CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November.

X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The Diocese is divided into six districts, each district under a secretary appointed by the president, and each with its box-directress to whom parish secretaries apply for work.

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life, all over the Diocese, through reaching parishes far from the customary centres, and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for missions in this organized way.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections, however, make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The six districts are as follows:

BUFFALO DISTRICT: Angola, Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, Lockport, Medina, Williamsville, Middleport, Niagara Falls, North Tonawanda, Gowanda, Depew and Youngstown. (Erie and Niagara Counties.)

ROCHESTER DISTRICT: Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls, Spencerport. (Monroe and Orleans Counties.)

GENESEO DISTRICT: Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford, Perry. (Livingston, Wyoming and Genesee Counties.)

GENEVA DISTRICT: Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee. (Wayne, Ontario and Yates Counties.)

BATH DISTRICT: Bath, Canaseraga, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Addison, Catharine, Montour Falls, Watkins. (Steuben and Schuyler Counties.)

OLEAN DISTRICT: Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Angelica, Dunkirk, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere, Ripley, Ellicottville, Cuba, Silver Creek, Wellsville. (Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties.)

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

One year's work is now closing. We are preparing to begin the next. May God's blessing be upon it! We shall listen to officers who report to us what they have accomplished in the year past; and we, ourselves, by debate and vote, are to decide on the policy of the Auxiliary in this diocese for the coming year. Roughly speaking, the morning is devoted to looking backward, while the afternoon's work looks forward. Delegates will find in the morning reports a valuable training for the afternoon decisions.

There are some interesting alliances in the departments. You would say, if you stopped to think about it at all, that the little Comfort Club was closely related to the Box-work; and that the work of the Spirit of Missions secretary and of the Church Periodical Club, were naturally grouped with the Educational Secretary's work. The pledges and the United Offering stand alone. One always comes first, the pledges; while the United Offering is collected last, and is an over-and-above gift of thankfulness. We should remember that the pledge-money goes directly into the mission field, and begins its privileged work. All departments show advance. Several suggestions will be made to you of better ways of doing things. And I beg you to consider these suggestions in a co-operative spirit. They are the growth of experience, and are worthy of being tried.

The Synod of the Second Province held its first meeting as a Province, in Brooklyn, two weeks ago. You will remember that you entrusted to my care the matter of our representation at the sessions of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province at the same time and place. I appointed Miss Lyon, of Bath—a former corresponding secretary and at present a district secretary, as the delegate from Western New York. She will report later to you on the meeting.

It seems to me that the culmination of our year's work is to be found in the amount we have given to help the undertakings of the Board of Missions, \$3,100. This is about a fifth more than last year. Our treasurer will show you how this increase came. A letter came a few days ago from the Rev. Mr. Davis, which I am to share with you. Let me read it:

"My dear Mrs. Nicholas:

The Diocesan Committee on General Missions met on October 29th at the See House, and heard with deep appreciation the announcement that the Woman's Auxiliary had contributed \$3,100 towards the diocesan apportionment. By resolution, I was instructed to express to you and the members of the Auxiliary our heartfelt gratitude for this splendid help. It has been an inspiration to us, and has contributed in no small degree to the gratifying result of last year's work. With your co-operation next year, the committee hopes to place our diocese on the Honor Roll of the Board, and for that co-operation we gratefully ask again.

Also, in the Pastoral Letter of the House of Bishops, issued from Minneapolis last month, the clergy and people are urged, in view of the terrible war and its consequences, "to let the spirit of self-sacrifice be called into willing action, so that the beneficences of religion, charity and missions may not suffer loss." This should be the key-note of our coming year, I believe; and I should like to see it printed on the title-page of our Manual. I do not know how to tell you how much I care about this matter; how I, too, hope to see the diocese next year on the Roll of Honor, to which it has come so near. The interests of the diocese seem more closely related to us since we have been asked to give a definite amount. It has been a constant pleasure to see the sum increase through voluntary interest. The *amount* shows that the Auxiliary has done its share in parish and diocese, while the *money* goes forth on its blessed mission.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

The thirty-third annual meeting of the Western New York branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in St. Andrew's Church, Rochester, November 12 and 13, 1913. One hundred and fifty-five delegates were present representing 39 parishes. The speakers on Wednesday evening were the Rev. J. K. Thomas, rector of the parish; Bishop McKim of Japan, and Bishop Walker.

