PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

In the name of our Heavenly Father, from whom cometh every good and perfect gift, and who has made it possible for us to again meet in annual session, I welcome you to this our twenty-sixth anniversary. May our coming together be a season of joy and Christian experience that will cause each one of us to thank God for having been present.

If we would make our meeting one of profit to the Master, we should take up the duties of this hour with greater earnestness, and endeavor to make this the very best meeting we have ever had; to even send forth from it influences that will make our next annual meeting better than this one. It is not my purpose in this greeting to occupy your time in listening to a general review of the year's work,—our Secretary will do that.

If we have been earnest in every service and faithful in every duty, our lives have been enriched by working in obedience to our Master's commands, and the good has been one with God and for humanity, the sum total of all work will be made up of little duties well performed, when all great principles will find their proper issue. It is not a special work, but one in which each interested church member should help. Perhaps some can do more than others, but in order that real success may be attained, each member must lay hold upon God and resolve to do her whole duty.

To know that we have aided, even in little deeds, our revered Bishop in furthering the cause of Christ, in giving to this people "the faith which was once delivered unto the Saints", we accept it as a blessed privilege, and because of it, let us renew our obligations in the Master's service and pray for strength to do better work in the future.

I regret very much not having been able to arrange for a visit to each branch of the Auxiliary during the past year, as personal contact affords better opportunity for interchange of

thought, and lessons learned by older Auxiliaries could have been made easier for those of less experience.

The hours of pleasure and mutual interest spent with each other in weekly meetings will linger with us while memory lasts; the sweet communion with God in prayer, the sisterly recognition, the warmth of hand-clasps on coming together at the meetings in each other's homes, and the tender words of sympathy to the sick and encouragement to the unfortunate, are numbered among the good results of work "in His name".

Spiritual and temporal aid has been given, of which no published report will be made; missions not under our supervision, but meriting our endorsement, have been given monthly aid; comfort has been given to the destitute poor in gifts of clothing; the sick have been visited and ministered unto, and darkened homes made brighter by prayer and spiritual advice. The results of such work tend to strengthen the mystical tie that binds our hearts in Christian love and sympathy in that touch of true charity that knows no creed in relief work for humanity. To love God is to love our neighbor as well, and if each Auxiliary member will yield to the prompting of the Holy Spirit in doing good, golden grain will enrich the harvest-fields of our work.

To our honored and beloved Bishop the women of Memphis are bound by ties of inexpressible gratitude for the meditations of a "Quiet Day", on March 30th last. It was a day of sweet communion with God, and on His altar saddened hearts laid burdens grievously borne. It was also a day of "coming to ourselves" and, realizing our sins, we were led to seek forgiveness, and in joy were brought back to our "Father's house". "Thus saith the Lord thy God,"—"in quietness and confidence shall be our strength." So, dear co-workers, let us seek for greater strength, in quietness and prayer to God. To every earnest worker, sooner or later, comes the knowledge of her own limitations, which brings with it the temptation to become discouraged and lose interest, but we must remember that God calls for no greater standard than "she hath done what she

could"; and that all He expects of us is to be faithful in the use of the little power we have.

In looking to the future, let us never drag and complain; instead, let us grasp our possibilities. We must not be satisfied until we have tilled the field we now occupy to our own satisfaction and the approbation of our honored Bishop. If we succeed, every victory must be the result of fervent prayer, friendly counsel and harmonious work; therefore let our armour be burnished with the faith that hopeth all things, forgiveth all things, endureth all things, and is purified in the crucible of Christ's all-embracing love.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

BRANCHES

During the past year thirty-four branches have undertaken and reported active work. St. Luke's, Cleveland; Holy Trinity, Memphis; and Winchester, have been reorganized and a Second Circle of Auxiliary women has been formed at St. John's, Knoxville. Several branches report an increase in gifts through the use of a special Auxiliary envelope, and a large majority report more active interest, which they attribute mainly to increased prayer and an acquirement of fuller information through systematic study.

DAY OF PRAYER

Twenty-one branches signified their intention of observing the Feast of the Annunciation as a day of special prayer and intercession for the work of the Auxiliary, and five other branches set apart a special day for this purpose.

BOXES

In response to letters from New York, personal Missionary Boxes have been sent by the Cathedral, St. Luke's, and Grace Church, Memphis; Christ Church, Nashville; Otey Memorial, Sewanee; and St. Paul's, Chattanooga; the value of these boxes being \$684.59. Boxes for the Mountain Missions, Diocese of Lexington, also sent in response to letters from New York, number five, and are valued at \$171.20; making a total box credit with New York of \$855.79. Seventeen boxes have been sent in the Diocese, value \$345.74, and fourteen boxes sent outside the Diocese, value \$239.95, making the total number of boxes thirty-seven and their value \$1,441.38. This is an increase of \$365.98 over the value of last year's boxes.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

At the Twenty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Tennessee the office of Educational Secretary was created and the undersigned appointed to fill that office.

