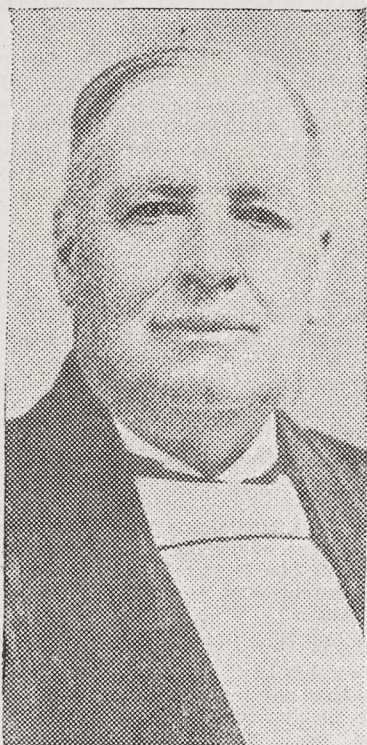

MINUTES OF THE DIOCESAN ANNUAL MEETING

The thirty-seventh annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Southern Virginia convened in St. Luke's Church, Norfolk, October 29, 30 and 31.

Two hundred and fifty delegates and visitors made this the largest meeting we have ever had. There were present also guests from the Diocese of North Carolina and Georgia.

"Japan" and "Our Diocese" were the keynote topics of the convention.

The guests of honor were the Rt. Rev. C. S. Reifsnider, Suffragan Bishop of North Tokio, Japan; Miss Louisa H. Boyd, U. T. O. Missionary to North Tokio; Miss Grace Lindly, National Executive Secretary; Mrs. T. K. Wade, National Supply Secretary; the two latter from New York. Fine addresses were made by these visitors.

On Tuesday night, in the parish house of St. Luke's, the convention was welcomed by Dr. David Howard, rector, who presented the Bishop of the Diocese, and he gave his annual address to the Woman's Auxiliary.

This was followed by the United Thank Offering play, "The Little Blue Box." Mrs. Joseph D. Deal, president of the III Circle of St. Luke's, had arranged this part of the program. It was very lovely in detail, Mrs. Deal taking the part of the Blue Box in a most pleasing manner. The playlet was both instructive and entertaining.

A social hour, and informal reception, gave the delegates an opportunity to greet one another. The rector, Dr. Howard, and the members of St. Luke's making everyone welcome and happy.

On Wednesday at 9:30 A. M. the assembly gathered at St. Luke's Church for Corporate Communion and commemoration of the departed, the Rt. Rev. B. D. Tucker and the Rt. Rev. A. C. Thomson, celebrants.

The business session was then called to order by the presiding officer, Mrs. Walter Whichard, Diocesan president.

The welcome address was given by Mrs. E. B. Hodges, president of St. Luke's first circle, and the response was made by Mrs. James Scott of Petersburg, former vice-president of this Diocese.

The president's annual message was delivered and ordered printed in full in our Annual Report together with the reports given by the other officers.

We were most fortunate in having our national executive secretary, Miss Grace Lindley, present to lead the noon day devotional and give an address. Her deep spirituality and earnestness were keenly felt and her valuable missionary message was most illuminating.

Much interest was manifested in the reports of our Diocesan institutions, especially the ones given in person by Miss Mildred Edmonds, of Dabney House. She told us of the great opportunity for an industrial school at this center. Miss Annie Hankins reported the Phoebe Ann Community House, Deaconess Howell, the Jackson-Feild Home.

Plans are being made to erect here an additional cottage, to be known as the Maria Washington Tucker cottage, a memorial to the wife of our beloved Bishop B. D. Tucker.

The report from "Camp Robert Hunt," a recreational camp for boys and girls, first conceived of by Bishop A. C. Thomson, now in its seventh year, was made by Mrs. E. V. Brush.

More applications came than could be cared for; it ran ahead of expenses, paid for many improvements, reduced the debt, so that the entire property is very nearly paid for.

"Chatham Hall, our Diocesan School," was presented by the rector, Dr. Edmund J. Lee, D. D. The Fork Community House reported by Mrs. Henry Edmunds, 3rd, vice-president, and a written report came from Mrs. Clark which told the story of the Clarkton Community House.

