CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November.

X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The Diocese is divided into six districts, each district under a secretary appointed by the president, and each with its box-directress to whom parish secretaries apply for work.

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life, all over the Diocese, through reaching parishes far from the customary centres, and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for missions in this organized way.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections, however, make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The six districts are as follows:

BUFFALO DISTRICT: Angola, Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, Lockport, Medina, Williamsville, Middleport, Niagara Falls, North Tonawanda, Gowanda, Depew and Youngstown. (Erie and Niagara Counties.)

ROCHESTER DISTRICT: Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls, Spencerport. (Monroe and Orleans Counties.)

GENESEO DISTRICT: Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford, Perry, Caledonia. (Livingston, Wyoming, and Genesee Counties.)

GENEVA DISTRICT: Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee. (Wayne, Ontario and Yates Counties.)

BATH DISTRICT: Bath, Canaseraga, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Addison, Catharine, Montour Falls, Watkins. (Steuben and Schuyler Counties.)

OLEAN DISTRICT: Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Angelica, Dunkirk, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere, Ripley, Ellicottville, Cuba, Silver Creek, Wellsville. (Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties.)

THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

My Dear Friends of the Auxiliary:

Instead of repeating here the account of Triennial évents which I gave at the annual meeting, I want to write to you about the one great new thing which was planned in St. Louis,—namely the Pilgrimage of Prayer. “This name we have taken from our English friends, the plan for our pilgrimage is our own. With them it means the proceeding of persons from place to place, making intercession as they go; with us it signifies the same petitions arising in place after place, until in the course of our Christian Year intercession shall have been made from every portion of the Church.

For this year we hope to make a new beginning, to pray with better understanding of what prayer is, with a firmer belief in its power; and we want to make of the year a pilgrimage that shall fasten our hope and wish on the mind of all.”

Our pilgrimage began with Maine on the first Sunday in Advent, and is sweeping westward at the rate of a week for each Diocese. Western New York's week of the pilgrimage begins with the first Sunday after Epiphany. This Manual will be too late to aid us in our early part of the work, but it will carry the thought through the year till, on the Sunday before Advent, the whole Auxiliary world will commune together, parish by parish. It is a noble plan, and one that makes a constantly increasing appeal to our hearts. Our place in the pilgrimage gives us less opportunity for the inspiration of learning what other Auxiliary Branches are doing; but it starts us early on a plan of prayer and supplication which will remain ours through the year. So, when we come to the closing service, our thoughts will move in the line of these petitions. We shall find ourselves ever using them.

Miss Emery writes me that this pilgrimage is to be made under her personal care throughout the year,—that in thought and interest she will accompany each diocese through its week of supplication; and she has sent me a copy of the leaflet full of her own marks. I want to share this with you.

There are seven petitions, and there are also seven passages of Holy Scripture given as foundations for these petitions.

Sunday, The Unity of Christ's Church. St. John 17:11.

Monday, The Binding Together of the Hearts of His People in the Bonds of Love. Ephesians 6:23.

Tuesday, The Spread of His Kingdom through all the world. St. John 17:20, 21.

Wednesday, That peace may prevail among the nations, among the divided members of Christ's body. Psalm 148:7, 11.

Thursday, That organizations formed for good may work in loving harmony together for the one great aim of making Christ's Name and Love the better known. II Corinthians 13:11.

Friday, That our enterprises of study and gifts and prayer may all be blest through the outpouring of the Spirit upon our souls. Ephesians 1:17.

Saturday, That our fellow-Christians, unreached as yet, may be won to pray and learn and give. II John 3:6.

May this great spiritual advance for which we are striving, bring us abundant blessings for the labors of this year.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

1915-1916

The thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Christ Church, Corning, November 10th and 11th, 1915; 46 parishes being represented by about 111 delegates.

The speakers at the evening missionary service were the Rev. Z. S. Farland, rector of the parish, the Rev. Dr. Arthur R. Gray, Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions, and the Rev. Wm. A. R. Goodwin of Rochester, who took the place of Bishop Walker, the latter being unable to be present.

As the hospitality of the Corning women allowed two full days for the meeting, the members of the different departments found time to hold conferences and to make plans for the work of the coming year. This was most helpful to all. Wednesday was as usual the day set apart for the Juniors. Their fine reports, formally presented to the Woman's Auxiliary, showed most efficient work.

