President's Annual Letter

TO THE PARISH AUXILIARIES OF THE WESTERN MASSACHUSETTS
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

My dear Friends:—The work of another year has come to an end. The opportunities which have come and gone are ours no longer, but the seed which has been sown in hope and love will surely spring up and bear fruit.

The work has progressed quietly and steadily. I like to think of our Western Massachusetts Branch as a young oak tree, sturdy and strong, throwing out no straggling branch which needs must feel the pruning knife, but "without haste, without rest," always growing, gaining in size and symmetry.

Through "The World" in Boston, and the Jubilee Missionary meetings held in our three Districts, we have heard from the wide field and learned of other methods than our own. This should result in added interest and enthusiasm and a quickened desire for mission study. Our contribution through the Jubilee meetings, made as a special thank offering, amounted to over a thousand dollars, and is to go to St. Margaret's School in Tokyo.

The united offering completed last October was over a thousand dollars larger than ever before, thus setting a new standard, which we must not allow to fall.

It is something quite out of the ordinary course that this year three of our regular pledges are not completed. I cannot feel that

this really means lack of interest, but rather lack of systematic giving. Perhaps we need more efficiency on the part of parish officers, and more faithful coöperation on the part of individual members. If each member of this Auxiliary would truly do what she could, there would be no question of completing the pledges. Let us remember that our Lord stands, as of old, "over against the treasury" as we bring our offerings, and let us ask ourselves if our gifts are measured by our love for Him.

I would like to call your attention again to the great importance of the Junior branch of our work. In these days when so much is said of conservation of resources, it is but natural that we should carefully consider and plan for the future of our organization, and in the Junior Auxiliary should be found a large source of supply. Let me remind you that our aim is to have not only a Woman's Auxiliary in every parish, but a Junior branch as well, and I believe it can be done, if only there is interest enough and zeal enough to persevere and find the right leaders.

Our share of the work of the Diocese is being more and more systematically arranged, and though at present we have no Deaconess, the efforts of Mr. Sniffen's devoted young helpers are accomplishing much. The Christmas gifts and cards, so carefully planned and sent out, were much appreciated. The Diocesan Secretary asks for Miss Preston's work, five dollars for a portable altar, also altar linen and vessels, service books and hymnals.

I wish that the study of missions might be made a more prominent part of the work in every parish. As you work for any field learn the names and the needs of those who are there, and pray earnestly for them and so make your efforts more real.

Our sincere thanks are due to our Worcester friends for the gift of the valuable missionary lending library which we have been allowed to use since our organization. It cannot fail to be of the greatest assistance in our work.

In the midst of all we may say and do to-day, there is one thought in every mind. We miss our Bishop, who has from the first greeted us at this time of our annual meeting. Memory brings before us his mild, benignant face, but there is a vacant chair—a kind voice is still. We look in vain to-day for the friend whose wise counsel

and affectionate interest never failed us in our need, and our hearts are sad.

Our Diocesan Missionary has told me that more than once, after talking over plans for increased effort and the possibilities of support, Bishop Vinton ended by saying, "I am sure of the Auxiliary." There is no better way to prove ourselves worthy of this confidence than to go on with deeper earnestness and renewed consecration in the service of the Master he loved so well.

We have indeed cause for thankfulness that the one on whom the mantle has fallen is a man deeply interested in missionary work and filled with the missionary spirit—one to whom we can look for guidance and help, and to whom we can offer our loyal allegiance.

Let us then, with gratitude to God for the past, and firm hope for the future, go forward into the year to come, resolved that it shall be one of earnest work. Let us make it mean more to ourselves and others than ever before. Let the spirit of our giving, whether it be of time or strength or money, be "How much can I give?" and not "How little will answer?" And as we approach the Saviour of the World, let us not offer to Him the broken fragments of our time and interest, or the small change we have left after supplying ourselves with luxuries, but let us give Him the best that we have to give—our best strength and most earnest endeavor to make His name and His love known to all the earth.

Tenth Annual Report

Three regular meetings of the Western Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions have been held during the year: the annual meeting in Christ Church, Springfield; the autumnal meeting in St. John's Church, Williamstown, and the midwinter meeting in Christ Church, Fitchburg. The average attendance has been one hundred and eighteen.

