CONSTITUTION.

I.

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II.

The object of this society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III.

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V.

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI.

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting.

The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII.

The Treasurer shall take charge of all the money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII.

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX.

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the last Wednesday and Thursday in September.

X.

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

Upon the retirement of our faithful and much beloved secretary, Mrs. M. C. Windsor, her successor, accepted with pleasure, but not without certain misgivings, the duties of the office; which have increased in interest, until she feels a personal regard for each parish branch, and for all the missionaries. The branch contributing from its store of love and sympathy, so much comfort and cheer—gives proof to the true self-sacrificing missionary, that there are unknown friends, who are deeply interested in him, and ever ready to help replenish the "Cruse of Oil."

The splendid boxes sent and the kind letters of interest in mission work, the secretary is constantly receiving, show that many parishes are working with earnestness. Fifty branches were represented by eighty boxes, having a money value of \$4,842.90, \$700.00 of which was sent South in clothing to the colored people, and \$500.00 in clothing to the Indians.


During the year new organizations were formed at Belmont, Clifton Springs, Belvidere, Fredonia, Shortsville, Wellsville and St. Jude's, Buffalo. But, again, there were older branches which failed entirely. A few faithful and generous individuals in the Rochester Archdeaconry increased the helpfulness of the Diocesan work something like \$650.00 of cash contributions.

Not included in these gifts were an altar, altar-cloth, communion linen, chancel carpet and chandeliers for a mission in the Rochester Archdeaconry.

A rag carpet should be cited as the work of ten women—the work of their own hands—willingly doing what they could for the comfort of one other woman in South Dakota.

And from these very people whom we help, may we accept an example of courage and devotion. Through the knowledge and love of God, an Indian gave his time each Monday for fourteen years to the building of a stone church for his people. May we, in building up the work of the auxiliary, give ~~of~~ the best we have and deem it our privilege.

In 1883 a fund was established in the "Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary," called "The Special Fund," to be raised by voluntary offerings of one dollar a year, or more, or less, from every Churchwoman in the Diocese, to meet the appeals of the General Secretary, or other appeals, as for the support of missionary teachers, hospitals, etc.: that these offerings should be over and above regular contributions to missions, or to the necessary money for sending boxes from parishes, but those giving regularly to special appeals are asked to devote a percentage of such offerings to this fund.

The money may be sent to Mrs. D. S. Chamberlain, Lyons, N. Y., Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch, or forwarded to her by the Treasurers of parish societies designated for "The Special Fund." The amount of this fund to be announced at each annual meeting and appropriated by a vote of the delegates to such objects as the officers of the Society, after consultation, shall suggest.

Should any one be willing to make an offering to this fund at any time, it would be gratefully received and be of much assistance to the officers.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

1898—'99.

It is with a distinct sense of thankfulness and encouragement that we submit the report of the "Church Periodical Club" for the past year of 1898-99.

The work is one which needs only a more widespread knowledge of its aims to secure the attention and co-operation it deserves.

Briefly, its purposes are identical with those of all educators, namely, the furnishing of mental and spiritual food to the hungry—to do for the mind what your missionary boxes and barrels do for the body. The work of either alone is but a one-sided charity.

And at what cost is the work being done? Do we merit the criticism so often heard of charitable enterprises that the results do not justify the outlay? I believe there is ample warrant for the statement that in proportion to the expenditure of either time or money the work leads all others in results—material as well as the more far-reaching ones.

In a sense, it has not even the merit of self-sacrifice. We ask you simply for your magazines and books when you have no further use for them, and then, for a comparatively small amount, convert them into sources of the greatest good and pleasure.

It is well nigh impossible for us, who are surfeited with good literature, to realize what a joy the faithfully-sent magazine is to the cultured man or woman, shut out, not alone from the world of men, but from the world of books as well—often voluntarily so, for pure love of his fellow-men. We can not realize what our generous boxes of literature must mean to those miners and fishermen in Nova Scotia, whose reading-room we supply; to the sheep herders of Utah and Wyoming; or to the poor whites, shut in by the mountains of Tennessee, who crawl eagerly into the little school room or mission chapel to have our magazines read aloud to them.

School and hospital and reading-room, soldiers' camp and lowly mission station, whether within the limit of our own Archdeaconry or in foreign fields, the work reaches and embraces them all.

In many instances our gifts have been the only reading matter to reach a community, and it is needless to say that they have proved an untold help and stimulus to the recipient.

