President's Report

A year ago our country had only just entered into the war. Today all the sad realities and stern necessities of the struggle for democracy and right are confronting our government. Civilization's call has been heard and must be obeyed. We regret to be at war with any nation, but peace could not be maintained at the cost of honor and so our country must fight. "God give us wisdom to play our part so well that the United States may in the future be an example of Christianity among all the peoples of the earth." All over our land there are sad hearts today and among our Auxiliary women there are mothers whose sons are fighting for their country and their country's flag. And how proud these mothers are of their boys, of their patriotism and bravery and of their willingness to die if God so wills it, for "Our Star Spangled Banner, The Flag of our pride." Yes

"Brave boys are they
Gone at their country's call
And yet—and yet
We cannot forget
How many brave boys must fall."

Looking back over the past year, and realizing all the work that has been done by the Auxiliary branches of Western Michigan for the cause of missions, and knowing also something of the difficulties under which these results have been attained, we feel that we need not be disheartened but rather that we may look forward hopefully to even better results in the future.

The Red Cross, The Young Men's Christian Association, and the various forms of War Relief have rightfully demanded of us our very best efforts and should continue to do so for the period of the war. But, at the same time, our church must not be neglected or forgotten. Let us not forget that verse of Scripture, "These ought ye to have done and not to leave the others undone."

Your President earnestly urges that all the parish branches in making their pledges this afternoon especially bear in mind the Bishop's League, and let us remember that this money is for the building up of our beloved church in our own Diocese.

Our Bishop is at present in France and doing wonderful things for our church among the soldiers there. Very soon we hope and trust he will return to us, and then he will need all the help and encouragement it is ours to give. Yes, and he will also require money for his work and that is what the Bishop's League is intended to provide. Dear friends, let us all resolve that we will make glad our Bishop's heart in every way we can when he comes home, for after all the hours of darkness, he will require all the sunshine and brightness that the people of his Diocese can give to him.

In September, I visited the branch at South Haven. It required two days to reach there, not because of the distance but because I missed train connection at Kalamazoo, and was obliged to return to Grand Rapids and take a new start the next day. Mr. Joiner, the Rector at South Haven had sent me most explicit directions about railroad facilities, but I listened to the voice of the Michigan Central Ticket Agent in my own home city, and alas, that was my undoing. In future, I have resolved to pay strict heed to my "Spiritual Pastors and Masters" in everything, even to train schedules. It is said "time and tide wait for no man." I learned on that trip to my sorrow trains waited for no woman. It was a very helpful and interesting

meeting and the Auxiliary women seemed alert and interested in their missionary work.

Two new branches have been formed during the year. In September a branch was organized at Holland with Mrs. Van Syckle as President and Mrs. J. E. Murray as Secretary and Treasurer.

It was most gratifying to see at the Group meeting in December at St. Marks, representatives from this new branch, as well as their Rector, Mr. Wycoff and his wife.

Ascension Day, May 9th, an Auxiliary branch was formed at Sturgis, with the following officers:

President, Mrs. C. Lockwood; 1st Vice President, Mrs. S. Flanders; 2nd Vice President, Mrs. T. Jacobs; Secretary, Mrs. E. Seitz; Ed. Secretary, Mrs. A. Morris; Treasurer, Mrs. H. G. Mowltion.

We are glad to welcome these new branches into our circle of Auxiliaries and wish them every success in their efforts for the splendid cause of missions.

Three Group meetings have been held during the year, invitations having been extended at our last annual meeting by St. Paul's, St. Joseph; St. Thomas, Battle Creek and St. Marks, Grand Rapids.

The first meeting was held at St. Joseph, October 29th and the branch there was most fortunate in having the Rev. C. C. Rollit, who is the Secretary of the Sixth Province, as their speaker. Papers were given by Mrs. Eaglesfield of Niles, Mrs. Slade of Benton Harbor, Mrs. Hughes of Dowagiac and Mrs. Grannis of St. Joseph. It was indeed a splendid meeting.

October 8th, the second Group meeting was held at Battle Creek. Mr. Hielman spoke most interestingly of his work among the soldiers at Camp Custer and emphasized the great need for more prayer books. A committee was appointed by your President, with Mrs. Sullivan as Chairman, to raise a fund for the purchase of prayer books.

Mrs. Ivins of Kalamazoo gave a fine talk as did a missionary from China.

The Woman's Auxiliary of St. Marks Pro Cathedral was the hostess at the third and last Group meeting which was held December sixth. A splendid address was given by Rev. Walter Tunks of Muskegon and the Auxiliary women felt honored in having him as their guest and speaker. Prof. Jessie Davis told of Dean White's work at Waco. Dean White is so dearly loved by all in our Diocese that no more welcome subject could have been presented.

It was the privilege of your President to attend each of these meetings.

Your loyalty and trust have enabled me to give the best that is in me to our work, and I hope that I have been somewhat worthy of you, and I can say that the tie that unites me with you is a very precious one to me. While the year has brought to us many responsibilities and some sorrows, it has also brought to us many blessings and on these we must particularly dwell, looking upward and onward, and gathering from retrospection only experience and strength, with which to meet all that the future may have in store for us.

Minutes of the
Thirty-Eighth Annual Meeting
of the
Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese
of Western Michigan

The Thirty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western Michigan was held in St. Paul's Church, Muskegon, May 17, 1918.

Four clergymen were in attendance. Thirteen parish branches were represented by twenty delegates, three alternates, thirty-six guests and six Diocesan officers, making a total of sixty-nine.

