

The Pastoral Staff was presented to the Bishop on his eleventh anniversary as Bishop by the members of the Missionary District of Kyoto, Japan, at a service held at Trinity Church, Kyoto, on February 2, 1911.

It is made of Japanese oak, hand-carved and studded with semi-precious stones from Ceylon. It was originally in one piece, but later was cut in three pieces for convenience.

It was carried during the Bishop's Administration, as Bishop of West Missouri.

Presented to the Diocese, October 28, 1930, at the Consecration of the Rt. Rev. Robert Nelson Spencer, his successor.

**THE FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT**  
of the  
**Women's Auxiliary to the National Council Diocese of West Missouri**

**THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS**

The year 1930—for the Churchwomen of the Diocese of West Missouri, has been one of sorrow and of joy. At the setting of the sun on Sunday, June 22, 1929, our beloved bishop, the Right Reverend Sidney Catlin Partridge, entered paradise. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of West Missouri is thankful to God for the lending to this Diocese for 19 years of this life, which had been originally dedicated to the foreign field. Bishop Partridge thus conspicuously represented the ideals of the Woman's Auxiliary, those of sacrifice and service. Not only was he a missionary in the foreign field and here in the domestic field—but he was a great scholar and teacher. The influence and power which he generated through his Bible talks and "Quiet Days" will ever be a leavening force.

Thou didst leave Thy throne and Thy kingly crown,  
When Thou camest to earth for me;  
But in Bethlehem's home was there found no room  
For Thy holy nativity.  
O come to my heart, Lord Jesus!

There is room in my heart for Thee.

This is the time each year for your president to give an accounting of her stewardship for the twelve months just passed. The time today is short and space in the annual report is always limited, therefore I will be brief.

Seven regular board meetings, a "quarterly" meeting in May in St. Joseph, Mo., at the time of the Diocesan convention and an Autumn meeting in November at St. Paul's, Kansas City, have been held. Three district meetings have been attended, Marshall, Springfield and Joplin. The attendance, interest and enthusiasm manifested at the district meetings have been most encouraging. Three delegates and several visitors from West Missouri attended the meeting of the W. A. of the Province of the Southwest held in October in Little Rock, Ark. All the elected officers of the Auxiliary have served as auxiliary members on the diocesan council and have co-operated with the council on the advance work program. This was also an important item in the budget of the W. A. Your president has represented the W. A. on the Executive Board of the Women's Interdenominational Missionary Council and each of the nine departments of the Council has had a representative from the Episcopal Church. These are just the "High Spots." I am sure that the reports of the other officers will go more into detail about some of these activities.

The Autumn meeting of the W. A. held in St. Paul's Church, Kansas City, was one that will always be outstanding in the minds of the women of West Missouri who were present on that day. It was the first Holy Communion service celebrated since his consecration by our new bishop, the Rt. Rev. Robert Nelson Spencer. The spirit of the consecration service of the day before, October 28th, still hovered near to add impressiveness to the day. The sermon preached by the Rt. Rev. E. C. Seaman, bishop of North Texas, was one that ought to be heard by every church woman. Bishop Seaman suggested that we organize a "whispering campaign" which would encircle the diocese with the message, "Let Us Help Our Bishop." A set of communion silver, the gift of the women of the Diocese to our new bishop, was blessed at this service by the Rt. Rev. Harry T. Moore, Bishop of Dallas. More than 200 were present at the luncheon which followed.

Today I am completing six years of service as your president. These have been happy years; many advantages and opportunities for service have come to me in this time and it is with a tinge of regret that I pass over the gavel to my successor. I bespeak for her the same spirit of loyalty and helpfulness that you have given me.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY 1930

Nineteen hundred and thirty was a year of important and interesting meetings, starting with the annual meeting held at St. George's Church, Kansas City, on Thursday, January 16th. The honored guest of the day was the Right Reverend Frederic L. Deane, D.D., Bishop of Aberdeenshire and the Orkney Islands, who was visiting the United States at the invitation of the late Presiding Bishop Murray and the National Council, in the interest of the Memorial Chapel to Bishop Seabury to be built in Aberdeen.

