Directions for Parish Secretaries and Treasurers.

1. The Corresponding Secretary of the Diocese has on hand letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools. Write to her for such letters when your branch is ready to begin work.
2. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Corresponding Secretary know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish.
3. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Corresponding Secretary immediately after a decision, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay.
4. Parish Secretaries must also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box and from whom.
5. Secretaries will please send, as soon as the box has been despatched, a statement of its money value to the Corresponding Secretary.
6. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent promptly to the Recording Secretary of the Diocese for publication in the Manual. (A type-written list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)
7. All items of money should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer except those of the United Offering, which go to Mrs. White, the Treasurer of that fund.
8. Semi-Annual collections are desired for the United Offering.

CONSTITUTION.

I.

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II.

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III.

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V.

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI.

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII.

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII.

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX.

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the last Wednesday and Thursday in September.

X.

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

Report of the Corresponding Secretary.

1901-1902



N our last annual report we recounted the work accomplished in such increased measures that we were astonished at the good results ; but with the opening of the new year a reaction came, and we seemed, at first, to rest under an apathy. This caused the officers much anxiety, and it seemed as if we must fall way below the high standard previously attained, because a number of branches accepted no work whatever, then two or three disbanded entirely, and only a few new ones were organized.

We sent no foreign box, but did send the usual ones to the Indian and Colored Missions, and to clergymen's families. In that mysterious way which no man may comprehend, the small beginnings gathered strength and at the end of this, the twenty-first year of organized work, our anxieties were suddenly swept away by the branches reporting again, even over the increased thousand dollars of last year ; so that the sum total for our box valuations for 1902 equals \$6,875.88.

You may remember that at our annual meeting last fall, a letter was read from our own Bishop asking if we could not give one thousand dollars to mission work in this Diocese. This request was received with regret, because we felt our inability. We were already pledged to the Board of Missions for one thousand dollars for Foreign or Domestic work ; and we felt that an additional thousand for the Diocese of Western New York was an utter impossibility. However, we decided to pledge fifty dollars in money ; and then a branch here and there sent boxes of clothing to clergymen and Indians in this, our home field ; until now we can show our figures to have reached the unexpected amount of \$976 given in boxes to Diocesan work. We have never equaled this before. This only proves to us all, how little the part we individually play amounts to us ; but in that strange and unaccountable way, the *increase* is moulded into our meagre efforts, and we feel it is all of God.

One of the most noted events, of missionary interest, took place in our Diocese last December—the conference at Rochester of the missionary leaders of our church from Alaska, Japan, China, Brazil, and also the Domestic Jurisdictions—giving us a week of most intense interest and instruction.

Connected with this conference was the missionary exhibit, conducted by the women from various branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. Here were exhibited articles of workmanship from all foreign countries where we have mission stations, and crafts and needlework from the colored and Indian stations, with additional information regarding the lives and work of the missionaries.

One exhibit, in particular, seemed to stimulate the sluggish mind and at once awaken an interest in the possibilities for work at home, and that was the "Ideal Missionary Box." The new and beautiful articles displayed were all ready to be packed and sent to some expectant clergymen's family, in a barren Western town, calling forth many a remark that "I did not know a missionary box was so lovely" !

Each afternoon of the exhibit there was the pleasant social meeting, and also addresses from some of our best informed women—one of whom, Mrs. Edward P. Hart, a rare and spiritual mind, has recently been taken to her Heavenly Home.

And now with thankful, but sad hearts, we turn our thoughts to one of the founders of this society. She who, in 1881, assumed the cares of a new organ-

ism, launching the new work upon a new field, lived to see this work grow, ripen and increase—Mrs. Quinby, our first Diocesan President, entered into life immortal last Easter Monday.

During this past year some of the Diocesan officers have had the privilege of visiting in person a few branches. This was of the greatest pleasure and advantage to the officer—thus learning of the struggles sometimes, or of the fine results, or again of the misdirected efforts of an interested body of women doing the best they could. “How shall they learn without a teacher?”

Our Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary has become splendidly systematized for such a large society—yet, with its parish officers so frequently changing and thus losing the thread of continuity.

There are still parish branches which do not fall in line with the others but prefer to take their own judgment in the matter of selecting a place for their gifts rather than accept the guidance of our efficient leader, Miss Emery.

