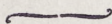

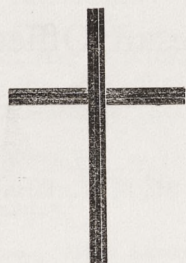

# Minutes of the Thirteenth Annual Meeting

of the

SOUTHWESTERN VIRGINIA BRANCH

of the

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

to the NATIONAL COUNCIL

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 1st, 1932

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The Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia, convened at Emmanuel Church, Covington, Virginia, on Tuesday, November 1st. It was opened with a "Quiet Hour" at 5 o'clock P. M., conducted by the Rev. E. R. Rogers, Ph. D. After a shortened form of Evening Prayer and the reading, in unison, of The Litany of the Church, (hymn 473), Dr. Rogers led us in a Meditation based on the 19th, 20th and 21st verses of the 22nd chapter of the Gospel according to St. Matthew. He told us that conscience is not some mysterious and subtle voice, which can always infallibly tell us what we should or should not do. We must think this out and decide for ourselves, conscience can not do it.

Quoting the Master's reply to the Pharisees, he showed us that "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's" has a very direct message for us. It makes no difference whether daily duties are lowly and even mean, or influential and highly thought of, they form God's plan for us in the world. Religion is not theory, but LIFE. Men do not judge Christians by looks or the singing of hymns, but by how they put their spiritual aspirations into deeds. If we fail in fulfilling our daily duties, we are not "Rendering unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's."

In the third part of his Meditation Dr. Rogers showed us that to render unto God the things that are God's, we



must establish such communion with Him as to keep alive in our souls the inner light of God's presence. The lives of many so called Christians contradict theories and form one of the chief obstacles to the growth of the Church of God. This is forcibly expressed in Lord Tennyson's words;

"I found him in the shining of the stars,  
I marked him in the flowering of the fields,  
But in his ways with men, I found him not."

Power to be what we desire to be, can only come through the spirit of God in us.

After the "Quiet Hour" a delicious supper was served in the Parish House, by the ladies of Emmanuel Church, forming a delightful point of social contact.

#### EVENING SERVICE

At 8:00 there was a Mass Meeting in the Parish House at which the usual routine was changed. As usual we heard from the Workers in our own Diocese, but this year their talks were illustrated with moving pictures taken at the points represented by those who spoke. Mrs. Lewis presented the subject for the evening "Our Mountain Work", after which Mr. Tom Scott operated the moving picture machine illustrating the missionary work in the Diocese. Misses Ora Harrison, Caryetta Davis, Nancy Chamberlain, Mrs. George Wiese, Deaconess Binns, Misses Farish and Savage and Dr. Rogers told of interesting phases of the work at their Stations. After each spoke, moving pictures taken at the various points were shown, illustrating what we had been told.

Holy Communion was celebrated at 9:00 o'clock by the Rt. Rev. Robert Carter Jett, D. D., assisted by Rev. Warren A. Seager, Dr. E. R. Rogers and Rev. John Wellford. An offering was made for the Woman's United Thank Offering.

## THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

Following the appointment of committees, Bishop Jett spoke in his usual spiritual and affectionate manner, stressing his joy and pride in the Woman's Auxiliary and its influence in the Diocese. He told us that while the future of The Southwestern Episcopalian is uncertain, if it cannot be continued individually, it may be by consolidation with the Dioceses of Virginia and West Virginia.

The Bishop's Educational Fund is being used to help young men studying for the ministry and one colored student at Lawrenceville.

He urged the auxiliary not to lose interest in the Advance Work—others have helped us and we should in turn help others as much as we can.

The morale of the Church must be maintained in this time of stress. If things deemed necessary to our physical life are lost or destroyed, they must be replaced, and this is just as true of the Church,—it will come back.

In closing he called on us to

- I—Put off the old man,
- II—Put on the new man,
- III—Have the mind of Jesus,
- IV—Adopt some method by which we may have the Spirit of Peace and triumph with Him, knowing that His **apparent** failure was in truth the greatest success in all the history of the world.

