In Memoriam



Margaret Douglass Richards

In the afternoon of Monday, March 10th, 1919, Margaret Douglass Richards, our beloved "United Offering Lady," fell asleep. Quietly, gently, peacefully she lived, and so, after a very brief illness, she died. Her life was an example and an inspiration to us all. Born an aristocrat, she was a living illustration of the true democracy of the Christian faith: "The ribald and rude, she took as she found them, and did them all good." Reared in affluence, and surrounded by luxury, her life was one of beautiful simplicity, humble piety, and personal service, her wealth being used not for ostentation, but for the glory of God. For more than seventeen years she served as Custodian of the United Offering of the Diocese of Tennessee; during that time she never allowed any meeting to close without some mention of the Little Blue Box. Therefore be it

Resolved, That in the death of Mrs. E. D. Richards the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Tennessee has suffered an irreparable loss. We mourn the passing of our beloved friend, our valued co-worker, our devoted and loyal Custodian; and we thank our heavenly Father, whom she loved so well and served so faithfully, for the blessed assurance that she is now forever with her Lord.

THE ADVENT CALL

I beg to report that initial steps to inaugurate the Advent Call in this Diocese were taken by asking each branch of the Auxiliary to send one or more members to the Summer School at Sewanee for instruction under Mrs. George Biller and by sending a letter to every clergyman asking for his practical interest in this work which was endorsed, sanctioned and earnestly commended to them by our Bishop.

In spite of many conflicting calls and the epidemic of influenza sympathetic and practical interest and coöperation of clergy and people were given and maintained. The instructions issued by the Central Committee were adapted to local conditions and followed out as closely as possible. The vice-presidents of each Convocation rendered valuable assistance in the distribution of literature and the "Juniors" of Memphis made the bazzards worn by the messengers.

Meetings for instruction and services of preparation were held in all parishes. Special sermons were preached on the First Sunday in Advent and Holy Communion was celebrated on one or more days of the following week, according to parochial needs.

One hundred and sixty-nine messengers carried the "Plan" into the homes; ninety-four intercessors were in the churches during the hours of visitation and the number of pledge cards signed exceeded four thousand.

The messengers were well received and only a few reports were made of instances where those visited refused to accept or sign the pledge cards. Additions to the ranks of active Auxiliary women were reported and many of those visited expressed their appreciation of the work of the messengers. Lasting Church friendships were made and much spiritual good has resulted from the effort which has materially helped in the upbuilding of the Kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ. May our next effort go further and deeper!

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The report in figures of the Church Periodical Club would be very discouraging if we did not consider that seven of our Librarians have made no report. There is quite a contrast between the sum totals of last year and this. I know, however, that the good work has gone beyond that tabulated last year.

Librarians complain it is impossible to even approximate the various distributions, for the people make no effort to keep in touch with the Librarians, thereby depriving the Parish of due credit.

Then Librarians often do not realize the importance of their work to the Parish and outside world, therefore make no especial effort to keep in touch with conditions and needs, nor to bring the subject before their own Guilds. Rarely is the correspondent called upon for suggestions as to disposal of reading and recreational material. There are always hospital and home demands for games, puzzles, and scrap-books—all of which would interest the young people in preparing. This need, the Church Periodical Club as an organization of the Church, is endeavoring to supply, and should have the interest and working encouragement of all her people. Offers for the regular sending of magazines are badly needed. Requests for some special magazine are always on file. Give the Librarian the name of the magazine you will send, and she will secure the address. In our own Diocese, there are Missions in need of literature. Why hoard your books after their mission in your own home has been fulfilled?

Monterey is in need of juvenile books especially, and asks for the works of Miss Alcott, Annie Fellows, Johnston or any others of simple, wholesome fiction, and for the boys, Henty, Optic and similar books—adventure, of course, appealing most strongly. The Librarian there says: "Ignorance is appalling and our library one good weapon in the fight against it."

Please do not rush a collection to any point without sending a list to see whether it is acceptable, as the wants may have been supplied—and there are other places.