She stands in the center of all the fields of labor for Missionary work of our church. Naturally, if she asks Western New York to accept certain work she knows what other Dioceses are doing, and where our efforts can be of the most service. Instead of a branch giving of its little, here or there, if we concentrate our combined forces upon one object, the results are naturally greater.

This was done surprisingly well last winter. Miss Emery requested Western New York to supply all the needs of clothing for the Indians under the care of Miss Taylor of Nevada. She was formerly a Rochester girl, and has given, for the past ten years, her life to Christianizing the Indians. We sent her eleven fine boxes.

Again, for a hospital for colored people in North Carolina where they depend entirely upon their friends' generosity, Miss Emery asked Western New York to supply all of their needs; and as many boxes of clothing were sent them, also with the addition of a large assortment of new surgical instruments.

And so our year, which began with so many excuses, for lack of interest, has fought a good fight, and we can say with thankful hearts: “Blessed be the name of the Lord who giveth us the victory.”

Annual Report of the Junior Auxiliary.

September, 1901—1902.



N these days when nature is so earnestly and intelligently studied, how many of our bird lovers have watched with anxious eyes the little mother patiently guarding the eggs during the lovely spring days, and when the fluttering helpless creatures with their shrill cry have rewarded her for her constancy, hastening early and late to supply the ever insistent demand for food. Later when full summer was upon us, how many have felt the shock which involuntarily came when we saw that loving mother of a month before sometimes rudely push her little ones out of the warm nest, or fly before them as they sat shivering on a rocking branch, temptingly displaying the food so longed for, but not to be received until the first flight into the world was taken. Poor little silly birds, I know we thought, so much is before you, try your wings.

Have any of our older Juniors been conscious during the past twelve months of a gentle shove out from our midst? Have they for a moment felt,

are we not wanted? If so, do not imagine we are less interested than when you were the little members of our little world, but look out from the nest and take the first short flight, sure of the welcome waiting ready to be extended you.

Our small work has been faithfully done and today we present it for reception as the honest effort of an earnest child.

The greatest pleasure of the year came at the beginning, when we were able to again associate with the Junior Auxiliary the name of our first president, and placed in the Cape Mount School, Africa, the Helen Halsey scholarship. For a second time we felt our increasing strength when for Easter Miss Emery asked us to attempt the difficult task of supplying the wants of St. John's School, Fort Bennett, South Dakota. The requirements were not all fulfilled, but each branch had redeemed its promise to its Sectional Head, and, best of all, the Indian girls had become known to us not only by measure of waist and length of limb, but also through the poetical letters they had written. How could one fail to feel interest in Marcella Four Bears when she wrote: "When the pleasant flowers and tender grasses grow, and summer breezes blow, we shall wish to gather flowers for you and decorate your room though you are not here," and when the news came that because of the discontinuance of government supplies the school must be closed, how our hearts ached for the brave bishop, the noble principal and the girls no longer under their wise care.

The Geneva Section sent its Easter box to Archdeacon Russell, Laurenceville, Va., and today we hold in our hands his last appeal for help, turning to us in his distress as to a trusted friend. From the head of that Section his cry is echoed and his earnest words, "we have worked for him so long; I feel very badly about his work; perhaps some might take an interest in him;" prove the vital interest our boxes inspire.

At Christmas we sent gifts to Archdeacon White, Jacksonville, Fla., and to the Rev. Wm. J. Cleveland, Pine Ridge, South Dakota. In Mr. Cleveland's letter of acknowledgement he said "Mrs. Cleveland desires to have the Juniors of St. Jude's know that their nice sofa pillow will remain in the mission house for her own and the comfort of her guests." Hardly had the Christmas fragrance faded when we read that this new friend had passed to her reward. And so the stitches faithfully taken at our parish meetings have, during the twelve months, drawn us closer together as members of the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese; and then as our work has gone out on its mission, it has taken our hearts with it, to Bishop Hare and Mr. Russell as they bravely face financial problems and to Mr. Cleveland, as without the loving companion of many years he goes on alone.

Our treasury, as usual, shows a surplus in spite of the added obligation, and this year, with our consent, one scholarship was paid in full by one society, St. Mary's, Buffalo.

