## REPORT OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATED WOMEN OF THE DIOCESE OF TEXAS

Held in St. Davids Church, Austin, January 24 and 25, 1938

The Associated Women of the Church of the Diocese of Texas met in annual session, January 24, 1938, in Austin, Texas. The meeting was opened at 9:30 A. M.

Mrs. Henry K. Arnold, Vice-President, called the meeting to order in the Educational Building of the First Southern Presbyterian Church. The attention of the group was called to the fact that the minutes of the last meeting were published in the Annual Report and would therefore not be read.

Mrs. W. G. Franklin of Austin brought sincere welcome and affectionate greetings from the women of St. Davids and All Saints Parish.

Motion was made that a message of greeting be sent to Mrs. Cortes Pauls, President, wishing her a speedy recovery. Carried.

Then followed a most interesting and inspiring program carrying out the Triennial Theme of Fellowship in Faith and Works. The first address, "Expressing an Individual Attitude Toward Fellowship in Faith and Works," by Mrs. Baker Duncan of Waco included the Devotional for the morning. Mrs. Hiram Salisbury of Houston spoke on "Fellowship in Faith and Works in the Family"; Mrs. George O. Wilson of Houston, "Fellowship in Faith and Works Among the Women of Our Parishes"; Mrs. J. P. Love of Cameron, "Fellowship in Faith and Works With Other Christian Bodies." The delegates and visitors took an active part in the discussions following each address, and experiences were exchanged and valuable suggestions made.

The papers on the above theme were so fine that Mrs. W. P. H. McFadden of Beaumont offered to have them mimeographed and filed in the Diocesan Office at 1117 Texas Avenue, Houston, for use of organizations desiring copies for program purposes.

The roll was called and there were one hundred and eighty-five women present, including eighty-four delegates.

Mrs. Leeland Fletcher was appointed Chairman of the Resolutions Committee.

Mrs. Wright Morrow was asked to respond to the greeting extended by Mrs. W. G. Franklin of Austin. Accepted.

Bishop Bratton of Mississippi lead the Noonday Prayers, and the meeting adjourned for lunch.

Luncheon was served at the Driskill Hotel. After lunch the men and women met in joint session at 2:00 o'clock in the Church.

### MINUTES

Tuesday morning, January 25, 1938.

The second day of the annual meeting of the Associated Women of the Church of the Diocese of Texas met at the First Southern Presbyterian Church, Austin, Texas.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 A. M. with the Vice-President, Mrs. Henry K. Arnold, presiding, due to the illness of the President, Mrs. Cortes Pauls.

Mrs. G. R. Rawlins of Houston was appointed Secretary to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. A. D. Adamson, resigned.

A telegram of greeting and best wishes was read from Mrs. Pauls.

The Devotional Chairman, Mrs. J. B. Lewis of Marlin, Texas, led the devotions at which time those members who had passed into the Life Beyond were remembered in our prayers.

The Treasurer's report was given by Mrs. A. J. Dow of Galveston, Texas, showing a balance of \$351.43, and a balance in the A. & M. Chapel Fund of \$789.54, making a total of \$1140.97. At this time the Treasurer explained that the budget for 1938 would be the same as 1937, except the item for Work Among the Isolated would be changed to the Camp Allen Fund.

A motion was made and seconded that the Auditor's report be accepted and filed, and that a note of thanks be written to the Auditor for contributing his services.

The only Convocational Vice-President reporting was Mrs. W. A. Toland of the Southwest Convocation, which report was accepted and filed.

There was no report from the Educational Secretary as Mrs. Chenault O'Brien was absent. Mrs. J. P. Love of Cameron read the report from the Group Conference of Educational Secretaries, which had been conducted by Mrs. J. C. Tolman.

Mrs. J. B. Lewis, Diocesan Chairman of Devotions, asked Mrs. J. S. Allen of Austin to report on the Conference for Devotional Chairman.

