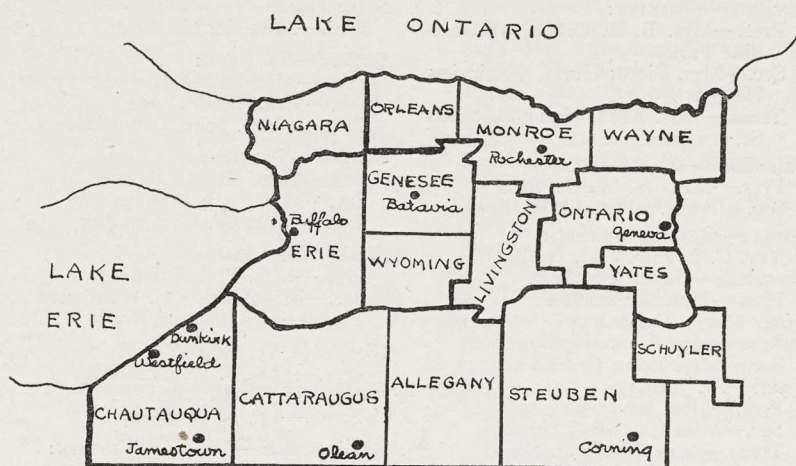

DIOCES OF WESTERN NEW YORK

DISTRICTS OF THE DIOCESE

The diocese is divided into six districts, each district being organized as far as possible with the following district officers, who may be elected or appointed by the Diocesan Executive Board.

District Chairman	Supply Secretary
Educational Committee or Secretary	Recording Secretary
Devotional Secretary	United Thank Offering Custodian
Corresponding Secretary	Treasurer

The objects of this division are a quickening of Auxiliary life all over the Diocese through reaching parishes far from the customary centres and holding there such meetings as may give them the information and inspiration that come from Diocesan meetings, also through the establishment of a system of administration equally applicable to conditions of work in village, town or city.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is to occupy every parish that is willing to do something for the Church's Mission in this organized way.

The division is made as far as possible according to counties. Railroad connections however make it impossible to follow boundaries arbitrarily.

The six districts are as follows:

BUFFALO DISTRICT: Angola, Buffalo, East Aurora, Lancaster, LaSalle, Lockport, Medina, Williamsville, Middleport, Niagara Falls, North Tonawanda, Gowanda, Depew, Youngstown, Dunkirk, (Erie and Niagara Counties).

ROCHESTER DISTRICT: Rochester, Brockport, Charlotte, Pittsford, Fairport, Scottsville, Union Hill, Sodus, Wolcott, Albion, Holley, Honeoye Falls, Spencerport, (Monroe and Orleans Counties).

GENESE DISTRICT: Geneseo, Avon, Dansville, Mount Morris, Batavia, LeRoy, Oakfield, Warsaw, Stafford, Perry, Caledonia, (Livingston, Wyoming, and Genesee Counties).

GENEVA DISTRICT: Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Shortsville, Phelps, Geneva, Palmyra, Lyons, Clyde, Newark, Dresden, Penn Yan, Branchport, Himrods, Dundee, (Wayne, Ontario and Yates Counties).

BATH DISTRICT: Bath, Canaseraga, Corning, Hammondsport, Hornell, Addison, Catherine, Montour Falls, Watkins. (Steuben and Schuyler Counties).

OLEAN DISTRICT: Olean, Salamanca, Mayville, Chautauqua, Angelica, Fredonia, Jamestown, Westfield, Belmont, Belvidere, Ripley, Ellicotville, Cuba, Silver Creek, Wellsville. (Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Alleghany Counties).

No greater privilege has ever been mine than that of serving this past year in the Auxiliary of Western New York, with such a body of inspired, hardworking, faithful, courageous and altogether delightful women; and of representing you in Portland at the Triennial. Your patience with a new and inexperienced officer, your cooperation, loyalty and spirit of adventure, are an inspiration which I shall always treasure. Your achievements have again been large, as can be seen in the splendid reports, received at this time, and have been a real and substantial contribution to the work of the national Auxiliary, represented by eighty-nine dioceses and missionary districts in Portland.

