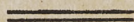

MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH MEETING

The thirty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held in Alton, May 11, and 12th.

There were twenty-four parishes and missions represented with an attendance of seventy-one women.

On the afternoon of May 11th the Rev. John Bunting of the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, addressed the Auxiliary. That evening a cafeteria supper was served in the Parish House of St. Paul's church by the women of Alton, after which the Auxiliary was addressed by Dr. Stanley Krebs, president of the Institute of Mercantile Art, New York. Dr. Krebs appealed to the women to develop the powers that nature has given them. He said, "Plan with brain, and push with hands and feet." To the question, often asked: "Why are we here?" he answered, "That we might learn to live with folks above, below, and around us; without jealousy towards those above us, nor scorn for those below us."

After the evening meeting the delegates were taken to the homes of their hostesses to whom they had been assigned upon registration at Parish House when they arrived.

The next morning May 12, at 7:30 a. m. was held the Corporate Communion of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Synod. The church was beautifully decorated and as the twenty-two clergymen walked up the aisle in white and red stoles, followed by the Bishop in cope and mitre, the scene was most impressive and inspiring and long to be remembered. The church was well filled. The service full choral and lasted one and one half hours. After the service the Auxiliary and Synod were entertained at breakfast at the Stafford hotel across the street.

The joint meeting of the Synod and Auxiliary was called for 10 a. m. The Bishop presiding. After a prayer the Bishop read his annual address, which was shorter than usual, but full of purpose and good suggestions.

After reading of the report by the Diocesan treasurer, Mr. D. G. Swannell, the women of the Auxiliary were excused to meet in the Parish House to hear Mr. Lewis B. Franklin, vice president and treasurer of the National Council. Mr. Franklin told us just how the finances of the church stood and gave us a great thrill of joy when he said that he felt that the action of the men at New Orleans in pledging to raise the deficit in the Missionary work, was inspired by the report of the splendid United Thank Offering, this report having been given the night before. The women were most grateful for this opportunity to hear Mr. Franklin.

Lunch was served in the Methodist church dining room close by.

The afternoon meeting of the Auxiliary was called for 2 p. m. with Mrs. Jesse Black of Pekin, Diocesan president in the chair.

The opening prayer was made by the Rev. John Mitchel Page of the Chapel of St. John the Divine, University of Illinois.

Some gracious words of welcome were said by the president of the Alton branch, Mrs. Edward Dorsey. Mrs. Black, responded, Rev. J. M. Page made the principal address of the afternoon. His subject was "The Church Work at the University and our Responsibility to it." He spoke of the immensity of the University it being third in size in the United States and giving every advantage in every way except religiously, the one thing not recognized is that these students are the children of the Eternal God, exposed to every kind of influence. He appealed to the women to help to shepherd these young sheep, saying that our Lord's command to St. Peter, "Feed my sheep"—feed my sheep—meant in the second instance "My half grown sheep."

In referring to the "student center" he said that neither the fireside nor the altar can get along without each other.

Two students—Miss Edith Pillatt of Elmhurst and Miss Edith Gibson of Momence made short talks on what the church work at the University meant to the students.

Miss E. M. Whitly, United Thank Offering worker at the University read her report on the work among the women students.

Rev. Charles K. Weller, archdeacon of the southern part of the Diocese gave an interesting account of his missionary field.

Miss Smith of Centralia spoke of the Church School Service League and what the church is doing for its young people.

The report of the nominating committee was asked for. Mrs. Crowe, chairman read it and it was unanimously adopted. It was as follows:

The pledges for the two funds were then taken and amounted to Student Center U. of I., \$620.85. Hayner fund, \$200.00. A word was said by each one of the vice-presidents, who is the extension worker for her Arch deanery—Mrs. Lansden, Mrs. Bacchus and Miss Armstrong.

Mrs. Black made the plea that all work done by church women in the Diocese be reported through the Women's Auxiliary—in its Annual Report. Report of the secretary was read, also report of the custodian of the United Thank Offering. A word was said by Mrs. Armstrong chairman of supply work. Mrs. Black announced that Mrs. Alex Wilson of Decatur had been appointed Diocesan Chairman of the "Auxiliary Special." Mrs. Black hoped that "The Message" had been read by every woman and the message carried to others.

Report of the Resolutions Committee was read by Mrs. A. P. Carman, chairman.

The meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF SPRINGFIELD:

Last year when it came time to report the work of the year 1925 we were beginning to feel the importance and responsibility of "The Message". This year we find ourselves launched into the Bishop's Crusade, a broadening out of some of the phases of "The Message."

There has been throughout the Diocese a revival of work in some places and the organization of new work in others. This, in some cases, has been largely due to the interest of the clergy. In other places, it has been due to the interest and energetic work of one or more earnest women determined to put the work of the Auxiliary before groups of women. My most grateful thanks to them. I believe that they have been helped by the spiritual awakening and earnest prayers of those who began with "The Message" and now are carrying on in "The Crusade."

Last October we sent three delegates to the Provincial Synod meeting at Racine. This is the first time in many years that we have had more than one delegate. The meeting was reported in the November number of "The Springfield Churchman."

The close of the year 1926 found us with 24 active branches of the Woman's Auxiliary out of 63 Parishes and Missions in the Diocese, but these numbers, by no means give a correct idea of the work done by the women in the Diocese. Much auxiliary work is done individually and also in groups—some of which is reported and some not. I hope that the day is not far distant when all the church work done by the women of this diocese, will reported through the medium of the Woman's Auxiliary or the church school Service League.

I desire at this time to thank the officers of this Auxiliary who so willingly have contributed to whatever success this past year has brought. Especially do I thank the secretary, Miss E. Maude Whitley, who with reports and letters was kept busy through the year. To the branch officers and individual workers who have helped I am most grateful. Without their interest we could have done nothing but with such exceptional interest this year you have encouraged and helped not only your chairman but also each other.
