CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November.

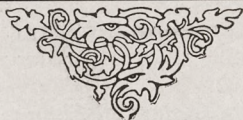
X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

I welcome you all most heartily to this annual meeting, and rejoice that so many have been able to come. This is our first trial of the new date for this meeting, and if the reality equals the general expectation the change will prove an unqualified success.

I want to direct your thoughts for a moment to the three-fold nature of such a meeting as this. We first worship God together, and together make our United Offering, and receive together the Bread of Life; and we believe that we are given at this service a blessing upon our work; next from the missionaries themselves, and those most closely associated with their labors, we gain a knowledge of missions; and last we attend to the administration of our work in two ways,—in *retrospect*, through the reports of every department, and in *forecast*, when we plan out the duties of the year before us. We are in a sense a great machine that needs care and watchfulness and constant adjustment in all its parts. And like a machine all parts of our work are taken up separately, adjusted, and re-fitted to the whole structure, so that we may enter upon another year with a better knowledge and a surer grasp in our several departments.

Let me now sum up these aspects of the annual meetings,—first worship, second knowledge and third what we have often called the Lord's business. All that we do here will come under some one of these heads. So, considering this meeting as a whole, let us make it the heartiest—the

most earnest one we have ever had; and looking at its three-fold nature, let us resolve that each part—worship, knowledge, work, shall give us something that we may take home to our parish branches, to strengthen and encourage them in this year's duties.

These words of welcome are very brief. I have at heart some matters that are of interest to us all, and will bring them forward at the right moment. But there are three matters that I wish to mention here. A suggestion has been made, and most favorably received, that we found an additional pledge in memory of Mrs. Charles H. Smith, of Buffalo, who was so generous and devoted a member of the Auxiliary and friend of missions. And I should like to see a central fund established at some time in our Auxiliary, on the lines adopted in Connecticut,—one which should include two of our present funds,—printing and emergency. Connecticut raises a fund of \$400 each year, which provides for printing the Manual, for issuing leaflets, for necessary postage and for the travelling expenses of missionary speakers. This plan leaves the offerings free to be given directly to any missionary objects. This fund would also provide for the travelling expenses of the officers who conduct the *district* meetings. These expenses become a heavy burden in some districts. Our territory is large,—more than double that of Connecticut, and the journeys correspondingly long. The establishment of districts and district meetings has been remarkably successful, but it should be noted that it has much increased the customary expenses of our officers.

And I wish to take this opportunity of testifying to the great amount of work done by these officers this year, and done remarkably well. It gives me great pleasure to record my appreciation of this work.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

November 12, 1908.

Again we are assembled for our annual meeting,—this time the twenty-eighth and held in November instead of September as the result of a resolution offered at St. Paul's Church, Buffalo, September 26, 1907, which was unanimously adopted,—namely,—That the time of the annual meeting of the Diocese be the second Wednesday and Thursday of November.

We are the guests for the first time of Trinity Church, Rochester.

The Corresponding Secretary is required to make a report each year for the Church Mission House. My report for this year includes ninety-six parishes represented by one hundred and three branches, an increase of six branches in the year.

Our box valuation has reached the figure of \$6,804.13,—a gain of \$143.89 over last year. Of this, \$71.65 is foreign, \$338.12 diocesan, and \$6,394.36 domestic. Of the boxes fully thirty were sent to the families of missionaries in the south and west. The Diocese furnished the outfits

for thirty boys and twenty-six girls together with the general needs of St. Elizabeth's, South Dakota, a mission school for Indian boys and girls; besides giving substantial aid to the missions at Morganton, N. C., Sewanee, Tenn., and other points in the south. Early in May forty-four four-pound packages were sent by mail to Eagle, Alaska. We have done our part, as an auxiliary to the Board of Missions, so far as responding fully to the appeals for boxes goes, but we did not quite meet our apportionment. Of the \$100,000 asked of the women, \$1,400 was expected from Western New York. We sent \$1,390, only falling short ten dollars.