Mrs. W. E. Japhet, Diocesan Supply Secretary, reported on the Conference for Supply Secretaries, at the same time presenting her annual report for the Supply Department.

Mrs. L. T. Hubbell, Diocesan United Thank Offering Treasurer, presented her report, including the offering made at the Triennial, which report was filed for publication in the Year Book. She also reported briefly for the United Thank Offering Group Conference.

Mrs. Carl Smith of Galveston, the Church Periodical Club Chairman, made her report of the work for 1937, and also reported for the Group Conference, at which time she spoke of the request from the Rev. John Epps of Tyler for a Hastings Bible Dictionary and a Peek's Commentary. Mrs. J. C. Tolman pledged one book from the C. P. C. of Trinity

Church, Houston, and Mrs. Leeland Fletcher from Christ Church Parish Association, Houston, pledged the other.

Mrs. Malcolm Reed, Jr., Chairman of Social Service, reported on making plans for 1938.

Mrs. Windham being absent, Mrs. Tolman reported on the Book of Remembrance, urging that the service on St. Mark's Day be a real memorial to Bishop Kinsolving. Nine dollars and forty-three cents was collected at the Council for the Maintenance Fund for the Book of Remembrance.

Miss Lynette Giesecke gave a most inspiring and encouraging report of the work accomplished by the Young People of the Diocese. She also spoke on the Pre-Lenten Leadership Training Institutes sponsored by the Department of Religious Education of the Diocese.

A report from the Daughters of the King was given by Mrs. G. R. Rawlins.

Mrs. Rufus Cage reported on Ditty Bags. A motion that the bags be sent direct to the Seamen's Institute and checked by the Executive there against a list furnished him by the Chairman of Ditty Bags, and that he report back to the Chairman of bags received, was made by Mrs. Cage, seconded by Mrs. Dow. Motion carried.

After Mrs. Hubbell's recommendation to the Executive Board meeting, Mrs. J. P. Love presented the following resolution: That Section 2, Article 4, of the By-Laws be amended as follows: Place election of Treasurer of United Thank Offering Treasurer in Group B instead of Group C, Section 2. Mrs. Love moved the adoption of this recommendation which after being duly seconded was carried.

Mrs. H. K. Arnold reported on the meeting of the Group Conference for Parish Presidents and the report was filed.

Mrs. J. P. Love reported on the A. & M. Chapel Fund. Pledged, including the amount held in our Treasury, \$735.56 for A. & M., and less expense of campaign, \$6762.00. Adequate building will cost \$10,000.00. Council voted to borrow the balance and erect building. Committee to try to raise difference and take care of loan.

Mrs. Leeland Fletcher, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, reported the following:

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE AND BISHOP KINSOLVING SCHOLARSHIP

#### MADAM PRESIDENT AND ASSOCIATED WOMEN OF THE DIOCESE:

The service on St. Mark's day has been designated by Bishop Quin as a memorial to Bishop Kinsolving, and offers each parish the privilege of contributing to the memorial through the offering made on that day. Also, to each member of the church is extended the privilege of inscribing names of loved ones who have passed on, in the Book of Remembrance, and with each inscription an offering to perpetuate the memorial fund. The fund is steadily increasing, although more slowly than was anticipated.

It is strongly urged that the service on St. Marks Day be a real memorial to Bishop Kinsolving. One hundred fifty copies of the Prayer of Dedication of the Book of Remembrance have been multigraphed and will hereafter be used in this memorial service. It is a great privilege to keep alive Bishop Kinsolving's memory through the medium of the fine young men who are helped in their education by gifts from this fund. The women of the diocese have a responsibility here, for no more worth-while work could be done. The following ten parishes held this memorial service: Holy Trinity, Dickinson; St. Georges, Texas City; Trinity, Houston; St. Georges, Port Arthur; Christ Church, Tyler; St. Peters, Brenham; St. James, Taylor; All Saints, Cameron;

Calvary, Richmond; Redeemer, Houston. The total offering was \$38.17.