Corporate Communion was celebrated at ten o'clock, the Lord Bishop being the celebrant, assisted by the rector, Mr. Tynor, Mr. Spencer of Grace and Holy Trinity and Mr. Hyde, Executive Secretary of the Diocese. The Lord Bishop spoke on his missionary work in Africa.

In spite of snow and zero weather there were more than a hundred present with five out of town parishes represented.

The offering of the day, \$50.00 was presented the Lord Bishop as the gift of the women of West Missouri to the Seabury Memorial Chapel.

The May Quarterly Meeting was held at Christ Church, St. Joseph, Tuesday, May 13th, in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Convention.

There was a Communion service at ten o'clock, and following this the auxiliary convened in the Undercroft, where the business of the day was transacted. During the morning session Miss Louise Howard asked to present the following resolution:

"Whereas, Our Beloved Bishop Sidney Catlin Partridge, after nineteen years of service in the Diocese of West Misosuri, has asked for a Coadjutor, because of impaired health.

Be It Resolved. That the Woman's Auxiliary record its deep appreciation of his devotion and faithfulness in his service to the Church; his brilliancy as a teacher, and his masterful presentation of the doctrine of the Church; to assure him of our affection and loyalty, and our desire to be of service in the years to come. That we express our sincere sympathy in his illness; praying that he may be spared for many years of usefulness, and that God's richest blessing may rest upon him.

Be It Further Resolved, That this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and that our Corresponding Secretary be instructed to send a copy of the same to the Bishop."

The motion, seconded by Mrs. Lockhart was unanimously carried.

After the conclusion of business the women of Auxiliary "B" St. Joseph, presented the pageant of "The Little Blue Box."

Following this the ladies had the privilege of listening in on the business of the convention and the election of Robert Nelson Spencer as Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese.

The members of Christ Church Parish were most cordial in their hospitality and all delegates were delightfully entertained.

The Fall Quarterly Meeting held at St. Paul's Church, Kansas City, Wednesday, October 29th, was of particular interest.

Corporate Communion was held at ten-thirty with Bishop Spencer as the celebrant. This was his first service folowing his consecration as Bishop of West Missouri, at Grace and Holy Trinity Church the preceding day.

A stirring sermon to the members, active and inactive, and to the potential members of the Woman's Auxiliary, was delivered by the Rt. Rev. Eugene Cecil Seaman, Bishop of North Texas.

Just preceding the Communion Service the Rt. Rev. Harry Tunis Moore, Bishop of Dallas, blessed the Communion Silver, the gift of the women of West Missouri to Bishop Spencer and this was used in the service.

Following the service luncheon was served in the Undercroft and this was made the occasion of a delightful and informal meeting. Follow-

ing the roll call the President, Mrs. Brown, made the presentation of the Communion Service to Bishop Spencer.

There was an attendance of more than two hundred with a representation from more than half the parishes in the Diocese.

On March 25th, Quiet Day was held at St. Andrews. Mr. DeWolfe conducted a very fine service. This was also made the occasion of the spring in-gathering of the United Thank Offering.

Each Monday during Lent a Study Class for leaders of Parish Study Classes was held at St. Paul's under the leadership of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Henry Burr.

In addition to these interesting meeting there were seven regular meetings of the Board on the last Mondays of February, March, April, May, September, November and December. In December the board members were the guests of the retiring Diocesan President at her home. The other meetings were held at St. Paul's Church, Kansas City.

It has been a year of unusual interest and under the guidance of a new Bishop and a new Diocesan President, we hope this year of 1931 will leave as interesting a record on the printed page.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

During the year just past the auxiliary has studied the findings of the Jerusalem Conference, the text used being Roads to the City of God. A leaders' class was held in Kansas City during Lent, representatives from most of the local parishes being present, and parish groups under these leaders followed this course of study. Many study classes outside of Kansas City used this same book and found it both interesting and profitable. In Sedalia the work done by the leader, Mrs. Ada Inge, was so outstanding that word of it spread, and Mrs. Inge was asked to review the book for a gathering of women from all the communions of the city.

