DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The Diocese is divided into six districts, each district under a secretary appointed by the president, and each with its box-directress to whom parish secretaries apply for work.

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life, all over the Diocese, through reaching parishes far from the customary centres, and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for missions in this organized way.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections, however, make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The six districts are as follows:

BUFFALO DISTRICT: Angola, Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, Lockport, Medina, Williams-ville, Middleport, Niagara Falls, North Tonawanda, Gowanda, Depew and Youngstown. (Erie and Niagara Counties.)

ROCHESTER DISTRICT: Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls, Spencerport. (Monroe and Orleans Counties.)

GENESEO DISTRICT: Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford, Perry, Caledonia. (Livingston, Wyoming, and Genesee Counties.)

GENEVA DISTRICT: Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee. (Wayne, Ontario and Yates Counties.)

BATH DISTRICT: Bath, Canaseraga, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Addison, Catharine, Montour Falls, Watkins. (Steuben and Schuyler Counties.)

OLEAN DISTRICT: Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Angelica, Dunkirk, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere, Ripley, Ellicottville, Cuba, Silver Creek, Wellsville. (Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties.)

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

1917-1918

At the Officers' Conference of the Woman's Auxiliary, held in Rochester last June, it was decided to have the reports of the Recording Secretary published in the Manual. These reports are the interesting and concisely expressed records of the meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, and are of great value.

The reports of the Corresponding Secretary will from now on deal exclusively with the records of the Box Work. When the report of 1917-1918 had been finished and forwarded to the Missions House, with a few lines expressive of regret that the sun had fallen below the usual standard, a postal card was received from Miss Margaret T. Emery, which read:

"It is all right, and if it is not quite as large as last year, it shows a vast amount of valuable box work in Western New York."

The work this past year has been done under unusual difficulties. The Women of the Auxiliary have been asked to give of their time and of their means, not only to their church and to their mission work, but to their country through various channels. These demands have everywhere been met cheerfully and generously, entailing great sacrifices.

Seventeen family boxes were sent with a total value of \$2,214.22.

There were three Joint Boxes.

One was sent to Tortella Hall, Nenana, Alaska.

Another to Stephen's Village, Nenana, Alaska.

A third to St. Luke's Hospital, Ponce, Porto Rico.

The most favored mission was the Blue Ridge Industrial School, Dyke, Green County, Virginia, which received fourteen generous packages and boxes during the past year.

St. James' Mission, Lydia, Virginia, and St. Paul's School, Atlanta, Georgia, were next in interest.

Altogether, eighteen missions, including schools and hospitals, received boxes.

The total value of the work during the past year was \$5,802.61.

If the Box Work has fallen a little short of the records of past years, the report for the coming year must make amends.

All hearts are full of thankfulness for the blessings of peace.

May this thankfulness be expressed in the Woman's Auxiliary by an increased interest in the great missionary work of the Church.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

1917-1918

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:

The past year has been one of unusual unrest and anxiety for most women, relieved to a great extent by the promise of ultimate peace. In spite of the fact that we lack the inspiration and visible presence of our Bishop, and that war work, sickness and death have removed several of our most earnest workers, Western New York has been able to show a satisfactory year's work.

The 37th Annual meeting was held in Trinity Church, Rochester, Nov. 9th and 10th, Ascension Church assisting in the entertainment of the delegates, who numbered 179, representing 54 parishes. The meeting and services were as usual, Bishop Colmore being the special speaker of the occasion.

The financial reports showed a most encouraging gain in spite of the extra demands of the war, our apportionment being exceeded by several hundred dollars.

Mission Study was on the increase and all departments showed a gain.

The Diocesan Officer's Conference was held at Christ Church, Rochester, April 2d. Bishop Burleson of South Dakota and the Rev. D. L. Ferris, rector of the parish, gave us much practical and spiritual help in addresses at the lunch hour.

In January, 1918, it was the privilege of our president, Mrs. Nicholas, and the Recording Secretary Mrs. Cooper, to be present at the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of New York and New Jersey, held in connection with the Synod of the Province. The question of Provincial organization was considered at that time and the first steps taken.

