MINUTES

The Nineteenth Annual Meeting of the Tennessee Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Otey Memorial Church, Seawanee, on Tuesday, May the eighth, 1906.

The day began with morning prayer and the corporate celebration of Holy Communion at eleven o'clock, Bishop Gailor being the celebrant.

The sermon was preached by the Rev. J. R. Winchester, D.D., rector of Calvary Church, Memphis, from the text: "And when they were come and had gathered the church together they rehearsed all that God had done with them" (Acts xiv: 27). The example of St. Paul and St. Barnabas was shown as a pattern for the Church in three important points: personal responsibility, corporate life, and missionary activity.

The offering was given to the United Offering Fund and amounted to nineteen dollars.

The business meeting was called to order at three o'clock in the Parish House, the President, Mrs. Shortridge, in the Chair.

Besides the delegates there was a large attendance of Auxiliary workers, which made an encouraging beginning. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, and then the President made an address of welcome and a call to greater effort to the delegates. Next in order was the reading of reports by the Secretary, Treasurer, and the different Custodians. In the absence of the Custodian for the Bishop's Purse, her report was read by the Treasurer. The Secretary of the Babies' Branch was prevented from being present by illness in her family and her report was delayed.

The only communication to the delegates was a letter from Miss Emery, and it was full of suggestions and helpfulness.

The pledges of gifts for the coming year were next made, and the business session came to an end.

Mrs. Shortridge introduced the speaker for the afternoon, the Rev. W. A. Guerry, Chaplain of the University, who made a helpful address on the encouraging aspects of missionary effort in our day, pointing to the organization of students in all our colleges for missionary study and intelligent work for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, to the united efforts of Christian women, and to the newly aroused interest among the laymen of the Church.

The Rev. R. K. Smith asked to be allowed to offer a suggestion that some plan be made to give the women left at home during the Annual Meeting of the Auxiliary, an opportunity to participate in the spiritual uplift therefrom, and to this end proposed meetings to be held on the same day in each branch. The suggestion was left to be discussed at the adjourned meeting, and there being no further business, the delegates were dismissed with prayer.

The adjourned meeting was called to order by the President at half past nine on Wednesday morning.

After the calling of the roll and reading of the minutes, the pledges were re-read for correction. The report of the Babies' Branch was read by Mrs. Chas. Duntze. The suggestion of Mr.

R. K. Smith was put before the meeting for discussion, and Mrs. H. P. Cockrane moved that the branches at home hold a meeting at the time of the Annual Meeting, and where there are more branches than one in a place, it be a joint meeting. The motion was seconded by Mrs. R. E. Mitchell, and on being put to the vote, was carried.

Miss Maud Payne made a motion which was seconded by Mrs. F. F. Reese, that an offering be taken at these branch gatherings to be given to the United Offering Fund, and it was adopted.

The President next called upon a delegate from each parish for an account of the workings in her branch, and many of the talks inspired the hearers with a determination to make greater use of the opportunities which lie before all.

The letter from Miss Emery was discussed in detail. The question about the apportionment brought us to the realization that we lacked thirty dollars of the amount suggested as our share. At the proposal of Mrs. Chas. Duntze it was decided to see if the deficiency couldn't be made up at the meeting, and in a few moments the full sum was in the hands of the Custodian.

After the motion for adjournment, the Doxology was sung, and the meeting for 1906 came to a close.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

To my dear friends and co-workers in the Woman's Auxiliary, as also to all present, I extend a most cordial and hearty greeting to this our nineteenth anniversary.

To meet those whom we have heretofore only known through correspondence, to again see the familiar faces, dear through long association in faithful work, is a pleasure which carries one over many hard places that may confront her, during her work of the succeeding year.

After reviewing the work of the past year, I cannot but congratulate you most heartily upon the work accomplished, since we last met. With the exception of a few parishes, there has been a marked advance all along the line.

The Auxiliary forms a part of the Church organization of the Diocese, you must therefore rise to a true and full appreciation of your position; the Church sends you to collect money, ask for aid and induce others to join you in this good and noble work; you do not go as beggars, but offer a blessed privilege to those to whom you go; therefore, we must endeavor to keep up the high standard of excellence accorded the Auxiliary, in this noble work; we must be continually forgetting the vexations that are behind, and reach forward with courage and determination — above all, we must be in earnest and full of enthusiasm for the cause, so that our influence may be felt by others.