It would be well to realize the necessity of getting in the apportionment money by September first, as the books at the Church Mission House close for the year on that date. Let me urge that every branch recognize its responsibility in this matter.

The report blanks sent out for the semi-annual meeting in June were well returned, showing a continued and growing interest in the many sides of Auxiliary work.

Our president, Mrs. Nicholas, called an officers' conference in Buffalo on March 9. Bishop and Mrs. Walker opened the See House for the conference. Good must follow from a day spent so fully in reviewing and discussing the work of all the departments.

At our last annual meeting it was a privilege and pleasure to have with us Bishop Mann, who told us of his work in North Dakota; also the Rev. R. E. Wood, of Hankow, China. At the June meeting in Hornell addresses were made by the Rev. S. H. Bishop, secretary of the American Institute for Negroes, who spoke of the great need of the colored people; and the Rev. Murray Bartlett, who was about starting for Manila. His address was most inspiring by reason of its earnestness and great hopefulness of the new work he was soon to begin.

The district meetings have been held as follows: In Buffalo, three; in Rochester three; in the Olean district, seven; in the Geneseo district, two; and one each in the Geneva and Bath districts. The division of the Diocese into districts, with a secretary and box directress in each, proved a success. The trial period of two years having ended, at the meeting in Hornell in June the question was again brought before the members, and the system was formally adopted.

The rapid increase of missionary study classes has been one of the most encouraging features of the year. As the growth and interest in our work for missions depend upon our knowledge, the benefit, as the result from this gain in educational ways, is noticeable in all the departments.

During the year we have been most grateful for a gift of a complete file of annual reports for the Archives of the Auxiliary.

My report so far has been a review of the work for 1907-1908. As to the coming year the forecast is a most prosperous one. A steady and healthful growth is shown all over the Diocese. Many branches have begun their meetings earlier than heretofore, and there has been a steady call for letters and appeals since early in September. We hope soon to

have a *Spirit of Missions* secretary and a United Offering treasurer in every parish and mission in the Diocese where as yet no branch has been formed.

The summing up of all Auxiliary work is the strong call for workers.

Let us hope that Western New York will continue to heed this call and that the time may soon come when this Diocese will be represented by faithful women workers in all the domestic and foreign mission fields.

DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The Diocese is divided into six districts, each district under a secretary appointed by the president, and each with its box-directress to whom parish secretaries apply for work.

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life, all over the Diocese, through reaching parishes far from the customary centres, and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections, however, make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for missions in this organized way.

The six districts are as follows:

BUFFALO DISTRICT: Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, Lockport, Niagara, Falls, Depew, North Tonawanda and Gowanda. (Erie and Niagara counties.)

ROCHESTER DISTRICT: Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Medina, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls. (Monroe and Orleans Counties.)

GENESEO DISTRICT: Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford. (Livingston, Wyoming and Genesee Counties.)

GENEVA DISTRICT: Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee. (Wayne, Ontario and Yates Counties.)

BATH DISTRICT: Bath, Canaseraga, Cold Springs, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Rheims, Addison, Catharine, Montour Falls, Watkins. (Steuben and Schuyler Counties.)

OLEAN DISTRICT: Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Dunkirk, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere. (Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Alleghany Counties.)

THE UNITED OFFERING

The United Thank Offering has come to be the great outward sign of the unity of the Woman's Auxiliary—the special work which all branches of the Auxiliary all over the world have in common. It is truly a *Thank-offering*, not intended to take the place of any other giving, but, over and above all other gifts, to be a loving, humble and grateful expression of thanks to our Heavenly Father, “for the great benefits we have received at His hands.”

The United Offering of 1910 is to be used according to the following resolution:

Resolved, That the United Offering of 1910 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the Mission field; including the training, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when

sick and disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$15,000 be devoted to a building, or buildings, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary. Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master, in the Mission field.

