*To the Members of the Western New York
Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary:*

This brief account of our pledges to the Board of Missions has been revised for the present year's work, and brings the latest news from the various objects we are to assist.

It is hoped that this may give to parish branches not only a clearer knowledge of the work which we are helping on, but also a sense of greater responsibility in faithfully fulfilling the obligations which we have assumed.

As it is important that the branches of the Auxiliary know which of their appropriations help the work the Board of Missions has undertaken for the year, it will be stated at the beginning of each paragraph whether that pledge helps the Board or is a "Special."

(1) DeLancey School, Geneva, N. Y.

SPECIAL PLEDGE, \$100

This scholarship was founded in 1893. It has been given annually to this school to assist in the support of a clergyman's daughter from the Diocese of Western New York, thereby enabling the beneficiary to receive an admirable education at reduced rates. The school itself grants \$250 towards the education of this candidate.



(2) Training School, Shanghai, for Native Bible Women.

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD \$85

The object of this school which was built in 1896, is the training of native deaconesses or Bible women, who "visit from house to house, teaching

other women the blessed truths of the Christian religion, preparing them to give an answer to their heathen opponents, and fitting them to carry comfort to the sick, afflicted and dying." The course of instruction, which covers two years, includes industrial as well as religious training and the graduates are distributed among the various stations of the mission.



(3) Lawrenceville, Va., St. Paul's Colored Normal and Industrial School.

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD,
\$125

This school was founded by Archdeacon Russell in 1888, without a penny. It was purely a venture of faith. Today it owns property worth \$100,000 and over five hundred pupils are enrolled this fall. The Industrial Department teaches twenty-four different trades. It is largely dependent upon the support of church people, as the state constitution now taxes institutions like St. Paul's that sell their products in the community in which the school is located, and also forbids their taking contracts for buildings, etc. Current expenses have been met heretofore from these sources.



(4) Bishop Graves' Life Insurance.

SPECIAL PLEDGE, \$50

The earliest concerted work for Foreign Missions that was planned in the Woman's Auxiliary was the insurance of the married missionaries. As Bishop Graves went to China from our Diocese, it seems suitable that his insurance should come from here.

(5) Miss Babcock's Salary, Japan.

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD,
\$150

Miss Babcock's work still lies in Aomori, 450 miles north of Tokio, a city of about 17,000 inhabitants where we have a chapel and parish building established in 1893. Miss Babcock's work consists in teaching the day school, Sunday School, and night school, as well as a training class for Bible women. The work has been extended from Aomori to the new station, Hachinohe, 75 miles away, and Miss Babcock visits there also. It is pleasant to know that after twenty years' faithful service as a missionary, Miss Babcock returns to her work from her recent furlough well and strong. Bishop McKim says that she now speaks the language admirably.



**(6) "John G. Webster" Scholarship,
St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China.**

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD,
\$50

St. Hilda's is the only boarding school for Chinese girls in the whole Hankow district. It is supported by scholarships of \$50 each, and there are about fifty pupils. The scholarship that we support was founded in Palmyra, in 1888, and took its name from a former rector of that place.



**(7) Miss Taylor's Work, Pyramid Lake,
Nevada.**

SPECIAL PLEDGE, \$200

Miss Taylor is the only woman worker among the Piute Indians in the Jurisdiction of Sacramento. Church services are regularly maintained from September first to July first. Since the chapel was

opened, about seven years ago, two hundred have been baptized, sixty have received Christian burial, and ten marriages have taken place in the chapel, the first Christian marriages in the tribe. Since the first year the Lenten offerings have been given for general missions.

Bishop Moreland says that Miss Taylor's work is "spiritual, permanent, and blessed."



(8) Miss Francis' Salary, S. D.

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD,
\$100

In South Dakota the church does its greatest work for Indians. One of the largest and best of its mission boarding schools is St. Elizabeth's for boys and girls at Standing Rock Reserve. Bishop Hare is the president, and Miss Mary S. Francis, principal. There are about sixty pupils, who are given Christian home-training and a practical education.



(9) Memorial to Mrs. Lloyd Windsor, School at Wusih, China.

