**MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
MAY 8TH AND 9TH, IN EAST ST. LOUIS**

The Fortieth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council was held in East St. Louis, May 8th and 9th, 1928.

Upon arrival in East St. Louis, delegates to Auxiliary Meeting and Synod went to the Parish House of St. Paul's Church and were assigned to places where they were entertained during the sessions.

That evening was held the Annual Church Club Dinner at the Broadview Hotel, which was enjoyed by over two hundred men and women. The speakers for the evening were Mrs. D. W. Conrey of Cleveland; Mr. Frederic C. Morehouse of Milwaukee; Dean White of Cleveland, and Bishop White. The Rev. Stanley A. Macdonell was an able toastmaster and presiding officer.

The next morning, May 9th, was held the Corporate Communion of Synod and Woman's Auxiliary in St. Paul's Church. The service was full choral with the choir of St. Paul's assisting. The Church was filled with worshippers.

Fourteen of the Clergy were in the procession, the Bishop in cope and mitre, preceded by the Rev. George Clark, bearing the Bishop's Staff.

All meals were served in the basement of the Church by the faithful women of St. Paul's.

Following the breakfast, all met again in the Church to hear the Bishop's Annual Address. The members of the Auxiliary were excused after the address and convened in the Jewish Temple close by for the first session of the Auxiliary. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Grant Knauff of Carbondale; Mrs. J. C. White, Diocesan President, in the chair.

Mrs. Snider of St. Paul's Branch gave the address of welcome, to which Mrs. White responded in a fitting manner.

The keynote of Mrs. White's address was "Love". She quoted Tertullian's well known words, "See how these Christians love one another." Later she said that most of us were so mildly inoculated with Christianity that we do not get the disease.

The Rev. George Clark of Pekin brought a message from our former beloved President, Mrs. Jesse Black. Father Clark said that after an operation and serious illness, Mrs. Black was slowly recovering. The secretary was instructed to send a letter of greeting and sympathy to Mrs. Black.

Roll Call was asked for, and showed ninety women present, representing twenty-six Parishes and Missions. The Chairman then appointed the following committees: Nominating Committee—Miss Forbes, Chairman; Committee on Resolution—Mrs. Knauff, Chairman.

It was reported that a new Branch of the Auxiliary had been started at Woodriver.

The President then called for the following reports: Secretary's report, which showed a large increase in number of Study Classes, Corporate Communions and gifts to the United Thank Offering. The Treasurer's report showed a balance of over \$400 in the treasury and all obligations paid. The report of the United Thank Offering Custodian showed not so large an increase as at this time last Triennial. The Educational Secretary reported a good work in that Department, which had no Chairman last year. The Chairman of the Corporate Gift reported that \$230 of our quota had been paid. The Chairman of the Gold, Silver and Jewel Offering reported \$22.70 realized from old jewelry. Miss Forbes reported work done by the Little Helpers.

The four U. T. O. Workers in the Diocese were then called upon and each gave a short report. The work of the nurse at Herrin; among the foreign born in East St. Louis; with the miners at Virden and Thayer,

and the work with the students at the University of Illinois, made interesting and varied reports.

It was announced that a Chapter of The Daughters of the King had been started at Lincoln.

The President then explained the two Funds to which pledges are made—the Hayner Fund and the Student Center Fund. The Christmas Box Fund was explained by Miss Forbes, who has been made Chairman of that work.

At this point noonday prayers were said by the President, and the meeting adjourned to meet again at 2:00 p. m. The afternoon meeting was opened by the address of Mrs. D. S. Conrey of Cleveland, Librarian of the Church Periodical Club. Mrs. Conrey began by saying, "Keep your eyes open for anything that is to be thrown away and could be passed on to someone else." She gave us lists of things that can be "passed on", and they are many, as are the places and people that are glad to receive them.

The three special objectives this year are:

- (1) School at Valle Crucis.
- (2) Wind River, Wyoming, for the Indians.
- (3) St. Paul's, Tokyo.

She said to carry on the work successfully, there must be in every Diocese a Diocesan Librarian, and in every Parish a parish officer. After this inspiring address, I am sure that every member of the Auxiliary will want to have a part in the Church Periodical Club.