Two of the most outstanding reports were made by Mrs. Frank

Darling, honorary president and field secretary of this Diocese, and Mrs. C. F. Ruan, educational secretary. To quote Mrs. Darling:

"There are about twelve thousand women communicants in Southern Virginia. We have about two thousand five hundred listed as members of the Woman's Auxiliary. Where are the other nine thousand five hundred? If each one of us would bring four women into the Auxiliary every Episcopal woman in the Diocese would be helping." WHAT A CHALLENGE? The other came from Mrs. Walter Ruan, educational secretary of the Diocese, who gave a most encouraging report of the educational work being done. Last year there were eighty-five study classes. Not only more branches ordered the course for study, but ministers are using it for vestries. The demand for the Lending Library, carried on by our educational secretary, has been so great that five sets of the Five Dollar Lending Library have been ordered. This library is available on request to Mrs. Ruan, Petersburg, Va. A donation of fifty dollars from the Auxiliary was sent to Archdeacon Russell to be used for educational purposes in the Colored Convocation. Four boys and four girls were enabled to attend the Colored School of Religious Education held in Lawrenceville, Va., in July.

The Lawrenceville Auxiliary was the banner branch for study classes this year.

The new library is now ready and can be ordered from Mrs. C. F. Ruan, the educational secretary. Mrs. Ruan will be very glad of books donated for the Diocesan Library.

During the luncheon, which was beautifully and bountifully served by the ladies of the Christian Church (Disciples), Mrs. Louis Pilcher, 2nd vice-president, of Petersburg, reported the Synod which met in Harrisburg, Pa., in October, to which she was a delegate from this Diocese, and Mrs. Frank Darling gave an account of her recent trip to the Holy Land in a paper, "Glimpses from Jerusalem."

At the meeting of the Synod, which embraces the Province of Washington, Mrs. Frank Holladay was elected one of the three members to serve with the officers of the Executive Committee of the III Province, and Mrs. Walter Whichard was appointed a member of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee.

The drive to Virginia Beach, Ocean View and Cape Henry, with a stop for tea at Camp Robert Hunt, arranged by Mrs. W. H. Taylor, 3rd, president of St. Luke's Second Circle, proved a most charming way to spend Wednesday afternoon.

At 9:30 Thursday morning a most helpful service of devotion and meditation was conducted by the Rt. Rev. A. C. Thomson, D. D.

Noon day prayer was offered by Rev. Edmond J. Lee, D. D., of Chatham Hall.

Mrs. E. J. Lee reported for the Committee on Recruiting.

Mrs. E. V. Brush of Suffolk and Miss Hattie Gray of Farmville were added to this committee, Mrs. John Bentley of Williamsburg and Mrs. Lee being the other two members.

Mrs. T. K. Wade, national supply secretary, in making a general report of this branch of work, told of the great need of standard garments for the store room at The Church Missions House. She suggested that branches hem towels, pillow cases and make children's clothes for this department, and cited the fact that when the terrible disaster came to Porto Rico, the Diocese of Washington was able to send from their Diocesan store room clothes to these sufferers even before the Red Cross could get to them.

(This suggests a beautiful way to interest the young women of our church, especially the young mothers. This work can be done at home at any time.)

Mrs. Wade further reported that the entire church is doing \$300,000 worth of supply work yearly; that New York expends \$43,000 yearly; 300 clergy are sent personal boxes; 200 mission stations and hospitals are helped; Christmas presents are sent to all our mission

workers, and thousands of dollars worth of clothing and other household necessities are being sent to the Diocese of Virginia and Southwest Virginia. Information as to the places our supply work is being sent can be had by applying to 281 Fourth Ave., New York.

The budget for 1930—\$2,515.00—an increase of \$166 over last year, was presented by Mrs. C. R. Grandy, treasurer. This was accepted by the convention, and will be printed in full elsewhere in this Report.

Mrs. N. E. Price, Meredithville, chairman of the National Corporate Gift, reported that our Diocese was still \$135 short of the allotted \$551 given us for this time, only 48 branches having sent donations.

Mrs. James Scott, chairman of funds for St. Luke's, Tokio, reported a splendid sum over \$1,000 having been raised for this project, and some branches are still to report.

Mrs. E. B. Hodges, chairman, reported the Diocesan Corporate Gift. This gift of \$360 yearly for work among the students at William and Mary College proves a great help to our work there.

The Executive Board of the Auxiliary recommended a gift of \$50 to be used at the State Normal College in Farmville.

Mrs. A. S. Eley, chairman of Altar Linen, reported that 11 sets of communion linen are ready for distribution, with material for one other set on hand. (During the day it was decided to send one set to Miss Clara Neely and one to Miss Louisa Boyd, for the Japanese churches.)