The *Spirit of Missions* says: "To be a Diocesan officer means that we use our persuasive influence among women throughout the Diocese and co-operate with every officer of the Diocesan branch, in extending that influence — therefore, let us join together, with a determination to use our 'God given' gift of influence and not only increase our members, but with a oneness of purpose work on, climbing each day to greater heights and diffusing our influence, until every woman in this Church is doing her full duty toward extending the Missionary work throughout this Diocese and beyond its borders."

We wish to fit ourselves in this matter of Christian service, to be the instruments that shall accomplish an end — and this lifts us to a higher and nobler view.

Individuals taking up the work of God and seeing for themselves the fullness of joy in believing, give it out to others; no wonder then, that the work of the Woman's Auxiliary finds and holds its way, in so many parishes and missions; it ought to wherever there is a clergyman to preach Jesus and His love.

Hearing, we believe, and belief gives the grace and the power to work. Each one present knows something of the joy that glows in response to loving effort, knows also how it is enkindled by sympathy and interest, how much more quickly and with what greater ease results are accomplished, where there is unity of purpose. Each one of us, as an individual, however, must realize her own responsibility to the purpose for which our Lord came into the world; having received from the source of life in our baptismal vows, we become auxiliary to that life in others. All this wonderful "Century Service," so ably described by the honorary secretary to the Board of Missions in her fifth triennial report, is the result of the gradual development of individual Christianity.

The question for us, dear women, is the same that might be asked in every Diocesan branch — what is our duty to our Diocese, so that she may sustain her Diocesan work, and reach without stint of self, of time, or money, to the most distant fields; our Bishop is put to a severe test to make ends meet, and as loyal Churchwomen, he is entitled to our faithful allegiance, and has a right to expect our assistance in building up the waste places in this Diocese; as we are the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, are we not pledged to assist it in every possible way? Which means that we should frequently give up our own preferences, and work on lines suggested by its managers; if we really want to help, there is no reason why we cannot do so cheerfully and without questioning.

Let us remember that we are personally responsible for much of the ignorance about the Auxiliary among Churchwomen, therefore let us resolve that henceforth, we will make every effort to interest others and bring them into union with us.

Let us not forget the "Church Periodical Club;" such a blessing to those who give and to those who receive, and which, because carried on in such a quiet, unostentatious way, does not receive the support it should.

The Junior Auxiliary needs your interest and assistance, the officers are doing their best, to build up the work in our Dio-

cese; it is most important to educate the children in missionary work, but this cannot be done, without material aid from the Woman's Auxiliary.

I want to call your attention to the "United Offering" — this is our last year of effort, for the united offering which will be presented in Richmond, Va., in October 1907, let me therefore urge each member of the Tennessee branch, to do everything she can to make our share a worthy one; I most sincerely hope that every woman connected with our Church, will give what she can to this offering, be the amount large or small; give only what you can afford, but give with a willing heart.

Once more, let me urge upon you, "earnestness of purpose," "systematic giving" and "the use of your influence" — three things we must place before us in the work.

Every one whom I have met in the Diocese, who has worked side by side with me, is very near and dear in the great interest we have felt, and in the sweet spiritual companionship which has been ours — you seek no praise from me, nor have I words at my command to express to you my grateful thanks for sustaining my efforts and overlooking any mistakes.

Again I bid you all welcome, hoping, that at the adjournment of this Convention, and after we have all returned to our several homes, we may carry with us not only pleasant recollections of this meeting, of Sewanee and our hostesses, but a renewed intention and determination to achieve better results, in our work in the Woman's Auxiliary.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY

Since our last annual meeting, the Junior Auxiliary has shown growth in all departments; in membership and in increased gifts in money and boxes; and, we hope, a growth in missionary spirit and missionary knowledge.

Missionary study classes have been most successfully carried on in many parishes and have been productive of much good. Among the most recent of these classes is that of Idlewild.

You will notice an increase in cash offerings of over two hundred dollars, and a great increase in the number and value of boxes sent — and these boxes represent much careful and earnest work.

Having done so well this year, ought to stimulate us to renewed efforts for the coming year, and make us endeavor to give larger pledges to the Board of Missions, Diocesan Missions, and the United Offering.

I take this opportunity to urge the formation of Sunday-school Auxiliaries where it does not seem possible to form a regular Junior branch. — Indeed, it seems to me, it would be well to have a Missionary Sunday once a month in every Sunday-school in the Diocese. The plan is simple, and has been worked well wherever tried. Where can we find a better place than in the Sunday-school to begin that missionary training, which leads up to the missionary spirit, and to impress upon the children of the Church the truth that their duty toward God and duty toward their neighbor is summed up in the one word, "Missions"?

May our Heavenly Father bless us all during the coming year with wisdom, zeal and constancy in our work.
