## DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The Diocese is divided into six districts, each district being organized as far as possible with the following district officers:

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life all over the Diocese through reaching parishes far from the customary centres and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for the Church's Mission in this organized way.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections however make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The six districts are as follows:

**BUFFALO DISTRICT:** Angola, Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, LaSalle, Lockport, Medina, Williamsville, Middleport, Niagara Falls, North Tonawanda, Gowanda, Depew, Youngstown, Dunkirk, (Erie and Niagara Counties).

**ROCHESTER DISTRICT:** Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls, Spencerport, (Monroe and Orleans Counties).

**GENESEO DISTRICT:** Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford, Perry, Caledonia, (Livingston, Wyoming, and Genesee Counties).

**GENEVA DISTRICT:** Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee, (Wayne, Ontario and Yates Counties).

**BATH DISTRICT:** Bath, Canaseraga, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Addison, Catharine, Montour Falls, Watkins. (Steuben and Schuyler Counties).

**OLEAN DISTRICT:** Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Angelica, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere, Ripley, Ellicottville, Cuba, Silver Creek, Wellsville. (Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties).

FROM THE HONORARY PRESIDENT

I gladly avail myself of this opportunity to reach the whole Auxiliary, and to say Goodbye to you all once more in my official capacity. To be now your honorary president is a matter for very grave thought, even while the honor is fully appreciated. It hardly seems real to me yet. I must confess that the events of November the tenth so astonished and disturbed me, even while they gratified me deeply, that I failed to say to you the word that was most in my heart, and I also gave very inadequate thanks for your kind and generous and beautiful Christmas gift.

It was my intention to ask each one of you, (and I do now ask it), for the maintenance of the friendly and affectionate and mutually-helpful relations of these past years. It has been a task to properly and accurately credit and apportion the many funds entrusted to me, but it has always been a pleasant one, because of the close association with you who have become very dear to me.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In taking up my new office as President of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York, I wish to express my sense of joy and privilege in being associated in this capacity with such a splendid group of women. The devoted and beautiful service of our beloved retiring President, and the achievement of each Branch of the Auxiliary, are sources of enduring inspiration, and make me very conscious of my own inadequacy. I shall have much need of your patience and forbearance and I pledge you my vital interest and the best work of which I am capable.

In outlining our Task for the year, which I take it is my happy privilege, may I first of all refer you to other pages in the Manual for Suggestions for 1921—1922 for the various parts of our fall program, as well as to the Report, hoping that they may receive your careful thought and study.

Then may I repeat to you my message given at the Annual meeting—for it lies very near my heart—about the spirit which I hope the Auxiliary in Western New York, individually, and as a group, may express, and stand for, at this critical and perplexing time in Church and National life.

---

#### THE SPIRIT UNDERLYING OUR AUXILIARY WORK

As members of the Woman's Auxiliary we have been missionary helpers, in reality as well as in name, here in Western New York, and we have recognized a Five-Fold Field of Service, which has carried us to the "uttermost parts of the earth." However, in commencing our Auxiliary Year together, may we turn the search-light back upon ourselves, individually, and as a branch, and examine our own lives and our work, that we may be of greater usefulness in the building up of God's Kingdom on earth.

May I, therefore, express the hope that we may have, first of all, a Spirit of Consecration, rededicating and renewing our lives day by day, that whatsoever we do in word or deed, we may do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, and conscious of our relationship to the living Christ. Thus will we be missionaries ourselves, as well as missionary helpers.

In the second place, may a Spirit of Prayer pervade all our work. There are perplexing problems ahead of us for the Auxiliary to settle; for the Church everywhere; and for our Country. If the Auxiliary could make this year a Prayer Year, with real intercession for every part of the Church's Mission, I feel

that it would be the most vital thing we could do at this critical time—prayer for guidance and wisdom, for increased usefulness and power. Indeed, we are asked to join the group of one hundred thousand Intercessors from our Country, by Easter 1922.