Our Travelling Libraries are in a "hold-up," two or three being in a place. Correspondence begging the circulation is ignored. Rather a selfish state for Christian people. It may be there is difficulty in having books returned, making a shortage in the list, but the Librarians in charge, after exerting every effort to have them returned, or to secure readable substitutes, should report to the Custodian, Mrs. Rogers, and let her help solve the problem. Lack of interested support from our Church people is the cause of many failures of missionary effort. This mission work is a valuable and far-reaching one, with so little expense attached for the amount of comfort and happiness given, that each one might be a cheerful giver.

Through a member of the Sewanee Unit Ambulance Service we were able to supply the boys with weekly and monthly literature, as well as a number of books, until the sending was prohibited. This privilege was greatly appreciated, as the Unit was serving entirely with the French Division, and not in touch with American centers.

I hope the tabulated report will be carefully examined and act as an incentive to those of us who are cold or lukewarm.

Several of our churches have been doing steady good work all through my administration, or since the beginning of their efforts.

I desire to thank them for the inspiration they are to me. Promptness in correspondence, eagerness to help, together with results obtained is our compensation for trials and tribulations.

The Church Periodical Club year has been changed to January, thus making it coincide with the Board of Missions and other Church organizations.

MINUTES

TUESDAY, May 6th, 1919.

The Thirty-second Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Diocese of Tennessee convened at Christ Church, Nashville, at 10 A.M. The Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Gailor, Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by Dean DuVall, of Memphis, celebrated Holy Communion and preached the sermon. Specially selected hymns were sung by the congregation and choir, and the beautiful solo, "Abide With Me," was given by Mrs. Thomas Malone, Jr. The whole service was a memorial to Mrs. Margaret D. Richards, for many years Custodian of the United Offering, who entered into rest on March 10th, 1919. The offering designated for the United Offering was \$22.73.

After the service Mrs. John Shortridge, President, called the meeting to order in the Parish House. Noonday prayers were offered by Mrs. B. B. Ramage.

Mrs. A. G. Campbell very graciously welcomed the delegates to Christ Church, to which Mrs. Rodes, of Franklin, responded.

Mrs. Calhoun then reported for the Committee and read resolutions on the death of Mrs. Richards, which were accepted by a rising vote. A motion was carried that these resolutions be printed on a separate page in our annual report.

Roll was called, to which eight officers and thirty-eight delegates responded. Two delegates were from a newly organized Branch at Spring Hill.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and accepted.

Mrs. Loaring Clark, Leader of the Advent Call, read her report, which will be found printed herein.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon.

TUESDAY, May 6th, 2 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Clark, Vice-President of the Girls' Friendly Society. A short business session was conducted.

Resolutions on the death of Mrs. Robert Daniel as a Girls' Friendly worker were read by Miss Spon and accepted by a rising vote.

Bishop Gailor was then announced and spoke in behalf of the Girls' Friendly Society, the Daughters of the King and the Woman's Auxiliary. He stated that the purpose of the Girls' Friendly Society being an effort to create common feeling of fellowship and good will between girls in all walks of life had done much to further the interest between the business girl and the girl not obliged to go out into the business world, and strongly endorsed the Society, especially for conditions arising in city life. He spoke of the value of the more spiritual side and power of prayer as emphasized by the Daughters of the King and how harmoniously the organizations worked together.

The Woman's Auxiliary he said was the essential side of the Church itself, and to every baptised woman came the responsibility of the mission of Christ.

In helping with the work at Monterey the Woman's Auxiliary was meeting a most definite need, as this mountain district, so remote from city life and privileges, faced problems of unusual retarded development and ignorance. The Bishop asked that we extend our help in Diocesan work and pledge \$300 for work at White Bluff.

Reports from Parochial Branches of the Girl's Friendly Society were read by Miss Spon, the Secretary.

After this session Mrs. Davis Taylor presented the work of the Junior Auxiliary, saying that the aim was to reach every boy and girl in the Sunday School and to train them in the mission of the Church.

Mrs. Haskell Rightor next presented the Little Helpers' organization. Urging that the babies be consecrated and trained to the service of prayer and helping missions.

