CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November.

X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meeting shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The Diocese is divided into six districts, each district under a secretary appointed by the president, and each with its box-directress to whom parish secretaries apply for work.

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life, all over the Diocese, through reaching parishes far from the customary centres, and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for missions in this organized way.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections, however, make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The six districts are as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY FOR 1909-1910

The twenty-ninth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York was held in St. Mary's on the Hill, Buffalo, November 11th and 12th, 1910. There were 220 delegates in attendance from 54 branches. At the opening service on Wednesday evening we were addressed by the Bishop of the Diocese, Rev. Hugh Burleson and the Rector of St. Mary's. Much of the inspiration of the following day was due to the presence and words of two of the secretaries from the Missions House, Rev. Mr. Burleson and Miss Grace Lindley. A delightful feature of the two days together was the reception given at the See House by Bishop and Mrs. Walker in honor of our Diocesan President.

For the Semi-Annual Meeting we gathered in St. Luke's Church, Jamestown, on June 1st and 2d. Again Bishop Walker was with us, speaking of the Missionary opportunities in our own land, while Rev. A. M. Sherman, of the China Mission, made on both days forcible presentations of conditions and needs in the Orient. A note of added earnestness was given to the Jamestown meeting by the announcement by the Rector of the volunteering for service of Miss Lucy Fish Baker, a valued worker in many parish activities. Miss Baker sailed on November 8th, for St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China, adding another to the many links which bind us, in Western New York to the Mission Field.

The reports of District Secretaries and Directresses showed a total of 104 branches contributing thro' one or more of the avenues of Auxiliary effort. Of these 90 contributed to the Box Work.

Nine District meetings have been held, three in the Buffalo district, one in the Geneseo, one in the Geneva, one in the Olean and four in the Rochester. One new branch has been reported, with one discontinued. Nine Young Women's Organizations have contributed through Auxiliary channels; two in the Buffalo District, three in the Geneseo, three in the Rochester, and one in the Geneva.

Turning to the Box Work, 19 family boxes have been sent to the field at a combined value of \$2,548.77. The miscellaneous boxes were valued at \$2,676.83. It is a matter for congratulation that the work has been almost evenly divided between the more difficult personal boxes, and those termed "miscellaneous." The Alaska work amounted to \$261.96, that for St. Elizabeth's Indian School, South Dakota, to \$340.41, with much larger amounts sent to the colored and mountaineer work. The nine Young

Women's Guilds have helped us to the extent of \$400. The total box-work for the year has amounted to \$5,225.60, a falling off of \$2,539.42 from the results for 1908-1909. This apparent backward movement needs some explanation. At the annual meeting one year ago, the delegates assembled in St. Mary's on the Hill, voted, practically unanimously, to place no further value upon second-hand clothing. It was a step taken primarily in the interest of the missionaries, at the cost to ourselves of lowering by \$2,500.00 our Box-Work column in the Manual, and in Miss Emery's report; but it is a step which has been splendidly worth while. It has placed our box-work upon *visibly* higher levels; we have sent better boxes, with more new articles than ever before, and the \$5,225.00 which we report today, means \$5,225.00 of *actual worth*. You would be interested, I am sure, to read the letters received from the missionaries themselves, expressing strong appreciation and approval of the action, as a result of which they are freed from the possibilities of being credited at the Missions House, with greatly over-valued boxes. Miss Emery, from whom the original suggestion came, has written: "You are good pioneers, and I hope that the example of Western New York may be widely followed."

For our Annual Officers' Conference, we were the guests once again on the second Monday in March, of Bishop and Mrs. Walker at the See House, and again we experienced the helpfulness of a day devoted to an earnest and thoughtful conferring together.

