**SECRETARY'S MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF SPRINGFIELD—1938.**

The fifty-first annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield, was held at St. Paul's Parish House, Springfield, on May 17th and 18th, 1938. The meeting was called to order on May 17th about 4:00 P. M., by the diocesan president, Mrs. Robert H. Baker of Urbana, who read the meditations used by Miss Grace Lindley at the Triennial meeting in Cincinnati.

Roll call was taken, showing 21 parishes and missions were represented, 52 present.

The president then appointed the following committees:

Resolutions—Mrs. T. P. Judd of Cairo, chairman; Mrs. M. A. Pease of Bloomington, and Mrs. Edith Owen, Carlinville.

Nominations—Mrs. James G. Weart of St. Paul's Church, Springfield, chairman; Mrs. Claude Green of Alton, and Mrs. Lulu B. Quick of Havana.

The treasurer read a tentative budget, which showed that the present income is inadequate for the necessary functioning of the diocesan organization. There was an informal discussion of ways and means of obtaining the amount of money necessary for this proposed budget for the ensuing year. Mrs. Pease of Bloomington, Mrs. Black of Pekin, Mrs. Hedley of West Frankfort, and others, took part in the discussion. The use of the quota system was suggested as a means of increasing the income. This would necessitate an amendment to the constitution, as Article III, Section 2, reads, "Each organization is expected to send annual dues to diocesan treasurer at the rate of 50 cents per capita," but the treasurer reported that only 12 branches paid their per capita dues of 50 cents during the past year, or made any contribution to the general diocesan auxiliary fund. No action was taken at this session, but all were asked to ponder over the matter, in the hope that some constructive action could be taken at the next session.

Mrs. Feltenstein, diocesan treasurer, gave the report from January 1st, 1938 to May 7th, 1939:

The report was accepted and placed on file.

Mrs. Daup of Decatur spoke about the work of the Church Correspondence School, stressing the importance of continuing this work, which has thus far been supported by money from the general fund of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. Weart announced that Miss Whitley's History of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield, given last year at the 50th annual meeting, was available at the price of 20 cents, to pay for printing. She also said that the people of St. Paul's Parish hoped that everyone attending the meetings would have a pleasant and comfortable stay.

Mrs. Feltenstein asked that pledges to the Hayner Fund, Student Center and the Orphanage, be given to her outside the meetings, to save time. The meeting was adjourned.

At 7 o'clock in the evening, the Woman's Auxiliary met with the Men's Church Club of the diocese, for a dinner in the Gold Room of the Abraham Lincoln Hotel. After the dinner, a musical program was given by John Stuart, organist and choir director, and Elizabeth Overfield, Vera Green and Corydon Bradley, soloists of the choir of St. Paul's Church. Amasa Booth, president of the Church Club, introduced The Right Reverend John Chanler White, D. D., Bishop of Springfield, who presented the speaker of the evening, The Right Reverend Robert Nelson Spencer, D. D., Bishop of Western Missouri. His subject was "Horizons," and he pointed out the great peril of triviality in thinking, for we make

our own horizons, and whether our horizon is great or small, depends upon the depth of our thinking. He made a great plea for an increased missionary spirit everywhere.

On Wednesday morning, May 18th, the Woman's Auxiliary joined the Synod for the celebration of the Holy Communion at 7:30 in St. Paul's Church. The Right Reverend John Chanler White, D. D., Bishop of Springfield was the celebrant, and was assisted by Bishop Spencer, the Reverend Fathers duDomaine, Arvedson, Dixon, Cope, Haughton, Miller and McColl.

Following the service, breakfast was served in the parish house, after which all assembled in the Church. Bishop White presented the Rt. Reverend Robert Nelson Spencer, D. D., Bishop of Western Missouri, giving him a cordial greeting in behalf of the assembled delegates. Bishop White then read his Annual Address to the Synod and the Woman's Auxiliary.

The morning session of the Woman's Auxiliary opened at 11 A. M., Mrs. Jesse Black of Pekin, First Vice President, presided. She used the responsive prayers in the back of the Forward Movement Manual for devotionals. Mrs. Charles H. Woods of Lincoln, Diocesan President of the Girls' Friendly Society gave a report on the work and aims of the Society, and urged an increased interest on the part of the women.

Miss Rachel Haug of Decatur, representative of the Young People's Service League to the Woman's Auxiliary, gave a very enthusiastic and encouraging report on the work of the young people, and told of the camp to be held at Lake Decatur, June 10th to 18th. She expressed appreciation to those groups who have donated scholarships, and bespoke the co-operation of all, to make the new venture a success. She was received by the group with enthusiasm.

