Twenty-Fourth Annual Meeting
HELD IN TRINITY CHURCH, CLARKSVILLE
May, nineteen hundred and eleven

The Twenty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Tennessee Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions will be held (D.V.) in St. John's Church, Knoxville, May, nineteen hundred and twelve.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT OF GENERAL CONVENTION

The General Convention of 1910, with its accompanying services of the Woman's Auxiliary, was a notable event, on account of its perfection of arrangements, the numbers attending and in the results attained.

No place could have been found in Cincinnati, for room and convenience, as well suited to the wants and needs of such a gathering, as the grand Music Hall with its Assembly Room and immense lobbies. The hospitality and thoughtfulness of the members of the Diocese of Southern Ohio was boundless.

On opening day, 5th October, the Holy Communion was celebrated in all the churches, and before 10:30 a. m., the hour of service, the Music Hall was packed with people and hundreds were unable to gain admission. It was a great and imposing service and the sight of that immense congregation, led by a choir of five hundred voices and accompanied by the organ and an orchestra, as they sang "Ancient of Days", with more than one hundred Bishops marching to their seats on the platform, will be long remembered by every one fortunate enough to be present.

Morning prayer was followed by an eloquent sermon delivered by the Lord Bishop of Salisbury, the honored representative of our Mother Church of England.

The business of the Woman's Auxiliary was taken up at 3 p. m., Mrs. Frederick Stevens, Detroit, Mich., being called to preside, in the absence (on account of illness) of the President of the Diocese. Miss Emery, assisted by several of the delegates, acted as Secretary. At Roll Call two hundred and sixty-two officers, representing eighty diocesan branches, responded.

It would be confusing, were I to attempt to tell you of all the resolutions introduced, referred to committees and acted upon, yet I feel you will all be deeply interested in the following one, which was unanimously carried: Resolved, That the united offering of 1912 be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's Work in the Mission field, including the training, sending and supporting of women workers, and taking care of them when sick and disabled; also, that \$20,000.00 be used for a building or buildings, approved

by the Board of Missions, on the recommendation of the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary and that to our "united gifts" there shall be added our earnest prayers, that God will put it in the hearts of many of our faithful women, to give themselves up to the work of the Master, in the Mission field.

As to representation at the Triennial meeting to be held in 1913, it was decided that every Diocesan branch shall be allowed five representatives, with power to vote, who shall be appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese, or elected by the Diocesan Officers. Miss Stewart, of Va., offered an amendment, which was carried, "That when possible one of the five should be a member of the Juniors."

The business of the Woman's Auxiliary was completed at two meetings, on Tuesday morning and afternoon. Each day one hour was given to "Mission Study Class", led by Miss Lindley. The Junior exhibit and plans for work found an enthusiastic following.

Friday at 1:30 p. m. Miss Stewart, of Va., presented Mr. John Wood, Corresponding Secretary; the Rev. H. L. Burleson, and others of the Church Mission House. The afternoon was spent in listening to discussions and addresses in the joint Sessions of the House of Bishops and Deputies. The following day the Auxiliary had the pleasure of meeting the secretaries of eight Missionary Councils.

At the presentation of the United Offering Christ Church was filled, there being over eight hundred women present. The service began at 8 a. m., yet at 7 a. m., when Mrs. Gage and I arrived at the church, the steps leading to the door were literally packed with women, all eager to get in. This was one service of the General Convention, at which women, and women alone, were considered and admitted to the main floor and every one was obliged to wear her badge. The church could not hold all the women, so there was an overflow meeting held in the Sunday school room.

The service at Christ Church proper was carefully planned, beautiful and impressive. It began at 8 a. m. and was not over until after 10 o'clock. Women were there from the ranks of wealth and social prestige, also many from lowly homes, all kneeling at God's Holy Altar and joining in prayer that God would bless their "United Free Will Offering". The Bishop of Southern Ohio celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev. Frank Williams of Christ Church, the Rev. John Henry Hopkins, D.D. and the Rev. Mr. Sanford. It was at this solemn Communion service that the United Offering and Free Will Gifts of the Woman's Auxili-

ary, over and above the regular amount, was presented for the cause of Missions.