On Thursday morning, at nine o'clock there was a celebration of the Holy Communion. At ten o'clock, the business meeting, which had been begun the previous afternoon with the roll call, was resumed. The pledges remained the same, with the exception of the one in memory of Bishop Coxe. Fifty dollars had been assigned to complete the education of an Indian girl at Ft. Hall, Idaho. This was changed to \$100 to help Bishop Rowe with his work among the Indians in Alaska. It will be of interest to the women of the Auxiliary to be reminded that the increase from \$50 to \$100 was made on the motion of Mrs. Burkhart, who had been confirmed by Bishop Coxe.

A new pledge for \$100 was also made, to be divided between the Arch-deaconries of Buffalo and Rochester. On account of the absence of Bishop Walker, it was thought that this pledge would gratify him and be helpful in his diocesan plans.

During two days of glorious spring weather, May 31st and June 1st, the semi-annual meeting was held at St. Peter's Church, Westfield.

The usual services and business meetings were held.

On Wednesday afternoon the Jamestown Juniors presented at the Patterson Library the "Appeal to the Nations,"—a monologue showing the happiness in Christianity.

The speakers at the missionary service were the Rt. Rev. Wm. D. Walker, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese and the Rt. Rev. Hiram R. Hulse, D.D., Bishop of Cuba. An enjoyable reception was held at the Patterson Library, which was made even more attractive by masses of spring flowers.

The Communion service on Thursday morning at nine o'clock was especially impressive, as it was celebrated on Ascension Day.

The cordial hospitality received at Westfield made the meeting a most enjoyable one.

On March 7th the twelfth annual Conference of the diocesan officers was held at the home of Mrs. Kingman Robins of Rochester. All present felt benefited by the informal discussions and charmed with Mrs. Robin's generous hospitality.

There has been a sadness in the compiling of this report. It was taken from the carefully begun records left by our beloved Corresponding Secretary—Mrs. H. J. Burkhart, whose sudden death last spring brought sorrow to many hearts in the Woman's Auxiliary. These records were supplemented by the reports of the Box Directresses, each one having sent a carefully prepared résumé of the year's work.

In spite of the many demands made upon the women of this diocese to aid the world's sufferers, perhaps because those very demands called out the highest and best in them, the work in the mission field has increased.

Fifteen family boxes were sent this year with a total valuation of over \$2,200. Twenty-five Missions were made happy with boxes and packages, large and small, for schools, hospitals and general mission uses.

Four Joint Boxes, a term conveying unlimited supplies, were sent during the past year.

One to the Pyramid Lake Indians, Reno, Nevada. One to the Arthur Yates Memorial Hospital at Ketchikan, Alaska; another to St. Johns' in the Wilderness, Allakaket, Alaska, and a fourth to Valle Crucis.

The sum total of this year's work is over \$6,500.

As the hearts of the women of the Auxiliary are filled more and more with the missionary spirit, the splendid work steadily increases. May this year's work be blessed.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

To the Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western New York:

When public-spirited women join in the furthering of a plan for the betterment of our country, our town, our home, we give our heart, our mind and our will to its success. There is no turning aside. When a leader necessarily drops out the emergency is met by the unexpected development from the ranks, of another capable, if inexperienced, leader, and the work goes on to the blessing of country and home. Our business is to develop leaders for a future emergency.

Now coming to the work which the women of the Church have undertaken and persevered in, more or less successfully, under the direction of the Board of Missions for thirty-five years: Has its progress ever halted because the office of a diocesan president has been temporarily vacant, or a parish branch has been deprived of its head? NEVER! The business of the organization in either case has been to fill the vacant office—sometimes sad-heartedly and many times with difficulty—but it has been done—and the blessings of the Auxiliary have continued to flow steadily.

Now, this you will see, is only an example which I want to use in discussing the EDUCATIONAL department of our Auxiliary for the past year, and in planning for the work of the coming year.

The great importance of this department should be realized by all of us. We should take its responsibilities seriously, and accept them when they are offered us: we must realize that we are hindering the work of Missions if we decline to join in the furthering of the campaign of education which the Board, the Bishops and most of the clergy plainly say is of paramount importance.

Ought we not to take up gladly this part of the work which is definitely laid out for us and do it to the best of our ability, each branch taking as its motto, "*As I can.*" Will you do this? Will you take Dr. Gray's book "*The New World*" for your consideration next season, and treat it as thoroughly as you can? The course will be ready by the middle of June, and Dr. Gray will give three lectures on it at the Conference of Church Workers at Geneva, July 5-15.

