

The United Offering of 1913

Resolved: That the United Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of woman workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the mission field, or, if they can not go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.

Minutes of the Eighteenth Annual Meeting

*Of the West Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the
Board of Missions.*

Held in St. Matthew's Church, Wheeling, June 2, 1911.

The eighteenth annual meeting of the Diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in connection with the Council at St. Matthew's Church, Wheeling. The meetings were held in the Fort Henry Club House near the Church and were presided over by the President. The first session was held at 10 a. m., when after the singing of a hymn and prayers by the Rev. Mr. Douglas, of Martinsburg, the Bishop of the Diocese addressed the meeting. He spoke of the work of the Auxiliary and of the "Forward Movement" of the Board of Missions and explained the new method of the Board's apportionment whereby the parish, the Woman's Auxiliary and the Sunday School are all included in our apportionment to the Board. As this apportionment is increased for the coming year about 33 1-3 per cent. there is a necessity that the Woman's Auxiliary should increase at that rate the amount they have given the Board in the past.

The roll was then called and the Secretary read the minutes of the last yearly meeting. The President, Mrs. Peterkin, then read her address. She reported five new branches: at New Martinsville, St. Albans, Alderson, St. Matthew's, Charleston, and Hinton. The Secretary's and Treasurer's reports followed and it was shown that \$254.00 had been paid towards our apportionment to the Board of Missions.

For Gary and Follansbee we pledged \$400, but came short by \$36.50. This is because some few branches did not respond by giving the amount asked of them.

The life insurance for Rev. Mr. Meem, of Brazil, is paid, \$59.50. Central fund, \$50.50. ,

In January when the Bishops issued the special appeal to the Diocese for its missionary work the Auxiliary responded by sending \$127.00 extra through Miss Hunter and \$225.00 direct to the Bishop, making \$352.00 beyond our usual contributions to Diocesan Missions.

We gave another extra \$22.00 for Arizona. Twenty-five was promised and the other three dollars will be paid by the Juniors.

In tabulating the twenty-three reports received the Secretary found that there had been twenty-one boxes sent within the Diocese, principally to the Sheltering Arms Hospital and to the Mountain Mission, which were valued at \$558.21; and seven without the Diocese valued at \$408.85. Total boxes, \$967.06.

After luncheon in the basement of St. Matthew's Church the Auxiliary was again called to order, and the Bishop Coadjutor had prayers and addressed the meeting. He stated that as the missionary for whom the pledge had been made for Gary had not been stationed there this year, he had used \$70 of the amount given for supply services there and had \$117.00 on hand. He asked that this might be given to the Forward Movement for the Diocese, stating that he felt sure none of us were willing to simply maintain the work now on hand, but that all must recognize the fact that there must be an advance all along the line of the Diocesan work. This request of the Bishop's was immediately granted.

He then stated that the Junior Auxiliary had given almost \$100.00 toward the Church which was to have been built in Fayetteville the past year. As the building of this Church had been indefinitely delayed he asked that this \$100.00 be given him for the beginning of a fund for a portable chapel for which there is great need in the Diocese. Such a chapel could be bought for \$800.00 and would be most useful. It could be kept in one place until that congregation could build a larger Church, or it could follow our shifting congregations. The leaders of the Juniors present voted this at once.

The Bishop then prepared to leave the meeting, but his attention was called to the fact that for the past several years the Auxiliary has given \$400.00 to some special object in the Diocese,

—last year to Keyser and Gary, in 1910 to Follansbee and Gary—and that no doubt we could gladly pledge this \$400.00 to anything he might desire this coming year. He then spoke of the portable chapel and the \$400.00 was voted for it. After the Bishop left the meeting the Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary pledged the \$100.00 which the Juniors give each year to a "Diocesan special" to the portable chapel too, so that \$600.00 was in sight for it. The roll was again called and the branches responded as follows: Charles Town, Zion 1; Charleston, St. John's 2; Fairmont, Christ Church 3; Martinsburg, Trinity 1; Moundsville, Trinity 4; Parkersburg, Trinity 2; Parkersburg, Good Shepherd 2; Point Pleasant, Christ Church 2; Romney, St. Stephen's 1; Sistersville, St. Paul's 2; St. Albans, St. Mark's 1; Wheeling, St. Luke's 5; Wheeling, St. Matthew's 26; Williamstown, Christ Memorial 1. Of the Junior branches the following: Charleston, Zion 1; Fairmont, Christ Church 1; Parkersburg, Good Shepherd 2; Parkersburg Trinity 1; Wheeling, St. Matthew's Div. 1, 2; Wheeling, St. Matthew's Div. 2, 1.

The Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, Mrs. Gravatt, then made her report, the summary of which is as follows:

The Custodian of the United Offering, Mrs. Rathbone, reported on hand toward the United Offering of 1913, from eleven branches, \$114.28.

The Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club reported: Church periodicals sent regularly, 88.

Odd magazines and papers, 767.

Boxes and barrels, contents not noted, 12.

Total amount of money contributed since last report, \$36.

Of this \$29.00 was sent the Rev. W. M. M. Thomas to purchase Theological Books for the Brazilian Mission.

Mrs. Peterkin, the Treasurer of the "Woman's Missionary" Fund, reported only \$453.00 on hand of the \$500.00 which the women of the Diocese pledge each year towards the support of a missionary in our own Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Thomas, of the Brazilian Mission, gave a very interesting and instructive talk upon the work being done by our

Church in Brazil. An offering was taken up and \$20.86 given him for this mission.

The Secretary then called attention to the fact that the Auxiliary had not taken action upon the request made by the Bishop in the morning, that we voluntarily increase our offering to General Missions next year by \$100.00. This was done without any discussion, and the Secretary was ordered to make the new apportionment among the branches.

After the singing of "From Greenland's Icy Mountains" the meeting stood adjourned.

Address of the President

Another year has passed since we met as an Auxiliary, and I trust it has been a year of progress and improvement in all the numerous channels of our activities as an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. The General Convention has convened since we parted in 1910, and a few of our West Virginia Auxiliary women had the privilege of attending our great Triennial United Offering service in Cincinnati, and, being at the numerous meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary held every day, I will not dwell on that, but pass on to our work and what we aim to do at these yearly meetings of our Diocesan Auxiliary.

At this time we should come with the earnest desire to learn how we can better do our work; we are so scattered in West Virginia, and our little bands of faithful women so isolated that there is danger of depression and a sense of aloofness, as it were, in our small corners of the Master's vineyard, that is not exhilarating, to put it mildly—it is that very feeling these meetings are to combat. We come here and all are impelled by one great desire, *viz.*, to learn from each other and to catch enthusiasm and take it away with us. Therefore, I would urge all branches to send at least one delegate to this annual meeting, for in that way, and that way *alone*, can we feel the *oneness* and strength that comes from personal contact. For instance, a woman comes and learns personally why we give to this or that object. What we are doing in our own Diocese and what outside, and it is *simply impossible* for her to return home *as she left it*, she must necessarily *know more*, and be able to disseminate information, and, in fact, be a more intelligent worker.

This is no hearsay or imagination, but a well known fact, that the branches that are enough in earnest to send a delegate are the *very* ones we can count on to push the work.

We have done well in 1910-11, for in addition to our pledge

for Follansbee and Gary and our quota of \$265 for our Woman's Auxiliary pledge of \$100,000 to the Board of Missions, we under took to raise an extra \$100 for the Special Appeal for Diocesan Missions from our Bishops. I believe this has been paid in full and more, for the Treasurer reports \$127. It is a very hopeful sign of growth that almost all our branches respond to these extra demands most heartily, and I confess I am sometimes surprised, as well as pleased, at the results as they appear in our Year Book.

That brings me to a subject I have often thought of, viz., our meetings. I fear the program is too cut and dried, there is not enough elasticity, and as I have lately come across a suggestion from another Diocese which I found coincided with my views—Iowa, I think it is—I venture to copy it here, and perhaps it will cause discussion—I hope it may: "While thinking of ways in which to make our annual meetings interesting, it has occurred to me that we do not make enough of our *annual report*. The annual report or Year Book, barely collected in time for the meeting, usually is hurriedly read as a part of the routine, and got out of the way as quickly as possible.

"Some branches have gained in *one thing*; some have lost; some go year after year without any system; some have given nothing to the United Offering.

"The report having been respectfully submitted, goes to the printer; some times it is received by the beginning of the Auxiliary year and mailed to each local Secretary, who produces it at a meeting and says, 'There is the report, if anybody wants to look at it.' Nobody does. It has done very little good, except as a casual reference book for officers.

"Now a specified time—a *half hour* at least—should be given to discussing the report. There should be questions, comparisons, much free discussion. The women who have come to represent these Auxiliaries would then have a chance to state conditions and ask advice. We are going to try it this year. The report is the pulse of the Auxiliary. We ought to know how it beats."

