MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The fifty-second Annual Meeting of the Western New York Branch of the
Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held in St. Mary's-on-the-Hill,
Buffalo, Thursday, January 12, 1933.

Holy Communion was celebrated at 10:00 A. M. by Rev. James C. Crosson
and assistants. At this service Bishop Davis made a short address in which he
told of the spiritual revival being planned by the Diocese, to culminate at
Whitsuntide. The Executive Council is counting on the women to be the right
hand of the church.

At the close of the service the meeting was called to order by the president,
Mrs. Dyett. Mrs. Nelson Russell read the opening prayer.

Mrs. Dyett said a few words of greeting to the members present.

Mrs. Armstrong, president of the Auxiliary of St. Mary's and Miss Esther
Smith, president of the evening branch, together welcomed the members.

The minutes of the 1932 Annual Meeting were approved as printed in the
Year Book.

The Treasurer read her report, also the report of the Auditor. A motion
to accept the report of the Auditor was seconded and carried.

All officers and heads of departments read short reports which are printed
elsewhere in the Year Book.

A motion was adopted to have the Corresponding Secretary write a letter
of cheer to Dr. and Mrs. Allison, both of whom have been quite ill.

A message of greeting sent by the Rochester Diocese from their Annual
Meeting January 11th was read.

Noonday prayers were led by Rev. Mr. Crosson.

Mrs. Vanderwall spoke briefly of the work of the Church Mission of Help. Announcement was made of an entertainment to be given February 21st and 22nd to raise funds for the work of the C. M. H. and the branches were asked to help make it a success.

The presidents of the branches were asked to meet Mrs. Dyett during the lunch hour.

At one o'clock luncheon was served in the Parish House.

The afternoon session was called to order at one forty-five. Miss Loosen led the opening prayers.

We had a very unexpected and welcome guest in the person of Bishop Ferris. The president asked him to say a few words and in his usual gracious manner, he told how glad he was to be with us, and brought greetings from the Rochester Diocese.

Mrs. Dyett announced that Mrs. Coleman had offered to have a message radioed to her son stationed in the Philippines and to be by him relayed to Deaconess Shaw, that her automobile was at last an assumed fact and would soon be on its way.

Miss Loosen, first vice-president took the chair while we proceeded with the election. Mrs. Broughton, chairman of elections announced 39 votes cast for the ticket as presented, which was as follows: President, Mrs. James H. Dyett; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Allan Burton; Assistant Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Henry Dawson; Educational Secretary, Mrs. Samuel W. Hippler. The chair declared these officers elected. Miss Loosen expressed the sentiment of the entire membership, when she said how happy we were and grateful too, to have Mrs. Dyett accept the presidency for another year, and Mrs. Dyett very graciously responded by saying she was glad to be of service to the Diocese.

The offering was taken, while the assembly sang Hymn 502.

The speaker of the day, Mrs. Harper Sibley of Rochester, was introduced by Mrs. Cameron J. Davis. Mrs. Sibley was a member of the Laymen's Foreign Missions Appraisal Commission, made up of representatives of seven denominations. This Commission spent a year in studying the conditions in the Mission fields in the Far East. She gave a very stirring account of some of her observations. The report of the Commission is published in book form, the title of which is "Re-thinking Missions". Mrs. Sibley urged all to read it. As churchmen who are interested in the furtherance of Christ's Kingdom and the right way to go about it, it is our duty to read and study this book that we may be intelligent in that branch of the work.

Dean Leslie Chard of the Lake Shore Deanery spoke briefly of the work on the Cattaraugus Indian Reservation. The Diocese is very fortunate in having as a worker among the Indians, Dr. Charles W. Harvey, who heard the call very definitely from God to take up the work there. At the close of Dean Chard's talk Dr. Harvey was introduced. It had previously been decided that the offering taken at the meeting was to be used for work among the Indians of the Diocese, and as Dr. Harvey very much needs a car in his work it was the unanimous opinion that the money should be used for that purpose. The amount of the offering was \$99.91. A second-hand car can be purchased for \$125.00. It seemed apparent that the balance would be supplied.