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD,
\$100

In the great walled city of Wusih, in September, 1901, a mission was started in a rented building, fitted up as a day and boarding school for boys. It is notable that the Chinese gentry helped greatly in this enterprise, showing that, though not Christians, they value the church's educational work. The school which is in Mr. Mosher's care is in a flourishing condition, and a suitable school house has now been built. Mrs. Lloyd Windsor was president of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York for several years, and the memorial marks her long service and great generosity.

(10) **Indians on the Cattaraugus Reservation.**

SPECIAL PLEDGE, \$50

The work on this reservation, thirty miles southwest of Buffalo, was started at Irving, in May, 1900, and has gone on steadily under our Archdeacon and Mr. Thomas Clough. In May, 1903, a second mission, known as the Church of the Redeemer was started among the pagan Indians in Newtown, ten miles away. During the past winter Miss Bedell has had a service each Sunday at this mission with an occasional visit from the Archdeacon. As a result there have been eighteen baptisms, while at Irving there have been ten baptisms, and five confirmations, making in all since the work began seventy-nine baptisms and twenty-two confirmations.



(II) **Work at Cape Mount, Africa.**

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD,
\$100

The mission at Cape Mount consists of the Irving Memorial Church, St. John's School for boys in the Langford Memorial Building, and the teachers' cottages. The school for girls has been removed to Clay-Ashland. There are eighty boys in the school under Mr. Matthews, who has no white assistant, and who broke down last year under the strain. Miss Mahoney took back with her a ready framed house for her dispensary work, and Bishop Ferguson is to have another woman helper, Miss Ridgely, who will be supported by the United Offering that we have just made.

(12) Church for the Cattaraugus Indians
SPECIAL PLEDGE, \$100

This pledge is given to Mr. Clough to use for church purposes, at either Irving or Newtown as he thinks best. The former, the Church of the Good Shepherd, now finished including the pews, neat and beautiful in every respect, is a source of honest pride to all who labored for it. In Newtown an old loghouse has been used this winter, and it is hoped that a suitable chapel may soon be built.



(13) Mrs. Folsom's Salary, Honolulu.

PLEDGE TO HELP THE WORK OF THE BOARD,
\$100

Mrs. Folsom is now in charge of the mission work at St. Mary's, Machichi, a suburb of Honolulu where many Chinese live. She has here a sewing-school, night-school and Sunday-school. Bishop Restarick says of her. "Mrs. Folsom has varied gifts, and I have made use of her in many ways. I do not know what we should have done at times if she had not been here. I put her here and there as I needed some one, and at times she has had work in three schools at once. But while I had her in the school she was all the time longing to get into the real primitive missionary work among the Chinese or Japanese. The people of Honolulu have a high opinion of Mrs. Folsom."



(14) Deaconess Sands, Honolulu.

SPECIAL GIFT, \$150

When Deaconess Sand went from Western New York last spring, to help Bishop Restarick, she understood that her traveling expenses were to be paid. The Board of Missions has been unable to do this, and our Auxiliary Branch has voted her a gift of \$150 to reimburse her for these expenses.

Bishop Restarick says of her, "Deaconess Sands came to me only a little while ago, but no one can see her for a short time without realizing that she is a remarkable woman. She has taken hold of her work with a fine spirit, and the Hawaiian girls, among whom she is to work, love her."



(15) Brazil, Bishop Kinsolving.

SPECIAL PLEDGE

As no money from our Diocese has been sent to any of the Latin countries, it was decided that the balance remaining after paying all other pledges should be sent to Bishop Kinsolving.

One of the most encouraging features of the work in Brazil is the effort towards self help on the part of church members. Last year they contributed \$7,500 to self support and as each new mission is opened, the people pledge a part of the missionary's salary. There are eight native students in the Theological Seminary in Rio Grande do Sul who are being trained as missionaries, and the expense of their training must be met largely by the voluntary offerings of Church people at home. \$300 will support one of these young men for a year and no branch of our work is more deserving of sympathy and help.