Rev. Walter Tunks was the celebrant at the 9:30 Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev. G. P. T. Sargent, of Grand Rapids. Mr. Tunks gave a very inspiring sermon taking the thought that we should "lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes." Isa. 54: 2.

At 10:30 the Business Meeting was called to order in the church by the President, Mrs. James P. Brayton. After the roll call of branches and a word of welcome by Mrs. Hume, President of St. Paul's Auxiliary, the Diocesan President, Mrs. Brayton, gave a report of what had been accomplished during the past year, laying emphasis on the need of a generous support of the "Bishop's League," to make glad his heart on his return. New branches were organized in Holland and Sturgis. Group meetings were held in St. Paul's, St. Joseph; St. Thomas' Battle Creek, and St. Mark's, Grand Rapids.

The minutes of the Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting were read and approved. Owing to the illness of the secretary, Mrs. F. E. Spraker was serving pro tem.

The President appointed as a nominating committee for the election of officers for the ensuing year: Mrs. C. L. Lane, Grand Rapids, chairman; Mrs. Neil Warren, Marshall; Mrs. S. H. Beardsley, Battle Creek; Mrs. Wm. Wycoff, Holland; Miss Jane Pixley, St. Joseph.

Owing to the absence of the corresponding secretary the report was read by Mrs. Wilkinson. 18 boxes had been sent with a valuation of \$774.21.

Mrs. E. H. Hunting, Treasurer of the United Offering reported \$515.08 on hand toward the Tri-annual offering, to be given in Detroit in 1919.

The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Johnston, recommended the branches to make a greater use of helps to be had from the Mission House and urged that missions be taught more and more in the Sunday Schools. The branch secretaries were requested to send their reports as soon as possible after Easter, thus insuring a more complete report.

Mrs. Sullivan, though absent, reported \$4.00 for The Little Helpers.

Mrs. Hillyer, secretary Church Periodical Club made a plea that the periodicals be sent to engine houses, jails, sanitariums and like institutions.

Noonday prayer was read by the Rev. Lincoln Vercoe.

The nominating committee presented its report submitting the following names for election:

Recording Secretary—Miss Bessie Newell, Kalamazoo.

It was moved and seconded that the report be accepted and the secretary cast the ballot for the election of these officers for the ensuing year. Approved.

Mrs. Hume spoke of the presence of Miss Richmond, after an absence of nine years. It was moved by Mrs. Wilkinson that a rising vote of welcome be given her.

Miss Littell spoke of the value of the United offering. Without it there would be practically no work among the women of China and Japan.

A letter of appreciation was read from Dr. Mary Gleynton for the sympathy shown her by the auxiliary.

Mrs. Ivins and Mrs. Hunting urged the use of the Spirit of Mission in the Sunday Schools.

At 12:30 a delightful luncheon was served in the Parish house by the ladies of St. Paul's, to 75 people.

At 1:30 the meeting was called to order: The Auxiliary presidents were called upon to tell of the work in their branches. All showed growth and were looking forward to a successful year.

The Treasurer's report was most gratifying, being the best report she had ever had the pleasure of giving; \$2091.21 having passed through her hands during the year. An additional pledge of \$75 was made for the "Bishop's League Fund."

Mr. Sargent congratulated the auxiliary on the year's work.

Mrs. Eaglesfield moved and a rising vote was made that letters of love and sympathy be sent to Mrs. McCormick and the two secretaries.

Miss Littell gave a very inspiring talk on missions in China. Her plea was for the Church's General Hospital, Wuchang, China. One hundred (100) dollars was pledged for the hospital.

Mr. Sargent extended an invitation to meet Miss Littell at Grace Church, Grand Rapids, May 21, 2 P. M. He also spoke of the Racine Conference and of the spiritual blessings to be derived from attendance.

Mr. Tunks spoke of the Red Cross, calling it the "Good Samaritan." Through it people were learning the opportunities of service.

A letter was read from the Rev. Harold Holt expressing regrets on his inability to be present.

A vote of thanks was given to St. Paul's for their hospitality.

Mrs. Butterfield extended an invitation from St. Marks, Grand Rapids for the next annual meeting to be held there.

It was moved and seconded that this invitation be accepted.

Meeting adjourned.

Report

Of the Fifth Annual Meeting of the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western Michigan.

The greatest difficulty which presented itself at the beginning of the year was the lack of information about the character of the various activities of the Junior Work, the number and size of the branches, and the manner of organization, etc.

There are now 10 active branches of the Junior Auxiliary in the Diocese—St. Mark's and Grace, Grand Rapids; Holland, Dowagiac, Traverse City, Grand Haven (Akeley Hall), Petoskey, Battle Creek, Hastings, and Manistee.

The box for Christmas 1917 was sent to Corbin, Kentucky, and the box for 1918 sent to Shoshone Indian Mission, in Wyoming.

This year our aim must be to increase the number of branches. Here the problem is one of leadership. Ideally the Junior Auxiliary is only the Sunday School in session on week days to put into concrete expression the ideas instilled through the Sunday Bible Study, and ideally the teacher is the leader of one unit of the Auxiliary.

Have you ever checked up on an Annual Report the number of parishes reporting a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary but no Junior organization and then ask yourself, Why? It is to the Woman's Auxiliary that we most naturally turn for leadership. Are there not some of the younger members of the Auxiliary who will come forward as Junior Leaders?