The collectors were young clergymen of the Diocese, who passed silently up and down the aisles, gathering the money in small basins, which they carried to the Altar and poured into the golden Alms Basin, used at the triennial meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary. The amount of the United Offering was \$242,110.83, the largest amount ever given by the Woman's Auxiliary, and \$19,000 more than was presented at Richmond, Va., in 1907. Tennessee gave as follows: Woman's Auxiliary \$1,317.83, Junior branch \$150.00 and the Baby branch \$50.00; total \$1,487.83.

Some time ago I received a letter from Miss Emery, in which she congratulated the Tennessee branch of the Woman's Auxiliary as having paid their apportionment *in full* for the year 1909-1910; therefore the Junior and Baby branches are on the "Roll of Honor."

MINUTES.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Tennessee Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary convened at Trinity Church, Clarksville, May 9th, 1911. The Rt. Rev. Thos. F. Gailor, Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. John B. Cannon, Rector of Trinity Church, administered Holy Communion. The Rev. Loaring Clark, Rector of St. Paul's, Chattanooga, preached the Annual Sermon and took for his topic the threefold purpose of the Woman's Auxiliary—to gain knowledge by a process of education in Missions; to develop, by consecration and prayer, the talents we already possess; to gain an inspiration for personal service. The address was a very practical one and calculated to bear fruit in increased service during the coming year. The offering, designated for the United Offering, amounted to \$14.61.

At the conclusion of this service the Twenty-fourth Annual Business Meeting of the Auxiliary was called to order by the President, Mrs. John Shortridge, at 12:30 p. m. In the absence of the Secretary, Mrs. Loaring Clark was appointed secretary *pro tem*. Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read, and, with one correction, approved.

The President of the Clarksville Auxiliary gave an Address of Welcome and Miss Gibson, of Nashville, said a few words on behalf of the Daughters of the King, extending to the delegates and their friends an invitation to attend a meeting in the interest of this organization on Wednesday morning at ten o'clock. Mrs. Loaring Clark and Mrs. C. W. Starr spoke of the Foreign Missionary Jubilee Meetings recently held in Chattanooga, and in Nashville. Mrs. S. J. Ellis gave a synopsis of the work of the United Study Class at Memphis. The Rev. J. B. Cannon extended an invitation to the members of the Auxiliary to luncheon. The meeting then adjourned until 2:15 p. m.

2:15 P. M.

After the usual opening service the President gave her Annual Address and reported having visited, during the past year, Knoxville, where a joint meeting of St. John's and Epiphany was held; Cleveland; Chattanooga, where a joint meeting of St. Paul's, Christ Church and Thankful Memorial was held; South Pittsburg; Sewanee; Mason and Bolivar, where a new branch was organized. Mrs. Shortridge also reported having addressed the Juniors at St. Katherine's school, Bolivar, and emphasized the fact that every girl in the school is a Junior. She also attended the Auxiliary meetings held in Cincinnati at the time of the General Convention in October, 1910.

The "Contingent Fund" was the subject of some discussion, and on motion of Mrs. Ellis, seconded by Mrs. R. Holland, it was resolved that the Secretary be asked to send notices to all branches urging the importance of a more prompt and regular payment of the Contingent Fee of thirty cents per capita of the membership of each branch.

The Treasurers and Custodians of Special Funds then presented their reports, and Parish Reports and Pledges were taken.

Miss Bassett, in charge of the Mission of the Merciful Savior at Sewanee, gave an interesting and instructive account of her work among the Mountaineers and asked for the practical interest of members of the Auxiliary in Tennessee.

A letter was read from Mrs. Chas. Warren, President of New York Central Branch, by Mrs. Martin, of Nashville, regarding Miss Julia C. Emery's thirty-fifth year of service with the Auxiliary. It was moved by Mrs. Mynder, of Knoxville, and seconded by Mrs. B. T. Howard, of Chattanooga, that each member of the Auxiliary be asked to contribute at least ten cents to be devoted to a Testimonial Missionary Fund--Miss Emery to receive the accrued interest of this fund during her lifetime--and to designate the Missionary object to which the principal shall be applied at her death.

The meeting then adjourned until Wednesday at 2:15 p. m.

WEDNESDAY, 2:15 P. M.

The meeting reassembled in the schoolroom of the Methodist Church and after the usual opening the Custodian of the United Offering, Mrs. E. D. Richards, and the Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, Mrs. Harry Gerhardt, presented their reports.

Archdeacon Windiate spoke on his work in Middle Tennessee, and at the conclusion of his remarks the following resolution was passed: That the Ven. T. D. Windiate be allowed to use any funds in his possession, collected by the Woman's Auxiliary for the Mission at Paradise Ridge, at his discretion.