The speakers have been the Right Rev. Alexander H. Vinton, late Bishop of the Diocese, who made a short address at the annual meeting; the Rev. John C. Seagle of East Chester, N. Y.; the Rev. Hugh L. Burleson, assistant secretary of the Board of Missions; the Rev. Amos Goddard of Shasi, Hankow District, China; the Rev. Wm. E. Gardner, secretary of the Department of New England; Dr. Henry B. Taylor of St. James' Hospital, Anking, China; and Archdeacon Parshall of Duluth.

There have been two regular and three informal Executive Committee meetings held during the year. One change has taken place on the Executive Board; the resignation of Miss Agnes Goodwin, vice-president of the Berkshire District, was accepted with regret, and Mrs. Alden Sampson of Pittsfield was elected to succeed her. The secretary of the Junior Department has been unable to continue her work throughout the year and has been relieved by Miss Slater of Webster.

The loss sustained by the Diocese through the death of Bishop Vinton has been keenly felt in every parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary; nevertheless the regular work has been faithfully carried on, and a special appeal for the Rev. Mr. Cuthbert's work in Japan was more than met.

The vice-president for the Connecticut Valley district reports a meeting held at her home for parish officers in January, and a pre-Lenten Conference held in Greenfield, the speakers being Miss Norton, who told of the summer work at the Diocesan home in Heath; Mrs. Merrill, secretary of the Babies' Branch; and Deaconess Phelps of St. Hilda's School, Wuchang. She has made six parish visits. Seven of the fourteen branches have increased their membership and nine have added to last year's gifts for the pledges. The box work has fallen behind.

In the Worcester district no new branches have been organized, but the old branches have all been doing good work. Three parishes have been visited by the vice-president. A district meeting was held in All Saints' Church, Worcester, on Friday, November 4, all present being invited to stay for the evening, when Mr. Betticher gave a talk on Alaska illustrated by stereopticon. The branches in the district were represented at the Worcester Jubilee meeting and several took active part in Jubilee meetings in their own towns. On Friday, May 5, the Woman's Missionary Society of All Saints' Church, Worcester, invited all parish branches in the district to take part in a Quiet Day, most helpfully conducted by Bishop Parker of New Hampshire.

The vice-president of the Berkshire district reports five parish branches visited during the year, two branches have not had meetings and no new branches have been established. In January a neighborhood meeting was held in Pittsfield with about fifty present. Mrs. Brooks and Mr. Sniffen gave most interesting and helpful talks. There is much interest and enthusiasm in the work and it is hoped next year every branch will be taking an active part.

Although these reports show steady and effective work in the branches already established, let us not be satisfied, but in this coming year strive to strengthen and advance the work by helping many others to realize the deep joy and inspiration of missionary service.

Annual Report of the Corresponding Secretary

For the working year of 1910-1911 just closing, the parishes of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts have contributed through the Woman's Auxiliary: Twenty boxes to Domestic Missions, valued at \$1,476.15; thirty boxes to Diocesan Missions, valued at \$868.87; seven boxes to Indian Missions, valued at \$506.80; nineteen boxes to Colored Missions, valued at \$1,001.69. Total valuation \$3,853.51.

Thirty-four parishes have contributed to the Foreign pledge, for which department no box work is done.

Five hundred seventy-five copies of the year book, five hundred twenty-five invitations to meetings, fifty reports from the Missions House and one hundred eight special notices have been sent out.

One hundred seventy-one personal letters and cards have been written.

Educational Secretary

The report on missions study is as follows: Study classes—Greenfield, St. James'; Shelburne Falls, Emmanuel; Springfield, All Saints'; Pittsfield, St. Stephen's; Webster, Reconciliation; Worcester, All Saints'. Program meetings—Holyoke, St. Paul's; Springfield, All Saints' and St. Peter's; Worcester, All Saints' and St. John's. Talks and readings—Ashfield, St. John's; Chicopee, Grace; Easthampton, St. Philip's; Great Barrington, St. James'; North Adams, St. John's; Northampton, St. John's; Southbridge, Holy Trinity; Westfield, Atonement; Worcester, All Saints', St. Mark's, and St. Matthew's.