Chairman of registrations reported 349 members present.

The president announced the following committees for 1933: Finance, Mrs. Ross Buchanan and Miss Loraine Loosen; Resolutions, Mrs. Henry S. Madden and Mrs. L. H. Allen; Nominating, Mrs. Frank N. Nixon and Mrs. Lewis N. Murray; Constitution, Mrs. Julius Potter and Mrs. Harry N. Yates. Three additional members to serve on the Nominating Committee were nominated and elected from the floor. They were Mrs. John Walker, Miss Esther Smith and Mrs. F. W. Crandall.

Report of the Resolutions Committee was read by Mrs. Hippler. The resolutions were unanimously adopted and are appended.

Dean Chard pronounced the Benediction.

In the evening a largely attended mass meeting was held in Trinity Church. At this meeting Mrs. Sibley again spoke on the report of the Appraisal Commission. The offering at this meeting was used for Community Relief.

Thus ended one of the most successful Annual Meetings ever held in the Diocese.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN IN CHARGE OF RECRUITING FOR THE MISSION FIELD

While no recruits for the Mission field have gone out from Western New York during the past year, we are keeping in sympathetic touch with two students whom we trust may find their way clear to enter this department of service.

On Ash Wednesday, 1932, a letter was sent to the rector of every parish in the Diocese, asking him to present the need of workers in the Mission field to his young people.

In spite of limited appropriations and the fact that we are in the midst of a difficult winter, the Rev. A. B. Parsons, who has charge of the Department of Foreign Missions, sends an earnest plea for a few of the very choicest young women of the Church for Missionary service as evangelistic workers, nurses and teachers and asks that we redouble our efforts to secure a fine quality of young people.

To quote the Interdenominational Layman's Foreign Missions Inquiry: "It is our judgment that only persons of the highest quality, fitness and tested ability should receive the approval of the sending boards."

"As the Christian Mission faces the future, it becomes a matter of honor that its standards of teaching, or of medical service, or of art, or music, or literature, or whatever it touches, are higher, not lower, than those of secular performance. The way of the future for the Missions can only be the way of the best."

"In the light of this," says Mr. Parsons, "we must be very careful that we secure those whose education has been of the very best and who are in every respect worthy of the great trust."

OUR WESTERN NEW YORK MISSIONARIES

We welcome to our Western New York Missionary family, Captain Franklyn H. Board of Buffalo and Corfu, serving with the Church Army. He is at present in Burlington, N. C., helping to establish the Church in a county with but one Episcopal church, by preaching, teaching, and holding prayer meetings wherever opportunity offers.

We have lost our own Mr. Clough, whose years and years of devotion to his Indian friends have been, and are, an inspiration and challenge to all of us. We also record the passing from active service of the Rev. Francis Lobdell, who, since the war, had been Chaplain at the United States Veterans Hospital at Oteen, N. C., and who "was loved by all the Post as well as the patients whom he served for eleven years."

Two of our Western New Yorkers have been seriously ill during the past year. Both Miss Larery and Miss Hancock are much better, the latter having returned to her post, and we feel we can depend on your prayers for their complete recovery.

Both Deaconess Bedell of Alaska and Mrs. E. P. Miller of Wuchang, China are in the States on furlough. Deaconess Bedell is at present at All Saints Mission, Henry St., New York. Mrs. Miller is also in New York City, (71 W. 12th St.) which is close by compared to China, so we will have ample opportunity to deepen our friendship with her and our understanding of the Church's problems in China.

Is any one going to California this year? If so, do go and see Miss Rosa Camfield at 623 E. Broadway, Long Beach. Miss Camfield worked for many years among the Indian people in Utah, and now nearly seventy years old, she has retired and is making a home for her Indian foster son, John. On a very small pension, she is teaching John the art of budgeting, and is happy to be well. She writes, "It would be so good to see some one from Western New York. I simply cannot tell you how much good your continued interest in us means to me."