In the summer the task of selecting a candidate from those applying for the one scholarship offered by the auxiliary of the Young People's Conference at Winslow, Ark., was an almost impossible one. Fortunately the difficulty was solved by gifts from church people who consider that money spent for this type of training is an investment for the future of the church, and through their generosity the auxiliary was able to pay, in whole or in part, the expenses of five young men and women. They, with three others, sent through other channels made up West Missouri's delegation of eight future leaders at Winslow. The Educational Department is proud of having had a part in sending these young people to the conference, and very grateful to the friends whose gifts made it possible.

Early in the autumn literature on the coming course of study, India, was sent to every parish and mission group. The indications are that there will be more study classes than usual following this course during Lent.

## A UNITED THANK OFFERING WORKER IN WEST MISSOURI

The work of the Deaconess in the year of 1930 falls into three divisions: Work for the Bishop, work for the Department of Social Service, and work outside for which the Bishop released the worker.

Work directly under the Bishop included short visits to parishes and missions outside of Kansas City on various errands, among them the raising of funds for St. Luke's Hospital, Toyko, Japan and a period of service in Independence where the worker conducted evening service and made parish visits between the time of the resignation of the Reverend Mr. Crawford and the appointment of the Reverend Mr. Chowins as priest in charge.

Social Service work covered service as Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Episcopal Church House for Girls and substitution for the Matron during her vacation period and her regular days off. The increased usefulness of the house during the year, while it made work heavier, was a source of great satisfaction to everyone. The worker is a member of the Commission on Social Service of the Federal Council of Churches as a representative of the Diocesan Social Service Committee. She also attended the Wellesley Conference on Social Ethics and the conference of the Department of Social Service held during the Provincial Synod at Little Rock, Ark.

The National Department of Christian Social Service again this year requested the Deaconess to conduct a course at a summer conference, this time the Erie-Pittsburgh, the subject being, Social Aspect of the Churches Mission, and the Bishop released her to do this. This was one of the instances where the work was distinctly of a social character though not done under the Diocesan Social Service Department. Other work of this type was the weekly visits to Crittenton House for a course in personal religion. (This was done for the Women's Interdenominational Council) and visits in St. Luke's Hospital for the Hospital Auxiliary. The worker was also called upon by several of the Kansas City Rectors to care for special individual cases. There was about twenty of these, some requiring attention over a long period.

The Deaconess was released to the Women's Interdenominational Council also to conduct a course on Family Relationships at the fall School of Missions and to the Women's Auxiliary for work with the Lenten Study Classes in Kansas City, St. Joseph, Marshall and Boonville. Study material was prepared for several of the parishes in the Diocese outside of Kansas City.

Assistance was given Altar Guilds and Choir Guilds with vestments and altar furnishings. Special talks were given before Women's Guilds, at two regional meetings of the Women's Auxiliary and under the Speakers' Bureau for the Kansas City Charity Drive. Letters were written and church literature was sent to approximately twenty-five families.

In the late fall the worker was released to the Field Department to go to the smaller places in the Diocese to create a better understanding of and interest in the budget. After one visit had been made a serious illness suddenly terminated the year's work.

### REPORT OF THE PLEDGE COMMITTEE West Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

#### BUDGET PLEDGES—1931

First—Advance work. During 1930 the men and women of West Missouri worked on the Advance Work, our quota being five thousand dollars. The object selected was a string of Missions in the Diocese of Anking, China. This work was started and locations selected by our beloved Bishop Partridge, and was chosen by this Diocese as a memorial to him. We want a hand in this memorial, and each Parish Branch is asked to pledge to this and pay it in by September, 1931.

Second: The Provincial Special. This is a pledge for \$1500 per year for three years, 1930-31-32, entered into by the four missionary districts and seven dioceses composing the Province of the Southwest, this time voted to the rehabilitation of the Helen Dunlap School for Mountain Girls at Winslow, Arkansas. This school is also used for the Summer Conference of our young people to which we send a delegate. West Missouri's share is \$125.00.