Leaving now the things which are behind, the question presses insistently as ever, along what lines may the note of advance be sounded for the coming year? There is a need in the box-work for more parishes willing to undertake the hard things. Some branches have accepted for the first time, this year, the difficult forms of box-work—the family letters, the clerical suits, vestments, outfits for Indian children, and appeals for Alaska, but there are still some fairly strong branches doing only miscellaneous work. Eleven Indian children, in a school at Ross Fork, Idaho, will be obliged to wait until late in the spring for the comfortable, warm clothing which already they are in need of, because we are not always willing to spend our money outright for the things which cannot be made with thread and needle. Let this year mark the wide-spread endeavor to fit not the appeals to our resources, but our resources to the appeals. Only so will the box-work become more completely an expression of the true spirit of Missions.

A *second need* is for Altar Guilds, who are willing to give some of their time and effort to far-away calls for vestments, altar linen, and hangings. It would bring a new vision to these organizations, whose work is already so redolent with loving service, if some work could be undertaken, perhaps during Lent, for the faithful Mission Priest and his humble House of Prayer.

Looking again at the work being done by the Young Women's Organizations among us, one longs for some determined and concerted effort to increase their number. Think of the great army of the unemployed in this Diocese, between the junior and senior age—unemployed in the mis-

sionary cause—and of what a virile Young Women's Auxiliary might be built up from this material, so rich in latent capacity for leadership and self-consecration.

In closing, one cannot but feel that the growth of the year has been in ways which cannot be measured or tabulated for our inspection. It has been a growth in breadth, in responsiveness, in willingness to sacrifice appearances for the higher good, while the beginnings and healthy growth of the Church Prayer League among us, give evidence of new vigor in the life of Intercession.

It has been a year of deeper vision, and it remains for us now to make the coming year one of larger demands upon ourselves and our membership—a year of "great expectations" in the things of the Kingdom.

THE RESOLUTION FOR THE UNITED OFFERING
OF 1913 .

Adopted at the Conference of Diocesan Officers, October 6, 1910

RESOLVED: That the United Thank-Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of woman workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.

THE WOMAN'S APPORTIONMENT AND DESIGNATED CONTRIBUTIONS

When Bishop Lloyd told the Woman's Auxiliary nine years ago that they ought to give \$100,000 every year toward the undertakings of the Board of Missions he started us on a definite task that we have been working at ever since. Our progress has been slow, though steady. We have not yet been completely successful. Miss Emery helped us by apportioning to each diocesan branch its reasonable share of the \$100,000. Of this, our part this year was to be \$1,400. We paid it, and \$106.86 more.

The Junior Auxiliary did not complete its apportionment (\$200) in time to be reported at the early date appointed by Miss Emery, so their payment will appear next year. The Juniors were close upon the full amount, and will doubtless complete it. The Babies' Branch was apportioned \$200, and gave \$210. So that Western New York (always accounted as a whole in this estimate) stands \$66.86 ahead for the year just closed, besides

the delayed Junior payment. The same apportionment is suggested by Miss Emery for 1910-1911.

It is not expected that all of our diocesan pledges should be for this purpose, but that other and further gifts from individuals should be, so far as possible, turned into those channels which help the Board of Missions to pay its pledges. In order that these additional gifts may be credited to our Woman's apportionment they should either be sent through our diocesan treasurer, or else the amount reported to her if sent directly to the Board of Missions in New York. In all cases add, "to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary apportionment." The donor's name may or may not be made public as preferred.

Money may be sent marked "For missionary work in the District (or Diocese) of —" for use in any such District or Diocese, and in the same way it may be sent for missions among Indians or Negroes. The Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Ave., New York, will give detailed information as to the sums needed to support hospital beds, scholarships, Bible women, native deacons and priests, single men and women, clergymen and bishops. It must be remembered that the thousands of undertakings throughout the world, to which the Board of Missions has pledged its support, are chosen after the most painstaking research and complete information.

There are women who look for wise ways of giving more money to missions after the parish pledges have been paid. To these an appeal is here made to consider the desirability of sending at least a part of this additional money through the "Designated Contributions" for the undertakings of the Board of Missions.