Noon-day Prayers were read by the Rev. Warren Seager.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

On meeting you for the first time as your President my first impulse is to express to you my gratitude for the confidence and trust you placed in me by electing me to this office.

The work throughout the year has been a joy and high privilege. Let me say with St. Paul: "First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for you all, that your faith is known throughout the whole world."

The joy and privilege of presiding over such a group, whose aim



is, by their faith and works to make Christ known to the whole world is an inspiration which challenges our best efforts of mind, body and soul. And shall we not let our past effort be a challenge to even greater effort in the future?

The stringency of the times demands strenuous effort.

"The world's adversity is the Church's spiritual opportunity".

I quote Bishop Johnson who also said in Denver at the General Convention that "The Womans' Auxiliary stands for the only adventure left, the spiritual adventure."

The "spiritual adventure" is not dependent upon material prosperity—on the contrary "Business Recovery is dependant upon a spiritual revival", so says one of the greatest financiers of the country.

In view of the world's great need there was never a greater opportunity for service than at the present time.

The Woman's Auxiliary is pre-eminently the Church woman's opportunity for the expression of her love through its varied activities.

I covet for the Auxiliary full and unhampered use of the promised "power" in meeting the full measure of our responsibility in this hour of the world's need.

It is an opportunity and privilege which we should not miss to aid our Bishop this year in meeting the Church's quota through an appropriation of funds to objects which count on the diocesan quota.

It was suggested at the Synod in Pittsburgh that tithing should be stressed by the Woman's Auxiliary, and that if practiced generally, the problem of Church finances will be solved.

A spiritual blessing has been promised to tithers: Mal. 3:10.

To further the work of the Field Department the Parish Auxiliary should offer leadership in disseminating information throughout the parish under the direction of the Rector.

It is earnestly hoped that we shall measure up to this high privilege as well as in leadership of prayer circles for the success of the Every Member Canvass. That through study, individually and in groups, by prayer and by self-denial, the power which Christ has promised may be unleashed, and the Church of Christ made victorious over material depression and worldly fears. The joy of having shared in this victory will more than compensate for our efforts.

During the past year the work of the Auxiliary, we believe, has progressed normally in its various departments.

We are grateful for the loyal and splendid efforts of the branches and of the diocesan officers and committees who will in turn make their reports.

One of the strong emphases of the Auxiliary is that of religious education, and in order that this may be done more intensively I purpose to suggest at this meeting certain changes to be made at the next annual meeting in the constitution, enabling us to have four instead of two district educational secretaries.



Two institutes were held last February for the purpose of training leaders to teach the Mission Study classes in the parish branches. Plans are now being made for similar work early in 1933.

The Auxiliary feels a distinct loss in not having had the opportunities of the Sweet Briar Summer School this year. We hope that this may be made possible another year.

We were fortunate early in the year in securing a visit from Mrs. Habersham to four points in the diocese; Roanoke, Lynchburg, Staunton and Sweet Briar, at which places she showed moving pictures of the Church's Missions in foreign fields, and was received with much enthusiasm. The diocesan Executive Board realizing the teaching value of moving pictures in presenting the missionary work of the diocese, secured the services of Mrs. Habersham to take pictures of our mountain missions. It is hoped that a large use may be made of these pictures by the branches of the Auxiliary.

We are happy to report that to the forty-six branches reported last year we have seven additions.

An itinerary through the diocese was arranged in September for Miss Sallie Deane, Provincial Secretary for Junior Woman's Auxiliary work, and through the courtesy and co-operation of the clergy and the branch presidents she presented the work of the Auxiliary to the young women at 16 points in the diocese.

She was received with enthusiasm and as a result of her visit we report up to the present four new Junior Woman's Auxiliary branches.

A Junior branch was formed last December in Covington, Va., which I am very happy to report also.

Two new Woman's Auxiliary branches have been organized recently—at Ivy Chapel, Bedford County, and Lebanon in the Associate Missions Field.

