DIOCESAN PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1923

When we met a year ago the Triennial Convention to be held in Portland in September was a topic of interest to all.

It is now history and Bishop Gailor says will go down as one of the greatest councils of the Episcopal Church. In speaking of Bishop Tuttle it was said that he was easily the outstanding figure of the Convention.

It was a great source of satisfaction to know that we had our five delegates present at each session of the Woman's Auxiliary meetings until almost the last. I think there were four there until adjournment. You have all heard reports or read them of all the proceedings. No Convention was ever better reported by the newspapers.

The Provincial meeting in Chicago was a thoroughly interesting one, a fine program provided proving inspiring and educational. We had four delegates present at the opening service, Holy Communion at 8:00 o'clock in the morning; this was particularly gratifying, especially if you remember the difficulty in getting our delegates to represent the diocese in the Provincial Meeting in Milwaukee in 1921—after some difficulty we had three there, and one of them, Mrs. G. P. T. Sargent, was elected President of the House of Church Women. She was re-elected last fall for the year 1923.

One matter particularly emphasized was that a diocese which has representatives on the Provincial Executive Board, should see that the

representatives are first elected delegates. Their expenses are met by the province.

Much embarrassment has been caused during the past two years, due to the fact that dioceses have not understood this.

Any officer must be a duly accredited delegate from her diocese which she represents.

Please remember this when electing the five delegates to the Provincial House of Church Women which meets in Toledo the second week in October, 1923.

The Carry-On Fund is to be continued another year and is a ten cent contribution asked from every Church Woman once each year. This is a discretionary fund to be used for emergencies in the province and has been very much appreciated.

There was so much of interest, but I must not take the time now to tell of it.

The first group meeting of the year was held at St. Mark's, Grand Rapids, in connection with the Diocesan Institute, where Dr. Wood spoke for the Nation Wide, and many of the clergy were very enthusiastic about the program he proposed, so because of this only one other group meeting was held during the Fall, that was at Dowagiac. Mrs. Hunting and I went to this meeting. There was a fine attendance from each parish of the group of both women and the clergy. Rev. Harold Holt preached the sermon, and we felt that it had been a day well spent. This group held another meeting in January, at Niles, and Miss Bliss accompanied me there, and the Rev. Mr. Long preached a splendid missionary sermon. Miss Bliss gave a fine talk; and the next one was held at Battle Creek; another at St. Pauls, Grand Rapids; the last at Kalamazoo, making six in all.

On special invitation I visited South Haven, Allegan and Traverse City. The co-operation of the clergy and the women of the diocese contributed to make all of these meetings very satisfactory both in reviving interest in blue boxes and in the general missionary cause, and Study Class plans were adopted by several parishes.

I have written 164 letters, mailed 80 programs, and 80 Annual reports.

In response to the appeal for the Near East Relief Work for which Mr. Wilson spoke at our meeting a year ago, I mailed twenty booklets containing 12 coupons each pledging five dollars, making \$60.00 a year; this fund to support one child in an orphanage in the Near East. Had each of these been filled our diocese would have contributed twelve-hundred dollars. Inasmuch as the money was sent direct to the headquarters I cannot say how much was given in this way. I do know of several who gave and in two instances one woman undertook the task, or shall I say made use of the opportunity for service and not only succeeded in raising the entire sum, but was able to collect a whole barrel of good used clothing. Grateful acknowledgement has been received for all we have given and more than that, we have the joy of knowing that we have done our bit to help this terrible suffering and, as Dr. Jeffries reminds us, that this is the "Inasmuch Way."

The Sliding Scale has been responded to so well that our expenses have been more than met, but can we not increase it, to enlarge our program. Every parish visited was given a new vision of service and responded very well indeed. If more parishes felt that they had a part in this diocesan missionary work would they not themselves experience a renewal of interest and enthusiasm?