Several branches explained a lack of their usual interest by the fact that there was no text-book issued. This hardly holds, however, as some of the best work done in the diocese was on the review course advised by Dr. Gray. The best demonstration of that course was furnished by a class of Corning women during the Annual Meeting last November. It was intensely interesting, and five of the seven members of that demonstration class taught a class in the parish during the Lent following, aggregating a membership of 231 individuals. The radiopticon was used successfully in two of these classes. The leader of the work in Corning likewise made weekly visits to a neighboring town and organized and conducted a class.

Six new groups were reported this year—and all with enthusiasm, and several leaders report new members in established classes and six rectors have

conducted classes in their parishes. One parish leader organized the St. Andrew's Brotherhood and the Junior Brotherhood into classes, using the *Spirit of Missions* course on the coming of the Church to this country. In a branch which had Program (or as they are now called *Missions Study*) Meetings one member presented the subject and one question was given out each week for general discussion. An interesting feature of the study of the King's Highway, in one instance, was some native impersonations and a debate. A class on Japan received a package of dainty work from Nikko, the proceeds from the sale of which are to swell the fund for the church there.

A class in Rochester with an average attendance of 43, studying the Conquest of the Continent, had an exhibit at each meeting. Two classes in the Rochester District were normal classes, a general invitation to the women of the District being extended for the weekly sessions. Two demonstration classes have been held at meetings of this District which has done exceptionally good work the past year.

Before closing my report I wish to express the loss to the Educational Department in the passing of our friend and co-worker, Mrs. Burkhart.

Absolutely sincere and frank—entirely loyal to the work of the Auxiliary in all its adventures—she ever sought to enlarge the scope of Missions Study in her District, always interested even to the extent of teaching a class when her many other activities permitted. We miss her strong personality. The memory of her consecrated service should increase the zeal and deepen the sense of responsibility which we assume when we become members of the Auxiliary.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB REPORT

The Church Periodical Club closes another year of service with thankfulness and a sense of real encouragement. The growth of interest—*intelligent* interest, the increase in membership and gifts, give evidence of the untiring efforts of many faithful workers.

Present records, with those of last year, show about a thousand more current periodicals forwarded regularly, and an equal increase in Christmas and Easter cards, more Bibles, prayer-books and hymnals, and larger gifts of money. There were 39,000 Christmas cards sent all over the world. During the past year in our Diocese there have been sent out regularly 354 periodicals from 243 contributors, three prayer books and hymnals, and one large Bible for the Lectern, with 95 books, theological and secular, 3 tracts, 976 odd magazines and newspapers, 462 Christmas and Easter cards, 403 picture cards and calendars, 1 music book and Christmas carols, 18 packs of playing cards, paper dolls, 13 boxes of magazines not counted, and 4 traveling libraries.

This last year, for the first time, all diocesan branches were asked to unite in providing a substantial gift of standard and recent books for the Theological Lending Library in the district of Kyoto. While all the books that were asked for have not been secured, the response has been sufficient to suggest the possibility of choosing one special need each year for a general co-operative effort.

It is not generally understood how often money gifts for the work are sent by those who themselves are receiving help of one kind or another.

The children in a southern school gave a generous offering for the club to which they owe all their reading matter. This wife of a miner sends an occasional dollar or two, if it is a good pay day. Two small boys devote to the club their Sunday eggs, or shuck walnuts, with blistered hands, rather than fail to pay what to them is a debt of honor, as well as gratitude. The claim that everything can find a use through the Church Periodical Club has recently been exemplified in case of some phonograph records forwarded without examination to an army post, and discovered on arrival to be French lessons instead of popular melodies. The records are fulfilling their destiny in helping the Chaplain's little daughter to perfect her French accent.

As no gift fails to meet some need, so no service that the Church Periodical Club can render comes amiss.

It may be any one of a thousand helpful acts that are constantly resulting from the simple sending of a magazine; but whatever the outward service rendered, let it be always the spiritual aim of every member of the Church Periodical Club to be a friend to man, and to help men to realize more truly the friendship of God.

JUNIOR DEPARTMENT

ANNUAL REPORT, SECTION THREE, JUNIOR AUXILIARY,

1915-16

The Intermediates of Western New York have had the banner year in their history, so far as the amount and earnestness of their work are concerned. We have at present twenty-eight active groups, with two lapsed branches.

Ten new branches have been organized, or have affiliated with us, since our last report; at St. Philip's, the Church of the Ascension and Trinity, Buffalo, St. Mark's, Rochester, Charlotte, Zion Church, Avon, and St. Marks, Tonawanda; a Young Woman's Bible Class in Geneseo, a Girl's Club and Camp Fire group in Geneva have been the affiliated branches.