Resolved, that a vote of thanks be given Mrs. D. W. Conrey for her interesting presentation of the work of the Church Periodical Club.

Then followed the election of delegates to the Triennial in Washington in October. Delegates and alternates were the following: Delegates—Miss Whitley, Mrs. Crowe, Miss Armstrong, Mrs. Crawford and

Mrs. Selcer. Alternates—Mrs. Lansden, Mrs. Herdina, Mrs. Spencer, Miss Hodgson, Miss Burrows.

Pledges to the two Funds were then taken. For the Student Center, \$397.00 was pledged, much less than last year. For the Hayner Fund, \$235.00.

A letter was read by the President from the Rev. Herbert L. Miller, bespeaking the interest of the Auxiliary in scholarships for the Racine Conference, to be held June 25th to July 6th. It was moved and carried that there should be three scholarships at \$30.00 each given to Father Miller for this purpose. It was suggested that two of the scholarships be given to two of our U. T. O. Workers in the Diocese.

It was also moved and carried that in case our quota for the Corporate Gift was not fully made up, that the balance be taken from the Diocesan Treasury.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned to meet next year, at the time and place of the Synod Meeting.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING SERVICE

Our First Annual Diocesan Thank Offering Service was held on September 27th, at 11:00 a. m., in St. Paul's Church, Springfield. There were over seventy-five women present. The Bishop, the Rt. Rev. John C. White, was celebrant and gave an inspiring address to the women in which he said that to be witnesses of Christ is our highest service. Two of the Clergy of the Diocese, the Rev. J. A. Betcher, Ph. D., of Lincoln and the Rev. E. A. Moore, of Havana, took up the splendid offering of \$653.33. This was the last offering of this Triennium. The U. T. O. for the three years will be about \$3,600. This sounds like a goodly sum, but there are many places in the Diocese, which are not represented in it. A Blue Box in the home of every Church woman is our ideal for the Diocese.

A delicious luncheon was served in the Parish House by the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Paul's Church. A business meeting followed the luncheon at which Miss Whitley, Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary, presided. Enrollment by card showed representatives present from fourteen Parishes and Missions. Father Haughton, Rector of St. Paul's Church, gave us a hearty welcome. He was followed by Mrs. L. L. Bacchus, who spoke for the Women's Auxiliary of St. Paul's. Miss Virginia Dresser, retiring Diocesan U. T. O., Chairman, gave her report of offering from Parishes and Missions. Miss Dresser was given a rising vote of thanks for her splendid service covering a period of thirteen years. Miss Nelle L. Moore, of Salem, was introduced as the new Chairman of the U. T. O. Miss Moore gave her ideal for the U. T. O. and appealed to all present to help her carry it out.

The Rev. Jerry Wallace of Christ Church, Springfield, made a brief talk encouraging the women in their work and inspiring them to make the whole mission of the Church their object.

Mrs. Haughton, Miss Bailey, Mrs. Cantwell, Mrs. Gerould, Mrs. Macdonell, Miss Forbes, Mrs. Armstrong and Mrs. Riley made short talks.

Mr. Franklin H. Spencer, Executive Secretary, announced the dates and places of the Post Convention Dinners. He showed a map of the Diocese and appealed for wider extensive work in the interest of the "Blue Box."

A rising vote of thanks was given to the women of St. Paul's for their hospitality and excellent lunch.

It was announced that fourteen women from the Diocese are expecting to go to Washington for the Triennial.

An invitation to meet in Decatur next year was extended by the Woman's Auxiliary of that place.

With the Bishop's blessing the meeting adjourned.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield:

In looking over an Annual Report of five years ago and comparing it with our 1928 report, I find that in the latter we have thirty organizations sending reports through our Diocesan Secretary, as compared with nineteen in 1923; but I also find that there are three places appearing in the earlier report which do not have any report in this year. I rejoice greatly in the enlarged work, but deeply regret that interest in the Auxiliary has lapsed in the three places.

We were told in Washington, "to organize to reach the unreached." We have at least two thousand Church women in the Diocese, only about five hundred of whom are doing any active Church work.