Mrs. W. E. Barnes of the Cathedral, Memphis, read a letter from Miss Emery, suggesting changes in the method of preparing the General Annual Report of the Auxiliary. After some discussion it was moved by Mrs. Loaring Clark and seconded by Mrs. W. E. Barnes, and unanimously carried, that the Tennessee Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary accepts the suggestion contained in Miss Emery's letter regarding the proposed change in her Annual Report, on condition that the majority of the Branches of the Auxiliary also accept the proposed change.

St. John's, Knoxville, through Mrs. Mynder, promised to equip, with summer clothing, the children in the family of a Tennessee Missionary.

The President spoke of the necessity of the reports from branches being properly filled out and promptly forwarded.

Votes of thanks were passed to the Ladies of Trinity Church; the Minister and Officials of the Methodist Church; the interested Resi-

dents in Clarksville for their kind entertainment of Delegates and to the members of the Clarksville Auxiliary. Copies were ordered sent to the proper persons and to the local press.

The meeting then adjourned, subject to call of the chair.

THURSDAY, MAY 11.

A Special Called Meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Matthew Gracey at 2:15 p. m. The President of the Auxiliary presided and opened in the usual manner. An interesting account of the work which has been inaugurated and is being carried on at Glenraven by Mr. and Mrs. Felix Ewing was given by Mrs. Ewing.

The Rev. W. S. Claiborne spoke of the needs of the University of the South for which he is a Commissioner and urged the members of the Auxiliary to support in every way possible their own University both in its College and Preparatory Departments.

Mrs. John Shortridge gave a full account of the work of the Auxiliary at the General Convention, which will be found printed in the report.

The meeting closed with the Benediction.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY

The Second Annual Meeting of the Junior Department of the Tennessee Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Clarks-ville on Wednesday, May 10th, at 2 p. m. Mrs. John Shortridge presided and opened in the usual manner.

Seventeen delegates, representing eleven Branches, responded to the roll call and a large number of the members of the Woman's Auxiliary were also present.

Miss Josephine Chapman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Juniors reported for the past year, an increase in both money received and in the value of Boxes sent to Mission Stations. She went on to say: "This closes one side of our organization. The other, and the more important one, is the spiritual one. That cannot be measured in boxes and dollars and cents, tho' these are the outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace. Let me beg that you will take back this determination with you—a determination to use the Noonday Prayer daily and to influence others to do so, until every baptized girl in the Auxiliary is living up to the seal of her baptismal vows and is anxious to fight under Christ's banner and to be his faithful soldier and servant until her life end—and will not yield to temptation to do only the things that interest her and send boxes only where the interest appeals strongly to her. Our human interests are easily changed and sometimes we give liberally in a certain direction and then neglect the work when our interest flags. Let us ever remember that we are only servants and soldiers and are under those in authority and then, in addition to objects that interest us nearest, we will resolve to put sufficient money in to the hands of the New York Board of Missions and into our Diocesan Treasury to supply some of these places that do not specially interest us, but that need the Gospel preached to them. Finally let me repeat that the message you have to carry back to your home Branches is one of encouragement for the work done so well in His name and an appeal to all baptized girls to pray for Missions daily and to gain information about them."

Reports were made by the local directresses. Mrs. B. T. Howard

for Chattanooga; Mrs. P. M. Tamble for Nashville and Mrs. S. J. Ellis for Memphis.

The Ven. T. D. Windiate spoke of the work at Paradise Ridge and asked the interest of the Branches in the same.

Miss Bassett, of Sewanee, gave a very practical and bright account of her work amongst the Mountaineers attending and living adjacent to her Mission at Jump Off and was accorded a hearty response together with many promises of practical interest in the future.

Reports of the work of the branches were made by Miss Ava Wright for Chattanooga; Mrs. Rowena Day for Clarksville; Miss Maude Reid for Franklin; Mrs. Mynder for Knoxville; Miss Allen for Calvary, Memphis; and for the Nashville Churches—Mrs. Fitzgerald for Advent; Mrs. Wheeler for Christ Church; Miss Sadie Buckner for St. Ann's; Mrs. Tamble for St. Peter's; and Miss F. Patch King for St. Andrews.

Pledges were then taken for next year's work and the meeting adjourned with singing and the benediction.

Miss Josephine Chapman entered into rest four days after the Junior Meeting, and this report has been compiled from her notes.
