MINUTES OF SECRETARY—ANNUAL MEETING MAY, 1930

The Forty-third Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Springfield Diocese was held on May 20th and 21st at Centralia, Illinois.

On Tuesday, May 20th the delegates met in the afternoon for registration and were assigned their places of hospitality during their stay at the meeting. At 6:30 p. m., the Annual Church Club dinner was held at the Masonic Temple. The Reverend T. G. C. McCalla presided in the absence of the President, Mr. George A. Williams. Excellent addresses were given by Dr. Glazebrook, of Washington, the Rev. Herbert W. Prince of Lake Forest, Illinois, the Rev. R. A. Seilhamer of Rhode Island, and Right Rev. John C. White, Bishop of the Diocese.

On Wednesday at 7:30 a. m., a corporate Communion of the Synod and Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. John's Church, Centralia, and it was a very beautiful service with a large attendance, the celebrant being Bishop White, assisted by the Rev. H. L. Miller, Champaign. Breakfast was served in the basement by the ladies of Centralia, Salem, and West Frankfort.

At 10:00 a. m., the Synod convened and the women stayed until after the Bishop's Annual Address, after which photographs of the group were taken, and the Woman's Auxiliary delegates went to the Community Hall for their meetings.

Miss Whitley, the President, presided and opened the meeting with prayer. Mrs. Gauss gave a few words of welcome on behalf of the Centralia women. Roll call showed that 102 women were present from 26 parishes and missions.

The Secretary's and Treasurer's report of the year's work were read and adopted.

A nominating committee was appointed, being Mrs. Black, Pekin; Mrs. Spencer, Springfield; and Mrs. Chance, Centralia. Resolution Committee—Mrs. White, Springfield; Mrs. Brown, Urbana; Miss Tomlins, Granite City.

The President gave a short talk urging all to have a definite programme in Religious Education, and finding that most places are having Mission Study which can be developed more fully in working with the Sunday Schools. Also many of the younger women are becoming interested in Auxiliary work. The President also recommended Quiet days, Corporate Communions, lantern slides, drama and reading of the Church papers. Announcing two important meetings in the autumn, on October 2nd the United Thank Offering meeting in Emmanuel Church, Champaign. On October 15th and 16th the Provincial Synod to meet in Springfield, Illinois.

The report of the Executive Board meeting was read and adopted. It was held on Monday, May 20th at 4 p. m. A short report was given at this meeting on the Racine Conference, and the following recommendations were made. 1st. That we have a Budget Committee appointed and make a budget on the basis of \$200. 2nd. That we have a short history of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Springfield made and printed in the next Annual Report. 3rd. That we have the Past Presidents form an advisory committee to the Board.

The Chairmen of Departments gave short reports.

Supply Work—given by Mrs. C. W. Armstrong, Decatur, who asked that if possible to fill quotas before end of fiscal year, and kindly reply to letters regarding quotas.

Miss Nelle Moore of Salem, reported for the U. T. O., the sum on hand being \$1,808.25 and the next Triennial meeting being in 1931, there will have to be an increased effort to make it as large as 1928 which reached \$3,887.76.

Mrs. Woods, Lincoln, spoke on the Corporate Gift, explaining Advance work, and our Diocese accepting \$4,500 to be in by Epiphany, 1932.

Mrs. Douglas, Nashville, spoke on the Little Helpers and Christmas boxes and intends sending a questionnaire out to each parish, and also asks to have the children study the field where box is sent, saying it would be advisable to send to same place for three years in order to have a real personal touch.

Luncheon was served in the Baptist Church. At 1:30 meeting convened and it was a very great pleasure to have Dr. Glazebrook address us on Evangelism. He spoke of the men always giving over to women big things to do in the Church work, and a great stress has been laid on Finances, but if the women could raise over one million dollars for a Thank Offering, surely, each one could win one soul for Christ. Try to win your own boy for Christ, and people who do not go to Church. The speaker referred to this being the 1900th Anniversary of Pentecost and that St. Peter never denied Christ after the Descent of the Holy Spirit, and that we can win souls through prayer, and living a Christ-like Spirit. Also urged visiting shut-ins, and sending them postcards, etc. Dr. Glazebrook closed by asking each one to pray this prayer every day.

