**SECRETARY'S REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING OF WOMAN'S  
AUXILIARY—MAY 17-18, 1932**

The 45th annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield was held in Jacksonville, May 17-18, 1932.

The members met to register at 5:00 P. M., May 17th, in Trinity Church Parish House, Jacksonville.

In the evening at 6:30 P. M. the women joined with the Church Club of the Diocese in the Dunlap Hotel, Jacksonville, for the annual dinner of the Club, followed by addresses given by Rev. Addis Drake, Rector of Trinity Church, Jacksonville, on "The Hundredth Anniversary of Trinity Church"; Rev. A. E. Marston, Diocesan Missionary, on "A Picture of the Mission Fields of Springfield"; Charles E. Beury, President of Temple University, Philadelphia, on "The Part of the Laymen on the Church's Program Today"; Rev. Charles T. Walkley, D. D., Rector of Grace Church, Orange, New Jersey, on "The Message of the Church Today and Its Application to Any Field." All of these addresses were much enjoyed by all present.

May 18th—7:30 A. M. Corporate Communion of the Synod and Woman's Auxiliary delegates largely attended and it was a very beautiful service. Bishop White celebrated, assisted by clergy of the Diocese. Breakfast was served in the Presbyterian Church. At 9:30 A. M. all gathered together for the Synod opening and hear the Bishop's Annual Address.

11:30 A. M. The Woman's Auxiliary convened for their meeting, the President, Miss E. M. Whitley, presiding, opening with hymns and prayers.

An address of welcome was given by Mrs. J. T. Langten of Jacksonville, giving all a cordial welcome. She referred to the 100th Anniversary of Trinity Parish and gave some reminiscences of former speakers to the Parish Auxiliary, saying that God sent all delegates as guests, friends, and co-workers.

Roll Call showed 95 members present from 27 parishes and missions.

The Secretary read the minutes of the Executive Board meeting held in January, 1932, when the members were guests of Miss E. M. Whitley at Abraham Lincoln Hotel in Springfield. General routine business was dispensed. Committees were appointed to revise the Constitution and also a Nominating Committee was appointed. Discussion on the Annual Report. One-half of the unappropriated funds in the Treasury was voted to be given to Bishop White to use at his own discretion. Arrangements were tentatively made for the Annual meeting.

Treasurer's report was read and adopted.

Resolution Committee appointed—Mrs. Mulliken, Champaign, Mrs. Fox, Edwardsville, and Mrs. Abels of Christ Church.

Nominating Committee—Miss Armstrong of Alton, Mrs. Jones of Bloomington, and Mrs. Purinton, Lincoln.

The Vice-President of the Arch-deaconries gave a short report of the work and meetings in their archdeaconries.

Mrs. Weart, Supply Chairman, gave a report of boxes sent to women workers, missions and an outfit for a clergyman who sent in very appreciative thanks to senders.

Mrs. Woods, Religious Education Secretary, reported sending letters to every parish and told of next year's study, on China and the North American Indian.

Mrs. A. C. Douglas reported that there were ten Little Helpers branches in the Diocese. Sixteen schools sent in Birthday Offerings, 19 schools sent Christmas boxes.

Mrs. France, on Rural Work, reported sending circular letters to parishes suggesting parish houses being thrown open on Saturdays for use of farmers. Also of work that could be done among isolated church members.

Mrs. C. Green of Church Periodical Club reported four new secretaries obtained whose parishes were sending magazines, church papers, books.

Mrs. Louis Gregory, Urbana, sent out letters to all parishes in regard to Christian Social Service work, and gave excellent reports of work done in Alton and Decatur last year.

Miss Nelle Moore, Salem, reported for U. T. O. that since the Triennial we have taken in \$481.58 from blue boxes and urged all to use the Blue Box.

St. Hilda's Guild of Springfield and the Young Woman's Auxiliary of East St. Louis gave reports on work they are doing.