It is also suggested by Miss Emery that her general report of the Woman's Auxiliary to be made to the Board of Missions each fall be more limited than heretofore; and that, if approved by the Board, the tables in this general report should contain only those sums of money, whether under appropriation or special, sent through the general treasury and acknowledged in the *Spirit of Missions*, and the record of those boxes sent to Missionaries and Missions approved by their Bishops at the Auxiliary headquarters.

ANNUAL REPORT DIOCESAN SECRETARY SPIRIT OF MISSIONS

Mrs. President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Your present Secretary of the *Spirit of Missions* undertook the work a year ago, and during the year she has found it a pleasant and we hope profitable task in its propaganda of the cause of missions.

The work, as you know, is mostly carried on by correspondence and by means of these letters, she has made many acquaintances and I hope we may also say friends.

Between seventy and eighty parish secretaries, or rectors, have been communicated with, and in many of the parishes well organized work was found being done and, as a result, long lists of subscribers have been sent to be enrolled on the Diocesan list.

She wishes now to thank those secretaries who so promptly replied to her letters.

In other parishes, however, she found a certain amount of lethargy and no systematic way of keeping the names of the subscribers to the magazine, so when a list was asked for it was very difficult to obtain it.

Your secretary, therefore, suggests that each parish secretary have a book in which she writes down the name and address of each subscriber, not only those recently obtained through her efforts, but all subscribers in her parish.

In order to obtain the names of old subscribers the rector should be asked to speak of it from the chancel asking each subscriber to send his or her name to the parish secretary.

If this were done a full list could readily be obtained.

In some parishes the grim reaper has cut down some of the choicest grain, and names that have always appeared as subscribers, appear no more.

Should we, however, use the simile of the "grim reaper?" Should we not rather say that for them, "the strife is o'er, the battle done, the victory of life is won?"

I think so, but we need others to fill up the ranks made vacant, and at this annual meeting, I want to make a special appeal to the parish secretaries, to take up the work with new vigor, so that every parish in the diocese shall have a large number of subscribers to our mission magazine. I believe if this were the case there would be a new birth in enthusiasm for missions.

In the pages of the *Spirit of Missions*, our missionaries north, south, east, west, pour forth their tales of love and labor for the friendless and down-trodden, the ignorant, and the blind, and if we read these stories, how can we but be moved with pity and with love?

Missionary boxes for providing for the bodily needs of missionaries and their charges are good, are greatly needed, are Christ's work, but when filling these goodly boxes let us think more, study more about the bread of life our missionaries are carrying with them and of the light they are shedding in the dark corners of the world. The *Spirit of Missions* tells of all these things and it would be well indeed if, at each meeting of the parish auxiliary a few minutes were devoted to reading from its pages.

The first issue of the magazine was published in 1836. It was issued by the authority of the Board of Missions and published under its direction.

To tell you what place this magazine takes in this work, I can do no better than quote from its pages:

"By the record of what her missionaries or other servants have done, or begun, by the continual presentation of the wants of perishing souls, souls for which Jesus Christ poured out His precious blood, the church will seek to impress her children with a proper sense of their indelible, baptismal

responsibility and to rouse them to a better estimate of their inestimable baptismal privileges. May God give access to the hearts of His people and, imbued with the spirit of truth, the spirit of peace, the spirit of love, the spirit of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, may this magazine prove itself the *Spirit of Missions*."

Thus nearly eighty years ago spoke the leaders of our church. Today the appeal is as strong and stronger.

The *Spirit of Missions* tells us of the work in China, Japan, the Philippines, Alaska, Africa, the far west, the sunny south, in mountainous regions and fertile plains.

In the pages too, we get the best reports of the proceedings of the General Convention and in one of its latest issues Miss Emery gave her impressions of the great Edinburgh Conference.

Just now too, it has started a series of missionary lessons for use in Sunday Schools.

As members of the Church, particularly as members of the Woman's Auxiliary, we should each and all be subscribers to it. Are we? If not, why are we not?

I must not, however, detain you longer, but in the words of a South Dakota Indian, "I shake hands with you in my heart."

