



SECRETARY'S REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING, MAY 19-20, 1931

The forty-fourth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield was held in Springfield, on May 19, 20, 1931.

The meeting was opened with a business session on Tuesday at 3:00 p. m. at St. Paul's Parish House, with Miss E. M. Whitley, presiding; fifty-eight women attended this session. After the singing of hymn, prayers were offered by Bishop White. Mrs. Abel acted as Secretary, in the absence of regular secretary. Mrs. Weart of St. Paul's Church branch gave the address of welcome for St. Paul's Church, touching briefly on the beginning of the Woman's Auxiliary in the church, bringing it down to the present time, showing what tremendous growth the Auxiliary has made in its various branches and its wonderful United Thankoffering which continues to grow from year to year. The Treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$288.70.

The following committees were appointed:

Nominating Committee—Mrs. Bacchus, Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Fox.

Resolution Committee—Mrs. Jones, Mrs. Janvrin and Mrs. Shuart.

The following Diocesan Officers gave reports:

Mrs. C. W. Armstrong, Decatur, Chairman of Supply Department.

Mrs. A. O. France, West Frankfort, Chairman of Rural Work.

Mrs. A. G. Douglas, Nashville, Chairman of Little Helpers, Christmas Boxes and Birthday Offering.

The advance work program takes the place of the Corporate Gift.

The Rev. H. C. Miller of Champaign, gave a report of the Advance Work, explaining that the Diocesan Quota is \$4,500, which is to be used for a Rectory in Mississippi and one in New Mexico.

It was a pleasure to have the words, "Glad to see you," from Mrs. John White, a former President. The Auxiliary was glad to have a greeting from Mrs. Black, Pekin, also a former President.

Two new churches have been built and organized, one at Zeigler and one at Marion.

Miss E. M. Whitley gave a short address which showed the very splendid work she is doing in the Diocese.

Adjourned at 4:30 p. m.

In the evening at 6:30 p. m. the Auxiliary joined with the Church Club of the Diocese in the St. Nicholas Hotel, Springfield, for the annual dinner of the Club. Excellent addresses were given by Dr. Charles Clingman, D. D., of Birmingham, Alabama, by Rt. Rev. Alfred A. Gilman, Suffragan Bishop of Hankow, China, and Rt. Rev. John C. White, Bishop of Springfield.

On Wednesday morning at 7:30 a. m., Corporate Communion of the Synod and Woman's Auxiliary. This service was largely attended and the service was very beautiful, with the full choir. Bishop White celebrated, assisted by clergy of the Diocese.

Breakfast was served in St. Paul's Hall.

At 9:30 a. m. all gathered to hear the annual address by Bishop White.

At 11:00 a. m. the Woman's Auxiliary was excused to meet in Christ Church, Springfield; the meeting opened with hymn and prayers conducted by Miss Whitley. Mrs. Ide, of Christ Church, gave a warm welcome to the delegates, expressing joy at having our Diocesan President, a member of Christ Church. Roll call showed ninety-six members present.

Miss Grace Lindley of New York sent greetings. Miss Whitley spoke of work Rev. Mr. Brooks is doing among the colored people in Cairo and East St. Louis, in East St. Louis, equipping a store room very simply in which to hold services.

A new Rectory was bought in Havana and mostly paid for by friends.

Mrs. Brackett, U. T. O. worker in Thayer and Virden, gave an interesting talk on the work of Guild and Mission in these two mining towns.

Miss Stokes, U. T. O. worker in East St. Louis told of the foreign work among the Armenians, having seventy-eight families to visit and work among.

12:00—Noonday prayers, meditation—conducted by Miss E. Neville, Bloomington, on Whitsuntide, speaking of the events since Easter, and gift of the Holy Spirit, especially stressing joy and wisdom. This was a very beautiful talk and filled with spiritual uplift.

12:30 p. m.—Luncheon at Christ Church.