The semi-annual meeting was held in the Church of the Ascension, Buffalo, June 3-4, 1914. Delegates representing 37 parishes were present.

At the Missionary meeting the speakers were the rector, Dr. Jessup, Rev. Arthur Sherman, of Hankow, and Bishop Walker. On Thursday, Miss Thomas of New York gave an interesting talk on the work of the Church Periodical Club of which she is general secretary.

The officers were the guests of Mrs. Jackson of Clifton Springs for their March conference. The meeting was held in the chapel of the Sanitarium, which has been the meeting-place of wonderful missionary gatherings. But the conference of the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary held there on March 10th is believed to be the first gathering of Episcopalians ever held in that historic room.

During the year 84 branches have contributed to the box work, sending in all 143 boxes to the southern mountaineers, the Indians, the colored people, the families of missionaries, and to two hospitals.

Just before his death Bishop Spalding wrote, "I do not know how to thank the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York for the gifts sent to St. Mark's hospital. You have filled our store-room with supplies which were very greatly needed." Equally appreciative letters have come from the other stations to which our boxes have gone.

This fall the boxes are going to La Grange, Ga.; the Indian Mission at Ft. Hall, the Colored Mission of St. Mary's, Columbia, S. C., with a few to the southern mountaineers. We have also the usual family boxes.

The Box-Directresses offer for your consideration the advice of Miss Emery on valuation of Missionary boxes.

"The Missionary box should be valued according to *its value to the receiver*. That is to say, articles should not be valued that are not exactly what the receiver needs, or that are added for the pleasure of the recipient, as, at Christmas, toys and candy for the children. And let us remember that these 'boxes are missionary, to help in the effort to spread the Kingdom of Christ throughout the world, and to bear His mark in every particular.' Then the missionary boxes will reach their greatest efficiency."

REPORT OF THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS SECRETARY

Personal effort is the dominant note in all successful business enterprise, and getting "in touch" is an *important* factor in building up a clientèle. It is for more *personal* work that an appeal is made to the Spirit of Missions Secretary in this diocese.

For two years the magazine has been under the increasingly successful management of Mr. Cyril D. Buckwell, whose office is in the Church Missions House in New York. From time to time advertising matter is sent to each diocesan Secretary, for distribution to the Branch Secretaries, who act practically as publicity agents for the periodical, by obtaining new subscriptions, and by being particularly careful to collect personally, and forward *renewals* to 281 Fourth Avenue; also, if there is a decrease in the number on the list, by making a very special effort to secure enough new subscribers, to fill up the gaps left by those who have fallen out. This matter of *renewals* is a most important one, for the *Spirit of Missions* loses thousands of subscriptions a year just through failure to renew, often from carelessness or negligence. A dollar is such a small sum for which to write a check! One hates to send money through the mail, and it sometimes seems a lot of trouble to get a postal-order. So let us Secretaries look after the renewals.

In one parish where it has been tried, this plan has worked admirably, and it is earnestly recommended to *all*. Co-operation of each department of every branch with the other departments is a help to *Efficiency*, which is often overlooked. The work is the Master's; and while some special phase of it is entrusted to each one of us, we must all help those *other* units, which collectively make up the perfected whole. In *co-operation* we shall find the "point of contact," which crowns personal effort with success.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York

Now that the work of the study classes for this year is finished we will glance backward over the ground we have covered and look forward to the path prepared and made easy for us to travel when we begin our study next autumn or winter.

In all successful concerted work there must be a source, a fountain-head, a spring, a leader, sending forth streams in numerous channels to distributing points which in turn diverge in many directions, but all keeping the thread unbroken and traceable back to the source. This should be true in this study of ours. The Board of Missions chooses for a specific reason, yearly, a strategic field upon which the entire body of students is asked to concentrate its attention. They appoint an Educational Secretary, who is a member of the Board, to plan out and prepare for use in every diocese a text-book and a help to its

use; to select books which are advantageous in giving perspective and definiteness to the work. The Educational Secretary of the Board transmits helps and material to an appointed Secretary in each diocese; and she, in turn, sends on the stream of information to the parish leaders in every remote corner of her diocese.

So, you see, the plan of Missions Study is a carefully thought out system. Do you not think that we should help the head, *the Board of Missions*, in this department, as in others, by pursuing the course of study planned for us as nearly as possible in the way they ask us to do?

