

PRAYER FOR THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY



The Fifteenth Annual Diocesan Assembly of the Daughters of the King was held in Memphis on January 18th in St. Mary's Cathedral, in conjunction with the 94th Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Tennessee.

Services began with Holy Communion, Bishop Gailor as celebrant, assisted by the Rt. Rev. James M. Maxon and Dean I. H. Noe.

What a distinct privilege it was! That the first service of a diocesan nature to be held in the new Cathedral, should be that of the opening service for the Daughters of the King, and that it was possible to have Bishop Gailor preach to the women on this memorable occasion. His discourse on "Womanhood" will live in the minds and hearts of all who heard him. Every word was a heart-to-heart talk rather than a sermon.

Then, the quiet hour in the Parish House, by Bishop Maxon! That hour will never be forgotten. Given as only Bishop Maxon can, it is surely a lasting remembrance. He gave a vision of the Star, a symbol of the Epiphany Season and gave illustrations of the manner of a Christian's work. The secret of success is aggressive work and Christianity does not make its progress in a noisy way. Bishop Maxon closed by asking all to follow the Star, and ask ourselves, are we ready to follow it, and ready to do our Master's work when called upon.

After the renewal of vows of the Order, the meeting adjourned for a dainty luncheon served by members of the chapters from all parishes in Memphis and prepared by a special committee from St. Mary's Cathedral.

The business session began at 2:30 with the President, Mrs. Carey Folk, presiding.

The Credential Committee—Mrs. R. E. Mitchell and Mrs. H. L. Rawlings, reported 26 delegates present, with 36 cards received.

The address of welcome to the delegates was made by Mrs. I. H. Noe of Memphis, and the response given by Mrs. J. L. McKoin of Nashville.

Mrs. Folk expressed a few words of greeting to all present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved; only the totals of the financial report were given, as the time was too limited for the report in full.

Twenty-five delegates representing 14 chapters were present.

The Very Rev. Noe, Dean of the Cathedral, extended a hearty welcome and spoke on the aims and inspirations of the Order; he said two things the Order stands for, he loves most of all: Prayer and Service.

The Rev. George O. Watts of Clarksville gave an address on Christ, the Supreme King for each Daughter.

Bishop Maxon again addressed the Assembly and spoke on their special privilege and of united efforts with other bodies whenever opportunity offered.

He emphasized the idea of Joyous Christians.

Mrs. Loaring Clark spoke on devotional opportunities. This was beautifully given. She made an earnest appeal that we each endorse the action of the National Council of the Order in accepting the challenge of the message and agree to make the message our own.

THE MESSAGE

I would know the Father as did Jesus Christ when on earth, opening my eyes daily to behold Him in other people, in the beauty of earth, in the written word, in the Sacraments and through daily communion with Him.

I would know my Church as He knows it and dare to face where we have been untrue to Her calling.

I would know myself as my Lord Jesus Christ does and be made conscious of those things which have prevented me from being a true follower.

I would offer myself daily to Him, my body, my mind and my spirit in full consecration, trusting Him with my whole life, and learning to be wholly His.

I would follow Jesus Christ and Him only, giving proof through all contacts of my life of my conviction that He is the only way of life, striving to help those about me to understand and use His power, and through it to accomplish His purpose in the world.

Finally, I would be a messenger of His grace, an ambassador of God among men, a doorway through whom the Christ may enter into the world.

Oh! Holy Jesus, most merciful, merciful Redeemer, Friend and Brother, May I know Thee more clearly, Love Thee more dearly, and follow Thee more nearly.

Mrs. Folk asked every one who favored Mrs. Clark's endorsement to give a rising vote. It was unanimous.

Report from Miss Tyler on Courtesy was given, expressing thanks and appreciation to the members of Memphis Parishes for their splendid manner in which we had been received and entertained. A rising vote of thanks was given for the courtesy extended. Mrs. J. R. Wheeler read a paper on Extension work written by Mrs. W. E. Norvell, who could not be present.

The meeting adjourned for a memorial service which was conducted by the Rev. Chas. Ware in the Chapel for members who have passed away during the year.

The session assembled at 9:30 on Tuesday morning, the 19th, for the completion of unfinished business.