The Box Work has been carried out beautifully and our Box Secretary has a splendid report. Much credit is due Mrs. Carney for her untiring patience and devotion to this work. In parishes where

the Church Service League is functioning, the box work has been cared for much more easily than before this plan had been adopted. This is not additional machinery as many seem to think, but a closer co-operation of organizations existing, and succeeding in getting the whole Church interested in the whole work of the Church.

Mrs. McDonald, of Detroit, illustrated this in a very clear way with the segments of a circle, each representing an organization already existing before adopting Church Service League, with their points out and the rector in a corner all by himself. After the adoption of C. S. L. the points are to the center, making a perfect circle, with the rector in the center. Of course, it takes no further explanation to tell you which functions best.

Miss Lindley asks that we adopt the Prayer Partnership plan. This means that each parish adopt a missionary to pray for and to write to. This is to be done in a methodical way, the Church Missions House having a list so that they can give out names of missionaries, avoiding duplication and providing for each one. The program includes interest in laws for prison reform, care of disabled veterans, proper laws for women and children, Christian inter-racial and inter-racial relations, limitations of armaments, and Christian unity.

You will find letter concerning this on the literature table, and I would suggest that you become interested in them.

There is too much in the way of appeals for both gifts of life and money to mention now. This literature giving information will be found on the table and bulletin board.

We must ponder well the solemn thought that to us is entrusted the task of handing down the work, so well formulated and set forth as to reach down a long line of daughters of the Holy Church who shall prove faithful and zealous for years of service, ready to tread in an ever-widening path of duty as the knowledge of God shall spread over the world. To this end let us endeavor to enlist the young women, and be watchful to grasp every opportunity to plead the cause of missions.

MINUTES OF THE FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING

The Forty-Third Annual Meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of Western Michigan was held in St. Luke's Church, Kalamazoo, May 16th and 17th, 1923.

There were about one-hundred and twenty-five present at one or more sessions, including ten Bishops, the Archdeacon, eight Clergymen.

The meeting opened with hymns and prayers and a short address of welcome by the rector of St. Luke's.

The afternoon was devoted to a meeting of the Executive Board and the various groups. Then followed registration and the assignment of delegates to the homes in which they were to be entertained.

The ladies of the parish entertained at a charming informal tea, and here again we had a chance to meet old friends and make new ones.

During the afternoon Archdeacon Vercoe gave an illustrated talk on his work in the small towns, and it was indeed interesting to be able to have a glimpse of the little chapels and churches and their surroundings, and while our Archdeacon always presents his subjects with wit and humour, yet behind there is a sad strain because of the

inability to do all that should be done or could be done if more would work and we would try to work a little harder.

Evening Service was held in the church at 7:30 with full choir. A pleasant feature at this was the confirmation of a class of twenty-five, and a talk by our own Bishop whom we were glad to welcome after his serious illness.

The Rt. Rev. Arthur W. Moulton, Bishop of Utah, gave a splendid talk on his work with several personal illustrations, one of which was about John Martin, a miner who worked in the earth six days of the week and spent the seventh, not fishing, not on the links, but with one hundred boys and girls all assembled in an old house to talk of Jesus Christ. This was the best contribution he could give to American life. The others were similar, some even more interesting.

On Thursday, at 7:30, was held a celebration of the Holy Communion with Bishop McCormick as celebrant, assisted by the Archdeacon and Father Bishop.

The business session opened at 9:30 with prayer by the Bishop.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and accepted.

Greetings were sent to our meeting by the House of Church Women, then in session in Detroit, and the Secretary was instructed to send a telegram to them in return.

The President in her report spoke of the five delegates to Portland being present most of the time and of the difference in the attendance of our delegates to the Provincial Synod held in Chicago as compared with the meeting in Milwaukee. She told of the splendid group meetings held during the year at St. Mark's, Grand Rapids, at Dcwgiaac, Niles, Battle Creek, St. Paul's, Grand Rapids, and at Kalamazoo. Also of visits to Allegan and Traverse City. She also spoke of the improvement in the sliding scale system and in box work done this year.