To see the Woman's Auxiliary as a whole, as we did there, where everyone's effort and service are brought together, where every contribution, large or small, of "thought, word, and deed," has its place, and is significantly and definitely

related to the whole, is to feel the inspiration and power; the joy and blessing; the hope and victory, of being "co-workers together with Christ," bound together and to Him in that indissoluble bond of love and fellowship, in helping, through the Woman's Auxiliary, to build up His Body.

May I read you some verses from St. Paul's epistle to the Ephesians expressing this thought?

"Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the chief corner stone; in whom each several building, fitly framed together, groweth into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom ye also are builded together for a habitation of God in the Spirit." Eph. 2:20-22.

"But speaking the truth in love, may ye grow up in all things into him, who is the head, even Christ; from whom all the body fitly framed and knit together through that which every joint supplieth, according to the working in due measure of each several part, maketh the increase of the body unto the building up of itself in love." Eph. 4:15-16.

From your other representatives, from our Bishops and lay deputies, we have all heard, and will continue to hear more, of the "Challenge to our Church today," and what our Church has pledged herself to do to answer this challenge. The Auxiliary in this diocese should strive by every means in its power to help the Church in Western New York, under the inspiring leadership of our Bishops and clergy, to "go forward" in Christ's name to the "greater things" He has bidden us do.

Our real task is to be "His Witnesses"—His instruments and servants, to serve Him with a single mind, without hypocrisy; with a pure and understanding heart; and with the strength of a noble physique. In this day there are needed more than anything else young women and older women who will learn to live close to the living Christ, of whom all seeing them may "take knowledge," as of St. Peter of old, "that they have been with Jesus." A truly Christlike character is the greatest contribution anyone can make; and any Auxiliary, individually or corporately, which is not seeking to "know Him, and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings," striving to be like Him, and to make Him known in and through their own daily living, is missing their greatest opportunity, responsibility and happiness.

Our Auxiliary service, therefore, is a very high service, a very deep and very broad and far-reaching service. It calls first of all then for *spiritual power* and Christ-like character and spirit,—a spirit that will agree to differ, as Bishop Roots said, but will resolve to love.

In the second place, it calls for a *comprehensive program*; a program of *prayer and worship*, for the growth of our devotional life and Christian character; of *education*, for increased knowledge and the ability to think wisely and in a consecrated spirit in solving the problems of today; of *work*, that furnishes a worth while task for every member; of *giving*—of time, personality, ability, money; in all of these reaching out from our home and parish, into the diocese, province, nation and world; and among all types of women, not just those already in our branches, but to the isolated, the business and working girls and women; the college and club women, the so-called society girls and women; young married women; those serving largely in the home; the shut-ins—in fact, every baptized woman.

In the third place, it calls for an *adequate organization* in the diocese, district and parish. We have begun today with diocesan organization. The hope is that this organization, the new constitution and by-laws and diocesan plans,

may make our business run more smoothly, with greater despatch and accuracy; may serve as a clearing house from headquarters to parish and visa versa; be the means of developing leadership; provide service for all; and be the channel through which fellowship and spiritual power may flow to the steady upbuilding of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

Your officers will shortly send you a joint letter, or leaflet, with specific suggestions for the carrying forward of our whole task, in the hope that each branch may see every part put together and have before it a vision of the whole; thus feeling the relation of their own contribution in prayer, thinking and study, work and gifts of money and life, to the work of the Church in the Diocese. Please read it, study it, pray about it, use it, when it comes!

In closing may I ask you the question, asked of us by the president of the National Executive Board of the Auxiliary?

Which do you say? My Work? Our Work? His Work? For those who begin to serve, *my* work is a great step forward, for it means self-identification with a work worth while. *Our* work means a larger, fuller conception of service, a spirit of cooperation, friendliness, and working together shoulder to shoulder with one another. *His* work means that we have become the instruments of His will, able to receive His power, His love, His joy, His suffering, in fullest measure; to be used where, when, and how He wills.