Thirty-four names were received and inscribed in 1937, and the offerings accompanying them were \$189.25. This has been placed in the savings account. Additional gifts of \$15.00 were received for names previously inscribed. The total received is \$204.25. In February the gold bond, No. 485, which had been previously purchased from the Carter Investment Company, matured; and this \$1,000.00, together with \$150.00 withdrawn from the savings account, amounted to \$1,150.00, and was sent to Mr. R. W. Franklin to be invested under his direction with other diocesan funds. Mr. Franklin now has in all \$3,000.00 of the Memorial Fund under his trusteeship.

At Bishop Quin's request, a special page was illuminated in the book. It is called "Extra Diocese," and on it the name of Gertrude Fain, from Kansas City, Missouri, has been inscribed.

A pilgrimage to Alvin, to Angleton, and to Dickinson was made by the Book of Remembrance.

It is urged that in every parish a chairman be appointed who will be active in keeping the memorial before the people. Many of the people of our church would find in the Book of Remembrance a blessed memorial for their dear ones. In perpetuating the memorial to the Bishop

through inscribing names of loved ones, they are dedicating their memorial to the active work of the church. Increasing the Scholarship Fund which is derived from gifts, gives to Bishop Quin an ever widening opportunity for helping our young ministers who will carry on.

Your chairman is deeply grateful for the privilege of acting as custodian for the Book of Remembrance and the gifts that have come.

## REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S REPRESENTATIVE

MADAM CHAIRMAN AND THE  
ASSOCIATED WOMEN OF THE  
DIOCESE OF TEXAS:

Greetings! The report which I am happy and privileged to make concerns itself primarily with two important and challenging phases of the Religious Education program of the Diocese, namely, the Church Schools and the Young People's programs. These have taken significant forward steps during the past year. So far we have been doing very necessary ground work in our Religious Education program and I believe that we are now at the threshold of a new era. Changing times demand a new and enlarged program of Religious Education. The Diocese of Texas has met this challenge, and through the Department of Religious Education an organization, though not as complete as we hope to make it, was set up in such a way in 1937 that satisfying results through consecrated efforts can and will be obtained. During the past year we have only prepared the way for advancement in our Church School program. An earnest, progressive Church School Chairman for each convocation has been appointed to contact Church Schools in their respective sections by personal visits and correspondence, to give guidance when and where needed, and to help coordinate and extend the work, as well as raise the quality of it through the Church School Commission.

This Commission is composed of the four convocational Chairmen, the Chairmen of the National offerings and the secretaries of the four offerings, plus the Adviser in Religious Education for the Diocese and the Chairman of the Department of Religious Education. It met for the first time in November. May I rapidly outline a few of the results of this meeting. First, plans were made and work has been started for the publication this Spring of a booklet entitled "The Life of the Church School" with various kinds of helps for all Church School workers. It will include, for example, the function of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education; the names and addresses of the members of

the Commission; standards for Church Schools; the value of a Church School library; explanation of the four national offerings, namely, the Little Helpers' Offering, the Birthday Thank Offering (which during this Triennium will help the Church's work with Japanese and Chinese children), the Lenten Offering and the Christmas Box; the explanation of the Five Fields of Service; Religious Education Month and its observance; how to enlist teachers and train them; pageantry suggestions; how to plan services of worship; curriculum materials, etc.

Secondly, at this meeting a systematic plan was worked out for publicizing the National Offerings through the *Texas Churchman*, as well as for sending literature to the Clergy and Church School Superintendents.

Thirdly, plans were formulated for the Church School courses to be given at the Leadership Training Institutes to be held in February.

In the fourth place, *Dots and Dashes*, a mimeographed sheet of the latest news items in Religious Education, comments on new books, reports of successful projects in various Schools in the Diocese, and other matters of interest, will be mailed to each teacher and prospective teacher whose name is given to the Department. The first issue will be out within the next few weeks.