Directions for Parish Secretaries and Treasurers

1. The Corresponding Secretary of the Diocese has on hand letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools. Write to her for such letters when your branch is ready to begin work.
2. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Corresponding Secretary know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish.
3. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Corresponding Secretary immediately after a decision, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay.
4. Parish Secretaries must also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box and from whom.
5. Secretaries will please send, as soon as the box has been dispatched, a letter to the missionary stating date of shipment, and also a letter to the Corresponding Secretary, with a statement of the value of the box. The address of the sender inside of the box is always advisable.
6. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the Recording Secretary of the Diocese, for publication in the Manual, not later than October 1st. (A *type-written* list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)
7. All items of money should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer except those of the United Offering, which go to the Treasurer of that fund.
8. Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering.

CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the last Wednesday and Thursday in September.

X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meeting shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

Report of the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary

WE assemble this year for the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York—to read and hear reports of the work we have been privileged to do.

It has been a year of prosperity. All that Miss Emery asked of us was accomplished. When the parish reports were read at the June meeting at Palmyra, we were amazed to hear that almost every branch had increased its money gifts and many of them their boxes of clothing. The year was also noteworthy in showing that all pledges of money to the Board of Missions were met in season.

The work in general has been conducted most systematically, and is approved by Miss Emery; but there is one little point which can not be passed by, and that is the inaccuracy of parish reports. Not enough care is given to this matter.

The reason such prominence is given to reports on the valuation of boxes is this: Miss Emery must know the correct value of a box, so soon as it is sent, that she may know whether the recipient will need a supplementary box; or possibly, that the box has been so valuable, that he will not need another large box the following year,—if any at all.

Generally speaking, the parish secretaries are very prompt, but let us all bear in mind that Miss Emery is either handicapped or her work promoted by every bit of knowledge relating to what this Diocese does or omits to do.

Not all of our branches responded to requests to take boxes; and on the other hand, new branches were organized. One at Wolcott, another among the wives of farmers in the district near Bath; and still another has very recently been formed in the farming country near Phelps,—the Rector and Auxiliary Women from Phelps going to a Mission at South Phelps and organizing a society there.

It was in a small house on a country road, that two of your officers met with some of these women, who were eager to hear how they, too, could help in this great Missionary work. The first gifts of clothing of two of these branches, were sent to the Indians of our own Diocese. No outside help comes to the Mission stations of Western New York, so that it is our duty to give unreservedly here, and by the ready response which always comes from the Auxiliary Women when appealed to for assistance for the Diocese, prove the pleasure we have in doing this portion of our work. \$528.54 was the value of boxes given to this Diocese.

Our usual Christmas and Easter boxes to Domestic Missions, were valued at \$5,672.54, and one foreign box at \$38.50, making a total of \$6,239.58—a slight increase over last year.

We, at home, have hardly the power to appreciate the gratitude felt by many of the clergymen's families, for the comforts the Auxiliary was able to send them.

The touching letter received in answer to a box sent a hospital for colored people in the south, repaid, a thousand times, the woman who reluctantly packed that box, when she heard how the pink wrapper had been eagerly seized by the

poor old colored woman of eighty; and another case of the same kind makes us weep with joy when we read of the aged woman who longed for a tomb-stone for her son's grave—and it actually came in the box.

These cases are too touching to be amusing, but does it not awaken us to the fact that what we call little things become great and glorious through the Love of God.

Of the many friendly and affectionate letters exchanged by parish and Missionary not the least interesting is one from a young deacon in Africa who wrote that he had been led to the Light by our Church, and he now wished to guide his own people; and as he was soon to become a priest he desired to be robed in the proper vestments of the Church.

We provided cassock, surplice and stoles, the latter being mostly given in material and work by St. Dunstan's School of Embroidery, Geneva.

The poor whites of Tennessee had a large share of our attention, and Miss Taylor's Indians in Nevada were not forgotten.

And now Miss Emery asks that we assist Miss Taylor's work again this fall, as she belongs to us, being formerly a Rochester girl.

But as we press forward this coming year, we must not forget the good woman who has recently gone from this Diocese—Deaconess Sands—who has given up a life among people who were friends and congenial in mind and customs—to go to Hawaii to teach the natives there, also the Chinese, and to live in a foreign way which cannot be so comfortable as that of our own happy land.

What do we think of our giving or doing in comparison to such sacrifice?