Can you say it?

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York

The year of 1921-22 has been one marked by steady and encouraging growth in every department. Never before has the work shown so many inspiring features.

The 41st Annual Meeting was held in Christ Church, Rochester, in November 1921, with 188 delegates representing 42 parishes. Mr. Reifsnider of St. Paul's College, Tokyo, Japan, was the special speaker at this time and in answer to his appeal enough money was raised to buy him a moving picture machine and a piano. This meeting stands out as one with an unusually large attendance and increased offerings.

The Semi-Annual meeting was held in June, at Zion Church, Palmyra, with 165 delegates from 40 parishes. The Rev. F. B. Barnett, recently returned from the hinterland of Liberia, made a stirring address at this meeting.

Three Officers' Conferences have been held, one in Rochester in March, one in Palmyra in June, and one in Buffalo in October.

A meeting of the Executive Board was held in October.

The Diocese was represented at the Provincial Synod held at Garden City.

The afternoon Conference at the Geneva Summer School for Church Workers proved very interesting and helpful.

Special features of the years' work were:

(1) Development of the work on the Devotional Life. (2) The great increase of the United Thank Offering and the Special Services held in connection with its

presentation. (3) The completion of the Mary E. Hart Memorial and the Emery funds, both being larger than was expected. (4) A full delegation of five at the General Convention in Portland, Oregon. (5) The use of a printed program at the Semi-Annual and Annual Meetings. (6) The change in the form of the notices of meetings. (7) The printing of all financial and detailed reports for circulation at the Annual Meeting, saving much time thereby.

There has been a greater demand for the Year Book and a quicker response to all letters sent out by your secretary, showing a greater knowledge of, and an increasing interest in, the business side of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Your secretary would like to take this opportunity of thanking all those, who by their wonderful co-operation during the past thirteen years, have helped to bring the Year Book to its present standard, and to express her regret that she finds it necessary at this time to pass her work on to other hands.

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE DEVOTIONAL COMMITTEE

Soon after the appointment of the Committee, a letter was sent to each parish President, outlining a simple devotional program for the year, and enclosing one copy each of the Church Service League Prayer Leaflet, a Missionary Litany and a "Devotional Service." With this a request was made that a report be made later of any work attempted. Special emphasis was placed, in the program, upon the giving of more time and thought to the opening and closing Services at our parish meetings, upon the holding of special Services for Prayer, and upon a wider use of the Church Service League Prayer Leaflet.

In addition each branch was urged to observe in some way the Day of Prayer for Missions, appointed for March 3rd by the Federation of Women's Boards of the country.

Early in May a brief letter and leaflet were sent to all branches, calling them to a participation in the Octave of Prayer for Unity, from May 28th to June 4th, thus sharing with our fellow-Christians of sixteen Communion in praying for the Unity which is Our Lord's desire, and which must still be the burden of His prayers.

During the summer the Convention number of the C. S. L. Prayer Leaflet was sent to parish Presidents, and later a notice went out, asking for Services of prayer during the sessions of the Triennial, and especially for a Corporate Communion on the morning of September 7th, at the hour of the great United Thank-Offering Service in Portland with suggested thanksgiving for the four Volunteers from this Diocese.

Two devotional Conferences were held during the year, one at the spring meeting of the Buffalo District, conducted by Mrs. Robins, and a second at the Semi-Annual meeting at Palmyra.

In these ways a beginning has been made along the lines of a corporate effort to emphasize and encourage those activities of the Auxiliary by means of which we are enabled to keep God at the centre of all our work.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

To the President and Members of W. N. Y. Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary: —

The Department work for the eleven months ending Oct. 1, 1922, on which date your Educational Secretary began to make up her report for the year has been sometimes gratifying, sometimes discouraging, but always interesting.

She feels, as never before, that so vital to the Doing of the Church's business is the Understanding of it, that as soon as possible, in some way, by some means, she MUST get to the women in every branch of our Diocese a compelling realization of its necessity.

