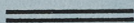

**MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
MAY 10-11-12, 1927, IN SPRINGFIELD**

The Thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council was held in Springfield May 10-11-12. There were 28 parishes and missions represented with an attendance of 146.

The meetings opened on May 10th at 2 P. M. in St. Paul's Parish House. In the absence of the president, Mrs. Jesse Black, on account of illness, Mrs. Lansden of Cairo, first vice-president, presided.

The Bishop opened the session with prayer. Mrs. Bacchus of St. Pauls gave an address of welcome to which Mrs. Lansden responded, speaking first of the deep regret at Mrs. Black's illness and consequent absence. Mrs. Lansden brought a greeting from Mrs. Candee, honorary president and first secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese.

In the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Bacchus called the roll, showing at this first meeting 53 women present. Miss Grace Parker, field secretary of National Woman's Auxiliary, with headquarters in New York, gave an excellent address, bringing first the greeting from Miss Lindley, general secretary of Woman's Auxiliary. She said that the work of the Woman's Auxiliary had been restricted because it had been necessary to cut the budget to meet the deficit. Missionaries had been disappointed in assistant workers and in buildings. Dean Lathrop, national secretary of Social Service Work, says that the members of the Woman's Auxiliary are the only dependable people in the Church. She said that he suggested two things to be done: clean up the jails and visit the church people in the rural districts. In this connection Miss Parker told of her work in Dr. Grenfell's Mission in Labrador. She touched upon the Corporate Gift, and told something of the training school for colored workers in Raleigh, N. C., built from Tuttle Memorial Fund. She also spoke of the House for Missionaries in training or on furlough, located in New York. She asked that the United Thank Offering be a daily and not a yearly offering. She said that the next book for Study Class would be "The Church Awake." Open discussion followed, during which Miss Parker answered many questions.

A letter from Mrs. Black was then read. She sent love, greeting and encouragement to the meeting. A motion was made and carried to send a greeting from this meeting to Mrs. Black.

The Chairman then appointed the following committees: Nominating Committee—Mrs. Pollard, chairman; Committee on Resolutions—Mrs. Goldman, chairman.

Miss Dresser, U. T. O. custodian, reported that we were half way between Triennials and have in our fund \$200.00 more than at this time in the previous Triennial.

Mrs. Armstrong read her report of the "Supply Department." Mrs. Alex Wilson's report of "The Corporate Gift" was read by Mrs. Armstrong. It showed that about \$150.00 had been pledged. The quota is \$1.00 per member.

The meeting then adjourned until 9:30 next morning. At the time of adjournment there were seventy women present.

Delegates were taken to the homes of those who were to entertain them and later to the St. Nicholas Hotel, where the Woman's Auxiliary and the Synod were to dine. For half an hour before dinner a reception was held in the parlors. Six bishops and one clergyman, outside the diocese, were in line together with Mrs. White, Mrs. Morrison and Mrs. Hopkins. About 300 sat down to the dinner. Dr. Hagler of Springfield was toastmaster. Each one of the bishops was called upon to make a short speech. Bishop Woodcock of Kentucky made the principal address. Mrs. Morrison, president of "The House of Church Women" of the Fifth Province, spoke on "The Corporate Gift."

At 7:30 the next morning was held the Corporate Communion of the Synod and the Woman's Auxiliary at St. Paul's Church. It was an inspiring sight to see the six bishops in full Episcopal robes, followed by twenty priests, in surplices and red stoles. The service was full choral.

Breakfast was served to all in St. Paul's Parish House.

From 9:30 to 10:30 A. M. a short session of the Woman's Auxiliary was held. The Diocesan Secretary read her report. Mrs. Morrison told us something about "The House of Church Women," laying great stress upon the deepening of our spiritual lives through frequent and constant prayer.

The Auxiliary then went into the Church in a body for the Jubilee service, at which Bishop Woodcock was the preacher. His subject was "The Challenge of the People of Our Church." He said, "It is necessary for every man who is a Christian to take up his burden and bear it."

All delegates to the Synod and Woman's Auxiliary were the guests at luncheon of Mrs. Jessie Taylor Brown of St. Paul's Church, Springfield. About 250 sat down at the tables in the dining-room of the Abraham Lincoln Hotel.

When the Synod reassembled after lunch, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary were asked to meet with it to hear Bishop White's annual address. The Bishop reviewed most interestingly the past fifty years' work in the Diocese, speaking in endearing terms of the four bishops who had preceded him—Bishop Seymour, Bishop Hale, Bishop Osborne, and Bishop Sherwood. He said that the Bishop's House was to be a memorial to all Bishops of the Diocese of Springfield. The building of the Chapel of St. John the Divine at the University of Illinois, and the Orphanage of the Holy Child were each mentioned and an appeal made for renewed interest in forwarding both projects. The children of the Orphanage were presented to the Synod by Mrs. Haughton, who spoke in their behalf.

