THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE
TO THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
OF
WESTERN NEW YORK

JULY - 1925

My Dear Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:—

As I write my belated annual message to the members of the Woman's Auxiliary in Western New York (belated as you know because of my severe illness) the time of the Triennial in New Orleans is nearly at hand. As you read these words from your president, the delegates will be definitely preparing to go, and the last United Thank Offering for this Triennium will have been taken—and our hearts and minds will be centered in those great national gatherings.

While much that we will wish to do this coming year will be dependent upon the action of the Triennial, there are several things I would like to suggest our thinking about which I am confident, as a member of the National Executive Board, will underlie and permeate all that is done there, and which therefore can be taken as the basis for our work in 1925-1926.

The planning that is being done preparatory to the Triennial is attempting to strike down into the very roots of our Auxiliary and individual life, and to place the Triennial—rooted and grounded in spiritual things—upon a higher spiritual plane than ever before. We are hoping and earnestly praying for "newness of life," that we may be truly transformed by our Lord's process of "renewing" as we meet together there in His name.

Newness of life is one of the joys and fruits of the truly Christian life. A Christian need never grow stale, yet some of us as individuals and as groups are not always conscious of the quickening power of the Holy Spirit. When we are not, we are in danger of being numbered among the stale Christians of our time.

In Western New York as we attempt to have our Auxiliary life rooted and grounded in spiritual things and this year seek to rise to a higher plane than ever before, let us consider three words which will be heard many times in New Orleans—three words that are so familiar as to be almost commonplace and trite, yet were they to be really lived out by each one of us would become charged with fresh meaning and power.

The first of these is CO-OPERATION—unity. There is newness of life for the Woman's Auxiliary and for each member, as it grows from an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions into full co-operation with all departments of the National Council and with all organizations in the parish and diocese. Definite ways of doing this may already be found in the new joint leaflet of the Woman's Auxiliary and Field Department.

Let us, therefore, in Western New York work and pray and think together with other groups in true unity of the Spirit, in full and hearty co-operation for the upbuilding of Christian life in the home and parish, diocese, community, nation and world.

The second word is CONVICTION—Christian conviction. There is newness of life to be found in real conviction concerning the power of Christ to rule the world—the confused, complex world of today; in conviction concerning His way of life as the solution of all world and community problems; in a conviction that He is able today to establish peace, justice, love, truth, abundant living upon the earth; to turn darkness into light, death and sheer existence into abundant living; exploitation, greed and suspicion into love; strife and bitter contention into peace. Do you really believe it? Or do you doubt it? There is newness of life to be found in the conviction that His way of life is not only the Way for the world in general but for ourselves in particular; that our own way of life is not the Way; that Christ is able and eager to give us each a power, a love, a light that will entirely fill each life, giving all things that are necessary

for happiness provided we are sincere and devoted followers. This kind of conviction must needs grow out of a personal religious experience and not be based on what another says or believes. It must spring from within the very depths of our nature and be so strong and sure and true that it shines as a beacon in the midst of the chaos of modern thinking and living.

Let us seek a fresh experience of God, a new conviction concerning Him and His way of life, both in our own personal lives and in our lives together in a group. The leaflet entitled "Learning to Know Jesus Christ Through a Study of the Gospels," by leading you into new ways of knowing Him, will be a help in gaining fresh conviction and experience of Him.

The third word is CONSECRATION. There is newness of life to be found in a fuller consecration—a consecration without reservations—giving all, holding nothing back—and with no water-tight compartments—with no social, political, business or pleasure compartments into which the Christ may not come; a consecration that actually trusts God with our whole life, trusting Him to choose our companions, our business, our wealth, our health, our home, our pleasures, our successes, failures. Have you this kind of consecration? Has your branch?

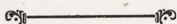
Let us seek to discover our own reservations, our water-tight compartments, the point at which we stop trusting God or letting Him rule our lives. Let us endeavor to open wide these doors during the coming year and to give ourselves wholly to Him. Let us be willing to identify ourselves with the failure of Christians today—to realize we too have been partly pagan. Let us seek to know and to follow our Lord so honestly, so truly that we may have newness of life and become more effective instruments of His Power. Finally, let us say together the prayer at the end of this message.

In closing, may I say how happy I am that you have asked me to serve another three years as your president and that you wish me to be one of your representatives at the Triennial in New Orleans. As I look back over the three years, I am filled with joy and pride in you all for the kind of women you are and for the splendid things you have done. I am also profoundly conscious of my many inabilities and failures; of the many things I should have done that I have not been able to do. I can only hope and try to be and do more in the future.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

To the Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:

In submitting these few statements to you, your President wishes to express her very keen disappointment at her failure to be with you at the Annual Meeting—only a serious illness could have kept her away from her place with you in May. She is most appreciative of all that others did to make the Annual Meeting such a great success and rejoices deeply in it. In view of these unusual circumstances, she begs leave to do two things; first, to send in the result of her study, while in the South, of the first two pages of the reports sent in by the parish branches, in the form of a regular report for the Year Book; second, in a very informal way, in a message attached to this in multigraphed form, to make a few suggestions for next year which will fall in line with those of the National Executive Board to the Auxiliary as a whole.

These report blanks were filled in most carefully by over 75% of the branches and have resulted in a real survey of the Woman's Auxiliary in Western New York. Your President has spent hours in studying them (she says this for your comfort) and cannot but express her great appreciation of the time and effort the parish officers have put into them. When all the replies are brought together, the diocesan picture is nearly complete. It contains many more high lights than shadows, and high lights of special radiance and clarity. It is a very inspiring picture and will bring great joy to your hearts.

You have emphasized to a far greater extent the devotional life; many more branches have undertaken some kind of educational work; the quality of your service of supplies has greatly improved; the United Thank Offering is as much in two years as in the three of the last Triennium; you have contributed more generously to the Pledges and Administration Fund, and in addition, to the National Specials and the Japan Fund; you have co-operated in the Forward Program of the Diocese in the ways suggested by the Officers' Conference last September, with the County Conferences and with the Diocesan Convention at the present time. You have given, finally, a most inspiring example of loyalty and response to all requests and plans of your Diocesan officers which has filled them with joy and humility.