MISSIONS STUDY CLASSES

At one of the closing meetings of the great Triennial of 1910 in Cincinnati, Bishop Anderson summed up, as the Watchword of the Convention—"Christian Education, Christian Unity and Social Righteousness." Of this triad we may apply in part, the first to our study of Missions. Study and Unity were the dominant notes of the Triennial. The prominence given to study in the Junior work plainly makes it the duty of the women of the Auxiliary to inform themselves, that they may intelligently train their daughters in missionary knowledge and develop in them the latent spirit to work for the cause of Christ either at home, or, if the call comes, to join the workers at the front.

When we are studying Missions we are studying what the Church was organized for. Will not the women in every one of the 104 parish branches in our Diocese—those who know so well the Church's efforts to extend Her bounds—this Lent, gather into groups for systematic reading or study of that work in Domestic or Foreign fields?

Choose as the Leader of your class one who has a love of the work and a desire to teach; who has a share of missionary intelligence and is keenly sympathetic—yet it is not personality which counts, but the Holy Ghost working through her. Your Leader should have the definite aim before her that some member of her class may be impelled to give herself or someone dear to her to Christ's Work at home or abroad.

The Educational Department of the Board of Missions publishes a textbook on every field, with Helps for Leaders and methods for teaching, which latter must be adapted to fit conditions.

One thing which is very earnestly asked of every Leader, is, that when the determination to form a class is reached, and later when the season's course of study is ended, reports may be sent to your Educational Secretary, to aid her in making a complete summary of all Missions Study pursued throughout the Diocese. I feel that I can report definitely only 25 parish, and two interparochial classes among the Woman's Auxiliary; although I am convinced that many more groups of women have done faithful study during the year, failing only to report that work to me so that I might accredit them with it in this report of the year's work.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

Books, magazines, and the daily papers have become such a part of our very existence, that in this progressive period and ever advancing civilization, possibly many of us have never had occasion to consider what a deprivation it would be to live without them. Yet there are many who have few or none of these blessings that we so often consign to the waste paper basket, without a thought.

"If each man in his measure
Would do a brother's part
To bring a ray of sunshine
Into a brother's heart."

Many and various are the means of dispersing our "sunshine," and among them stands the Church Periodical Club. It was only a small seed sown by an invalid. The seed took root. It grew and flourished, until today it holds a sacred place in our hearts as a blessed reminder of this noble woman's great love and desire to serve her fellow creatures. Let us try to imitate her example, and each sow a seed, that it too may bring forth good results.

Fifty-six librarians have been enrolled on the Periodical Club books of this diocese, but only thirty-three can be considered active. It is very necessary to remind the librarians again that a reply to all inquiries is one of their most important duties, and to impress upon the contributors the importance of sending a magazine regularly, with postage prepaid; also the need of funds to carry on the work. A former librarian writes me she has sent the *Spirit of Missions* to one person for more than ten years. Such faithfulness should be an inspiration to all librarians. Let every parish strive to do its share in aiding and encouraging the librarians; they in turn, I am sure, would show greater enthusiasm, and an increased interest be added to the work which will enable me to give better reports to the New York office.

It is by co-operation that we can reach those who hunger for good literature and thus fulfil the motive of the Church Periodical Club.

The appeals that come are numerous and often most pathetic. We should not turn aside and forget those who are without this mental food. From Alaska a man writes: "When hunting was suspended each day seemed a week, and he had most of his reading matter by heart." This man was also kept in a great deal by lameness, and he asked that an occasional novel be added to the magazines.

In a factory town, where they only have a priest once a month, these women meet in the evenings, when they can, and sew for the missions —some one reading aloud the *Spirit of Missions*.

Last February the first Conference of Diocesan Correspondents was held in New York. It proved a most helpful way of interchanging ideas, and many points of interest were discussed. Among them was the subject of the Endowment Fund. "The sum hitherto asked for is \$15,000. There is at present in hand \$6,000, invested in American Express Company stock, yielding 12%; \$3,000 in Savings Banks, yielding 4%, but soon going down to 3½%; \$3,000 raised last year and invested." As expenses are going up and interest on permitted investments going down, it seems to be necessary to increase the sum for endowment. It was suggested that Diocesan Officers make a special effort to raise money for this purpose "in order that the rents, salaries, and office expenses may be covered, and future contributions set free to go directly into the work of purchase and distribution."

