CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch the of Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November.

X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The Diocese is divided into six districts, each district under a secretary appointed by the president, and each with its box-directress to whom parish secretaries apply for work.

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life, all over the Diocese, through reaching parishes far from the customary centres, and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for missions in this organized way.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections, however, make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The six districts are as follows:

BUFFALO DISTRICT: Angola, Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, Lockport, Medina, Williamsville, Middleport, Niagara Falls, North Tonawanda, Gowanda and Youngstown. (Erie and Niagara Counties.)

ROCHESTER DISTRICT: Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls, Spencerport. (Monroe and Orleans Counties.)

GENESEO DISTRICT: Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford, Perry. (Livingston, Wyoming and Genesee Counties.)

GENEVA DISTRICT: Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee. (Wayne, Ontario and Yates Counties.)

BATH DISTRICT: Bath, Canaseraga, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Addison, Catharine, Montour Falls, Watkins. (Steuben and Schuyler Counties.)

OLEAN DISTRICT: Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Angelica, Dunkirk, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere, Ripley, Ellicottville, Cuba, Silver Creek. (Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties.)

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The Triennial meeting, which has been so long anticipated, is over. Many of you were able to attend it. And now we have all come back to Western New York to share with those who did not go, the inspiration of those great gatherings. As the next three years go slowly by, we shall show, as a Diocesan Branch, whether we have made a right use of these Triennial opportunities. Grave is the responsibility if we do not use well the uplift of those noble services, those heart-searching "Quiet Hours," those analyzing conferences, those helpful normal classes in missionary study, those stirring addresses from missionaries from the field! All the things that could help us in our Auxiliary life were gathered there, and offered to us in the short space of fifteen days, for the benefit of all. There was no limitation of helpful grace.

But the diocesan work begins again. We are now assembled here to close the old year and to open the year of effort that lies before us. May it be blessed! We are going to keep up all the work that we have already begun. For Western New York there is never any step backward. Let us think for a moment of the duties and privileges of this coming year in regard to study. All of those normal classes in the great parish house of St. Michael, pre-supposed a carrying on of these classes in every parish within our reach. Two conferences on Missionary study were held in New York, at one of which our educational secretary, Mrs. Berry, read an excellent paper.

No sooner was the great United Offering made, than we voted to give the whole of the next offering to women's work, with the view of assuming the support of all the women in the field—a mighty task!

In the new undertaking of the Older Girls and Younger Women we were found at the head, or very near the head, of the dioceses which have started on that work. It is not yet large enough to be turned over as a whole to the Woman's Auxiliary, as had been expected. For three years more it is to be grouped with the Junior work,—reporting with them. But at any time, any group of these young women may come into the Woman's Auxiliary from their own choice, and be heartily welcomed there.

Classification was a matter that received much attention, and your president served on a Junior committee, containing two members of the Woman's Auxiliary, to consider and report on the resolution offered which bore upon this subject. Western New York desired to see the Little Helpers given as much independence within the Auxiliary as the Juniors have. But their wish could not be wholly granted. The Board of Missions recognizes two divisions only—Women and Juniors. Other departments must be grouped under these heads. So the Junior Branch is associated with the Older Girls and Younger Women on the one hand, and with the Little Helpers on the other. The three groups are known by letters, and are probably to have names. The Little Helpers made their first appearance on the cards of notice of this meeting as "Section 1." It was felt that the work of the Little Helpers was made more widely known by the abundant discussion of all these points. A suggestion was made that if the Woman's Auxiliary desired at any time to form a younger group, the Older Girls and Younger Women might enter it as Chapter B of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Coming to the treasurer's work, this diocese had the happiness of knowing that it had more than paid all that was asked of it for the apportionment.

Box-work was carefully considered in conference in New York. The I wa plan, of sending money only, was rejected. The missionaries in general, like our present way of sending boxes the best. And whose preferences should be considered, if not theirs?

So you notice that there are slight changes in nearly every department—enough to keep us alert, and busy in adapting the new to the old.