We are printing a second "List of Missionaries" this year. In addition to Western New Yorkers working away from home, we are recognizing as equally true missionaries those working in our own Diocese. Mr. Merrill, who serves in the several Dioceses in this Province, has cheered and held services for our deaf. Mrs. Vanderwall and Miss Gifford of the Church Mission of Help have guided, encouraged and been true friends to 239 girls, and watched over 86 babies during the year. The Buffalo Church Extension Society has continued to bring a bit of sunshine into our institutions, as well as to maintain the services and the life in the Mission Churches. Mr. Allison and Dean Chard have directed

work in country places; and Dr. Harvey is reviving the work among our Indian neighbors on the Cattaraugus Reservation. They lost a true friend in Mr. Clough. They have gained another in Dr. Harvey. The end of May, or early in June we are planning to visit the Reservation. Dr. Harvey and Dean Chard are to arrange a friendship tour for us. It will be on a Sunday, with Service in one of the churches, a picnic lunch together, and a chance to get better acquainted with our Indian family. We hope a great company will join us, and so put life and encouragement into our contact--not only with our Missionaries, but with their people, who are, with us, members of GOD's great family.

Although there was much discussion at the time of the General Convention in Denver about discontinuing personal family boxes and sewing, and instead increasing the Supply Cash to the great extent of being able to pay adequate salaries to Missionaries, and to purchase supplies for Missions and Hospitals instead of sewing for them, that Elysian time has not yet arrived. The present economic state of affairs pushes the probability of that time farther into the future. The need for sewing is even greater just now than it has been for years, but the Branches seem very much alive to the necessity, and the contributions of second hand and new clothing and quilts and all kinds of sewing, has been most generous. A beautiful spirit is being shown in the way of sacrifice of time and funds.

Your Supply Secretary wishes to thank all who are co-operating so splendidly, and Mrs. Pollard who gives so many hours to the purchasing of supplies for our various Institutions and Hospitals.

When supply work is received in the Fall, Branches will please appraise, and if for any reason your Branch is not able to fill the allotment, please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary before January 1st.

Branches receiving Personal Family boxes for Missionaries, or \$5.00 Christmas Gift Letters for Missionaries will please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary of their acceptance as soon as possible in the Fall, and will report the sending of these not later than December 15th.

Branches sending Personal Family boxes should communicate with the family to whom the box is sent, giving them the date of shipment, and telling whether sent by parcel post, freight or express.

Branches working for Institutions, Missions or Hospitals will send boxes directly to the Mission for which they are working, enclosing a self-addressed return postcard, in order that you may be notified of its safe arrival.

Branches are privileged to use the Standard of Values sheet, which may be obtained from the Diocesan Supply Secretary, in order to estimate the cost of making garments, which may be added to the cost of material, thus obtaining the full value.

There is no valuation on second-hand articles of clothing.

When allotment is finished please list all articles on the blue sheet and pink sheet and white sheet. Compute all values, including postage, etc., on the blue sheet and the pink sheet, sending the blue sheet to the Diocesan Supply Secretary as soon as possible, and keeping the pink sheet carefully on file to be used for making out reports to Diocesan President in December.

All work for the year should be finished and sent, and blue slips sent to Diocesan Supply Secretary by May 1st, at the latest.

Under no consideration should work be carried over until the next Fall.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

Sixty-six branches shared in the first Diocesan United Thank Offering, presented in St. James' Church, Buffalo, on United Thank Offering Sunday, June 5th, 1932, at 4 P. M. The special preacher, at this service, was the Rev. Henry F. Zwicker, D. D., rector of Grace Church, Lockport.