But before we close, let us consider one thing we can do, and that is, to prepare boxes earlier in the fall, that they may be received at Thanksgiving time, instead of at Christmas.

Miss Emery sends letters to this Diocese in August; if we have had our annual meeting of the parish branches in the spring, then the work may conveniently be begun early in the fall, thereby making it possible for the recipients of the box to be warmly clad all winter, instead of living, for the first half, in anticipation of comforts which are promised at the convenience of the giver.

Let us all rejoice with the branches which have promised their boxes, this year, for October.

This brief report does not cover all that has been done in this Diocese, but how ever much or little we each have done, according to our ability, we trust Our Heavenly Father has accepted it "In His Name"—

The United Offering

The United Offering has come to be the great outward sign of the unity of the Woman's Auxiliary,—the special work which all branches of the Auxiliary all over the world have in common. It is a *Thank-offering*, not intended to take the place of any other giving, but, over and above all other gifts, to be a loving, humble, and grateful expression of thanks to our Heavenly Father, "for the great benefits we have received at His hands."

The United Offering of 1904 was made in Trinity Church, Boston, on Thursday, October 6th, and amounted to over \$144,000. Through the additional gift of one member, the whole Offering will be \$150,000. This Offering has been placed in the care of the Board of Missions, in accordance with the following resolution, adopted by the Diocesan Officers at their adjourned meeting held in San Francisco, on Monday, October 7th, 1901.

Resolved: That the United Offering of 1904 be given to the Board of Missions, for woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields; including the training, sending and support of women workers; this to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba and Mexico. It is also to be understood that this resolution includes the care of sick and disabled women workers.

At the adjourned meeting of Diocesan Officers, held on October 10th, 1904, the object of the United Offering for 1907 was decided upon, and is expressed in the following resolution.

Resolved: That the United Offering of 1907 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields; including the training, sending and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; this to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba and Mexico: but that a sum not exceeding \$10,000 be devoted to some building, or extension of the same, preferably connected with woman's work, to *mark* the United Offering of 1907 and to be begun in that fiscal year, such building to be approved by the Board of Managers on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Report of the Diocesan Treasurer of the United Offering

1903-1904

In the early spring the Auxiliary of Rochester had the pleasure of hearing and meeting Bishop Brewer. In speaking of the United Offering he said, "Set your mark high, then aim to reach it. If you fail, don't be discouraged,—the effort will have given you strength."

Each parish treasurer with that word of encouragement in mind has accomplished much. Our high mark has been reached and passed, and our gratitude goes out to Him who has given us the ability to do this work for the Church we all love so well.

The small parishes have well earned a word of praise,—some sending in their offering for the first time,—others more than doubling any previous one.

My thanks are due to each and all the parish treasurers who have so nobly sustained and encouraged me.

Hoping that your next triennial may be even more successful than this one.

Annual Report of the Junior Auxiliary

FROM SEPTEMBER, 1903—SEPTEMBER, 1904

The Junior officers began the year of 1903 and '04 with a plan of introducing through the Sunday School the study of our seven scholarships into the many parishes containing no branch of the Junior Auxiliary. They hoped that those churches too weak to warrant a regular branch would welcome such a means of interesting the children, as the lessons were instructive and the only request was that the offering of the day be sent to the treasurer, Mrs. J. H. Potter, to be devoted to the particular scholarship which had been the subject of study. The first lesson on the "Sibyl Carter" Scholarship prepared by Mrs. Charles Smith of Buffalo, was published in December and sent with a letter of explanation to every clergyman in the diocese. The second by Mrs. George G. Merrill of Buffalo, on the "Mary E. Hart" Scholarship appeared in February, the third by Mrs. Henry S. Somerville of Buffalo, on "Honolulu" in April, the fourth by Mrs. Le Boutillier of Rochester on the "Emergency Fund" in June and three remain to be published this year. The results are as follows: Seven Sunday Schools have used the lessons, three of these containing already strong Junior branches. The money received has been \$15.56 from which must be deducted the cost of publication. The casual observer might be justified in pronouncing the experiment a failure, but we know by observation the vast number of requests every rector receives and how few can be granted and refuse to admit that an honest effort systematically presented will not in time receive consideration though possibly not as soon or in just the way we expect. To have seven women connected with the Junior Auxiliary, capable and willing to prepare such lessons as have been issued is in itself an encouragement.