When we sum up our winter's work I think we shall find that conformity has been the rule and self-chosen work the exception, because of the 56 classes reported all except one have studied the official course, using for the text-book either the "Emergency in China," "The Life of Bishop Ingle" or "The Story of the Church in China." These books should be in every parish library and circulated widely. "The Emergency" for its facts; "Ingle" for the example of a lovely, strong life, and "The Story of the Church in China" for the sympathy and interest it at once arouses from beginning to end.

We, in this diocese, were fortunate in having the notes and summaries used in one of the Triennial classes, with the Prayer Cycle for China prepared by the Leader of that class.

Several members of the Western New York Branch came to our work with the fresh inspiration gained from the wonderful privileges of the classes held in New York.

We began the year's work with a Demonstration Class at the time of the Annual Meeting of the Branch in Rochester, and a class was held at each of three District meetings during the winter.

A wave of illness and epidemic disturbed the order of our work in many places; but, undaunted, the workers went on as they could. In one parish the books of the course were circulated from house to house of the members, so that they were read by all.

Our splendid Normal Class in Buffalo was interrupted, after one lesson, by contagious illness in the family of its Leader, but her plan of work was so distinctly outlined that, by a diligent use of the telephone, the work went on, and Mrs. Kirtland writes: "When I went to the sectional meeting at Lancaster in April my heart glowed with pride as parish after parish told how absorbed they had been in China; its opportunities and its needs, and how enthusiastic even the indifferent members of each class had grown."

One leader gave a supplementary talk at her own house, which she called a "China Tea," to fill in the lessons for the members who had been obliged to miss a lesson here and there.

Another had an interesting and beautiful set of curios to show her class.

Several Rectors of parishes led classes themselves and one who had many classmates in the China field gave to his lecture-talks personal touches which interested his people deeply.

The Stereopticon illustrated the lessons in not a few classes. Rochester had a wonderful Normal Class preceding Lent, the Leader preparing most thoroughly the entire course beforehand and bringing it to a successful end at her own house. She also visited three out-of-town parishes and organized

and conducted classes which did excellent work. There was a great gain in the work of the Rochester District this past winter, due to the unflagging zeal of its District Leader, Mrs. Brown.

One group showed an exhibit of interesting curios loaned by the "Missionary Education Movement."

One leader in the Geneseo District writes that she enjoyed her class so much that she was encouraged to the extent of volunteering to accept the work another year, if she were asked to do so.

Two members of the State School for the Blind were in a Batavia class and evinced always much interest.

In one of the Geneseo classes the members voted to take a special missionary for their personal interest, choosing Mrs. Ely, and they voted to collect and sell old jewelry, this summer, for the benefit of St. Mary's, Shanghai. An offering for St. Luke's Hospital, was also the result of this class.

In the Geneva District one class made an offering of money for General Missions, which was to go to China. Another class, led by the rector, held two extra meetings because of the keen interest of its members.

A notable example of Program Meetings is that of St. Luke's, Jamestown, in the Olean District. It is several years old and has 100 members, with an average attendance of 75. The sharing of the program is a rule which makes the interest so general that the missionary gifts of the women of this strong parish are stimulated by it. The parish sent a teacher to Wuchang who was induced to go because of her enthusiasm, aroused while the leader of a class.

Besides the program meetings, there were also two Discussion classes in the parish.

The most remarkable of all the work reported to me in this Diocese is the group of four classes in Christ Church, Corning, all taught by the same leader, the membership aggregating 83 persons, all taking, as their single aim, "To realize our personal responsibility to see that China has the help needed, by providing the very best types of men and women, and also the money necessary to carry on the work of Christ effectively."

The members agreed to be present whenever possible; to prepare for each session; to offer daily petitions for Missions, mission-work and workers, especially those in China. One of these groups was composed of 13 interested people wholly unable to attend meetings, but who bought the "Emergency" and agreed to read it at home. Two of the classes adopted the suggestion that a mite-chest offering should be received for the advancement of work in China.

The Missions Study work in Corning is four years old, beginning under the same leader with a membership of 13, and her consecrated service has brought a seven-fold blessing in members.

The "Emergency" was used in the Sunday-School of the parish in a class of 11 young men, and the "Flowering of the Flowery Kingdom" in the Primary Department of the school. But these last can only be mentioned as they have been reported through the Sunday School commission.