This seems to me both feasible and sensible. I am glad to be able to report the formation of five new branches, so that our number now is twenty-eight, and these have come into existence from within, as no outside pressure was brought to bear, but simply that earnest good women felt the need of mission work to

put them in touch with the onward march of Christ's army in its war against the world, the flesh and the devil. My dream is for each parish and mission in West Virginia to have an *Auxiliary*, and I trust the time will come when it will be considered a disgrace for any Church not to have missionary workers, so that we can all be fellow laborers in this great field of the world.

Let us all determine that we will try in every way to commend the Auxiliary and enlarge its membership, so that each year may find it doing more earnest zealous work, helping in the parish, the Diocese, in our own country and around the whole world, and that our West Virginia Auxiliary will stand for *more*, and *be more of a real force and factor* in our Church's advance.

Report of the Secretary

The Secretary should, I suppose, keep some kind of a record of the work done during the year, the number of letters written, etc., but that I have never done. As soon as the annual meeting is over and the report sent the General Secretary, the Year Book is gotten out and the branches notified of the obligations undertaken for the coming year.

At Fairmont last June, we renewed our pledge to give \$200.00 for the support of a missionary at Gary, and \$200.00 was pledged towards the new Church building at Follansbee. I am sorry to say that neither of these pledges have been entirely paid — \$176.25 has been paid for Gary and \$187.25 for Follansbee, so \$36.50 is still due. Some few branches never unite with us in a common effort.

In October at the General Convention, your President and Secretary made only one pledge, and that of \$25.00 to help get an assistant for Miss Thackara at the hospital for Indians in Arizona. The branches nearly all sent the dollar asked for that, and the \$3.00 yet needed will be paid by one branch of the Juniors.

In January when the Bishops sent out their special letter of appeal in behalf of Diocesan Missions your Secretary pledged the Auxiliary for \$75.00 and wrote each branch. Miss Hunter's

report shows that in response she received and handed to the Bishops \$127.00 and one branch reports that they sent direct \$175.00 and another \$50.00, so that we gave to the Diocesan Missions' Special \$352.00.

When one of the Auxiliary reports was received for this year, the President of the branch, who sent it to me, said that it seemed that this year we had been rather an Auxiliary *to the Diocese* than to the Board of Missions, and she hoped no pledge would be made to the Diocese for the coming year, so that we could send more to the Board. This is rather unusual, and it is encouraging to note that at least one branch has grasped the idea that we *are* an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. So often branches do not understand this and think that any parochial work is proper for the Auxiliary. At the same time we would remind this branch that our having upheld the missionary work of the Diocese in the last few years as well as we have done, has helped the Board indirectly. Until a very few years ago we were obliged to receive help from the Board ourselves, and only when we met in Clarksburg the last time, did the Bishops and the Council decide that we could stand alone, and the Board was notified that West Virginia was independent of help from it. Since then it has been a hard struggle, and it is absolutely necessary that each and every member of the Church and the Auxiliary to give all in our power to support our own Diocesan Missions.

At the same time we never forget our first obligation is to the Board direct, and I am glad to report that we shall have paid our Auxiliary apportionment this year. One branch which always sends \$10.00 has not sent in its report yet, and when that is paid, as I am sure it will be, we shall only lack \$1.00 of our full amount, \$265.00. I shall write the three branches who have sent nothing to the Board this year and remind them of this obligation and I may say that the apportionment will be met, and we may congratulate ourselves, for all Diocesan branches do not pay it entirely.

Reports have come in from twenty-three branches, all but Berkeley Springs and their report always comes late in June.

The twenty-three branches report having sent out this year twenty-eight boxes valued at \$967.06; twenty-one within the

Diocese valued at \$558.21, and seven without the Diocese valued at \$408.85. I am glad to notice that no value was placed on second-hand clothing in several instances. It is only right that the reports should be uniform in this respect, and the Auxiliary branches are coming to see that clothes, etc., which would be given away freely at any other call, should not be valued when given for the Church's work. I feel sure it is not necessary to call the attention of our Auxiliary to the fact that sometimes boxes received by the missionary's families are a great disappointment. So far as I have ever known, any that we have sent have been selected with great care and judgment after having written the family for a list of their needs, size of garments, etc.

May I again urge that every member of the Auxiliary take the *Spirit of Missions* and the *Church News*. The latter is the organ of the Diocese and of the Auxiliary. In it are printed each month necessary communications to the Auxiliary and the Treasurer's report. It ought to be that a letter in it would reach all our members. We are glad to believe that it does reach almost all and usually an appeal in it meets with a prompt and gratifying response. If each member of the Auxiliary would get us a new subscriber the twenty-five cents would be well invested, our circulation would be greatly increased, and there would be an increase of intelligent information throughout the Diocese.