It was a great pleasure and privilege to be one of the delegates to the Triennial in Washington last October. Our Diocese was well represented in having our full quota of five delegates and many visitors numbering in all, eighteen. The happenings of the Triennial are too familiar to you all to speak of anything in detail at this late date, but there was one resolution which I would like to quote in full:

"Therefore be it resolved: That we each and every one of us return to our several Dioceses from this meeting, praying that all hesitation in witnessing for Christ may be taken from our hearts, with a fervent desire to share Him with others and a sincere purpose to carry out the same."

Dear women of the Diocese, will you not join with us in carrying out this resolution, to which we as delegates pledged ourselves? What it would mean to have two thousand women in the Diocese active in the Church's work, instead of the small number which we now have.

One of my pleasant duties since returning from Washington has been to visit many of our Parishes and Missions in the Diocese and to tell them something of the meetings of the Auxiliary. By the time that this reaches you, I will have made seventeen such visits. I have been impressed with the faithfulness, the sincere desire for more information of the Church's Program, and the earnestness. Interest had deepened through the extensive circulation of THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS and the Blue Box. I have distributed Blue Boxes with U. T. O. literature, Woman's Auxiliary Manuals, the Bishop's Bricks Banks, and Miss Lindley's Noonday Meditations. Three branches of the Woman's Auxiliary have been organized and in one place, the Auxiliary and Guild have combined under the name of the Woman's Auxiliary. In another place a Chapter of The Daughters of the King is working splendidly in cooperation with the Woman's Auxiliary. I have been most hospitably received and delightfully fed.

Our first Annual United Thank Offering Service was held in September at St. Paul's, Springfield. The service was well attended. The next will be held in Decatur in October.

The Post-Convention Dinners were held in five or six places early in November. At several of these Dinners our Women Delegates to Washington had a part in the program.

The great United Thank Offering Service during the Triennial, the first service to be held in the Cathedral, was the outstanding event of the Auxiliary Meetings. I had the privilege of carrying to this Service our Diocesan U. T. O. It amounted to \$3,881.76, which sounds like a goodly sum, and nearly \$500 more than we gave in 1925, but even so, it falls far short of being an every woman "Thank Offering." Think what it would be for the three years if every one of the two thousand women gave "a penny a day."

I would like to thank the Diocesan Officers of the Auxiliary for their willing help, especially to mention the Secretary, Mrs. Macdonell, who has been most faithful and untiring. The Executive Secretary and his office have assisted us many times.

We feel the Bishop's deep interest in the Woman's Auxiliary and hear of the frequent occasions on which he speaks "a word in season."

For the advance work, "The New Corporate Gift" is our first obligation. Our fourth of it must be completed by Easter, 1929. I hope that everyone is responding promptly to our Diocesan Chairman's appeal.

We are asking each Branch to contribute a small sum towards the Memorial Tablet in Washington Cathedral.

Let me close with a quotation from the Minutes of the Triennial—"The ministry of example, that through that which Christ has wrought in us, others may see and believe."

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

Just before Lent in 1928 a circular letter urging the formation of some intensive work in the study of "A Church Awake" or the Bible Course was sent to the thirty-seven auxiliaries in the Diocese of Springfield. Four of these letters were returned because of the wrong address, which shows the necessity of each auxiliary sending the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary the correct names and addresses of the officers of the Branch. There were six replies to this circular letter.

February 15th an intensive day—a morning session preceded by the Holy Eucharist and an afternoon session—was held for the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Matthew's Church in Bloomington.

At an evening meeting during the Synod in May, in East St. Louis, a talk was given on the value of discussion and study groups.

In the November number of the *Springfield Churchman*, an article on the same subject appeared. In the same month, a second circular letter was sent out to the various Auxiliaries calling to their attention the interesting course of study on Africa as outlined by the officers of the National Woman's Auxiliary.

My impression is that several new study groups have been formed and that nearly all of our Auxiliaries in the Diocese are hard at work upon the text book, "The New Africa", by Donald Fraser. If a physician, I would report, "Patient is making progress."