Our subject for next year will be the Social Results of Foreign Missions, with a text-book by Pres. Faunce, of Brown University, which is promised by Sept. 1. Among the books for collateral reading, that to which we are looking forward with expectation, is one to create a point of application for the course.

This will be prepared by the Educational Secretary from material furnished him by Bishops Brent, Graves, Tucker, and others.

Those of us who have kept along with him during his journey to the Far East, by reading his "Snapshots" in the columns of the *Churchman*, will be prepared for enjoyment in his completed book. I have not given you many statistics, but have chosen distinctive features from our 56 classes, with the hope that you may be inspired to do even better work next year for the extension of the Kingdom.

CHURCH PERIODICAL REPORT

The Church Periodical Club is a society organized to provide reading matter for those who are unable to obtain it for themselves. Thousands of current magazines, religious and secular, are forwarded by its members all over the world.

The Church Periodical Club works through diocesan and parish officers, who should be consulted by those who wish to share in the work. Everyone may share in it, as the opportunities range from the sending of a post card to the founding of a library.

An appeal has been made for books and Christmas cards for missionaries and Shut-Ins. Let us make an earnest effort among our friends, and in our own parishes, for Christmas cards, so that we may send a bit of Christmas cheer at home and abroad. Books need not be new, but modern and readable. New theological books would be most welcome.

Chaplin Smith of Madison Barracks, N. Y., asks for a few records for a Victrola, also for playing cards. He has the men at his home every Thursday evening. His records are about worn out. The Chaplin spends three entire days and nights, after payday, with the men to keep them from spending their money at the saloons, as they are very apt to do.

We have one hundred and ninety-two contributors who have sent regularly seven hundred and forty-two current periodicals, six hundred and fifty-three Christmas and Easter cards, three Bibles, fifty prayer-books and hymnals, five hundred and forty-one odd magazines, one hundred and three picture cards and calendars, twelve barrels of literature and four travelling libraries. Finan-

cial statement: used by librarians, \$8.50, sent to correspondent, \$28.55, used for postage, \$3.00 Fifty-five dollars were sent for memorial fund, from two mothers, of St. Luke's Church, Buffalo, also five dollars from Trinity Church, Buffalo. The librarians of Buffalo raised the money to pay the expenses of Miss Thomas who was one of the speakers at the June meeting.

With the insistent call for help in Europe and with the general financial depression, this is bound to be a hard winter for all organizations, such as ours. Let us not forget that the hard times will affect our recipients also, and make them more than ever dependent on our help. And let the greater need be to us an incentive to strengthen and increase our work. I heard Archdeacon Stuck speak of the work in Alaska. He closed his address with these words: "This is God's work, and He allows us to help. Just now it is my work, and I am *content* to do it." May this spirit animate all members of the Church Periodical Club.

JUNIOR DEPARTMENT

REPORT OF THE INTERMEDIATE SECTION, 1913-14

The "Intermediates" of Western New York have just completed the second year of their existence as Section 3 of our Junior Department.

Organized two years ago, by Mrs. Holloway, with so much thoroughness and efficiency, we are now reaping the fruits of such wise planting and watering.

It is well, however, to follow the enthusiasms of new beginnings with work within the organization itself, deepening foundations, setting standards, and fitting the girls for the task, as well as the task to the girls. And so our efforts as a whole, this year, have been in that direction, rather than in the way of further extension.

We have, however, eight new branches, at Jamestown, Trinity, Buffalo, Christ Church, St. James, St. Thomas, Trinity and St. Luke's, Rochester, Pittsford and Batavia, making a total of 28 active branches. There are nine branches in addition to these, either lapsed or sending in no report, this year. About 450 girls constitute our present membership.

May I report, very briefly, on the three sides of our work, the S. P. G. of Study, Prayer, Giving, which results in so well-balanced a missionary life and growth?

There have been Study Classes in 19 of the branches, the majority using the Senior Text-Book, the "Emergency in China". It has been a delight to hear that the educational work has been voted in a number of organizations the most interesting part of the year's effort. We must be watchful, of course, that it does not end there, and that each freshening of enthusiasm shall result in new expressions of helpfulness, in well-planned-for and well-directed ways. Some educational results have been—the leading of the Study Class Sessions of one branch by the girls, themselves; the presenting of a chapter of the "Emergency" before the Senior Auxiliary of the parish, the making of a really

remarkable book on China, and Committee work in the arranging for stereopticon lectures, program meetings, etc. One Older Girl has been placed in charge of the Intermediate Work in her parish and others are assisting in Section II. For the Leaders, Conferences were held in the Rochester and Buffalo Districts, and at the January Institute two Normal classes were provided.