It plans to expend \$15,000 in one or more buildings, and it has been pointed out that several dry, warm and sanitary homes may be erected for such a sum. A steadily increasing number of women workers means more places to shelter them, for valuable lives must not be sacrificed by neglect and a short-sighted policy.

The closing paragraph brings the United Offering to the offering of life itself for the Master.

UNITED OFFERING TREASURER'S REPORT

What does the United Offering stand for? What does it mean? At this late day, more than twenty-five years since its infancy, there are many good church-women, who will ask these questions. We cannot too often repeat the answers. It stands for one of the grandest works ever done by women. It means the spreading of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. It means the teaching, supporting, and caring for our women workers, wherever they are sent by the Board of Missions.

To be able to do this, every woman should feel it, not only her duty, but a great privilege, to add her mite to the great whole, which we women, every three years, present at the Altar, that the Board may be able to carry on its work. How great, and how far reaching that work is, we may never know; but I wish every woman would feel she had a part in it, no matter how small. The small amounts make up the great whole.

Ask for boxes and leaflets.

Mrs. W. L. Davis, 261 Alexander St., for the past two years has had entire charge of this work, and has distributed a large number of boxes, but each treasurer should not feel satisfied, until she has a box in the hands of every woman in the parish. In addition to this work, Mrs. Davis has gone to the parishes who have asked her to come to them, and talk of the United Offering. Her whole heart is in this work and she has the happy way of making every woman see her duty. All she asks is an *audience* and her expenses.

Let us hope that with God's blessing, we may have a large increase this next year.

DESIGNATED CONTRIBUTIONS

Seven years ago, in San Francisco, Dr. Lloyd, the general secretary of the Board of Missions, asked the women of the Auxiliary to give \$100,000 each year towards the pledges which the Board had made for that year's work in the missionary field. He thought it would be their fair share.

We loyally began to work up to that sum, accepting it as our apportionment. Miss Emery helped us by apportioning to each diocesan branch its reasonable share of the \$100,000. Of this, our part in Western New York is now \$1,400, while the Juniors are asked to give \$200 and the Babies' Branch \$100. It is not expected that all of our diocesan pledges should be for this purpose, but that other and further gifts from individuals should be, so far as possible, turned into those channels which help the Board of Missions to pay its pledges. In order that these additional gifts may be credited to our Woman's apportionment they should either be sent through our diocesan treasurer, or else the amount reported to her if sent directly to the Board of Missions in New York. In all cases add, "to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary apportionment." The donor's name may or may not be made public.

Money may be sent marked "For missionary work in the District (or Diocese) of ——" for use in any such District or Diocese, and in the same way it may be sent for missions among Indians or Negroes. The Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Ave., New York, will give detailed information as to the sums needed to support hospital beds, scholarships, Bible women, native deacons and priests, single men and women, clergymen and bishops. It must be remembered that the thousands of undertakings throughout the world, to which the Board of Missions has pledged its support, are chosen after the most painstaking research and complete information.

There are women who look for wise ways of giving more money to missions after the parish pledges have been paid. To these an appeal is here made to consider the desirability of sending at least a part of this money through the "Designated Contributions" for the undertakings of the Board of Missions.

SPIRIT OF MISSIONS

The secretary of the Spirit of Missions, Mrs. Jno. M. Gilbert of Buffalo, reports 258 new subscribers since she started work three years ago. She

asks that a secretary be appointed in each parish where there is none, and urges these secretaries to get at least one new subscriber each year to the best missions magazine in the world. Let each secretary keep a list of the names of subscribers in her parish, and see that their subscriptions do not run out, and note those not subscribing, show them the magazine and give them the opportunity. Let it be known that half of the dollar subscription may be put into the United Offering for the first year, if desired; make known the fact that by combining with one or more other magazines, (which these are, may be learned at the Church Missions House) still lower rates may be obtained. The children should take single copies to sell and thus earn the money for their Sunday-School Auxiliary, as well as increase the circulation of the magazine. *And all parish secretaries should report subscribers, both old and new, promptly to Mrs. Gilbert.*

The work of placing the Spirit of Missions on file is going on in different parts of the Diocese, and will prove most helpful to missions study classes. Mrs. Harrison W. Blake of 777 7th St., Buffalo, has now completed 57 years for the Grosvenor Library, Buffalo, and would like to correspond with anyone who will give or exchange copies of the magazine, in order to complete her file.