While the amount of the offering this year was somewhat less than that of 1929, there has been a decided increase in the number of women who have "shared". Ten branches show an increase over their 1931 offering, and eleven new branches, including branches giving, as a group, for the first time this year, have been added. The parishes showing an increase both in amount of the offering and number of givers, find that it is due to working with a U. T. O. committee and with a U. T. O. treasurer for each distinct group of women. One parish, in which this method was employed, doubled their 1931 offering. It is hoped that other parishes having two or more groups of women, will adopt this method of reaching every woman with the story of the Little Blue Box.

Two facts of especial interest to the women of this diocese, have been discovered. Mrs. Richard Soule, now of the Diocese of Massachusetts, affectionately known as "the mother of the U.T.O." lived in Buffalo in 1886, and attended Trinity Church, during which time she conceived the idea of having a United

Offering. It has been brought to our attention, also, that the altar in the Church of the Holy Communion, Buffalo, was given by the Church of the Holy Communion, New York, and is the altar upon which was laid that first United Thank Offering of \$2188.64, in 1889, which built Christ Church, Anvik, Alaska, and sent the first U. T. O. missionary to Japan.

Through the courtesy of the Clergy, our new U. T. O. Poster has been placed in the vestibule of nearly every Church in the Diocese. A leaflet, entitled "The Romance of the Little Blue Box," has been published by the Diocese of Western New York. It is hoped that every parish treasurer will supply herself with a quantity of these leaflets, which may be had without cost, by applying to the diocesan treasurer.

The U. T. O. has been presented from the historical and the romantic side during the year. We shall hope, throughout the coming year, to place the greater emphasis upon its spiritual value, as a means whereby the women of the Church seek to carry out the GREAT COMMISSION of Our Lord.

The diocesan treasurer wishes to thank the parish treasurers and all women who, by their prayers, their gifts, and their service, made possible the United Thank Offering of 1932.

REPORT OF THE ADVANCED WORK FOR 1932

To the Members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Western New York

In 1932 the Advanced Work in our Diocese was to raise funds with which to purchase an automobile for Deaconess Kate Shaw of All Saints Mission, Bontoc, P. I.

I am happy to report \$690.50 was contributed by auxiliaries and individual gifts, this together with bank interest of \$8.25 makes a total of \$698.75. Thanks to the generosity of an automobile dealer we were able to buy in January, a new 1932 Chevrolet Coach for \$485.00. The cost of shipping together with insurance was \$176.03, making a total of \$661.03, leaving a balance of \$37.72 with which to start our 1933 Advanced Work.

The Advanced Work of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western New York for 1933 is to raise funds with which to build a log cabin adjacent to the Mission Chapel at Newtown, N. Y., on the Cattaraugus Indian Reservation. When this cabin is completed the work of repairing the Mission Church will be undertaken. The cabin will be used as a rectory by Dr. Harvey who is in charge of the Mission. The Indians are to supply the labor, and the logs for the cabin are to be felled in the woods on the Reservation.

This is an advanced work right in our midst as Newtown is between Gowanda and Irving. Dr. Harvey is doing a wonderful work among these Indians where Paganism still exists. It is to be hoped that each Auxiliary will make a special effort to help with this splendid undertaking so near home that we can go to see the results of our giving. Dr. Harvey is bringing the word of Christ to these Cattaraugus Indians. We all should feel this 1933 Advanced Work to be of real service to our Faith and our Community. EDUCATIONAL REPORT FOR 1932

To the members of the Women's Auxiliary in Western New York:—

Instead of beginning the Diocesan Educational work with the usual large institute in January of 1932, we tried a new plan. The branch Educational Secretaries were invited to small conferences at the home of the Diocesan Secretary. During January, February and March there were six conferences with from 3 to 5 attending. General Educational work was discussed--the method of presentation of the special topic--"Building A Christian Nation",--supplementary books were shown and problems were presented and suggestions were received and made. This was followed by a cup of tea and visiting.

These conferences have been a great help to me and will be resumed this year at the request of some of the leaders who attended last year and the recently elected and appointed ones.