In the third place, I wish we might have the Spirit of true Learning, a “passion for knowing how” to do things, and a real understanding of the church’s full mission. This, with the cultivation of our own inward resources, will produce in us an inward harmony of life, which means joy, and peace, and power for service—a service which is intelligent and sound.

Fourthly, may we have the Spirit of Service—that each branch, and each member of it, may go about as “one who ministers,” not as one who needs to be “ministered unto,” giving expression, in our daily living and contacts, to our own religious theories, working in harmony and co-operation with those about us, and evincing a real desire for usefulness rather than for self-glorification.

In the last place, may we have a Spirit of Adventure—that spirit which “dares great things for God and expects great things from God;” a spirit of faith, of courage, and a willingness to be led by the Holy Spirit, as the Children of Israel were willing to be led by Moses through the Red Sea. As you remember, the waters threatened to encompass them, but they found that, when they *dared* to go forward, they went through on *dry* land. Someone dared to adventure, fifty years ago, for the Auxiliary. And, at the time of our Semi-Centennial, I am sure we wish to show that same spirit of faith and courage and adventure which has been responsible for the vitality and usefulness of the Auxiliary in the past.

#### REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY—1920-1921

*To the president and members of the Woman’s Auxiliary of Western New York:—*

The past year has been one of steady and uneventful work in the Woman’s Auxiliary. The 40th Annual meeting was held in St. Paul’s Church, Buffalo, Nov. 9th and 10th 1920. As the Synod of the 2d Province was in session at this time, it was felt that our regular Services and business session would have to be greatly changed in order to enable our delegates to avail themselves of the unusual opportunity offered them of attendance upon the sessions of the Provincial meeting of the Woman’s Auxiliary.

Everyone attended the opening Service of the Synod instead of the regular Woman’s Auxiliary Service, and our business session was shortened to one hour.

40 Parishes were represented by 110 delegates. Our special speaker was Mrs. Hawkes Pott of Shanghai, China.

Several important steps were taken, even though the session was brief. (1) The Revision of the Constitution as presented by the committee was accepted; (2) The appointment of Miss Lawrence as Field Secretary to the Church Service League, and Woman’s Auxiliary; (3) The election of Mrs. Robins, Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Nicholas to represent the Woman’s Auxiliary on the Diocesan Council of the Church Service League; (4) The election of Mrs. Potter to

represent the Woman's Auxiliary on the Provincial Committee of the Church Service League.

The Geneva Summer conference for Church workers gave one afternoon to the discussion of Auxiliary matters, and also one to the Church Service League. Both were well attended and most interesting; Miss Tillotson presiding for the Woman's Auxiliary and Miss Sturgis for the Church Service League.

*The Semi-annual meeting* was held in St. John's Church, Dunkirk, June 8th and 9th. 25 parishes were represented by 101 delegates. Bishop Brent and Mr. Betticher were the chief speakers.

Many things of interest have taken place during the year; (1) The Church Service League reported through the Field Secretary that we had reached 90 parishes; (2) The change in the box work methods with the creation of a new office, that of secretary of supply, necessitating a room especially set apart for work in the Diocesan House, and a paid worker in charge; (3) The appointment by Mrs. Nicholas and the educational secretary, of a Diocesan Educational Committee; (4) The successful progress of the Mary E. Hart Memorial, and the Emery Funds; (5) Special Services were urged throughout the Diocese, at the presentation of the United Thank Offering on Oct. 15th., Buffalo and many other parishes responded; (6) The Church Periodical Club has accomplished much more than usual. Worthy of special mention is the fact that 150 magazines are being sent to Alaska as a result of Mr. Betticher's appeal at Dunkirk.

Numerous requests for Manuals have been met, and printing expenses of notices and post cards have been heavier.

An Officers' Conference was held in Christ Church Parish House, Rochester, at 2:00 o'clock on Nov. 9th. 13 officers and the custodian of the Bureau of Supply were present.

