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October 28, 1924.

The fifth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia was held in St. John's Episcopal Church, Bedford, October 28th, 29th, 30th, 1924.

A meeting of the Executive Board was called to order at 4:00 o'clock by the President. After a prayer for direction, a short business session was held. All of the officers were present.

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#### QUIET HOUR

The quiet hour service of meditation and preparation was conducted by Mrs. Walter Ruan of Petersburg. The subject chosen "Prayer and Service."

"Prayer."

God listens to every petition with His whole heart. Each time we pray the whole infinite God is there to hear. He asks that in each prayer the whole man shall be there too.

"If ye abide in me and my words abide in you, ask whatsoever you will and it shall be done unto you."

"We, the Church, the world need nothing so much now as the spirit of intercession to bring down the power of God on Earth."

A prayer for the descent from heaven of the spirit of intercession and for a great prayer revival was offered.

"Service."

What is service? Who is my neighbor?

Which is the greatest Commandment?

As I ask these questions the answer comes quickly to your mind, as a picture flashed on the screen. You see the Master talking to the rich young ruler, the Lawyer, the crowd of Scribes and Pharisees.

We feel sometimes that service must be some great thing like the gift of fortune or a life. But condemnation was pronounced alike to great and small, also rewards to the widow who gave her mite as well as the nobleman and captain of a hundred men, who ministered unto many.

And so we face our work with faith and courage. Each day a new duty, each year a new task. We are helping to make Church History—we are helping to extend the Kingdom. May it be done this year with a deeper sense of power through prayer, can we not draw nigh unto God feeling the strength of presence, knowing that in spite of so many discouragements,

“While God is in heaven,  
All’s well with the world.”

Once more we listen to the Master’s voice as he gives to us our great commission and the realization sinks deep into our hearts that it is through service that souls are to be won.

### ADDRESS OF WELCOME

Mrs. O. C. Bell, Bedford, as hostess, charmingly welcomed the delegates. In her address of welcome she said that a Woman's Auxiliary had existed in Bedford since the organization of the Auxiliary in Virginia. So that, of itself, would cause the Bedford branch to welcome the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. Coming together in this way would be an inspiration and a help.

### RESPONSE

Mrs. W. H. B. Loving, Salem, in her response for the Auxiliary, as a whole, expressed the appreciation and joy of being with St. John's Auxiliary and of finding such a true and sincere welcome in the church, homes and hearts of the women of Bedford. She felt assured that all visitors would return home with pleasant memories and thankfulness that we were privileged to attend this meeting.

### BISHOP'S ADDRESS

The Bishop in his address stressed three points: Spiritual Life, Faithfulness, Coöperation.

In this day of organization, let the spiritual life be supreme. Be careful lest you become mechanical. Second, Faithfulness—When you undertake to do a thing, *Do It*. Remember never to complain of any work that is done for our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ. In connection with this the Bishop told of the new policy in the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia, in regard to funds for the Program of the Church. All gifts from every church will be volunteer—there will be *no* assessment. The Leader is a layman, Mr. W. D. Tyler, Dante, Va. It has been prophesied that this

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method will fail—the Diocese accepts the challenge. The Bishop instructed the Woman's Auxiliary to go back to their homes and by their influence, work and prayer help to make the plan a success.

This brought in the final note—Coöperation. Parochial service alone is selfishness. In the service we render to Christ we must break beyond the border of the Parish of the Diocese to the world, wherever there is need.

The address closed with this benediction: "God bless you, my women. While you must plan I shall pray to draw the arms of the Lord about you that you may be used in a wonderful way for the advancement of the Kingdom."

### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The President, after extending greetings, made a short address, in this she gave good news. The Auxiliary has gone forward. Increased interest on all sides,—this was attributed to three causes: help of the Bishop, clergy more interested and visits made during the year by the President, nine branches were united:

February—St. John's, Roanoke.