During the past year four hundred and thirty-seven church and secular periodicals have been sent regularly. One hundred and fifty-nine books, nine hundred and five odd magazines and papers; seventy-five Christmas and Easter cards; ten pictures and games; four packs of playing cards sent to an army post; eight boxes; thirteen barrels; total amount of money for the year is \$30.15.

I am proud to report the Traveling Library from St. Thomas' Church, Bath. It is the first one, and thus far the only one from this diocese. Mrs. Robie, the librarian, deserves great credit for her untiring efforts. She gave not only time and thought, but a personal touch to the task, showing that she feels "Nothing is ours until we share it."

It is by reading that we keep in touch with the world and its continual onward move. By it we gain higher thoughts and better aims, our inspiration to nobler living. Can we, who are blessed with reading matter, forget the sorrows, disappointments and discouragements that are so a part of life, that must be met and lived, and still neglect to lend a helping hand in spreading good literature?

"Then give to the world the best you know
And the best will come back to you."

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY

In looking back over our work, its success or failure cannot be measured merely by material results. So in estimating our growth in the past year, let us think for a moment what are the three parts of Junior work, and in that way estimate what has been accomplished. These three are prayer, study and gifts—the gift of money and work, and the gift of life.

Whether or not we have been as faithful in our prayers as we should be, we can only judge by our increase, and by the results in the other two parts of our work—study and giving. In the way of increase, we have surely been blessed, as we have ten new branches formed during the past year.

In the department of study, nineteen branches are reported as having taken up a regular course and several others have had instruction on the pledges. The work was not as successful as had been hoped, but we believe much of the imperfection was due to insufficient time for preparation. This year, by beginning now to make definite plans for the year, it is hoped that much more may be accomplished.

The giving of pledges shows an increase of \$31.70. The total amount of box-work for the year was \$813.08. a decrease of \$388.48 from last year owing to the discontinuing of the valuation of second-hand clothing. Nine boxes were sent to Cape Palmas Orphanage, Pine Ridge, S. D., Ashe-

ville, S. C., Morganton, N. C., Oneida, Wis., Church Mission Home, Charlottesville, Va., Santee Agency, Neb., besides a box valued at \$15 which was given by the Buffalo section to the Rev. Mr. Buisch of Alaska. Our United Offering this year was more than ever before, \$127.03.

Included under gifts there is one other thing which we, as Junior leaders, should have continually in mind for our children—the giving of life. From our Auxiliary must come not only the faithful church men and women of the future but also the future volunteers for the Master's service in the field. And we, of Western New York, have something to be thankful for this year, in that we are giving lives. Two Juniors at Corning have begun a definite course of reading in preparation for missionary work, and one of our Junior leaders has already gone to Alaska as the wife of a missionary.

There have been some changes in the Junior department in the past year. Though Mrs. Harvey has moved to the Geneseo district, she is still doing efficient work as head of the Geneva and Bath districts. Mrs. Berry has again taken up the work in the Olean district. It is constantly growing there, three new branches having been added during the year. It is with deep regret that we are obliged to announce that Mrs. Merrill is to give up the work in the Buffalo section as she is leaving the diocese. But her work is splendidly organized and in a most prosperous condition and, we feel certain, must remain so. The Rochester section is growing, and has the latest recruit in a branch of twenty at Piffard. On the whole, there is a growing spirit of unity and earnestness.