It was with genuine regret that the president was forced to accept Mrs. Eley's resignation as chairman of this work. Mrs. Eley has done the work beautifully and thoroughly and many churches rejoice in exquisite altar linen because of her pains-taking care. Although Mrs. Eley was urged to get help and continue as chairman, trouble with her eyes compelled her to give it up.

The report of the Diocesan Pantry, Mrs. Keith Lee, chairman, will be printed in full. Mrs. Lee made this very important suggestion: That you make your lists before packing your boxes, send to the chairman and get her instructions so that each branch or district chairman can ship supplies to the nearest point.

Mrs. A. E. Ewell, Lynnhaven, chairman of Rural Work, reported, naming the following committee to assist her in this work: Mrs. C. F. Ruan, Petersburg; Mrs. C. E. Stewart, Powhatan; Miss Annie Hankins, Halifax; Miss Mildred Edmonds, Java; Miss Hilda Potts, Burrowsville.

Mrs. C. E. Smith, chairman, reported the meeting of the summer colored convocation. Mrs. Smith made a request for prayer books to be sent to her address at Lunenburg, Va.

"Greetings" were given by Mrs. R. A. Gay, Diocesan president of the Girls' Friendly Society, and Mrs. A. Lee B. Ribble, Diocesan president of the Daughters of the King, and a report of the Church Periodical Club was given by Mrs. J. B. Hudgins, Provincial secretary.

In the absence of the U. T. O. custodian, the secretary of the Prayer Partnership Plan and the treasurer, Mrs. Wm. B. Baldwin, of the Maria Washington Tucker Memorial Fund, these reports were read by the secretary and will be printed in this report in full.

The following committees were named by the president:

On Nominations—Mrs. Rucker Penn, Danville; Mrs. Ida Mason, Hopewell; Miss Elizabeth Salle, Hallsboro.

On Resolutions—Mrs. L. C. Shepherd, Norfolk; Mrs. E. W. Nottingham, Eastern Shore; Mrs. Chas. Warren, Smithfield.

The Bishop of the Diocese appointed Mrs. Frank Holladay of Suffolk president of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, her term beginning January 1, 1930. The following new officers were elected: Mrs. Joseph D. Deal, Norfolk, secretary; Mrs. Harry H. Russell, Cape Charles, social service secretary. The other fifteen officers succeeded themselves for another term.

Mrs. Frank Darling expressed the love and appreciation of Mrs. Walter Whichard, the retiring president, not only from each member of the Executive Board but of the membership of the Auxiliaries of the Diocese. Her wise rulings, her deep sense of the power of the spiritual life, unfailing thoughts of others have made her greatly beloved. Mrs. Whichard was presented with a prayer book and hymnal by the board.

Mrs. Randolph Barksdale, of Petersburg, who this year completed ten years of splendid service as custodian of the U. T. O., was presented also a prayer book by the board.

Many tributes were paid to Mrs. Whyllie of the Dominican Republic and her wonderful personality in bringing the story of the great work she and her husband are doing in this far off field.

Also a great appreciation was expressed for the marvelous help that the community health nurse and agricultural agents are giving to our community workers.

Mrs. A. S. Eley invited the Auxiliary to St. Paul's, Suffolk, for the next annual meeting. This invitation was accepted.

After the re-dedication service and the singing of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," the meeting was declared adjourned.

REPORT AND MESSAGE OF THE DIOCESAN PRESIDENT

To our Bishops and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Coming to the close of the three years as your Diocesan president, my heart is full of gratitude to our Bishops, the Executive Board and every member of the Auxiliary for the many privileges that have been mine during the term of office. The responsibilities and obligations have been great, but the blessings still greater.

My goal in taking office was to know individually the members of the Auxiliary and my hope has been very nearly realized. True joy has come from these personal contacts which have been made in going over the Diocese many times.

In planning this meeting we have been looking forward since January to having Bishop Murray with us. Although he has joined the Church Triumphant we feel his presence here today. Let us stand a moment to honor his memory.

At these annual meetings we gain mutual inspiration and information from the reports of work done in the five fields of service. While interchanging ideas and methods we stimulate our own interest and work.

I will not attempt to review the excellent work accomplished by the Auxiliary during the past year, as our most efficient officers and chairmen will bring this out in their reports, but I do want to call your attention to the faithful service rendered by our valuable United Thank Offering custodian, Mrs. Barksdale, who is now completing ten years of joyful service. Her accomplishments in this branch of our work are too well known to you for me to dwell on them. We can show our love and admiration for her in no better way than by increasing our interest in the United Thank Offering and assisting her whenever it is possible.