MISSION STUDY CLASSES

It is the wish of the Board of Missions that its Woman's Auxiliary shall form Mission Study Classes which shall reach into every branch. Miss Emery says plainly that prayer and missions study are the two best ways of helping on the extension of the Kingdom. In short, the purely material does not produce the practical results that the spiritual and intellectual do. This puts the poorest parish upon a level with the richest and does away with any excuse of any parish that it cannot afford to have a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The women of Western New York have made an excellent start in Mission Study. Below is a table showing something of what was done last year, though we believe that there are other classes quietly working which have not been reported, and which we should like to hear from.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

To better understand and appreciate the noble charity that is constantly being done by the Church Periodical Club, one should read the many grateful letters that come from all parts of the country, and thus realize the importance of the work and how, from year to year, it has steadily grown, until its branches reach from Alaska to the lowliest spots of the South and West.

Miss Emery has suggested that much might be done by sending out the *Spirit of Missions* in sets to help Mission Study Classes in their study of different fields.

Surely a helpful thought for every parish to act upon. This assistance would nourish the growing interest in Missions. And may it also be a means of increasing the interest in the Church Periodical Club, and the fact be borne in mind that both can go hand in hand.

From a clergyman comes this cheering word. "I receive the *Churchman* regularly. It is a great benefit to me in my work. I give it to others, so that it is doing Missionary work." Another wrote—"We read everything that is sent to us, pass them around and finally when the circle is supplied we mail them on to friends further south with the request to pass them around."

With what pleasure do we all rejoice in that far-away reading room at Fairbanks, Alaska! where for the year nineteen hundred and seven, the magazines, newspapers and books make a grand total of nineteen thousand four hundred and forty-five. After these periodicals have done duty in the reading-room, they are given out to the men to take to their claims, making the plan of the Periodical Club seem almost like an endless chain in its desire to ever "pass it on."

Recently it became necessary for the Periodical Club to make an appeal for help through our Church papers. As a fitting tribute of this twentieth anniversary of the Church Periodical Club, I would like to suggest that each librarian, and any one interested in this work, should try and make a special effort for a Silver offering in every parish, be it small or large. It would greatly aid the financial condition of the Club. According to the rules of the Club each librarian, or her parish, should contribute at least one dollar a year, or more, if possible, which helps to defray the postage, express and other necessary expenses at the New York office.

During the past year we have sent out three hundred and twelve current and secular periodicals, one hundred and fifty Sunday School books, thirty-seven secular books, three hundred and seventy-eight odd magazines, one hundred and forty-five Easter cards, one Bible, ten pictures, seven barrels and nine boxes of miscellaneous literature. Twenty six dollars and fifteen cents is the total amount of money contributed.

There are thirty-one librarians. In our large diocese it seems a small number to report. During the past year a few new librarians have been appointed, which is encouraging and gives hope that in the future more parishes will give their aid to this worthy work, and another year bring greater results.

It is only by making "a good thing better" that we really progress, and may each one strive to bear this in mind, so that by our faithfulness we will encourage others to be the same, that the work may be the better carried on for the uplifting of our fellowmen.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY SECRETARY'S REPORT

The past year has been one of progress in the Junior branch of the Auxiliary, owing first to the energy of the Sectional Heads and second to the readiness on the part of the branches to take up whatever work was suggested to them. In each section new branches have been formed, fifteen in all, these in nearly every case being the outcome of a personal visit by the Sectional Head who explained Junior methods and started the branch in the right way. Buffalo has now a branch of the Junior Auxiliary in every parish but three, Rochester in every parish, while the smaller cities and villages are not behind in their interest.