We extend to all of these new branches an affectionate welcome into our ranks, and count it a privilege to share with them the joys of our common task.

For these valuable additions we "thank God and take courage". But, "lest we be puffed up overmuch", we must remind ourselves that the diocese reports 100 parishes and mission stations.

Shall we not take as our slogan "An Auxiliary branch in every parish and mission station", and work to that end? This should not be an impossible task since the work of organizing is not left entirely to the president but is shared by a splendid committee working under the advice and counsel of the president.

We deeply regret that Mrs. Spindle, our faithful and efficient Secretary, and Mrs. Grandstaff, our Educational Secretary of New River Convocation find it necessary to resign their respective offices—owing to ill health in their families.



It is with deep regret also we report that Miss Helen Otey, our much loved first vice-president will not be eligible for any office on account of ill health.

I am asking the Auxiliary to join me in prayer for her recovery.

Let us pray.

O Father, of mercies and God of all comfort, our only help in time of need; Look down from heaven, we humbly beseech thee, behold, visit, and relieve thy sick servant, for whom our prayers are desired. Look upon her with the eyes of thy mercy; comfort her with a sense of thy goodness; preserve her from the temptations of the enemy; give her patience under her affliction; and, in thy good time, restore her to health, and enable her to lead the residue of her life in thy fear, and to thy glory. And grant that finally she may dwell with thee in life everlasting, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

It seems fitting that at this time when unemployment, poverty and distress are rife among us that the Auxiliary should be reminded of the fact that in 1919 the Woman's Auxiliary became auxiliary to the National Council, and enlarged its scope to include Social Service as well as Religious Education, Missions and Church Extension.

To be sure, our one object is Missions, and all other efforts are but the means to that end.

While much social service work has been done in the various branches we have had no diocesan social service secretary to give leadership and impetus to the work.

Until the Constitution is changed providing for a Social Service secretary we can only APPOINT a committee to have oversight and make suggestions to the branches. Among the important duties of this committee will be to form close contacts with Boy's Home, the Associate Missions Field, and the work in Franklin and Amherst Counties, reporting any needs to the branches.

In addition to this the committee should be equipped for emergencies—and never lost sight of the aim which is to bring even the lowliest into the safety of the Church.

A very important part of our Auxiliary work is that of enlisting recruits for foreign mission fields.

A committee has therefore been appointed whose duty it will be to visit Church schools, and colleges, presenting the need for the proper type of young women to fill the various posts in the foreign mission fields.

I quote a paragraph from a letter received from Dr. Wood's office: "Our most urgent need is for young women who are trained for work along the lines of religious education. Shanghai has been appealing over a long period of time for ten such workers and we



need ten more in the combined districts of Japan and the Philippine Islands. If your diocese could concentrate on this need it would be a tremendous help—and please bear in mind and encourage students who might develop an interest in eventual service”.

These appeals must be **RELAYED** and we hope that our committee will lose no time in doing so.

#### NECROLOGY

The Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese suffered a severe loss on September 9th in the removal from earth to her home in Paradise, our first president, beloved and honored by all, Mrs. T. D. Hobart for 6 years president of this diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The diocese has also suffered keen loss in the death on February 12th of Mrs. G. A. Jones, former president of the R. E. Lee Memorial branch in Lexington, Virginia.

For the lives and good examples of these our friends and fellow workers let us give thanks.

Almighty and everlasting God, who dost enkindle the flame of thy love in the hearts of the saints; Grant to us thy humble servants, the same faith and power of love, that as we rejoice in their triumphs, we may profit by their examples. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

There is a matter which I very much wish to stress at this time. It is the responsibility of the Woman's Auxiliary for the work of **Personal Evangelism**.

This seems to me to be peculiarly the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

At the General Convention in Washington the Auxiliary went on record as fully committed to the task of **Personal Evangelism** through the ministry of books, the ministry of prayer, and the “speaking without hesitation for Christ.”

