

Minutes of the Twenty-third Annual Meeting

The twenty-third annual meeting of the West Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Parkersburg, Thursday, June 10th, 1915. The meeting was held in the assembly room of the Y. M. C. A. building, which had been kindly given us for the day.

At 9:30 a. m. the meeting was called to order by Mrs. Peterkin, the Diocesan President, and after the singing of the hymn "Fling Out the Banner," the Litany of Missions was read by the Rev. Mr. McDonald of Morgantown. The roll call, which was also repeated at the afternoon session, showed an attendance as follows:

Charleston, St. John's, 2; Charles Town, Zion, 1; Clarksburg, Christ Church, 1; Hedgesville, Mt. Zion, 1; Huntington, Trinity, 2; Leetown, 1; New Martinsville, 1; Parkersburg, Good Shepherd, 12; Parkersburg, Trinity, 23; Point Pleasant, Christ Church, 3; Romney, St. Stephen's, 1; Sistersville, St. Paul's, 3; St. Albans, St. Mark's, 1; Weston, St. Paul's, 2; Wheeling, St. Luke's, 3; Wheeling, St. Matthew's, 5; Williamstown, Christ Memorial, 5; Morgantown, Trinity, 2; Parkersburg, Trinity, Division B, 13; Summit Point, 1; Middleway, 1; Ripley, 3; Elkins 1. There were many others who attended both meetings, and a delegation of twenty came from the Auxiliary in Marietta.

The minutes of the last meeting in Morgantown were then read by the Secretary and the President delivered her annual address. The most notable feature of it was the announcement of ten new branches of the Auxiliary within the past year. These were as follows: Morgantown, Parkersburg, Trinity, Division B; Wheeling, St. Matthew's, Division B; Wheeling, St. Andrew's; Charles Town, Zion, Division B; Summit Point, Middleway, Charleston, St. Luke's, Ripley, Elkins.

Mrs. Peterkin then reported that the Woman's Missionary Fund had amounted to \$462.09 instead of the \$500 for which we

aim. A member of Trinity Parish handed in \$3 after the meeting to make the amount \$465. Next year no doubt the new Branches will more than make up the amount needed.

Mr. Brayshaw, who has been at the Seven Rivers Mission, and who goes to Princeton for the coming year, is the "Woman's Missionary" now.

The Treasurer of the Auxiliary then read the summary of her report, as follows:

Mrs. Gravatt then presented the report of the Junior Auxiliary. There are now 13 Chapters, a gain of two Branches. The summary of her report follows:

Mrs. Gravatt asked all the Junior Branches to consult with her early this Fall as to where to send the Christmas boxes. Those wanting Christmas boxes apply to her and thus it can be managed systematically. She also made an earnest appeal for

leaders for the Junior Branches. There ought to be one woman in every Parish who would be willing to lead a Branch of the Junior Auxiliary.

A discussion followed as to methods of work among the Juniors and especially work to interest the boys.

The meeting then adjourned to attend service at the Church and for luncheon in the Parish House of Trinity Church with the delegates to the Council.

At 2:30 p. m. the Auxiliary again convened, and the Rev. Mr. Lee, of Weston, conducted the devotional exercises. The Secretary of the Auxiliary then gave her report. It showed a decided increase in the work of the Auxiliary, which is very encouraging.

Reports had been received from 37 Branches this year—eight more reports than last year—and two Branches had failed to report.

The sum total of money and boxes as reported by the Branches (including the United Offering) amounts to \$4,977.91. This is a gain of \$244.94 over last year. We look for a much larger increase next year, since many of the new Branches had hardly started on their work and had very little to report.

The Secretary called attention to the fact that four Branches had given nothing to the Board of Missions, which is our first obligation always.

Still, since 18 Branches had responded so well to the Emergency call and had sent \$533.64 to that, our report showed more to the Board of Missions than ever before. The contributions to General Missions had been \$443.85, so that we sent the Board direct \$977.49.

