CONSTITUTION.

I.

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II.

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III.

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V.

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI.

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII.

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII.

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX.

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the last Wednesday and Thursday in September.

X.

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

**REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF
THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE
OF WESTERN NEW YORK.**

September, 1899 to September, 1900.

WE have much to rejoice and be thankful for, in this our twentieth year of Auxiliary work. It has gone on with increasing strength, which did not come alone from the large and older branches,—those gave bountifully from their full store—but it was the many efforts coming in small ways which made the fine result.

One hundred and twenty-three boxes, were reported this year, against eighty last year. Thirteen boxes were distributed in this Diocese; one box to the Soldiers' Hospital, in Manila; and one hundred and nine boxes to the Domestic Field. The total valuation of boxes was \$5,581.62 accomplished by 63 churches, (63 branches). The total amount of money given was \$1,300.90.

The valuation of boxes this year is \$738.72 more than last year.

Over three hundred and sixty letters were received and answered by the Secretary.

There was a great degree of harmony throughout the year's work and many strong cases could be cited. The old fear of clerical suits seemed to be entirely overcome, when one small society, which had thought it could not possibly give a suit, on reconsideration gave two. The clerical suit has always been a dread in the preparation of a box; yet we are requested not to accept a letter which calls for a suit, unless the branch will provide it.

This year our Diocese has the privilege of mentioning two boxes sent by a woman who, though constantly traveling, never forgets her part in mission work.

Another good case was the organization of a small branch in the country which, being asked, not so much for clothing for an Indian school, as for comforts and conveniences for the faithful teachers, sent a whole set of dishes.

The Evening Society of St. Paul's, Buffalo, is one lately organized for those young women who cannot meet afternoons. A large and valuable box is the result.

Another new branch, which may be an example to many a parish, has been the gathering together of about fifty young women at St. Paul's, Rochester. Their first effort was wisely directed to study. Undoubtedly, the probable reason for our increased success this year has been the general seeking for information upon all missionary subjects and informing our minds, intelligently, about what we give our hands to do.

It is a lamentable fact that only one hundred and fifty-eight copies of the "Spirit of Missions" are taken in this Diocese: with its twenty thousand communicants. This is the missionary magazine of the Church and if each parish branch would appoint one person who could well and earnestly present the interests of the "Spirit of Missions", readers and workers would increase.

Miss Emery advises:—"Of our own Auxiliary we are learning that the boxes must take a secondary place, even in the parishes that can do very little and that all new parochial branches should be taught that to pray for missions, to learn about missions and to give money—and as much as they can, not as little—through approved and authorized channels, is their first and important work."

Although the year has brought forth such good results, it is the culmination of years of wise and loving guidance from our president, Mrs. W. L. Halsey, who now retires from active duty, after ten years of faithful and loving service. With release from her labors we wish her renewed strength and the blessing of God.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

September, 1899—September, 1900.

In a recent communication from Miss Emery to the Junior Secretary the following questions were asked : " What special efforts and new departures have been made among the Juniors in your Diocesan Branch, during the past year, along the lines of increase of workers and interest in methods of work and of giving ? " " What special difficulties and discouragements have you met with during the year ? "

How can I better present my annual report to the Woman's Auxiliary than by answering these questions, asked by our general secretary, as when we have considered methods, discouragements, difficulties and encouragements there is little, if anything, left to say. As a Diocese the chief effort to increase interest is the plan tried this year for the first time, the " Missionary Exhibit," which, with the Stereopticon views of missionary subjects, cannot but be an object lesson pleasant to learn and, we trust, difficult to forget. Not only does knowledge of missions lead to belief in them but also to give for them of our money, of our time, of our talents and so we are striving to swell the ranks of the Woman's Auxiliary with educated Juniors ready to undertake intelligently the larger work there waiting for them to do. In our sections, too, this effort to increase interest by increasing knowledge has been attempted more generally than before and the packing of the boxes at Christmas and Easter have been accompanied by a special study of their destination. An encouraging sign among our branches is the almost universal systematic gift of money at each meeting, the greater care in the sewing done and the more ready response to efforts made by the officers to glean information about local branches. Within the past six weeks the Secretary has heard from thirty of our fifty societies and the knowledge of the interesting meetings and successful work has made her acquainted with the methods employed and more deeply interested in the individual members.