Toward that end, she has:

1st. Established, with the help of others, an Educational Committee, as reported to you in the Circular of March 1, which shall aid her in carrying on routine and inspirational work in the various districts simultaneously. This committee, having, since its inception, suffered several additions, some resignations, and one death, stands, on Nov. 1, 1922:

Buffalo—Chairman, Mrs. ROCHESTER—Librarian, Mrs. CODD

Rochester—Chairman, Mrs. I. V. A. SNYDER

Olean Dist.—Miss HEQUEMBOURG

Geneseo Dist.—Mrs. COOPER

Bath—Miss WALKER

Geneva—Mrs. PEIRSON, pro tem.

As an important part of the Department organization, the Committee has been of great help to the Secretary, and as experience grows it is certain each year to prove more valuable.

2nd. Issued to every branch two personal, although necessarily from the number typewritten letters as follows:

A. January 1, 1922, Letter of acquaintance and greeting.

B. March. 1, 1922, Letter of suggestions and announcements.

3rd. Visited and spoke at two district meetings (Buffalo: Geneva) and at three parish meetings, beside the conducting of three Educational Committee conferences, and miscellaneous business of a like nature.

4th. Attended, to the best of her ability, to the routine work of the Department. This includes the careful filing of all work done by the branches, and all Educational work pertaining to them, correspondence, distribution of free material, helping in sale of books, stimulating interest in the General Church programs and literature, the Missionary Calendar, Spirit of Missions, etc.

5th. Kept an account of monies received for the use of the Department from the Educational Fund and disbursed by her.

The figures pertaining to these various matters are herewith printed.

A summarized statement of the Educational work of the parish branches was in your hands at the Annual Meeting, November 8-9 past, and is herewith submitted again. It carries at once encouragement and discouragement. There have been only 25 parishes having discussion-classes, but these were almost entirely independent, rather than in connection with group organization. It shows a deepening rather than a widening interest in educational matters.

The reports also indicate that but little Bible study is at present being done by Auxiliary women. This is a matter upon which your Secretary feels strongly, and has so expressed herself at different times through the year. Nothing in the whole range of our effort will be more far-reaching in its effects than a general return to frequent and thoughtful reading of the Bible, and the teaching of it to our children.

Your Educational Secretary has this year been invited to attendance, in an advisory capacity, upon the meetings of the Department of Missions of the Diocese. This opportunity, it is hoped, will hereafter tend toward a closer touch between Auxiliary and Diocesan Auxiliary work, and help to show us more clearly both opportunities for service and methods of undertaking it.

In closing, let me again suggest that the Educational Secretary and the Educational Committee members are at your service for suggestions or information as to the making of plans, if they are not already matured. Also, that the wealth of fine material with Miss Lambright and the almost endless resources on Fourth Ave. are waiting for your use, to the sole end that all may understand clearly and take seriously to heart her individual and indispensable part in the work of hastening the Kingdom of God.

REPORT OF THE SERVICE OF SUPPLIES OF THE DIOCESE OF WESTERN NEW YORK FROM NOV. 1921 TO NOV. 1922.

The past year has been one of interesting work in the Department of Supplies and much has been done to aid devoted missionaries and their families and to help sustain the work of the Church's Missions, Schools and Hospitals. It has also been a year of growth as the eighty-nine branches contributing have increased by over seven hundred dollars the gifts of last year. Some of these branches have supplied family boxes, some have sewed for the missions and schools allotted to our diocese, and some have sent their work to the Bureau of Supplies. These last named articles to the value of over twelve hundred dollars have been reported to Mrs. Wade and have been shipped out at her direction; one as an emergency box where there had been a fire, and the others to missions that had not received their full share of help.

Never, I think, have the boxes from this diocese contained such a varied assortment and this variety has added greatly to the interest of the work and has broadened our vision as to what may yet be the privilege and scope of this department.