With the exception of this venture the work has been carried on as usual, the Buffalo Section sending Christmas boxes to the Rev. Mr. Deloria, S. Dakota, the Rochester and Geneva to Archdeacon Cassil, Brunswick, Ga. The Sec. felt a special interest in these last named boxes as she had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Cassil at the Missionary Council in Washington and having a pleasant talk with him about his work. It was with great regret that she learned after Christmas that for weeks he had been desperately ill and his acknowledgment to Mrs. Crittenden, written as late as March, was even then from the hand of an invalid. The reports of the contents of the boxes were as usual most satisfactory, 1400 presents having been sent to Mr. Cassil and about a thousand to Mr. Deloria, everything "new, beautiful and desirable." The Easter boxes were sent to Miss Edrington, Widewater, Va., Rev. Mr. Claiborne, Sewanee, Tenn., and Miss Ham, Boydton, Va. The box packings have been the means of gathering two hundred children together at a time and have been held not only in Buffalo, Rochester and Geneva, but also in Bath where the new Hammondsport branch sent twelve delegates with their one hundred gifts making four hundred presents from those two branches alone. The occasions have been used for instruction upon some side of mission work, a unique feature of one of the Christmas

gatherings being an imaginary trip to Brunswick, Ga., the journey being enlivened by a song and dialogue showing the nature of Mr. Cassil's work. On arriving a miniature Christmas tree was found surrounded by dolls representing the old and young darkies he had written about and on the return trip refreshments were served and letters read written by one of the holders of the "Amelia Wright" Scholarship.

The presents have been of great variety, knives, mouth organs, printing presses, games, books, dolls, mounted pictures, work bags well filled, articles to embellish the homes, garments for boys and girls, new as well as old, shoes, etc. The acknowledgments have been most appreciative and, except in the case of Mr. Cassil who was ill, prompt. The box to Mr. Deloria was acknowledged for him not only by Miss Frances but also some of the Indian children. The money valuation of the year's work was \$750.00 but the actual value cannot be estimated unless we are able to measure the deepened interest in the hearts of those who have conscientiously given thought, time and labor at home and to know of the comfort and cheer carried to those abroad.

There have been nine new branches formed during the year, and we wish we might add, all the old ones are active. But here we strike one of the discouraging features of the work. With the leader at her post all goes well, but suddenly comes an illness, a prolonged absence, a removal from town, and the children and their promises vanish in the twinkling of an eye. We must expect this, it is inevitable, but to foresee when it is to occur and not promise more than we can fulfill is our ever present problem. We therefore ask all the branches to do their part not only in preparing the boxes but also in contributing to our pledges which now amount to two hundred and ten dollars annually and to do this last early in the year thus bringing peace of mind to the officers in the diocese and prompt payment to our representatives in the field.

REPORT OF 1904

We have with us today one of our Generals who has led our army of Workers through the gates of many cities that could not have been entered but for his heroic leadership and consecrated common sense. He has made us believe Christ's victory is a certainty, if *we* will only do *our part*, and has made foreign missions very near.

It is eleven years ago since we met in Lockport and Bishop Graves was with us, just going into the field and carrying with him a "Vade Mecum" from these Little Helpers of Western New York. They have followed him with their prayers and gifts.

There are 700 Little Helpers in Western New York whose gift for 1904 is \$486.63. I received, after the June letter was in print, from seven parishes \$57.00 One hundred thirty-five boxes are kept in memory of little children, teaching our oneness in Christ. The gift of all becomes one in His sight. The Church Militant and Expectant are one.

Thirteen dollars received after the June report as specials from boxes and memorials, will go toward furnishing the kindergarten in Akita, Japan, now to be supported by all "The Little Helpers", and to become Gaylord's memorial. Two dollars reported in letter went to the school at Wusih. Our gift for the Triennial will be \$115.00. In 1892 it was \$14.00, in 1901 it was \$75.00.