Mrs. Weart of Springfield gave short report of the Diocesan officers convention held in Chicago, Whitsunday offering and also of the Fifth Province conference held in Brent House, Chicago.

The Reverend Jerry Wallace, of Springfield, conducted the noonday prayers, spoke some on Religious Education and gave a meditation on the Gospel for Ascension Day showing Jesus as our example of Patience comparing the kind of people we have to deal with and the kind Jesus dealt with at that time. He led them out as far as Bethany. Applying a lesson to ourselves that we should have consuming patience and pity, work harder, and more prayerfully.

12:30. Luncheon was served in the Presbyterian Church.

2:00 P. M. Opening prayers and hymns. Address by Miss Whitley in which she gave a welcome to delegates and gave as a key word "Hold Fast," giving many references of the words found in the Bible urging all to hold fast to Church and sacraments. Spoke of the Triennial meeting, Archdeaconry meetings. Plea for Rural work, also National Deficiency Fund. Church needs more prayers and personal interest.

Mrs. J. F. Morrison, Indianapolis, Provincial representative on the National Executive Board, was our outside visitor and speaker and as she had been to our Diocese on different occasions felt that we were friends, congratulated on the work and President and saw us broadening out greatly in women's work in five years time; suggested that members attend Missionary Institutes, then gave a very fine spiritual talk on lessons from Whitsunday. Many heathen are right at our own borders. Day is hopeful, a new evolution of Christianity is taking place. Need truer discipleship to do the will of God. In a quiet, constant way try to change conditions. Never overlook an opportunity to give prayer and service as you may be the only Bible your neighbor reads. All felt it very helpful to have Mrs. Morrison with us to advise and answer questions.

Miss Cooper, in charge of Student Work at the Chapel at Urbana, gave some interesting facts on the work among the students and urges continuance of pledges and co-operation.

Mrs. Brackett told of the work at Virden and Thayer. Mrs. J. White of Springfield reported the new revised constitution which was voted on and carried unanimously, copies of which will be sent to branches and officers.

The Nominating Committee Chairman, Miss Armstrong, presented slate of officers which was unanimously carried.

First Archdeaconry meeting held in Pekin on September 28th for the Archdeaconry of Springfield.

At the Springfield Archdeaconry meeting there were about fifty women present, representing nine parishes and missions. At each one of these meetings a vice-president presides. The first vice-president, Mrs. Joseph Pitts, presided at the Pekin meeting. The principal address was given by Miss Edith Neville of Bloomington. The Bishop and the four clergymen present each made short talks.

The U. T. O. was presented.

The second Archdeaconry meeting for the Archdeaconry of Alton was held in East St. Louis on October 14th. About fifty women present, representing nine parishes and missions. Mrs. Earl Sherry of St. Louis was the principal speaker. Miss Cora Pyle, second vice-president, presided.

The third Archdeaconry meeting for the Archdeaconry of Cairo was held on November 3rd in Salem. About fifty-five women were present. Interesting reports for Diocesan officers were made. Mrs. Earl Sherry of St. Louis was the principal speaker.

The U. T. O. was taken. Short talks were given by each of the two clergymen present. Mrs. D. S. Lansden, third vice-president, presided.

**REPORT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION**

Mrs. Charles Woods, Chairman, Lincoln

During the summer of 1932 as Chairman of the Committee on Religious Education for the Woman's Auxiliary, I obtained the books recommended by the National Council for the study course on Missions. China and The American Indian were the two suggested. After reading this material I selected those best suited to our groups, and sent out a letter to each parish branch, outlining two programs.

It was my privilege to attend all three of the meetings held in the arch deaconries at Pekin, East St. Louis and Salem. The women were most cordial, and it was a great pleasure to meet them personally and to talk to them of the work. I had secured a supply of the study books from the Book Store, and so was able to place them with the chairman of each parish group present. Some branches took the material on both China and India. Altogether there were twenty groups, or more, which

took up some definite study. In this time of stress and curtailment of lavish spending, I feel that more and more will our people turn to reading and study, and if we may couple with this prayer and meditation it is beyond all contemplation what God may bring about through us.