Three branches have been received from Section Two—St. Peter's, Dansville, the Bishop Thomas branch of St. Paul's, Rochester, and St. John's, Mt. Morris. Two branches have been graduated from Section Three into the Woman's Auxiliary—St. Andrew's, Rochester and the Bishop Brent Branch of St. Paul's, Rochester.

It is with great regret that we relinquish the hearty support and loving fellowship of our work together, and yet we rejoice that a beginning has been made in the orderly progression which is to carry the Little Helpers on into the ranks of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Our special efforts this year have been three in number—for a wider interest in the United Offering, the partial support of a district nurse in the North Carolina mountains, and for a Volunteer. The response to the United Offering has been encouraging. Twenty branches have given \$156.74, a gain of \$78.04 over last year. Is it not a satisfactory thing that we are gathering our girls into this sisterhood of many races, its members working together in the fellowship and sympathy which make of it, indeed, a "Ministry of Reconciliation"?

United Offering meetings have been held, one of especial interest being a joint gathering, in the Buffalo District, with the United Offering lecture and slides, followed by a presentation of the Offering in the Church, with the resulting splendid sum of \$109.

A special of \$125.81 has been given toward the salary of the District Nurse, under Dean Lobdell, of Rutherfordton, N. C. It is not as large as we had hoped, but it has helped to send her on her gracious, healing way. A special of \$10.22 was sent to Bishop Thomas of Wyoming, of \$14.52 to St. Luke's, Tokyo, one of \$10 to Monterey, Tenn., and one of \$2.50 to St. Agnes, Kyoto. An emergency box and a watch were also sent to our workers there at the time of the total destruction of St. Raphael's Mission House by fire—a spontaneous and loving reaching out to help.

Our pledges this year have amounted to \$234.22, the box work to \$430.26, which with District and Diocesan expenses and \$14 reported only make an entire total of \$1036.96, a gain of \$348.91 over last year.

We deeply regret the withdrawal from the leadership of the Buffalo District of Miss Elizabeth Lawrence, to whose untiring efforts much of our advance is due.

Coming now to our educational work: Twenty-six of our thirty branches report some form of mission study—about nineteen having had the regular discussion classes, Modern Heroes of the Mission Field and the Missionary Life of Christ being the courses most generally followed. One Girls' Club and an organization of Camp Fire girls have used partial courses. At the semi-annual meeting of the Auxiliary in Westfield a group of Intermediates from St. Luke's, Jamestown, presented "The Appeal of the Nations," a series of monologues, illustrating the need of the Oriental women for Christianity.

We have been especially fortunate, this year in the inspirational meetings which have quickened enthusiasm and brought a living message from the field. We are indebted to Dean Burleson and Deaconess Goodwin from the Missions House, Dean Lobdell, Miss Long of Tennessee, and Miss Hopwood of Japan in this respect.

Two training classes have been held for leaders, while more than one-half of our District and Diocesan officers were in attendance, for a longer or shorter time, at the Summer Conference at Geneva. The recent Bible Classes held in Buffalo and Rochester by Miss Grace Crosby have brought to many among us a new vision of the glories of the Kingdom and an awakened desire to share in its hastening.

Finally, that which we feel to be the crown and summit of our work for the year is the offering of life which a young woman in the Diocese has made, and although circumstances are keeping her among us for the present, we hope that in due time the way may be made clear for her to go. If only our Offering of Life could be commensurate with our offering of means how the Kingdom would grow by leaps and bounds, both in our midst and in its farthest reach to distant lands!

Our plans for the future are designed to strengthen our weakest points—the effort to put an Intermediate branch into more of those 86 parishes of the Diocese, where there is a Woman's Auxiliary but no group of Older Girls—the reaching of scattered branches by going to them with a District Institute, and the desire to encourage in ourselves the habit and practice of Intercessory Prayer.

GROWTH—TRAINING—DEEPENING—

it is a program big enough to engage all of our powers. Our watchword for the year is "More Prayer." And if we will keep before us also, as someone reminds us, that we are not only an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, but an Auxiliary to Jesus Christ, we shall find that miracles still happen, when the work of the Kingdom is carried on in His company.

REPORT OF SECTION II OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT

The past year in Section II of the Junior Department, though full of promise at the beginning, shows in its reports loss instead of gains. We had hoped to make it a year of extension. We took as our watchword "A live branch in every parish." Instead we have lost branches, our pledges and our box-work have decreased. Just what are the causes for this condition is hard to determine. It seemed that the work was so well organized that the time might be given to extension work. But many obstacles arose which prevented this. And after all may not this apparent failure work for good in the end?

