CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November.

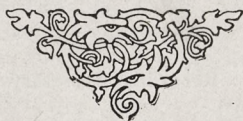
X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

This meeting, to which I heartily welcome you all, is the greatest Auxiliary gathering of the year in Western New York, and it should always be a memorable meeting. Let us make it so this year.

I want to speak to you first about the reports which merit a careful hearing now and attentive reading when they appear in the Manual. Each of the departments unfolds to you today the record of its labors. In nearly every case you hear the story from the lips of the person most closely responsible for that particular sphere. To this record of hard and steady work for Missions I want to add a word about the spirit of harmony and devotion and ready sacrifice shown by the whole Branch of Western New York. And I cannot too heartily praise the diocesan officers who have seconded so ably every new plan and effort, and this with perfect harmony among themselves.

*No new lists having been sent in the names of the officers of last year have been reinserted.

The death of Mrs. John H. Stedman deprived us of the co-operation and sympathetic assistance of a second vice-president whom we all greatly valued. She is missed not only by us, but by many other noble organizations with which she was associated.

It seems to me that a president's duties point at this time very steadily to the forward view, with only enough of retrospect to teach how the coming tasks may be accomplished better, so I will pass immediately to a proposal for the future. It is a step in advance, and one that I long to see taken this coming year. Let me explain it to you. If you like it, and will help in it, I believe you will find through it a gain for yourselves as well as for Missions. And first let me say that our present system of parish pledges is an admirable one, and one not to be in any way disturbed, but rather fostered and encouraged by all. But a provision for *spontaneous* giving seems to be needed in addition to our pledge system. The parish that knows at the beginning of its year that its pledge is \$20 or \$50 or \$100 lets its mind rest on that, and does not think (generally speaking) of doing more. In many cases that is all a parish branch can reasonably do, yet I think there are times when branches have a little extra money or when two or three members, interested in some especial missionary, or particular field of mission work are warmed to a fervent zeal that would lead them to give a little more except that they do not want to disturb their pledges in their relation to the pledges of other parishes of a like ability to give. Now if a parish branch could feel in these moments of enthusiasm, that it could wisely send (through our treasurer) any little extra sum independently of the pledge, just as individuals might, we should have advanced another step in missionary work. This kind of giving would be so elastic that it would awaken in us a pleasant sense of *freedom*, after our fixed duties in giving had been fulfilled. These sums would be counted on our apportionment, and so support and honor our Western New York Branch, while helping Missions most directly.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

September 26, 1907.

In this, the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, it is a pleasure to find ourselves for the fifth time the guests of St. Paul's branch, Buffalo. The first time in December, 1883, seventeen parishes were represented by thirty-three delegates. In September, 1892, nine years later, one hundred and thirty-eight delegates were present from forty-one parishes. The foregoing statement and the large number present today, fifteen years later, show the gradual growth of interest and co-operation in missionary work in the Diocese, and place Western New York far up in the ranks of the much-valued organization known as the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

During 1906-1907, we have had ninety-seven branches, ninety-three being old ones and four new. The reports show the valuation of the boxes sent to be \$6,660.24, a loss of \$852.97 from last year's record. Of this, \$6,366.28 is domestic and \$293.96 diocesan. It includes about thirty boxes sent the families of missionaries in the south and west, also a goodly number to the mountain whites and hospital work in Sewanee, Tenn. Substantial aid was given the colored work at St. Paul's Normal and Industrial School, Lawrenceville, Va., and to the Indians at St. Elizabeth's School, S.D. Our work for the year received the commendation of Miss Emery, and was what she asked of us, although not proving to be quite so high in money-value as last year. An encouraging feature has been the almost entire absence of self-chosen work. Very few instances have been reported of branches accepting other appeals than those coming to us through the authorized channel, which is the Church Missions House.

Our president, Mrs. Nicholas, called an officers' conference in Rochester, on March 11, when the women of the three departments were asked by the officers living in Rochester to meet with them at the *Samovar*. The day was spent profitably; and from the exchange of ideas, much good has resulted.