1:45 p. m.—Talk by Rev. T. G. C. McCalla, Centralia, urging more gifts to Hayner Fund for Bishop to use for buying cars for Mission clergy.

2:00 p. m.—Mrs. Earl Sherry of St. Louis, gave a talk on "Growth in the Spiritual Life," showing three growths: Physical, Mental and Spiritual; explaining that Churches are well organized but we haven't surrendered our hearts to God; urging all to search out God's purpose for each one. Be charitable; Have love for all—There are at least four kinds of Peace—Silence—Forgiveness—Confidence and Power.

The following books were recommended:

The Christ of Every Road—"Jones."

Truth and Life—"Newton."

Splendor of Dawn—"Oppenheim."

This talk on Spiritual Life was very excellent and gave much food for thought. I think it is well to note how much of the *spiritual* we had on our programme.

2:45 p. m. Bishop Gilman of China, spoke, he started, by saying that Mrs. Gilman had gone out as a U. T. O. worker thirty years ago, and gave splendid illustration of "Munroe Law," starting in school under Mrs. Gilman and now is Consul General in Calcutta and wants a Chinese missionary for Calcutta. He spoke of Foreign Custom Service, Boy Scouts, Navy Men in China, Communists and how music plays a large part in Christianity among the Chinese. They can be reached through music when other methods seem to fail.

Miss Irene Cooper, United Thank Offering Worker at the University of Illinois told of the work among the students. She said that 463 students gave the Episcopal Church as their "preference."

She also said that they were greatly in need of funds to carry on the work, and appealed to parents and members of the Woman's Auxiliary to interest themselves in this work.

Miss N. Moore of Salem, gave a report of the United Thank Offering, which amounted to \$2,922.46.

The following motions were made:

First—That we have (instead of the U. T. O. service in the autumn) a Diocesan meeting after Triennial at which delegates will give a report of meetings. Carried.

Second—That the President meet with the three Vice Presidents and decide on time and place of meetings after Triennial. Carried.

Third—Mrs. Baker, Champaign, moved, seconded by Mrs. Bacchus, Springfield—Proposed amendment to the constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield—

ARTICLE IV.

Section 3. No officer shall hold the same office for more than three consecutive terms. This motion was tabled until next Annual Meeting.

Miss Bowen told of the work of The Girls Friendly Society.

Mrs. Edward Haughton gave a report of work for the Orphanage of the Holy Child, Springfield.

REPORT OF THE THREE POST-TRIENNIAL MEETINGS
(One Held in Each Archdeaconery)

October 28—The meeting of the Cairo Archdeaconery was held in Centralia. There were representatives from Nashville, Salem, Centralia and Springfield. The meeting opened with the Holy Communion. Luncheon was served at noon, followed by talks from the Rev. T. G. C. McCalla, Miss Nelle Moore and Miss Whitley, all giving interesting accounts of the General Convention and meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary in Denver. Mrs. Douglas told of the work of her department. Mrs. Clarkson presided.

November 18—Meeting of Springfield Archdeaconery. Second meeting to hear reports of Triennial was held in Bloomington. There were Representatives from St. Paul's and Christ Church, Springfield, Pekin, Decatur, Lincoln, Champaign and Bloomington. About forty present at Holy Communion service, luncheon and meeting. Mrs. Jesse Black presided. Speakers were the Rev. F. H. O. Bowman, Mrs. Louis Gregory and Miss Whitley. Mrs. James Weart spoke on Supply Department, Mrs. Chas. Woods on Religious Education.

December 10—Meeting of the Alton Archdeaconery. Third meeting to hear reports of Triennial, meeting held in Granite City. Representatives from St. Paul's and Christ Church, Springfield, Alton, East St. Louis, Salem, Centralia and Granite City. About 22 present at Holy Communion service, followed by luncheon and meeting. Mrs. Cora Fitzpatrick presided. Talks were made by Miss Moore, Rev. F. Burford, and Miss Whitley. Mrs. Claude Green spoke on Church Periodical Club, Mrs. James Weart on Supply Department.