Seven new circles have been added, and three re-organized. Those added are Dundee, Brockport and Newark, and in Buffalo, St. Stephen's, St. Matthew's, St. Clement's and the Good Shepherd. The Ascension and St. Paul's in Buffalo, and St. Peter's, Geneva, have been re-organized, making our parishes with Little Helpers at work fifty, and a circle under my care of 16. These last names are of children outside our Church or in some other diocese. After our missionary pennies were acknowledged, a special gift came of \$8.91 for the gavel for the Bishop. We were only asked for five dollars, but the Little Helpers' purple bags were gladly filled, and the response was beautiful; and a United gift from Women, Juniors and Babies was highly appreciated by our Bishop.

Report of the Church Periodical Club

1903-1904

The Church Periodical Club was founded by the late Mrs. Mortimer Fargo. She had been led first, by her residence in the west, to see its great need, and made to herself a solemn promise that if she ever came to live in the east she would gather and distribute literature, particularly among the clergy in the west, where they were starving for it. With a foresight which must have been given her by the Holy Spirit and with a mathematical precision she had formulated and crystallized her plans for a work which has been the greatest ever undertaken by one woman not only in the Church but in the world.

The object of the Club is to supply to clergymen and missionaries in remote parts of the country such periodicals and other literary matter as might be useful to them in their work and otherwise inaccessible. Papers and magazines which, once read by the original subscribers would be cast aside or buried in cupboards, may do missionary work if the owners will remail them to addresses furnished by the librarian of the parish, prepaying postage. The expenses of the Club for stationery, postage, express charges and typewriter have been met by special gifts, but the club would be glad to increase the number of members paying one dollar a year, as it would assist in extending the work. Those who have no periodicals or books to forward, but desire to take part in the work, may make special gifts of money to be expended by the Secretary for the purchase of new theological publications which are constantly being asked for by the Clergy.

The work of the Club in our own Diocese the past year has been progressing slowly, but I feel it is accomplishing a great deal of good. We have had but one new librarian this year. To show how much the work is appreciated read a few extracts from letters received from recipients :

A missionary in Japan writes : " My dear Madam, 'The Virginian' arrived in safety and has been greatly prized. I don't know when I have enjoyed a book so much and I am so much obliged for it. It is just now going on its round to be enjoyed by my friends, not only of this mission, but others. One had it on the train, and said it helped to keep her from thinking of her weariness, for it was not possible to find room on the train to rest, there being no sleepers and a thirty hour trip is tiresome.

Your Club is surely giving pleasure to many. I do thank you so much for the papers I have received."

" The box of books reached me safely and I send most grateful thanks for the contents. The reading is enjoyed very much by us and others. I see such pleas-

ant employment for many a weary day. The calendars are very beautiful, I gave one to a neighbor who came to see me yesterday, she was so pleased to have it and will hang it up in her room. She is from the North. I have been sending out reading matter for about eight miles all around us for over three years. The papers and magazines that are kindly sent us we read and then let the neighbors who can read have them, then I gather them up and send them to the lighthouse keeper's family, who are twelve miles from us on the Gulf Coast near St. Joseph's Point. Farmdale is their Post Office and I leave the papers there. They are very thankful for them, as they are in such a lonely situation. The two pictures are beautiful and again I thank you for all the things and for your kindness in thinking of two lonely invalids."

We have 37 librarians and have sent during the year one thousand five hundred and two magazines, Church papers and books. Also two barrels and one box.

The Special Fund

In 1883 a fund was established in the "Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary" called "The Special Fund," to be raised by voluntary offerings of one dollar a year, or more, or less, from every churchwoman in the Diocese, to meet the appeals of the General Secretary, or other appeals, as for the support of missionary teachers, hospitals, etc. These offerings should be over and above regular contributions to missions, or the necessary money for sending boxes from parishes. Those giving regularly to special appeals are asked to devote a percentage of such offering to this fund.

The money may be sent to Miss Alice N. Dox, Geneva, N. Y., Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch, or forwarded to her by the Treasurers of parish societies designated for "The Special Fund." The amount of this fund will be announced at each annual meeting and appropriated by a vote of the delegates to such objects as the officers of the society, after consultation, shall suggest.

Should any one be willing to make an offering to this fund at any time, it would be gratefully received and be of much assistance to the officers.