At the regional meetings held during April in Batavia, Buffalo, Medina, and Jamestown, the work for the current year--China and The American Indian--was presented with special emphasis on the General Program of the Church. Book lists, leaflets on China and the Indians were distributed.

We had our usual Intensive Day at St. John's in Buffalo on October 26th. Again we departed from our regular custom, and had two speakers. Mrs. Leonard V. Buschman, dressed in Pueblo costume, gave us an interesting picture of the Pueblo mother and her children, taking us on an imaginary visit to a home in the Southwest. Dr. A. Sagar Greene, a returned Medical Missionary, told us of life among the Chinese--speaking especially of the Chinese women.

Neither of the speakers were from our own church so we made a very real interdenominational contact.

We are developing a small lending library, of books, maps, and pictures and are also completing a list of speakers on various topics. These are available for branch auxiliaries. This service has been used by many of the secretaries. Assistance has been given five branches in planning the season's program.

These branches have extended the adult education by having evening meetings, with both discussion and program sessions, both men and women

being present. This is something that we are looking forward to doing more and more.

At the close of this year, it seems to me that the church needs the educational work more than ever. It is very gratifying to me that so many of the branches have cooperated in the suggestion to have something educational upon every program at every meeting. To bring Christ's Kingdom on earth, to everyone everywhere, is our aim. We cannot share what we do not have ourselves.

REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE

The year 1932 closed with a far greater amount of social service and welfare work done in the Diocese than the previous year. 42 Parishes reported, 14 turned in blank reports and 19 did not turn in reports at all.

The different forms of social work reported, furnished varieties enough to fill the need of any and every Parish. Cooperation with the Red Cross and all charity organizations. Altar hangings, vestments and candle sticks sent to Rev. Chard for Indian Mission on the Reservation. Food and clothing sent to sick and needy in nearly every parish. Money and clothing to Church Mission of Help. Layettes contributed by many parishes to Salvation Army and any worthy case found. Collection for Cod Liver Oil for undernourished Children of Public Schools. Playing cards for County House and paying coal, rent, gas and electric bills.

In one instance carrying insurance for aged couple. Filling and delivering Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets. Sewing for Hospitals. Remodeling second hand clothing. Donations of sheets and pillow cases. Work done on committee for aiding the unemployed. Distributing magazines to Hospitals and shut-ins, and friendly visiting. Donations to Church Home. Filling supply shelves to be used in the Parish.

Money spent for Social Service reported by 33 Parishes amounts to \$2,334.18.

A STATEMENT OF THE WORK OF THE CHURCH MISSION OF HELP FOR THE YEAR 1932

263 young people, mainly girls but including a few young men and several married couples, and 86 children, a total of 349 individuals, were given service by the Church Mission of Help in the year 1932. The Church Mission of Help is the diocesan social service organization for work with unadjusted young girls including the out of wedlock mother and child whose numbers have been on the increase this past year. It works individually by the case work method, and case work is in the truest sense treating people as souls, or to use a more modern term, as personalities.

The office is at 237 North Street, and there is a staff of two case workers, Mrs. Wilma A. Vanderwall and Miss Selene Gifford, and an office secretary, Miss Ruth Ford.

All problems of young people have been made more acute by "the times". Employment, except domestic, has been almost impossible to secure. Formerly girls were placed in offices, stores, factories, and hospitals. Now these avenues are closed. There is far too much leisure time without facilities and more understanding of how to use it. There is a general sense of frustration and a "what matters it" attitude. 37 domestic positions were secured during the year and here it has been necessary to guard against exploitation:--too long hours and too heavy work for teen-age workers. 25 girls were assisted by financial help, clothing, etc., to remain in school or were placed in school for further education. Case work with just one girl often involves from 25 to 75 calls and interviews in the course of a few weeks or months. On the other hand, some situations are very quickly smoothed out.

Medical service figures and hospitalizations show a figure of 116 clinic or physicians' examinations, 26 hospitalizations, 51 dental appointments, and convalescent care for 10. 151 recreational opportunities were provided.