Mrs. Carney's report in box work was given and accepted, and she thanked the various branches for the splendid way in which they had co-operated with her.

Miss Bliss, the Educational Secretary, gave a short talk on her work; of the visits made to several of the group meetings and to Allegan, and urged every woman in every parish to have a blue box; to see that prayers for missions were offered in every church on Sundays and to see that the time of Auxiliary meetings was spent profitably with all its members doing something definite.

The Treasurer's reports were read and accepted and all branches were asked to have reports in by May first, so that the books may be audited, ready for the annual meeting.

Mrs. Hunting gave her report for the United Thank Offering in her usual charming way.

Mrs. Boltwood reported for the Bishop's League and as Trustee for Akeley Hall.

After all reports had been accepted, we then listened to the address by the Bishop and his plans for the coming year, one of which was help for Miss Vera Gardiner, one of our girls studying at St. Faith's. He spoke of the death of four of our Bishops, of the Memorial to Bishop Tuttle to be erected at Harbor Springs, his summer home; of the National Cathedral at Washington and its connection with Bishop Harding, and of the Memorial Cloister in the Cathedral in Paris.

Mrs. Hunting explained the budget for the year and urged every parish to try to raise the desired amount.

The Emery Fund is to be developed as a Special Fund, as explained by Mrs. Hake, and in future it will be under the supervision of the Diocesan Treasurer.

Notice of the death of Mrs. Harry Older of South Haven, was read, and a card from Mrs. Belden, of Homer, who though unable to be present, sent her best wishes and a gift of money.

Noon-day prayers were said by the Bishop.

The revised Constitution was read by Mrs. Beardsley, Chairman of the Committee. It was discussed, and after a few changes were made, it was accepted for immediate use.

The Nominating Committee submitted the following list as officers for the coming year:

The Secretary was instructed to cast a ballot for these and it was seconded.

The following were elected to act as delegates to the House of Church Women, in Toledo, in October:

Delegates: Mrs. Sargent, Grand Rapids; Mrs. Danhof, Grand Rapids; Mrs. Dibble, Kalamazoo; Mrs. Lewis, Marshall; Miss Bliss, Battle Creek. Alternates: Mrs. Hake, Grand Rapids; Mrs. Allen, Grand Rapids; Mrs. Carney, Kalamazoo; Mrs. Brooks, Marshall; Mrs. Morgan, Traverse City.

A delicious luncheon was served by the ladies and the hour was made merry with singing and speeches by several of the clergymen.

The afternoon sessions assembled at 2:00 p. m. An invitation was read from the branch at Niles to hold the next Annual Meeting there. It was voted to accept the kind invitation.

Mrs. Boltwood, as Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, submitted the following:

“During the past few months, four of our eminent Bishops have been called to give up their work on earth to enter Paradise; Bishop Charles D. Williams, of Detroit, an ardent advocate of the right; Bishop G. Mott Williams, formerly of Marquette, lately in charge of the American Churches in Europe; Bishop Alfred Harding, of Washington; and our beloved and revered Presiding Bishop, Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle. He was and is a great soul, a true Bishop of the Church of God. Of him, as of Lincoln it may be written, that he went ‘As when a kingly cedar, green with boughs, goes down with a great shout upon the hills, and leaves a lonesome place against the sky.’ We regret deeply the passing from our ranks and active service several of our Woman’s Auxiliary workers, who have gone to their eternal rest. May light perpetual shine upon them.

“Resolved: That the Western Michigan Woman’s Auxiliary in Convention assembled, make this testimonial of their appreciation of the wonderful work and faithfulness of these servants of God.

“That this resolution be spread upon our minutes.

It was suggested that the Secretary be informed of deaths during the year.

It was moved and seconded to give twenty-five dollars to Bishop Moulton for use in his work.

