MEMBERSHIP.

The membership of the Woman's Auxiliary is composed of those women who by virtue of their baptism are already members of the Missionary Society, and who, recognizing the responsibility such membership entails, take an active part in this association also.

No membership fee is required by the General Auxiliary.

OFFICIAL ORGAN.

The Woman's Auxiliary Department of The Spirit of Missions is the official organ of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Feast of Annunciation Day, March 25th, is the day recommended by the General Auxiliary for a Quiet Day in the church for all women.

The Thirty-first Annual Meeting of the West Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will be held the Thursday following the annual meeting of the Council in January, 1920, at Grace and Holy Trinity Church, Kansas City.

DIRECTIONS FOR PARISH BRANCHES.

1. Blanks will be sent about January 1st of each year for a report of the year's work; also blanks to be filled out giving names of new officers for the coming year. These must be filled out and returned **at once** to the Recording Secretary, Mrs. H. E. Martin, 814 Greenway Terrace, Kansas City.

2. **BOXES:** The Box Directress of the Diocesan Branch, Mrs. R. E. Lee, 4209 Oak Street, Kansas City, will furnish, upon request, appeals sent from the Church Missions House, stating needs of the Missionary, hospital or schools in the Mission Field. Notify the Box Directress at once of your choice, and return to her immediately all rejected appeals. Notify the Missionary as soon as the box has been sent, sending a list of contents, **without** values. Report at the same time to the Box Directress the name and address of the missionary, school or hospital, to whom the box has been sent, giving list and **valuation of box**.

3. Send all United Thank Offering money to the United Offering Treasurer, Mrs. S. E. Woodstock, Brookside Hotel, Kansas City.

4. Send all other money, designating for what purpose intended, to the Treasurer, Miss M. Louise Howard, The Elsmere, Linwood and Troost, Kansas City, Mo.

5. All money must be sent one week before each meeting. The Auxiliary year now runs from January 1st to December 31st, inclusive.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Realizing that this office is the greatest honor the Diocese can bestow upon its members, it is with many conflicting emotions that one steps out of the chair. There is the feeling of regret that more has not been accomplished, the feeling of relief that the responsibilities are upon other shoulders, the sense of loss that the delightful associations are a thing of the past, and strongest and greatest of all, there is the feeling of thankfulness that even in a small way we have been privileged to spread Christ's kingdom.

In glancing over the past three years, certain facts are prominent. One is, the groups of women in many of the small towns, who by their loyalty and devotion, and with little incentive from outside, are keeping up the life of the church. They deserve our help. Let us, in the large parishes, show our friendliness and appreciation.

If asked what seemed the most potent factor in arousing missionary interest, I think we may say the Auxiliary Union Box, which under Mrs. Casperson's capable leadership, has reached large proportions, and will go on its way, carrying many prayers and blessings.

The work has progressed—more study classes, a larger United Offering, more missionary boxes. Let us remember, however, that there are still hundreds of women who care little for the "Churches' Mission", and with the enlarged field of our work, let us change this sad condition. With Social Service and Religious Education included in our Auxiliary work, our possibilities are limitless. Social Service was the fundamental principle of Christ's life. Let us make it very practical and give financial and moral aid to a devoted woman, who without much assistance has started a mission in the East Bottoms, has classes and services and has had one hundred baptisms.

Religious Education seems to belong to the clergy and the women. Some of us could be substitutes in the Sunday Schools, thus rejoicing our rectors' hearts. Let us help with the Diocesan paper and also continue the "drive" for church publications during the whole year. Along this line and with the study of "neighbors" for a background, let us co-operate with the government and the church in forming a true Americanism for the "strangers within our gates."

"Education Plus Religion Equals Democracy."

The Nation Wide Campaign has aroused the church to its duties to the twenty million immigrants in our land. There are

seventy thousand in our own city, called the most American of all cities. Let us remember they are lonely and friendless, and ignorant, and need our sympathy and help.

We are supposed to be the most active organization in the church, yet from May until October very little is accomplished. Why not give out work—knitting for Alaska, or hospital garments to be made in the summer? Wouldn't it be an inspiring sight to see tables filled with finished work in the fall?

In conclusion, as the preacher says, I want to thank you personally and officially for your support. We officers can do nothing by ourselves. It has been one of the great satisfactions that whatever we suggested, we knew we could count upon your co-operation.

You have made the office much more of a happiness than a burden. I feel nothing but optimism for the future of the Diocese. I believe God's Holy Spirit is guiding and leading us to greater things, that more and more will we rise above parochialism and Diocesanism and catch a vision of the whole world for Christ.

ANNUAL REPORT

of the Recording Secretary of the Diocese of West Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Executive Council.

To the Right Reverend Sidney C. Partridge, Bishop of the
Diocese of West Missouri, and the Women of the Auxiliary:

It has been some time since you had a report from your Secretary for which there are several reasons. In order to make the fiscal year of the Auxiliary coincide with the fiscal year of the Diocese and of the Board of Missions, it was deemed advisable to print no report in May, 1919, but to make the annual report include the time between May 15th, 1918, and January 1st, 1920. This report should have come out then, but owing to the "flu" epidemic it was impossible to get the different reports in. When it was at last ready for the printers the Executive Board decided to hold it until the election of the new Diocesan officers, that their names and addresses might be included, also the names of the new Parish officers, in that way making it a book of reference for the Diocesan work.

On account of the many changes in the Auxiliary work, there will be an early revision of the constitution, so it was decided to omit printing the constitution in this issue, as there will be another report in January, 1921.