On a motion made by Mrs. Clark, being seconded and carried, the Secretary was asked to cast the ballot for the election of all the nominees.

Mrs. W. H. Clements gave a report on the Parish and Diocesan work. Mrs. L. W. Woolwine reported on the Interparochial Assembly Meeting.

Mrs. Alvis read a paper, prepared by Mrs. Rutland, on notes from the Triennial.

Mrs. Charlton Rogers of Christ Church, Nashville, spoke on the Bible Studies and the manner of conducting same.

The Junior work of the Diocese were given in reports by:

Miss Mary Lee Huntziker of St. Luke's, Memphis.
Miss Laura Wheatten Johnson of Calvary, Memphis.

Miss Mary E. Stith of St. John's, Buntny.

Miss Stith also outlined the Triennial as she saw it, giving a beautiful and graphic report of that great Convention. Miss Stith was the only Junior Member at the Triennial.

Reports from 17 chapters were given to the Secretary, but owing to the short time, they could not be read.

A resolution was adopted expressing great appreciation for the sermon delivered to the Daughters of the King by Bishop Gailor. This being put in form of a motion, was seconded and carried, to memorialize the morning's service on Monday in the Gailor Memorial Cathedral, as a special message of love and appreciation to Bishop Gailor.

The President appointed Mrs. Crockett Adams to prepare the message, which follows:

"To Our Best Beloved Bishop:

"We, 'The Daughters of the King,' of the Diocese of Tennessee, want to try in our most humble way to express our heart-felt thanks for the glorious privilege of having the very first service in this, our beautiful Cathedral. We feel that we have been most highly honored, not only in having the first service, but more so in having our beloved Bishop to so graciously conduct it and deliver that wonderful eulogy on 'Womanhood.' Last, but not least, having been given the privilege of taking the Sacred Communion of our Saviour administered by our Bishop. We just cannot find words to express our thanks and appreciation for this very great privilege. We pray God to continue to bestow His many blessings on you and yours.

The committee on Recommendations submitted the following report:

Be it Resolved:

1. That in our re-dedication and renewal of vows to the Order of the Daughters of the King, we place deep in our hearts the messages given to us by our beloved Bishops, Bishop Gailor and Bishop Maxon and the Rev. George Watts and Dean Noe, and that during the current year our services will not only be better for having heard them, but the best that we can render—not forgetting that these re-

newals place loyalty to Jesus Christ, our Church and our fellowmen, first in importance.

2. That we look after our own spiritual development, as recommended by Mrs. Clark, and that we use the SECOND day of February as a day of corporate prayer, according to resolutions passed at the meeting in New Orleans.

3. That we read carefully and thoroughly the last number of the *Royal Cross*, thereby informing ourselves of the proceedings of the meetings held in New Orleans.

4. That we be loyal to the various officers and be ready to stand for all plans made to extend the services of the Order.

5. That we remember our Juniors, and by our example strengthen their vision, and be ready to help and endorse their activities as well as to encourage them in forming other Junior Chapters.

6. That this Order of the Daughters of the King, Diocese of Tennessee, elect an EXTENSION Secretary.

The 1926 session of the Daughters of the King closed with the benediction by the Rev. Geo. Watts. We adjourned to the Cathedral for the wonderful opening services honoring Bishop Gailor for his service as Bishop of the Diocese for thirty-two years and as President of the National Council for six years.

It was appealing, grand and yet simple with all the dignity of the order of services that has been preserved for centuries, in the Church of England.

The singing of the Veniti, Buck's Te Deum and the Jubilate, was soul inspiring, but the climax came with the Offertory Anthem, The Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's "Messiah"; it was exalting.

From the beginning on Monday at eleven o'clock until the close of that wonderful service, we, the Daughters of the King, can truly say, it was beautiful and inspiring—

Crowns and thorns may perish,
Kingdoms rise and wane,
But the Church of Jesus,
Constant will remain.

Miss Carrie Alexander having refused the election as Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocesan Assembly of the Daughters of the King, Mrs. McCargo, the President, has appointed Mrs. Walter C. Whitaker, of Knoxville, to serve.

THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

We would be most ungrateful if we failed to record from time to time our deep appreciation of the many encouragements and the co-operation from the friends of the Church Periodical Club: our Bishops, who are unusually interested in this work; the Secretaries who have given such hearty support; the *Tennessee Churchman* for the privilege of publicity, and to the many others who, by their interest, will know they are included in this attempt at acknowledgement.

Some Church Periodical Club members have been feeling the urge of a desire for new fields of endeavor. Having helped to win university rank for St. Paul's, having had a share in making good the fire and earthquake losses at St. John's and Boone, they are asking why so much must be done for the Orient.

The job of the C. P. C. is to help the Church to do her work in any way that is needed, trying to help most where the need is greatest.

The need for libraries is greater in the mission field than at home, and greater in China and Japan than elsewhere because it is in these two countries that the Church has built up a great international hospital and splendid colleges to give Christian education to the best young people of both countries.

Colleges and hospitals cannot get along without libraries, especially in lands where there are no big public libraries for the students and faculty to use.

If the C. P. C. fails to help these institutions, they will, in time, be seriously crippled. There is no other agency to take up this work if the C. P. C. drops it. It is not enough to give a good library such as at St. Paul's and stop. Scholarship and science advance rapidly; new books appear, and students must have them to keep up to date.

Three years ago the C. P. C. pledged to give \$5,000 a year for the maintenance of its libraries. Only a part of this sum has been raised. Too much cannot be said of the faithfulness of the branches which year after year do their share or more than their share. Many of them are working joyfully to give all they can. Others remain indifferent. Cannot we, as a diocese, do our part? Let each parish arouse to action. The libraries need books. What are we going to do about it?

The Bishop Troy Beatty Unit of the Church Mission of Help is organized under the Department of Christian Social Service of the Diocese of Tennessee, to minister directly and individually to wayward, problem and unadjusted girls over sixteen. Under the supervision of a trained social worker, casework is done with each girl.

The girls are brought into contact with the social and religious forces in the community best fitted to build up character. They are helped to self-support. Medical treatment is secured for those who need it and an effort is made to obtain the proper protection for the feeble-minded. Shelter and maternity care are secured for the unmarried mother; equitable support for her baby is sought, while the mother's responsibility is steadily kept in mind.

The Church Mission of Help keeps in touch with girls in institutions and tries to safeguard them after they leave the institution. Preventive work is done with the girls in wrong environment.

The Memphis Unit has perfected working plans and a three-years' test has proven so successful that at the last meeting of the Bishop and Council of the Diocese of Tennessee, the Church Mission of Help was put in the budget for 1926, allowing four months of the Executive Secretary's time to be spent in the Diocese.

The Woman's Auxiliary gave \$400.00 toward this work for the year 1925 and the Department of Christian Social Service has given \$150.00.

The National Council of the Church Mission of Help will hold the annual Institute in Chattanooga, February,

1926; representatives from all the Diocesan Societies and interested people from unorganized dioceses will meet for three days to study methods of work and for prayer and meditation. We are indeed fortunate to have this meeting in the Diocese and know it will be of inestimable benefit to the work in Tennessee.

The Executive Secretary has visited Chattanooga and Nashville preparatory to starting Units of the Church Mission of Help in these two cities. In Nashville a committee of social workers and members of the Episcopal Church was formed to investigate the need for the work and the possibility of establishing a unit. This Committee is now in correspondence with the National Church Mission of Help with reference to securing a trained worker for Nashville.

In Chattanooga the clergy and church women, also several social workers who were interviewed, are ready and willing to co-operate in every way possible. Definite plans for organizing the work here and in Nashville will be made at the National Institute, when conferences will be held with representatives of the National Church Mission of Help. Attached are the statistics for the year, 1925.

A Branch of the Girls' Friendly Society has been organized at Otey Memorial Church, Sewanee, with 22 probationers. Mrs. Louis Riley, Branch President.

St. James Branch, Knoxville, has pledged \$1,000.00 toward the new Church of which sum more than half has been paid.

Great success has blessed the Candidate Class at Monterey. Several of the older girls have met the requirements and have been admitted to full membership in the G. F. S. giving Monterey a G. F. S. Branch as well as a Candidate Class. Mrs. A. C. Killifer, Branch President, is to be congratulated.