The members of the Auxiliary again went into session. The roll was called, showing 136 women present. Mrs. Gullett, chairman of the Junior Work, read her report. Mrs. Hutchins, Diocesan treasurer, explained the meaning of the two funds—"The Student Center Fund" and "The Hayner Fund." Mrs. Bailey told something of "The Gold, Silver and Jewel Offering." The Religious Educational Secretary's report was read by Mrs. Armstrong. The U. T. O. worker at the University of Illinois read her report of student work. Pledges were then taken for the two funds—"The Student Center" and "Hayner Fund." The Orphanage was included in the pledging. The results showed "Student Center," \$530.00; Hayner Fund, \$257.00; Orphanage, \$211.00. The pledges for Student Center fell nearly \$100.00 below the pledges of last year.

The report of the nominating committee was read and accepted. Report of Resolutions Committee was read and accepted. Report of Committee on "Tribute to Rev. J. M. Page" read and accepted.

Meeting adjourned.

On Tuesday, May 12th, "A Quiet Day" was held for the Women of the Auxiliary at Christ Church, conducted by the Rt. Rev. Dr. Shayler, Bishop of Nebraska. Fifty-two women and a number of clergymen were present at the celebration of the Holy Communion at 7:30 A. M. At this service Bishop Shayler outlined his subjects for the three meditations under the heads of (1) Victory of Faith, (2) Touch of Faith, (3) Power of Faith. Breakfast was served in Christ Church Parish House. The second and third meditations were at 10 o'clock and 11 o'clock.

At noon Prayers for Missions were said. Lunch was served at St. Paul's Parish House. The ladies of both churches, St. Paul's and Christ Church, were most kind in taking delegates to and from meetings in their automobiles.

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Unfortunately in the list of officers of the Woman's Auxiliary published in the Journal of the Thirty-ninth Annual Synod for 1927, I was named Chairman of Church Periodical Club instead of Chairman of Religious Education, so that most of my correspondants have reached me via Miss Whitley.

In September I attended the Conference for Religious Educational Secretaries at Racine, Wisconsin. This Conference was exceedingly well attended and every one there had a fine workout in the method of holding discussion groups. As a result of this conference our own discussion group in Emanuel Memorial Episcopal Church has received an added stimulus.

The extent of my work this fall and winter has consisted in answering a number of inquiries in regard to courses of study. There seems to be a real desire on the part of the women in the Diocese to carry on a systematic course along some religious or missionary line.

I am about to start an intensive campaign for the formation of study classes during Lent among all the auxiliaries in the Diocese, urging the use of "A Church Awake."

An invitation to hold an intensive day—a morning session and afternoon session—has been received from the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Matthew's Church in Bloomington, and I expect to go there in February.

Annual report of St. Paul's Branch of The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, and the Church Service League of St. Paul's Parish.

Number of members, forty-eight, with average attendance of 35.

Time and place of meeting—On the first and third Wednesdays of the month. On the first Wednesday the regular business meeting is held in the Parish House. On the third Wednesday, the meeting is held at the home of some member. Sewing is done, either for charity or the bazaar, and there is usually a speaker.

Study Class.—On Wednesdays during Lent a personal religion, or Bible study class, was conducted by the Rector; as Missionary study "Problems of the Rural Church" was read and discussed. During the Mission conducted by Rev. Charles Mercer Hall, there was a personal religion class every afternoon, November 14 to 21.

Corporate Communion.—There were two corporate communions, Ash Wednesday and Maunday Thursday, on the calendar, however, we received on Wednesdays during Lent, just before the personal religion class.

United Thank Offering.—About 50 boxes are in use. These were collected in April and October, and yielded \$70.00.

Box Work.—Three Missionary boxes were sent, one to Springfield, South Dakota, one to Beaufort, South Carolina, and one to Tokio, Japan. In addition to these, two boxes of clothing were sent to our Parish Daughter at the Orphanage. A barrel and box of provisions were sent through the Church School to the Orphanage, and four Christmas boxes were given to needy families in the Parish.

CAIRO

Report of St. Mary's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary for 1927:

The Auxiliary has met on the fourth Friday of each month in conjunction with the Woman's Guild with 55 members paying diocesan dues and contributing through the blue boxes to the United Thank Offering. Sixteen have responded to the dollar per capita assessment for the Corporate Gift to be presented at Triennial in Washington in October, 1928.

All pledges have been paid in full to the three special objects sponsored by the Auxiliary of the diocese, the Student Center at the University of Illinois, the Hayner Fund and the Orphanage at Springfield. Boxes of clothing were sent to the Mission at DuQuoin and to New Orleans for the flood sufferers, a box of towels and curtains to Student Center and a fine consignment of clothing and toys at Christmas time to Vicksburg, Miss.

The meetings have been well attended. The programs were varied, with talks on the different phases of Auxiliary work and topics from the Albany Cathedral to South Dakota Indians and Alaska. Liberal use is made of the articles and pictures in the "Spirit of Missions" and a study class was conducted during Lent by Mrs. Weller, our rector's wife, using Goodwin's "Beyond City Limits" as the text book. Three corporate communions were held.

The April meeting was a memorial to Mrs. Frank Spencer, for many years a devoted member of the parish and a faithful, earnest worker in the Auxiliary and Guild. The Branch was represented at the annual meeting in Springfield in connection with the Synod—the golden jubilee of the diocese—by its president who had to preside at all the meetings of the women in Mrs. Black's absence.