As we have sketched somewhat hastily in outline the vast field of Auxiliary endeavor, it is easy to see that the needs of the hour are more challenging to-day than ever before in **parish, diocese, nation**



and world.

May God give us strength to meet them with high courage and great joy.

### WEDNESDAY EVENING

The music furnished by the organist and choir of Emmanuel Church added to the beauty of the Service at which Miss Hallie Williams of Kyoto, Japan, was the speaker. After speaking of some things that Japan had learned from the West, which had taught her to **grab** what she wanted, when it was to her advantage, she showed the other side of the picture, when she told of lives which had been transformed by the power and love of the Christ. And of groups of Japanese men and women who were on their knees praying for peace, though living in a militaristic country. She told of the work of St. Agnes' School, illustrating by the story of how, through its influence on the life of one little girl, her entire family, some relatives, and many friends came to know of the love of God, their Father.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by Rev. E. R. Rogers Ph. D.

### BUSINESS SESSION

The business session was called to order by the President and opened with prayers. The roll was called by the Secretary, to which twenty-seven branches responded.

Mrs. Mingea reporting for the Committee on changes in By-Laws and amendment to the Constitution, moved that the matter which had been tabled at the last Annual Meeting be taken from the table. This was seconded by Mrs.



Baker and upon vote being taken was lost.

Reports of the First Vice-President, the Educational Secretary of the James River Convocation, and the Correspondent to the Southwestern Episcopalian were read and accepted and these and all other reports rendered will be found printed in full under "Reports".

Dr. Rogers eloquently presented the needs of "Boy's Home" and Mrs. Robert Carter Jett presented the following Resolution for adoption:

"Resolved—That we, the Woman's Auxiliary of Southwestern Virginia in session at Covington, Va., desire to record our appreciation of the faithful untiring and efficient service of Mrs. Reinhold Rogers at the "Boy's Home", and our conviction that without her co-operation the splendid work of Dr. Rogers would have been impossible."

Seconded by Mrs. Loving, the Resolution was adopted.

The Special Askings carried over from Wednesday were here presented by Mrs. George Wiese for Grace House-on-the-Mountain, and by Deaconess Williams for Industrial Work in the absence of Miss Mansfield.

Mrs. Davidson made an appeal for help for a girl living near Blacksburg, which was referred to the Budget Committee.

The advantages and aims of Virginia Episcopal School for Boys were ably portrayed by Mrs. Oscar De Wolf Randolph.



Bishop Jett asked the privilege of the floor to recommend the Church schools of the diocese for careful consideration by any people interested in the education of our young people.

The report of the Educational Secretary of the New River Convocation was read by the Secretary.

Mrs. Loving on the Woman's United Thank Offering.

Mrs. Randolph on Religious Education.

Mrs. E. L. Haley, Chairman of the Committee to tabulate Standard Branch report, reported three 100% branches, viz.

Christ Church, Pulaski.

St. Paul's Church, Salem.

The offering made at Wednesday evening's Mass Meeting amounting to \$20.75 was ordered given to Miss Hallie Williams.

Preceding the report of the Budget Committee Bishop Jett asked the privilege of the floor to explain that he was asking the Auxiliary to raise a sum of from three hundred to five hundred dollars to be applied to the diocesan quota for the General Church.

He spoke of his distress at the thought that Southwestern Virginia might be unable to pay its quota in full.

He told of how much we receive from the General Church through our splendid United Thank Offering Mission Workers and how, in gratitude for them, we should make extraordinary efforts to raise all that is asked of us.

He also said that in this time of economic distress it seems probable that this especial help from the Auxiliary, will be needed that the diocese may be able to pay its quota in full.

### REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, DIOCESE OF SOUTHWESTERN VIRGINIA

My report is necessarily short. The most important thing done during the year, in the educational line, was the Institute at Lynchburg (St. Paul's), where we were most delightfully entertained. The book under discussion was "Building a Christian Nation." The able leader was Mrs. Ramage, of Sweet Briar. Wonderful work was done during the classes among the leaders of our diocese.