The Semi-Annual meeting was held at Zion Church, Palmyra, on June 6th and 7th, 87 delegates from 30 parishes being present. The special speaker was Dr. John W. Wood, foreign secretary of the Board of Missions. At this meeting the Provincial Constitution was presented and ratified. The New Plan for special War Work for the Woman's Auxiliary was also considered, and it was resolved to start a fund of \$1000, called the Woman's Auxiliary War Emergency Fund,—to be raised by January 1st, 1919, the money to be used in supplementing the salaries of those missionaries who were affected by the high rate of exchange.

The next occurrence of moment in the year's history was "Auxiliary Day" at the Geneva Summer Conference for Church Workers, in July, when a most interesting conference was held, attended by many Western New York women, the principal speakers being Miss Grace Lindley and Miss Warren, of New York. Both explained the "Advent Call," the name given to the campaign for Prayer, the special war work undertaken by the Woman's Auxiliary. Much help and inspiration were gained at this meeting, the result being immediate organization in Western New York to carry out plans for the Advent Call, Mrs. J. W. Denness Cooper, of Geneseo, being appointed the Diocesan Chairman.

The Campaign for launching the Advent Call commenced in September. Every rector and parish president received full information on the subject. Committees were formed in the Districts, and special meetings held in Rochester, Buffalo, Corning, Mt. Morris and Geneseo, addressed by the chairman. The prevailing epidemic interfered with every arrangement made, but most successful training-classes for messengers, and those interested, were finally held in Buffalo, Nov. 18-19, and Rochester, Nov. 20-21, led by Mrs. C. E. Hutchison of Newark. Out of 100 parishes reached, about 80 responded in some way to the call, along the desired lines, and this in spite of very limited opportunities for information and training.

The Annual meeting was to have been held at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Buffalo, Nov. 13th and 14th. No gatherings were permitted at that time on account of the prevailing epidemic, so it was found necessary to postpone the meeting. On the regular date, Nov. 14th, an adjournment was taken by those present to Jan. 15th and 16th, Mrs. W. D. Walker presiding.

The Auxiliary was represented at the Provincial Synod in Syracuse, November 12th and 13th, by Mrs. Nicholas, our president, who had the honor of being a member of the Provincial Nominating Committee.

We cannot bring the record of the year's work to a close without speaking of the death of Miss Mary E. Hart, who, for so many years, was a source of help and information to every worker. As Founder of the Little Helpers' Branch, her influence has spread far and wide. Long will she be loved and missed.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:

There has been a decrease in Mission Study work during the winter of 1917-18. Interest and time given to the Red Cross has been the most urgent reason given. Then the fuel shortage and subsequent closing of many Parish Houses, combined with the individual conservation of coal, frequently resulted in no place to hold meetings. Illness of leader, Rector too busy to undertake the work and no other leader available, lack of time for preparation and study, and fear that the Official text book would prove too heavy for effective handling, were other reasons given.

In one parish the only available date conflicted with the Curate's Woman's Bible Class, where the subject for the year's work was the Life of Christ. Here a compromise was made, the curate devoting the five Lenten lectures to the Missionary aspect of the Life of Christ. One of these lectures was an illustrated one on the Journeys of Christ's Years of Ministry.

In Geneva, because no leader was available, fourteen ladies agreed to read Bishop Rhinelander's book, the "Gospel of the Kingdom," in their own homes, and afterwards meet once with Mrs. Nicholas for a general discussion of the book. In reporting this work Mrs. Nicholas said: "The Method of this work was not at all what had been dreamed of. It was really a

conquest of circumstances. Some of us were resolved that this parish should not be unrepresented on the roll of Missionary students and yet it was hard to find the hour, or the well-heated place, or even the people for a class, so absorbed had everyone become in the Red Cross work. And there were other hindrances as well, so we just managed to do something. I am surprised to find that the something was so good in quality, though so small in quantity."

One excellent report was passed on to the Juniors. It was a very successful, simple and easily adopted method of an effective way to work out the New Junior Plan.

Last year 57 parishes were reported. This year only 31 are reported. Total membership of 744, five parishes reported offerings and only three a corporate communion.