Mrs. Wilson, of Chicago, gave a talk on the Daughters of the King. A vote of thanks was given Mrs. Wilson for the work she has done in our diocese in talks and organization of new branches.

Notice of the Summer Conference at Hillsdale was given by Mrs. McCormick.

Mrs. Beardsley, of Battle Creek, gave a talk on Girls' Friendly Work and the growth of the society in the diocese during the year.

Mrs. Foley, of Kalamazoo, gave a splendid talk on Orphanage Work in Syria, and although the hour was late, we were all sorry when the talk was over.

It was decided to use the donation from Mrs. Belden to start the Bishop Tuttle Fund.

The meeting closed about four-thirty, with prayers and benediction by the Bishop. OLIVE S. BEARDSLEY, Secretary.

A meeting of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Kalamazoo in connection with the Group Meeting to arrange for the Annual Convention.

A meeting of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Kalamazoo on the opening day of the Convention. Every member was present.

Mrs. Hunting presented a budget for the coming year and it was decided that it would be wise to try it, providing the delegates to the Convention decided in its favor.

CONSTITUTION

Article I

This Organization shall be called The Western Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

Article II

The objects of this Organization are, by means of united and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence and to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese, to unite existing societies in a common interest and to encourage the formation of new ones where there are none.

Article III

Every woman, by virtue of her baptism, is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary, and may become an active member by payment of yearly dues to her parochial branch.

Article IV

The officers of this Organization shall be a President, one Vice-President, Secretaries and Treasurers, who shall constitute the Board of Managers, and whose duties shall be specified in the By-Laws.

Article V

This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided all branches have been notified of such alteration or amendment two months before the annual meeting.

BY-LAWS

Article I

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of this Organization and Board of Managers. To call special meetings; to arrange for the organization of new parochial branches. To appoint Committees and a Corresponding Secretary and to have general supervision of the work.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall assume the duties of the President in her absence.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of the Organization and Board of Managers. To keep a list of the Parochial Auxiliary Officers and their addresses. To send out notices of meetings. To conduct the correspondence of the Organization and Board of Managers. To furnish reports for the Diocesan paper and to prepare an Annual Report.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to act as private secretary to the President and conduct all necessary correspondence.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Box Secretary to assign the Diocesan allotment to the various branches and to keep an accurate record of such assignments and their values.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Educational Secretary to form classes for missionary study, to train parochial leaders, and by visiting and by distributing missionary information to increase interest in church extension.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all Auxiliary Funds, except the United Thank Offering. She shall present a detailed audited report to be incorporated in the Annual Report.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the United Thank Offering Treasurer to secure United Thank Offering Treasurers in all parishes, to promote interest in the offering and to hold the same until presented at the Triennial.

Article II

Section 1. This Organization shall hold its Annual Meeting in May, on such date as shall be agreed upon by the Bishop and President. The purpose of this meeting shall be the election of officers, of delegates to the Provincial Synod, and General Convention; the reading of reports, and the transaction of necessary business. In addition to the regular business, there shall be such services and programs as shall be arranged by a committee appointed by the President.

Section 2. The Board of Managers shall meet early in the Fall, at the Annual Meeting, and at such other times as shall be necessary.

Section 3. At all meetings of Board of Managers, five shall constitute a quorum.

Article III

Section 1. Officers shall be nominated by a duly appointed committee and elected by a majority of the delegates.

Section 2. The Officers shall be elected for a term of one year and may be re-elected.

Section 3. In case of vacancy in any office, by death or resignation, the office shall be filled by appointment by the President and anyone so appointed shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

Article IV

Section 1. Any Parish organization or mission may become a branch of this Organization by subscribing to the Sliding Scale or by doing any regularly constituted missionary work.

Section 2. Each branch shall be entitled to two votes by duly appointed delegates at the Annual Meeting.

Article V

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided all branches have been notified of such amendment two months before the Annual Meeting.