Miss Anita Pryor, a member of Christ Church Branch,

South Pittsburg, was called to her Heavenly Home, December 13th. The G. F. S. had meant much to Anita before she was taken ill and during her illness. The family requested the G. F. S. to attend the services at the Church (Methodist) and to sing the G. F. S. hymn. It was a very beautiful service and one never to be forgotten by our girls of this Branch.

Your Diocesan President had the privilege of representing the G. F. S. in Tennessee at the National Council G. F. S. A. held in Cincinnati, October 28-November 2, 1925, and also at the Church Council held in Memphis January 19, 1926.

With deep gratitude for all the blessings enjoyed by our members for the past year and with a fervent hope that many more girls and women will join in this fellowship which is marching steadily forward under the spotless banner of purity, helping to win the world for the white Christ.

MINUTES

The Seventh Annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of Tennessee, was held Wednesday, January 20, 1926, at the new Cathedral in Memphis.

The opening service was also the opening service of the Diocesan Convention, the Communion service being celebrated for both bodies, by Bishop Gailor; Bishop Maxon preaching the sermon.

Directly after the service, in the Parish house of the Cathedral, the business session was called to order by the President, Mrs. John R. Wheeler. Dean Noe led in the Creed and prayers, after which he gave the women of the Auxiliary a cordial greeting.

The address of welcome was given by Mrs. Gailor to which Mrs. W. M. Goodman of Knoxville responded.

Eleven officers and one hundred and fifty delegates responded to the roll call.

Mrs. Wheeler then presented our beloved honorary President, Mrs. John Shortridge. In her gracious response, she spoke most interestingly of the first United Thank Offering given by Tennessee, which she had the privilege of presenting in 1891, the amount being \$110.00. Mrs. Loaring Clark on behalf of the Auxiliary, presented Mrs. Shortridge with corsage flowers, saying the petals of each represented the love and esteem with which she was held by us all.

Mrs. McDonald from Epiphany Mission, Sherwood; Deaconess Allen of Monteagle and Mrs. E. B. Wilson from Berkley, California, were next presented and welcomed.

The acting secretary, Mrs. J. B. Richardson, was instructed to send a message of love and sympathy to Miss Oehmig, who was prevented from being present by serious illness in the family.

Mrs. H. A. Davies, Memphis; Mrs. W. M. Goodman, Knoxville; Mrs. H. C. Salmond, South Pittsburg; Mrs. T. P. Yeatman, Columbia; Mrs. R. B. Underwood, Memphis.

The President made a short address, saying her full message would be in the Annual report.

A letter from Miss Oehmig expressing her love and best wishes for continued success in the work of the Auxiliary was read, also her report.

Reports were given by Mrs. Otey Walker, Treasurer; Mrs. W. H. DuBose, Secretary of Devotions and Prayer Partnership, and Mrs. Maxon, United Thank Offering Treasurer. Mrs. Maxon said she was glad to have laid the splendid offering of \$10,353.00 for Tennessee on the great gold basin at New Orleans, and as she is now retiring from office, begged the same co-operation for her successor that had been given her.

The meeting then adjourned for lunch.

At 2:00 P.M. the afternoon session was opened with the reading of the Auxiliary prayer by the President. Reports from Mrs. J. B. Richardson, Supply Secretary and the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Nauts, were given, also those of the three Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Marsh of Memphis, Mrs. Rogers, Nashville; Mrs. Davidson, Chattanooga. All reports were accepted.

Mrs. Loaring Clark then told most interestingly of the meetings in New Orleans and the resolutions passed, giving a resume of the minutes of that meeting.

Mrs. Nauts, Educational Secretary, then gave plans and outlines on the study of Latin America, illustrating with the use of the sand table and maps, how interesting such a study may be made.

Bishop Gailor was presented. He expressed his appreciation and sense of obligation to the women for what they were doing and asked them to concentrate in Tennessee on some definite and urgent need, not forgetting Monterey and Keeling as most worthy of help.

Mrs. McDonald was asked to tell something of her work at Sherwood and she made a strong appeal for help. The building was inadequate and that a knitting machine would be most acceptable. Mrs. Maxon supported Mrs. McDonald warmly in this appeal and the President asked that we give this matter our most serious consideration.