For the future, then, may we, as Junior Leaders, do our work in a spirit of prayerfulness, and give our children an example of self-sacrifice, earnestness and sincerity. Let us in our study, and constantly in our work, endeavor to rouse their imagination, so that they may see the world-wide vision. Then will we be hastening the coming of the Kingdom.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LITTLE HELPERS

NOVEMBER 9TH, 1910

The Little Helpers work is being felt today as never before, for the Church is asking, "how can we reach the women who do not attend the Auxiliary meetings, or see a *Spirit of Missions*? those who love not the work, and know nothing of its joy?" Our Little Helpers answer this question; for each one is consecrating a Mother, and enlightening her mind by this prayer and gift; and we are not only educating a great army for the Junior Auxiliary, (who know every penny means a prayer, and have formed a habit of life), but are reaching, and adding valuable members to the Woman's Auxiliary "For a Little Child shall lead them." Bishop McKim told us in Cincinnati that the value of our kindergarten at Akita could not be estimated. It had reached the Mothers of Japan as no other work could have done. And the Gaylord Hart Mitchell Kindergarten which we all helped to build had become *Nine* in his Jurisdiction.

Miss Salisbury working among the Indians at Birch-Coolie in Minnesota said "She felt this was her greatest work among them." The mothers love the box and can hardly wait for the child to be baptized, they want it so much to be a Little Helper. She has *90 Indian children in her Branch* and their gift was the largest in the Diocese of Minnesota. The memorial Box is especially dear to the Indians as it is to us all, for it makes Sunday not only a missionary day but a day of remembrance. We have in *Western New York 152 in our Memorial list* and this box can be placed where there is no Parish Secretary, where there is no Woman's Auxiliary, where there is no Church, where there is not even a child, save one in Paradise. And mothers can in this way help the Apportionment Fund and little children everywhere.

Miss Moulson will tell you how much money has been given by Western New York. I want to tell what the *61 Dioceses have reported this year*:

\$6,312.21 whole amount.
\$4,217.19 Board's appropriation.
\$1,076.88 Specials.
\$1,018.14 United Offering.

This does not include any gift for Diocesan work but money sent through the Church Missions House and our United Offering.

Miss Emery has asked us all to unite in giving *\$500 for the Kindergarten at Mayaguez, Porto Rico*. So the \$50.00 we gave to Manilla we will transfer this year to another of our new possessions and a part of the 2d District, which is our own District.

A special gift was sent from Western New York to Mountain Whites in North Carolina at Beaver Creek. This was a phonograph with 27 records and the money came from eight mothers in memory of Little Helpers, as well as fourteen active ones. This gift was all outside of red boxes. Mrs. Hamilton's letter is full of appreciation of this gift. *Every year Miss Emery sends a Font from the Little Helpers. This year she has sent two.* One to the Park District in Porto Rico where a glass dish was used, and another to

Otsu in the District of Kyoto, Japan. We have a part with the other Dioceses, *in Twelve Fonts*, and twelve more have been given in our own Diocese. Every time we give a Font the Kingdom of God in this world is strengthened, for a new member is admitted into the Kingdom and the Babies' Branch has for its first principle Baptism. Bishop Coxe at our June meeting in 1891, at Watkins, when this work was presented to Western New York with 80 boxes, felt the great power the work was to be to the Church of the future, and sprang to his feet saying: "This is the key note of the Convention of 1835. Enroll your Little Ones." Are you each one doing this?

DIRECTIONS

To Parish Secretaries:

1. The work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the Corresponding Secretary in mid-summer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee, are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

2. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress at the same time, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay. You should also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box, and from whom.

You should write again to the missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, stating date of shipment and enclosing the received bill of lading and you should also send a letter to the Directress giving the value of the box. This makes at least five letters to be written in connection with each parish box. It is always advisable to put the name and address of the sender of the box inside.

3. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the Recording Secretary of the Diocese, for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st. (A *type-written* list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)

If delegates to the annual or semi-annual meetings, find, after their names have been sent in, that they are unable to attend, they are requested to notify the head of the hospitality committee immediately, if necessary by telegraph, thus making room for others and preventing unnecessary confusion.

To Parish Treasurers:

4. All items of money should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer except those of the United Offering, which go to the Treasurer of that fund.

5. Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering.