Bath District—reports two parishes doing Missionary Study Class work, with offerings of \$5.00.

Buffalo District—reports class work in 11 parishes, no classes in eight parishes. Corporate Communion one, offerings \$21.25.

Geneseo District—reports from only one parish of work done.—One Corporate Communion.

Geneva District—reports two classes.

Olean District—none.

Rochester District—15 Study Classes. Offering of \$20.61, and one Corporate Communion; four no response to form sent in; four no class in parish. "An unusual normal course which was given to the leaders, six weeks prior to Lent by Mrs. Kingman Robins. She had her entire course typewritten and several leaders had copies of it and found the course extremely valuable to them."

St. George's, Charlotte—reported 16 in Auxiliary with average attendance of 25. Course was "Missions according to the Bible," method, lectures, home reading, and discussion; nearly all did work of preparation and were ready to take part in the discussions. People attended from other Churches. Three lectures were given by Rochester women. It was the most successful class ever held here. At Corporate Communion 18 were present. Leader found her copy of Mrs. Robins' course a great help. This course has gained several new class members.

REPORT OF JUNIOR CHAIRMAN—1917-1918

The year of 1917-1918 has been for the Junior Department, in common with other organizations, one of especial difficulty. The increased demands upon our time and energies, through the needs occasioned by the War, the loss of workers taking up especial War work, and our unsuccessful attempts to secure additional helpers—these have tested our courage and our faithfulness. But there could be no real discouragement, in the face of the conviction, revealed anew by the Great War, that the world's need can be met only by the world's Saviour, and that therefore the greatest service we could render was the steady doing of the thing we were already doing, through our Junior prayers and gifts and efforts—the making Him known to His world.

And so, "Loyalty" to undertaken duties is again our watchword and our text, "Strengthened with might by His Spirit in the inner man" points us to the Power which will make "all things possible" to us.

To our great encouragement we can again report two Volunteers,—Miss Russell of St. Paul's, Rochester, and Miss Gager of St. John's, Buffalo. May we stand back of them, as we are standing back of our men in the Service, with the utmost of our resources, material and spiritual.

It was with the greatest regret that we released from her Junior duties Miss Sanders, for so long the capable, wise and far-sighted Leader of Section Two. Many of the best features of our work are the results of her ability and devotion, and we trust that she will sometime be able to resume her work among us. Her successor, Miss Esther Smith, brings to her duties an exceptional training as a successful parish and District Officer, in itself a surety for the future.

The Annual Meeting of 1917 was held in Trinity Church, Rochester, the June Meeting in Zion Church, Palmyra, with the usual Officers' Conference in September. Two one-day Institutes were held, in Christ Church, Rochester, and St. Mary's-on-the-Hill, Buffalo.

The entire Auxiliary united this year in its Corporate Communion on the third Sunday in May, and a group of 20 Leaders are enrolled in the Church Prayer League.

Two especial efforts have been made this year—the taking part in the Advent Call, and in the Special Emergency Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary. The greatest united, spiritual effort which has ever been made by any body of Christian women found a ready response among Junior Leaders, and services were held in many places for the children, while the Older Girls were included in the Senior plans. It is hoped that some definite follow-up work may result, as perhaps, the training of the Juniors in the Noon-Day Prayer for the Kingdom.

The effort was made to have each Older Girl give twenty-five cents for the Emergency Fund and each younger Junior ten cents. The total amount received so far is \$31.35.

Some anxious weeks have resulted from the failure of the branches to meet the Pledges, but the deficit has been made up, and an effort will be made this year to meet this "bounden duty" in a better way.

The new Plan of co-operation between the Church Schools and the Juniors is very slowly making progress. Certain features are in operation in various parishes, but the number of Church Schools helping with the Pledged Junior work is disappointingly few. As Superintendent of a small school, it is a pleasure to testify to the feasibility of the main features of the Plan, even where numbers and resources are small. Our next move should be to persuade the Church School authorities to take the initiative in a movement which is vital to their best interests.