Our last annual meeting was held in St. Peter's Church, Niagara Falls. We were fortunate in having the Rev. Everett P. Smith, Educational Secretary, present, who gave us a most helpful address concerning that branch of our work. At the June meeting in Mt. Morris, we were privileged to have the Rev. Walter Clapp of Bontoc, who told us of work in the Philippines, and Miss Alice M. Clark, a United Offering Missionary from Hankow, China. Later in the month, Miss Clark visited several of the branches. Her plea was in great part for more workers for China, and a message brought in so direct a way from the mission field can not fail to make a deep and lasting impression. The district meetings have been held as follows: In Buffalo, five; in Rochester, four; in the Olean district, three, and one each in the Geneva, Geneseo and Bath districts.

Most encouraging reports have come from all, and this new feature—an experiment—has proved a source of strength and lasting benefit to the Auxiliary work. Some gain has been made in educational ways. The study class work is gradually becoming a part of every branch, and when a study class is started and knowledge increases, the work and interest for missions will surely grow.

Again Western New York is asked to turn its attention to St. Elizabeth's School, S. D.—this time to more than double the amount done last year. I am sure we shall succeed in our efforts in that direction from the sympathy and co-operation expressed for the work of this school for Indian boys and girls in June at the Mt. Morris meeting.

The Board of Missions asks the Auxiliary as a whole for \$100,000 to be applied towards the annual appropriation to the mission field. The Woman's apportionment for Western New York for 1906-1907 was \$1,400. In our pledges each year let us try to meet this request of the Board.

As women of the Church we realize that there is no halting place in missionary work. We must ever press on, and be thankful that we are privileged to help in this great cause.

THE DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

At the June meeting in Brockport, 1906, it was decided to divide the Diocese into six districts, for a trial period of two years, each district under a secretary appointed by the president, and each with its box-directress to whom parish secretaries apply for work.

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life all over the Diocese, through reaching parishes far from the customary centers and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings; also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The six districts are as follows:

BUFFALO DISTRICT: Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, Lockport, Niagara Falls, North Tonawanda and Gowanda.

ROCHESTER DISTRICT: Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Medina, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls.

GENESEO DISTRICT: Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford.

GENEVA DISTRICT: Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee.

BATH DISTRICT: Bath, Canaseraga, Cold Spring, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Rheims, Addison, Catherine, Montour Falls, Watkins.

OLEAN DISTRICT: Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Dunkirk, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere.

THE UNITED OFFERING

The United Offering has come to be the great outward sign of the unity of the Woman's Auxiliary—the special work which all branches of the Auxiliary all over the world have in common. It is a *Thank-offering*, not intended to take the place of any other giving, but, over and above all other gifts, to be a loving, humble and grateful expression of thanks to our Heavenly Father, "for the great benefits we have received at His hands."

The United Offering made this year, 1907, is given to woman's work, as before, according to a resolution passed in Boston at the Triennial Conference of 1904. This resolution provided that \$10,000 of the offering be expended for a building, preferably for woman's work, to *mark* the offering of 1907. It has been decided to give the \$10,000 for a training school for

native women at Sendai, Japan, including a home for the women missionaries there, as was announced on Oct. 3d, at the woman's mass meeting in Richmond.

The United Offering of 1910 is to be used according to the following resolution:

Resolved, That the United Offering of 1910 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the Mission field; including the training, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$15,000 be devoted to a building, or buildings, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary. Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master, in the Mission field.

It plans to expend \$15,000 in one or more buildings, and it has been pointed out that several dry, warm and sanitary homes may be erected for such a sum. A steadily increasing number of women workers means more places to shelter them, for valuable lives must not be sacrificed by neglect and a short-sighted policy.

The closing paragraph brings the United Offering to the offering of life itself for the Master.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN TREASURER OF THE UNITED OFFERING, 1906-1907

The Triennial of 1907 has become a thing of the past. I wish each one of you, my faithful workers, could have enjoyed with me the great privilege of being present at that grand United Offering Service in Holy Trinity, Richmond. To look upon the almost inspired faces of those devout women, who were placing upon God's altar the work of three years past, was something to carry in one's memory a life time. Then the kneeling at the Altar and renewing our vows to be "His faithful servants, to our life's end" crowned a never to be forgotten service.