Our work so far has been pioneer work, building up, organizing, setting forth ideals, training leaders as best we could, but with all our conferring, planning and praying, somehow we have failed to reach the results we hoped. So when Diocesan and District leaders met together in October the weak points were taken up and committees appointed to form definite plans to try and solve the problems. One thing that came out very strongly at this time was the need for co-operation in the Sunday School and other parish organizations. Now, we have from the St. Louis convention recommendations which, if they can be carried out, will help us to solve this very difficulty. Our watchword for the year is "Prayer" and some definite petitions have been prepared by a committee to be used by the Juniors throughout the year. Committees to formulate plans for the formation of new branches and to plan for a series of Institutes were also appointed. A revised Letter-Leaflet and a new report blank are other plans for the year. The appointment of Miss Arnold as chairman of the Diocesan Junior Committee will greatly simplify many parts of the work. We gladly welcome her in this capacity.

We have had in Section II this year 56 active branches as against 67 last year, 39 branches reporting 767 members. Box-work amounted to \$497.36. These boxes were sent to Dean Lobdell, Miss Long, Monterey, Tex., Fort Hall, Idaho, and St. Augustine's school. Two hundred eighty dollars and fifty nine cents was given for pledges; \$2.50 for Dr. Lobdell's special, \$6.62 for St. Luke's, Tokyo, from the Buffalo district, and \$500 given for St. Luke's through the Junior Department. Last year section II gave for pledges \$336.70. The United Offering was \$49.91, last year having been \$31.68. Here alone we show an increase in gifts. Rallies and box-packings throughout the year have been specially stimulating, and have done much to deepen the interest. Speakers have been Dr. Burleson, Dean Lobdell, Miss Long, Miss Hopwood and Miss Crosby. As a result of Miss Long's ten-day stay in Buffalo an extra box was sent to her, after the fire which had occurred at St. Raphael's Mission. Dean Lobdell's visit also increased interest, so that a specially fine box was sent him in January.

In March Mrs. Burrows brought her Juniors to All Saints, Buffalo, to give her play "The Wishing Stone," and a procession of girls represented the five scholarships. A little play, "The Real Prince," was given in Geneva.

Reports are most encouraging in the line of study. Normal study classes in Buffalo and Rochester were held. Thirty-seven parishes report mission study on "Jack and Janet," "Warfare," "Forward March in China," "Modern Heroes," "King's Highway," and "How the Cross goes Round the World."

Geneva gave a mystery play, and many branches report talks on different mission fields. The volunteer from this diocese is a great cause for rejoicing. So on the whole there seems no cause for discouragement. May we not make our apparent failure a stepping stone to greater things? "Let us attempt great things for God, expect great things from God," remembering that we have His promise to be with us, to guide and prosper us.

LITTLE HELPERS' REPORT

I cannot begin the report of "The Little Helpers" in a better way than with the words of our dear friend Miss Sally Stuart, the president of the Woman's Auxiliary of Virginia for 25 years, whose life we are all going to remember this year in our memorial gift for the Building Fund of St. Agnes School, Kyoto, the dormitory being the Stuart memorial. She said on her 25th anniversary: "We are to cherish our past for the sake of the future, keeping in mind and heart the Divine command, 'Thou shalt remember all the way which the Lord thy God hath led thee.' Like Israel of old we must remind ourselves of the *beginning* that in the years of the future when we who have been your leaders have left you you may be able to pass on to your children's children the knowledge that has been a source of inspiration to you." *That* is why we are celebrating, and have been gathering together the facts of twenty-five years, that *we* may remember in Western New York how God has led us and blessed the work of "The Little Helpers."

In 1891, in June, we reported 84 Little Helpers in Western New York. Today one parish alone has that number, and we number more than 68 dioceses now, who have this work. In many pledges we unite, while we also each have our diocesan work. Our Memorial Circle began in 1892 with Gaylord's box; now we have 205 names and 22 of these in St. Michael's, Geneseo. You have heard through Mrs. Walter North, our treasurer, that we have given from boxes and Specials \$9,655.85. That is Western New York's gift alone for 25 years. The Gaylord Hart Mitchell Kindergarten in Akita is one of the interests in which all the 68 dioceses unite. This plant is valued there at \$7,000 and Mr. Evans tells what a spiritual, moral and educational factor it is in that jurisdiction. "The Little Helpers" of Western New York have given for this kindergarten \$950.59.