Roll call was taken at this time, 27 parishes and missions were represented, 103 present, which showed a large increase over the roll call of the preceding day, as 6 more parishes were represented, and 51 more delegates were present.

Miss Bertha Jones of Champaign, Chairman of Religious Education, outlined the course of study for the coming year, and called attention to a display on the walls, giving maps, and other information about the work.

In order to expedite matters, Mrs. Feltenstein circulated papers for personal pledges to the Hayner Fund, Student Center, and the Orphanage of the Holy Child.

Sister Raphaelle of the Order of St. Anne, spoke about her work at the Orphanage of the Holy Child, reporting the progress made in the three years of her stay, and asking for continued support from all parishes to general expenses and to the clothing fund, the need being great. She said that they had received a gift of \$1,000.00 from the estate of Jesse Taylor Brown, and that many necessary repairs had been made with this money.

Mrs. Green of Alton, Chairman of the Church Periodical Club, told of the wonderful work done by this organization, explaining the many ways in which this work is carried on, and showing how easy it is to share in it. She urged every branch or group of women to have some part in this splendid work.

Mrs. Weart again called attention to Miss Whitley's History, copies of which were available at 20 cents. She also announced the birth of a son to our prayer partner, Mrs. Mildred Alley Butler of Twin Falls, Idaho.

Mrs. Black introduced the Rev. S. L. Hagan, Rector of the Church of the Redeemer, Cairo, who spoke on "The Woman's Auxiliary in the Mission Field." His first-hand knowledge as a worker in the missionary field in South Dakota and Oklahoma enabled him to make his subject interesting and helpful.

Noonday prayers and meditations were given by Bishop Spencer. It was a great privilege to have one so gifted in spiritual leadership, and he made us feel anew the privilege it is to serve our Church. He spoke

very beautifully of Mary of Bethany, whom he designated the very first auxiliary woman. He told about many religions, the good in many, that some of them were good to live by, but the Christian Religion was the only one to die by.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon at the First Congregational Parish House.

The afternoon session was opened with prayers by Mrs. Baker. The treasurer, Mrs. Feltenstein had a chart, showing pledges up to date by organizations, and by individuals. Student Center pledges amounted to \$267.50; the Hayner Fund was \$118.50, and the Orphanage was \$125.50.

Mrs. Rodger McColl of Champaign added a few words to her printed report about Student Center. She made us feel again how fortunate we are to have such a person working among our students at the University.

Mrs. Arthur Kincaid, president of St. Paul's Auxiliary, had been so busy looking after the needs of visiting delegates, that she had not been able to make her address of welcome until now, when she said a few gracious words. She and her helpers had taken care of every detail efficiently, so everything was running smoothly.

Mrs. C. C. Jones of Bloomington, Chairman of the Supply Department, reported on the work of that department, giving some suggestions that should prove helpful in the future.

Mrs. Daup of Decatur, Chairman of Christian Social Service, spoke about the work, and also about the Church Correspondence School, and how much she had learned while carrying on the work in the rural field. She made a plea for World Peace, stressing the importance of giving the matter serious thought. She told about the young people's camp to be held at Lake Decatur in June, outlining some of the classes, and asking for co-operation in this new venture.

Mrs. Feltenstein announced that the offering at the early service was \$27.30, which was for the United Thank Offering.

Mrs. T. P. Judd of Cairo submitted the following resolutions:

Be it resolved, that We, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Springfield, make known our deep and sincere appreciation to the rector and members of St. Paul's Parish, for their most generous hospitality; also to the women of the Congregational Church for their fine luncheon.

Be it further resolved, that we extend to our Bishop our great appreciation of his loving guidance and support in all of our work.

Be it further resolved, that we express our heartfelt gratitude to the Right Reverend Robert Nelson Spencer, D. D., Bishop of Western Missouri, for his leadership in prayers, and the beautiful and inspirational meditation at the noon hour.

Be it further resolved, that we take this opportunity to thank the Reverend S. L. Hagan, Rector of the Church of the Redeemer, Cairo, for his splendid and inspiring address, in which he gave us help with the continuation of our work in the mission field.

Be it further resolved, that we thankfully acknowledge Mrs. Howard Bigelow's inspirational talk on Christian Family Living.

Be it further resolved, that we express our regret at the continued illness of Mrs. White, our honorary president. May God grant her a speedy recovery.

Be it further resolved, that we express our sincere gratitude to our officers and committees of the past year, for their faithful, diligent service; especially do we thank our president, who has given so lovingly and generously of her time, energy and prayers.