It has been my pleasure this year to attend the Provincial Synod, in Harrisburg, Pa., as one of your delegates. I had a part on the program of the Diocesan Days held in all points of the Diocese, and I have visited most of the Diocesan institutions.

Besides speaking at the Norfolk district meeting, I spoke at many parish branch meetings—two out of the Diocese and also to a missionary meeting of Baptist women. I presided over all the Executive Board Meetings and attended two Chatham Hall Board of Trustees' meetings. I heartily commend this splendid Diocesan school to you. Much time was spent in correspondence, which is one of the most interesting phases of this work. I compiled our Annual Report and arranged the program for this meeting.

A Committee on Recruits for the Mission Field has been formed, with Mrs. Edmund Lee as chairman, and we have also added a chairman for Rural Work, Mrs. A. E. Ewell. New branches have been organized, which of course means more members.

As I have suggested before, each parish branch should have a membership chairman, her goal being every baptized woman a member of the Auxiliary. If each member would interest one young person our power for the extension of Christ's Kingdom would be greatly increased. Through prayer and the personal touch we can redouble our efforts in enlisting every woman in the Diocese as a member. Give them something to do in which their interest is aroused and many new leaders will be developed whose leadership, I believe, you will find most effective. Co-operate with the Girls' Friendly Society and the Daughters of the King.

Include the Church Periodical Club in your work and see that every member reads The Diocesan Record and the Spirit of Missions. Our organization can be very far-reaching by supporting the Church's Program. In your parish meetings, tell not only of work done locally and in the Diocese but also in the National Church. Let us never miss an opportunity to take a step toward Church Unity and World Peace. Arrange more Corporate Communion, Devotional Days and Quiet

Hours, and observe the World Day of Prayer. It is in these services that we are drawn closer to our Lord and to each other.

Since the National Corporate Communion is observed in the spring, the Feast of the Purification, the Diocesan Board has decided to change our Diocesan one from Epiphany to All Saints' Day.

I am sure all of us are looking forward to the time when the Maria Washington Tucker Cottage, at Jackson-Feild Episcopal Home, will be a reality. Mr. Marshall, the rector, writes most enthusiastically when stressing the great need for the building.

With such women as now fill the various parish and Diocesan offices, our work will surely go forward. Let us remember God is equal to making us equal to anything He calls upon us to do.

As I go out of office in January, I want to express my deep appreciation for the sympathetic co-operation you have given me. The contacts made with our Bishops, the relationships which have been established with parish branches and the ties of friendship between the members of the Executive Board will go with me through life. As an ex-officer, I want to be of real service to the Diocese. When I pass on my duties to my successor it will be with the hope that she will receive as hearty co-operation and as rich a blessing as has been accorded to me.

The thought that I wish to leave with you in closing is the topic for our next World Day of Prayer—"That Jesus May Be Lifted Up." Let us realize that He can not be lifted up without our human hands. The year 1929 has been a busy one for this department. Early in January an outline of six programs for branch meetings was prepared and sent to each branch president—also published in the Diocesan Record. This was followed in July by five programs suited for the fall meetings of branches. These programs were designed to suggest subjects for information at branch meetings, and sources for getting this information, hoping to stimulate reading by members in preparing these programs. One of the by-products has been the number of interesting branch programs which have been reported to your secretary.

In May the programs for the Sweet Briar Summer School were sent to all branch presidents and educational secretaries.

The three Educational Institutes held in February were more largely attended than our institutes have ever been, and if their success can be measured by books sold, they were the most successful we have ever held.

We have at last really established a Lending Library, and have printed a book list of over 150 books now available for your use. The reference books on Africa were in great demand during the Lenten Study Class season.

A large number of leaflets were distributed to new branches.

I have kept no record of the number of letters written, but they were many. It is always a pleasure to be asked for information and help of any kind. Six visits were made to branch meetings where I was asked to speak, and help was given one branch in materials for a pageant.

REPORT OF DIOCESAN PANTRY

Your chairman desires to express her pleasure that this year it is possible for her to present her report in person instead of mailing it in. Each year previous, something has prevented her attendance. It is indeed a pleasure and privilege to be here and to thank you personally for the part you have played in giving us this measure of success which could never have been attained without your very gracious assistance.