One of the real educational features of this year's work for me was a visit to two of the mission stations. You will remember a suggestion in our Program for October,—“A visit to one of our mission stations.” Well, our Auxiliary in Bedford made this pilgrimage. We took a day off and visited Callaway (St. Peters) and Endicott (St. John's.) We drove over, taking our lunch with us. The drive was short and the roads remarkably good. We passed the crossroads, marked “Callaway” and on through a stretch of woods, and suddenly, in an open space,—a clearing in the woods, the most beautiful pano



ramic view of the mountains, in its wonderful fall coloring, burst up on our vision,—we had arrived at St. Peter's.

The chapel on the hill, above the school and mission house, is built of round, river rock and is most inspiring in its simplicity. We found the Rocky Mount Auxiliary there to welcome us in addition to Miss Caryetta Davis and some of her workers, the mothers of the children in the school.

We were so glad the dining room was full. We had to eat our lunch out-of-doors, under the trees with their colorful autumn foliage—the mountains surrounding us. Miss Caretta Davis served coffee, which was most delightful.

We were then invited to go over the school. Heard the children sing and recite their school psalm. The school house is built of flat rock, and the Mission House is a square frame house.

The children, visitors, and all, with the two ministers (Mr. Purson and Mr. Marshall) repaired to the Chapel where we had a short service.

We had to tear ourselves away, and hurry on to St. John's (Endicott.) Here we were met by Miss Ora Harrison and Miss Beheler. The children sang for us in their assembly room in the school house in a most inspiring manner.

We were then invited to go to their Mission House, enjoying the beautiful garden between, then, admiring their handicrafts,—counterpanes, scarfs, table runners, towels, baskets, etc. We were also allowed to see looms and the actual weaving of a rug, which was interesting. It was done by one of the mountain women. Here we paused for tea and cake, which was very much enjoyed by us all.

I want to tell you that this was a day in our lives, long to be remembered, and stored away for future reference. We will never again hear the names St. Peter's and St. John's without vizualizing the workers, the children, and their school, chapel. We have an inspiration which will stay with us for years to come, and, I suggest that each of you make such a visit.

## REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY NEW RIVER CONVOCATION

Feeling sure that the branch reports will give full credit to the diocesan program, the Mission Study and to special subjects studied by the members, I shall attempt to show, in my report, that we have made some progress in 1932.

To strengthen the branches, to increase interest and to keep before them the fact of the far-reaching possibilities of vitally interesting and well prepared programs at the monthly meetings, has been my chief object.

In support of this, I have mailed carefully selected material to the branch educational secretaries, written many letters suggesting books for the year, and how to obtain them at a minimum cost and have responded to all requests for help.

It is with keep delight that I report a Junior Branch recently organized in St. Mary's parish, Bluefield, with Miss Orianna Kester in charge of religious education.

The Saltville branch, for several years inactive, was reorganized last year and has done splendid work this year. For this all praise and gratitude go to Reverend and Mrs. Wellford and the Abingdon church.

All branches reporting have made progress in educational endeavor and show increasing interest in all phases of Auxiliary work.



Two branches deserve especial mention as their reports were fuller than the rest: St. John's Wytheville and St. John's, Roanoke.

In addition to carrying out the diocesan program and Mission Study Course, St. John's Wytheville, entertained a large number of delegates to the institute held in that parish last winter for training Study Class leaders.

They also had three special speakers during the year from other Dioceses addressing them on the subjects of Social Welfare, the U. T. O., and the "B" Branch.

St. John's, Roanoke, was hostess to the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch in the Fall of 1931. The book, "Building a Christian Nation," was used by the Rector as basis for his Wednesday afternoon lectures during Lent, thus bringing the subject to a larger number of listeners than would probably have heard it in class. Their Social Service program, lasting six weeks, was wide in scope and equally educational.