These three Archdeaconery meetings were in the place of the Annual United Thank Offering Service, held always in the autumn. It was the wish of the women that they organize as Archdeaconeries and hold an annual meeting each fall. A chairman and secretary were appointed. The Archdeaconery of Springfield will meet next fall in Pekin, the Archdeaconery of Alton in East St. Louis; the Archdeaconery of Cairo in Salem.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is again my privilege to come to you my Auxiliary Co-workers—with a Fourth Annual Greeting. The office of president is not always an easy one—but it is interesting and most worth while—and I consider it a privilege to have served in it for four years.

In comparing our Annual Report of four years ago with the one this year—I find a number of changes.

At least four of our faithful workers have gone to the Larger Life. The number of our branches has increased—but not so greatly—as we had hoped. Four or five branches of the younger women have been started. In this we greatly rejoice.

The attendance at the Annual Meeting has steadily increased, and with the constant distribution of printed matter, has come much increased interest.

The Department of Christian Social Service has been added—the work of the Church Periodical Club—revived—and the Rural Work started. “The Birthday Thank Offering” and “The Christmas Boxes” has been included in the chairmanship of “The Little Helpers.”

The three Archdeaconeries of the Diocese have been emphasized both as to group meetings and extension work.

The work of the G. F. S. has been incorporated with the Auxiliary and the Diocesan Secretary included in the Advisory Board.

The larger and fuller Annual report makes it more useful as a reference book throughout the year.

It has been my privilege to attend as a delegate two meetings of the Triennial—Washington in 1928; Denver in 1931. In Denver we had our full quota of 5 delegates—all of whom were faithful in attending the sessions of the Woman’s Auxiliary and some of whom made most valuable contributions to our Post-Triennial Meetings in the three Arch Deaconeries—six other women from the Diocese attended Triennial as alternates and visitors. Our Religious Education Chairman reports 16 branches doing some kind of study and the Christian Social Service Chairman says there are 14 branches carrying on Social Service work.

The Supply Chairman reports only two allotments returned—these being taken care of by others so that the whole allotment from New York was filled. Seventeen branches having a part in this.

The U. T. O. Chairman has had contributions from 34 places and 2 personal gifts. The U. T. O. from the Diocese in Denver was \$3,456.90. This was our part of the whole offering which was as you remember, \$1,059,575.27. If you had been in the great Municipal Building in Denver where over two thousand women gathered for their Corporate Communion and to present this offering—you would have been as happy as we were—to have had a part in this wonderful gift.

The Diocesan Treasurer has worked faithfully and cheerfully under rather trying conditions this year. Send her your Diocesan dues—50 cents per capita. The Advisory Board was happy to be able to make a small extra gift to the Bishop after its January meeting.

The Chairman of “The Little Helpers,” “The Birthday Thank Offering” and “The Christmas Boxes,” sends in another fine report. I hope that every one is cooperating in this work of the Children and seeing to it that every Sunday School and Font Roll, is represented in the report.

The three vice-presidents have functioned well, especially in carrying out the arrangements for the Post Convention meetings. The Secretary, as always, has been most faithful and helpful. As your President and Extension Worker in the Diocese, I have visited 18 groups since our last Annual Meeting—bringing to them something of “The Church’s Program,” our “Diocesan Projects” and Report of the sessions of the Woman’s Auxiliary in Denver. I have been happy in doing this and most thankful for health and strength to “carry on” in traveling the many miles which was necessary in making visits in a Diocese covering 60 counties. I have been greatly aided in my travels by the Supply Secretary and her car. Again we cooperated in the “The World Day of Prayer,” February 12, in the program, of which I had a small part.

During the summer I attended two sessions of the Evergreen Conference at Evergreen, Colorado.