We have received reports of collections of the following:

520 quarts of canned fruits, preserves, canned vegetables, etc.

3 two-quart jars of canned fruits, preserves, canned vegetables, etc.

190 pint jars of canned fruits, preserves, canned vegetables, etc.

77 half-pint jars of canned fruits, preserves, canned vegetables, etc.

Also 1½ dozen glasses jelly, half dozen jars peanut butter, 11 boxes of oatmeal, 2 cases and 5 cans potted meats, 1 lb. candy, 4 pounds canned fish, 2 lb. sugar, 1 can milk, 1 box cocoa, 1 bbl. and 1 bu. potatoes, half bu. sweet potatoes and 5 boxes miscellaneous materials which were shipped by various branches without making a list of them. Total, 890 containers and 5 boxes miscellaneous.

In this connection your chairman would make two suggestions: First, that you make your lists before packing the boxes and send list to the chairman at the time you ask for shipping instructions. Second, that the chairman will try so far as possible to recommend that you ship to the nearest point to you, as this saves freight and also breakage and spoilage along the way. Please try to do this.

If each of you could read the letters and hear what is said by the recipients of these supplies I am sure it would make you feel that you were indeed doing it "in His Name."

REPORT OF EXTENSION SECRETARY

Your Extension Secretary is in no way responsible for the new branches formed. The vice-presidents and the other officers and other members have performed that service.

The only service I have been able to render is to urge every branch to see that every woman in her parish is working for the Auxiliary. It has been done; it can be done, and I believe that since to be a 100% branch we must work in the five fields of service, all of our church work can be done under one organization and that organization is the Woman's Auxiliary.

We were so confused a few years ago by the term "Church Service League." Let us drop that term and cling to our old organization, the Woman's Auxiliary. It will unify the work. I know of churches in other diocese who are working on this plan, and Christ and Grace Churches, Petersburg, have brought all of their woman's activities under the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Ladies' Aids and the various guilds do not like to give up their names. The work is carried on about the same as the women are divided into the various groups for service, but it is all headed up under one organization. In my own parish we are working along those lines by naming the presidents of the aid and the guild vice-presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary so that ties us all together and all feel the responsibility.

The Auxiliary divided into groups certainly helps to extend the influence of the Auxiliary and to increase her workers. Trinity,

Portsmouth, and St. John's, Hampton, have such an organization. Any method that will bring the women into the Auxiliary is the best for that Auxiliary.

We have 9,000 women in Southern Virginia who do not work for the Auxiliary. The 2,000 of us who are trying to do a little bit must bring those 9,000 into the Auxiliary. Can we do it? Each one of us bring four women who are not now in the Auxiliary work into the organization. Will you accept the challenge?

October 29, 1929.

My Dear Friend:

I know how you dislike circular letters, but please read this one. This is a circular in that it is concerned with Eternal, never ending love which is the foundation of everything worth while in this world. The love for our Church and the all-consuming fire in the hearts of her members that "all the world" may enjoy the blessed privileges we enjoy, concerns us every one. There are about 12,000 women communicants in Southern Virginia. We have about 2,500 listed as members of the Woman's Auxiliary. Where are the other 9,500 women? If each of us should bring four women into the Auxiliary every Episcopal woman in the Diocese would be helping. What a help to have, 9,000 more women in the Auxiliary! Let's do it. No one is going to ask you to do it. Just go ahead and do it. Don't expect the officers to do all the work of the rank and file of the Auxiliary. Just see that every woman in your parish has a part in the Auxiliary work. In the prayers, the boxes, the money given (if she is blessed with a money talent), calling on strangers, shut-ins, sick, timid folk, lonely folk, religious education, Spirit of Missions, Diocesan Record, a part in the five fields of service, Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation, World.

The Diocesan vice-presidents and any other Diocesan officer will help you to arrange a branch in a neighboring parish. See that every woman in your own parish is doing Auxiliary work.

The circle plan is wonderful. Make your Auxiliary work popular. Inform the women in your parish in regard to our work: Diocesan Pledges, Study Book, Prayer Partnership, Prayer Days, Boxes, Diocesan Organizations, Jackson-Feild Home, Dabney House, Chatham Hall, Phoebe Anne Community House, Robert Hunt Camp and most important the Churches' Program. Make the heart of our good Bishop glad because 12,000 women are cheerfully helping him bear the burden of the Church's work in Southern Virginia, for "Him who went about doing good."