Sixteen out of all the questions in the report come within the special province of the President and District Chairmen. The replies may be summarized as follows, and reveal a few of the shadows:

- 26 branches meet every week.
- 16 branches meet twice a month.
- 47 branches meet once a month.
- 6 branches meet in the evening every meeting or alternating.
- 2453 total number of active members.
- 1882 total number of contributing members.
- 288 total number of members gained during the year.
- 128 total number of members lost during the year.
- 43 branches report some new leaders or officers.
- 76 new leaders or officers.
- 26 branches have a membership committee.
- 53 branches use other methods for obtaining new members.
- 35 branches report some plan or program for the year.
- 43 branches have made their organization more adequate.

- 46 branches have tried to deepen and develop the spirit of fellowship.
- 35 branches have brought the Provincial Objectives before the branch.
- 26 branches have done some Christian Social Service.
- 45 branches have made suggestions to the Diocesan and District officers.
- 66 branches have given problems or difficulties.
- 64 branches have tried to equip themselves more adequately.
- 22 branches have definitely tried to encourage the Gift of Life.

How to make available for every branch the information and practical suggestions with which you and National Headquarters have supplied us; how to enable the branches to share each other's experience, is perhaps the greatest practical problem of your Executive Board. We are trying to solve it by sending you Quarterly Letters with the results of our regular Executive Board meetings and with news from the Field; by using at least a page in every issue of Our Diocesan Fellowship for Woman's Auxiliary news; by as frequent visits and personal letters to the 115 branches as is possible for us; by holding district and diocesan meetings, conferences and institutes; by making the Year Book more suggestive than ever; by publishing an interchange of methods in which you will find many of the best replies sent in by the branches on such subjects as increasing membership, programs or plans for the year, provision for leadership, preparing yourselves more adequately, devotional life, etc.

Thus by knowing one another better, by understanding our common needs and problems, and being bound closely together in our common task, we hope that we may all learn to serve more adequately, following more closely in the footsteps of our Blessed Lord.

POLICY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF WESTERN NEW YORK

AIM FOR 1924

Let us strive to be real followers and interpreters of the "Christian Way of Life" in our own parish, in the district and diocese, and into the uttermost parts of the world.

"To every man there openeth
 A way, and ways, and a way;
 And the high soul climbs the high way,
 And the low soul gropes the low;
 And in between on misty flats
 The rest drift to and fro.
 But to every man there openeth
 A high way and a low,
 And every man decideth
 The way his soul shall go."

To help us realize this aim, let us co-operate in the following objectives:

I. LET US STRENGTHEN WHATEVER IS WEAK in our individual lives and in our life together as a branch, as a district, and as a diocese.

A careful analysis of last year's activities will reveal whether it is our devotional life; our habits of study and thinking; our service of supplies; our administration; our gifts of time, ability, life or substance; our co-operation

with each other, district or diocese; our spirit of fellowship. A complete service for the individual member of the Auxiliary and for the branch includes all. "No chain is stronger than its weakest link."

2. LET US FULLY EQUIP OURSELVES AND PROVIDE FOR THE TRAINING OF OTHERS.

This will enable us to meet more adequately the challenge of today.

The Woman's Auxiliary Handbook, our own district meetings, summer and county conferences, the plans and suggestions of the Educational Secretary of the Auxiliary will help us equip ourselves. Let us consider them carefully.

The Training Houses for Women give us an opportunity for providing for the training of others. At least \$5,000 was set in the conference at the Annual Meeting as our goal for May first, 1925. For definite information write to Mrs. James H. Dyett, 1 Penhurst Park, Buffalo, who is the chairman for Western New York for the Woman's Auxiliary National Special, in memory of the late Bishop Tuttle.

3. LET US WORK AND PRAY FOR THE GIFT OF LIFE FROM OUR DIOCESE FOR THE TRIENNIAL OF 1925.

Let us strive also for a full consecration and offering of ourselves, each and everyone, dedicating ourselves anew to the Christ and His service that we may be "living epistles known and read of all men," willing to be used for His purposes just as He wills and when and where. This requires daily practice for the individual, and for the branch a real plan for its devotional life. From it will spring the passion, poise and power for a full Christianity.

4. LET US GROW UP INTO THE STATURE OF THE CHRIST.

Let us choose the highest and deliberately eliminate all that prevents our best attainment, keeping the balance as Christ did between contemplation and activity. Let us "measure up" in 1924 to the best of which we are capable in character and service. Let us be satisfied with "nothing but the best for 1924."

A general basis or standard for a well-rounded and balanced service for 1924 will be indicated by the new report blanks referred to at the Annual Meeting, which are to be prepared by the Executive Board. An outline of these will be sent each branch in time for discussion at the spring meetings, that they may finally represent the corporate thinking of our diocesan branch rather than that of the Executive Board alone.

"O God, our Father, we dedicate ourselves anew to Thee and Thy service. Put into the heart of each one of us such a love for Thee that we may truly love our neighbors as ourselves—a love that leaps the boundaries of race or color or creed or kind, that knows no distinction of class, that reaches out a saving hand even unto the least of these our brethren. Fill our lives with the single motive of service, and use us, Lord, use us for Thine own purposes just as Thou wilt, and when and where; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

REPORT OF THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT

In presenting my report as Third Vice-President, it is this year with a deeper sense of my privilege and pleasure in the work assigned me than ever before. My assignment of special work is for the Isolated within the Diocese. I have interpreted this term to mean more than those geographically separated from the privileges of regular services of the Church.

It was suggested that I ask the Branch Presidents for the names of women who for any reason were out of touch with the Master's work in the Diocese. So I sent out fifty-four letters to the Branch Presidents outside of Buffalo and Rochester. Fifty-three names were received of those to whom I might send an occasional "Fellowship," a cheery letter, any W. A. literature, or special notices. May I take this opportunity to express to the Branch Presidents who responded to my letters my grateful appreciation for their replies and co-operation. One of those, whose name I have, writes me as follows: "I thank you for the inspiration which prompted the sending," and other like expressions have made a real joy of the work given me to do. I have sent out 102 copies of the "Fellowship," 50 individual letters, 50 copies of the Daily Bible Readings, 50 copies of the W. A. and U. T. O. Prayer, and in these reaching the 53 persons whose names I have. I have also sent out 18 copies of the Leaflet, "Devotional Life," prepared by our President, besides a number of Christmas messages of greeting and Good Will. Not much, it is true, to report in the tabulation of figures, but if a bond of prayer and fellowship has been established with even a few, if a few hearts have been cheered in the consciousness that the Woman's Auxiliary has a care and a thought for them, bringing them into touch with its larger life, then it has been a precious privilege and well worth while.