## DEPARTMENT OF SUPPLIES

### REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF SUPPLY

The first year's work of the Supply Department was entered upon in the fall of 1920 with some misgivings and a little anxiety. The Supply Secretary feared somewhat for the success of the new plan, which at first seemed to bristle with many difficulties and complications; but like the proverbial thistle these difficulties lost their sting when firmly grasped, and the complications seemed to trouble us less and less as the work progressed. The following report shows how much can be accomplished by hearty co-operation and willingness to meet the new conditions and requirements which have been shown by the branches of the Diocese during the past year.

Eighty branches have contributed a total in value of \$7771.55. All of the work, except that intended for the missionaries and their families, the branches were instructed to send to the Bureau of Supplies, and it has certainly been both interesting and inspiring to see the many boxes that were poured in upon us containing such quantities of new, well-made dresses, aprons, underwear, quilts, knit goods, household supplies, etc.; and also the serviceable second-hand garments, repaired and put in good condition to be of further use to some needy

one. Some of these boxes were for St. Thomas's Mission, Beattyville, Ky., some for Christ Church Mission, Cocoanut Grove, Fla., some for the Seamen's Institute, New York, and some contained surgical dressings for far-off Alaska. Over \$700 worth of new clothing, etc., was sent for the Bureau of Supplies.

Because of these goods on our shelves, we were able to send an emergency box on three days' notice to St. John's Collegiate Institute and Industrial School at Corbin, Ky., where they had suffered a disastrous fire. The new goods in this box were valued at over \$150. It also contained a large amount of second-hand clothing. Other boxes were sent from the shelves of the Bureau of Supplies, on call from Mrs. Wade, to many points north, west and south, including Alaska, Wyoming, Nebraska, Texas, Georgia, Oklahoma and many other places. The Buffalo District also sent five large packing cases, and money for drugs and hospital supplies, to Cape Palmas, Liberia, valued at \$925.68. In all, 44 packing cases and three bales were shipped. There were also thirteen family boxes sent direct by the Branch supplying the box.

All of this has entailed a great deal of work at the Bureau of Supplies because, beside the packing of the outgoing boxes, there were also the incoming to be unpacked, and acknowledged, and contents taken care of and credited to the Branch sending the box. This has all been most carefully and painstakingly done by Miss Alice Dennis, who is the custodian of Supplies and who has done most splendid work.

This coming year it is planned to enlarge the scope of the Bureau of Supplies so that through it we may be able to minister to those in need nearer home. The Reverend Mr. Priddis, the Civic Chaplain of Buffalo, is constantly running across needy ones, when on his errands of mercy: and we hope to be able to supply garments and other articles needed to assist him in his work.

It is also hoped to make the Bureau of Supplies a sort of clearing-house for all kinds of articles. We are often asked by missionaries for chancel appointments, and many times used vestments would answer the purpose very well. Therefore if any parish replacing altar hangings or other sanctuary appointments would send the old ones to us, we should be sure to find a mission church that would be grateful for them.

For these reasons we solicit many more contributions this year, to the Bureau of Supplies, of new garments and household articles, and also of used clothing in good repair.

## REPORT OF EMERY FUND

### DIOCESE OF WESTERN NEW YORK

Collecting the Emery Fund has been a great pleasure as well as some work. Almost all the parishes expressed joy in giving, and many of those unable to give conveyed a feeling of interest in sympathy with the undertaking.

The giving of this fund is a wonderful opportunity for this organization which we represent, to pay a tribute corporeally to the name of Emery, during the life time of several of these remarkable sisters. Starting with Mrs. Twing, who was Miss Mary Emery, and who became the first Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, followed ten years later by Miss Julia Emery, who for forty years served in her place, we come finally to Miss Margaret Emery, first Directress of Box Work, 1874 who still serves, though no longer in charge of this Branch of the work.