It is only recently that a letter of grateful acknowledgement was received from a southern clergyman, in which he stated that there was not a bookstore in his county.

We have in the Diocese forty librarians, the number being exceeded only by New York and Long Island.

During the year but one new name has been added to the list, that of Mrs. G. M. Champlin, of St. James, Hammondsport, N. Y.

We record with regret the resignation of three of our numbers, Miss Hannah J. Baldy, St. John's, Buffalo; Miss Dora Wright, Grace, Lockport, and Miss Nellie White, St. Mark's, Leroy, all of whom have been most faithful in the work.

We would urge upon the Librarians a more general response for the coming year. The contribution may be a personal one or it may be solicited from members of her parish.

It would be ungrateful, I am sure, were I not to allude to the many appreciative letters which are constantly being received and which attest, as nothing else can, the usefulness of the work.

We wish to acknowledge with thanks a large box of reading matter sent by the Woman's Auxiliary of Wellsville, where, although there is no librarian, much interest has been manifested in the work.

In closing I would emphasize again the great good already accomplished by the Society, and urge its needs most earnestly upon your attention.

There are many parishes where we have no representative, where, I feel sure, that were the cause known and understood a ready response would be forthcoming.

The year of 1900 is to be one of renewed effort along many lines of work.

Will not each Librarian endeavor to raise the \$1.00 and by a faithful canvassing of her parish to so increase her list of contributors that the ushering in of the new century may witness a splendid growth in the scope and consequent usefulness of the Club.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

The September Spirit of Missions quotes the following from a letter received by Miss Emery from the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in Southern Florida: "It seems to me the annual report is a most important part of the work in recounting what has been done, and what left undone, during the year just passed. The writing of it stirs the writer to her depths, and inspires to new efforts, whether the report is encouraging or otherwise. In the former case, the thankfulness to our Master for blessing our efforts seems to urge to greater endeavor, as a thank offering, and to open our eyes to broader fields. If on the other hand there is little success to report, one feels fired with zeal to make things different and as they ought to be. This is the effect on the writer, and by God's help it is the same, in a greater or less degree, on the readers of it; and so a wave of new interest and energy circles out from the annual report through time into eternity." As we present this record of another year's united work may we in some measure catch the spirit of this devoted sister in the far South. Our eleventh year has, with the ten preceding ones, its lights and shadows. We cannot number many new branches as has been our pleasure in the past, and we must acknowledge several have apparently died or are at least in a comatose condition. The only comfort, if it can be considered such, is that the sectional heads can partially account for this lifeless state, and it is not without a reasonable cause. The harmony between the various sections increases as the years make us better acquainted one with the other, and our boxes have been filled and our pledges paid with little anxiety on the part of the senders and much pleasure on the part of the recipients. The editor of our junior column has done no begging this year for sums to fill the allotted space. The pleasant accounts of the packing of sectional boxes in which the contributing branches are so cordially invited to assist, the grateful letters from our missionary friends telling often an amusing incident connected with the distribution of the gifts, the occasional reports from our branches of a successful fair, a new plan adopted, and once the sad news of a little junior called to higher work, the warning voice of our Treasurer from time to time that

pledges are still unpaid, all these have taxed our column to its utmost limit, and each month we have known what our juniors were actually doing and what yet remained to be done.

Thirty-four branches united in sending boxes to Archdeacon White, Florida; Rev. Amos Ross, South Dakota; Mrs. N. P. Geoffroy, Beaufort, N. C.; St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C.; Rev. Francis Joyner, Bunyan, N. C. Two branches have in addition sent boxes to special points in which they were interested, and two branches contributed nothing to the sectional boxes, but sent as they themselves desired. The total value of our boxes was \$784.45.

Thirty-one branches have contributed to the five scholarships \$130.50. Exactly this same number contributed last year, being little more than half the societies on our roll call.

We can all congratulate our Treasurer on the splendid report she is able to give us of pledges paid and a balance on hand, but can we rejoice with her unless in some way, be it small or great, we have helped to bring about that result.

The juniors of our Diocese are doing each year better than the last, as we who know the difficulties in the way and the earnestness of the leaders can honestly testify, but let our work be all round, not one sided. Let us unite in the great triennial offering, let us unite in our pledges, let us unite in our boxes, and above all let us unite in our prayers.

"He nobly did a noble deed,

Give recognition now;
That I may know thou dost accept
The work o'er which I've toiled and wept.

