Minutes of the Annual Meeting and Officers Reports for 1934

The Fifty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western New York was held in St. John's Church, Buffalo, January 31, 1935, beginning at 10 A. M.

Bishop Davis was assisted at the celebration of Holy Communion by Rev. Walter R. Lord, Rev. Glenn B. Coykendall and Rev. Eugene M. Chapman.

The topic of the Bishop's address was "If We Be His Disciples," which was the theme of the Woman's Auxiliary at General Convention. He spoke of the forward movement, a commission for which was appointed at the Convention, and asked for the help of the women to put it across in this Diocese. Between 250 and 300 were present at this service.

At 11:15 Mrs. Dyett, the President, called the business meeting to order and Mrs. Broughton led the prayer.

Mrs. Reeves welcomed the women of the Auxiliary to St. John's and Mrs. Dyett responded and finished by saying that as Mrs. Hippler was unable to be present because of her continued illness she had put the flowers on the Altar as her greeting. Some flowers had been sent to Mrs. Hippler as a token that we were also thinking of her.

The minutes of last year's meeting were approved as printed in the Year Book.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Buchanan, read her report, also the report of the Auditor. Motion to accept the latter was seconded and carried.

The Diocesan Officers of the Auxiliary and the Vice-President of the Church Mission of Help Board, the Diocesan Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, the President of the Girls' Friendly Society and the chairman of the Elizabeth Lawrence Visitors, each brought a message of satisfaction with the past year's work and hope for a continuance of the same helpful spirit of the branches for the year to come.

The feature of the morning session was an address by Rev. Elmore M. McKee on "The Church's Responsibility for Education and Especially Peace Education". Mr. McKee's address most emphatically drove home to his hearers their personal responsibility if Peace was ever to come to the World.

Noonday prayers were led by Bishop Davis, all joining in a special prayer for Peace.

From 12 o'clock until 1 o'clock special conferences were conducted by the heads of the several departments, assisted by outside speakers, as follows: Education, Leader Mrs. Alian Burton, Speaker Rev. Elmore M. McKee, Treasurer, Leader Mrs. Buchanan, Speaker, Mr. A. F. Freeman, Financial Secretary of the Diocese, Social Service, Leader, Mrs. Everett Jameson, Speaker, Mr. Patterson, Secretary of the Council of Social Agencies, Presidents, Leader Mrs. Jas. Dyett, Speaker, Bishop Davis, Supplies, Leader, Mrs. Karl Searles, Speaker, Mrs. Vanderwall, Church Periodical Club, Leader, Mrs. Cyphers, Speaker, Rev. Glenn Coykendall, Devotional, Leader, Mrs. Broughton, Speaker, Dean Hale, United Thank Offering, Leader, Mrs. Nixon, Speakers, Rev. G. Napier Smith and Mrs. Eversley Ferris.

After luncheon, which was served by the ladies of St. John's the meeting was resumed, being called to order by the President at 2:15. Mrs. Walker led the opening prayer.

Mrs. Dyett read a letter from Bishop Davis, thanking the women for a gift of money sent him on the 5th Anniversary of his consecration, and for their support.

Mrs. Walker, 1st Vice-President, took the chair while the President read her annual message which is printed elsewhere in the Year Book.

The first speaker of the afternoon was Rev. F. S. Patterson, Dean of the Genesee Deanery (and rural worker in the Warsaw District, succeeding Dr. Allison). He told of the great importance of the rural work, especially the personal visitations in the isolated areas.

The second speaker was Dr. Francis Wei, one of the outstanding Chinese Christians of the day and President of Central China College, Wuchang, China. His topic was "Missions in this Age." He said in part: "The old religions of China were not satisfying to the modern Chinese mind and expressed the belief that only Christianity could save China by breathing into the old culture the love of God. The China of today is a challenge to all Christendom as she stands at the cross-roads of her destiny."

During the singing of Hymn 493 the offering was taken.

The President announced the appointment of Mrs. Charles M. Wilson and Mrs. Everett W. Jameson to the Nominating Committee. The following three members were appointed from the floor: Mrs. R. L. Kirtland, Trinity Church, Buffalo, Mrs. Horace B. Curtis, St. Paul's, Buffalo, and Mrs. Henry S. Madden, St. John's, Buffalo. The Constitution Committee, Mrs. Julius Potter and Miss F. E. Myers.