We are looking forward to a round table discussion of our year's work and study at the meeting of the Synod to be held in Decatur in May.

#### REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

**Mrs. Louis Gregory, Chairman, Urbana**

Eight branches have sent in reports and many more are doing social work, the work that some of them are doing is splendid. Most of them are working in co-operation with the local associations for relief—Red Cross, hospitals and welfare bureaus. In addition, needy members of the parishes have been given food and fuel and other assistance. Three reported serving luncheons to school children. St. John's in Decatur, St. Paul's in Alton, and Christ Church in Springfield deserve special mention for their excellent work. They are all doing a great deal and are apparently well organized, else they could not accomplish such a large volume of work. I am sure that all are doing their share in helping to relieve the distress and need so evident this year and that those branches too small to do any organized work of their own are nevertheless doing their share. I feel that we must make our religion more social in its expression if we are to be worthy of the great inspiration that the privileges of the Church can bring us, and am hoping the good work will continue and grow so that in these times when traditional religions are being examined by many critical eyes, the exemplification of ours will stand the test of closest scrutiny.

#### REPORT OF GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

**Mrs. W. E. Hadley, Secretary, Collinsville**

I think there are only two admitted Girls' Friendly Societies in the Diocese at present, the Collinsville branch and the one at Thayer.

Since taking office, Mrs. Cluver and I have organized a branch at Glen Carbon. They are ready now for their admission service, which will probably take place within the next two weeks.

I drove over to Glen Carbon yesterday to talk to them about it. Mrs. Cluver has a branch that just organized in January.

Since we have so few branches, I think if a little time could be spared at the Arch-Deaconry meetings it would be nice to include the G. F. at that time.

At the last meeting in East St. Louis, when Miss Whitley was here, I wanted so much to say a few words for our organization, but felt I could not take up any time without permission, when there was such a full afternoon.

We were to have a field worker here in January, but she was so delayed by illness that she was only here two days.

I had written to every priest in this part of the Diocese, and had only one response, from Bloomington, Ill.

So after Miss Brown's late arrival, I urged her to go on and get caught up with her schedule.

I am sorry not to have a more definite report.

I think the girls' organization is more needed today than ever before, but they must have leaders, and that is what is lacking.

But we do know the Church is picking up and that is very encouraging.

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Annual Meeting Decatur, May 17, 1933

I will not take the time to make any lengthy address. Just a few minutes to express my gratitude for the help and kindness shown to me by all and especially by the efficient Diocesan Officers.

We are sorry not to have the usual printed report by this time, but the delay was unavoidable. We hope to take some action to incorporate the reports of 1931 and -32 with the reports of 1932 and -33.

All Diocesan officers' reports show some advance. While the Treasurer has not handled as much money as in 1931, there is a larger balance.

There are two things very near to my heart:

To create a President's Fund of \$50.00 for her expense in the office and travel, and to give a gift to the Rev. Mr. Dixon for his work with the students at Carbondale.

While the chairman of the Supply Department has not had quite so large a response in money value, three more places than last year have had a part in this work.

Chairman of Religious Education reports 20 groups as taking up study this year as compared with 16 in 1931.

Church Periodical Club has one or two additional branches sending magazines and books.

Christian Social Service chairman reports that 8 branches have sent reports to her. That is a step forward, as last year no branch sent a report to her directly, just reported their Social Service work through parish report.

Sorry not to have a report of Rural Work. The Diocesan Chairman found it necessary to resign before the year was out. More than anything else we need the Rural Work in this Diocese and I hope we can take it up systematically a little later.

The G. F. S. is being revived and two or three new branches started. Mrs. Cluver will tell you more later.

The three Archdeaconry meetings as reported by the vice presidents, were well attended. Nearly 50 attended each meeting. We are looking forward to these meetings again this fall in Lincoln, Alton and Belleville, dates to be set later.