"O God, give me an opportunity to-day, and make me equal to it."

Mrs. Robert Burkham, of St. Louis, National Chairman of the Corporate Gift, was next called upon to speak and in a short talk gave valuable information on the Corporate Gift going back to 1919, when the Triennial met in Detroit and the Woman's Auxiliary became an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, she also told of a gift being organized known as the Emery Fund and presented in Portland in 1922 amounting to \$100,000. This was followed by gifts in 1925, 1928 and now the Advance work program amount to be given in by Epiphany 1932. Our Diocese to raise \$4,500 for Parish Hall in Mississippi, and a Parish House in New Mexico.

Miss Ruth Osgood was our next speaker and she gave a little outline of our Diocesan conditions, and how the work can be strengthened, telling us up to date she had been to 22 meetings in the Diocese, and finds the work functioning in gifts and service, but urges more time given to worship and meditation. She spoke on the 5 field ministry, reading good spiritual books and passing them on, spoken word and experience, ministry of example and prayer, stressing the need for quiet hours, and groups gathering for intercession, and also gave a splendid suggested yearly program taking in the five fields of service. Next year the study is India.

The following resolutions were read:

(1) That the Woman's Auxiliary, of the Diocese of Springfield, expresses its sense of loss in the death of its friend and faithful Secretary of the Little Helpers, Miss Caroline Forbes, of Danville. She will be missed and her place will be difficult to fill.

(2) The Woman's Auxiliary wishes to express to Mrs. Robert Burkham of St. Louis, to Miss Ruth Osgood of the National Headquarters, and to Dr. Glazebrook of Washington, D. C., sincere appreciation of their helpful messages.

(3) To the Diocesan Officers of the Auxiliary, to the Executive Secretary, Mr. Spencer, and his office, the Auxiliary members extend grateful thanks.

(4) The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield also wishes to extend thanks and appreciation to Rev. T. G. C. McCalla, and his faithful cohorts, for their generous and beautiful hospitality.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING SERVICE

The Third Annual Presentation Service of the United Thankoffering of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Emmanuel Memorial Church, Champaign, on October 2nd, 1930. It opened at 11 a. m. with celebration of Holy Communion, Celebrant being the Bishop of the Diocese. The sermon was preached by The Rev. E. L. Roland of Danville, and it was a very excellent sermon on the subject of Missions, and full of inspiration.

Luncheon was served by the women of Emmanuel Memorial Church.

At 1:30 p. m. a short afternoon session was held with Miss E. M. Whitley, Springfield, presiding. The Rev. H. L. Miller extended a welcome on behalf of the Parish and Mrs. T. Deakin also spoke a few words of welcome, expressing great joy in entertaining the ladies. The Secretary, Mrs. S. A. Macdonell, Decatur, reported the registration being from nine parishes and missions with ninety-four present.

Miss Whitley urged the members to spend more time in Devotion, referring to the Daily Bible studies in "The Living Church," the study for October 2nd being filled with adoration when our Saviour joins with His Disciples in singing a Psalm. All programs should have some definite period for devotion such as Quiet Days, Corporate Communions, Private Prayer and Reading.

The Reverend R. E. Brock of Bloomington was called to speak on the United Thank Offering and said the offering must be united and thankfulness is Spiritual. Tithes belong to God and our offering over and above tithes are our own Spiritual offering of thanks. Also suggested that the men might have a white or red box to correspond with the blue boxes. Anyway the men in the home could share with the women in giving a Thanks offering to the blue box.

Miss N. Moore of Salem, the U. T. O. custodian, gave a report of the offering:

Next year being the Triennial year we have just two more offerings to make and each one was asked to make increased effort in order to come up to the last Triennial offering.

A motion was carried that we have a U. T. O. presentation day next year, the time and place to be decided later.

Mrs. Herbst of Danville was introduced as the third Vice President of the Executive Board and said a few words of appreciation.