REPORT OF LITTLE HELPERS FOR 1899.

"God bless all the Missionaries all over the world and all the Little Helpers" and "Thy Kingdom Come," are the words in my heart as after the twelve o'clock bell rings "The Evangelus," this 8th report is written of the Little Helpers work in Western New York. What does that prayer mean to the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York? What does His Kingdom mean to each one? Are these just words, or are they through the power of the Holy Ghost a living power in our lives? What is going to bring us together as one family of this King, as loyal members of his household, but a hearthstone where we all meet at the twelve o'clock hour, and the education of our little ones, that from Baptism they are made members of His Body, the great Missionary Society, the Church. The purpose of this Little Helpers' Society, organized in 1891 for the little children under ten years of age, has been from the first educational. It is the hot house of the Church where the tender seeds are planted, to grow into the strong, fruit bearing trees. The Little Helpers in Western New York number 500, and their gifts this year for Missions is \$296, and for the seven years over \$1,700. There are several mistakes in the Treasurer's report, owing to the fact that the date of sending gifts was changed from Whit Sunday to Easter. The gifts from the boxes were coming from several Parishes from April until June, instead of from the Parish Secretary as a whole at one time. Changing the date of the Woman's Auxiliary meeting necessarily changed the date for report which is read at that meeting, but two weeks before Easter a postal was sent to each Diocesan Secretary, but as much of the money did not come until Whit Sunday, and the meeting was that week, it was very difficult to keep changing the figures, which were in the hands of the printer. This year the date will be Whit Sunday. Please send amount from boxes promptly Whitsom Monday, and see that the remittances come by express or postoffice order or New York draft. Do not send individual check, as these are always subject to exchange charge. In 1892 our "Little Helpers" only Branch represented by a gift for the United Offering in Baltimore. In 1898, 24 Dioceses and 11 Jurisdictions reported, the work all following in line with the first branch. Its teaching is all found in six simple rules.

This work, as you see, is not for the child alone, but for the parents as well, and the seed planted by the child's hand may bless the whole household, and the Parish that has not yet a Missionary garden of young plants may have new life and beauty by starting this work. The organization is very simple. Only one woman required who will each year collect the money from the boxes, sending to the Diocesan Secretary the amount, number of Little Helpers, and names to be printed in Memorial list. The Parish Secretary keeps the Parish Record of names, the boxes and cards and supplies, all information which she will find in the report published for the Washington meeting. Baptism is the one requirement, and the gift put in with the text or prayer forms a habit that may become a mighty power for good in the child's life, for it is not the amount that we value, although it is doing most beautiful work; it is the teaching of consecration and the interest kindled by the home circle knowing they have a part here and there all over the world in God's Kingdom, Africa, China, Japan, Alaska, Porto Rico and the Indians in five Jurisdictions are touched. The Diocese becomes of interest because we are doing some little thing for some Mission in it. The colored work, with its children in school taken care of, and its Hospital bed, all make the children feel they are a part of the great work, and we grown people like to know just what the Church is doing with our small gifts through our little ones who believe in him. The meetings in Washington of the Diocesan Secretaries was full of meaning and help, and we are uniting each year more and more in our gifts. The Little Helpers support two scholarships of their own, and help the older Juniors greatly with their promises. One of the beautiful parts of the work is the Memorial circle that each year is meaning more to the Church. Boxes are kept by some one who misses a little one here, and each Sunday a gift is put in with a prayer. No matter how many years ago it was, that child is always to us the little one, and to bind the Church Militant and Triumphant in one is one of the beautiful things we hope our Little Helpers may do. Their works to follow them. They have a part in bringing His Kingdom. Their names are remembered each year. I wish we could add to the Parishes and Missions that have this work, those who are too weak yet for the Woman's Auxiliary, and those who have a strong branch but long for new life in the Parish.

Gaylord's little brother is interested in the "Headen moders who don't care for their children," more than in sending his pennies to the little children. Are we not a little like the "headen moders" and Godmothers when we neglect the beautiful opportunity to lead His little ones into all the beautiful influences of life? This teaching now given will never be forgotten. You cannot change older minds,

but little children's minds and hearts are a sacred trust put in our care, and if His little ones believe in Him, in His word, in His Kingdom, the world will be indeed the Kingdom of our Lord. Dear friends, what does this mean to you and me? Have we a real, wholehearted interest in this King and in His Kingdom?