REPORT OF THE FOURTH VICE-PRESIDENT

THE PRAYER PARTNER PLAN

The Prayer Partner Plan was started in this Diocese two years ago and it has been most successful in the Canadian Auxiliary. The original plan allowed each Branch to choose a special worker in the field. When our Diocese undertook the duty of Prayer Partnership, it was found that there were not enough missionaries for each Branch to have a Partner. So we were allowed six and it was therefore possible for each District to have one. We immediately accepted the following names: *Buffalo District*, Miss Winifred Mann, House of the Holy Child, Manila, P. I.; *Rochester District*, Sister Oliva Mary, St. Andrew's Priory, Honolulu; *Geneva District*, Miss L. G. Graves, St. Mary's School, Shanghai, China; *Bath District*, Miss Lucy Archer, Inasmuch Mission, Rossville, Ga.; *Geneseo District*, Mr. & Mrs. C. H. Evans, Mito Japan, (Tokio); *Olean District*, Miss Florence Basom, St. Andrews School, Mayaguez, P. R. For the whole Diocese, Deaconess Shaw, Philippine Islands.

When a District has accepted a Partner, it is the privilege of every Branch in that District to write personal, interesting letters to him or her telling of our special interest and our earnest prayers, asking for prayers in return. When an answer comes, unless very personal and confidential, it should be sent to the district chairman, who will have it copied and sent to the other parishes in the district. On no account, must the parishes expect the missionary to answer every

letter. The idea is, many letters from us and an occasional one from our partner, who will tell us of any special needs and difficulties. This copied from one of the letters already received speaks for itself and the plan needs no further commendation; "First, I want to thank you and the women associated with you in your 'prayer League' for your kindness in associating us with you as your 'prayer partners.' This helps us in understanding the many ways in which unexpected help and protection, as well as encouragement, have come to us during the past year, which has undoubtedly been one in which we have received much help in time of need. We know that this has come from the Giver of all good, but we can at the same time understand that it has been as well, in response to prayers from faithful souls who have come to the Throne on our behalf, and united their prayers with our own. It certainly should give to every Missionary thus prayed for, a new courage, and new confidence. We are undoubtedly thankful for the inspired thought that initiated this new method of help, and that thus assists in making us who are far away a real part of the praying and work in Church across the sea. It will certainly give new vitality to our own prayers, as it has given us new reasons for thanksgivings."

One other step taken this year, is the use of the Diocesan Fellowship as a means of making our needs known. Every month special intercessions and thanksgivings are printed, and in one issue, the whole page was given to the Devotional Life.

REPORT OF THE FIFTH VICE-PRESIDENT

The Executive Board, feeling strongly that it was time we considered our unused forces among the business and professional women of the diocese, appointed me as fifth vice-president with the duty of reaching these groups.

As a nucleus we have four evening Auxiliary branches which grew out of the old 'Juniors.' It is the intention to organize an evening branch in every parish where it seems feasible, and few parishes are without possibilities. The size of the group is not important as compared with the provision to give to women who are barred from afternoon meetings an opportunity of making their contribution to all departments of Auxiliary work. In the autumn we shall arrange to have the work—in all its varied scope—presented by one of the Church's outstanding leaders at several large gatherings; meantime I am ready to visit any parish to help organize branches and explain the work. Judging by the strength of the evening Auxiliary branches in Canada, we confidently look for a large accession of the finest type of workers, when we have made provision for their recruiting. The intention is to have the new evening branches function exactly like the day ones, with their own officers and under the direction of the Diocesan Board. But in future some of our big meetings will be arranged for the evening, to allow business women the opportunity of taking part in the discussion of the plans and of hearing outside speakers.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

The Recording Secretary presents the following outstanding events of the year from Jan. 1924 to Jan. 1925.

The 43rd annual meeting of the Western N. Y. Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held in St. Paul's, Rochester, Jan. 9-10, 1924.

There were 247 delegates registered, representing 54 parishes.

The treasurer reported \$8916.07 given, over and above our pledges, for specials. Of this amount \$6635.45 was given for the Japanese Relief, and \$800.00 for the Hooker school.

The United Thank Offering Custodian made a most encouraging financial report and further stated that two lives from Western N. Y. had been given to the Service during the past year.

A very impressive service and one of historical significance took place on the second day of our meeting, when The Book of Remembrance was presented by Mrs. Frederick Knowlton, in memory of her mother, Caroline Hamlin Stone, to our Bishop to bless and lay upon the Altar. The volume is an exquisite example of the arts of the book-binder and illuminator. On the first page are the words, "In loving and grateful memory of these saints who rest with the Lord and have labored diligently in His Service." On the following pages there is illuminated the list of officers and women who have done special work in the Auxiliary since its organization in 1881 and who have now passed on to Eternal Life. The bulk of the volume is left blank for future names to be added as the years go on.

The Committee on the Constitution and By-Laws presented some minor amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws, which were adopted. The amended Constitution and By-Laws will appear elsewhere in the Year Book.

It was a very great privilege and joy to have as our guest and speaker, Miss Eva Corey, at this meeting.

During the year 1924 there have been held two meetings of the Diocesan Board and three of the Executive Board. On Mar. 27th, 1924, the Diocesan Board met in Rochester at the home of the President, Mrs. Robins. Sept. 26-27, 1924, there was held a two days session of the Diocesan Board, the members being guests of our President, Mrs. Robins, and our First Vice-President, Mrs. Knowlton, and the Rochester District Chairman, Mrs. Harper Sibley.

A letter from our Bishop was read requesting the Woman's Auxiliary to change the date of the annual meeting from Jan. to May coterminously with the Diocesan Council. A resolution conforming to the Bishop's request was adopted. According to our amended Constitution it lay within the power of the Executive Board to make this change. The Executive Board met June 11, 1924 at Trinity Parish House, Buffalo.

On Oct. 17th a special meeting was called in Grace Church, Buffalo, to consider the resignations of Mrs. Pollard, Secretary of Supply, and Miss Lawrence, United Thank Offering Custodian. These Resignations were accepted with deep regret. Mrs. John D. Pugh, Niagara Falls, was elected to succeed Mrs. Pollard, and Mrs. C. A. Champlin, Hammondsport, to succeed Miss Lawrence.