The Reverend H. L. Miller of Champaign gave an outline of the Advance Work. Program being launched through the whole Church. The offering to be voluntary over and above budget and assessment. Springfield's Diocese asked to raise \$4,500 to help build two Rectories, one in Rolling Fork Field, Mississippi, one for St. Andrews Church, Roswell, New Mexico. The money will be raised in 1931 before General Convention and will be a canvass to individual members of the Church. This advance work was accepted by the whole Church at General Convention in 1928 and each Diocese assumes responsibility. While Springfield is doing her part another Diocese will be doing something for Springfield.

The Reverend Jerry Wallace of Springfield gave plans about the Provincial Synod which for the first time is to be held in Springfield on October 14, 15, 16. Programs for the Synod have been printed. All people of the Church are urged to be present at some of the sessions.

Mrs. C. W. Armstrong, Decatur Supply Chairman, gave a few words in regard to that Department of the work.

The Secretary also asked that reports be sent in by January 15th and new officers' names and addresses be sent in promptly.

Mr. F. Spencer, Executive Secretary, congratulated the Woman's Auxiliary on the splendid work being done by them in the Diocese. In all parishes women are leaders, giving money, prayers and enthusiasm. Also referred to needs of the Orphanage of the Holy Child—our only institution—bags for food are being given out to be sent in October.

Miss Cooper, New U. T. O. worker for Students at the Chapel of St. John the Divine, Urbana, was introduced to the meeting. Mrs. Pitts of Bloomington told of the meeting at Racine this summer.

The Treasurer, Miss Mary Belle Baker, Centralia, would like branches to send in dues and pledges to Hayner Fund, Student Center and Orphanage.

Resolution of thanks was passed to the Rector and Women of Emmanuel Memorial Church for kind hospitality and to the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese who assisted in the program.

The Bishop pronounced the benediction and meeting adjourned.

UNITED THANK OFFERING

Resolution on the United Thank Offering for 1931:

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1931 be given to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, to be used as follows:

One-tenth of the Offering to be added to the permanent trust fund the income from which is to be used for retiring allowances of United Thank Offering workers.

That at least \$75,000 be held in reserve for training of United Thank Offering workers, any surplus to revert to the general fund.

And the sum of not less than two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to be appropriated for buildings to be erected in the mission field.

The balance of the Offering, together with all interest earned thereon, to be used by the Missionary Society as directed by the National Council, for the work of women in the missionary enterprises of the Church, including their training, equipping, sending and support and for their care when sick and disabled, the appointment of said women having been approved by the Executive Board.

Be it further resolved: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves and their substance to the work of the Master in the mission field.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Again, I come to you with a short report of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Springfield. By the time of our meeting in May I shall have visited nearly every parish and mission in the Diocese. Since our last Annual Meeting, I have met with 29 groups of women and endeavored to bring to them The Church's Message. In every place I have been received with the greatest kindness and helpfulness. It is my hope to make an annual visit to each place.

The Diocesan Secretary and I had our Annual Conference last week over compiling the reports for the printer. We find that reports have been sent in from 32 places as compared with 24 reports in 1929. In the report of U. T. O. Chairman, 37 places have reported as using the Blue Box while in 1929 the report showed 34.

The Diocesan Treasurer has handled a little less money than in 1929, but we notice that Diocesan dues have increased nearly \$50.00. That there was an increase of \$50.00 given to the Orphanage and that the printing and postage was less. There are greatly increased offerings through "The Little Helpers," "The Birthday Thank Offering" and "The Christmas boxes." Mrs. Douglas the new Chairman of these three departments is to be congratulated on her splendid work. About the same number of groups have taken up study under Religious Education, but much increase in the number reported doing Christian Social Service. There has been a decided increase in the number of Corporate Communions and two Quiet Days are reported.

The last Annual Meeting was the largest attended of any regular Annual Meeting and more parishes and missions were represented.

The Chairman of the Corporate Gift sent a fine letter to all places in the Diocese explaining the merging of this fund in "The Advance Work" of the Church and urging our co-operation in this work with the Rev. H. L. Miller, Diocesan Chairman of "The Advance Work Program."