Now that we have made some progress in interesting the younger women in the Woman's Auxiliary, we want to take a step farther and bring in some of the members of the Y. P. S. L. You know our Constitution says that a member of Y. P. S. L. is included in our Executive Board. For the first time in the five years that I have been President,

I was invited by a group of Y. P. S. L. to tell them something of the Woman's Auxiliary. It was a great pleasure and I hope that this contact will grow and that the members of the Woman's Auxiliary will feel a responsibility for these young people and show their willingness to help them. Prepare a breakfast for them now and then after their Corporate Communion.

Report of Christmas Boxes and Birthday Thank offering was interesting as always.

Little Helpers. Only two branches reported and they are from the two colored congregations. So sorry that the faithful chairman is prevented by illness from being here today.

We have acquired a Prayer Partner, Mildred Alley, and will hear more of her later from Mrs. Weart.

I have visited 27 groups since last May.

In closing, I can only say: Thank you all for making it possible for me to carry on as your President for five years and I bespeak the same hearty cooperation for your new president.

The following seems a most fitting message to all church women and was found in a recent copy of "The Living Church" from a report of the Diocese of East Carolina.

Women, three hundred thousand,  
In loving purpose banded together  
To extend the Kingdom of God.  
News to those who know not,  
Equipping those in Mission Fields.  
Studying to understand,  
Sowing precious seeds in  
Isolated places.  
Never weary of rendering  
Glad service to the Master.

Noonday prayers were led by Miss Matthews, in which she spoke on letters of St. Paul advising all to be strictly careful of the life we lived and to "Redeem the time." Old men are looking back to the past, but the young man is on the verge of a new order. More worship is needed and all can only rightly worship through our churches.

W. A. Work Talk—By Miss E. Matthews; special mention to U. T. O. which is entirely a free will offering and every church woman should have a part in it. Also spoke of great need of an adequate Pension Fund. Every woman sent to mission fields has to have papers passed by a committee of women. Provisions should be made for furloughs for Domestic Missionaries. Foreign Missionaries are better off than Domestic. There is always something to be thankful for, and each individual who uses the U. T. O. Box puts consecration into the U. T. O.

Motions—That \$50.00 be appropriated for work among college students in Carbondale. Carried.

Pledges—\$180.33 to Student Center; \$132.33 to Hayner Fund; \$102.33 to Orphanage.

Mrs. Davidson, Student Center, Urbana, talked on the work and also of great need for equipment and finances at the Center, giving some illustrations of personal work among the students.

Mrs. Brackett of Thayer gave a report on work. An interesting letter was read from Miss Mildred Alley the prayer partner.

Miss Lindley's Annual letter was read, in which mention was made of November 11th being set aside for women to have a day of prayer in all parts of the world.

#### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Mrs. Charles Woods, Chairman, Lincoln

"Take my yoke upon you and learn of me." How to carry this burden of life has been the whole world's problem, and still is. And here is Christ's solution, carry it as I do. Take life as I take it. Look at it from my point of view. Interpret it upon my principles. "Take my yoke and learn of me and you will find it easy." These words from Drummond's *Fax Vobiscum* express exactly what we have been trying to do this year in the study of "Christ and the Modern World," suggested by the National Council, through the Diocese of Springfield.

As Chairman of Religious Education for the Woman's Auxiliary, I attended the meetings of the Provincial Synod, and also those held in the three Archdeaconries of the Diocese. At these the work for the year's study was outlined and I took enough copies of the "Never Failing Light" (the source book) and the Leaders Manual to furnish all who wished to buy the books. Over twenty branches have taken up a study program. I had also listed books for reference obtainable in our State Library, as well as those at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, Church Missions House Book Store. In reply to 70 letters, which I sent out at Easter, I have had many replies, all enthusiastic over the inspiration received from the study classes. I feel, that as never before, have the women responded to the work and in return it has filled a great need in this hour.