Let us be loyal to the Auxiliary, to one another, and to the Saviour who set us our missionary tasks, in sending us into all the world to preach the Gospel to every creature.

In view of the fact that each diocesan Branch has been asked by Miss Emery to agree on a day when the members of the Auxiliary may, in the Holy Communion, pray together for God's blessing on their Body and its Work; let us this year choose Ascension-day, at either the early or the later celebration, for this united supplication.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY FOR 1912-13

The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions held its thirty-second Annual Meeting in Trinity Church, Buffalo, Nov. 13 and 14th, 1912, when 160 delegates were present from 49 branches. On Wednesday the Juniors and Little Helpers held their meetings, and a model Study Class on "Japan Advancing" was conducted by the Educational Secretary.

We were privileged to have as speakers during the two days of our gathering, Rev. Dr. Harding, Secretary of the Second Missionary Department; Rev. Dr. Reese F. Alsop of the Board of Missions; the Rector of the Parish; the Bishop of the Diocese, and our General Secretary, Miss Julia C. Emery.

The Semi-Annual Meeting was held in Grace Church, Lockport, June 4th and 5th, when 41 Parishes were represented by 158 delegates. Our missionary speaker, on this occasion, was Rev. Robert Wood of Wuchang, China, and we were also addressed by the Rector of the parish, and Rev. Mr. Cooper of Geneseo, Bishop Walker being unavoidably absent.

The yearly Officers' Conference was held in St. James' Church, Batavia, where we were guests of the Officers outside of the Buffalo and Rochester Districts.

During the past year the strength of the Auxiliary has been represented by the fact that 110 parishes and missions report some branch of the work done. Of these five report a Junior branch only, one an Intermediate, and two Little Helpers, leaving 103 Senior Organizations. Of these eighty-two contributed to the Box-work. In addition ten Young Women's branches, or Chapter B's, helped to swell the total. At the beginning of the year 70 branches reported a membership of 2489—a gain of seven branches reporting, and of 149 members over last year. One new branch has recently been organized at Silver Creek.

Of direct inspirational value have been the usual District Meetings and the Junior Institute, held in Rochester in January, at which a Study Class for the senior Auxiliary was one among many helpful features.

What, now, has been accomplished in the Box-work? The plan of sending to fewer stations has been followed in the main, though we have branched out a little as we have found that the missions were being sufficiently supplied. Those which we have helped most largely in addition to our family boxes have been St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, the Allakaket, Alaska, the Indian School at Fort Hall, Idaho, and Mountaineer Missions in North Carolina.

The value of Indian work, including Alaskan, was \$1,558.80, of Mountaineer, \$1,664.40, and of Colored Missions \$747.69. The family boxes amounted to \$2382.41. These with other scattering values bring the total to \$6,285.29, a loss of \$486.20 over the work of last year. There are two causes which might seem partly to account for the decrease—the increased emphasis placed upon the Apportionment, and the fact that it has been exceeded in all of our departments, and also that the work undertaken has called for less outlay than usual. This could hardly account, however, for the entire falling-off, and it is hoped that the parishes which show a decrease in their Box-work may have gained in money offerings, so that the work as a whole may not have suffered.

Turning now to the work that is before us, we have again on our list St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, and Fort Hall, Idaho, and in addition the Oneida Indian Mission in Wisconsin, Mountaineer work in North Carolina, St. John's School and Hospital, Ketchikan, Alaska, and St. Mark's Hospital, Salt Lake City.

As we prepare and pack our boxes this winter, let us try to realize, anew, that we and those whom we help are members one of another, that our boxes are all a part of the great, growing effort to make of the world a brotherhood, not so much, as Bishop Rhinelander says, by *giving* as by *sharing*—and that our very least efforts may be used for the bringing in of His Kingdom of Love.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:

Inasmuch as this is our report for the Triennial of 1913 I may be pardoned for going back over the history of Missions Study in this diocese.