In closing this report which is general, and is to be followed by detailed reports of the three Sections, we have to record the entering into Paradise of the beloved Foundress and Head of the Little Helpers, Miss Mary E. Hart. It is impossible to speak of her in the past tense. Unique in her personality, and in her contribution to the Cause which she loves, by and through her labors for the child-life of the Church, she is a living presence among us to-day. The

incarnation of zeal and enthusiasm, she brought to every effort for the Master a perseverance and loving faith, a dependence upon the power of Prayer which is the secret of her influence and fruitfulness. We are thankful for her good example and we rejoice in the fuller, richer life which is hers to-day.

REPORT OF SECTION III—JUNIOR AUXILIARY, 1917-1918

In comparing the work of the older girls of the Junior Auxiliary for this year with that accomplished last year, the many pressing demands of "War Work" are clearly seen. The calls have been insistent to our Older Girls and while fewer branches have made reports, the nineteen well established groups have done effective work.

First—I am very happy to report that two of our Junior Girls have dedicated themselves to Missionary Service,—Miss Julia Russell of the Bishop Brent Group of St. Paul's, Rochester, is attending the University of Pennsylvania, studying to be a Medical Missionary to China, and Miss Blythe Gager, of St. John's, Buffalo, is at St. Faith's Deaconess House, New York, preparing to be a Bacteriologist in some Mission Hospital. These gifts of devotion are our greatest and best offerings to our Master.

Two new Groups have been welcomed to Sec. III this year. A new one formed at St. Simon's, Buffalo, and the other at St. Thomas's, Rochester.

We have held the older Girl Rallies and box packings at Rochester and Buffalo.

Last spring the Rally at Buffalo was also a "Geneva Réunion," Bishop Stearly and Miss Hobart being the speakers.

The Buffalo leaders have met monthly for conference and prayer, and the Rochester Leaders are finding help in similar meetings.

A helpful little card with the Junior Motto, text, and Loyalty collect was prepared by Miss Arnold and a Committee, and sent to the leaders to be used at their meetings.

Fourteen mission study classes have met in as many Parishes, the text books being "Simon Peter, Rock," and the Bible.

This year our specials were to be included in our regular scholarship pledges and in this way we have given \$227.74, a sum nearly equal to the amount given for scholarships last year. To Diocesan and district expenses our contribution is \$37.58. To the United Offering \$134.87.

Our Box Work amounts to \$279.05. The boxes were sent to the Pine Ridge Agency, South Dakota; to the Rev. George Hilton at Morgantown North Carolina; to St. James' Mission at Lydia in the mountains of Virginia; a Christmas box to Marietta Ga.; one to St. George's Indian Mission, Ketchikan, Alaska; two boxes to Dean Lobdell, Rutherford, N. C., from the Lockport Branch, and a box to St. Faith's Mission, Tarrytown, on the Hudson, from the Jamestown Group.

Two "Specials" for St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan, amounting to \$7.89, were reported from two Groups and \$5.00 to Mr. Saulsbury, of Buffalo, for a chapel building fund.

Several groups report gifts of money, work, and articles to the Red Cross.

Our total gifts reported amount to \$687.94 but I trust there are treasures hidden in the year's work that cannot be counted in dollars and cents.

Now that War Work is not quite so demanding and our young women have become accustomed to meet together often for unselfish service, let us hope that missionary work may receive a new impetus. If they could but catch the vision and realize the joy in responding to Christ's call to them for this service, how many new branches might be started!

Could not these War Service Groups of young women be used for His service in this particular direction and thus become one of the greatest blessings of Peace?

REPORT OF SECTION II—JUNIOR AUXILIARY, 1917-1918

Section II has passed through a most difficult year, on account of lack of leaders, due, we believe wholly to unavoidable causes in this time of stress and strain; and although we must report loss in number of branches and in giving, there are some most encouraging features. Only forty-five branches have been active during the year, but they have given a total of \$901.14 where last year fifty-six gave \$1066.01.

* Boxes show an increase in value over last year of \$15.48, the box sent by Geneva District valued at \$157.00 being the best they ever sent.