In the afternoon at the great Auditorium, the magnificent amount coming from all over the world was announced. Your Diocesan Treasurer was not ashamed of what you women in Western New York had accomplished.

The offering for the coming three years will be devoted to the same object as the previous one. Let us now resolve to do all in our power to increase that amount. It is not alone the money you give that counts, but the work you do for the Master. This He will repay you four fold.

God bless you and grant to us one and all, such a spiritual uplifting, as shall stir the hearts of all women to help on this grand and useful work to the building up of His kingdom here on earth.

DESIGNATED CONTRIBUTIONS

Six years ago, in San Francisco, Dr. Lloyd, the general secretary of the Board of Missions, asked the women of the Auxiliary to give \$100,000 each year towards the pledges which the Board had made for that year's work in the missionary field. He thought it would be their fair share.

We loyally began to work up to that sum, accepting it as our apportionment. Miss Emery helped us by apportioning to each diocesan branch its reasonable share of the \$100,000. Of this, our part in Western New York is now \$1,400, while the Juniors are asked to give \$150 and the Babies' Branch \$100. It is not expected that all of our diocesan pledges should be for this purpose, but that other and further gifts from individuals should be, so far as possible, turned into those channels which help the Board of Missions to pay its pledges. In order that these additional gifts may be credited to our Woman's apportionment they should either be sent through our diocesan treasurer, or else the amount reported to her if sent directly to the Board of Missions in New York. In all cases add, "to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary apportionment." The donor's name may or may not be made public.

Money may be sent marked "For missionary work in the District (or Diocese) of " for use in any such District or Diocese, and in the same way it may be sent for missions among Indians or Negroes. The Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Ave., New York, will give detailed information as to the sums needed to support hospital beds, scholarships, Bible women, native deacons and priests, single men and women, clergymen and bishops. It must be remembered that the thousands of undertakings throughout the world, to which the Board of Missions has pledged its support, are chosen after the most painstaking research and complete information.

There are women who look for wise ways of giving more money to missions after the parish pledges have been paid. To these an appeal is here made to consider the desirability of sending at least a part of this money through the "Designated Contributions" for the undertakings of the Board of Missions.

The letters received from the Parish Secretaries show me more and more that this is a most valuable effort. It is high time people were more intelligent upon the subject of the Church's great work. There is an appalling lack of interest on the part of many, and what are we all doing to make this better?

So I hope during the next few months to hear from Parishes which have not yet appointed Secretaries. Won't they help this great work by appointing some one at once, and let me have her name and address?

Don't put it off!

The opportunity is *now*!

And do not think that because you are a small Parish or Mission you can do so little and so will do nothing at all.

Do try it at least.

Some of the most encouraging reports have come from the smallest Parishes!

The list showing the number of new subscribers in each Parish shows those which have been obtained through this effort started two years ago, not those who have been subscribers before.

All that have been reported to me are here given.

There have been changes in the secretaryship in some of the parishes and this has hindered somewhat the work in those parishes.

There are some encouraging things that have come to my attention too. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Mission at Kenmore has subscribed as a whole. The Young Woman's Missionary Guild of St. Paul's Church, Rochester, subscribes in the same way.

A member of the Woman's Auxiliary of Buffalo told me she had placed a copy of the *Spirit of Missions* on the table in the waiting room of a dentist whom she knew, which seemed to me a very good thing.

In connection with this department is the work of placing the *Spirit of Missions* on file in different parts of the Diocese. Mrs. Chas. B. Potter, 111 Spring St., Rochester, has charge of the work in Rochester, and Mrs. Harrison A. Blake of 777 7th St., Buffalo, has made excellent progress in Buffalo, where the Grosvenor Library now has over forty complete years. Mrs. Potter and Mrs. Blake will be pleased to correspond with those who wish to give or exchange copies of the magazine.