Mrs. Shortridge then appointed the following committees:

Credentials—Mrs. Starr and Mrs. Barnes.

Courtesy—Mrs. Willard Warner and Mrs. Bolton Smith.

Nominations for vacant offices and for delegates to Triennial Convention to be held in Detroit, Mrs. Otey Walker, Mrs. Broadbent and Mrs. Archer.

The meeting was then turned over to the Junior Auxiliary for their annual meeting, when reports from their officers and delegates were given.

SECOND DAY

WEDNESDAY, May 7th, 9:30 A.M.

The meeting was opened with the creed and prayers by Mrs. Shortridge.

Mrs. Calhoun gave the United Offering report. For the year \$871.77 had been turned in; for the three years to date \$2,076.77.

Five dollars had been sent by a friend as a memorial to Mrs. Richards, and it was suggested that this be increased by others desiring to enlarge our fund before the General Convention and have it as a thank-offering for the privilege of Mrs. Richards' devoted service for so many years.

A resolution from Clarksville was presented by Mrs. Drane on the subject of changing the name of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions to the Woman's Branch of the Church Missionary Society.

Miss Spon presented an amendment, which was not seconded.

The hour having arrived for opening service of the Convention the meeting adjourned until time for the afternoon session.

WEDNESDAY, May 7th, 2 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by the Vice-President, Mrs. Clark, and opened with prayers by Mrs. Drane.

Taking up the subject of the resolution which was presented at the morning session the following amendment to the original was read, voted on and carried:

Resolved, That we, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Diocese of Tennessee, respectfully request the National Committee on National Constitution to change the name of the woman's particular organization for missionary work and instruction from the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions to the Woman's Branch of the Church Missionary Society. Furthermore, we ask that opportunity for discussion on the matter be given at a business session at the Triennial to be held in Detroit.

A letter was read from Miss Lindley regarding the Nation-Wide Campaign to be worked out as was the Advent Call, reaching and enlisting the interest of all Church women.

Dr. Garden, of the Seventh Province, was announced and explained somewhat the scope of the work connected with the subject.

Dr. Isabel Kerr, of Boston, was then introduced, and spoke on the subject being taken up by the Social Morality Campaign which is going over the United States.

Minutes of Wednesday's meeting were read and approved, after which came reports of Diocesan officers and Parish branches, which will be found printed herein.

A resolution was read and carried that the fiscal year of the Diocesan Auxiliary and its parochial branches be changed to coördinate with the Diocesan and National Church fiscal year as ordered by the General Convention to be from January 1st to December 31st of each year.

Reports of the Nominating Committee were read by Miss Archer. The Diocesan officers to stand as they are with the exception of Treasurer, which office Mrs. Otey Walker should fill in place of Mrs. Gifford, who resigned, and Mrs. Tyler Calhoun to be Custodian of United Offering.

Delegates to the General Convention were: Mrs. Shortridge, Mrs. Loaring Clark, Mrs. J. R. Wheeler, Mrs. Tyler Calhoun, Mrs. Davis Taylor.

Alternates: Mrs. Drane, Mrs. Norwell, Mrs. McCargo, Mrs. Ramage, Mrs. Rightor.

These reports were accepted.

A letter from Bishop Colmore was read, soliciting the interest of the Auxiliary for Church equipment in Porto Rico.

It was voted to pledge for this fund, and that the Secretary should write all Branches accordingly.

It was also voted to make pledges for work at White Bluff according to Bishop Gailor's request.

The meeting then adjourned.

THIRD DAY

THURSDAY, May 8th, 9:30 A.M.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Shortridge and opened with prayers by Mrs. Archer. The Vice-President was then asked to take the chair.

Miss Edmondson, worker from White Bluff, was presented and spoke most earnestly of the work, the needs and opportunities for service. Eighty-five families are visited, Sunday School enrollment is twenty-five and daily school forty. She emphasized the Bishop's request for \$300 to extend the work.

Rev. A. C. Killifer, of Monterey, told of the work at St. Raphael's School during the past year. How the pledge from the Woman's Auxiliary had made many things possible, and still a great deal more was needed.