Third: National and Provincial Fund. This fund is composed of the \$25.00 pledged toward the expense of our National Executive Board, and the \$5.00 dues in our Provincial Auxiliary, and the \$20.00 per year paid toward the hotel and traveling expenses of our Provincial Representative on that board. It is a great honor for West Missouri to have our Mrs. Benjamin S. Brown on the Executive Board and this pledge should be subscribed to and paid in full. Total fund is \$50.00.

Fourth: Diocesan Supply Fund. This is the fund that helps with our box work. It is used by the Supply Secretary to purchase things not made by the parish branches, such as suits, overalls, sweaters, sheets, pillow cases, blankets, etc. Amount necessary, \$25.00.

Fifth: Triennial Delegates Fund. This is used every three years to defray the expenses of our President, if she be a delegate to the Triennial Convention. It also assists with the expenses of other delegates. This fund has brought much information and given great pleasure to our delegates, and should bring much more in 1931. The branches pay whatever sum they desire to this pledge.

Sixth: Current Expense Fund. This fund is set by our Constitution and takes care of the expenses of the diocesan auxiliary, such as supplies, postage, speakers, our annual report, etc. It is set, but never fully subscribed at \$200.00.

Seventh: Diocesan Travel Fund. This fund makes it possible for the diocesan officers to visit the parish branches, to help with inspirational and educational meetings, and helps us to know each other, and each other's problems better and is for \$50.00.

Eighth: Bishops' Contingent Fund. This fund goes to our own Bishop to help him to meet the numerous calls for relief. We took this pledge over when we absorbed the Diocesan Society. This fund is in loving appreciation of our Bishop and should be over subscribed by our parish branches. The amount is set at \$250.00.

Ninth: Reeves' Memorial or Emergency Fund. This fund allows us to do the unexpected things emergencies, courtesies, to assist when some heart rendering appeal comes for help. It is made a memorial to Mrs. Louise Reeves of St. Johns, Kansas City. An offering for this fund is always taken at the monthly meetings of the Executive Board. It is set at \$50.00.

Tenth: Educational Secretary's Fund. Educational work is the most vital and necessary work in the church today, for knowledge is power. Our Educational Secretary is splendidly equipped for her office and has the necessary background. This fund pays for books, pamphlets, supplies, etc., and is for \$25.00.

Eleventh: Membership in the Interdenominational Missionary Council and work in the Girls' Home. It covers in part our social service work in Kansas City. Christian Social Service is the most stressed work in the church today. This fund should be subscribed to by the guilds, as well as auxiliary branches. Those out through the diocese doing bits of local Christian social service may substitute that work for this pledge. The amount asked, \$200.00, is meant for the Kansas City branches.

Twelfth: Clergy Support Fund. This pledge is in its third year, being first started in May, 1929. This work is going steadily on and the necessity for this pledge is greater than ever before. Our new Bishop wants all our missions served and this will be a great help to that end. This year the pledge will be for \$300.00.

Thirteenth: Young People's Conference Scholarship. One of the strongest recommendations made at the Triennial meeting was our co-operation and interest in the work of young people. Miss Lindley, in her report says, "We MUST do this work if we expect to win the youth of the church to service for the Mission of the Church." We have an interesting conference in this Province—at Helen Dunlap School, Winslow, Ark. Last year our auxiliary sent five delegates to this conference. This is our chance to educate leaders for the future and we trust this scholarship will be over subscribed this year. The amount is \$60.00.

Fourteenth: Delegates' Dues. This is a fee of 50 cents charged to the parish branches for each voting delegate attending diocesan meetings, as required by our Constitution. This does not mean that representation is limited to paid delegates, for all women of the church are welcome and discussion is invited and stressed, but this fee stabilizes our voting. Each parish branch is represented by its elected officers and four appointed or elected delegates, all to be paid for at 50 cents each. This fund is a part of the current expense fund.

These pledges are arranged to give us a place in the work of the church, at home and abroad, in the community, and an interest in our young people. The parish branches must supply the funds needed and your board asks that you be as liberal as possible, for each pledge has been cut to the lowest possible amount, and was approved at the November meeting of the auxiliary.