Twenty-seven branches report Mission Study on "The Call of the King" and "Simon Peter-Rock." Geneva and Rochester Districts have each held one meeting for box packing during the year; both were well attended; Buffalo held two, a box packing, and "The Feast of Lights" at Epiphany,—a very beautiful and impressive service. The Buffalo leaders have met monthly for prayer, a record having been kept of intercessions made and their answers. Such definite prayers must surely result in more vital work.

Boxes valued at \$508.84 were sent to Pine Ridge, S. D.; Marietta, Ga.; Lydia, Va.; Morganton and Ketchikan. Pledges amounted to \$279.04; specials \$6.00 and United Offerings \$37.10.

In submitting this, my final report, I wish to record my constant joy in being permitted this share in the Master's work and my deep regret that I must lay it down; also my appreciation of the co-operation and support of my fellow workers. I leave my work in the hand of one who knows it even better than I do, and has proven her efficiency and loyalty. My prayers and best wishes will be always with you.

REPORT OF SECTION I—JUNIOR AUXILIARY, 1917-1918

The Report this year fits in with the other Sections of the Junior Auxiliary in a most natural way, for as the Officers met in Conference in Buffalo, Sept. 14, 1918, the watchword chosen accorded with my thought exactly that, as a united body, we must “Carry On” the Sacred Trust committed to our care by one whose very life had taught what it was to be a missionary from earliest childhood to the very last day of her life. Her joy and gladness and consolation which she found in the Church shone in every fiber of her being. When to the watchword the text was added, Ephesians 3:16, “Strengthened with might by His Spirit in the inner man”

we have the secret of power; then to the text add the hymn 510, "Go Forward, Christian Soldiers" and we have our Baptismal Commission to 'ce faithful Soldiers and Servants unto our life's end, the very initial step in our Little Helpers' work.

The Organization is not only one of deep sentiment, it is far more than that; it is basic; it is a normal part of our Church's growth and development, and it is our privilege to strive to make it a great power in the missionary life of our Church. My Sister's deep, heart-felt longing was that the united work already established might always be continued as a monument of what the Little Helpers had accomplished and as an inspiration of what they could do in the future by united prayers, gifts, and earnest effort.

The Little Helpers started out by caring for one boy, Ko San, in the orphanage at Osaka under Miss Bull. Today they are helping to train a hundred little Japanese boys and girls, and fully fifty in Chinese Day Schools. In many instances Churches and Chapels have been the outcome from the schools. The united gift of Fonts in Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan Fields has been a wonderful way of helping to carry the Gospel to all nations. This united work is one never to be given up, and at every point where a Font is given, a "Little Helpers" branch ought to be established. Many and varied are the ways that the Little Helpers have been working through these twenty-seven years, while the babies have grown into strong and efficient men and women working in the Church.

One important fact must be recorded in this Report, the completion of the "Odate Kindergarten Building Fund." Here we must pause and render thanks to the Giver of all good gifts and "remember all the ways the Lord thy God hath led thee." Think of that memorable meeting in Trinity Parish House Buffalo, Nov. 8, 1916, to which Mary Hart carried with such happiness her twenty-five consecrated pennies (united in a twenty-five cent piece) as a thank-offering for twenty-five years of Service in the Little Helpers' Work, and where there awaited her that wonderful surprise, twenty-five silver dollars, offered in such an exquisite bag and accompanied by a message of such love and appreciation that went straight to her heart. I think there never was a happier child. Before the day ended the sum had increased to \$51.35 through added gifts from loving friends. This was the first gift to the Odate Building Fund. (At the St. Louis Convention, 1916, Mary Hart had been chosen chairman with a committee of six to raise \$1,000.00 for this kindergarten by October, 1919, when the General Convention would meet in Detroit.) After her return home she was taken very ill and her one thought seemed to be as she grew stronger to get her letters off to the different Provinces so that the work could begin at once. From her consecrated pen the messages went out and behold the result. On June 29th Miss Lindley wrote, "I want to tell you at once the good news, the money for the Odate Kindergarten has all come in. The last came yesterday (June 28th, 1918) in a check for \$100.00 from Pennsylvania. I know how happy you will be, and we all are"—and to think that on July 30th, 1918, Mary Hart could have had the added happiness of knowing from Rev. Mr. Evan's letter that the Building had been formally opened, and hallowed for use, and that on July 1st, forty-four children were enrolled with a waiting list of twenty. Forty children is the number they can comfortably seat. And now letters come from Miss Kinsley telling of how finely the work is going on—they feel it to be a great power for the spreading of the Gospel in that region. This is but an illustration of the outward and visible sign of what the Little Helpers have accomplished. The Inward and Spiritual work done can never be told.