In the fifth place, a curriculum committee was appointed, and this committee has diligently and prayerfully begun its task, having had one meeting to outline the trend and procedure to take in planning curriculum that will meet the needs of the various age groups in both small and large schools. We can expect great things from this group!

Sixth, let me introduce you to another debutante in Church School circles. It is one with great possibilities if all of us by our interest and support will make it so. Just as we have a Diocesan Council for men and for the Associated Women and the Young Churchmen of the Diocese that they may come together for fellowship, information and inspiration, so does the Department plan to sponsor a Diocesan

Church School Workers' Conference the first Saturday and Sunday after Easter. Trinity Church, Marshall, has cordially invited the conference, and we have lines out to secure one of the best Religious Educators in the Church as the headliner on the program. The registration will be \$1.50 per person. May I suggest that you watch for further details in *The Texas Churchman*?

You will be interested to know that the Department is planning a Presentation Service for the Church School Lenten Offering at St. Andrew's, Bryan, on the second Saturday after Easter. The children of the Diocese will be invited to bring their Lenten offering to this service and present it at God's altar that it may be blessed and sent to the Nation Council to be used for the spread of His Kingdom throughout the world.

Now may we move on to a significant step that was taken last year in our Young People's program. The Diocese is indebted to Christ Church, Houston, for the splendid way in which one of the largest youth groups we have ever had was entertained. Approximately 350 young Churchmen between the ages of 14 and 25 and their leaders, representing all youth organizations, assembled in November to consider the theme "Forward With Christ." The discussions, based on the Oxford Conference on Life and Work, proved to be vitally interesting and a real challenge to the young people. The eight groups considered these topics: "Forward with Christ in Education, in Interracial Relations, in Economics, in Government, and Forward with Christ in the Major World Problem—Peace." Each group discussed one of these topics and reported excellent findings. Mimeographed copies of the questions were distributed that there might be follow-up study and discussion on them in the groups at home.

Sectional conferences were held in the afternoon for (1) Older Young People—out of High School, not in College, and under 25 years of age; (2) College Students; (3) Church School Delegates; (4) Young People from Parishes and Missions where there is no organized youth work; (5) Young People's Service League; (6) Junior Daughters of the King; (7) Girls'

Friendly Society; (8) Acolyte and Servers' Guilds; (9) Boy Scouts.

This Council with all groups cooperating was an experimental step in an effort to coordinate the work of the various groups and to reach more young people through our Diocesan program. A Constitution for the Young Churchmen of the Diocese of Texas was adopted. A budget of \$685 covering the larger fields of service, the Diocese, Nation and World, was adopted. What are some of the results of this cooperative effort?

First, the young people in the smaller Parishes and Missions came as full-fledged members of the Young Churchmen's group. They received a new conception of the Church's life and work and their place in it. Secondly, it makes for a progressive system of religious education whereby those who finish high school are willing to move out of the Service League and into a more advanced and older group. It has given the young people a sense of unity and will enable them to present a united front for Christ in facing the issues of our day.

There is much to be accomplished through the coöordinated efforts of youth, and we have high hopes of making our program more vital to a larger group of Young Churchmen than we have yet reached.

May I express our gratitude for the opportunity to cooperate with the women of the Diocese in their Ditty Bag project. The young people of various groups contributed 114 Ditty Bags. It has been a real joy to have the women share in the two Institutes that were held last January at Christ Church, Houston, and St. Philips Church, Palestine. The Young Churchmen are ever eager to make their rightful contribution to the life of the Diocesan family, and to strengthen its work in every possible way.

God, our Father, has pointed the way in the advancement that has been made. May we courageously seek always to follow His leadership that the greatest benefits may be received by all His children in the glorious task of building Christian individuals and a Christian society.