Appeals for workers have come to the President from various mission fields. These workers should be recruited from the colleges of which there are so many in this Diocese. This message was left in closing:

"Remember when we say 'Thy Kingdom Come' that we are trying to make that a real thing. We do not do enough to make every woman see her duty to God and to her Church. Not until every woman is a worker or a giver should we consider that we have done our part in trying to make that Kingdom Come."

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Mrs. Wilkins, St. Barnabas Mission, Piney, near Wytheville, Virginia, was requested to tell more of her work for these mountain people. The greatest need in this section of the mountains is an Accredited School. The Woman's Auxiliary, Detroit, Michigan, after listening to an address on the subject by Mrs. Wilkins, gave a scholarship, in recognition of the services of Mrs. Stevens, their president.

### "THE STEVENS SCHOLARSHIP"

Special Pledges were made by the delegates for this work, amounting to \$60.00.

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Deaconess Williams, Dante, was unable to attend this meeting. Mrs. Binns, Nora, asked if help could be given the Deaconess in paying the board of the volunteer summer workers. \$60.00 was pledged for this purpose.

Miss Barber, Richlands, made a touching appeal to the hearts—Give from the heart. The world must have Christ, its *only* help. Miss Barber has had experience working in the foreign field, China. Now the great needs of our own mountain people are pressing on her heart as she works for them. The Community House, Richlands, will be a great potentiality for Christ, if properly equipped. A piano is greatly needed. This appeal was referred to the Pledge Committee by the President.

The 329th Hymn—"Thy Kingdom Come, O God" was sung, followed by the Noon-day prayer for missions, by Rev. T. C. Page, Alta Vista.

Following the prayer Mr. Page asked for a few minutes to speak. He expressed his gratitude for the help received from the Woman's Auxiliary last year. He reported that St. Andrews-in-the-Sticks has been built and paid for. The building has been occupied since Christmas—Mission held in July. Five were confirmed.

Miss Caryetta Davis also reported that the mountain boy whom the Auxiliary is educating is a boy of admirable spirit and an honor student.

Bishop Jett reported another Honor Roll student, a Bristol boy, who was in the Virginia Episcopal School for three years, supported by Bishop's Educational Fund. He is now in the University of Virginia, purposes studying for the ministry. For a while he will have to give up his work as an operation on his eye is necessary.

### SUPPLY SECRETARY'S REPORT

Mrs. Franklin Hanger, Supply Secretary, before giving her formal report gave a sketch of the history of her work. This work was assigned her in 1920. As she expressed it, she was told "to swim". Results have proven that she has learned.

Trinity Church, Staunton, furnishes a room for the Emergency Supplies in the Parish House.

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For the past year the value of the boxes sent out amounted to \$413.06.

## AFTERNOON SESSION

Meeting called to order at 3:10 by the President.

The Secretary was instructed to send greetings to the Auxiliary of Southern Virginia now in session in Christ Church, Norfolk, Va.

A letter read from Deaconess Williams reporting that the mountain girl in Chatham Episcopal Institute, whose tuition is paid by this Auxiliary, is doing good work.

The address for the afternoon was made by Rev. H. H. Young, Dean of the Associate Mission. Subject: The Mission of a Christian. The Mission of a Christian is to do the work of the Master-Christ. To do the work, one must have the vision of Christ. The greatest army in the world is the Christian Army, and the mission of that army is to uplift the world and to serve humanity.

Grounds for Missionary obligation: Human Need.

There are 185,000 in Associate Mission field. 100,000 are non-church people,—that is, belonging to no branch of Christ Church.

In the field there are nine women workers and two clergymen. Need—Man power, at least ten chapels and schools—\$70,000 at least in money.

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Get the world vision. Carry the Gospel of Love to every creature. The doors of the world are open and God is calling us to enter. Take the world for Christ. Gain knowledge. Ignorance is the cause of lack of interest.

"The Gospel of the King shall be preached to all nations."

It is the Missionary obligation to hasten the fulfillment of these words.

The physical hardships of the foreign missionary are not to be compared with the spiritual hardships. Keep in touch with the wonderful gift of prayer that alone will keep one close to the Master, the Author of our faith.