A sewing machine and equipment for a Domestic Art and Science Room were joyfully received by the Okolona Industrial School of Mississippi and the accompanying gift of over three hundred yards of cotton for sheets and pillow cases was most welcome as it provided work for the sewing machine and a means of teaching the girls how to use it besides furnishing needed dormitory supplies. This school also received many new garments and household supplies and some useful second hand clothing.

Eighty dollars worth of drugs were sent by one branch in memory of Mrs. Ramsaur to Vai Interior Mission at Bendu, Liberia and five other boxes for that mission were valued at over one thousand dollars.

Through another branch, one hundred dollars worth of surgical dressings went to St. Timothy's Hospital in Liberia.

Four clergymen received new cassocks, and a new stole and cassock were furnished for a man who was ordained last March. Three catechist's suits were also provided.

One branch sent new altar hangings for a Mission Church in New Mexico, and second hand choir vestments have been sent to Southern missions and more are asked for.

Several boxes of knitted articles were sent to The Seamen's Church Institute. These boxes also contained used victrola records and games and second hand overcoats and were most gratefully received.

The Inasmuch Mission at Rossville, Ga., has received several boxes containing all sorts of new and useful articles and a quantity of second hand clothing; and to Holy Trinity Mission at Ponce, Porto Rico, we have sent boxes valued at nearly one thousand dollars.

In all, eighty boxes and one barrel have been shipped valued at. . . \$8,473.95.

The G. F. S. also sent a Joint Box valued at. 1,098.16

to St. Paul's School at Lawrenceville, Virginia, making. 9,572.11
the value of all boxes sent through the Department of Supplies.

SUGGESTIONS AND DIRECTIONS TO PARISH OFFICERS

TO PARISH PRESIDENTS

Parish Presidents are referred to the new Constitution and By-Laws for the fuller organization of their own parish branches, and also to the President's address, the Reports of all diocesan officers, and other articles contained in the Manual.

It is suggested that in meeting the present challenge to the Church, each branch seek to be "spiritually empowered and adequately organized," making a comprehensive program for the year that aims to realize the whole purpose of the Auxiliary as contained in Article II of the Constitution. The Devotional Life of the Auxiliary is the special charge of the President or Vice-President.

The Diocesan President and officers stand ready to be of any assistance they can. It is their hope that they be used.

TO PARISH SECRETARIES

Parish Secretaries should keep careful and comprehensive records for the branch.

A typewritten list of officers of each Parish branch should be sent to the District Chairman for publication in the Manual, not later than January first.

As changes occur during the year, notices should be sent *at once* to the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. E. M. Curtis, 37 Allen St., Buffalo, in order that the proper officers may receive the communications.

TO PARISH TREASURERS

The Parish Treasurer should send all money, except the United Thank Offering, and that properly belonging to the District, to the Diocesan Treasurer, Miss Esther Smith, 305 Porter Avenue, Buffalo. All pledges are due January 1st, so please send in your Parish pledges as soon after that date as possible—by July 1st at latest.

The Parish Treasurer should present, or arrange to have presented to the branch, the pledges, and any news of interest concerning them, which can be ob-

tained from the Diocesan Treasurer or from Miss Lambright, 3 Ely Building, East Avenue, Rochester.

TO PARISH UNITED THANK OFFERING CUSTODIANS

All Parish Custodians are reminded that we now invite *every woman* in the Church to make a United Thank Offering and proffer her a Blue Box.

Remittances may be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, Miss Elizabeth A. Lawrence, 579 Breckenridge Street, Buffalo, annually or semi-annually.

TO THOSE IN CHARGE OF THE DEVOTIONAL LIFE

It is hoped this year that every parish will make a definite effort to do some special work of this nature, and that a person, or a committee be appointed to take charge of it, so that every parish will have;

- 1—A Corporate Communion at a special or regular service.
- 2—A more general use of the Church Service League Prayer Leaflet.
- 3—A Prayer Plan for every Auxiliary meeting (see "Devotions for Group Meetings.")
- 4—A better understanding of the Stewardship Ideal, (Stewardship Leaflet)
- 5—More homes with Family Worship.
- 6—The Daily Bible Readings used in every home.
- 7—More earnest private devotions on the part of its people.
- 8—General interest in the new plans to be announced later.