"Let none whom He hath ransomed fail to meet Him," through the neglect of any woman in Southern Virginia.

REPORT OF RURAL CHAIRMAN

The Rural Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary has been organized recently in our Diocese. It is made up of people actually engaged in rural work—one might say experts in this field of endeavor. It does not seem unreasonable to expect, therefore, that their deliberations may lead to such recommendations as may be of material assistance to the weak rural churches of our Diocese. RECRUITS FOR THE MISSION FIELD

You may remember that at the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Washington, the following resolution was passed:

"RESOLVED: That the Woman's Auxiliary in triennial meeting

assembled in Washington recommend to all Diocesan branches the formation of committees on recruiting, to work in co-operation with the Department of Missions or any department seeking workers, in the finding and encouraging of possible candidates for missionary service and other church work. Further, to investigate and follow up such candidates whose names may be referred to Diocesan committees by the Department of Missions; further, it is suggested that the Diocesan committees be made up of selected women with representatives of various groups in the Diocese connected with young people and professional women needed in the mission field."

As a result of this, a committee on "Recruiting" has been appointed by the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese. Mrs. Frank Darling, Hampton; Mrs. John Bentley, Williamsburg; Mrs. E. V. Brush, Suffolk, and Miss Hattie Gray, Farmville, constitute the other members of the committee. We will present from time to time the need for workers in the various mission fields through the Record.

While the Department of Missions is making no attempt at this time to extend the various work of our Church or to enter new fields, in order to hold the ground already occupied and to staff the existing institutions it has issued a call for workers from the Church at large. The list of recruits needed at once is given below. Especially urgent is the call for two nurses for St. Luke's Hospital, Manila, Philippines.

Mr. Parson, our assistant foreign secretary, writes:

"This hospital has 120 beds and sets a high standard in medical and nursing work not only for the city of Manila, but for the whole archipelago. Practically all of the city physicians of high standing use the hospital. When complete, the nursing staff totals five.

"The most important feature of the hospital is the training school for Filipino nurses, of whom there are fifty, housed in their own comfortable quarters.

"We want attractive, sensible young women, preferably not under 25 years of age, who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, graduates of training schools of high standing, who are interested in missionary work and willing to volunteer for a period of at least four years. They should be free from binding family obligations and willing to use their nursing ability as a means of carrying on Christian work. For this reason it can readily be seen that they should be thoroughly loyal communicants."

A List of Workers Needed in the Mission Field

Recommendations:

(a) The Memorial Executive Committee recommends that
the plans for the cottage now in hand be replaced with one of colo-
nial type, probably with a main building and wings on either side,
with the thought of addition at any time.

(b) That the building be started early in 1930 and a date set
for the laying of the cornerstone, which can be announced at the
Diocesan Council to be held in January.

In planning for this Memorial, the committee had in mind a cot-
tage to cost \$15,000.00 and the additional amount was for furnishing
and endowment. We feel when the building is in construction the
furniture will be easily obtained and the endowment will follow.

Realizing the rectory now used by the Home might not be
available indefinitely, we feel an urgent need for the cottage to be
built at once.

Maria Washington Tucker Memorial Executive Committee."

HIGH LIGHTS OF THE SYNOD AS GIVEN BY A DELEGATE

When the anticipation of attendance upon the Provincial Synod became a reality, womanlike, I began to talk about it and discovered that there were quite a few people, including two vestrymen, who did not know the Episcopal Church had Synods. Presuming there may be others who have a hazy idea of the subject, I would like to say that the Synod is composed of the Bishops, lay, and clerical delegates from diocese within certain geographical lines comprising a Province. It meets the intervening years between the general conventions. It is not a legislative body, but meets for inspiration and conference in order to clarify matters that arise at the general conventions. The woman's division includes delegates from the Woman's Auxiliary, G. F. S., Daughters of the King, Church Mission of Help, the C. P. C. and St. Barnabas Guild for Nurses.

The Eleventh Synod of the Province of Washington was held in Harrisburg, Pa., on October 15th, 16th and 17th. The topics of the meetings may be classified under three heads: Missions, Christian Social Service and Religious Education.