Coming now to the second great Auxiliary privilege, what can be said of the organization as a means of "Religious Education?" How do we provide for the Worship which should be the great Companion of our Work? The beautiful new Junior Collect, with its call to Thanksgiving Service, Fellowship, and Consecration, we have tried to put into the hands of every member, to be committed to memory, to be used in private, and at every meeting of every branch. In many of the branches, continuing their Junior training, the girls conduct their own devotions.

Through the Study Classes they have been taught Intercession for special fields and missionaries, and some have written their own prayers for the field which they have studied.

Soon after the close of the Study Classes a Corporate Communion of branches throughout the Diocese, each in its parish Church, and largely at the same hour, strengthened our sense of fellowship and a common purpose, and, we can not but believe, brought us new stores of the Power which "Belongeth unto God." In one branch in the Buffalo District, the third Sunday in each month has been set apart for a Corporate Communion.

Lastly, Giving—We have already spoken of Gifts of Service, the giving of time and thought in Study and Prayer. To the various Scholarships supported by the Junior Department, the Intermediates have contributed \$210.76, to the United Offering, \$62.44 to General Expenses, \$29.93 a total of money offerings of \$303.13. The value of our boxes has been \$322.23—the total of both boxes and money \$625.36, a gain of \$98.29 over last year. Early in the year, a generous gift of \$175 was made to St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, by St. Mary's Guild of St. Mary's on the Hill, Buffalo, in memory of two former members. The amount was credited, however, to the work of the preceding year. Joint boxes were sent to Alaska, the Southern Mountaineers, Cape Palmas, Africa, and to St. Agnes' Hospital, and St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, in some Districts the girls working with Section 2 in the preparation of their boxes.

In closing, will you take one glance into the future with us? We have a year of very definite and arduous effort in prospect. After much thought and conference, we have set ourselves to fresh effort in three directions—first, the reaching out for other girls to share our privileges, setting as our goal a definite increase of at least 25% in our membership, second, the placing of a United Offering box in the hands of each girl, with its call to thankfulness, and as a reminder that she is called to give herself, somewhere, in the Enterprise and third, we have undertaken the support of a special missionary, Rev. Frederick D. Lobdell, of Rutherford, North Carolina, who will be our representative in the fore-front of action, and who will carry to his Mountain people for the Intermediates of Western New York, the message of Love, which we but hold in trust. As Auxiliary Daughters, we ask your sympathy and prayers, that we may realize our hopes.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT, 1913-14

The key-note for the past year's work in the Junior Department was extension, but for numerous reasons it has been one of adjustment. It is gratifying to note that most of the new branches gained are in weak districts where the need of effort seems greatest. To offset this, several branches have become dormant from lack of leaders, and two have graduated into Section III, so that the actual gain in number of branches ready for work this fall is only two. But on the whole we feel that the year has been one of progress in the quality of the work, the enthusiasm shown, greater interest in the educational side and better system and organization of the district work. Two new members have been added to the Junior Committee to build up special parts of the work.

Sixty-five branches have been active this year, as against sixty-nine last year. But twelve new branches have been gained and five revived. The number of branches ready for work this fall is seventy-one, the same as last year; but this really means a gain of two branches, counting the two which have graduated into Section III.

Boxes have been sent to North Carolina, Virginia, Alaska, and Africa, the total value being \$579.26 as against \$854.27 last year. This decrease is to be accounted for partly by the fact that a large proportion of the boxes went to far distant places. Pledges from Section II this year amounted to \$338.87 as against \$373.50 last year. This is accounted for by the loss of branches to Section III; for the total amount of pledges this year from the two sections is more than \$100.00 more than last year. The quality of box-work was much higher than ever before.

Miss Laura Moulson, formerly treasurer of the Little Helpers, has been appointed treasurer for Sections II and III. We feel that we are greatly blessed to have in this office one who has been in the mission field. Miss Ann Prophet, of Mt. Morris, is to take charge of the box-work for both sections, and will be ready to furnish information about the different fields where work is sent.