Three new branches have been reported, and not to our knowledge have any succumbed to that fatal disease, inaction. Forty-three branches have contributed to the boxes, the total valuation being \$781.84.

The treasury received for the six scholarships from thirty-five branches \$186.04, and in addition to this seven branches have contributed to the church at Irving, N. Y. \$45.05, two have sent to the Rev. Dudley Powers \$25.00 and one to a special scholarship \$40.00, making a total of money given \$296.09.

The box packings with their social gatherings have been more largely

attended than ever, and the half day devoted to our annual meeting will for the future be a necessity.

And so in the hope that our efforts may find approval we hand our report to the Senior branch of our auxiliary work.



Report of the Babies' Branch.

1902.

NE of the greatest growths in the history of our "Babies' Branch" for the report of 1902 is the realization of the Woman's Auxiliary of the importance of their kindergarten. This is giving to the work new meaning and new power as the annual meeting where the gifts of his little ones are offered becomes a memorable time in the Parish History. Many parishes are realizing this and are entering into the plans, and it is a great blessing to the big people as well as the "Little Helpers," for it is an object lesson in the offering of gifts which we may do well to consider. Here are gathered old and young together—there is the rector giving his time for this education, and learning to know the lambs of his flock and showing his true sympathy in their work. There are the women who love the church and realize these plants are to furnish the church with fruit-bearing trees. There stands the great Alms Basin made as beautiful as possible, with open arms, waiting the loving gifts of the children, and to this come the children themselves, laying their boxes in together. The little baby with the mother's hand helping, and all together saying the prayer of little Gaylord: "God bless all the Missionaries all over the world and all The Little Helpers." The sending out of boxes and bringing them or sending them back is one way of doing the work, and for a year or two when the work is new, brings back rich gifts; but as *education* is our watchword, the important thing is not the amount received, but the learning to more fully understand the spirit of the offering. If we can teach our little ones in bringing their offering something of the delight of presenting a gift, have we not grown in spiritual things? The important question in the eyes of the world is the growth of an organization. God looks at the work so differently; but this year we have cause to be very thankful while there is a new tenderness and love for the Babies' Branch, because of all that it has given us, all that it has given the church everywhere. From the Little Helpers' boxes of Western New York, we received in June \$340.00—\$8.11 added since that date—\$75.00 a special, making a total of \$423.00.

For boxes, Leaflets, Second General Report, and *The Little Letter* sent to every child and Diocesan secretary—to say nothing of postage, express, and our part—\$5.00—for the printing of the Annual Report of Western New York. Our expenses are great for we are not working for Western New York alone, but hold a trust to the whole Babies' Branch of the Church. For the United Offering we have \$18.00. \$10.00 of this laid aside in June and the other has come in since the *Little Letter* was sent out. All late gifts are put into this offering as it is so broad in its possibilities. This \$8.00 was from the Missions of Belmont, Belfast, Friendship, and another late box from Belvidere. St. Paul's, Rochester, added \$1.00, and from a memorial kept by our Deaf Mute Missionary, Mr. Dantzer, and in memory of Lulu Severence Phelps.

The Babies' Branch of Western New York has given for Missions in ten

years \$2,820.15. There are forty-three Diocese or jurisdictions now working with us. We now support as a Diocese a Scholarship in St. Paul's College, Tokyo, Japan, two children in the Kindergarten of St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C., Help the Junior Auxiliary in their six pledges and each year give a font to our own Diocese. We also help the other Diocese in supporting a bed in St. Agnes Hospital and two day schools in China—one in Wuchang and the other in Shanghai.

Now let me speak a moment of our Indian Church, at Irving, N. Y. where we have given so *much thought*, such *earnest prayers* and where our little ones have so richly given this year. It is now doubly dear to us for Angelica Church Hart was the one who gave the "Hand Book," the "Wooden Boxes," "Secretary Prayer," and who took us there for this work. This has made the work more sacred, for the window now being prepared for the Altar, whose picture you all know in your letter, is to be in memory of her. The grape vines speak of the givers, "The Babies' Branch." The Lamb stands for the name of the Church. "The Good Shepherd," with the Cross, and in place of the banner there is to be a white lily because of her lines written when only twelve years old:

"In her hand a cross she beareth,
Radiant with Heavenly Light,
And a Lily, this completeth
All her armour for the fight."