There were no nominations from the floor. It was moved and seconded that a unanimous ballot be cast for these officers.
Mrs. Baker announced that the appointment of a chairman of the Altar Guild was reserved for the Bishop, and his appointee was Mrs. Daup of Decatur.

It was decided to take no action about the method of raising diocesan funds at this time, but all were urged to talk over the matter in their own groups. Nor was any action taken on the raising of funds for the expenses of delegates to the Triennial Convention. It was hoped that a greater responsibility would be felt throughout the diocese for our diocesan organization, enabling us to properly carry on the functions rightfully belonging to it.

Mrs. Baker then introduced the speaker of the afternoon, Mrs. Howard Bigelow of Kalamazoo, Michigan. Mrs. Bigelow spoke rapidly and fluently. She was thoroughly versed in her subject, "Christian Family Living," and presented it in an unusual and logical manner and everyone felt encouraged as she showed the alignment of family life and religion, and that the possibilities for the future were never brighter.

Mrs. Baker closed the session with the prayer used at the Edinburgh Conference.

ANNUAL REPORT OF ACTING PRESIDENT.

Trying to carry on for the President during the active period of the auxiliary from September to June has been quite difficult. Last fall's activities began in October, with the Provincial meeting at Flint, Michigan. Our diocese had its full quota of delegates, five—Mrs. Weart, and Mrs. Luby of Springfield, Mrs. Armstrong of Decatur, Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Black of Pekin. We are proud, and justly so, that our diocese is represented on the Provincial Board, Mrs. Weart holding the office of treasurer.

A new plan was instituted at this meeting. The Provincial letter is being sent to each parish president, and I hope you are taking ad-

vantage of this added means of keeping in closer touch with the activities of the Province and of the whole Church.

The Archdeaconry meetings followed soon after the meeting in Flint, and the delegates to the Provincial meeting attended the three Archdeaconry meetings, as did also most of the diocesan officers. It is to be regretted that more of our women do not make an effort to attend these meetings. They were planned originally by our past president Miss Whitley, their purpose primarily to have an Archdeaconry corporate communion at which the United Thank Offering is presented. Secondly, it gives the Diocesan officers an opportunity to present their work, and plan it directly with the members of the auxiliary. Also it affords time in which to discuss the problems which confront us.

We have had two board meetings, one at East St. Louis on October 8th, 1938, and the other in Springfield, on March 6th, 1939.

I wish to take this means of thanking the diocesan officers for the help they have given me, and the time they have devoted to their work. Their efforts deserve every co-operation possible from each organization and individual in this diocese.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

The second annual conference for diocesan educational secretaries of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Province of the Mid-West was held in Chicago in September, 1938. At this conference the two topics for the year's study were taken up in detail by leaders in each field. Dr. Samuel C. Kincheloe, author of "The Church in the City" conducted a study course on this subject, giving a splendid idea of the problems the Church faces in the city. This topic has been studied by some of the groups in the Diocese during the past year and found extremely interesting and valuable. It is a topic which can be studied next fall by those who have not taken it up this year, as the books were so late in coming from the press that many groups had already made their year's program before securing the material.

The second subject was "India." At the Provincial conference Dr. T. H. P. Sailer conducted the study group on this subject.

Springfield and Champaign-Urbana were fortunate in having the privilege of having a group of five delegates to the Madras, India, Worldwide Missionary Conference speak to groups in their cities. Rt. Rev. Henry W. Hobson, Bishop of Southern Ohio, Rajah Bhushanan Manikam, of Madras, India, Hachero Yuasa of Tokyo, Japan, Miss Mina Soga, one of the Soga family, the best known native family in South Africa, and a church woman, and Miss Ruth Seabury of Mt. Holyoke College made up the group. The Madras conference is to be a topic of study for next year, and coming at the close of a year of study on India ties these two years together. Bishop Azariah of India aroused the interest of those attending the General Convention at Cincinnati and made the work of the Church in India seem very vital.

Several of the parish branches have put their programs in very attractive folders, which show a variety of subjects have been given attention and study during the past year. Some groups take up a different subject each meeting, while others take several meetings on one topic. Some groups have found their meetings more interesting by having different members lead the discussions, while others prefer having one leader for several meetings.

The topics for each year's study should be a vital part of the meetings of each parish group and as many members as possible should take part in the study. Then some action should come from the group to carry into effect ideas gained from the study.

ANNUAL REPORT OF DIOCESAN ALTAR GUILD—1938-1939.