Dec. 2, 1924, the Executive Board met at The Church House, Buffalo, at which time we were the guests, for luncheon at the Twentieth Century Club, of Mrs. E. M. Curtiss.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY FROM JAN. 1, 1924
TO JAN. 1, 1925
BASED ON 86 REPORTS

Thirty-seven branches report a regularly appointed Educational secretary, whose name and address is duly recorded in the Educational Officers list.

Forty branches have had Discussion Group series, varying in number from one to seven in a series, held usually in Lent, although a few series were earlier in the season. "Creative Forces in Japan" was the generally preferred text-book, although the following were also used:

Adventures in Brotherhood
The Leaven in Japan
Missions of the Episcopal Church
Story of the Program
My Father's Business
China's Real Revolution
Hidden Forces
Woman's Auxiliary Handbook

Thirty-five parishes report program meetings on a wide variety of subjects with 45 different speakers.

Somewhat over 250 are reported as having taken a sustained part in Educational work, but more than half the branches failed to report on this, so that the figure is of little value.

There are reported 33 leaders for general classes and 15 for normal classes. About 42 members attended a summer conference, most at Geneva.

Considerably over a hundred are doing some form of Bible study, but again the figure is inadequate from lack of data.

Thirty-four branches report some educational effort this year that did not so report last year.

Two branches that did some Educational work last year reported none this year.

Eighty-six branches did some form of Educational work, as against 53 last year.

Thirty-nine branches had discussion, as against 35 last year.

During the month of January past were held in Rochester and Buffalo institutes which it is expected will further develop and intensify interest in the Church's work. While the report of these will appear in the 1925 Diocesan report, a mere note of them is here made to complete the sum of present effort.

SUMMARY OF REPORTS FROM PARISH BRANCHES
CONCERNING GIFTS.

Many Branches seem confused about their gifts. They report as pledges, gifts sent to the Diocesan Box Custodian for boxes and The United Thank Offering, also District dues. On this account, it is hard to make a careful tabulation of the result. Gifts for Pledges, United Offering, Box Work and The National Special are reported on another page.

To date, Feb. 17, 51 Branches have sent in reports; 42 have increased their gifts; 4 did not answer questions; 5 report no increase in gifts.

The following Branches have given financial aid to their *Parish*: Angelica, Belfast, Belvidere, Epiphany—Buffalo, St. Lukes—Buffalo, Cuba, Wellsville.

St. Marks and St. Clement—Buffalo, Jamestown, St. Pauls—Rochester, and Wellsville report gifts for The *Community Chest*, Mission of Help, Radio equipment in Hospitals, etc.

Several Branches report gifts to the *Diocese* through the Church. One Branch reports a personal gift to Bishop Brent.

Many large gifts were given to Missions in the *Nation* and throughout the *World* by most of the Branches. These gifts were sent directly to the field by the Parish Branch.

Branches report that they have studied and learned about the recipients of their gifts as follows: by reading aloud articles published, especially the Spirit of Missions; by letters from the Secretary of Supplies and letters from Missionaries; by talks from members of the Church and Missionaries.

They obtained money for their gifts by dues, voluntary contributions, money given for quilting, making comfortables, sales, suppers, and direct appeals. St. Peter's, Westfield, writes—"We furnish opportunity to give; failing that, we select the right person to make the personal appeal; we often ask an uninterested person to make appeal thereby interesting a second person with a single effort."

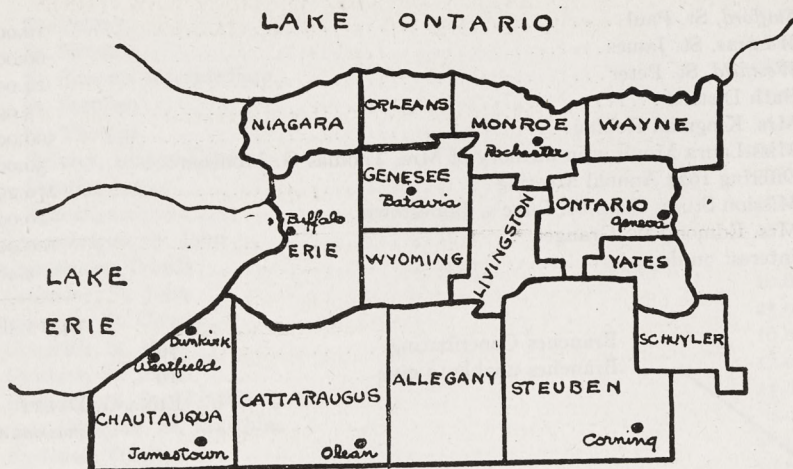

DISTRICT ORGANIZATION OF THE WESTERN NEW YORK
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

BY-LAWS

1. The object of District division is to further the general program of the Diocesan organization through meetings, conferences, services and any other means found necessary.
2. The District shall include all branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the territory designated by the Diocesan Board.
3. The officers shall be a chairman, secretary, treasurer and such other officers and committees as are necessary.
4. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting for a term of three years and are not eligible for election to the same office for consecutive terms.
5. The chairman shall appoint a nominating committee of three to prepare the ticket.
6. Vacancies occurring during the term shall be filled by appointment of the chairman, except that of the chairman, which shall be filled by the Diocesan Executive Board.
7. The chairman shall preside at all District meetings, render an annual report of the activities of the District and perform all other duties necessary to carry out the Diocesan program.
8. The secretary shall keep record of all the meetings, including attendance, a list of the branch officers, forwarding same to Diocesan secretary for the Year Book, send out notices for meetings and attend to correspondence.
9. The treasurer shall take charge of all District money and submit a report at the meetings.
10. Each branch shall contribute toward the administration expense, 10 cents per member.

REPORT OF THE BATH DISTRICT FOR 1924

The Bath District is composed of nine active branches. Two District meetings were held during the year with a good attendance at each; both meetings were combined with the County Conferences and by this we were able to have one of our Bishops at each meeting, which we deemed a great privilege. The Spring meeting was held in St. Thomas' Church, Bath, May 21st. Our Diocesan President, Mrs. Robins, by her opening address gave us inspiration to carry on the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. Miss Brent, Mrs. Dyett, and Miss Lambright each gave most interesting talks on different subjects. Bishop Brent opened the afternoon session with Hymns and Prayers.