Miss Julia Emery is perhaps the best known of this remarkable group. Some of us can remember her early visits to this Diocese, organizing Parish Branches nine years before the Diocesan Branch was formed in 1881. It was largely thru the work of this one small delicate woman, full of faith and zeal, that soon all over the land the former Woman's Missionary Societies were merged into the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions (now the Presiding Bishop and Council). This memorial to this very unusual family serves to bind the missionary work of the past to that of the future.

In this connection comes a thought—Do you know what differentiates man from all other animals? A great European Mathematician says it is his faculty of time-binding. All the events, happenings and discoveries of one age become the property of the next thru the exercise of this faculty. History is made, preserved and passed on; and all knowledge can be kept. This allows of progress, development, evolution; or whatever you choose to call it. We can go from strength to greater strength, and this Jubilee Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary acts as one of the time-binders in the history of Woman's work for missions. It makes for the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace, and also actively helps in sending the message. We are not any of us wholly Christ-like, neither is any branch of the Church or any nation; because each is made up of individuals who are becoming Christ-like, having not yet arrived. Nevertheless we see signs of larger areas of Christianity in our own lives and in the Church and world, so, "Forgetting those things which are behind, we press on towards the goal unto the prize of the upward calling of God, in Christ Jesus."

For a more detailed account of the work of the Emery sisters, and a history of this organization, I would refer you to the various Leaflets published at the Church Missions House, and Miss Emery's book "A Century of Endeavor," and the Church Periodicals.

The Emery Fund for the use of returned missionaries at home on furlough was raised in this Diocese mainly by letter. 95 letters were sent out last January, 60 in April and May and about 30 in September. In case of no response to this last appeal, the clergyman was written to, with such good results that today only 11 parish branches have made no reply of any sort. Total amount raised is \$1209.49.

#### DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

##### REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY 1920—1921

*To the President and Members of the Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council:*

Your educational secretary finds that the year 1920—1921 reveals almost identically the same conditions as the preceding one, for much time is needed to meet adequately in our diocese as in the Church at large the new developments and results of the Survey and last Triennial but many foundation stones have been laid on which a permanent structure can be erected.

For years the Woman's Auxiliary has recognized the place and importance of missionary education and has translated this theory into action, to be sure not so wide spread as we wish it could be; and it joins most gladly in the present effort to create and carry into effect an educational program of all three departments which will reach every member in the parish, that will make "the man of God complete, furnished completely to every good work."

The Educational Department of the Auxiliary has this year been so very closely affiliated with the Department of Missions, that their aim and program have in fact been identical. The Educational Secretary was also elected to the Board of Education to represent the Educational Department of the Auxiliary and to serve in relation to adult education. She will be also on the Diocesan Co-ordinating Committee on Adult Education for the three departments and the Auxiliary.

Thus plans for further organization of the Woman's Auxiliary Educational work have been held in abeyance until those for the co-ordinated program could be more nearly matured.

To our equipment, however, there has been added much: many new book and pamphlets on Missions, Social Service, and Personal Religion, and packets on every mission field, containing clippings for the last three years from current periodicals and the Spirit of Missions. Miss Frances Edwards, who has been the librarian this year, has spent many hours collecting, sorting, and filing these packets, which are now ready for circulation.

During the year over 800 letters have been sent. Nearly every branch has received at least one personal (though typewritten) letter, and the following circular ones:

June 25th: Suggestions for summer conferences and summer reading.

October 25th: Outline of work for the year.

January 19th: Notice of the institutes to be held.

February 9th: A few words in regard to the Lenten study classes.

April 28th: Reports for the year.

About the same number of books have been sold by the Department as last year, something over 200 books, with over \$500 passing through our hands. Alaska has been the most popular, for 55 copies were sold, and 9 Suggestions; 44 copies of the Survey: 38 copies of Dr. Sturgis's Manual, and 33 of Miss Boyer's Helps; 38 copies of The Church's Life, and 8 Suggestions; in addition to miscellaneous books. These are in addition to the numbers sold in Buffalo at the time of the Synod and at the Institute.