As long ago as 1898 a class existed in Trinity parish, Geneva, and Inter-parochial classes in Rochester and Buffalo. In 1903 the Buffalo work was placed in my hands and the Interparochial class was attended by an average of 80 women. We chose our own subject at first and worked it out in our own way—with papers and discussions and readings. Then, Rev. Everett P. Smith was appointed Educational Secretary of the Board and planned our course for us—China, Japan, the Islands of the Pacific, Africa, the Mountaineers of the South all claimed our attention in successive seasons.

Work was started in nearby towns and cities, but with self-chosen subjects. At last the idea of concentration and uniformity reached out to us from the centre of all our work—that busy hive at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York. Summer schools were organized; the subject for the year was planned for us; collateral reading was furnished and lantern slides were loaned to illustrate the subject—and Missions Study was avowed to be a definite, important branch of our work for the Board.

In 1909 your Diocesan Educational Secretary was appointed and in thus definitely placing the responsibility for growth on an individual the work and its character have broadened and developed. In only a few cases has the work been self-chosen—and by the appointing of District leaders who report to the diocesan educational secretary, as she in turn reports to the Educational Secretary of the Board, the field has been more systematically covered.

Normal Classes were held at District meetings, exhibiting the method of the model class. Demonstration classes were also conducted by the diocesan educational secretary at the semi-annual and annual meetings of the Auxiliary. In every way we have tried to demonstrate the prescribed method. Normal classes have been held in Buffalo and Rochester in the weeks preceding Lent, thus preparing parish leaders for the Lenten course, and the consecration and devotion of these normal leaders is noticeable. One writes that she has visited the classes at work in her district, preparing herself to talk to the smaller classes which were unable to carry out their program. Another, who says that she prepares herself to speak on every subject for fear the person to whom it has been assigned will not be present, repeats that the privilege and benefit of her preparation has been to her inestimable.

The text book, "Japan Advancing—Whither?" prepared by the Educational Secretary of the Board, Rev. Arthur R. Gray, met with general favor, and was almost universally adopted; only two or three groups studying self-chosen subjects.

Before recapitulating for you the statistics of our diocesan study, I would say that we classify the reports in four divisions or methods:

- I. Readings from the textbook or *The Spirit of Missions*.
- II. Lectures.
- III. Program Meetings.
- IV. Model or Discussion Classes.

We will group them in the six districts of the diocese.

The BATH District had two Discussion Classes. To quote from a leader's letter:

"Topics with references for reading were prepared by the leader, written on separate slips by the leader, and handed to different women at the beginning of the meeting. The leader took charge, connected the topics, and announced the topics for the next week.

The other class in this District was not given up in spite of the severe illness of its admirable leader, but was carried on successfully by a young man whose mother was a member of the class.

I quote from Mrs. Kirtland's report of the work in the Buffalo District:

"There were 21 classes in the Buffalo District last Lent. Of these, one class studied the Acts of the Apostles instead of Japan; one class studied China; two classes had readings from 'Japanese Girls and Women' as well as from the text-book, supplemented by an afternoon's address by Mrs. Kirtland—the address being a résumé of the text-book. Eight classes were very near to the standard and might truthfully be called 'ideal classes.' Mrs. Kirtland lectured at St. John's and at St. Thomas', conducted an afternoon class at St. Jude's, St. Simon's, and at Grace, and a Porch Class on the Conquest of the Continent at Orchard Park. Two men have led the classes this year in their respective parishes, the Rev. Mr. Harrison, at E. Aurora and the Rev. Mr. Ryan, at Grace, Lockport." The work in Buffalo has gone on uninterruptedly for so many years that it has developed in efficiency and method.

In the OLEAN District a demonstration class was held at a district meeting and there were, during Lent three Discussion classes; one series of eight program meetings on the Women of the Mission Field; six groups reading the text-book and the *Spirit of Missions*. A decided gain in this district over last year.

The GENESEO District had six Discussion Classes; two with readings, and four program meetings—one of the Discussion classes ending with a lecture with stereopticon. Two leaders used the lecture method; one, a clergyman, making his address on the Friday evenings during Lent a résumé of the text-book "Japan Advancing—Whither?"

In the GENEVA District there were four Discussion Classes and three groups reading the text-book. From one of these classes was sent an offering for Christ Church, Osaka, and one leader writes me "the study has done us good and the members wished to extend the class indefinitely."