Bishop Maxon was presented. In his greeting he said the work of the Auxiliary was a source of never failing joy

to him. He reported progress on the whole through the Diocese during the year. Asked our interest and consideration for the different social service centers in the Diocese, and also said that our greatest service was in making converts of men and women not members of the Auxiliary to the apportionment now called the quota.

The meeting then adjourned.

8:00 P.M. The service was under the auspices of the Department of Missions and Church Extension. The Right Rev. James M. Maxon presided. Addresses were made by the Right Rev. Mercer Green, Bishop Coadjutor of Mississippi, and the Rev. E. P. Dandridge, Christ Church, Nashville.

Thursday, January 21.

At 9:30 A.M. the meeting was called to order by the President. Rev. E. P. Dandridge, Rector of Christ Church, Nashville, and Chairman of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, was presented and opened the meeting with prayers. In his message he asked the women to think of the 19th verse of the 2nd chapter of St. Luke's Gospel, "But Mary kept all these things and pondered them in her heart." He considered this had been the work of the Auxiliary ever since it had started. He requested the women to see that the Parish Quotas were promised and to see that they were paid, and then to keep in mind the Advance work of the Diocese, of which we would hear more after a special report had been given at the men's meeting.

Mrs. Clark read a telegram from New York from Mr. Franklin, reporting acceptances of nearly all Quotas in the different Dioceses and one was sent to him from Tennessee, saying that our Quota would be accepted 100 per cent.

Mrs. Loaring Clark was asked to present the "Message" as given in New Orleans. She said we had been asked to make it our own and pass it on to another. She recommended a course of study on "Evangelism in the Church" as arranged by Dr. Schaad, and the Bible study, using this book as a text-book as arranged by the Daughters of the King. At the request of the President, all stood and read the re-dedication, the closing pledge of the "Message."

The President then told of a Year Book, the program of which could be adopted by the various branches of the Auxiliary, uniting the activities of the Diocesan branches. This had been compiled by the Executive Board, and Mrs. Maxon was asked to present it. Mrs. Maxon said it was flexible and could be changed, but recommended following

it as closely as possible. After thoroughly explaining the program, Mrs. Maxon asked us to use the prayer on the first page at each meeting and closed with this thought, "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward" Ex. 14, 15. A motion was made by Mrs. Gerhart and carried that our appreciation of the compiling of this Year Book, be extended the Executive Board.

Mrs. Nauts spoke of the reference books to be used in connection with the study of Latin America. She announced that Miss Laura Boyer would visit this Diocese early in October and hold normal classes for next winter's work.

The President announced that she had received a letter from Miss Lindley asking if we would receive Miss Grace Parker, new organizing Secretary on the National Staff in this Diocese during the week of March 22-27. A motion carried that we would be glad to have a visit from Miss Parker and that the different Vice-Presidents would arrange her schedule in each convocation.

The other organizations co-operating in Church work were next heard from. The Girl's Friendly was represented by Mrs. H. C. Salmond, Diocesan President, who reported of the National Council meeting held in October at Cincinnati and of the help to the Church and the growth of the organization. Mrs. Bolton Smith spoke of the work at Hoffman-St. Mary's for colored students and presented the principal, Rev. M. J. Nelson, who gave a very interesting account of the past year's activities. He thanked the Auxiliary for their gifts and said the school could not exist without the help and interest of that organization. Also that the school had been pleased to contribute the sweet potatoes for the luncheons given at the Cathedral during the Convention. Mrs. Omberg, Secretary for the Department of Religious Education, commended the work of the school highly.

The Church Mission of Help was presented by Miss Grabau, Executive Secretary, who told most interestingly of the splendid work done in Memphis by this organization; a full report of which will be found in this issue. New Units are soon to be formed in Nashville and Chattanooga.

At the noon hour all stood and said the prayer for Missions. The Church Periodical Club was presented by Mrs. Harry Gerhart, Correspondent. She requested Mrs. Wm. Marsh of Memphis who represented the Club in New Orleans, to give a report which was most interesting. Mrs.

Gerhart made special mention of the traveling libraries and asked the interest of all in this very important work.