The address was given by Rev. Edmund L. Souder on Japan, which proved to be most interesting and instructive. REPORT OF THE BUFFALO DISTRICT JAN. 1924-1925

The Buffalo district has gained five new branches; two are newly organized, the Good Shepherd Irving and the Transfiguration, Buffalo; the others, Jamestown, Westfield, and Silver Creek come from the Olean district. There are now — branches.

Two all day Conferences have been held. The first one was held Feb. 5, at the home of the Chairman for presidents and educational secretaries. There were forty-five present and all entered into the discussion of problems and methods with interest and received new ideas. The afternoon was devoted to Education with Mrs. J. W. Mrs. Nicholas and Mrs. Robins both being present and speaking. Mrs. Robins extended greetings to the new Chairman, Mrs. H. B. Tyler, and paying fine tribute to the work of Miss Prescott who retired from office of Chairman of the Geneva District.

Miss Lawrence spoke on the United Thank Offering, also the Gift of Life. The offering was given for the Japanese Reconstruction work, the amount being \$19.59.

The second meeting of the district was held in St. John's Church, Clifton Springs, October 3rd, 1924. Ten branches were represented with an attendance of ninety-two.

Our first Vice-President Mrs. Knowlton presented the new by-laws. Our Honorary President Mrs. Nicholas moved we accept these. This was carried.

Mrs. Pierson spoke on the church plan urging all to read the book, *My Father's Business*.

Miss Lawrence gave a wonderful talk on the Diocesan Fellowship.

The offering was sent to Hilda Hequembourg for Bishop Burleson's work in S. D., the amount being \$24.68.

The box work for the past year amounts to \$883.71.

REPORT OF THE ROCHESTER DISTRICT FOR 1924-25.

The Spring Meeting of the District was held at St. Andrew's, Rochester, on May 23rd, and there were present 148 members from 17 branches. It is always the attempt in this District to have the Spring Meeting a summing up and a comparing of the winter's work done by the various branches, so that through the interchange of ideas we may have the benefit of each other's experiences.

At this meeting we began with the celebration of the Holy Communion and then adjourned to the parish house, where we listened to various reports. The most interesting discussion was brought about in connection with the questionnaire, which Mrs. Robins described to us as a charcoal outline which we were to fill in and make a picture. Various difficulties were brought out in connection with some of the questions and the whole thing was revised in a way that simplified many of our problems.

In the afternoon Bishop Brent brought with him to the meeting Bishop Reifsnider, recently returned from Japan, who gave us a most stirring and vivid picture of the tragedy in that country. His faith and the faith of those Christians whom he described to us was a great challenge to us all.

The work began this autumn with a meeting of the United Thank Offering Custodians and the Branch Presidents at the house of the District President on October 6th. Miss Lawrence spoke to the group, thereby enthusing them for their work of collection, in preparation for the United Thank Offering Presentation in November. The Branch Presidents took this opportunity to discuss some of the problems of the winter and to plan definitely for the autumn meeting.

The Annual Meeting was held at Epiphany Church on October 16th. There was a large attendance at the Holy Communion. We laid great stress on the devotional part of this day, feeling that through prayer and communion more than from discussion or speeches would come the inspiration for the winter's work. Dr. Talbot lead the noon-day prayers, which followed the service without a break, and the need of the Church and our part in the Forward Program was emphasized.

In the afternoon Mrs. Cooper in a few minutes gave us the keynote of our winter's mission study and outlined to us our subject,—China. Mrs. Robins then spoke about personal responsibility in the Church's work. It was a great privilege to have Bishop Remington of Eastern Oregon speak to us at the close of the meeting. He gave us two separate addresses, one following the other; the first on the Forward Program, the second on his work in Eastern Oregon, and no one could have listened to his enthusiasm and conviction without catching some of it themselves. We were very grateful that he had been able to come to our Annual Meeting.

On January 14th a meeting was planned so that all the women of the District might hear Bishop Overs of Liberia. There was a large attendance and many of those present have since had a share in helping in his work.

In our educational work, through the efforts of Mrs. Pierson, our Educational Secretary, we were fortunate in securing Mrs. Hutchison, who came to Rochester on January 21st and 22nd to conduct classes in mission study for leaders from the various branches. There were 26 women present from 16 branches and Mrs. Hutchison gave them great help in practical methods, as well as inspiring them to teach. These members are teaching mission study classes in their own parishes on the subject of China.

On March 10th Mr. John A. Ely, Dean of St. John's University, Shanghai, China, told of his work at Christ Church and gave us a much more intimate and personal idea of the missionary enterprise in China.

The questionnaires have come back very thoughtfully made out and may I take this opportunity of expressing to the branches my appreciation of the work and time they have spent on them. It is a great help to have the information and to be able to visualize the work in each parish. We hope that every branch will receive suggestions and real help from this possible interchange of experiences.

Resolved, That we as an Auxiliary to the National Council spread upon our records the sense of our rich heritage in having had such a leader, and the realization that in thankfulness for this we are under obligation to intensify our efforts to spread Christ's Kingdom.

Resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary see to it that literature be furnished for the Church House on the Chautauqua Assembly grounds—with the suggestion that each organization of the Diocese be asked to provide leaflets telling of its work; also that the *Spirit of Missions* and other Church publications be supplied.

Resolved, That we spread on our minutes grateful appreciation of the devoted, untiring and conspicuously successful work of Mrs. James H. Dyett, Chairman during the three years just ended for the Diocese, of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund. The responsibility and care which Mrs. Dyett has carried would have been a burden had she not brought to it the enthusiasm of a true consecration which rejoices in the privilege of a real task for the Kingdom. The Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York records with thankfulness its debt to Mrs. Dyett for her able leadership.

WHEREAS, Mrs. Embry MacDowell and her staunch assistants have performed the almost Herculean task of bringing to a successful ingathering the Gold and Silver Offering, to be used in rebuilding Saint Margaret's School, Tokyo, they having secured the sum of about eighteen hundred dollars (gross) within a few months.

Therefore be it Resolved, That the Diocese tender them their deep appreciation of their unselfish and untiring efforts, and that we hold them in loving memory because of their Christian example of devotion to the Master.

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR CHURCH WORKERS—GENEVA, N. Y.

The Annual Summer School for Church Workers will be held at Hobart College, Geneva, N. Y., from Monday July 6th through Thursday July 16th.