One class in this District used the combined Lecture and Discussion method, having for a speaker at its first meeting, Mrs. Graves the wife of the Bishop of Shanghai. One of the topics in this class "Our material gifts toward Japan's Spiritual Life" was a wonderful summing up of our institutions and properties in the Island cities. Ten minutes of each meeting was given to a discussion of current missionary topics. I think this was the custom in many classes—at least I made the request that it should be a part of class work throughout the Diocese.

The ROCHESTER District has shown the greatest gain in number and method of the six District divisions; there were eight discussion classes; three groups read the text-book, one used the Lecture method and one was a combination of the three methods. One class had for its subject "The Mountains of the Bible"—the subject treated in a unique way.

A Missions Study Class on Mexico was conducted at a District Meeting in Rochester.

I asked parish leaders to send me the average attendance at their classes and this has been done in all but nine instances. I find that, allowing five members to each unreported class, over seven hundred women are registered in the study classes of the Diocese of Western New York. I have not included the intermediate societies as these will probably be counted with the Juniors but I have reported three groups of young women inasmuch as they used the senior text-book.

The year just closed has shown us how much may be accomplished in the future by concentrated and uniform effort—working con-jointly, and by telling the story of our work to one appointed to record it. The opportunities afforded by Summer Schools and Conferences, the co-operation of our rectors, the enthusiasm of those of us who will avail ourselves of the Conferences and study classes—above all, the spirit of intelligent, earnest consecration to the work—all these must tend towards making our study of China next year the best and most fruitful in the history of Missions Study in our Diocese.

CHURCH PERIODICAL REPORT

It was said of a sparsely settled section of North Carolina, that the people did not know much about the Church, but they knew all about the Church Periodical Club. I feel you know all about the Church, but you do not know or realize the amount of work done by the Periodical Club. I came home from the Convention hungry for librarians, and enthusiasm and aid from the Auxiliary. There is this peculiar value about a book or a paper, that when you read it, and get out of it all you can, it is just as good for the next person as for you. Bishop Tucker of Kyoto said "I want to thank the Church Periodical Club, for myself and my missionaries, for the books and papers we receive. Our missionary work involves long trips in uncomfortable

Japanese trains and many long periods of isolation from people of our own race. In these circumstances a bright, cheery story or any good light reading is a good boon."

During this year our Diocese has sent out one hundred and forty-nine current periodicals regularly, ninety-eight contributions of periodicals, one Bible, ninety-two Christmas and Easter cards, twenty-five picture cards, valentines and calendars, seventeen boxes, and only one Travelling Library, which is supported by the Bath Librarian. The amount of money used by Librarians for their expenses was \$19.73, sent to the New York office for current expenses \$15.00.

We have lost by death one librarian, Mrs. Sherwin of Batavia. There has been one resignation, Mrs. Levi Ward of St. Pauls, Rochester. Mrs. E. C. Stebbins has been appointed to take up her work.

Will each Auxiliary president make it her duty this year to see who the librarian of the Church Periodical Club is in her parish, and aid her as much as she can? If there is not a librarian, will she ask her Rector to appoint one. Why! the correspondents of Central New York, and of Massachusetts have to have a secretary, they are doing so much work. I hope the correspondent of Western New York will be able to report at the next General Convention, in three years, her work is so great she has to have two secretaries. The Church Periodical Club asks you for your books, periodicals, and your financial aid, and your prayers, that this good work may be supported and strengthened.

REPORT OF JUNIOR DEPARTMENT 1912-13

Those of us who were privileged to hear Bishop Lloyd's opening address to the General Convention received a big vision of what the Church might become if all its resources financial, intellectual and spiritual were brought into play. He spoke specially of the weakness of the Church in the rural districts, and reminded us of the splendid material which is often lost to the Church and which should be a great factor in the life of the Church and the nation. He urged the Church to feel the responsibility for this part of the work, in order that by the time of the next Triennial there might be laid before the Convention a plan which will provide efficient machinery for the conservation of every resource of the Church.