Our auxiliary group, the Council of Church Women of the Church Mission of Help, many of whom are recruited from the Woman's Auxiliary, give unusual service: by raising money, by publicity through contacting church groups and by supplying clothing. 486 girls' garments and 1055 children's were given out during the year. Most of these were provided by the Council of Church Women and branches of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Just one example of how necessary it is to have clothing always available:—On the day before Christmas a Traveler's Aid Society worker brought to the office a homeless girl. She had in the world exactly the clothes on her back. How worthwhile to be able to fit her out with underwear and stockings and an extra dress before placing her in a temporary home for over the holiday.

Volunteer service has increased, such as motor, clerical, friendly visiting, and providing entertainment such as teas and the Christmas party.

Comment is made on the fact that the various organizations of the Church seem to be becoming more conscious all the time of the inspiration and momentum to be gained by joining forces and working together. "This is not a time for despair. It is rather a time for high resolve and a determination to place first things first."

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

January 12, 1933.

Dear Members of the Auxiliary:

We have come to the end of our first year as a smaller Diocese. The reports of the various officers have shown how well you have carried on. The year has been a trying one, and you have shown fine courage and spirit. It is said no one is truly known until power or adversity have been theirs. Certainly the adversities of the past year have been a testing, and you have not sat down with this dear little depression in your lap, comforting and coddling it, but have ignored it as much as possible; and with brave hearts and untiring energy, given of your time in devoted service, so that missionary boxes have been sent as usual. You have helped to keep the Church fires burning and salaries paid. Those in need have received assistance, and new ways of usefulness are constantly being sought.

To the Diocesan Officers I give especial praise. All new but three, their successful carrying forward of the work deserves most grateful recognition. I wish there were some sort of measureometer that would record the hours of thought and active service of these women. Not that we want to keep a record, but because of the inspiration it would be to you, showing too, that results do not come of themselves.

Last Spring we held four regional meetings, particularly for officers, but other members were welcome. The attendance totalled 361, in contrast to the old Buffalo District Officers Conference which drew from practically the same territory and never had more than fifty.

In February a supper conference for Evening Branches was held. It was voted such a successful event that a request was made for one every year.

In the Fall, instead of having the usual stereotype meeting, groups of Diocesan officers went en tour. Twenty-one Branches outside of Buffalo were visited and over 500 women were in attendance. Some meetings were in large, well appointed Parish Houses, some in small ones, others were in beautiful homes, or in attractively furnished and decorated basement rooms, and some in a bare basement where we sat near the furnace to keep warm, and a corner was the visiting room; the pictures and charts on the walls told that the Sunday School used it too; but one and all received us with more than courteous hospitality--there was a very real fellowship.

Members who, for various reasons, have been unable to come to outside meetings, were told of the Auxiliary, its ideals and purpose, and they have a vision they did not have before. The Diocesan Officers in their turn, have seen the parish and community setting of the different groups, often a very different picture than they had in mind. At these meetings there was no rush. Luncheon or tea was served, and we had plenty of time to become acquainted. All of which has given a sympathetic understanding on both sides that will prove most helpful. I am convinced that the smaller diocese with direct contact of Diocesan Officers with the Parish group is most effective.

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The Auxiliary was included on the Programs of the four Deanery meetings. Mrs. Hippler spoke at Dunkirk, Mrs. Smallwood at Batavia, and your President at Buffalo and Salamanca.

Many Parishes have reorganized their women's work into one large auxiliary, made up of smaller groups. Our membership now is over 2,777, with fourteen not included, as against 1,700 last year.

The Auxiliaries have given to their Parishes \$11,295.00. Gifts, other than Auxiliary pledge, advance work, supply and social service, were \$2,200.00. The total disbursements, including the United Thank Offering, were well over \$30,000.00, and there are still 14 reports to come in. A record to be proud of.

