Deaconess Radford, of Schuyler, Miss Neely of the Japan and Dr. Taylor of the China mission, all gave the young people truths of their respective works; graphically holding the interest of the crowd, and surely leaving behind them facts to be remembered and helpful. Dr. Taylor, our medical missionary in Gnanking, China, dressed in Chinese garb, queue and all, made a deep impression on the audience. Miss Neely, though in the dress of our land; clothed upon with tactful intelligence, gave to all the "message glorious." We need such in our own *Christian land*. It is sad to relate. The work done by our Lynchburg Deaconess at Schuyler, was represented practically by her two delegates and by the exhibit of the samples of their material work, made and sent out from the active mission to places in our own Diocese.

One of the most pleasing and important features of Junior Day was the election of Miss Lila Tucker as Assistant Secretary to Mrs. Lloyd.

The meetings in Lynchburg have given evidence that we should not neglect the "assembling of ourselves together" for worship and consultation. The reports are all in from the branches, and I think

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I can see the evidence of fresh thought and energy as results of such gatherings. Some of the branches have outstripped their former efforts and worked their best. It will be impossible to give the spirit of the work done by each branch, as now we have 54 branches; only the financial work is tabulated for inspection. But it would not be fair to those branches in Norfolk, Petersburg, Lynchburg, Hampton and elsewhere, if honorable mention were not made of their generous work and gifts. Some mistakes have arisen on the subject of when the report should be sent in; so Danville, usually so generous and good will appear in the Annual Report from May to May.

The pledges made for Southern Virginia Juniors were heralded by a sheet sent to each branch, along with the blank report. They were as follows:

Two new branches have been added to our Junior ranks: at Blackstone a boy's branch, and at Saltville one of girls and boys, and a lively branch re-organized by Miss Lila Tucker for St. Paul's, Lynchburg, whose report since shows active work done in spite of changes and absence of leader.

The Sunday Schools of Grace and St. Paul's, Lynchburg, added to what their Junior Auxiliary Branches had contributed for their pledges. This partnership and interest on the part of Sunday Schools is encouraging, and keeps us from being behind hand on the apportionment.

As a sample of intelligent leadership the Blackstone Branch writes: "These boys are learning the missionary Bishops and their fields of labor by heart, and are much interested in articles read from the Spirit of Missions. They have a missionary pig into which they drop their pennies; and they never forget their Junior Auxiliary prayers," a pretty good method and result. On each report blank, questions were asked about Study Classes, etc. This is one of the answers. We wish every branch could have done likewise. As an example of

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teaching and its result of discipleship, it will be interesting to cite an instance: A little girl of eleven years [ast Christmas day), not a member of the Episcopal Church but of a Junior Auxiliary Branch for nearly two years, moved with her parents to another place. In leaving her home of six years standing, and the local branch and its leader, she said it would be right, according to the teaching of the Acts of the Apostles, after learning the Will of God, and Christ's command to His disciples, to try and follow their example and do what she could to "teach all nations." Accordingly she asked permission of the minister to form a Junior Auxiliary Branch in his parish (she of Methodist parentage). The result has been wonderful. She is President of the branch of eight girls of her own age, and they have done most intelligent work ever since. How many of us grown Christians carry out literally our Lord's command like this little child!

The Diocesan Secretary, or "President" as I'm informed I should be called, could fill a volume with all that she saw and heard at the meetings of the Woman's and Junior Auxiliaries at the General Convention in Cincinnati. I will only be able to name a few impressions: First, the zeal that was shown in every place devoted to the work of the witnesses for Christ, whether as leaders of grown people, children, or the missionaries themselves. The Junior Department had many interesting features; the Study Classes for Junior Leaders, conducted by Miss Grace Lindley, now our general officer of the Junior work, who has her office in the Church Missions House, and her very capable sister, and others. The classes were attended each A. M., by the most enthusiastic women learning from and teaching others. One book, "The Winners of the World," I should like to speak of here as a sample of what Study Class teaching means, with a text book and the spirit of missions for help.