Already 41 books have been circulated from the library and 7 of the packets of clippings; some branches passing the books from member to member for home reading.

Mrs. Codd has been untiring in her work in the Buffalo District. Mrs. Burrows gave us the Six Outlines for Program Meetings which have been used by a number of parishes. Miss Esther Smith and Miss Helen Olmstead prepared the Suggestions for Devotions at Group Meetings which have filled a long-felt need.

Perhaps the most helpful and far reaching single event this year was the coming of Miss Tillotson to the diocese at the time of the institutes of the three departments and the Woman's Auxiliary. She visited Buffalo, Rochester, Dunkirk, Niagara Falls, Lancaster, and at Corning came in contact with many branches of the Bath District. It is very much to be hoped that she or someone else can spend even more time among us another year. Personal visits are much more satisfactory than letters.

Turning now from the work of your department to the work of the individual parishes your secretary feels that most of the branches have done splendid work this year, overcoming many obstacles and puzzling conditions. The failure of some to make any use of special material sent them with personal letters, or even to respond to these letters seems difficult to understand and is the most discouraging feature.

The subject most widely studied this year was "The Church's Mission" in varying form. Fourteen groups used The Survey as the basis for study, twelve Alaska Missions, and four The Church's Life. Several used Neighbors, and one branch took up the Near East question. In all, 56 branches have had some form of educational work this year, as against 45 last year, an increase of working branches. The figures as against those of last year may be of interest:

Reading Circles: 29 as against 16 last year.

(11 of these carried on reading while sewing, 7 read and discussed, and 11 were home reading circles.

Program Meetings: 37 as against 22 last year.

(12 branches had a series of meetings; 25 occasional programs.)

Discussion Groups: 32 as against 29 last year.

(Of these 22 were Auxiliary groups, 10 in connection and co-operation with the Nation Wide Campaign.)

Plays: 2 as against 3 last year.

Stereopticon Lectures: 5 as against 3 last year.

Exhibits from Mission Fields: 2

Teas, or other special efforts to arouse interest: 8

Normal Classes: 2 as against 1 last year.

Conferences of Leaders: 5 as against 3 last year.

Membership: Over 1000 as against nearly 1000 last year.

One encouraging feature this year has been that many branches have carried on the educational work through the year, and have had programs dealing with Social Service and Religious Education as well as Missions.

Ways and means and results are always interesting. The following are just a few instances: As a result of their study of Alaska Missions, St. Luke's, Rochester, presented \$25 to Mr. Ziegler of Cordova, to purchase canvas and paints for his pictures. Dunkirk aroused interest by a Twelfth Night Tea and a Progressive Instruction Luncheon. St. Stephen's, Rochester, organized as a Travellers' Club. In LeRoy each woman was given the name of a missionary bishop, about whose work she was to be informed. At the Rochester District Meeting a demonstration home reading circle was held, showing the possibilities for an interesting meeting where a few women come together to talk over a book which they have all been reading at home.

It was a great joy to see that not all the branches stopped work last summer. About 20 members attended summer conferences, and a number took books for summer reading. This year several have already taken books and packets from the library and it is hoped that many more will do so.

Your educational secretary hopes very much to hear frankly as to which letters and what material and suggestions sent have been of help and which have struck just the wrong note. She also wishes every branch a very happy summer and great success next year.

To her we owe the origination of many methods which shall hereafter make our Dept. move more smoothly. All hail, then, to her as President! Under her leadership we shall surely bear a creditable share of the Great Task of the Church.

Your new Secretary is clearly conscious of both her responsibility and her slight wisdom. Nothing so much as her faith in our President's forbearance and kindly counsel has influenced her to assume this highly important—even vital—task. She solemnly asks your prayers for her in her new office.