Since September 15, 1938, sixty-one letters have been written concerning Altar Guild work in the Diocese of Springfield. An archdeaconry meeting in each of the deaconries was held during the fall. St. Paul's, Springfield, was host for the archdeaconry meeting of Springfield with a total attendance of twenty-seven. West Frankfort was host for the archdeaconry meeting of Cairo with an attendance of twenty-two.

An hour was given the Chairman for Diocesan Altar Guilds at the Woman's Auxiliary meeting at Carlinville to present the work, about fifteen being present.

St. Peter's Church, Mound City, received in the early winter two dosal curtains, a Fair Linen cloth, an Altar cover, two Corporals, six Purificators, and seven choir caps. Two servers cottas were sent to St. Paul's, Ziegler. Six Purificators, six Mundatories, and two Corporals have been sent to mission priests.

The Diocesan Directress has spent several hours shopping for materials to be used in Altar work in some of our missions.

Six Altar Guild Manuals have been sent to various places in the Diocese.

One Junior Altar Guild has been reported in the Diocese, that of the Church of the Redeemer, Cairo, with Mrs. S. L. Hagan, as directress.

St. John's, Decatur, reports a class in ecclesiastical embroidery of seven members. The class has been busy all year making Bible markers, two burses and veils, and embroidering linens, both for the Parish, and for the Diocese. At present, a number of women over the Diocese are helping to make a set of linens and coloured burses and veils for a traveling Communion set owned by Father Markey of Marion.

The Directress will be willing and happy to be of service to any Altar group at any time in purchasing materials, stamping of linens, providing patterns for vestments, or teaching a class in ecclesiastical embroidery.

It is the earnest wish of the Directress of Altar Guilds in the Diocese of Springfield that each Parish and mission have an organized group to care for the Altar and its ornaments, the Altar linens and the priest's vestments, having regular meetings with a definite study at each meeting. During the coming year, let us pray together for the work for a very efficient Diocesan Altar Guild.

We greatly appreciate the help of the Woman's Auxiliary and other Guilds of the Church. They have always been ready to answer and fulfill our requests, and we want to thank them especially for the clothing fund. It has been very satisfactory. The year 1938 was even better than the year 1937 when the plan was first started, and we hope each year will be better, as our people understand what we are trying to do. There are only six guilds and two personal pledges we can plan on. Others help when they can. Some helped last year and dropped out this year (we hope for only this year). It costs from Two to Three

Hundred Dollars a year for shoes, hose, underwear, skirts and dresses. Some Guilds have sent in some very nice things. We have been fortunate in not having to buy coats and suits.

Many gifts have been received during the year. In April fifty dozen Girl Scout Cookies were sent in.

Three years ago a call went out for house linens. Many responded and the linen closet was stacked up nicely. Again we repeat the call for bed linen. If each guild would send linen for one bed, the supply would be sufficient.

We have twelve girls, all have single beds, and we have room for three more girls. We invite you all to visit the home at any time. You are always welcome.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S SERVICE LEAGUE TO THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY BOARD.

The outstanding activity of the young people of the diocese of Springfield for the year was the camp held last June at Camp Kiwanis on Lake Decatur. It was well planned and the young people were urged to work for credits.

The day started with the Holy Communion at 7:00 in the open chapel and after breakfast was over, there were classes in Adult Christian Education, on the Prayer Book, on Sunday School work, Young People's Organization, Church Drama, Handicraft, Personal Religion and the Bible. There was also some study of Church music and a camp choir.

Supervised recreation was enjoyed, and get-togethers in the evening around the campfire for singing and story telling. The entertainment varied nightly, sometimes it was of a religious nature, sometimes artistic, always educational and interesting with a nightly snack.

It rated so well that the New York office wrote for copies of the program, and Miss Cynthia Clark, head of all Young People's work in the Episcopal Church was offered by the National Council to assist in this summer's camp. A balance of \$116.67 was left in the treasury to boost the camp this year.

Among other activities of the winter, was a get-together of the young people of St. Paul's and Christ Church, Springfield, for supper and a program. A regional meeting was held on December 10th in Decatur when Captain Earl S. Estabrook of the Church Army was the speaker and conductor of the "Clinic." World peace, Christian Morals, Why Young people are indifferent to the Church, were some of the things discussed. Entertainment was provided, so there was a light as well as a serious side to the meeting, but all agreed Captain Estabrook made a lasting impression.

The Decatur young people gave a Christmas party for the girls of the Home of the Holy Child and also entertained Champaign young people at a China Relief program.

Two new leagues have been formed in the diocese in the last year, one in Cairo and one in West Frankfort. We feel that the young people are really going places and we hope you will be more and more proud of us.