The members of the Auxiliary, who at the Bishop's request were elected to the Departments of Social Service, Education and Missions, have gone faithfully to the meetings, and have found them most interesting, and have acquired an understanding of the Diocesan affairs that they can pass on to the Branches and we shall be able to co-operate as never before.

It was a pleasure to have Bishop Davis turn to the Auxiliary when he needed a Committee to care for the Diocesan House and Grounds. For nine years nothing had been done to the house, until last year, when the Bishop was in California, his offices were done over as a surprise by the Bishop Davis group of Trinity Auxiliary. Your President formed a Committee of 14, with Mrs. Cameron Davis as chairman, Mrs. Irving Snow, assistant chairman. The whole house is to be put in order and kept in order, for the Committee is to continue as the "Bishop's Committee." The work done so far has been paid for by gifts from the Committee, their friends and the G. F. S. The result is astonishing. The dingy old house is attractive with fresh paper and paint, refinished floors, new curtains and lamps. A card party on January 27th, at the Diocesan House, is to furnish funds to complete the work. The House contains offices of the Bishop, Financial Secretary, Extension Society, Church Mission of Help. It is used by the G. F. S., Diocesan departments and Executive Committees, St. Barnabas Guild, and many others. The third floor is used as a dormitory for the DeLancy Divinity School Students, and is available for our out-of-town clergy. It is indeed a Diocesan House, and a fine thing for the Auxiliary to take over.

It is interesting to note that things like this can be done even when the wolf is supposed to be at the door--the necessity being to show the need to the right people.

Reoprtng never tells the whole story. I know that in so many ways our diocesan missionaries have been heartened with books, choir vestments, altar hangings, victrola records, Christmas stockings, cards and innumerable other things that will never appear on any report, but all this is shown in the good will that is spreading.

This Spring, when the country will be particularly lovely, we are planning an auto tour to the Indian Reservation and other Diocesan mission stations. The Bishop is enthusiastic over the idea. On a Sunday morning after service, we will set forth with lunch baskets and the whole family, on a carefully mapped route, meeting at a convenient spot for a great picnic, and we hope it will prove a jolly and educational affair. Then perhaps when the Every Member Canvas comes, the Diocesan budget will have a meaning to us and we will respond to the appeal.

And now, a new year is before us!

We naturally ask ourselves what is most needed from us as Christian women. I think it can all be compressed into the one word "HOPE". Let us have and give "Hope", for it speaks loudly of vibrant life, confidence and courage. It carries cheer in its make-up, and there is in it a determination to succeed and a poise founded on faith.

"Behold I have set before thee an open door". Eagerly and radiant with hope let us enter 1933.

Sanctuary Chapter—Takes charge of the care of the Altar and care of vestments.

Social Service—Parish social service for Rector; co-operates with our own Church Extension Society and the social agencies of the city.

Hospitality—In charge of social activities.

Chairman of Weekly Luncheons—Arranges for weekly luncheons prepared by group of members.

Visiting—To assist the Rector in keeping in touch with sick, non-attending and new members.

Civic—Reports items of interest concerning women's activities in the city.

Mothers' Club—Meets once a month, evening meeting, educational and philanthropic work—a group to promote the education of mothers in the study of the physical, mental and spiritual development of children. Co-operates with Church School in the gathering of the Advent and Lenten Offerings, in preparing pageants, plans and prepares Church School dinners, makes layettes for Church Mission of Help, and provides Christmas gifts for children of C. M. H. Provides Thanksgiving baskets for Church Extension Society.

Junior Auxiliary—Carries on own program.

Publicity—Prepares and sends newspaper notices.

Church Bulletin—Edits and issues Church Bulletin

Devotional Leader—Plans and prepares devotions for Monday meetings, Corporate Communions, and Quiet Days.

Supply Secretary—Purchases all articles for Missionary box and other requests from Diocesan Supply Department.

Educational—Plans educational program for year and takes charge of discussion groups on special topics.

U. T. O.—Committee plans placing of blue boxes and ingathering once a year.