And now, what shall I—what can I—set down here which shall influence for action those individuals or Parishes which are not yet undertaking to learn of the Church at Work? How rouse their desire, how stir their imagination? Surely it must be that all have not turned the pages, ever so hurriedly, of our blessed Spirit of Missions, wherein are shown, by word and by picture, little children being rescued from misery of body and terror of mind; women being drawn up from degradation and set upon a Rock; strong men being led from outer darkness to where they stumble not, because they see the Light. These things are happening in our own land and abroad daily because—only because—some *have* studied the need, and, understanding, have helped. Never can an Auxiliary branch which is indifferent to Mission Study or investigation, by some means, of the Church's work, be greatly efficient in helping. Nor, conversely, can a branch which adopts some method of informing itself on these matters, *fail* to help. Our greatest weakness lies, not in our lack of sympathy, but in our pre-occupation in other matters. Your new Secretary earnestly, prayerfully, begs those parishes which have so far not sought information, to this year engage, however slightly, in some definite study of the conditions which we, as an Auxiliary are laboring to ameliorate. I in this issue am listing suggestions and material, as very practical help for those parishes which find it hard to make a beginning.

OUR GOAL:—EVERY BRANCH STUDYING  
SUGGESTIONS FOR THE WINTER OF 1921—22

There are several ways, within easy reach of all, of beginning a study of the Church's work. Any one of the three means of approach listed below, adopted and followed through the winter with reasonable perseverance, will surely produce the desired result; *viz*, a greater understanding of what we are trying to accomplish.

1. The blue leaflet, "What do You Plan to Learn in 1921," issued by this Dept., will shortly be sent into every parish needing or desiring it. This is a complete list of our present resources in books, clippings, and study material, together with concise explanations of what constitutes education in Auxiliary and General Church matters. Therein may be found, (sec. 5, p. 4) a detailed scheme for drawing up an Educational plan for your Auxiliary.

2. Two leaflets, "How to Lead a Discussion Group,"  
"Program Missionary Meetings,"  
obtainable without cost at 281 Fourth Ave., N. Y., or of your Diocesan Sec., shed the clearest possible light on how to proceed toward this end.

3. Failing to adopt either of these plans for study, any branch or individual may send to the Lending Library, 3 Ely B'l'd'g, Rochester, for a list of its resources. (This is also given in the Blue Leaflet). From this may be chosen one or more books which may be, by renewal, available for a month. These may be read in groups, or at home and,—a highly desirable climax—talked over together after they are finished. By this simplest of all methods, an individual or a whole branch may acquire a good working knowledge of the Church's work, and, by so doing, deepen its efficiency.

Please keep an exact record of numbers participating and material used, and make your report by May first.

## REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

*To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:*

That the spirit of a growing sense of responsibility in passing on to others reading matter which has been used, and not wanted again by its owners, makes it possible for me to submit to you this report of work of cheer done by the Church Periodical Club in Western New York this past year.

Eight hundred and fifty (850) periodicals are being sent regularly; one hundred and fifty (150) of these are being sent to Alaska, Donors and Librarians being anxious to help the work there, after hearing Mr. Betticher's plea for Alaska.

A thousand Christmas and Easter cards have been sent to missionary workers for distribution. Ninety books have been sent to Boone library.

One hundred and seventy-eight (178) books given by Miss Staples of St. John's Church, Buffalo, will stock a reading room for a southern mission worker,—Rev. C. C. Buck.

Forty (40) reference books given to DeLancey Divinity School by Miss Emma Lovejoy of St. Mary's-on-the-Hill. Twenty-five (25) book-plates have been signed for Tokio library; one from St. Paul's Church in memory of Mrs. W. Y. Warren, the first Church Periodical Club librarian in the Diocese.

Over eight thousand magazines, books and papers have been sent, or taken, to institutions in the Diocese for which we have a constant appeal.