This year a special effort is being made to offer more advanced courses that will appeal and be helpful to leaders now active in carrying on the Church's work. Those classes which will particularly interest the Women of the Auxiliary are:

(a) **THE DISCUSSION METHOD**—a class for training of leaders of adult discussion groups, whether missions, religious education or a social service subject. The text book used will be "The Method of the Discussion Group," by Miss Laura Boyer.

(b) **THE CHURCH'S PROGRAM**—its evolution and its challenge to the Church of today; the parish and its program.

(c) **LATIN AMERICA**—advanced course dealing with the religious, historical, political and economic problems of the field. This course is to be led by the Right Rev. James C. Morris, D.D., Missionary Bishop of the Panama Canal Zone.

In addition there will be courses on the Bible, Church History, the Life of Christ, specialized work in the parish such as the Church School, the Girls' Friendly Society, Church Mission of Help, Pageantry and the work with Young People. For Geneva there will be a new feature this year in the two cultural courses, The Kingdom of God, Its Nature and Purpose, and Evidences of Religion From a Modern Standpoint, which will be open not only to the members of the school but the people from the city of Geneva.

The daily schedule starting with the Celebration of Holy Communion at 7:15 calls for three study classes in the morning, rest, recreation and group conferences in the afternoon, Sunset Service and various attractive programs for the evening.

To meet increased costs of maintenance it has been necessary to raise the Summer School rates to

\$3.00 for the Registration fee,

5.00 for the Room fee,

16.00 for Meal fee for the entire session, making a total of \$24.00.

Check for Registration fee, which is payable in advance is to be made out to Mrs. Mary G. Collison whose address is 681 Castle Street, Geneva, N. Y. No assignments will be made before May 15th. As every available room will be filled through the regular registration channels, the Board of Governors regret to state that there will be no accommodations for people arriving without previous registration and notification, for part time students, or week-end guests. No student under full 17 years of age will be accepted, unless a graduate of High or Accredited Prep School; in 1926 there is to be a third Summer School, offering a strictly Junior program.

It is hoped that every Auxiliary in the Diocese will try to send one of their members to this Summer School. If this is impossible, a good suggestion is to pay the way for some young person in the parish to go for this training. This year particularly when the General Church so needs our help, shall we not make a special endeavor to learn more about its Mission so that through our prayers, study, work, gifts and Christian Fellowship we may render more acceptable service through our parish unto the uttermost parts of the earth.

SUGGESTIONS AND DIRECTIONS TO PARISH OFFICERS FOR 1925-26

TO PARISH PRESIDENTS

Each Parish President should have at heart the development of all parts of the Auxiliary work. She should, therefore, try to see that the branch is organized in a way to insure this rather than over-concentration on one part alone. She should bring the officers together occasionally for prayer and for conference, for they can do much toward creating the atmosphere and promoting the spirit of fellowship. She should also take the initiative in forming with the other officers a plan for the year's work which will give an opportunity to each officer to present to all members that part for which she is responsible or to arrange for someone else to do so. Plans which parishes in Western New York have used this past year will be found in the "Interchange of Methods," the summing up of the splendid replies sent in on the new report blanks.

She should be familiar with the chapters in the Woman's Auxiliary Handbook on "Duties of Officers" and "Activities and Meetings." She should note particularly the Woman's Auxiliary page each month in "Our Diocesan Fellowship" and the quarterly letter from the Diocesan Executive Board, and should look over carefully the reports and recommendations in this Year Book.

It is her responsibility to see that her branch is represented as frequently as possible at district and diocesan meetings, conferences, etc., and to secure its co-operation in diocesan plans and undertakings to the best of its ability. Your

district and diocesan officers will welcome opportunities to know the parish officers better through visits, correspondence, or by arranging conferences and meetings.

TO PARISH SECRETARIES

Parish Secretaries should keep careful and comprehensive records for the branch.

A typewritten list of officers of each Parish branch should be sent to the District Chairman for publication in the Year Book, not later than March first.

As changes occur during the year, notices should be sent *at once* to the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary, in order that the proper officers may receive the communications.

TO PARISH TREASURERS

The Treasurer's Year begins Jan. 1st and closes Dec. 31st. All Auxiliary money, except the United Thank Offering and District Funds, should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, Miss Hilda Hequembourg, Dunkirk, N. Y., as soon after Jan. 1st as possible and before July 1st.

Please study the Budget and explain the division of your Diocesan Auxiliary gift to the members of your branch. Tell them how the Administration Fund is used and show them how each Church is given credit for 4/5 of the pledge which is used for the Church Forward Program.

TO PARISH UNITED THANK OFFERING CUSTODIANS

Remittances may be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. C. A. Champlin, Hammondsport, N. Y., annually or semi-annually.

TO THOSE IN CHARGE OF THE DEVOTIONAL LIFE

Each Branch should make a definite effort to increase interest in the Devotional Life. This should be made the work of some special person or committee.

Each Branch should hold at least one Corporate Communion during the year. Beginning the year with such a service of consecration and fellowship is of great value.

Each Branch should have a definite plan for prayers at each meeting, and will find it helpful to vary its form of prayers, using intercessions, thanksgivings, short litanies, Penitential office, meditations, etc. The W. A. leaflet, *The Devotional Life*, (price five cents) explains briefly the meaning of meditation, confession, intercession, petition, thanksgiving, etc., and contains suggestions for varying the devotions at regular meetings of the Auxiliary.

Each Branch should also be praying through groups or individuals for Christian Unity, Christian International Relations, Peace, and other suggested topics for intercession, and co-operate in the observance of special days of prayer as they are presented.

Each Branch should be making an effort to increase interest in the practice of Family Prayers, Church Attendance, Bible Study and Reading, Stewardship and Private Devotions.

Each Branch should possess a copy of the National Woman's Auxiliary Handbook, (price twenty cents), and study carefully pages 13-18.

A Book of Prayers, published by the Church Service League of Massachusetts (price fifty cents) contains a large variety of prayers which are particularly helpful to the Woman's Auxiliary.

TO PARISH EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEES OR SECRETARIES

This committee or secretary should begin early—preferably during the summer—to plan for the educational work of the Branch, and not wait until almost time to begin a class or secure a speaker. Whenever possible this plan should include presentation of the special subjects for the year in some of these ways:—through talks, papers or readings, special programs and speakers, or discussion groups. Among those for 1925-26 are Latin America; The Search for Peace (twenty-five cents); Learning to Know Jesus Christ through a Study of the Gospels (five cents); the Forward Program of the Church.