Trinity branch, Rocky Mount, held the May meeting in the interest of Christian unity in which other communions were invited to take part. The interchange of ideas and methods on missionary work and Christian fellowship were extremely helpful. The meeting was a splendid success.

To those dear women who have written me from time to time, during the six years I have held this office, that many women in their parishes still are not interested in the Auxiliary, I wish to say here that we should all continue to pray for them with faith, hoping that they may be led to realize that by baptism and confirmation they have the privilege of the highest type of service to the Church.

This report would not be complete without mention of the untiring efforts and accomplishments of our chairman of programs, Mrs. Oscar De Wolf Randolph and our prompt and obliging second vice-president, Mrs. Landon Lowry, in charge of religious education.

### REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

There are forty-two branches of the C. P. C. in the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia. Some of the branches in 1932 have surpassed their efforts of preceding years. We often hear of the difficulties we are facing but we must take them as a challenge, not a source of discouragement, realizing that the C. P. C. material is more needed now in these days of depleted incomes than ever before. If every one in the church would give such simple service as lies easily within his power, the C. P. C. might grow up to its opportunities.

The C. P. C. requires only that you be willing to pass on to others for their enjoyment magazines and books which you have already enjoyed. In our homes we may find simple books on religion for a parish book shelf, general literature for a mission library, a picture to add beauty to a parish house or home, games for our missions, and an occasional book for a missionary's own recreation. The missionary's interests are chiefly along religious lines but he is likely to have mundane tastes which it is a joy to gratify.

We are told by our Bishops and missionaries that the C. P. C. is the best agency of the church to establish friendship between clergy and laity and to hearten men working under difficulties in mission fields. The opportunities to serve your neighbor are of all sorts and conditions. Some are clergymen and missionaries in isolated posts, some are in hospitals and prisons, others on lonely farms. One and all they need something to read.

A careful record of requests is kept in card files waiting until you offer a magazine or book or the money to purchase them. When you are willing to mail a magazine regularly, call the C. P. C. secretary of your Parish and give her the name of your magazine and have her secure the address from me. The postage is small consider-



ing the pleasure given the recipient; a penny for two ounces, regardless of zone.

Let us keep this thought in mind and upon return to our homes urge more earnestly than ever before the passing on of such books and magazines as are lying idle in our homes.

#### REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDENT OF THE SOUTHWESTERN EPISCOPALIAN

Since I took the office of Correspondent for the Auxiliary last February, I have received for publication in "The Southwestern Episcopalian" letters from St. John's Bedford, twice; St. John's Wytheville; Christ, Pulaski; Ascension, Amherst; Christ Church, Roanoke and St. John's, Roanoke. Expressed differently, it means that out of forty-five organized branches reporting to this body, only six have sent letters to be published concerning their work during the year! I feel there were several reasons for this. First, I am a stranger to most of the secretaries, and the personal tie is lacking; and second, the paper has not come out regularly as heretofore, and that fact has been disconcerting, and has no doubt been the cause of some of the falling off in the correspondence. The Editor, Rev. Mr. Gibbs, asked that copy for our page be sent him not later than the fifth of each month. This request I have complied with in every instance.

In June and July nothing came for publication, so that **No Copy This Month** headed our page for that issue. I felt sure that the various secretaries seeing that would be spurred to forward "copy" by the pageful for the next issue, but no one seemed to be affected by it in the slightest degree.

On the first of September I wrote to four branches urging that they send letters for publication, and I received two replies which I immediately forwarded to Rev. Mr. Gibbs on the fifth of the month.



These should have reached him before the paper went to press.

Besides the parish letters already spoken of, the Auxiliary page has contained this year letters from the Bishop, our diocesan President, Treasurer, Custodian United Thank Offering, Educational Secretaries, and from missionaries at home and abroad.

Only with your cooperation can the Auxiliary page become an inspiration and a help. The older and larger branches, by reporting small as well as large achievements, can encourage the smaller branches to reach out and attempt greater things. In no less degree, the small branches, by their loyalty and consecration, may prove to be the power that stirs a large branch into action.