Missions Libraries, too, have been started in many churches, notable among them being "The Helen Halsey" Memorial Missionary Library in Christ Church Parish House, Rochester, intended especially for the use of the Auxiliary. Miss C. E. Davis, 261 Alexander St., Rochester, will furnish catalogues and other information upon application. An annual due of 25 cents for membership is asked.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The Church Periodical Club stands as a beautiful memorial to its founder, Mrs. Fargo, who, nineteen years ago sent out the first periodicals. From this small beginning it has grown until recipients in all quarters of the globe are being benefited by this noble woman's kindly thought to uplift mankind by good literature. Every year it reaches out more and more and carries good cheer and feeds many tired and hungry minds.

There are thirty librarians. A few have not been active, but the most of them are very faithful and very prompt in their answers to inquiries, which I appreciate. This is a great aid and if all of them only realized the importance of this duty, I am sure they would willingly give this small amount of labor which keeps the whole line of work in better and more systematic order. Many times it is just a little carelessness on some one's part—possibly a contributor may be at fault and not report to the librarian that they have discontinued this paper, or the librarian may not report it to me, etc. That means the loss of a periodical, which may not seem much to us, who are well provided with good reading matter, but do we stop to consider how much pleasure we may be depriving others of, and how it may be longed and looked for in some far western home or in the mountainous regions of which we have read so much in the *Spirit of Missions* of late, or in a foreign land where a home paper may be its only

comfort and recreation for days at a time? I am sure not—or each one would strive to do her part.

During the year we have sent out five hundred and four current and secular periodicals, forty-seven odd magazines, thirty-five Sunday School papers, four Prayer Books, fifteen cards—Christmas and Easter, five barrels and three boxes of miscellaneous literature. Twenty-five dollars is the total amount of money contributed. About one-half of this sum was raised by a special appeal to buy theological books.

The following is only one of the many grateful letters written by a clergyman.:

"It seems to me that there is no phase of our Church work more important than yours. In very many cases it must be true that you confer a very real gift of Light.

To tell you adequately what your work has done for me would be to write a history of all the study and thought side of my ministry. Through you I have been able to keep in touch with the larger world of thought outside my own parish; through you I have been able to feel myself in some sense not only a citizen of my own Virginia but also a citizen of the world."

According to the statistics we are supplying nearly two hundred more persons with literature than last year. With this growing demand comes the necessity of more money. Let each parish strive to do its part in this interesting work—be it ever so little. And may every branch of our Auxiliary make it more and more a part of its work to arouse greater enthusiasm in the Church Periodical Club, and remember that it is for the uplifting of the moral tone of many regions and the spread of Church teaching.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY OF WESTERN NEW YORK, 1906-1907

The Junior Auxiliary of Western New York usually works so smoothly that our report from year to year is necessarily an account of work confidently undertaken and successfully accomplished. This year, however, serious illness has invaded our ranks and for months the Head of the Buffalo section was prohibited from even thinking of her duties and her fellow workers forbidden to communicate with her. Conditions were but little better when the time came for the spring box-packing, but thanks to her efficient helpers and the Secretary of the Buffalo District, a box valued at \$130.00 was packed at St. James' Church, twelve branches being represented. In midsummer, Mrs. Potter with great regret sent to the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese her resignation as head of the section, retaining, if deemed best, her office of treasurer. Those who have worked with and under her realize what this means, for her wisdom, enthusiasm and untiring effort have made the Buffalo Section a factor in the missionary work, not only of the Diocese, but in a larger field. The big boxes so willingly undertaken have never failed to fulfil expectations, and the gatherings of two hundred or more children to have a part in the packings have been an inspiration to all who saw them. While we regret that the promoter of all this must for a time at least lay down her work, we rejoice that she remains among us as treasurer and congratulate the section on her successor, Mrs. George G. Merrill. Miss Esther S. Smith will be Mrs. Merrill's assistant, and will have charge of the autumn box-packing.

In the Geneva Section prolonged illness in her family has made the Head ask for temporary relief from her duties and Mrs. Harvey of Phelps has been found ready to assist as far as is in her power. Those changes would be even more trying than they are did they not reveal the richness of this Diocese in able consecrated women.