Mrs. Loaring Clark, Provincial President for the Daughters of the King, said that the Daughters would be most happy to co-operate with the Auxiliary in the work planned for the ensuing year.

The meeting adjourned for lunch.

2:00 P.M. The afternoon meeting was opened with a talk by Deaconess Allen who is doing splendid work at Monteagle, the interest in the Social Service work, the Church School and Library having grown a great deal.

The President then presented Bishop Campbell of Liberia. He said that Liberia was about the size of New York state. The eighty-seven schools already established he was very much pleased with. His policy for extension work was to push into the interior and develop the Educational and Medical work. He said the Church has a fine start and that we must support the workers with our help in every way.

Mrs. Wheeler urged the women to remember Bishop Campbell in their prayers. A motion was made to supply a fund through a free-will offering from the women of the Diocese for Bishop Campbell to use for medical supplies. Mrs. R. H. McClelland, 801 18th Ave., S., Nashville, was appointed Chairman of this fund.

Mrs. Loaring Clark presented the idea of the women of the Diocese sharing in the furnishings of the New Cathedral, and after discussion it was voted and carried that each woman contribute twenty cents or more and provide the STAND for the "Book of Remembrance" which is to be placed in the Chancel of the Cathedral.

The President requested Mrs. Clark to take the chair and hear the report of the Nominating Committee which was given by Mrs. Jas. E. Caldwell, Jr. This report was accepted as read and the Secretary instructed to cast a ballot to make it unanimous. The following officers were elected, and presented:

Mrs. Loaring Clark, Secretary of the National Committee for the Blind, spoke most interestingly of the work, and of the books issued in revised Braille which had brought much help and happiness to many blind persons. We, your Committee on Courtesy, desire to express our hearty appreciation of the hospitality of the people of Memphis. We appreciate most deeply the privilege of meeting with you and taking part in the inspiring ceremonies upon this outstanding occasion, the opening of our Cathedral, the Sailor Memorial, with its beautiful and impressive service, and its inspiring chorals.

We desire to thank the Church women of the Parishes for including the women of the Auxiliary in the invitations to the beautiful tea given in honor of Bishop and Mrs. Sailor, also our appreciation of the privilege of attending the banquet.

We wish to thank St. Mary's for the use of the Parish House and for the delicious noonday lunches, which have added so largely to our comfort and have aided materially in operating the work of the Convention.

It has been a great inspiration to hear the messages brought to us by the different members of the Clergy and the Bishops.

The Press has been most generous in its support and we thank them for the publicity given our meetings.

The Christian Fellowship endorsed by the Churches of Memphis has seemed to us a great example of Christian Unity, and for this we are deeply grateful.

My dear co-workers of the Woman's Auxiliary:

First, by subscribing to it ourselves, secondly, by getting every other woman in the parish to do the same, where it is possible. Various groups could take copies and review articles together. There are many ways by which this most splendid and interesting magazine could be in the hands of every church woman and we should lend our efforts to see that it is accomplished.

I have visited several parishes this past year and want

to visit more this year. If there is any special time I can help, please let me know and I will be glad to do so.

You are very much gratified I know over the splendid United Thank Offering that Mrs. Maxon presented in New Orleans. As she has had your splendid support during her term of office, will you not continue it for her successor, so that in Washington in 1928 we may feel that we have done our best.

We wish very much for the interest of all women in every parish and mission. Mr. Dandridge as Chairman presented the following, which was accepted at the meeting of Diocesan convention at Memphis in January, and which is now the responsibility of all Churchmen in Tennessee, and to which the Woman's Auxiliary has pledged \$1000.00.

Your Committee has selected those items of Advance Work in the Diocese which seem to be most imperatively necessary, and one item from the Advance Work of the General Church in which we believe Tennesseans would naturally be interested, and we recommend:

First: That the Diocese undertake this year the following projects.

Second: That the first Sunday in May be designated as the time when special offerings for this Advance Work will be made in every Parish and Mission of the Diocese, and that the clergy be instructed on some Lord's Day prior to that date, to inform their people concerning these items of Advance Work, and urge their co-operation.