Most interesting work is done by the committee in charge of the crippled children's ward. All kinds of hand work are taught, as well as reading and writing, and the children are entertained with parties and gifts.

Members of the courtesy committee visit the patients, take flowers to the hospital and keep the rooms supplied with magazines.

Another part of the auxiliary's work is the care of the chapel. The following gifts and memorials were given during the past year: an almsbasin, communion linen, credence table, prayerbook for altar, framed calendar of memorial flowers, brass reading desk, hymn board, memorial book, bronze alms box, chancel seat and dossal.

Other gifts were: A machine costing \$\_\_\_\_\_ for use in bladder cases; \$10.50 for Christmas decorations; \$25.00 for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, Japan; \$30.00 in gold to Bishop Partridge on the 30th anniversary of his consecration; a portable typewriter to Bishop-elect Spencer.

The one money-making project of the year was an autumn bridge party which netted \$335.00. Other revenue came from gifts, contributions to the Sally Belle Pugsley Memorial fund, and the dues of the 50 active and 200 associate members.

Visitors are welcome at the meetings, which are held at the hospital the first Monday in each month. Any woman interested in the hospital or the work of the auxiliary may become an associate member upon annual payment of \$1.00.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH  
HOUSE FOR GIRLS  
1930**

The Episcopal Church House for Girls is filling a great need in the social service life of Kansas City. The girls are sent to the Church House, 1401 Locust St., from The Girls' Advisory Board of The Junior League. These are the unadjusted girl, the unmarried mother, and the girl who has run away from home. The girls are cared for until the Advisory Board has worked out the best solution to the problem.

The first step of the Advisory Board is to communicate with the girl's family, whenever that is possible. If the family is able and willing, the girl is sent back to her home. If that is not possible she is sent to the hospital for examination. If she is an unmarried mother she is sent either to Rest Cottage to stay until her baby is born or, if she is willing to stay for the three months' nursing period she goes to Crittenden House.

The girls needing medical treatments are taken to Bell Memorial Hospital by some responsible person.

The Advisory Board finds positions for the unadjusted girls, and they remain at the Church House until a desirable position is found for them.

Occasionally an unmarried mother and her baby are at the house until a satisfactory location is found for them by the Advisory Board.

The length of time the girls remain at the Episcopal Church House varies from one to two weeks, occasionally longer.

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The West Missouri Diocesan Branch of The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

### ARTICLE II

Its object shall be to increase, by united effort, the interest of all Parishes and Missions of this Diocese in the missionary work of the Church.

### ARTICLE III

All baptized women of this Diocese are regarded as members of this Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE IV

The head of this Auxiliary shall be the Bishop, ex-officio. The officers shall be: a President; a Vice-President; a Recording Secretary; a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer, all of whom, except the Bishop, shall be elected at the Annual Meeting preceding the Triennial General Convention, and shall serve three years. They shall be installed immediately after their election is announced. The President shall not be eligible for more than two consecutive terms.

The duties of these officers, other than as prescribed by the By-Laws, shall be those usually appertaining to their respective offices. The President shall appoint an Educational Secretary, a U. T. O. Treasurer, a Supply Secretary, a Chairman for the Department of Missions and Church Extension, a Chairman for the Department of Social Service, a Chairman for the Department of Publicity and such other committees as she may deem expedient.

### ARTICLE V

There shall be three regular meetings during the year: An Annual Meeting on the first day of the Diocesan convention in January; a meeting the first Thursday in May that does not fall on Ascension Day, and a meeting on the first Thursday in November that does not fall on All Saints' Day. The date of any meeting may be changed by vote of the Board of Managers, or in an emergency, by a unanimous vote of the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE VI

Each Parish Branch shall be entitled to representation at all meetings by its officers and four delegates elected by itself. Each Branch shall pay in advance such Delegates' dues as shall be fixed by the By-Laws.

### ARTICLE VII

This Constitution may, with the approval of the Bishop, be amended at any regular meeting of the Auxiliary, by a two-thirds vote of the Delegates present, after thirty days' written notice to each Parish Branch.