An important change in the arrangement of the box packing has been made in the Buffalo Section, the Christmas gifts being now sent in the late spring and the miscellaneous box early in January. This has been urged before but never adopted, but it came about naturally this year as among the missions to be supplied with Christmas gifts were Eagle and Fairbanks, Alaska, and the packages had to be mailed in the summer. The Geneva Section which hitherto has confined its attention to southern missions selected this year Mr. Deloria's Indians of South Dakota and the Rochester Section after packing its box for St. Elizabeth's School, S. Dakota sent what remained to add to Mr. Deloria's box. This, too, was composed chiefly of Christmas gifts.

The three sections sent boxes to eleven different mission stations, the total valuation amounting to \$1,105.12 an increase of \$299.11 over last year. The gatherings for the packing of the boxes have been successful as always and the secretary had the pleasure of being present at the spring meetings in both Rochester and Geneva. At the former there was a meeting of branch heads for an hour preceding the arrival of the children and several difficulties were freely discussed and, we trust, removed. Mrs. Merrill met with eighteen of her branch heads early in January, when the work for the coming year was planned and in connection with the meeting there was a "primitive missionary exhibit" to stimulate imagination. A second conference of branch heads was held this last month to plan the mid-winter box at which time eighteen parishes were represented by forty-two members. Five Junior branches sent delegates to the district meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held in Phelps January ninth.

For years it has been the custom of the Babies' Branch to give five dollars to each Junior pledge, thus in a practical way showing the very close relations between these younger departments of the Woman's Auxiliary. Owing to confusion in reporting this money it was decided last year to discontinue the plan and the Junior treasury has had to meet

the entire pledge alone. We wish our annual meeting might have seen all obligations fully met but the treasurer reports a deficit of about thirty dollars. If the branches would *all* place the pledge first in importance, and the box second there would be no difficulty in paying our promises promptly.

Three faithful workers in the Junior Auxiliary have passed from our midst since a year ago. Mrs. Albert Cleveland of Canandaigua although not recently an active worker was for sixteen years head of St. John's branch, and always an interested friend, Mrs. Shirley Brown of Hornell, and Mrs. Charles H. Smith of St. James Church, Buffalo. Five years ago when the lessons on the pledges were issued Mrs. Smith assisted in their preparation, and the missionary spirit which she so beautifully described in the lesson on the "Sibyl Carter Scholarship" was hers when she met with us in our annual meeting and will abide with us as we recall her presence, for though the dead rest from their labors yet their works do follow them.

LITTLE HELPERS' REPORT

Let us all sing in our hearts the refrain of "The Little Helper's Song"—"Thank Him all ye little children," as we see how God has blessed our work this past year.

With this refrain, their annual letter began, and as big children we may well echo their song as we review the work of the past year together, Woman's Auxiliary, Junior Auxiliary and Babies' Branch. We are, indeed, in Western New York a three fold cord woven more closely together each year, and more fully appreciating our dependence one upon the other, and that unity brings strength.

The gift from the boxes of Western New York this year was \$377.25 and one of the things we are doubly thankful for is that we have kept our pledge to the Board of Missions, and the \$175.00 asked of our Babies' Branch was the first gift sent from the boxes.

The old pledges for the Kindergarten teachers in Akita, Japan, for the lot at St. Agnes Hospital, Raleigh, N. C., for Bishop Spalding's Emergency Fund for his Indians and the Font, have also been kept. The Font Miss Emery sent to Honolulu for the church for the Chinese, where Mrs. Folsom is working so faithfully. Two new pledges were added this past year. One was among the Mountain Whites at Corbin, Kentucky in St. John's Institute. Five Dioceses gave together the small sum of \$25.00, which educates a little boy seven years old. We have named the scholarship for Dr. Lloyd our General Secretary.