It was the privilege of our Diocese to entertain the Provincial Synod in October. The meeting was held at the See city Springfield and as reported by the president of the Synod it was the best Provincial meeting ever held. Miss Elizabeth Matthews of Ohio was re-elected president of the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary.

We had our Third Annual U. T. O. service in Champaign on October 2, with an attendance of 94 women from nine parishes and missions. We were greatly favored in having the Bishop and six of the Clergy with us.

Now we are looking forward to our Annual Meeting in May. This meeting and the Synod will be held on May 19th and 20th at St. Paul's, Springfield. Each organization of Church women doing any kind of Missionary work is entitled to four delegates. Let us plan now to have a full delegation from each place. Full program and information will be in the next issue of "Churchman."

This as you know is the year of the General Convention and the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. The place is Denver and the time is September 16th to October 3rd. Each Diocese is entitled to five delegates. At our Annual Meeting we will elect five delegates and five alternates. These should be active members of the Woman's Auxiliary, preferably Diocesan officers as it is they who serve faithfully throughout the year. Also there are departmental meetings for all the departments of the Auxiliary and a Diocesan officers can greatly benefit by these conferences and bring the message back to that department in her Diocese.

I would like to thank the Bishop, the Executive Office, the Clergy of the Diocese and the Diocesan Officers for help and encouragement throughout the year.

Before closing let me urge you to interest your branch in making a pledge at the Annual Meeting to our Diocesan Funds, the Student Center Fund, the Hayner Fund and the Orphanage. Also use your little Blue Box daily. We want our offering taken to Denver to represent a gift from every woman in the Diocese.

Looking forward to seeing you all in May.

CORPORATE GIFT, 1930

There has been no definite gift called for under the head of Corporate Gift during 1930. This the women will understand since they have made no contribution. Our quota was quickly raised in 1929, since that time our Diocese has accepted the plan adopted by the National Council at Washington, to raise \$1,500,000, both men and women of the whole Church working together. This money is to be used for works in the missionary field, at home and abroad, which is needed over and above that already pledged at that time by the National Church. Epiphany 1932, is the time set apart for the completion of this fund.

So at this time no figures can be submitted. However, in every parish the women are doing their full part to raise the quota assigned to our Diocese—and at the close of 1931, the report will show how large a part of the burden in The Advance Work Program, they have borne. Our assignment is \$4,500.

REPORT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The subject for study for 1930 was The World's Mission of Christianity. In the Diocese ten groups studied this subject—two, "The Spirit of Missions," and three took "India"—the subject for 1931; three took "Africa"—the subject for 1929. Some other groups made regular study of the Book of Common Prayer and others had regular Bible Study. Making in all eighteen groups having some kind of Religious Education.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

Sixteen groups did some kind of Christian Social Service, during 1929-1930, which was an increase of seven over the year before. Some of the different kinds of service rendered were: making and giving clothing for poor families, gifts to community chest, sewing for local hospitals and welfare associations, Christmas baskets to the poor and other kinds of service through civic organizations. Flowers to individuals and to hospitals.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY— OCTOBER 14

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of Springfield Diocese met on October 14th, in Christ Church Parish House, Springfield, seven members being present and one Past President, Mrs. Black of Pekin. Miss Whitley opened the meeting with prayer and reminded members of appropriations voted at Annual Meeting for members to use for literature, etc., for their departments; also, that a history of Woman's Auxiliary was to be compiled shortly. A new chairman of Rural Work had to be appointed and by unanimous choice, Mrs. A. O. France of Centralia was elected. The Secretary read the new proposed Provincial Auxiliary by-laws. All were asked to think over suitable persons to be delegates to the General Convention next year. After some discussion on pledges, the following motion was made:

That the Secretary notify Parish Auxiliaries to have a "Pledge Day" in their respective parishes which would be either one or two months before annual meeting, at that meeting personal and branch pledges be made to Student Center, Hayner Fund and Orphanage—to be presented by a delegate at the annual meeting. (Carried).

It was decided to send a letter about pledges early in February.

The meeting was adjourned.