Third: That the following materials be prepared to aid in this endeavor:

- (a) A special offering envelope.
- (b) A special pledge card.
- (c) A special section of the Tennessee Churchman give a description of each of these projects, with cuts, if possible.
- (d) Inexpensive folders to be printed from the same type as this section of the Tennessee Churchman and distributed in the churches of the Diocese.

Fourth: That a special committee, consisting of the Bishop Coadjutor, the Executive Secretary of the Diocese, the editor of the *Tennessee Churchman*, the Chairman of the

Department of Missions, and the President of the Woman's Auxiliary be appointed to carry out these plans.

REPORT OF VICE-PRESIDENT, WEST TENNESSEE

The work in West Tennessee has gone steadily forward. The regular W. A. branches, Guilds and groups of women in all places have been kept informed regarding all the work as outlined in the Diocesan Program.

The stronger branches have widened their vision, and through the "Convocational Committee," have reached out and touched the hand of their sisters in the smaller branches in a real understanding way.

Several branches have been strengthened and three new ones formed. A real effort has been made to assist the colored members.

The Auxiliary women of Mason are doing real constructive work in their community; though they have no rector their Church stands for what it is meant to in the community, through its members. They have helped organize branches of the Auxiliary among the colored people, supplied prayer books and Bibles and done much social service work.

In May, attended the Convocation of Middle Tennessee; also Officers' Conference at Nashville; on way home visited

Union City, Trenton, Jackson, meeting with groups of women and getting a better knowledge of their work and problems. Packages of helpful literature were left each place.

The Convocation of Memphis, held in Mason June 17th and 18th, was well attended, and all departments of woman's work presented by leaders of the departments.

Throughout the summer many letters were written and visits made in the effort to spread information concerning the work of the Triennial.

Special Intercessory services were held in May during the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity. One of these being held at St. Albans.

On October 6th, the Quiet Hour was specially observed in all parishes.

On October 16th day of Intercession by United Meeting at Cathedral with Clergy, following the same plan as at New Orleans.

As one of the delegates attended Triennial, staying the full time and present at all business sessions.

Assisted the Bishop and Dean at Fall Convocation, Memphis, November, by having on display samples of the new literature brought from Convention.

Secured as special speaker for the October Meeting of The Woman's Service Leagues, the Ven. Archdeacon Drane, Alaska, and Miss Francis Oxley, Field Secretary, of Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses.

In Supply Department completed the allotment left over from 1924, also five allotments for 1925. Nine parishes outside of Memphis assisting.

The large attendance of Memphis Women as visitors at the Triennial and the inspiration and knowledge received therefrom, has enlarged our vision and helped us to realize the true meaning of the words "Auxiliary and Co-operation"; let us "be ready" for the call to service. Let us strive to make ourselves become "more effective instruments for His Power in the accomplishment of His purpose for the world."

Remember our six prayer partners, and above all remember that we have made "The Message" ours, wishing to crowd out apathy and indifference by love and zeal. Then shall we gladly assume responsibility for the general work which has been undertaken by our representatives, and press on to advance work greatly needed.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Of the Forty-five branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese, thirty-two answered the questionnaire from which the following report is taken:

27 branches have had educational work of some kind.

15 studied China.

7 Missions in Tennessee.

4 "World and I."

3 studied each of the following:

"My Father's Business"; The Program: Spirit of Missions; "Latin America: Peace."

2. Auxiliary Handbook.

1 Liberia; Christian Stewardship; How May We Know the Way?; Leadership; Selected Articles; Alaska, Bible; Prayer Book; Church Calendar; Mission Study.

9 reported little or no progress.

16 reported progress all the way from "a slowly growing interest" to "greatly increased interest," "real desire to continue the study." The answers spoke of "greater number of study leaders," "increased attendance," "larger contributions," "a deeper interest in the Bible."

There have been 62 actual Discussion and Study groups,

as some branches are divided into circles, each circle forming a class to itself.

This is quite a gain, as last year there were but 43 study groups.

Last year eight different books were studied while this year nineteen have been used.

There were 23 women at the Summer Conference at Sewanee, and 15 attended Dr. Sturgis' course in "Church's Mission" at Western Tennessee Normal.

Miss Boyer says, "Dr. Ridgely, from our China Mission, told me that he had been impressed with the results of our classes on China."