Our treasury shows a steady increase. A balance on hand to be voted away at our annual meeting is a pleasure but no longer a surprise. We have yet to consider the question of our difficulties and discouragements. There are not many. Some branches, to be sure, have fallen away, but can we expect among the changes and chances, the ups and downs of every parish life that our Juniors will remain ever firm ?

No, the discouragement seems to be the fact that as yet, while we are sending of our money and giving of our time, we have not given ourselves personally to the work of teaching or healing in the missionary field. In spite of the urgent call for more workers no answer has gone from Western New York, " Send me."

There are five points in which we have a special interest as in each we are represented by a scholarship, St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China, Nara Japan, by Bishop Talbot's School, Shoshone Agency, Wyoming, St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C. and the Emergency Fund or Miss Carter's baby Indians in Minnesota. Towards St. Hilda's our chief attitude must be one of prayerfulness and patient waiting, that in these trying times our ward may be spared suffering and death and that out of the present chaos, order may in time, arise. Of the Nara scholarship we can learn little, but we feel sure that under the two efficient Bishops, who so carefully administer the Church's work in Japan, whatever money is sent is placed where it will do good. Mr. Roberts, of

Shoshone, writes encouraging news of the present holder of the Bishop Coxe scholarship and we hope to have reason to feel as proud of her as of Rebecca, her predecessor, whose escapades on wild horses and with unruly cattle delighted the venturesome among us, while her gentleness with the sick and aged touched all hearts. Our colored girl at Raleigh we know must be doing good work as her being an inmate of Mrs. Hunter's household was a guarantee that she was one able to appreciate any advantage placed in her way. The "Emergency Fund" cannot be represented by one but by the many little Indian children whose hours of sickness have been brightened and we trust also lessened by our gift under Miss Carter's wise direction. Our boxes have been sent as usual west and south. At Christmas to the Rev. Philip Delonia, Standing Rock Reserve, the Rev. Joseph Cook, Santee Reserve, South Dakota, and Archdeacon Pollard, Raleigh, North Carolina. In the spring to Sister Mary Francis, Atlanta, Georgia, Rev. J. J. Perry, Brunswick, Georgia, Rev. F. W. Wey, Waynesville, North Carolina, and Rev. John Roberts, Shoshone Agency, Wyoming. All have been gratefully acknowledged and in several cases a pleasant correspondence was carried on between the Sectional Head and the missionary during the weeks the box was being prepared. In addition to these six boxes others were sent to different points of various branches, one of these, St. Luke's, Rochester, deserving special mention, as the special gifts made were *in addition* to work done through the Sectional Head. The total money value of the boxes from the Diocese was \$746.32. Twenty-eight branches contributed to the scholarships \$148.20. Four new branches have been started during the year, one in the "Church of the Epiphany," Rochester, a boys' branch in Le Roy, another boys' branch in the Ascension, Rochester, and a branch in Belvidere.

Our Juniors are far from being isolated societies but are closely bound together first in the section where the Head knows personally each leader and often many of the members, then in the Diocese where the Secretary is interested and kept informed by her fellow officers of the efforts made and accomplished, and over all of us has been for twelve years the watchful eye of our beloved President, ever ready to advise, quick to encourage, slow to reprove. Can it be wondered at if, as we look over the past and remember that the mother of our infancy cannot continue the mother of our youth, we sever with sad hearts those ties which have bound us so delightfully together? Yet while lovingly acknowledging our debt to her who has led us thus far, we feel that in no way can we show better the lesson she has taught us than by ever offering to the Woman's Auxiliary that loyalty due from a faithful child.

REPORT OF BABIES' BRANCH

For 1899-1900

FOR the past eight years, it has been the custom of the Babies' Branch to have a report read before the Woman's Auxiliary at the Sectional meeting in June, because the time is so fully occupied at the annual meeting in September; but as so few of the Mother Society hear it at that time, it seems best to make it very short, and bring it before you in connection with the Junior Auxiliary, as it is the Kindergarten of that society.

