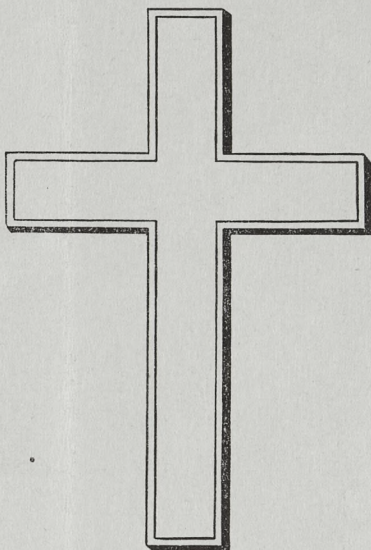

President's Address.

To the Woman's Auxiliary:

In the light of passing events, it is hardly necessary to say that the Woman's Auxiliary has been of great service to the Church. The many clergymen whose homes have been gladdened by the labor of the women of the Church speak in no uncertain tones of the gladsome joy of suffering relieved and wants satisfied, thus furnishing the means of the last command—"Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Encouraging news from our own Diocese reaches us. New Branches are being formed, old ones reorganized, and new life is showing itself in many places, proving how great is the strength of unity.

Four new Branches have been organized since our last annual meeting, and are fully equipped with efficient officers, busily working in and out of our own Diocese. It is very gratifying to observe the increasing interest in working through the regular channels, thus making the effort more effective. It enables the general Secretary, and those co-operating with her, to make the organization more and more useful every day, to reach destitute places and relieve a struggling humanity. Let us all take fresh courage and press forward in the noble work.

It seems to me we lack system and co-operation in our Branches. Each Branch works along after a somewhat lazy fashion, and once a year, a few members, from a few Branches, meet, as we now do, have a formal meeting, then return home, and each Branch pursues its solitary way again. Now, I would suggest that in the future we have an informal gathering, when we can talk over matters, ask and answer questions, exchange ideas, and learn each other's ways.

A great impression was made upon me at the Auxiliary meeting at the last General Convention held in Washington, D. C. There were about three hundred women, officers, etc., from the various Dioceses gathered together. We were called alphabetically, and allowed to say a few words in reply. When La Platte was called a lady arose and said, "I, with Mrs. Graves, our Bishop's wife, constitute the whole of the Woman's Auxiliary in the missionary jurisdiction of La Platte—she, the President and I, the working force. I have come all the way from Nebraska to tell you that there is nowhere in our broad land a more devoted, hard-working, united and enthusiastic Branch than ours. We are determined to work harder and harder each year, and I hope to be at the next General Convention to tell you how our membership has increased and how our zeal has not lagged." She then sat down amidst great applause.

Now, let us determine that we will work harder and more enthusiastically, and by hard work I don't mean merely coming to the meetings and giving money (very necessary and not to be overlooked), but our personal service, each member feeling her own responsibility to her Savior and to her fellow Christian, and each one trying to get one new member for her Branch, by personal appeal and by showing them we don't think it a hardship, but a sacred privilege and a great one to be allowed to work for Christ and His needy ones.

Oh! if we could only get a little of that great love that our dear Savior had for all humanity, and gain some little of that utter unselfishness which was his, then would we grow in zeal, and what a blessing the Woman's Auxiliary would be where ever it exists!

Let us not be weary in well doing, knowing that in due season we shall reap, if we faint not.

Secretary's Report.

Our Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Missions, Mr. John Wood, speaking to us recently at Sewanee, told us of the progress made in foreign missions during the nineteenth century. It is hard for us to realize that only a hundred years ago Cary left England as the first modern missionary, with little encouragement from the church, and no one to accompany him to his far off field of labor. From this small beginning we have gradually spread an influence which has gained in impetus until now we have churches and hospitals and schools in foreign fields, and are given the opportunity to enlarge the work until "all people, nations and languages shall serve Him," "whom to know aright is life everlasting."

People all over the world are beginning to realize their own responsibility to publish the glad tidings, and those who cannot obey the command to go are strengthening those who are in the field by their prayers and their gifts.

We may feel encouraged today by the fact that in our Branch of the Auxiliary there is a growth in missionary intelligence, and in the zeal which is sure to come with increased knowledge.

With nearly every report comes the statement that the Branch is learning more about the work and workers in the different fields, and in nearly every case the help given by the branch shows an increase over former years.

We have sustained a great loss in the resignation of our beloved and efficient Secretary, Mrs. Telfair Hodgson, whose prolonged absence from the Diocese made it necessary for her to give up this feature of her work. Her unselfish devotion and unflagging zeal were a stimulus to each one of us, for which we owe her more than we can tell, and we shall welcome her return to the Diocese when we may count on her ready encouragement and help.

As the new year of work begins we have many claims on our interest and help. The United Offering will be presented at our Triennial Service in San Francisco this October, and we shall have this opportunity of helping the missionary districts at home and abroad.

The hospital for women in Shanghai is the next pressing need which looks to the Auxiliary for relief, and surely no object could appeal more to the women of Christian lands than this one of alleviating the physical pain, and thus gaining a way to the hearts of women in heathen lands.

Miss Emery wishes us in Tennessee to add what we can to the fund for erecting a suitable building and properly equipping the hospital. There is always a call for boxes to lighten the missionary's burden, and to supply the mission.

May I take this opportunity to ask each Secretary to notify me as soon as a box has been sent that I may report it promptly to New York? And let me thank each one for her co-operation and help.

May each year find us stronger in numbers and zeal and good works.

After the President's address and the report of the Secretary, the principal speaker of the afternoon was introduced, Miss I. P. Mann, missionary to Japan, and we enjoyed the privilege of hearing of the work in that important field from one of its earnest workers. Miss Mann gave an interesting account of some of the customs and etiquette of Japan, and cited instances of conversions which are lessons to us in this Christian land. We learned that the Japanese women realize their membership in the Auxiliary by virtue of their baptism, and may we see the time when American women will assume their responsibility as conscientiously. Next in order were three interesting papers, the first on the subject of "The Beginning and History of the Women's Auxiliary, Character and Scope of Its Work," by Miss Mary Miller, read by Miss Weise, of St. Peter's Parish, Nashville; second, "Woman's Place and Work in the Church In and From Apostolic Times," written by Mrs. Fasey and read by Miss Windiate, of the Good Shepherd Parish, Memphis, and the third, "The Church's Work in Cuba," written by Mrs. Jounard and read by Mrs. William Robertson, of Chattanooga.

The session was adjourned with prayer. At 8 o'clock there was evening service and a sermon by the Rev. R. K. Smith on "Woman, a Definite Christian Force."

On Thursday, May 9, there was an informal meeting in the chapel, when the delegates discussed methods of work in their respective branches and ways of increasing the effectiveness of the organization. Respectfully submitted,