Decatur, Champaign, Pekin, Alton, Belleville, Christ's Church and St. Paul's at Springfield all report intensive study during Lent, and several have extended their work because of added interest. Father Atchison of Alton conducted a class in personal religion in addition, and Father Haughton of Springfield one on the life of St. Paul. In some instances joint classes were held with the men, meeting in the evening. Mrs. Arvedson of Pekin and Mrs. Riley of Champaign have been outstanding leaders. Some few places where the numbers were small have passed the book around for individuals to read. From the percent received from the sale of the books I purchased several copies and gave where they were needed.

Emmanuel Memorial, Champaign, and Christ's Church, Springfield, both follow the plan of meeting for Communion Service in the morning, then serve luncheon to the group, following with devotional services and meditation on the days of the church calendar. Then each meeting is under the direction of a different leader, who has assigned topics on the subject taken from "Christ and the Modern World" to several people. These in turn give their resumes of books and selected material and lead in a general discussion. This plan certainly makes a successful study group. Some few parishes have carried the study through the whole year.

At the meeting of the Diocesan Synod in Bloomington this May, we have planned to have a round-table discussion of the year's work, its inspirations, its problems and a forward look toward what can be accomplished another year. I am confident great good will come with prayer.

I must express my appreciation to Mrs. Kimball, who has so willingly mimeographed material for my department; for the inspiration from many; the encouragement given me by our president, Mrs. Weart, and to all who have made me feel their helping hand in what I have tried to do."

## DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

Mrs. Annette Rickard, Chairman, Pekin

My first meeting with officers and delegates of the Archdeaconry was at Lincoln, October 31st. This happy meeting was indeed one of good fellowship and inspiration.

As workers in Christian Social Service we realize that power and good come to us as we give ourselves to make Christ known to others, through the Church.

At this meeting seven parishes were represented and reported much relief work being done. Many all day sewing groups were outfitting 50 or more school boys and supplying expectant mothers with complete layettes.

Towel showers and fruit were especially mentioned and these donations were given to hospitals.

A most hearty and generous response was given for future plans in this work.

## REPORT OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF SPRINGFIELD

A Diocesan Council meeting was held September 21st at the home of the Diocesan President, Mrs. W. E. Hadley, Collinsville, Ill. We were very fortunate to have with us Miss Elsie Brown, National Field Secretary of the Girls' Friendly Society, who reported on the various parishes and missions she had visited in the Diocese in an effort to organize Girls' Friendly branches. She gave us many valuable suggestions for the work in our own Diocese and told of the work of the National Society.

One new branch and two candidates' groups have been formed since last year. In comparing the membership of the Diocese with that of last year there is an increase of 32.

Dues and Record subscriptions were received to the amount of \$32.10. Ten dollars was sent to the National Society for the "Contributor's Plan," a fund, the purpose of which is to make the Girls' Friendly Society self-supporting.

## RURAL WORK

After a lapse of some months the Rural Work was again taken up in an effort to reach the Church people of the Diocese who are not directly connected with any parish or mission.

Double post cards were sent to over 100 persons asking them to reply to the three following questions:

1. Are you sufficiently near to a parish or mission to be able to attend services?
2. If not would you like the clergyman and some of the Church people in the nearest parish or mission to call upon you?
3. Are there children of Sunday School age in your family or in the families of others in your neighborhood?

There has been a small percentage of replies where a request was made for services. These replies have been sent to clergymen, three of whom have sent back very satisfactory letters.

May 6, Rogation Sunday, is being observed throughout the Church as Rural Work Sunday. I am sorry that it could not be observed as such in our Diocese.

In a letter from the Rev. Goodrich R. Fenner, Secretary for Rural Work on the National Council, in which our plan of work was commended, he says, "Do not be discouraged if your replies are few. If just three or four

families have been given the blessings of definite Church relationships through an effort such as this it well repays for any expenditure of effort one has made."