The opening service was a devotional one conducted by the Rev. Floyd Tompkins, D. D., of Philadelphia, which put us in tune, so to speak, for the wonderful services to follow. He called to mind the four salient points in the life of a Christian, namely: Faith that never falters; Love that never grows old; Consciousness of God in all our services; Vision that the world is coming to Christ in Faith; love and devoted service. At 8 p. m. there was a mass meeting in the interest of missions. As the strains of the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus," pealed forth a choir of fifty boys and men, followed by eighteen bishops, marched up the aisle, a most inspiring sight. Our own beloved Bishop Tucker conducted the service and the Rt. Rev. Chas. Reifsnider, D. D., of Tokio, and the Rt. Rev. Robert Campbell, of Liberia, were the speakers. They both stressed our responsibility in carrying on what we have begun, saying the harvest is white if we will only do our part in furnishing them the necessary equipment.

On Wednesday the Woman's Auxiliary met at 9:30 a. m. for reports and a short business session, re-convening at 11 a. m. in joint session with the Synod. The subject of rural work was the first consideration, and there were several speakers, among them Mr. Myron Marshall, who gave interesting statistics showing the large percentage of the clergy who have come out of rural parishes, and the great value of the rural parish to the general Church.

Bishop Ward of Erie made a stirring appeal for the accomplishment of the advance work of the Church's program. He stated that most dioceses had gone back in their gifts to missions, some a third and some as much as one-half. The per capita gifts to missions in 1929 was \$37.78. Per capita gifts have increased, but general gifts decreased; in other words, a few are giving largely, but many are giving nothing.

Dr. John Wood, representing the Department of Missions, dissected, so to speak, the department, showing just how it works. He feelingly spoke of the necessary cut in the missionary work of the Church, because we fail to meet our quotas.

He said he had reached the conclusion that the "pay as we go" plan was really to go as we pay, and we pay any way we please.

After a delicious luncheon at the Civic Club, the joint session re-convened. Mrs. John Glenn, National President of the Church Mission of Help, gave some striking examples of the work of that organization in helping the insecure girl find herself in religion.

Rev. Reinhold Rogers, of the Boys' Home at Covington, told of his work, which is familiar to most of you.

Rev. Percy K. Kammerer, Ph.D., Dean of Trinity Cathedral, Pittsburgh, and head of the Church's commission on marriage and divorce, spoke on "The Pastor and the Family," and the growing lack of personal contact between the two. He made the appalling state-

ment that the number of divorces in America is three times as great as the increase in population.

At 4 p. m. the Synod was delightfully entertained at a tea given by the Rt. Rev. Darlington, Bishop of Harrisburg, and Mrs. Darlington, at their charming home. The night session was addressed by Rev. Samuel Tyler, D. D., of Rochester, N. Y., who dealt principally with social conditions in the large cities, and work among the foreign born.

On Thursday we met in St. Paul's Church for a regular Auxiliary meeting, reports, elections, resolutions, etc.

Miss Edna Eastwood, from the Department of Religious Education of the National Council, spoke on "The Isolated Church Woman," and her talk was replete with suggestions and ways of interesting unchurched people. There seems to be no end to the varied topics which are covered by the department of religious education and pamphlets are issued which cover almost any subject upon which a church woman wishes to inform herself. These can be obtained from 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, N. Y.

Miss Elizabeth Winegar, of the Ragged Mountains, who works under Archdeacon Neve, was the official guest of the Synod. In touching terms she told of her work and of her great gratitude for the missionary boxes that have been sent her. If it were not for them, often times infants would not have a garment to put on when they came into the world. She said the most encouraging aspect of her work was the awakening among the young people of a real desire for service and the joy it brings. Deaconess Gertrude Stewart, head of the Church Training, and Deaconess House, Philadelphia, but for twenty-one years missionary to China, gave us glimpses of her work in both places, and quoted Bishop Graves as saying in the past year, in spite of the upheaval in China, that there have been more baptisms and confirmations than ever before.

The closing service was a quiet hour led by the Rt. Rev. E. L. Strider, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor of West Virginia. He bade us be firm in our faith and charitable in our thoughts of others, saying faith in our God coupled with faith in man were the two centers of our religion and in order to attain unto the mark of our high calling in God we must strive—

To see Him more clearly,

To love Him more dearly,

To follow Him more nearly, through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

MESSAGE TO THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY FROM GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

As the new Diocesan president of the Girls' Friendly Society, it is a pleasure as well as a privilege to bring to the Woman's Auxiliary a message from the Girls' Friendly Society of this Diocese.