For its support since 1904, Western New York has given \$600. For building of lower story \$212.70, for building of upper story \$178.17.

Work since 1913: \$25 for five pictures that hang on the walls, \$34 for the

garden in trees and plants and care to make it shady and attractive for the children.

We have had a part in 18 fonts that are found in different parts of the world. In 1904 it was proposed that each diocese should give \$1 toward a Font, the place to be decided by Miss Emery. But before that date we began this special work, for I find that in 1901 we had \$10 in the font sent by fourteen dioceses to Trinity Cathedral, Kyoto; and to Alaska, with the Diocese of New York, in 1901. Our Fonts are found in Japan, China, Alaska, Cuba, Porto Rico, Honolulu, W. Colorado, and in North Carolina. Western New York every year gives a Font in this diocese, 17 have been placed.

The names on our pledge list of the Junior Department show how *we* are united and that we cherish the past, and look back to our beginning and are filled with thanksgiving as we think how God has led us those many years and helped us to lay a solid foundation for our children to build upon, not only in this diocese but in 68 which look to us for leadership.

Africa has marked upon it the combined interest of Woman's Auxiliary and Junior Department in the name of Helen M. Halsey, who was with us in our beginning of history.

Bishop Coxe's name is placed on three types of work done by this diocese. The Juniors of Sections II and III have their scholarship in Wyoming among the Indians in the Shoshone School. "The Little Helpers" in the day school of Sinza, Shanghai, and the Woman's Auxiliary have their pledge in his memory for Alaska. Alaska is also marked in the Junior Department with the name of a living, moving factor in all our work, Woman's Auxiliary as well as Junior, for she has served us all as an officer. How could this work of 25 years have been done without the help of Effie M. Potter. We have tried her 23 years and she has not been found wanting.

Baptism is the keystone that holds this building together, and it was Bishop Coxe who declared in Watkins in June, 1891, when our work was presented to the diocese, that this should be the key-note of this Babies Branch as declared by the General Convention of 1835, and as long as there is a font in every parish it depends upon us to see that those children who are there engrafted into His kingdom have their father's work then and there given them to do.

A kindergarten we are for the church, and our growth depends on the help given by those who value first principles, Baptism, consecration of gifts, systematic giving.

A kindergarten in Odate is to be the work for the next three years, and our thank-offering for twenty-five years of work is to be given for this building fund. We are promising \$100 from the Little Helpers of Western New York towards the one thousand required, and \$50 has been given this year.

We know in whom we have believed. God has so richly blessed us in the past and enabled us to do so many things we have longed to do that we know we can go on to greater things. While we cherish the past with its wonderful results, we go forth to extend Christ's kingdom with new zeal and the old faith, for the prayer of the first "Little Helper" of this society was, "God bless the missionaries *all* over the world and *all* "The Little Helpers."

DIRECTIONS

To Parish Treasurers:

1. Parish treasurers should send money, as usual, to the diocesan treasurer, Mrs. Potter, not later than Oct. 25th, as our fiscal year closes Nov. 1st.

To United Offering Treasurers:

2. Money for the United Offering must be sent to the treasurer of that offering, Mrs. Woodward. Semi-annual collections are desired, in order to secure the interest on the first payment.

To Parish Secretaries:

(Mrs. Nathaniel Rochester, of Buffalo, has now become the head of this work.)

3. The box work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the Corresponding Secretary in mid-summer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee, are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

4. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress at the same time, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay. You should also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box, and from whom.

You should write again to the missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, stating the date of shipment and enclosing the receipted bill of lading; and you should also send a letter to the Directress giving the value of the box. This makes at least five letters to be written in connection with each parish box. It is always advisable to put the name and address of the sender of the box inside and also *outside* the box. The prepaid freight is always estimated as part of the value of the box. An effort is being made to send a copy of the Word of God in each box.

5. A list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the District Secretary, for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st. (A *type-written* list would be considered a special favor by the Secretary.)

6. If delegates to the annual or semi-annual meetings, find, after their names have been sent in, that they are unable to attend, they are requested to notify the head of the hospitality committee immediately, if necessary by telegraph, thus making room for others and preventing unnecessary confusion.

7. Parish Presidents are urged to appoint a Leader for each Missions Study Class, who will confer with the diocesan educational secretary about subject, text-book and method desired, and report to her promptly the results obtained; that she, in turn, may send a full report of all Missions Study pursued in the Diocese to the Church Missions House before June 1.