The committee or secretary will find the following books and leaflets suggestive and helpful: The Woman's Auxiliary Handbook (twenty cents), chapter on Educational Work; How to Lead a Discussion Group; The Discussion Method by Laura F. Boyer; Suggestions for Program Meetings.

The committee or secretary should present to the Branch anything of educational interest received through letters from or visits with diocesan or district officers, from conferences, or through "Our Diocesan Fellowship" or other sources.

The Geneva Conference (see page 51) offers a splendid opportunity to all those interested in the Auxiliary, especially to those who are trying to promote the educational side of our W. A. service. Many more Branches should be represented and send delegates. The Educational Committee or Secretary should seek to accomplish this.

A careful record should be kept of all work done.

All material should be ordered from Miss Lambright, 13 Ely Building, 81 East Avenue, Rochester, N. Y.

When speakers are desired, correspond with Miss Lambright.

Lantern slides are obtained from the Lantern Slide Dept., 281 Fourth Avenue, N. Y. Ask for the rewritten ones only.

Report all changes in branch Educational officers to the Diocesan Educational Secretary.

TO PARISH SUPPLY SECRETARIES

Parish Supply Secretaries are requested to get in touch with the Supply Secretary of the District in the late summer concerning the work of the Service of Supplies for the coming year.

When a choice has been made of the Missionary and family whose requisition your Branch wishes to fill, return at once to the District Supply Secretary all other letters that you have been considering, and at the same time give her the name and address of the Missionary whose letter your Branch has accepted. Write to the Missionary telling him that your Branch will send him a box and ask any questions that you wish in regard to his needs. These boxes should be sent in time to reach their destination for Christmas.

Those Branches not sending family boxes should obtain early in the fall

from the District Supply Secretary, work that will be sent to the Missions, Schools or Hospitals whose requisitions are allotted to this Diocese.

It is hoped that each Branch will feel it is a privilege and an obligation to contribute annually, for the allotment, the price of at least one blanket; also give something toward the purchase of dispensaries for hospitals. Checks for these funds should be sent to the Supply Secretary of the Diocese.

RULES FOR SENDING BOXES

- 1.—For every box that is sent make three lists exactly alike, giving:—
 - A.—Name and location of your Branch as sender.
 - B.—Name and address of the Missionary, Hospital, School or Mission for whom the box is intended.
 - C.—A complete itemized list of the contents, giving the valuation of each new article. Charge for the making of garments according to the prices allowed by the Standard of Values. Give the number of garments of each sort and the charge for making; to that add the cost of material.
 - D.—It will greatly assist the Custodian if each new article of wearing apparel sent to the Bureau of Supplies, is marked with its size and value.
- 2.—Boxes for Missionaries are to be sent direct to the address given.
 - A.—For these, send one of the three lists to the Diocesan Supply Secretary; one to the District Supply Secretary and keep one for your own Branch.
 - B.—Write the Missionary as soon as the box has been shipped, giving date of shipment and stating whether sent by parcel post, express or freight.
- 3.—Send all other boxes to the Bureau of Supplies, 237 North St., Buffalo, N. Y. in care of Miss Alice E. Dennis, Custodian.
 - A.—For these, send one of the three lists to the District Supply Secretary; put one in the box and keep one for your Branch.
 - B.—Put in the box a self addressed stamped envelope so that acknowledgment of its receipt may be made to the proper person. When this is returned to you, it will have on it a memorandum of the amount of postage that you are to add to your own valuation list and the one you send to the District Supply Secretary.
- 4.—On the outside of all boxes put the name and address of the sender and FULLY PREPAY all carrying charges.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this association shall be The Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT

Sec. 1. The object of this Auxiliary, as an organic part of the Church Service League, shall be to help in the carrying forward and realization of the program of the National Council of the Church, for the fulfillment of the mission of the Church. To this end this Branch of the Auxiliary shall enlist the women of the Church in active service for the spread of Christ's Kingdom on earth by witnessing in His Name, through prayer and worship, knowledge and wise thinking, work, giving, and the influence of Christ-like character.

Sec. 2. The work of this Auxiliary shall be divided, in co-operation with other diocesan agencies, among all fields of Christian Service—home, parish, community, diocese, province, nation and world—along the lines of Missions, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service, the chief service, however, being a missionary one.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. All women, by virtue of their baptism, are eligible for membership in the Woman's Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. Any group of such women wishing to further the work of the Auxiliary as defined in Article II of this Constitution shall be eligible for membership in the branch of a parish or mission.

Sec. 3. Any such branch in the diocese, or such group unrelated to a parish or mission with the consent of the Bishop shall be eligible for membership in the diocesan branch.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

Sec. 1. The officers of this Auxiliary shall be a President, four or five Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Supplies, an Educational Secretary, and a Custodian or Treasurer of the United Thank Offering.

Sec. 2. There may be a custodian or committee in charge of the Bureau of Supplies, and a Field Secretary or Secretaries, appointed by the Executive Board.

Sec. 3. These officers shall be elected for a term of three years.

Sec. 4. These officers shall be eligible for election to the same office for not more than two consecutive terms, except the President, who may be elected for a third consecutive term.

Sec. 5. Each officer shall serve until the adjournment of the annual meeting or until her successor is elected and installed, but the Educational Secretary and the Vice-President in charge of the Devotional Life shall continue their duties through the Easter Season.

Sec. 6. There shall be a nominating committee of five members, two whom shall be appointed by the Chair, and three elected from the floor, at the annual meeting, whose duty it shall be to receive any suggestions for nominations prior to the annual election and to prepare a ticket to be voted upon at that time. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

Sec. 7. The officers shall be divided into three groups, as follows:

Group I—President, Corresponding Secretary, Educational Secretary.

Group II—Recording Secretary, four Vice-Presidents.

Group III—Secretary of Supplies, United Thank Offering Custodian or Treasurer and one Vice-President, when there are to be five.

Group I—to be elected the year preceding the Triennial.

Group II—to be elected the year of the Triennial.

Group III—to be elected the year following the Triennial.

At the time of organization the officers shall be elected for the following terms:

Group I for two years. Group II for three years. Group III for one year.

Sec. 8. The election of officers shall be by ballot, a majority vote constituting an election.