An encyclopedia, Stoddard's lectures, and twenty books have been given to a Buffalo clergyman.

Six hundred pasteboard sheets with pictures pasted on either side and six hundred prepared postal cards made by the Church School Service League, have been given to the Health Stations and hospitals for the use of sick children, in answer to an appeal. Seven scrap-books have been delivered to the Children's Hospital.

We have thirty-seven librarians. Five dollars have been given to the endowment fund by the librarian of St. Luke's, Buffalo, and five dollars have been sent to the secretary of the Provincial Synod, by the Correspondent of the Diocese, for Diocesan dues. The annual meeting of the Church Periodical Club is in January. There is no other financial report.

The library in the Diocesan House has been given to the Church Periodical Club to furnish. For the present we have the use of rugs and bookcases through the courtesy of Mr. Ballachey. The immediate needs, a desk-table and chair, have been ordered.

The Church Periodical Club is proud to report a spirit of church unity, as we have two Unitarians and three Presbyterians among our donors, and a Baptist clergyman in our diocese is a recipient.

The Church Periodical Club works in the five fields of Christian service.

For the generous response made by the friends of the C. P. C. we thank you.

While it is Christ who bids us do this work of cheer, can we, the librarians and donors, give Him anything but our best?

#### WHAT THE AUXILIARY HAS DONE FOR THE CHURCH SERVICE LEAGUE

The Woman's Auxiliary was asked to introduce, as the spokesman of all the federating organizations in the diocese, the work outlined for the Church Service League. To this end the field secretary has visited many parishes, some-

times discussing it simply with the rector, sometimes with the heads of departments in his parish, and often with larger groups. As a result of this preliminary work about one hundred parishes and missions have consented to adopt the plan, it being understood that the formation of the units would follow at the discretion of the rectors. In a number of instances the parish units were formed last spring and are now functioning most satisfactorily. Bishop Brent strongly approves of the unit comprised of both men and women. His definition of the purpose of the League is this: "It is an endeavor to recognize Christian service as a necessary part of Christian life, and should relate the service rendered by each citizen of God's Kingdom to the Kingdom itself, and to that which is being done by other citizens."

The response of the rectors and groups already reached has been hearty and encouraging and we feel that by the end of the coming year a splendid start will have been made in our diocese.

## SUGGESTIONS AND DIRECTIONS TO PARISH OFFICERS

Note;—It is recommended that each branch study the Manual carefully, and each officer the reports and suggestions for her work.

### To PARISH PRESIDENTS

Your Diocesan President will be happy to be kept in touch with the Parish Presidents, and to be of any service they may desire.

The Diocesan President earnestly urges the Parish Presidents to organize their branches for every part of the work, where they have not already done so; for consecration, and prayer, for education and for service—of time, money, and life. Will they, therefore, consider the appointment or election, of the following officers, or committees, *where they do not already exist*, in addition to Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, directions for whose work appear below; and give them an opportunity to present their special work to the entire branch.

1—A person or committee on DEVOTIONAL LIFE and suggest that they arrange for some of the following;

A Corporate Communion of the Parish at a special or regular service.

An understanding of the Stewardship Ideal (see Stewardship Leaflets.)

Intercessors for all parts of the Church's Mission, particularly for the "gift of life" from this Diocese (see Church Service League Leaflet.)

Family Worship and private devotions. A prayer plan for every Auxiliary meeting (see Devotions for Group Meetings.)

2—An Educational Secretary or Committee to arrange for some kind of educational program, for the individual, and for the branch, of reading, study, discussion, address, etc., and who will co-operate with the parish educational plan of the rector and his committee, if there is one.

3—A Secretary of Supply or Work Committee who will work along Red Cross lines as far as possible.

4—A United Thank Offering Treasurer, giving her special opportunity this Triennial Year, to stimulate the "gift of life" in addition to larger gifts of money.

5—A Secretary for the Church Periodical Club,—and for the Spirit of Missions.