Since our pledge for Princeton had some how fallen short \$26 and the pledge to Miss Thackara's assistant nurse at Fort Defiance, Arizona, was short \$4, the Treasurer was ordered to pay the balance due on each fund from the Central Fund, which had accumulated a surplus this year. In tabulating the reports the Secretary had found that the Auxiliary had sent out within the Diocese 31 boxes, valued at \$879.10; without the Diocese 13 boxes valued at \$430.53, or a total of 44 boxes valued at \$1,409.65. This represented a gain of 20 boxes and \$290.21 in value. Besides her correspondence and writing for the Auxiliary in the Church News, the Secretary reported having addressed 28

Branches, as follows: Martins Ferry, Ohio, a newly organized Branch; St. Andrew's, Wheeling; St. Matthew's, Wheeling, Branches A and B on the subject of the War Emergency call; Fairmont, Morgantown, Weston, Clarksburg, Elkins, Moorefield, Romney, Berkeley Springs, Hedgesville, Martinsburg Leetown, Middleway, Summit Point, Rippon, Charles Town, Shepherdstown, Ronceverte, Hinton, Charleston, St. John's, St. Luke's, St. Matthew's; St. Albans, Point Pleasant. The other branches were not visited for lack of time and because most of the others could attend the annual meeting.

Since then letters have been received telling of the Day of Prayer which had been observed by all Branches of the Auxiliary on May 19th—a day of prayer in view of the special situation now confronting the Board of Missions. Miss Brady spoke of the call to the Auxiliary to work and self-denial this summer, and asked that a day be appointed by the Auxiliary for prayer and thanksgiving and for the ingathering of the special gifts which we shall give the Board as the result of our work for the next two months.

After the Secretary had finished her report it was moved and seconded that the 6th of August (the feast of the Transfiguration) shall be observed by the Auxiliary of West Virginia as suggested, when each woman will bring her gift—a thank offering for the many blessings vouchsafed us, especially the blessing of peace, when the other nations of the earth are passing through such fearful times.

It was also decided to have a special offering for General Missions at the close of this meeting.

The custodian of the United Offering then reported that since she had taken charge of this fund in February, 1914, she had given out 465 boxes and leaflets. Then there were 40 places in the Diocese where boxes had been distributed and now there are 58 places.

Her report summarized is as follows:

Mrs. Douglas, the Secretary of the Little Helpers for the Diocese, reported sixteen dozen boxes distributed and \$73.14 received and disbursed. With the exception of \$10 which was given as a special for the annex to the kindergarten in Akita, Japan, the whole amount was sent to the Board for General Missions and the support of kindergarten and hospital work in this and foreign lands.

Mrs. W. H. Smith, the Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, gave her report, which was very interesting and which is published in full.

Miss Tillotson, the Educational Secretary of the Auxiliary, had come from New York to address the meeting on the general subject of mission study. We wish all the women of the Church in West Virginia could have heard her helpful, inspiring address. Certainly all who were so fortunate as to be at this meeting will go home feeling as never before the importance of being informed of the work at home and abroad and of helping to inform others. Bishop Peterkin has always been fond of quoting a saying of the older Bishop Doane, which is most true: "In order to inspire men with missionary enthusiasm it is necessary to acquaint them with the missionary enterprise." That is mission study.

Archdeacon Chrisman, who had been sent by Bishop Gravatt to represent him, as it was impossible for him to leave the Council, was then introduced by Mrs. Peterkin.

He said that the Bishop wished us to give as our special gift to the Diocese for the coming year \$500 towards the salary of a missionary who will be sent to Chester and points adjacent. This is an important work, and we have owned a lot there for some time. No doubt with a missionary in charge the work will grow rapidly. The field as yet is only able to pay part of the salary, and it will be a great help to depend upon the Auxiliary for this \$500. Last year the \$500 we gave to the Princeton Rectory. It is a great satisfaction to the Bishops to know they can depend upon the Auxiliary for this five hundred dollars special each year. Of course Mr. Chrisman was instructed to tell the Bishop we acceded to his request.

Mrs. Frank Moats then moved that Miss Kinnie Smith be instructed to convey to the Bishop the love and sympathy of

the Auxiliary. Seconded by Mrs. Aschman and carried by a rising vote.