Report of Custodian of the United Offering

The annual meeting of our Church Council brings to our minds the thought that we have made an eight months' start on the Triennial Offering of 1913.

We women feel that from a small beginning a wonderful thing has grown. We are told that at a service held in the Church of the Epiphany, in Philadelphia, on October 11, 1883, for the first time Holy Communion was administered to the women of the Auxiliary, gathered as a representative body. A meeting in Association Hall followed and some eight hundred women, from fifty-one Dioceses and missionary districts attended. We are also told that the sum of \$371.21 was given by these women; and that this amount was divided into many small sums, to be used for designated missionary objects, in the domestic and foreign fields.

When in twenty-seven years' time the Woman's United Offering to Missions has grown to the large sum of \$243,360.95, it must give us women workers in the Master's cause, a feeling of great encouragement and renewed zeal to do our very best, to pray more and to give more for Missions and missionaries. May our dear Lord bless all efforts made by the women of the Church for the promotion of His glory and the good of His children.

During the first eight months of the new Offering but few sums are sent to your Custodian, for the reason that only a few branches of the Auxiliary make their collections from the mite-boxes twice a year. Those that have reported, however, are as follows:

I am glad to report that our pledges for Foreign Missions, China and Africa, and Miss Dodson's salary have been more than met. We were responsible, under the West Virginia appropriation, for \$100.00 to the Board of Missions. Of this sum \$92.00 has been sent through my hands, and Miss Brady sent direct \$25.00 from first division of St. Matthew's, Wheeling, making an amount of \$117.00. However, the Juniors have not done quite so well in their pledge of \$100.00 to the Diocese for Fayetteville. I have received and turned over for this purpose, only \$91.31, a deficit of \$8.69. But two of the branches, Huntington and Charles Town, after having paid their pledges in full, sent \$21.00 in answer to the special appeal of the Bishops, for work in the Diocese, which overbalances that deficit. The reported sum of the United Offering is also slightly in advance of last year, and the "specials within the Diocese;" but "specials without the Diocese" have fallen behind, and the value of boxes sent. The grand total of this year is only \$578.33 against last year's \$592.41.

By this comparison we seem to have fallen short of what we ought to do, as proven by what we have done before. Let me beg you not to be discouraged. It only needs a little investigation to find out the cause of this short coming. You must know that this has been a year of very up-hill work. I find that for some reason, many of the Branches disbanded the summer before, were not called together to resume work until very late. Seven Branches have sent in reports, which cover only three or four months—some not even beginning until just before Lent, and all working only at the very time of the year when their members have their time and thoughts full of their school work.

We cannot expect very good results from the crowding in of work and interests at such time. For real Juniors, especially in smaller places, the best work may be accomplished in vacation and early fall, when there is more time and freedom.

By referring to the report of last year I find that there were 13 Branches of the Junior Auxiliary in West Virginia. There are 13 again this year. One of the last year Branches, Romney, has not been, in any way, heard from this year, in answer to letter, or by report, or funds, and must be counted out. Another, Moundsville, wrote kindly and with evident interest in the fall, and sent an Xmas box in answer to appeal; but has, in no way,

been heard from since. We hope that Branch will revive in the coming year. To balance these two losses we have, this year, had the addition of a fine Branch at Berkeley Springs, which has shown real vigor and determination since its start in February, having met its pledges and sent a special to Indian Missions. I am also glad to report that this Branch is using the "Missionary Leaflets" with interest. Also I may report a Brotherhood of St. Paul in Charles Town working in connection with the Juniors.

There is a bright prospect for an increase in Branches in the coming year. Montgomery, Ansted, St. Matthew's, Charles-ton and St. Albans have all written encouragingly of the likelihood of starting branches, and several other places, as Weston and Sistersville, have been only deterred by the difficulty of getting leaders.

Will it be inappropriate just here to ask the members of the various Woman's Auxiliaries to give their attention and consideration to this question. Why should it be so difficult for the Juniors to find leaders when there are so many members of the Woman's Auxiliary eager to do some missionary work? Here is your opportunity—possibly your duty. Let it not be said in your community, that all these loyal young workers for the Master had to be disbanded, or discouraged, for the lack of help and encouragement from their seniors.

Lastly, let me mention one feature of great encouragement, namely, that many of the present branches have taken up some form of Mission Study, and are earnestly striving to become intelligent workers. Some simple, easy form of instruction has been adopted by nearly all.

I hope to be able to report another year that there is no branch without its course of study and prayer.