Two normal classes have been held under the leadership of the secretary, one in the Worcester, the other in the Connecticut Valley district. The subject of study was "The Negro"; the text-book used was "The Upward Path." The class in the Worcester district had four members—from the Reconciliation, Webster, and St. John's, Worcester. The one in the Connecticut Valley district had twelve members—from St. Paul's, Holyoke; St. Andrew's, Ludlow; St. Mary's, Palmer; All Saints' and Christ Church, Springfield; Atonement, Westfield. Excellent work was done in both classes.

The secretary attended the conference of the Diocesan officers of Department One, held in Trinity Chapel, Boston, May 9. She gave a few details of her work.

Some six hundred leaflets have been distributed.

Again the secretary reminds the Western Massachusetts Branch, that in the rule of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions—prayer for missions, study of missions, gifts to missions—the second place is given to study.

Secretary's Report

MAY, 1910—MAY, 1911.

The Junior Department has twenty active branches, and three of these are divided into two chapters, one for the older and one for the younger girls in the parish. During the year new branches have been formed in Easthampton, Great Barrington, and Chester, and a new chapter in Northampton. Other branches have been revived or reconstructed on better lines. Two branches have lapsed.

Christmas boxes were sent to a Colored mission in Georgia, to a Mountain White mission in Oklahoma, and to various missions under Mr. Sniffen's charge in our own Diocese.

Either one of two text-books—"The Winners of the World" or

the "Pickaninny's Progress"—has been used in the study classes, and much satisfactory work has been done in this line. Eight branches have made excellent scrapbooks illustrating the course of study.

The banner has been won by St. Luke's, Worcester.

The amount of our pledges was increased \$100 and they were all paid in full.

After Bishop Vinton's death it was decided by the Executive Board that the money pledged for his discretionary use this year should be used for a memorial to him—this memorial to be something connected with the mission work of the Diocese.

The Board of Managers has met at the time of the regular meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary. There has been one meeting of the Executive Committee and one conference. Twice during the year the secretary has sent a circular letter to each branch.

In January Miss Chapin was obliged to resign to the regret of the whole department.

Report

There are now six branches in the Diocese, four of them having been established within the past six months—St. John's, Northampton, 60 members; All Saints', Worcester, 140 members; St. James', Greenfield, 26 members; Christ, Springfield, 66 members; Christ, Fitchburg, 30 members; Grace, Chicopee, just started.

The first branch established in the Diocese was that of St. John's, North Adams, which although small was in a flourishing condition when it was given up this year, very much to the regret of those interested, who hope to see it renewed as soon as conditions are more favorable. I also hope soon to be able to report a branch started in St. Peter's, Springfield. In three of the branches the leaders have followed a suggestion made early in the year of interesting the older Juniors in the work of the Babies' Branch, thereby connecting more closely the two parts of the Junior Auxiliary. The success of this plan has been most satisfactory. A social time is given the mothers twice a year, when contents of mite boxes are collected.

I hope before next year's report that we shall have many more parishes ready to establish a Babies' Branch. Some have said to me, "But we have no *Junior* department." That makes no difference whatever, for as the *Font Roll* is the kindergarten of the Sunday school, so the *Babies' Branch* is the kindergarten of the Junior Auxiliary, a nucleus, so to speak, from which a Junior department may come. I am sure that when each of you fully understand just what the Babies' Branch stands for,—that primarily we strive for the *interest* and *prayers* of the *mothers*, their interest obtained *through their children*,—we shall have a strong following throughout the Diocese.

The financial statement is really from but two branches, as the other four were started so recently that no collection is possible

until next fall. Since May, 1909, \$128.24 has been sent to the Church Missions House—from St. John's, Northampton, \$24, and from All Saints', Worcester, \$104.24. Of this amount \$70 has been collected since May, 1910, and divided as follows:—

Preamble

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Therefore, every baptized woman is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary, and becomes an active member by attendance upon its meetings.

Constitution of the Western Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

The name of this organization shall be the Western Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

The object of this organization shall be, to unite all church women of the Diocese in work for Domestic and Foreign Missions, to increase missionary activity in the parish auxiliaries, and to encourage the formation of such branches where there are none.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERS.

All societies of churchwomen in the Diocese, doing work for missions, may be auxiliaries to this Branch; and women coöperating with the Western Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions will be considered members of the organization.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION.

SECTION 1. The officers of this branch shall be a President, a Vice-President for each district, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer, and a Secretary for each of the following divisions of the work, respectively: Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Indian Missions, Missions to the Colored People, Diocesan Missions, an Educational Secretary, and a Secretary for the Junior Auxiliary.