Sec. 9. Any vacancy occurring in any office during the term shall be filled by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS

Sec. 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Diocesan Officers of the Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. The Diocesan Board shall be composed of all the Diocesan Officers and District Chairmen and District Officers.

Sec. 3. The Diocesan Board may include in its membership the Church Periodical Club Correspondent of the Diocese and the Diocesan Secretary for Missions of the Girl's Friendly Society.

ARTICLE VI—STANDING COMMITTEES

There shall be the following Standing Committees appointed by the President.

- (a) Nominations (see Art. IV, Sec. 6)
- (b) Auditing
- (c) Finance
- (d) Constitution and By-Laws
- (e) Resolutions

ARTICLE VII—ANNUAL MEETING

Sec. 1. The annual meeting shall be held each year on the Wednesday and Thursday following the fourth Sunday in January, unless otherwise deemed expedient by the Executive Board, for the Election of officers and receiving of annual reports and any other business that may come regularly before the meeting, and for the realization of the object of the Auxiliary as contained in Article II.

Sec. 2. A semi-annual meeting may be called by a two-thirds vote of the

Diocesan Board, or at the request of one-half the total number of Branches.

Sec. 3. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Diocesan Board.

ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary by a two-thirds vote of the parish branches present and voting, provided the proposed amendment has been previously submitted in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, and to the membership of the Diocesan Branch.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings and to perform all other duties appertaining to the office, as defined in Article II of the Constitution.

Sec. 2. In the absence of the President, the Vice-Presidents in the order of their rank shall perform all the duties of that office.

Sec. 3. The special duties of the Vice-Presidents shall be determined by the Executive Board. One Vice-President shall be in charge of the Devotional Life of the Auxiliary.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a correct record of the proceedings of all meetings of the Diocesan Branch and of the Diocesan and Executive Boards. She shall authenticate all acts and orders of the Auxiliary; she shall keep a list of the Branches; she shall submit a written report of the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch to the annual meeting, to the Provincial Synod and to the Executive Council of the Diocese, and shall prepare and edit the Manual.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to carry on all correspondence assigned by the Executive or Diocesan Boards or the Annual meeting; to arrange, through the proper channels for publicity in Church and daily papers, keeping a record of the same; to issue notices of all meetings; to read all letters and have custody of the same; to send out the Manual; to notify the proper authorities of all newly elected officers and delegates, and of those who have passed away during the year; to submit a written report at the annual meeting.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys, with the exception of the United Thank Offering, and deposit the same in the name of the Auxiliary in such bank or banks as she may see fit; to dispense all money as directed by the Diocesan Branch; to keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and to render a written report at the annual meeting.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the United Thank Offering Custodian or Treasurer to increase and deepen interest in this offering of life and money by correspondence and visitation so that every woman may partake therein; to organize the diocesan Branch for more thorough promotion of the United Thank Offering; to make an annual report of all money, and forward or take same to the Triennial.

Sec. 8. It shall be the duty of the Educational Secretary, in co-operation with diocesan educational plans and the Executive Board, to organize the Diocesan Branch for educational work and stimulate the same by every possible means.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of Supplies, in co-operation with other diocesan organizations, and with the Executive Board when requested, to maintain the diocesan Bureau of Supplies; to organize the diocesan branch for the Service of Supplies; to stimulate in every possible way the Service of Supplies; to receive and disseminate all information relating to the same; to render a report of supplies and money at the annual meeting, having the financial statement audited.

Sec. 10. The Auxiliary shall be divided into six Districts: Buffalo, Rochester, Geneseo, Geneva, Bath, and Olean. Each district shall elect its Chairman and officers at the meeting following the annual election of Diocesan officers.

Sec. 11. It shall be the duty of the District Chairmen, in co-operation with the Executive Board, to organize their districts for the carrying on of all diocesan plans; to arrange District Meetings, in co-operation with District officers; to assist in organizing new branches; to stimulate interest in the work of the Auxiliary; to secure a true list of all parish officers, sending the same to the Recording Secretary; to notify immediately the Corresponding Secretary of any changes during the year; to render an annual report of the activities of the District for the Year Book.

ARTICLE II—DUTIES OF BOARDS

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to choose the policy and prepare the plans for the year and publish the same; to appoint committees; to fill vacancies; to execute work assigned to it by the Diocesan Board and the annual meeting; to submit a report at the annual meeting.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Diocesan Board to have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE III—DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Auditing Committee to audit all financial reports of the Diocesan Branch.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare and submit a budget to the Diocesan Branch annually in co-operation with the Executive Board and to the Treasurer of the Diocese; to devise means of raising this budget; to secure and disseminate information concerning the pledges at the time of the annual meeting.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws to receive any proposed changes in the Constitution or By-Laws; to submit the same with recommendations to the Executive Board and to present them to the annual meeting.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to receive all Resolutions to be presented at the annual meeting and to make a report of the same.

ARTICLE IV—DUES

Each Branch shall make a voluntary contribution, commensurate with its ability, to the pledges of the Auxiliary.

Each Branch is asked to contribute to the administration Fund in proportion to the size of its contribution, or as suggested by Finance Committee.

ARTICLE V—FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Auxiliary shall be from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31st.

ARTICLE VI—MEETINGS OF BOARDS

Sec. 1. The Executive Board shall meet at the call of the President, at least twice a year.

Sec. 2. The Diocesan Board shall meet twice a year.

Sec. 3. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the President or by her upon the request of three members.

ARTICLE VII—REPRESENTATION AT ANNUAL MEETING

Sec. 1. Parishes shall not be limited as to delegates to the annual meeting, but only one vote shall be cast from each parish branch when balloting for officers. Each parish branch shall elect its own representative for this balloting for officers.

Sec. 2. Delegates to the Triennial shall be elected at the annual meeting preceding the Triennial, nominations being made from the floor, and the election being by ballot.

Sec. 3. Delegates to the Provincial meetings shall be appointed by the Executive Board.

Sec. 4. Any vacancy occurring among the delegates to the Triennial shall be filled by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VIII—QUORUM

Sec. 1. One-third of the Branches of the Auxiliary shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting.

Sec. 2. Five members shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Board.

Sec. 3. Nine members shall constitute a quorum of the Diocesan Board.

ARTICLE IX—PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order, Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended at any annual meeting of the Auxiliary by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing on the first day of the Annual Meeting to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws.