The realization of this weakness in the scattered districts has been the principal effect of the past year's efforts for unity in the Junior Department. And surely the conservation of the children of the Church and their religious training will help in the realization of the Bishop's vision.

So the Key-note of the coming year is to be extension. Our watchword is a branch in every parish and mission.

The great difficulty in work in these scattered districts is to get efficient leadership, not from lack of ability, but because it is harder for such leaders to keep in touch with the central organization and to avail themselves of opportunities for training. How to overcome these obstacles, therefore, will be the chief problem of our work during the coming year. Suggestions for the solution of this difficulty are that the stronger districts help the weaker ones both financially and by sending leaders, where this is possible.

Western New York has led, this past year, both in the number of new Junior branches and in the number of branches of Older Girls. Other causes for thankfulness have been an increase in pledges, in the number of study classes and the number who have availed themselves of opportunities for training in the District classes, the Diocesan Institute and by attendance at the summer conferences. Western New York had ten representatives at summer conferences this year.

Ninety-nine branches have done some work during the past year, one hundred and two are ready for work this fall; of these thirty are Older Girls. Twenty-seven are new branches. That the Junior Department is coming to be regarded more as a training school is evidenced by the increasing interest in the educational part of the work. Miss Sabey reports constantly increasing use of the fifty-one volumes in the library, and ordering of books from the Missions House. Fifty branches have done mission study during the past year. A normal class was held in Buffalo and a training class in Rochester in addition to the Institute.

The work of the Buffalo District opened with a Corporate Communion and everywhere the spiritual side is kept ahead; first things are being put first.

In the Buffalo District three mass meetings and box-packings have been held and a like number in the Rochester District. Three plays, a box-supper and an exhibit at the time of the Institute show the methods used to rouse the interest of the Juniors.

Boxes have been sent to colored missions in the Diocese of Tennessee, Morganton and Waynesville, N. C., St. Elizabeth's School and Pine Ridge valued at \$1,144.11.

The \$425.00 pledged for scholarships has been raised, and \$26.00 more, which went to General Missions. The \$100.00 asked for expenses was also raised. In addition to this specials have been sent amounting to \$190.00. \$15.00 from Le Roy was sent to Valle Crucis and \$175.00 from St. Mary's Guild, St. Mary's-on-the-Hill, Buffalo, to St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai. The total of over \$740.00 is the largest ever raised by the Junior Department. The United Offering was \$107.27.

The new financial system and the new report cards can not be counted a perfect success, but results justify their continuance for another year.

It is hoped that each year may strengthen the organization, so that we may help to realize Bishop Lloyd's vision.

LITTLE HELPERS' REPORT 1912-13

"The Little Helpers" have dropped one of their names since our last report. They have gone back to the original one given them by little Gaylord at the time the Society was started in 1891. While "Babies' Branch" has become dear to us all, it limited our opportunity for work, so that the majority called for the other name. You will all realize we have been asking God to bless "The Little Helpers" as well as the Missionaries, and not "The Babies' Branch."

For many years we helped the Junior Auxiliary with their work, and gave \$25.00 toward the support of their pledges, until it was found in 1907, that this confused our reports. For that reason, the Junior Department asked us to make a distinct report, and have our own Treasurer. Mrs. Potter was fourteen years Treasurer of both sections. How grateful we all are to her for her patient and faithful service.

We are coming together this year at this 12 o'clock hour, to pray and see how we can be knit together in closer fellowship of the Church in our work for children of *all* ages. In this diocese, there has always been the most close and beautiful sympathy, but as one of the Resolutions passed at our late Triennial was, that "Special thought be given to the development of Sections one and three," and as we are Section 1, in order to take one *step forward*, we really step back, for we were one Department for many years.

Miss Moulson—our Treasurer—has had plenty of work in caring for Little Helpers, and faithfully has she performed her duties. She has left us for a time to work among the mill people, at The Good Shepherd Mission, LaGrange, Georgia. But she loves the work of the "Little Helpers" so truly, that she does not want her place filled for a year; so I am going to call on the Parish Secretaries to help me in different ways. Mrs. Walter North looks after the Buffalo section, and there we have each year a beautiful service for the children. This year it was at the Church of the Good Shepherd. Another was held in Rochester, in St. Mark's, and I also had the pleasure of being in Geneseo, when their generous gift was presented.