The Font, the Vases, the Prayer Desk, the Alms Basins are all waiting with the date "All Saints Day 1902" upon them. The Indians are ready to do their work—\$75.00 outside of boxes has been given by the "Little Helpers" Through the little barrels from personal friends both in and outside the Diocese, the Sunday Schools and other organizations, the penny with God's blessing has become \$245.00. This amount has passed through my hands outside the personal memorial gifts for *furnishing* the Church. Has *everyone* in Western New York a few pennies *at least* in the *first* Indian Church in the Diocese just as a matter of history if *nothing else*? If not give one penny to-day. The children have done their part. The window and the prayer desk are in memory of the consecrated woman, Angelica Church Hart, and the little child, Gaylord Hart Mitchell, who have made the Babies' Branch what it is with God's blessing, and are "specials," for even if our hearts are very full and our cup flowing over we must not take from the red boxes. *This Church* is the *overflow* of Thanksgiving and a Memorial to *our Saints of God*. Who will come forward *to-day* and help us to make All Saints Day, 1902, a day of remembrance, indeed of how much God has done for us, that these Indians may feel, "A Little Child shall lead them."

Report of the Comfort Club.

1901—1902

THE Comfort Club, Archdeaconry of Buffalo, has had but fifty-two members enrolled for the year ending September, 1902. Ten parishes have been represented; Trinity, St. Mary's, St. Luke's, St. John's, All Saints', Ascension, St. Barnabas', St. Clements, and Chapel of the Holy Innocents, Buffalo, and Christ Church, Cuba, N. Y. The articles contributed have been found useful in the boxes sent out by different churches, for which fifty have been furnished, leaving a number on hand.

The receipts for the year, amount to \$15.45, to which \$1.66 the balance on hand at the close of last year is added making a total of \$17.11 in the treasury.

No clerical suit has been sent as funds have not been sufficient, but it is hoped to have enough to purchase one during the Autumn.

Efforts to form branches of the club in the small parishes outside of Buffalo, where it should be extended have so far been ineffectual.

Two of the parishes contributing this year do so for the first time and it is hoped several may be added during the coming year.

Report of the Diocesan Treasurer of the United Offering

1902.

IN making this my first annual report for the United Offering work I feel greatly encouraged. Last November I sent out one hundred and four leaflets of my own, enclosing "The story of the United Offering," knowing that the little leaflet could explain and answer all questions regarding our work. In May I sent out notices to all Treasurers asking for semi-annual collections in all parishes wishing to make two collections.

In August I sent postals asking for the annual collection before the Auxiliary meeting in Buffalo. Fifty-three responded with money, several replied they could do nothing now, but hoped to do something next year.

I had hoped to see the name of every parish in the Manual, even if the offering was small. The small amounts so often represent much more sacrifice on the part of the giver than checks from our large parishes. Let no treasurer be discouraged if she can not send what she would like, gather in the pennies and the dollars will soon come.

In regard to semi-annual collections it seems to me we gain by it not only in additional money but in increased interest. It is like everything else we do, the nearer home we come the more enthusiasm.

Treasurers will receive a notice in May for the June meeting, and another one in August for the September meeting, and they can collect as seems best for their parish.

During the past year I have forwarded to Miss Emery orders for nearly one thousand boxes in addition to those already in hand. This means much increase of interest.

The Special Fund.

N 1883 a fund was established in the "Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary" called "The Special Fund," to be raised by voluntary offerings of one dollar a year, or more, or less, from every churchwoman in the Diocese, to meet the appeals of the General Secretary, or other appeals, as for the support of missionary teachers, hospitals, etc.; that these offerings should be over and above regular contributions to missions, or to the necessary money for sending boxes from parishes, but those giving regularly to special appeals are asked to devote a percentage of such offering to this fund.

The money may be sent to Mrs. D. S. Chamberlain, Lyons, N. Y., Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch, or forwarded to her by the Treasurers of parish societies designated for "The Special Fund." The amount of this fund will be announced at each annual meeting and appropriated by a vote of the delegates to such objects as the officers of the Society, after consultation, shall suggest.

Should any one be willing to make an offering to this fund at any time, it would be gratefully received and be of much assistance to the officers.