We have had a good year and a half of work and while for a time there was much uncertainty as to what the status of affairs would be after the nation wide campaign, patience and watchful waiting overcame the difficulties and there seems to be a prospect of wonderful increase in the work and the workers under the new program.

In May, 1919, Mrs. J. C. Howard resigned as Educational Secretary and Miss Emma L. Stuart was appointed in her stead.

The Union Diocesan Box, under Mrs. Casperson, has made marvelous progress. In fact there has been a marked increase in the box work generally.

Four regular meetings have been held: In November, 1918, at St. John's, Kansas City, where we had the very great pleasure of having Miss Tillotsen of the Church Missions House with us; in February, 1919, at St. Mark's, Kansas City, Bishop Longley, of Des Moines, being the preacher; May, 1919, at St. Joseph, where Dean Bell, of the Great Lakes Training Station, was speaker of the day; and November, 1919, at St. John's, Springfield, when we had the Provincial Educational Secretary, Mrs. John Ames, of Kansas, and Dr. Spencer, of Grace and Holy Trinity, Kansas City.

All these meetings were well attended as was the Quiet Day conducted by the Bishop at St. Paul's, Kansas City.

The increased United Offering was a source of great joy to us all and the custodian is to be congratulated. Special attention is called to the reports of the Educational and Corresponding Secretaries. We predict a great advance in 1920 with the new program and the new officers.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

For Year Ending December 31st, 1919.

The report of a corresponding secretary would be tiresome, indeed, if it contained only a list of cards and notices sent, letters written and received, and literature distributed. Suffice it to say that such routine work has been done, and done gladly.

Our Diocesan Auxiliary now has seventeen well organized branches, with a membership of 387 and four unorganized branches with 49 workers, making a total of 436 women doing auxiliary work. Comparing these figures with our last year book, and considering the hearty response the church women in small parishes have made to the visits of our President, it can easily be seen what splendid results could be obtained in this diocese through the systematic efforts of a trained organizer. The work is of such absorbing interest, the possibilities so great and the results so satisfying where efforts have been made that it seems a great pity our Auxiliary cannot afford a traveling secretary, when so great is the opportunity.

I must here make mention of the Mothers Meeting of Grace and Holy Trinity parish in Kansas City. This little band of busy Mothers, under the efficient directorship of Mrs. W. R. Jacques, while not an organized branch, is doing splendid Auxiliary work, and this year contributed more than one hundred dollars to our pledges.

The Nation Wide Campaign was successfully completed and West Missouri raised 85 per cent of the quota assigned to the diocese, and is reported in the second grouping of dioceses that have been successful. This shows that we can do a thing when all hands work together.

During the past six months we have had visits from Mrs.

Billar, of the Church Missions House staff and from Miss Matthews of Southern Ohio, who is President of the Church Service League, both of whom brought us inspiration and help and a clearer vision of the enlarged scope of the work of the Auxiliary, with the promise of a two weeks visit in the fall of an organizing secretary to visit isolated parishes and to encourage new branches.

The plan to create a Triennial Delegates Fund, to be contributed to by all parish branches, was a great step forward, and to St. Mark's and St. Paul's parishes, in Kansas City, must go the honor of sending the first contribution to this fund.

As a retiring officer, I shall watch the work of the Auxiliary with unusual interest. Some questions have been solved; some do not stay solved and a number remain to test the abilities of the incoming officers. The past holds much of which to be proud, and, in looking forward, we find much reason for encouragement.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

From May, 1918, to January 1st, 1920.

Except for the sending out of two letters to each parish, mission and station in the Diocese, in behalf of the books for Liberia and which resulted in the sending of several hundred specified books for that purpose, very little work was done before November, 1919. Your secretary in the meantime attended special classes at Racine and Detroit in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and the especial work of the Educational Secretary. As a result of these meetings it was planned to attempt developing educational work on the lines of Daily Bible reading, Prayer Cards, Bible Classes, and Study Classes of all kinds, etc. Report of these plans was printed and sent over the Diocese early in January, 1920.

Actual work done prior to January, 1920, consisted in letters written by the request of Rev. Mr. Washburn to nearly all the entire Diocese, urging the members of the Woman's Auxiliary to forward the Nation Wide Campaign.

At the meeting in Springfield, there was an exhibit of Educational literature and material. It is expected that these exhibits will become a regular feature of every quarterly meeting.

At St. Paul's Bazaar a booth with devotional and educational literature for sale was assigned to your secretary, and by courtesy of the ladies of St. Paul's Church the profits of these sales were given to this department.

Early in December Mrs. Child gave permission to enlarge the Secretaryship for Education to a Department of Education, to fit the enlarged needs of the new work. Mrs. Love and Mrs. Burr were appointed as heads of Social Service and Religious Education respectively. There has not been time enough since then to make any definite plans on these lines.

During Advent, letters were sent to every parish priest, requesting intercessions for the Study Classes and in December a normal class of six was formed for study of "Prayer and Some of Its Difficulties," which had five meetings with an average attendance of four. We have ordered and have on hand a limited supply of the study book of the year, "Neighbors," and are in hopes that every parish will have at least one class, so that we may, as a church, be better prepared to assist intelligently in the Americanization of the alien races in our land and especially in Kansas City.

Mr. Maloney of Christ Church, St. Joseph, reports the successful use of the Christian Nurture Course, but has as yet this season not called a meeting of the Junior Auxiliary. I asked Mrs. Woodstock to act in my place at the Diocesan committee meeting of the Sunday School Missionary Army.