The Rochester Section has moved serenely on under its able head, Mrs. Richards, and the three sections have sent boxes to twelve different places embracing the states of Florida, Tennessee, North Carolina, Kentucky, Virginia, Oklahoma, Utah, South Dakota and Alaska and valued at \$826.10.

Again we have had the unpleasant experience of a belated arrival of Christmas gifts, and the spring box sent from the Geneva Section to Kentucky has been traced as far as Richmond, there to be lost in the accumulation of freight bound for the Jamestown Exposition.

Our treasury has been a source of great anxiety and we are yet far behind in our pledges. This is our weakest point and one we have become more conscious of since we set apart the offering of the annual meeting for the United Offering. The falling off has been in the number of contributing branches rather than in the amounts from the several branches themselves, and some plan must be devised to remedy this serious defect. The pledges should be the first consideration in every branch, instead of which but twenty-six have contributed this year.

In March the Secretary sent to each branch head an illustrated pamphlet on the United Offering sent out from the Church Missions House, and these were followed in August by envelopes in which was to be placed the United Offering of each branch, to be brought to the annual meeting by the delegate or sent previously to the Junior treasurer.

At the Officers' Conference in March, two Junior officers were present, and the Secretary requested that so far as possible the vice-presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary in the parishes of the Diocese have a motherly interest in the Junior branches thus preventing either total extinction or a long period of inertia which so often follows the dropping out of the Junior leader. With this close association of the Senior and Junior departments a mutual benefit would surely follow.

REPORT OF THE BABIES' BRANCH

I have just taken up a book on gardening, and my eye has fallen on these headings in the *Contents*: "Its Location; when seeds should be planted. Fruit: its Market and its Products." My mind has turned to the Sixteenth Report to be read before our Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary—so finely located in Western New York, where such wonderful opportunities are given the spiritual plant for growth and tender culture. Everyone must feel the importance of this beautiful garden. The time for planting the seed, we know, is baptism; and tender care is indeed needed to keep the seed of Missions alive. It cannot be planted too early; the spring of life is the planting time, but what you want to know is what the garden of Western New York has produced in this past year, and if there has been any new growth. This is the year that the Men of the Church, for the first time, offer their first fruits of Thanksgiving. This is the time that the Women all over the world present their offering. So now the Little Helpers would gather up their work of three years of labor together. Their gift for the United Offering for these three years was \$81.38. When the gardeners meet in Richmond, we are to learn from each other how to sow the best seed, in the best ground, in the wisest way. Fifty Dioceses have this garden. Twenty of them unite in their work, and these twenty have given to "The United Work" in the past three years, \$4,274.94. This is apart from General Missions, Diocesan Work and the United Offering.

Western New York's "Little Helpers", with the aid of their Helpers in the Lord, have given \$636.36 for Missions this past year. Of this, \$398.06 was from boxes, and \$212.80 was a special gift for the Kindergarten building at Akita from the friends of the Little Helpers. The cost of printing the annual letter was met from this amount. The money reported in June as \$374, became \$398.06 by the September meeting. The additional \$24.00 was divided between the United Offering, the font for Fairport, a picture given by four dioceses to Akita and \$1.00 for expenses.

Our Little Helpers' meeting in Buffalo was held on the day before Ascension in St. Mary's on the Hill, and for the Rochester parishes on the Thursday before Whitsunday in St. Mark's.

DIRECTIONS

To Parish Secretaries:

1. The work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the corresponding Secretary in mid-summer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee, are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

2. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish.

3. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress immediately after a decision, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay.

4. Parish Secretaries must also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box and from whom.

5. Secretaries will please send, as soon as the box has been dispatched, a letter to the missionary stating date of shipment, and also a letter to the Directress, with a statement of the value of the box. The address of the sender inside of the box is *always* advisable.

6. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the Recording Secretary of the Diocese, for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st. (A *type-written* list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)

To Parish Treasurers:

1. All items of money should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer except those of the United Offering, which go to the Treasurer of that fund.

2. Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering.