Miss Bowen, worker at St. Raphael's, provided by the United Offering, told of her personal contact with the community around the School.

Mrs. Bolton Smith spoke in behalf of the colored work and the school at Keeling.

Mrs. Ramage presented the following resolution, which was accepted :

WHEREAS, A considerable number of the communicants of the Church in the United States are suffering from total blindness and no adequate provision is made for supplying them with Church literature ;

Therefore, be it Resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Tennessee respectfully and urgently petition the Triennial Convention to be held in Detroit to set aside from the next United Offering a sufficient sum to provide a permanent fund for supplying this widespread and appealing need.

The Credential Committee reported that ten officers were present and thirty-nine delegates, representing twenty-three Parishes.

The report of the Committee on Courtesy was read and accepted, as follows :

Your Committee would express on behalf of the officers and delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Tennessee its warm thanks for the cordial hospitality of the members of Christ Church and the other churches of Nashville. Realizing the many problems to be faced in view of the hurried call to entertain the Convention and the Auxiliary, our

expressions are all the more profound and appreciative. It is always a joy to visit the Mother Parish of the Diocese, and on no occasion has our pleasure been greater than the present one.

We deeply regret to know of the illness of your Rector, and trust that he may soon be restored to health and strength.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

This, the last year before the Triennial, has indeed been a busy one for the Juniors, notwithstanding the fact that influenza, war work, etc., were a great handicap in carrying the work into new fields.

Immediately after the last Convention, a letter was written to every Parish Branch not represented at the Convention, telling them of the definite things decided upon for the advancement of the work, and all the literature then published on the New Junior Plan and other leaflets, with suggested books, were also sent.

As a member of the Committee on Parochial Education of the Tennessee Diocesan Board of Religious Education, I was made superintendent of the Junior work in the Church Schools of the Diocese. Through the co-operation of the Chairman of this Committee, the Tennessee Diocesan Junior Plan was completed. It was approved at one of the Junior Conferences at Sewanee last summer, was printed and distributed throughout the Diocese, the Committee on Parochial Education bearing a large part of the expense. About 150 copies, with enclosed letter, were mailed to the various Church School workers, and to every Woman's Auxiliary president. I want to thank the Woman's Auxiliary members who so readily responded and so greatly helped in stimulating an interest in the work in their respective parishes.

Three Church Schools reported having adopted the Plan, St. John's, Johnson City, and the Cathedral, Memphis, leading in interest and thorough co-operation with the Board. Four other schools have made excellent beginnings and several sent their first Christmas boxes under the direction of the Board of Missions.

A missionary catechism was compiled through the co-operation of these two boards and will be published later.

Six missionary addresses were made by me before groups of Church School teachers, Woman's Auxiliary members and Juniors themselves. I assisted in arranging programs, etc., for several Church Schools, investigated Study Courses, books, plays, pageants, etc., and collected a number for distribution.

A Lenten "Call to Service" was issued by the Junior Department of the Church Missions House and 4,000 leaflets and 50 letters were mailed to the various schools. It is hoped that those who failed to use these leaflets during Lent will do so later, as the prayers and other suggestions are very helpful.

Altogether I wrote nearly 300 letters in the interest of this work, besides replies to letters of inquiry and commendation about the Plan outside the Diocese.

An Interparochial Training Class for Leaders was started in Memphis and a few meetings held. We hope to resume them again during the coming year.

The Chairman of the Christmas Box Work, Mrs. Wm. E. Barnes, is to be especially commended for her excellent work, as the number of boxes has almost doubled this year.

We were sorry to lose the Vice-President of our Board through removal from the Diocese, but we are delighted to have with us our new Treasurer, Miss Margaret Sadd of Chattanooga, whose interest and efficiency have been a great addition to the Board.

It is difficult to measure the amount of missionary work accomplished, as interest in missions is a growth, a development, and it takes time for plans to develop. While progress has been slow, we feel encouraged that many of our schools are beginning to realize the importance of mission study and activity and that a few of the tiny seeds sown have taken root. If we plant and water, God will give the increase.