Our part in the United Offering was \$100.00. \$320.00 went toward the apportionment of Western New York. We have 53 parishes with this work. Eighteen children are called "Miss Hart's Circle," as they do not represent Parishes. One hundred and seventy-five Memorial Boxes are kept in this Diocese.

From Miss Emery's report just received, I find the 65 Dioceses gave this year \$5,876.80. This did not include money sent direct for Diocesan Missions, which most dioceses include in their work.

For 12 years we have given a Font in the Diocese. This time it went to Depew.

It was your Secretary's privilege to be one of the five to be elected from The Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York for the General Convention, and while there, to hold six conferences for work for children under eight years of age. Four of them were in the Chapel of St. Michael's, and two in the homes of two interested workers in New York.

Twelve Dioceses were represented at each meeting and 15 people. We decided on a Prayer for our Parish Secretaries, and new work for our Kindergarten. Deaconess Carlson from Akita was with us, and we have promised to help her this year to put an upper story on our Kindergarten Building in Akita, giving a room for her teachers to sleep in, and where she can have her mothers' meetings.

We also promised to help Dr. Teusler in the building for St. Luke's Hospital.

We have now three beds in St. James' Hospital, Anking, China—one supported in memory of Frances Wood of Batavia; one in Gaylord Hart Mitchell's memory, and one called "The Little Helpers' Bed." \$30.00 supports a bed for a year. The Little Helpers give \$15.00 for the support of the Little Helpers' Bed while the rest is given as specials.

To sum up our points of contact—1st Praying for each other. 2d Providing a box that shall take the place of the red ones when they become Juniors. 3d At eight years of age welcoming our Little Helpers into your midst by a service.

The plans of the two sections of the Junior Auxiliary are necessarily different, for WE do not, as a rule, send Missionary Boxes. There are no meetings, except when the gift is presented. OUR children are all Baptized. OUR children cannot enter into the plans for Junior Study, but education has been our watchword. We emphasize the gift with the Prayer, and teach mothers the delight of a United Offering of Prayers and pennies with her child, and form habits in life, and try to make the work and workers real.

So let us choose as the Junior Sections do, a word for this year, and that is "Reality":

Realize our great responsibility to God for such an awful, sacred trust;
Realize our responsibility to our Parish to do each one her part faithfully and lovingly;
Realize how we can lift the standards of the Church in its men and women, if we make their first years of life stand for Christ.

We cannot teach the children until the work is very real and dear to us.
They challenge our sincerity and loyalty to our King.

DIRECTIONS

To Parish Treasurers:

1. Parish treasurers should send money, as usual, to the acting diocesan treasurer, Mrs. Potter, not later than Aug. 25th, as the fiscal year at the Church Missions House closes Sept. 1st, and consequently the Western New York books must close five days earlier.

To United Offering Treasurers:

2. Money for the United Offering must be sent to the treasurer of that offering, Mrs. Woodward. Semi-annual collections are desired, in order to secure the interest on the first payment.

To Parish Secretaries:

3. The box work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the Corresponding Secretary in mid-summer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee, are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

4. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress at the same time, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay. You should also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box, and from whom.

You should write again to the missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, stating date of shipment and enclosing the receipted bill of lading and you should also send a letter to the Directress giving the value of the box. This makes at least five letters to be written in connection with each parish box. It is always advisable to put the name and address of the sender of the box inside. The prepaid freight is always estimated as part of the value of the box. An effort is being made to send a copy of the Word of God in each box.

5. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the District Secretary, for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st. (A *type-written* list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)

6. If delegates to the annual or semi-annual meetings, find, after their names have been sent in, that they are unable to attend, they are requested to notify the head of the hospitality committee immediately, if necessary by telegraph, thus making room for others and preventing unnecessary confusion.