We have always been a self-supporting Branch, asking no aid from the older societies, except your love and co-operation; and we are ready, though very little Helpers, to do our part for the work of the whole. Our Diocese stands in a peculiar position of trust. We are responsible to God and to the Church for a very sacred work, for as the Branch was planted here and grows so fast, all eyes are watching for the fruit. We must see that the fruit has the right sunshine and care. As leaders, we must not fall behind, but hold up the highest ideals of consecrated giving, -of making the Lord's Day more sacred to our little ones, who believe in Him through us, and of habitual prayer for Missions, so the next generation may see a new era in its Christian men and women.

Four hundred and twenty-five Little Helpers sent in their pennies this year, and their gifts amounted to \$319.74. Thirty-eight Parishes were represented in this gift; eleven other Parishes which have the Branch were not heard from this year. You can read in the report how this amount was divided. The Indian work was remembered in six Jurisdictions. Cannon Ball, N.D.,

received the most, as that bell and tower is the thank-offering from all the Little Helpers for Gaylord's work. Our little Japanese boy, whom we started in an Orphanage in 1892, has now entered St. Paul's College, Tokyo, wanting to give his life as a Catechist, because so awed by the prayers and care of the Babies of the Church in Western New York. Each year a font is given to a Mission in the Diocese in one of the Archdeaconries, with a gift of \$10.00 for the other sections of the Diocese. We send \$10.00 each year to Raleigh, N.C., which takes care of two little colored children in St. Augustine School, and we call this "The Little Helpers Scholarship." Five dollars also is sent for the support of the bed in St. Agnes Hospital at the same place, under Mrs. Hunter's care. This bed for a little colored child was bought and furnished by all the Little Helpers, and is supported by them as a united work. There are now over eight thousand Little Helpers. Twenty-six Dioceses and ten Jurisdictions are represented, all having the same prayer, text, rules and box, and uniting every three years in the same work. You will be interested to hear we have at last found a red wooden box that will not break. The paper box will be given up next Spring.

The Babies' Branch is going to miss every moment the sympathy of our President, Mrs. Halsey, who has always been so loyal to this little Branch since it started. Will the new officer be as tender of the green bough?

I am going to ask the mothers if they won't help us more this year, by seeing that the gift is put in on Sunday, with *reverence*, with regularity, with joy, so that the child may feel it is a pleasure and a privilege to you. Children feel our interest, and know whether we are in earnest. It is one new duty added to a mother's life; but what she teaches her child in one moment will last for a lifetime, and it only takes that time once a week on His day. Let this be one of the sweet, sacred things of that day that the child associates with you. We don't need or want the money half as much as the education; and the child will never know the beauty and joy of consecrated giving if you put it all in the week the box is called for. And here let me ask that you will help the Parish Secretary in gathering her gifts, so she may send them on Whitsun Monday, as the delay makes the letter come so late, and makes the work so difficult. Open the box with your child, so the little one may see its gift. Talk about it. Take the trouble to read over the letter sent back, and pray yourself from your heart, "God bless all the Missionaries all over the world, and all the Little Helpers," and the work will continue to grow and have His blessing; and all the ends of the earth shall know and believe in Him, through His little ones who have been taught, through you, to believe in His name, His promise, His Word, that it cannot fail.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

For 1899-1900

IN reviewing the work of the "Periodical Club" for the past year, I am impressed more and more with its value, not only as a means of providing mental rest and recreation, but as a powerful educational factor in the life of the Church to-day.

Side by side it stands with the work of our Sunday Schools and Colleges and of the Ministry itself, its mission to supplement and strengthen their efforts, or to penetrate into isolated corners of the earth, there to be the only source of mental and spiritual stimulus, the one uplifting and enlightening influence.

In making my appeal today, I would emphasize the fact that we have not fulfilled our whole "duty to our neighbor," when we have supplied his merely physical needs. That charity is a beautiful one which warms and clothes a man, but it is shortsighted if it stops there. We do as much as that for the "beasts that perish!" Our brother surely deserves more at our hands. To meet the wants of the physical nature merely, without a corresponding nourishment of the mind and soul is to provide material for our prisons. It is supplying *strength* and *power*, but denying the intelligence to direct them.