## BY-LAWS

1. The Order of business at all meetings shall be as follows, except that the Secretary's report and Parish Reports shall be given at the Annual Meeting only:

2. The Recording Secretary shall prepare an Annual Report for circulation in the Diocese.

3. The Corresponding Secretary shall make annually a full report of the work of the Auxiliary to the General Secretary of The Woman's Auxiliary in New York.

4. The Treasurer shall be chairman of the Department of Finance, shall receive all moneys, receipt for and disburse the same under the direction of the Parish Branches and the Auxiliary. She shall render a report at all regular meetings.

5. "The Educational Secretary shall be the chairman of the Department of Religious Education."

6. "The Departments through which the Auxiliary works, namely, Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education, Social Service, Finance and Publicity, shall co-operate with the corresponding departments of the Bishop and Council."

7. There shall be a board of Managers consisting of the Diocesan Officers, ex-Presidents of the Diocesan Auxiliary, the elected Officers of Parish Branches and the Diocesan President of the Girls' Friendly Society. This Board shall meet on the first Monday of each month and at other times upon call of the President. It shall be entrusted with the management of the affairs of the Auxiliary and shall have power to transact all business that may come before it. Nine members of the Board, representing at least four Parishes, shall constitute a quorum.

8. There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the President, the First Vice-President, the Recording Secretary, the Corresponding Secretary and the Treasurer, which shall transact such business as may be necessary between the meetings of the Board.

9. Parish and Mission election of Delegates shall take place during the month preceding the Annual Meeting and be immediately reported by the Branch Secretary to the Recording Secretary.

10. Delegates and Alternates to the Auxiliary Meeting held in connection with the Triennial General Convention shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot at the May Meeting preceding.

11. Each Branch shall pay an annual fee of fifty cents for each delegate and officer, and no delegate or officer shall be entitled to vote unless the dues and assessments of her Branch have been paid in full.

12. A Current Expense Fund of not less than \$200.00 shall be provided annually for printing, postage, stationery and the expense of speakers. This amount shall be apportioned among the Parish and Mission Branches by a Finance Committee of three appointed by the President.

13. All moneys shall be sent to the Treasurer one week before each meeting.

14. No part of the current expenses of the Auxiliary shall be paid from funds contributed for Missionary purposes.

15. All nominations shall be by ballot.

16. Except as provided in Section 10, all elections shall be by ballot. Unless there is an election by a clear majority on the first ballot the chairman shall declare the two names having the largest number of votes and subsequent ballots shall be upon them until a clear majority is reached.

17. These By-Laws may be amended or suspended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the Delegates present.

18. In any contingency not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws the Auxiliary shall be governed by Roberts' Parliamentary Rules.

## STANDING RULES

That there be a Missionary Sunday every year, emphasizing the United Thank Offering. (April Board, 1919.) Gifts to the U. T. O. shall be presented, wherever possible, at a corporate communion of the parish branch on March 25, (Feast of the Annunciation) and on November 2, (All Saints' Day) and shall be sent immediately to the Diocesan U. T. O. Treasurer. (November, 1926.)

That the Memorial Roll be framed and hung in a suitable place. (May, 1919.)

That each branch of the Auxiliary be asked to pledge to provide a fund for the traveling expenses of Delegates to the Triennial, and that this fund be used first for the expenses of the Diocesan President when acting as a delegate. (November, 1919, January, 1925.)

That a fund be provided for the use of the Educational Secretary. (November, 1919.)

That notices of Board meetings be sent out one week in advance; notices of Annual and Quarterly meetings, two weeks in advance. (November, 1919.) (January Board, 1920.)

That a fund be created for necessary traveling expenses of Officers in the Diocese in the interest of Auxiliary work. (November, 1920.)

That all ex-Presidents of the Diocesan Auxiliary shall be members of the Board of Managers. (1921.)

That during the year preceding the election of officers, the presidents of the parish branches shall act as a Lookout Committee. The duties of this committee shall be to bring before the Board of Managers from time to time, suggestions as to possible candidates for Diocesan officers. (1924.)

Those who are members of the Interdenominational Missionary Council are representatives to the Board of the Woman's Auxiliary. (April, 1928.)