About forty branches have done mission-study using the Junior text-book, while nearly every branch has had it in some form. The Institute held in Buffalo in January was the most successful and largely attended ever held, twenty-one came from the Rochester district alone. Classes were graded according to the new classification, one being carried on by Miss Hart for leaders of Little Helpers. A class on missionary methods from the Bible, led by Miss Smith in the afternoon, was most helpful. Mrs. Ely, of Shanghai, spoke in a most entertaining manner at two mass-meetings, one for Juniors and one for Intermediates. Another interesting feature was a visit to Mrs. Burrows' branch in North Tonawanda to see her play, *Princess Merrie Heart, and the Light Fairies*, given by her Juniors. "The original princess", Miss Mary Hart, was present and spoke to the children. Later the "original fairies" sent a special gift of \$6.55 to help carry the light to China. Mrs. Sheldon, of Kenmore, is the second new member of the Diocesan Committee. She will do the work formerly done by the Rochester Educational Secretary, Miss Sabey, who was obliged to resign. Mrs. Sheldon has already prepared a bibliography for the text-books for the year, and will have circulating libraries from Albany, and be ready always to assist leaders in their work.

District mass-meetings, box-packings and conferences have been specially interesting and successful. In the Rochester District impersonations of missionaries, and presentations of stations where work was to be sent, were most pleasing and instructive. In the Buffalo District, two large meetings were held for the Rev. Mr. Allen of Waynesville, N. C., who came to express his thankfulness for a box which filled all his needs. A collection of \$103.21 was given to his work.

At the semi-annual meeting a new pledge of \$100.00 was adopted in honor of our former Treasurer, to be called the Effie M. Potter Fund, to be used for medical work at Fairbanks, Alaska. \$75.00 of this is to be given by Sections II and III.

A great cause for rejoicing is a gift of \$75.00 for extension work. It is hoped to build up the weak districts by personal visits from Diocesan officers, and payment of expenses of leaders to Institutes and meetings. Three new branches in one district are the result of a trip by the District Head and Head of Section II. Their reception in these parishes seems to prove not only that we need them, but they need us, and will welcome us gladly.

The Institute, and semi-annual meeting in which the three sections of the Department co-operated, have helped to increase the feeling of unity and give to all a greater appreciation of all parts of the work. We feel that co-operation is necessary if we are trying to bring forth fruits to perfection; it must be "first the blade, then the ear, then the full corn in the ear." And no part must be neglected,—the education in the home, the education through service and study later, if we are to provide efficient members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Social Service is the special topic chosen by the Board of Missions for the year's study. So the Junior Department has chosen for its motto "Christ for every life and all of life." Many branches in the past reported work for the parish, the flower mission, Church Home, and other interests. This year we will emphasize the oneness of all Christian service.

New things planned for the coming year are: A letter-leaflet to be sent to all leaders, containing information about the work, and an Honor Standard consisting of a series of questions about the work. From the answers to these questions a Roll of Honor will be compiled. There is also a new report-book for the use of parish leaders.

This year has been one of deepening, adjustment and small beginnings in new lines; it is hoped that next year will show more of progress.

LITTLE HELPERS' REPORT, 1913-14

The Watchword of "The Little Helpers" Section, this year, is Intercession. Intercession for the Divine measurements of our work. We can only get these from the highest source, our King.

The question most important to Him is—are we each one growing up into Him? Not how many belong to the Circle, not how much money has been given by the children.

We can report One thousand letters sent into homes for mothers to read, which tell where the pennies were sent, with the prayer and the Missionary picture on the front page.

Mrs. North can tell you about the amount she has taken care of as Treasurer, and that we gave for the Apportionment \$90.00 more than was asked. Since reading report yesterday \$16.00 has been added for Miss Mead—\$736.23. We can report three new circles—Perry, Caledonia, and Stafford, with a promise of work next year in Belmont, and Angola.

In 190 homes, Memorial boxes are kept. We have more boys than girls growing up to take their place of influence in the world.

We have been, by corresponding, trying to reach the 15 places where our Fonts have been placed. This year, the font went to the new Indian Church at Newtown.