6—Someone to assist in completing the *Mary E. Hart Memorial Fund*.

### To PARISH SECRETARIES

Parish Secretaries should keep careful and comprehensive records for the branch.

A typewritten list of officers of each Parish branch should be sent to the District Secretary for publication in the Manual, not later than November 1st.

As changes occur during the year, notices should be sent *at once* to Mrs. J. W. D. Cooper, Geneseo, in order that the proper officers may receive the communications.

### To PARISH TREASURERS

The Parish Treasurer should send money, as usual, to the Diocesan Treasurer, Miss Esther Smith, 305 Porter Avenue, Buffalo, in June when possible, and not later than October 25th, as our fiscal year closes November 1st.

The Parish Treasurer should present, or arrange to have presented to the branch the pledges, and any news of interest concerning them, which can be obtained from the Diocesan Treasurer or from Miss Lambright, 3 Ely Building, East Avenue, Rochester.

The money for Dr. Reifsnyder should be sent to the Treasurer as soon as possible and will go toward both the piano and the moving picture machine.

#### TO PARISH SUPPLY SECRETARIES OR WORKING COMMITTEES

The box work assigned to this diocese for the year reaches the Supply Secretary in midsummer, and is by her distributed among the Box Directresses. Write in August to the Box Directress of your district, for two or three letters, stating the needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools, to choose from. The officers of the branch, or a special committee, are requested to make this choice for the fall work before the branch begins regular meetings. An early choice is always wise, and especially so now that boxes are dispatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Directress know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Directress at the same time, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay. You should also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box, and from whom.

You should write again to the missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, stating the date of shipment and enclosing the received bill of lading; and you should also send a letter to the Directress giving the value of the box. The new method requires us to send a list of the articles in our boxes with the value of each article, to the Bureau of Supplies for record. This makes at least six letters to be written in connection with each parish box. It is always advisable to put the name and address of the sender of the box inside and also *outside* the box. The prepaid freight is estimated as part of the value of the box. An effort is being made to send a copy of the Word of God in each box. **Further information about the new Bureau of Supply is being issued in a special leaflet by the Department.**

It is suggested that, after the regular boxes are finished, each branch make, and send, a few articles to the Supply Bureau.

#### TO UNITED THANK OFFERING TREASURERS

The United Thank Offering Treasurer should arrange to present, or have presented, to the branch, the United Thank Offering, in as interesting a manner as possible, during the year.

## CONSTITUTION

---

### I

The name of this Society shall be "The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in America."

### II

The object of this Society is by means of union and systematic effort to diffuse Missionary intelligence, to increase Missionary study among women of the Diocese to include Religious Education and Social Service, where feasible, to unite previously existing societies and to encourage the formation where there are none.

### III

All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Society.

### IV

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Treasurer, two Secretaries, Corresponding and Recording, a Secretary of Supply, and an Educational Secretary, chosen by the Diocesan Association at the Annual Meeting and approved by the Bishop.

### V

The President, or in her necessary absence one of the Vice-Presidents shall call meetings and preside over them.

### VI

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and prepare a report to be read at the Annual Meeting. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep minutes, prepare a Manual for circulation in the Diocese, and present a report at the Annual Meeting. The Secretary of Supply shall also present a report at the Annual Meeting.

### VII

The Treasurer shall take charge of all money belonging to the Society except that of the United Thank Offering, and shall keep an exact account of all receipts and disbursements, and shall make a full report of the same at each Annual Meeting, and oftener if required.

### VIII

The Secretaries of parish branches shall send in reports of money collected and work done together with the number of members in that branch, to their District Secretaries. Delegates from the parish Societies will be expected at the Annual Meeting.

### IX

There shall be an Annual Meeting of this Society on the second Wednesday and Thursday in November, also a semi-Annual Meeting in the spring.

### X

During the year, District or Special meetings may be called by the President or the District Secretaries.

### XI

This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.