Illness prevented my attendance at a Provincial Meeting, called by the Bishop of Chicago for March 1st. I was ably represented by the Supply Secretary. A word about this meeting. A crisis faces “The Program of the Church.” At the suggestion of the Presiding Bishop—meetings were called in each Province to consider ways of raising the \$400,000.00 needed to carry on the “Church Program.” It is asked that an offering be made by each parish and mission on Whitsunday, May 15. The call is to every loyal member of the Church. Plans and programs will be sent to every

place giving suggestions, that each individual, parish and diocese may have a part in the effort. The Woman's Auxiliary has pledged its hearty support to whatever plans are made.

Miss Lindley said in Denver, that she felt that "courage" was the keynote of the 1931 Triennial. Let us in the Diocese of Springfield take this as our watchword, and have courage, to pray, study and work, faithfully every day, that the Kingdom of our Blessed Lord may be extended and enlarged in this Diocese. With the thought always before us—not of increased membership—not of larger offerings—excellent as both of these are—but of the manner in which we are witnessing for Jesus Christ in our daily lives. Are we an influence for good in the Parish, the Community and the Diocese? I think that many are—I feel sure that all have that desire.

I would urge that all organizations have at least one Corporate Communion a year—two would be better—always one on Maunday, Thursday—at which time the United Thank Offering is presented. If possible put a quiet day in your program. Some of us know the joy and inspiration of a yearly retreat.

May I ask that the women in every parish and mission feel a responsibility in seeing that the "budget" for the General Church is met. This we should do, but some of us have not realized it until now. May I also appeal to all the women in the Diocese to respond to and cooperate with the chairmen of the several departments. Answer their friendly letters and help with the work by appointing some one in each place as a parish officer in each department.

What are we as Auxiliary Women doing for the younger women of our church? Miss Beardsley's splendid letter on "The Young People," is a challenge to everyone of us.

In closing my four years as your President I am most grateful to the members of the Advisory Board, for their efficient and kindly help; to the Bishop, the Executive Secretary, and his office, and to the individual members of the Auxiliary in the large and small places, where I have been hospitably received and delightfully entertained. You are my loyal and faithful friends. May God bless the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Springfield.

Reports were asked for from any of the branches that were already doing any Social Service work in order to know the kind of work that were being done in the Diocese. There have been very few replies and they are not sufficiently in detail.

Fourteen branches have this year done some kind of Social Service work, the following being the different kinds of work done: visiting the sick; food and clothing to the needy; feeding school children; sewing for the Red Cross; contributions to the Community Welfare Fund; making layettes; helping University students; sewing for hospitals, community stores and Social Service Department, and sending Christmas baskets.


REPORT OF RURAL WORK IN THE DIOCESE OF SPRINGFIELD



A unique plan for getting in touch with isolated people who have no Church affiliation was undertaken by your Chairman at the beginning of 1932 and altho there has been little response, there is still hope for success. A letter was sent out to every auxiliary branch in the Diocese asking that Parish Houses be opened to children of farmers on Saturday afternoon when Mr. and Mrs. Isolated and their family come to town for shopping for the week, the time in which the children are cared for to be used in entertainment with stories, games, etc. The follow-up is easy to carry out with the encouragement of the parents to linger and soon a new field for the Church's Ministry has been created.

Rural work headquarters in New York advises us that the first thing to do in undertaking the work is to complete an accurate list of isolated people interested in the Church. This is to be followed with an introductory, informatory letter and then with enrollment blanks to the various people who reply, for correspondence Church School instruction, Confirmation instruction; or adult study on "Church History," "Church Symbols and Customs," "History of the Prayer Book." Over a dozen suggestions for the study are listed. There is also a lending library from which books may be borrowed for just the cost of postage.

You can readily see, however, that the work cannot be carried out unless the list of names is first compiled. Your Chairman is willing and ready to see that the correspondence is taken care of if each Auxiliary will do its part in getting names of the isolated in its district to her.

Let us make it our special duty to see that this very practical home missionary work becomes part of our regular program in the future. It is not hard and the results are certainly well worth while.