During the year the Secretary sent notices of literature, prepared by the Board in New York, to every Auxiliary Branch President and Junior leader. The response was most encouraging; nine branches holding Study Classes and six conducting Programme Meetings amongst the Seniors. Many Junior branches did good work. Nine branches used "Japan Advancing: Wither?" as their textbook; others report using "The Uplift of China"; "China's New Day"; "Conquest of the Continent"; "Early Missions of Ireland, Scotland and England"; and the "Spirit of Missions".

On May 1st and 2nd, the Rev. Arthur R. Gray, Educational Secretary of the Board, held a two-day's Institute for the Nashville branches, from which much good will result.

At the Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting held in Sewanee the Secretary reported that China would be the book for study next year, and urged each branch to consider that subject.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDENT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The work of the Church Periodical Club during the past year has shown healthy growth, although the yearly report, in some respects, has fallen below that of last year.

It has been impossible to secure replies from several librarians, consequently those parishes in a state of inactivity have been dropped from the list. We sincerely hope it is not a permanent loss.

Three new branches have been enrolled and many individuals interested. Two excellent travelling libraries are in circulation, and libraries are now established at Goodlettsville, Clark Station, White Bluff Penitentiary, Goodrich, Sylvia Reform School. This branch of the work is very important and accomplishes permanent results. Mrs. Joseph W. Rogers, of Goodlettsville, is in charge of this part of the work, and her report is most encouraging. She has issued and had returned to her during the past year 687 books and 309 magazines and papers. In connection with the library she purposes to establish an information bureau.

Mrs. Woodsworth, of White Bluff, is meeting with success in her efforts at the Nashville prison.

Mrs. Ellen C. Dugdale, who is a self-appointed missionary with the Bishop's approval, is doing a most interesting work at Savannah on the Tennessee river. Stimulus to increased effort is found in the letters of cordial thanks that are constantly being received, the efficiency of some of our parish librarians, and the generous coöperation of individual contributors.

Books and magazines have been sent to the following places in the Diocese: Epiphany Mission, Sherwood; Tennessee Reformatory for Boys; Tuberculosis Hospital; Savannah; and to several Alaskan stations. Librarian No. 18, of St. Paul's, Chattanooga, still holds the banner; while Librarian No. 11, of Grace Church, Memphis, is a close second.

There is almost no financial assistance from the parish branches for carrying on the Diocesan work. I have received \$1.00 from

Librarian No. 19, Columbia; \$1.00 from Librarian No. 18, Chattanooga; and \$2.00 from Sewanee Auxiliary. The latter I sent to the General Office so that our Diocese should not be lacking in this respect. Each parish librarian apparently bears the expense incurred. Is this Missionary Spirit?

Through your Correspondent and the fourteen librarians, there have been distributed 116 periodicals; 36 Bibles, Testaments and Psalms; 32 Prayer Books and Hymnals; 135 theological and secular books; 1,236 tracts and Catechisms; 5,313 odd magazines; 382 Easter, Christmas, picture cards and calendars; 12 pieces of music, in book or sheet form; 97 games, scrap books, etc.; 22 boxes and packages. Fifty donors are sending magazines regularly. I have written sixty-three letters and ninety postals.

Mrs. C. K. Benedict, President of the Sewanee branch, gave cordial greeting and warm welcome on behalf of Sewanee to the delegates assembled, to which Mrs. Walter Buckner happily responded.

The President read her Annual Address, which will be found printed herein. The following resolution, pertaining to a change in Article X of the Constitution, and of which due notice had been given, was moved by Mrs. Felix Ewing, seconded by Mrs. H. P. Cochrane and unanimously carried:

Resolved, There shall be one meeting of this Association each year, to convene about the same time as the Diocesan Convention. At all meetings of the Diocesan Association each parochial branch shall have the right of representation by its President, or such an one as she shall designate; and

one delegate for each twenty-five members reported to the diocesan officers and for whom contingent fees have been paid.

Mrs. Felix Ewing and Mrs. M. Paoli were appointed a Committee on Courtesy. Reports were presented by the Secretary; the Treasurer (read in the unavoidable absence of Mrs. Charles Duntze by Mrs. J. R. Wheeler); the Treasurer of Specials; the Custodian of the United Offering; the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club (read in the unavoidable absence of Mrs. Harry Gerhart by Mrs. C. H. Drane). These reports will be found printed herein.

It was moved by Mrs. H. P. Cochrane, seconded by Mrs. Frederick Hardy and unanimously carried:

Resolved, That the cost of the Quintard Chinese Scholarship should be assumed by the Auxiliary of this Diocese for the ensuing seven years.