As you all doubtless know, the missionary work of the Girls' Friendly Society of America follows along the line of the Woman's Auxiliary work. Every year our mission study grows more vital to us. This is proved by the enthusiasm with which branches threw themselves into the work for Africa, trying to understand the people and their problems and endeavoring to translate the new-found sense of fellowship which this study brought into the tangible terms of a money gift. As a result, over \$6,000 has been subscribed for the women's wing of the hospital at Cape Palmas, Liberia—over \$1,000 more than the sum pledged. The Girls' Friendly Society has taken for its mission study for 1929 the same topic as that chosen by the Department of Religious Education of the National Council of the Church—"Our World at Work." We shall be studying this single issue discussed at the Jerusalem Conference of 1928, while you of the Woman's Auxiliary, will be studying all the problems in this world of ours that were considered there. Our new money offering is to go nearer home this year—to St. Andrew's Mission, Mayaguez, Porto Rico, where there is a splendid branch of the Girls' Friendly Society. Of course, the Girls' Friendly of this Diocese only has a small part in this work, but it is thrilling to be part of this great undertaking. For our own Diocesan mission work we have Dabney House and Jackson-Feild Home and have pledged our help to them this year as we have in the past. One of our branches has as its own special work the clothing of one of the children at Jackson-Feild Home and our assignment from the Box Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary was clothing for an Indian Mission in South Dakota.

May I tell you in closing this message that at least five new branches will be reported to National Office this year. All the associates of the Girls' Friendly Society, as you already know, are com-

municants of the Episcopal Church, but the members of the Society may be of any denomination. We feel that our associates must above all have a genuine love for girls and a sympathetic companionship with them, bringing out the best in each of them. Girls need to know how to find their place in the community, that is vocational guidance, their duties as citizens of their local community and of the world, the opportunities open to them for service, as in the Red Cross, etc., and how to answer personal problems—what to do in a given situation, in other words, manners and etiquette, how to get along with their friends and parents, human relationship, how to be charming, but perhaps the greatest contribution the associate can make to a girl is to help her through work, play and worship to grow towards God—how to know God, pray to Him and realize Him in their lives. We ask your help and prayers for the girls of the present who are the future women of the Church, that they may be ready to take upon their shoulders the mantels of those who are now carrying on our Lord's work upon this earth.

THE BIRTH OF "THE DAUGHTERS OF THE KING"

This may be of interest to those who do not know how, when or where "The Daughters of the King" came into being.

The senior Bible Class for young women in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, New York, had for its class name, Daughters of the King. Desirous of stimulating its members to greater activity and zeal for Christ and His Church, their teacher, Mrs. M. J. Franklin, called a meeting on Easter Eve, 1885. The purpose was to arouse interest of the members and to urge their co-operation in some definite work for the Church.

Having obtained consent of the Rector to form an association, a committee was appointed to select an emblem and a motto. Before Whitsunday of the same year, the class was started and work begun. The daughters felt that the work could be done by the exercise of greater patience and prayer. Therefore, the first of the two rules of the Daughters of the King was called "Pray."

Pray for Christ's Kingdom, especially among women, and the second is "Effort." To make a constant effort to bring women within His Kingdom.

The Daughters work among women, just as the Brotherhood of St. Andrew work among men. In fact, the Brotherhood's rule, that each member should bring at least one person to service each week, was adopted. Their first effort was to bring women to the Bible Class; next, the Daughters had special pews in the church, where some of them always sat, in order to be able to speak to and find the services in the prayer book for strangers.

The cross, the motto and watchword were adopted by several other classes and societies in and out of the parish. Permission was asked to affiliate and this led to the adoption of the original constitution which remained in force until November, 1891.

By 1889 there were six chapters. We can now report 461 senior and 80 junior chapters, with chapters in England and Canada. The order in no way conflicts with the other societies or parochial activities. It is purely religious. "With lofty mind uphold the Cross," is its watchword. "For His Sake," its motto.

I can trust that He will raise up friends that He has blessed with means that they may ever go on, as long as there is a need for these children, To know Christ, and make Him known.

We attended the School of Religious Education in large numbers, and through the generous help of the Diocesan Branch of Southern

Virginia many were enabled to go from the Rural Auxiliaries.

The Colored Old Folks Home stands for the help and comfort of the old and homeless; of course we need everything for it, to make it what God would have that we may be more able to serve. Yet I have not waited for that, but kept on in His name with what we have, and made many declining years happy.

Praying that this year may be the greatest in the history of the colored work in Southern Virginia with the District meetings to be added, may love, joy and God's richest blessing be added to our many branches that are doing their bit in this great chain of love that encircles the known world.