Then I saw the most interesting exhibit with about fifty boys and girls in a large hall. This was in the form of a play, "Mother Church and the Little Pilgrims." The clergyman, in his robes, had a short evening service, standing in a lovely garden with many voices behind him singing "The Church's One Foundation." I wish I could tell you all. But it seemed to me most impressive, and so beautifully and devoutly done by so many young people; and, having learned the "Trinity Course," the Church year, and Life of Christ, I could but fancy all had done the same, and the Prayer Book became dearer as each scene was enacted. Even the "Certificate" of the Prayer Book was represented by a dear little girl of nine years who gave a clear reason for the claims of the Prayer Book as taught her and others. The only regret to me was that I could not share with others in Southern Virginia what I had myself.

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When the auxiliary meetings come in the Fall let us have a still better time in our conference of Junior Leaders, and see if the failures of the year for lack of earnest leaders of young folks may not be a thing of the past.

That in our summer days we may at least say our midday prayers; that, all we do in the days to come may be answered prayers, is the wish of your loving Secretary (President).

THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LITTLE HELPERS'
AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF SOUTHERN VIRGINIA
TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The reports of the various branches of The Little Helpers' Auxiliary are now in hand; and I note with thankfulness to the children, their parents, my dear faithful officers, and to God, the Giver of all good gifts, an increase in the number of members, and a considerable increase in the amount of the offering laid on God's Altar this year. By this we feel greatly encouraged, but when we cast our eyes over the heathen world, and see the millions who know not that there is a God, we wonder that God has left himself without a witness; that they live and perish, with no knowledge of the God who made them, and of the Saviour who died to save their souls, and then, with painful consciousness, the truth is borne in upon our hearts that God did send them His message of Light, of forgiveness, and eternal life, and that we are the tardy messengers who have not delivered it; and they are dying in ignorance because we are unfaithful to our trust, to God's command, "Go ye into all the world and proclaim the Gospel."

When we look at the millions of heathen whom we are commanded to call into the Kingdom of God, and who are still in outer darkness; when we look at the small number of men and women and children who are laboring to help in missions, by giving, by praying, or by laboring to uphold and strengthen those who are bearing the burden and heat of the day, we must realize that we are disobeying a plain command, and neglecting a solemn duty, and that we are losing the blessing of God's approval. When we look at the great needs of the heathen, and the small charities of the Christian world, there sounds in our ears the war cry of the God of our forefathers, "Go forward."

Each year as I read the letters of many of my Leaders of the branches of the Little Helpers, I feel that the spirit of the Lord is upon them. When I see their zeal and love, and desire to serve and

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to labor to extend God's Kingdom, I feel that their hearts are His dwelling place, and that they are hastening the time of His coming to His Saints.

The Banner Branch this year has far surpassed all former records. There are sixty members of this glorious little band of workers, under the wonderful and inspiring leadership of Miss Victoria Dodson. They have this year given to Missions one hundred dollars. Some of it goes to foreign fields, and some will be used to build up the waste places in our own land and diocese. This offering of the Banner Branch of St. Paul's, Petersburg, fills our hearts with thanksgiving. Like Paul of old, they are ministering to all the churches. May God ever bless and quicken them, more and more to His service.

The Banner child of our Auxiliary is this year again Randolph Harrison, of St. Paul's, Lynchburg. His offering to missions is this year the largest he has ever made, being \$17.00. Mrs. R. E. Gish, the President of this Branch, sends the second largest offering to Missions—\$34.36. St. Luke's, Norfolk, under the active and efficient leadership of Mrs. Wilkinson, \$29.60. There are some of the Branches this year whose offering averages near two dollars apiece for each member. They are St. Paul's, Petersburg, St. Paul's, Lynchburg, and St. Thomas', Abingdon.

The following branches average one dollar or more: St. Paul's, Norfolk; St. Thomas', West Russell Parish, Bedford County; Grace, Lynchburg, and the two little members of Los Angeles and Plastico. The Branches that nearly come up to this average are: St. Luke's, Norfolk; St. Peter's, Norfolk; Emmanuel, Kempville. Our largest Branches are: St. Paul's, Petersburg; Trinity, Portsmouth; St. Luke's, Norfolk; Christ, Norfolk; St. John's, Roanoke; Trinity, Staunton; St. Paul's, Salem. They have each done a fine work.

In many of the Branches not mentioned, there are individual children who gave a dollar, some largely over.

All of my officers and the dear little children have done splendid work this year, and sent an offering that will speed forward the glad tidings of the gospel of Christ.