DIRECTIONS

To Parish Treasurers:

1. Parish treasurers should send money, as usual, to the diocesan treasurer, Mrs. Potter, not later than Oct. 25th, as our fiscal year closes Nov. 1st.

To United Offering Treasurers:

2. Money for the United Offering must be sent to the treasurer of that offering, Mrs. Woodward. Semi-annual collections are desired, in order to secure the interest on the first payment.

To Parish Secretaries:

(Mrs. Nathaniel Rochester, of Buffalo, the Corresponding Secretary, is at the head of this work.)

3. The box work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the Corresponding Secretary in mid-summer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters, stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee, are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

4. When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress at the same time, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay. You should also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box, and from whom.

You should write again to the missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, stating the date of shipment and enclosing the received bill of lading; and you should also send a letter to the Directress giving the value of the box. This makes at least five letters to be written in connection with each parish box. It is always advisable to put the name and address of the sender of the box inside and also *outside* the box. The prepaid freight is always estimated as part of the value of the box. An effort is being made to send a copy of the Word of God in each box.

5. A type-written list of the officers of each parish branch should be sent to the District Secretary, for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st.

6. If delegates to the annual or semi-annual meetings, find, after their names have been sent in, that they are unable to attend, they are requested to notify the head of the hospitality committee immediately, if necessary by telegraph, thus making room for others and preventing unnecessary confusion.

7. Parish Presidents are urged to appoint a Leader for each Missions Study Class, who will confer with the diocesan educational secretary about subject, text-book and method desired, and report to her promptly the results obtained; that she, in turn, may send a full report of all Missions Study pursued in the Diocese to the Church Missions House before June 1.

A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

Bishop Brent has just given a comforting assurance of his interest in the Auxiliary. He writes, "I note your satisfactory report on a good year's work. The War Fund deserves commendation. It will be a real pleasure to be able to consider furthering your work when I have an opportunity to take up plans for the Auxiliary. At present I must postpone that, relying on a continuance of the work in my absence as it has been in the past year."

And now let me write out for you one or two of the thoughts that come to me constantly about what we may do.

We are just entering upon the busiest part of our work. Every parish works for Missions in Lent, even if at no other time. I know well that a great many parishes work faithfully through the autumn and early winter as well, but I am newly impressed by the way in which we concentrate on the six weeks of Lent. From now till Easter we shall all be doing the same things.

We are only beginning to be freed from the burden of our own war expenses in the matter of money; but we have a rich possibility before us in the trained and disciplined aid which we may win from the women who are returning from European war work, or being gradually released from such work in this country. We should claim their interest and enlist their efforts. They are the new helpers whom we must try earnestly and definitely to win. All former members who have been so occupied with war work will surely now return to help us. The suggestion that our hospital boxes be enriched by garments and surgical dressings made by the women who have been doing the same thing for the soldiers, is most valuable. Let us think over the ways of combining this new skill with our missionary boxes, and make all these women realize that the army box is worthily followed by the missionary box.

CONSTITUTION

I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II

The object of this Society is, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing societies, and encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, and two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the annual meeting and approved by the Bishop.

V

The President, or in her necessary absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall call meetings and preside over them.

VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes, and prepare a manual for circulation in the Diocese.

VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society; shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each annual meeting, and oftener if required.

VIII

The members of this Society will send reports of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from the parish societies will be expected at the annual meetings.

IX

There shall be one general meeting of this Society each year, on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November.

X

During the year three or more sectional or special meetings may be called by the President, or at the request of three or more parishes. The days of said meetings shall be Wednesday or Thursday.

XI

This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.