We, members of the "Woman's Auxiliary," stand to-day as exponents of the doctrine of man's duty to man.

We can not afford to neglect the crying need of mental food, wherever our efforts extend. No Auxiliary is doing its *whole* duty without its Librarian for the collection and distribution of reading matter: no box should ever be sent without its share of uplifting literature. There are parishes represented here to-day, where I regret to say, we have no workers. I trust that the officers of such Auxiliaries will find it possible to appoint one of their number to the not arduous duties of Librarian, remembering that no effort is too small to offer, and that the addition of but one periodical to our list is not to be despised.

I appeal further to individuals among you. There must be few present who could not send a magazine or paper to some one less fortunate than herself.

Three or four cents a month and three or four minutes of time will be the source of such pleasure as *we* have never experienced, who have not, as one of our recipients puts it, "been starved for something to read."

Think of your magazine, perhaps carelessly or little read, being the *only* one to reach a town; of it's being passed from house to house, read aloud to eager listeners, then carried on by traveling missionaries or lay-workers. The field is wide. You may send to a friend within the bounds of your own parish, to the far west, or to foreign lands. You may send to clergyman or mission worker; to hospital school or prison; to bed-ridden sufferer; to soldier or sailor; to rough miners and fisherman; to the cow-boys of Texas, or the mountain whites of Tennessee.

There is no limit to the scope of the work, as there is no limit to its possibilities.

In response to an appeal from the General Secretary, slips have been sent to the various librarians, requesting each to appoint a sub-treasurer in her parish, (or else take it upon herself) to solicit yearly subscriptions for the work of the society. Encouraging replies were received from many of the librarians, and although the amounts have not all been sent in, about \$18.00 has been collected up to this time.

The need for funds is most urgent, for the expenses of the General Office. I therefore urge upon you a contribution, however small, for that purpose.

During the year one new Librarian has been added to the list, Miss Florence Sheldon, of Christ Church, Albion, and the following have been appointed to fill vacancies: Miss Sallie Cary, Batavia, N. Y.; Mrs. S. D. Gilbert, Leroy, N. Y.; Mrs. John Vanderburgh, Jamestown, N. Y.; Mrs. Geo. S. Sheppard, Penn Yan, N. Y.

"Can you imagine yourselves living where you have no congenial society or companions, no Church, lectures or entertainments of any description, and with just enough "siller" in the stocking toe for the absolute necessities of life, with a hungry longing for books and magazines to pass away the long, lonely afternoons and evening?"

If you *can* imagine yourselves in such a condition, you would have a faint idea of how we appreciate the large box of magazines just received from you. I can not, with a *pen*, tell you how much we appreciate them and the kindness of the Club."

A clergyman from *Texas*, to whom a package of books was sent says, "I have not been able to buy a book for five years."

A Lieutenant writes from the *Philippines* "I am most truly grateful for the barrel of books sent to the marines by the C. P. C. and there is nothing that the men appreciate quite so much as gifts of this kind.

There are absolutely no amusements of any sort here, and if it were not for the reading matter that they get from the States the men would find their duty at this station unbearable."

THE Comfort Club for the Archdeaconry of Buffalo has had a prosperous year, although the report shows a slight falling off in the number of members, as well as the amount of contributions.

This is partly due to the fact that some who were enrolled last year,

have become active members of Auxiliary branches, while others have neglected to send the small amount of dues. Three parishes have contributed for the first time, and many individuals availed themselves of this opportunity to provide funds for the purchase of clerical suits. A box containing an excellent coat and vest (partly worn) also other articles suitable for a clegyman was sent in December to a Western parish and was very acceptable, as a promised box had been delayed.

A clerical suit was purchased and sent at Easter, accompanied by articles suitable for a clegyman's family and in both cases letters were received gratefully acknowledging the donations and thanking the Comfort Club for its timely assistance.

The Woman's Parish Society of St. Peter's Church, Niagara Falls, through their Secretary, Mrs. W. B. Bennett, sent a generous contribution of five dollars which helps to increase the balance in our treasury.

The articles collected have helped to fill various boxes and are in constant demand.

The success of the club is in a large measure due to faithful service of women in the several parishes who solicit churchwomen to become members and collect articles and money.