"Let us try to see this year that every woman in every Diocese has an opportunity to attend a class on Latin America."

REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S GUILD

Hoffman-St. Mary's School

The School has had a successful year, with an enrollment of 264 pupils—146 boys and 118 girls. Fifty-eight girls have been boarded in the School for varying periods. The dormitory accommodates thirty-four. Six girls are supported entirely by the School.

Seventy-eight children are in the Primary department, taught by Claby Legg who has been educated in the School. She has had tempting offers to leave and take a position in the County Schools.

Seven teachers are employed.

The State Department of Vocational Training has chosen the School as an experiment station in which it has placed an agricultural teacher, Allison Plummer. Three-fifths of his salary is paid by the State, the School being responsible for the remainder. The Bishop's Guild has furnished a fairly expensive equipment for him; this was required by the State Education Department as a condition of his coming.

Graduates of the School have been eagerly sought by the County Superintendent for the negro schools. Eighth grade pupils would have been given positions by him if it had been thought wise.

The School had a community Christmas tree which pro-

vided presents for the colored people of the countryside. This was done largely through the generosity of the churches in and around Newark, N. J. The Bishop's Guild donated \$30.00 and an individual member gave \$5.00 for Christmas cheer at the School.

Teachers and pupils of the School are paying for a cottage which it has built this year for the families of two of the teachers. They wish each year to make a visible contribution.

The Auxiliary at Mason have assisted and taught two young colored mothers and will form a branch at Hoffman-St. Mary's.

Auxiliaries have been asked about the colored people in their neighborhood, thus encouraging a feeling of responsibility for them.

**CONSTITUTION OF THE TENNESSEE BRANCH OF
THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE
NATIONAL COUNCIL****ARTICLE I.—Name.**

The name of this Association shall be the Tennessee Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

ARTICLE II.—Object.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out through the Diocese of Tennessee the three great aims of the Church, viz: Missions and Church Extension; Religious Education and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III.—Membership.

The Association shall be composed of those women who, being by Baptism members of the Church, are engaged in any department of Her work.

ARTICLE IV.—Officers.

The Officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents (one for each Convocation), a Secretary, a Treasurer, an Educational Secretary, a Supply Secretary, a Secretary for Colored Work, a Secretary on Devotional Life, a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, and a Secretary on Prayer-Partnership. They shall be elected annually and no officer shall serve longer than three years consecutively in any one office. These Officers shall form the Executive Committee of the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE V.—Parochial Branches.

A Branch of the Auxiliary may be organized in any Parish with the consent of the Rector of the Parish. Every Parochial Branch shall formally adopt this Constitution.

ARTICLE VI.—Duties of Diocesan Officers.

The duties of Diocesan President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be such as usually appertain to such offices.

ARTICLE VII.—Convocational Vice-Presidents.

It shall be the duty of Convocational Vice-Presidents to stimulate the activity of all Parochial Branches of the Auxiliary within their respective Convocations; to form new Branches and distribute allotments for Box Work which they shall receive from the Supply Secretary. They shall make reports of the work accomplished in their Convocations at the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE VIII.—Reports.

Each Parochial Branch shall make an annual report as soon after December 31 of each year as possible and not later than January 10 of the succeeding year. All financial reports must be closed on December 31.

ARTICLE IX.—Meetings.

There shall be one meeting of this Association each year, to convene about the same time as the Diocesan Convention. At all meetings of the Diocesan Association, each Parochial Branch shall have the right of representation by its President, or such a one as she shall designate, and one delegate for each twenty-five members reported to the Diocesan Officers and for whom Extension Fund Fees of at least 50 cents per capita have been paid.

ARTICLE X.—Plans of Work.

The Executive Committee shall devise modes and plans of work for the Association, and bring the same before the general meeting for its action thereon.

**ARTICLE XI.—Organization and Rules
of Parochial Branches.**

In any city, each Parochial Branch shall have its own officers and shall adopt such rules as to qualifications for membership, duties of officers, times and places of meeting, and other necessary rules, as it may see fit.

ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Diocesan Branch by vote of the majority, due notice of the proposed amendment having been given at least one month before the annual meeting to every Branch.