SEC. 2. These officers shall constitute an Executive Committee, to whom shall be intrusted the general business of the Branch when not in session.

They shall fill all vacancies occurring in the Board between the annual meetings. They shall also choose an Auditor.

SEC. 3. These officers shall be elected by the Branch, by ballot, at the annual meeting. The voting shall be by parishes, each parish and mission being entitled to one vote. All delegates shall be enrolled as such before they are entitled to vote. Women enrolled as members of the Auxiliary, but not delegates, are not entitled to vote.

SEC. 4. There shall be appointed annually, by the Executive Committee, a Nominating Committee of three members: one from each district, who shall nominate at the annual meeting, subject to the approval of the Bishop, one or more candidates for each of the offices named in Article IV, Section 1.

ARTICLE V.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the President to call the meetings of the Executive Committee, and of the Branch, and to preside at them.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents in order of seniority of appointment to call meetings and preside in the absence of the President. It shall be the duty of each Vice-President to endeavor to increase in her own district a missionary spirit, by rousing the societies to greater interest in the three aims

of the Auxiliary, viz., daily prayer for missions, systematic giving for missions, and the study of missions. She shall receive from each parish reports of new work undertaken, and an annual report, which she shall forward to the Secretary. The Vice-Presidents are authorized to hold meetings at such times and places as they please in their own districts.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to give notice of meetings and to keep a record of such meetings, and to prepare an Annual Report for circulation in the Diocese.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Branch, to assist in the preparation of and to circulate the Annual Reports, and to attend to such further correspondence as may be requested by the President. She shall also present a report at the annual meeting.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all money sent her for the purposes of the Branch; to disburse the same, as directed by those sending it or by the Executive Committee. She shall present a report at the annual meeting of all money which has passed through her hands.

SEC. 6. It shall be the duty of the Assistant Treasurer to take charge of all money contributed in the Diocese toward the United Offering, to send the same to the Treasurer, and to present a report at the annual meeting.

SEC. 7. It shall be the duty of the Secretary in charge of each department of missionary work, and also the Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, to conduct all correspondence relating to that work with the Parish auxiliaries, General Secretary, Secretary of the Diocesan Branch and Vice-Presidents, and to present a report of such work at the annual meeting. They shall forward to the Diocesan Treasurer all money deposited with them for missionary objects and receive a voucher for the same.

SEC. 8. The Educational Secretary shall keep as complete a file as possible of the Auxiliary and Junior Auxiliary publications, and such other missionary literature as may be available. She shall correspond with the parish officers in regard to such literature, assisting them by suggestion for mission study and in the formation of classes. She shall keep the Vice-Presidents informed

of such work in their districts, and present a report of her work at the annual meeting.

SEC. 9. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine all accounts of the Treasurer and to present a voucher for the same.

ARTICLE VI.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at a regular meeting of the branch, provided due notice of such amendment be sent to each parish and mission two weeks before the date of such meeting.

By-Laws

1. The Diocese shall be divided into three districts: the Worcester District, comprising Worcester County; the Connecticut Valley, including Hampden, Hampshire, and Franklin Counties; and Berkshire, comprising Berkshire County.
2. This Branch shall hold three regular meetings yearly, in October, January, and May, the latter to be the Annual Meeting, and to be held in the central district of the Diocese.
3. Special Meetings may be called by a two-thirds vote of the Executive Board.
4. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be at the call of the President, or, in her absence, at that of the senior Vice-President, and shall be not less than two annually.
5. An offering shall be taken at every meeting of the Branch, and each parish may also make an annual voluntary contribution to the running expenses.
6. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any regular meeting of the branch.

Definitions

The following definitions will be found helpful:—

General Missions are those Missions of the Church for which the General Board of Missions is responsible.

Domestic Missions are such Missions, supported by the General Board, as are situated within the jurisdiction of the Government of the United States.

Foreign Missions are such Missions, supported by the General Board, as are beyond the jurisdiction of the Government of the United States.

Diocesan Missions are Missions within the Diocese which receive support from the Diocesan Board of Missions, outside the limits of one's own Parish or Mission.

The United Offering is the Thank Offering presented at every Triennial service of the Woman's Auxiliary.