Mrs. Brittingham then offered an appropriate resolution of thanks to the Auxiliary of Trinity Church for their hospitality and to the Y. M. C. A. for the use of their assembly room.

The offering was now taken up and amounted to \$27.80. A member of Trinity Parish who had been unable to be present at the meeting afterwards made this amount up to \$30, which the Treasurer was instructed to send to General Missions.

After singing From Greenland's Icy Mountains and the benediction by the Rev. Mr. Fish, the meeting stood adjourned to meet in Martinsburg, June 1, 1916.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

As I look in your faces, my dear Auxiliary women from all over West Virginia, my heart is very full, and there are so many things I want to say to you that it is difficult to know how to begin. First of all, I must congratulate our West Virginia Auxiliary most heartily on the good showing in the reports this year and the ready response they made to the "Emergency Call" of the Board of Missions. It gladdens my heart and shows a vitality and earnestness of purpose that bodes very well for our future work. Next in order comes the increase in our Branches, which in this past year has gone with leaps and bounds, and we have ten new branches to welcome into our Auxiliary. Most of them have come into being in a very healthy and permanent way, viz., that the women without any outside pressure felt they must do more than they had done, and now they stand ready and willing to work, and if they follow the other branches they will always respond to any call that the leader puts before them. Never was there a band of more obedient followers, and I am very grateful for their steady support.

Our work is both inside and outside the Diocese, as our reports show. We feel we must help hold up our Bishops' hands, so one thousand dollars goes to West Virginia every year. In this time of stress and strain, with the whole world disorganized

and almost despairing, it is a comfort to be at such a meeting as this, which is not for self-seeking or self-aggrandizement, but simply to help others, truly following in our dear Lord's footsteps. Wherever we can help, we try to do it, our motto text being "With good will doing service," having been chosen by our beloved first President, Mrs. Small, who did so much hard pioneer work when we were a feeble infant band and to whom the Auxiliary owes a real debt of gratitude.

Let us live up to our motto, showing that this is a real thing with us, part of our lives, and that we want to work and not to shirk; that we stand for what our name implies, women workers, and that we will stoop to do the lowliest service if thereby we can help even the humblest of God's servants or aid in carrying on the glorious mission work of the church.

This year completes our twenty-fifth year of existence as an organized Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in West Virginia, and it will be interesting to note what is unknown to many of the present active members, that it was organized by Mrs. Mary Twing in Trinity Hall, Parkersburg, in May, 1890, and consisted of four members. Mrs. Small was appointed by the Bishop as the Diocesan President, and we started out, and unless I am mistaken ours was the only Branch in West Virginia for a year or two; then the women waked up and took hold, so we now have thirty-nine Branches, with at least six hundred women who are members. Is that not enough to hearten us and make us thank God and take courage?

Let us then go back from this meeting with more knowledge, more zeal and greater devotion to this work, which is such a mighty work and in which each of us has our part to do, and no matter how insignificant it seems it ennobles it to remember that it is all a part of the great plan and we are co-workers with God. How that glorifies our petty round!

I heard a very good sermon once on these three P's—"prayer, pluck and perseverance"—which move and conquer the world, so I commend them to you as the three essentials in the Woman's Auxiliary, and with them we will work wonders in the future as in the past.

REPORT OF LITTLE HELPERS

It is not encouraging to report a decrease in contributions at this time when, from every quarter, "Forward" is the only watchword we hear in missionary endeavor; but we have fallen somewhat behind. We ask the reason for this and the only plausible answer seems to be the lack of local leadership. Unlike other Branches of the Auxiliary, the Little Helpers can do nothing whatever without someone to go before that they may follow; without an interested and capable leader they are helpless, rather than being able to give help to others. Several Branches have fallen by the wayside and from them no word has been received. The others from which I make the following report are doing good work. I would make mention of one which had weekly meetings for children of five years and over and some very beautiful scrap books were made—the director sewing the leaves of cambric, but the designing and pasting were done by the children themselves with much taste and originality shown, and the books were enjoyed and appreciated by the little patients in St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, North Carolina. The same branch sent a box of new clothing to a missionary district in our own Diocese. I mention this to show what can be done and incidentally to encourage others to emulate the example in the year that is before us.