Another gift new this year was for the building fund of the Memorial Ward in the new "Sunshine Sanitarium," San Francisco, California. All the Little Helpers are helping in the building fund. Six dioceses are to equip beds in a ward. \$25.00 was taken from the boxes for this ward, while the bed with its equipment of bedding, towels, napkins, chair, table, bed-table, screen and rest is from special mothers in memory of their Little Ones in Paradise.

We have now in the Alliance Bank, Rochester, \$94.53 and the balance required, \$2.32, to complete this beautiful memorial is pledged.

It was through the sale of a Sunshine and Gladness Card that bed, mattress and pillows were bought, and some women of the Auxiliary have been very lovely to their "Little Helpers" in helping them with their cards.

From the boxes we have, as in the past, helped our Western New York Indians, and a bell has been bought for their church at Irving in which "The Babies' Branch" had a part.

Then our Font in the diocese was not forgotten, and this year was placed at St. Paul's, Darien.

The Deaf Mutes too, have had help, and the amount given from these "Little Helpers" for the work in their own diocese was only \$46.00; yet it taught their parents a mighty truth that we have a duty right here in teaching in our own Missions the importance of Baptism—of helping Indians depending on our care—in giving to the people of silence the help of the Christian Ministry.

The letters printed and sent through Parish Secretaries to every one that has contributed, reach many that never see the *Spirit of Missions* and over 700 are printed each year.

From the boxes was taken \$16.65 for the expenses and \$10.00 for the Manual of the Woman's Auxiliary.

A special of \$20.39 was given to defray the expenses of printing *with* the amount from boxes.

After our reports are sent out to "The Little Helpers" and their gifts have been sent away, we take all pennies from the boxes sent for The United Offering—for this is our cup of blessing that has run over, and the

amount this year is \$8.70. Lockport—All Saints just having sent \$3.50; Holley \$2.31 from their boxes, while the rest was from Rochester Parishes.

Three interesting meetings and a box packing have been attended by your Secretary. The box packing at little Marian Cooper's, was a morning never to be forgotten. Ten Little Helpers were gathered together to prepare the package to go by mail to Akita, Japan, and the value of the gifts—50 in number became \$10.00, for after one had been mailed others added their help who could not be present, and \$1.00 was given by Graham Thompson of New York for the candy. But the refrain we all carried with us was,—“Little Town of Bethlehem” sung by one Little Helper, as we offered our gifts together.

The first United Meeting was in St. Marks, Rochester, May 27th, when eleven parishes presented their offering of \$118.14. Seven of our Rochester Rectors showed their sympathy in this work by marching up the aisle with their “Little Helpers” who carried plumes of white lilacs and little banners of silk with the name of their parish printed on them.

The church was filled with interested friends from all the Rochester parishes.

On June sixth another interesting meeting was held at “The Ascension,” Buffalo, where again eleven parishes sent their offerings of \$138.86 in the form of fruit which the Rector gathered together in the Alms Basin, wreathed with flowers. It was beautiful and full of teaching.

A feature of the Buffalo meeting was the printed invitation in verse which was sent to each guest. The meeting for “The Little Helpers” next June will be at St. John's parish.

Batavia had its meeting on the ninth, and there twenty children came together with a gift of \$14.00, and a beautiful memorial gift has been sent since then, the result of that meeting. Corning has the banner number of “Little Helpers”—67 at the present date.

Have we not indeed cause to thank Him for our inheritance in Western New York;—unity, loyalty, increase of gifts, increase of love for His children all over the world.

DIRECTIONS

To Parish Secretaries:

1. The work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the Corresponding Secretary in mid-summer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

2. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish,

3. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress immediately after a decision, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay.

4. Parish Secretaries must also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box and from whom.

5. Secretaries will please send, as soon as the box has been dispatched, a letter to the missionary stating date of shipment, and also a letter to the Directress, with a statement of the value of the box. The address of the sender inside of the box is *always* advisable.

6. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the Recording Secretary of the Diocese, for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st. (A *type-written* list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)

To Parish Treasurers:

1. All items of money should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer except those of the United Offering, which go to the Treasurer of that fund.

2. Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering.