It was moved by Mrs. J. M. Metcalfe, seconded by Mrs. H. P. Cochrane and unanimously carried:

Resolved, That the cost of the Josephine Chapman Scholarship, tenable at St. Katherine's School, Bolivar, should be assumed by the Auxiliary of this Diocese for the ensuing year.

Greetings were received by telegram from the Bishop, the President and the members of the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Michigan, who assembled simultaneously with the Auxiliary in this Diocese for their Annual Meeting. Response was telegraphed in the name of the Bishop, the President and the members of the Auxiliary in Tennessee.

The meeting then adjourned to the home of the Bishop and Mrs. T. F. Gailor in response to their invitation for luncheon.

TUESDAY, May 6, 2:45 p.m.

The delegates reassembled in the Professor's Club Room for the session devoted to the work of the Junior and Babies' Branches. Reports will be found printed herein.

At 4:00 o'clock the President took the chair and introduced the Rev. W. S. Claiborne, rector of Sewanee, who gave a forceful address on the missionary work amongst the mountaineers of Tennessee in general and on the special needs and oppor-

tunities for increased work in and around Sewanee in particular. The Rev. George L. Neide, of Memphis, followed and spoke on the work in Memphis down-town districts. He stressed the efforts being put forward to increase the efficiency and enlarge the scope of the work of the Church amongst the working people resident in the South Side of our Cathedral city.

The Bishop then emphasized the needs in several centres, particularly mentioning Etowah. He asked the women not to let their "specials" in the Diocese interfere with their gifts to the general diocesan missionary funds, and closed his remarks with an appeal to the spiritual side of the individual life and its practical application to the great cause of missions.

The Bishop pronounced the benediction and the meeting adjourned in order that the delegates might accept the invitation of Dr. and Mrs. Kirby-Smith to attend a reception at their home.

SECOND DAY

WEDNESDAY, May 7, 9:00 a.m.

The President called the meeting to order and opened in the usual manner.

Minutes of the previous day's sessions were read and approved.

The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Tyler Calhoun, in a graphic and forceful manner, dealt with the urgent need of a wider and more thorough acquirement of missionary knowledge and detailed methods and means. Her report of the work accomplished in the Diocese during the past year will be found printed herein.

On motion of Mrs. Haskell DuBose it was unanimously

Resolved, That Miss Grace Lindley be invited to attend the annual meeting of the Auxiliary in Tennessee in 1914 and conduct a Study Class or Missionary Institute, whichever shall be deemed advisable.

The meeting adjourned at 10:30 in order that the delegates might attend the opening service of the Diocesan Convention.

WEDNESDAY, May 7, 2:30 p.m.

The President called the meeting to order and opened in the usual manner.

Reports from the parish branches were read and pledges made for the coming year, all of which will be found printed herein. Mrs Felix Ewing, of Cedar Hill, gave an account of the interesting work being carried on amongst the rural residents in that locality. The report of Mrs. Richard McCargo, delegate to the meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Fourth Department, held at Charlotte in October last, was read by Mrs. A. M. Thompson, in the unavoidable absence of Mrs. McCargo. Mrs. Loaring Clark gave an outline of the plan and scope of organization in the Fourth Department.

The meeting adjourned in order that the delegates might attend the reception given by the Bishop and Mrs. Gailor.

THURSDAY, May 8, 11:00 a.m.

The meeting was called to order by the President. Mrs. Haskell DuBose, Vice-President of the Auxiliary, conducted the opening devotional exercises.

Minutes of the previous day's sessions were read and approved.

Addresses were made by Miss Bassett of the Mission of Our Saviour at Sewanee; Miss H. H. Turner, State President of the Girl's Friendly Society; and Miss Clementine Rowe of Sherwood; all of whom spoke on their respective branches of work.

Mrs. E. D. Richards and Mrs. Tyler Calhoun made strong pleas for special effort in respect to increasing the United Offering before the Triennial Meeting. Mrs. E. M. Ellsworth reported the circulation of the *Alakan Churchman*.

The Committee on Courtesy presented the following report:

The Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Tennessee Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions desires to express to the more than hospitable people of Sewanee its deep appreciation of the cordial welcome extended and continued to it during the three-days' meeting.

To their beloved Bishop and to Mrs. Gailor they say "thank you" with a heartiness born of genuine love and gratitude for their many favors to them.

To Mrs. Benedict, her able assistants, and the respective hostesses, must praise be given for their splendid management of everything pertaining to comfort and well-being.

The indescribable atmosphere that always envelops Sewanee has wrapped its magic spell about us and each and all will feel this influence long after the goodbyes have been said.