If all parish presidents will assume definite oversight of the work until well started, much will be gained.

Write to the fourth Vice-President, Mrs. J. W. Denness Cooper, for further information on this subject. Send in the name of anyone in charge of such work and report to Mrs. Cooper by May 1st.

TO PARISH EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEES OR SECRETARIES

This Committee or Secretary should arrange for study classes, speakers, papers, lantern exhibits, or whatever seems best suited to the parish or branch needs for Educational work, and should keep a careful and clear record of the work done and results obtained. A blank will be sent from District Educational headquarters, in May, upon which the results of the season's effort should be reported. This is important, and merits your thoughtful preparation.

All material should be ordered from Miss Lambright, 3 Ely Building, Rochester, N. Y.

When speakers are desired, correspond with Miss Lambright.

Lantern slides are obtained from Lantern Slide Department, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City, asking for those only which have been rewritten.

Keep the Educational Secretary informed of changes in the Educational officers of the branch.

Make the acquaintance, if possible, of your District Educational Committee member. Apply to her, or if necessary, to the Educational Secretary for assistance in the planning of the year's work.

TO PARISH SUPPLY SECRETARIES

Parish Supply Secretaries are requested to get in touch with the Supply Secretary of the District in the late summer, concerning the Service of Supplies

for the coming year. An early choice is always wise, now that the first boxes are despatched immediately after Thanksgiving in order to be received by Christmas.

When your branch has "accepted" a letter—that is, undertaken the work which that letter calls for, let the Supply Secretary know at once the name and address of such letter, and the name and location of your parish. It is of the utmost importance that you should return the rejected letters to the Supply Secretary at the same time, so that she can send them out to other parishes without delay. You should also write at once to the missionary whose letter has been accepted, stating when he may expect a box, and from whom.

You should write again to the missionary as soon as the box has been despatched, stating the date of shipment and enclosing the receipted bill of lading; and you should also send a letter to the Supply Secretary giving the value of the box. The new method requires us to send a list of the articles in our boxes with the value of each article, to the Bureau of Supplies for record. This makes at least six letters to be written in connection with each parish box. It is always advisable to put the name and address of the sender of the box inside and also *outside* the box. The prepaid freight is estimated as part of the value of the box. An effort is being made to send a copy of the Word of God in each box. For fuller information, write the Diocesan Secretary.

It is suggested that, after the regular boxes are finished, each branch make, and send, a few articles to the Supply Bureau.

DELEGATES TO DIOCESAN MEETINGS

If the delegates to the annual or semi-annual meetings, find, after their names have been sent in, that they are unable to attend, they are requested to notify the head of the hospitality committee immediately, if necessary by telegraph thus making room for others and preventing unnecessary confusion.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I — NAME

The name of this association shall be The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

ARTICLE II — OBJECT

Sec. 1. The object of this Auxiliary, as an organic part of the Church Service League, shall be to help in the carrying forward and realization of the program of the National Council of the Church, for the fulfillment of the mission of the Church. To this end this Branch of the Auxiliary shall enlist the women of the Church in active service for the spread of Christ's Kingdom on earth by witnessing in His Name, through prayer and worship, knowledge and wise thinking, work, giving, and the influence of Christ-like character.

Sec. 2. The work of this Auxiliary shall be divided, in co-operation with other diocesan agencies, among all fields of Christian Service—home, parish, community, diocese, province, nation and world—along the lines of Missions, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service, the chief service, however, being a missionary one.

ARTICLE III — MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. All women, by virtue of their baptism, are eligible for membership in the Woman's Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. Any group of such women wishing to further the work of the Auxiliary as defined in Article II of this Constitution shall be eligible for membership in the branch of a parish or mission.