We can give you from Miss Emery's Annual Report, the fact that this first Section this year, gave \$6,135.77 sent through the Church Missions House, which did not include gifts sent direct, or those given for Diocesan Missions—\$4,861.54 going to the Board's work. For all these splendid figures, we are profoundly thankful, but behind all this, there is a deeper and higher purpose to be accomplished. Can we not all help each other more this year, by Intercession—by getting the real true heart-and-mind measurements that the Divine Leader calls for? Will the Woman's Auxiliary, realizing that we are doing the work they long to do,—that we are their helpers in the home, reaching mothers who cannot come to meetings help us to place these boxes, that the prayer and gift may begin in the home? Our work begins at Baptism and in the home. Mother and child make a United Offering. When they are old enough to attend meetings, the name "Little Helpers" and the red box are given up, for they now bring their penny to the meeting, and their education is in the Parish House. Our hot-bed supplies the Junior Auxiliary with flourishing plants.

Cannot Sections 2d and 3d find us some younger brothers and sisters, for we have boys as well as girls.

Our only meeting is when the offering is presented once a year, and our object lesson is prepared by Diocesan Officers and District Secretaries of Buffalo and Rochester. Each year it is held in a different Parish. Last year, the Story was "The King," and a Crown was filled with flowers.

In the Buffalo District, the meeting was in St. Luke's, Buffalo; in the Rochester District in Christ Church, Rochester.

In Buffalo, 18 parishes were present with their Banner and gift, and in Rochester 16 parishes. Those who attend these meetings love them.

Our special effort this summer has been for the upper story of The Gaylord Hart Mitchell Kindergarten, Akita, Japan, which "The Little Helpers" feel

is their special work always. It was built in 1905, when Miss Bessie Mead, who is with us to-day, was the teacher. Bishop McKim asked for One Thousand Dollars, and Miss Emery writes me \$475.23 have been given up to date. \$55.00 of this, was from our Diocese. I wish we could send more, especially since I received this letter this week from Miss Verbeck, who was with us last year at this time, and now is in Akita, saying:

"You know, of course, about the beautiful upstairs being built. Miss Carlsen is specially pleased, and we are both eager to have the building finished. When it is, I shall send you a picture of it."

The \$55.00 already given was from the special friends of "The Little Helpers", not from the red boxes.

The money for the Font, which Miss Emery sends from all "The Little Helpers", has gone this year to St. John's, Osaka, Japan.

A delightful meeting was held this summer by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Batavia District, when Junior Work was given special attention by Mrs. Burkhardt.

Shall we not intercede for our work as never before? Offer Him one basket with its five loaves, and believe He will use us to feed the multitude that are hungry with the "Bread of Life," to give the cup of cold water "In His Name to the thirsty" and give Him the one talent that he may make it ten, and so, by our quietness and confidence, rest the weary world.

St. Augustine said—"Thou hast made us for Thyself, and our heart is restless till it rests in Thee." Let us rest in Him more fully as we work. Then He will bless our labor for His little ones. We need not try so hard to have better printed reports, but strive for service of more loyal, loving hearts according to His divine Measurements.

One of the tasks set us by Miss Emery has been accomplished. Two sets of the *Spirit of Missions* have been compiled and two completed, the work stretching over a period of twelve years. It is given to mark the worthy labors in the missionary field of earlier graduates of the college.

DIRECTIONS

To Parish Treasurers:

1. Parish treasurers should send money, as usual, to the diocesan treasurer, Mrs. Potter, not later than Aug. 25th, as the fiscal year at the Church Missions House closes Sept. 1st, and consequently the Western New York books must close five days earlier.

To United Offering Treasurers:

2. Money for the United Offering must be sent to the treasurer of that offering, Mrs. Woodward. Semi-annual collections are desired, in order to secure the interest on the first payment.

To Parish Secretaries:

3. The box work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the Corresponding Secretary in mid-summer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee, are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

4. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress at the same time, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay. You should also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box, and from whom.

You should write again to the missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, stating date of shipment and enclosing the received bill of lading; and you should also send a letter to the Directress giving the value of the box. This makes at least five letters to be written in connection with each parish box. It is always advisable to put the name and address of the sender of the box inside. The prepaid freight is always estimated as part of the value of the box. An effort is being made to send a copy of the Word of God in each box.

5. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the District Secretary, for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st. (A *type-written* list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)

6. If delegates to the annual or semi-annual meetings, find, after their names have been sent in, that they are unable to attend, they are requested to notify the head of the hospitality committee immediately, if necessary by telegraph, thus making room for others and preventing unnecessary confusion.