Sec. 3. Any such branch in the diocese, or such group unrelated to a parish or mission with the consent of the Bishop shall be eligible for membership in the diocesan branch.

ARTICLE IV — OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

Sec. 1. The officers of this Auxiliary shall be a President, five Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Supplies, an Educational Secretary, and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering.

Sec. 2. There may be a custodian or committee in charge of the Bureau of Supplies, and a Field Secretary or Secretaries, appointed by the Executive Board.

Sec. 3. These officers shall be elected for a term of three years.

Sec. 4. These officers shall be eligible for election to the same office for not more than two consecutive terms, except the President, who may be elected for a third consecutive term.

Sec. 5. Each officer shall serve until the adjournment of the annual meeting or until her successor is elected and installed, but the Educational Secretary and the Vice-President in charge of the Devotional Life shall continue their duties through the Easter Season.

Sec. 6. There shall be a nominating committee of five members, two of whom shall be appointed by the Chair and three elected from the floor, whose duty it

shall be to receive any suggestions for nominations prior to the annual election and to prepare a ticket to be voted upon at that time. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

Sec. 7. The officers shall be divided into three groups, as follows:

Group I—President, Corresponding Secretary, Educational Secretary.

Group II—Recording Secretary, four Vice-Presidents.

Group III—Secretary of Supplies, United Thank Offering Custodian, Treasurer and one Vice-President.

Group I—to be elected the year preceding the Triennial.

Group II—to be elected the year of the Triennial.

Group III—to be elected the year following the Triennial.

At the time of organization the officers shall be elected for the following terms:

Group I for two years. Group II for three years. Group III for one year.

Sec. 8. The election of officers shall be by ballot, a majority vote constituting an election.

Sec. 9. Any vacancy occurring in any office during the term shall be filled by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V — BOARDS

Sec. 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Diocesan Officers of the Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. The Diocesan Board shall be composed of all the Diocesan Officers and District Chairmen and District Officers.

Sec. 3. The Diocesan Board may include in its membership the Church Periodical Club Correspondent of the Diocese and the Diocesan Secretary for Missions of the Girl's Friendly Society.

ARTICLE VI — STANDING COMMITTEES

There shall be the following Standing Committees appointed by the President:

- (a) Nominations (see Art. IV, Sec. 6)
- (b) Auditing
- (c) Finance
- (d) Constitution and By-Laws
- (e) Resolutions

ARTICLE VII — ANNUAL MEETING

Sec. 1. The annual meeting shall be held on the second Wednesday and the following Thursday in January of each year for the election of officers and receiving of annual reports and any other business that may come regularly before the meeting, and for the realization of the object of the Auxiliary as contained in Article II.

Sec. 2. A semi-annual meeting may be called by a two-thirds vote of the Diocesan Board, or at the request of one-half the total number of Branches.

Sec. 3. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Diocesan Board.

ARTICLE VIII — AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary by a two-thirds vote of the parish branches present and voting, provided the proposed amendment has been previously submitted in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, and to the membership of the Diocesan Branch.

Article VIII. Suspended for one year to allow change to be made freely in 1924.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings and to perform all other duties appertaining to the office, as defined in Article II of the Constitution.

Sec. 2. In the absence of the President, the Vice-Presidents in the order of their rank shall perform all the duties of that office.

Sec. 3. The special duties of the Vice-Presidents shall be determined by the Executive Board. One Vice-President shall be in charge of the Devotional Life of the Auxiliary.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a correct record of the proceedings of all meetings of the Diocesan Branch and of the Diocesan and Executive Boards. She shall authenticate all acts and orders of the Auxiliary; she shall keep a list of the Branches; she shall submit a written report of the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch to the annual meeting, to the Provincial Synod and to the Executive Council of the Diocese, and shall prepare and edit the Manual.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to carry on all correspondence assigned by the Executive or Diocesan Boards or the Annual meeting; to arrange, through the proper channels for publicity in Church and daily papers, keeping a record of the same; to issue notices of all meetings; to read all letters and have custody of the same; to send out the Manual; to notify the proper authorities of all newly elected officers and delegates, and of those who have passed away during the year; to submit a written report at the annual meeting.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all gifts, with the exception of the United Thank Offering, and deposit the same in the name of the Auxiliary in such bank or banks as she may see fit; to dispense all money as directed by the Diocesan Branch; to keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and to render a written report at the annual meeting.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the United Thank Offering Custodian to increase and deepen interest in this offering of life and money by correspondence and visitation so that every woman may partake therein; to make an annual report of all money and forward or take the same to the Triennial.

Sec. 8. It shall be the duty of the Educational Secretary, in co-operation with diocesan educational plans and the Executive Board, to organize the Diocesan Branch for educational work and stimulate the same by every possible means.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of Supplies, in co-operation with other diocesan organizations, and with the Executive Board when requested, to maintain the diocesan Bureau of Supplies; to organize the diocesan branch for the Service of Supplies; to stimulate in every possible way the Service of Supplies; to receive and disseminate all information relating to the same; to render a report of supplies and money at the annual meeting, having the financial statement audited.

Sec. 10. The Auxiliary shall be divided into six Districts: Buffalo, Rochester, Geneseo, Geneva, Bath, and Olean. Each district shall elect its Chairman and officers at the meeting following the annual election of Diocesan officers.

Sec. 11. It shall be the duty of the District Chairmen, in co-operation with the Executive Board, to organize their districts for the carrying on of all diocesan plans; to arrange District Meetings, in co-operation with District officers; to

assist in organizing new branches; to stimulate interest in the work of the Auxiliary; to secure a true list of all parish officers, sending the same to the Recording Secretary; to notify immediately the Corresponding Secretary of any changes during the year; to render an annual report to the Diocesan Branch of the activities of the District.

ARTICLE II — DUTIES OF BOARDS

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to choose the policy and prepare the plans for the year and publish the same; to appoint committees; to fill vacancies; to execute work assigned to it by the Diocesan Board and the annual meeting; to submit a report at the annual meeting.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Diocesan Board to have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE III — DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Auditing Committee to audit all financial reports of the Diocesan Branch.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare and submit a budget to the Diocesan Branch annually in co-operation with the Executive Board and to the Treasurer of the Diocese; to devise means of raising this budget; to secure and disseminate information concerning the pledges at the time of the annual meeting.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws to receive any proposed changes in the Constitution or By-Laws; to submit the same with recommendations to the Executive Board who shall in turn present them to the annual meeting.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to receive all Resolutions to be presented at the annual meeting and to make a report of the same.

ARTICLE IV — DUES

Each Branch shall make a voluntary contribution, commensurate with its ability, to the pledges of the Auxiliary.

Each Branch is asked to contribute to the administration Fund in proportion to the size of its contribution, or as suggested by Finance Committee.

ARTICLE V — FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Auxiliary shall be from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31st.

ARTICLE VI — MEETINGS OF BOARDS

Sec. 1. The Executive Board shall meet at the call of the President, at least twice a year.

Sec. 2. The Diocesan Board shall meet twice a year.

Sec. 3. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the President or by her upon the request of three members.

ARTICLE VII — REPRESENTATION AT ANNUAL MEETING

Sec. 1. Parishes shall not be limited as to delegates to the annual meeting, but only one vote shall be cast from each parish branch when balloting for officers. Each parish branch shall elect its own representative for this balloting for officers.

Sec. 2. Delegates to the Triennial and to the Provincial Synod shall be elected at the annual meeting preceding the Triennial and the Synod, nominations being made from the floor, and the election being by ballot.

ARTICLE VIII — QUORUM

Sec. 1. One third of the Branches of the Auxiliary shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting.

Sec. 2. Five members shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Board.

Sec. 3. Nine members shall constitute a quorum of the Diocesan Board.

ARTICLE IX — PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order, Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

ARTICLE X — AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended at any annual meeting of the Auxiliary by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing on the first day of the Annual Meeting to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws.