The Elections Committee reported thirtythree votes cast for the ticket as presented, which was as follows: 2nd Vice-President, Mrs. Charles C. Guyett; Supply Secretary, Mrs. Karl N. Searles; Treasurer, Mrs. Ross G. Buchanan; U. T. O. Treasurer, Mrs. Frank H. Nixon. The President declared the foregoing officers elected.

The Registration Committee reported Buffalo branches represented 31, out-of-town Branches 28. Total registrations 606.

There was only one Buffalo Branch not represented.

The President expressed the hope that all had enjoyed a day of refreshment and urged that we all bear in our minds the theme for the year, "If We Be His Disciples."

The closing address of the day was by Mr. David Seabury, Consulting Psychologist of New York who gave us some very inspiring thoughts to carry away with us on the topic, "The Bible, a guide to Everyday Life".

A very well attended meeting was held in Trinity Church in the evening at which Dr. Wei spoke again, continuing his address of the afternoon, touching on the political situation in China, and the present trends.

The offering taken at both afternoon and evening meetings amounted to \$166.57 and will be allocated at the first meeting of the Executive Board.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Dear Members of the Auxiliary:

The year of the Triennial always seems more significant than other years. Women from all over our country and from foreign lands have met together at the same time Bishop, Clergy and laymen are meeting. All are putting heart and mind and soul into thinking through what is God's Will for us. As we have gathered together at Communion, when in worship and prayer, we have sought guidance, at Meetings when we have listened to Missionaries and others who have inspired and told us conditions and needs -- at study and discussion groups when we have tried to come to conclusions and form plans -- something strong and vital has taken possession of us -- something greater than ourselves. We have been filled with a buoyant and expectant hope, with a deep sense of our responsibility and a new courage and we return filled with the desire and determination to do our part in building the Kingdom of God.

In some small measure may these Annual Meetings bring to you some of this same high hope and courage, that each one who is here today will feel consecrated anew to Christ Jesus, to a steadfast progressive effort that will show we are truly His disciples.

Both an honor and a great responsibility and privilege has been conferred on the Auxiliary when the House of Bishops and House of Deputies voted that the Auxiliary should elect four women to serve on the National Council.

Those elected at the Triennial to serve for the next three years are Miss Eva Carey, Diocese of Massachusetts, Mrs. James R. Cain, Diocese of Upper

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South Carolina, Miss Rebekah L. Hibbard, Diocese of Los Angeles, and Miss Elizabeth Matthews, Diocese of Southern Ohio.

It is very important that we should emphasize the National Development of our Church as the agency for carrying forward its world wide Mission, keeping before us the whole work of the Church and so plan that we may make an intelligent and constructive contribution.

At the Triennial we had brought before us three great subjects: Missions in Our Age presented by Dr. Wei. Christian Citizenship by Miss Scudder and the Life of the Spirit by Dean Robbins.

These addresses have been printed and during the next three years we are to consider and act upon them and also the reports of the Committees on each of the subjects. These cannot be passed over lightly--they require your best and deepest thought and prayerful consideration.

The Central Theme for the next three years is "If we be His disciples" and we are to bring this to bear upon our thoughts, our speech, our actions in every contact of our lives.

One of the most important resolutions passed was the one on "Peace".

Believing that Christ stands for the way of love as against the way of violence and that power to overcome evil with good, lies in Jesus Christ and His followers, we should make love the active principal of our relationships, that we guard ourselves daily from destructive habits of thought and life, that we urge vigorously that the settlement of all disputes or conflicts shall be sought by peaceful means to the end that justice, goodwill and peace may prevail.

Mr. McKee has prepared for us some very definite ways to carry this out which will, I hope, be brought up at your Meetings and acted upon.

Other resolutions referred to the following:

Realizing the vital need of enlisting the young people in the service of the Church we are asked to give earnest and sympathetic cooperation to the Girls' Friendly Society, Department of Religious Education and Young People's Fellowship and in parishes where it seems best, establish Junior Auxiliaries.

We are instructed to hold the United Thank Offering before the women of the Church with more zeal than ever, as an ideal expression of their personal devotion and gratitude to the living Christ and as a means of forwarding the Missionary work of the Church through well equipped women. We look to the day when every woman of the Church, even though it be in a small degree, will share in this most beautiful corporate gift.

We are to keep in close touch with the Missionaries who have gone out from the Diocese. This we have made an attempt to do, but I fear by many it has been thought rather unimportant and I hope this Triennial action will bring it so before you that you will give to it the attention it deserves. Each Branch has been given a Missionary to have as a particular friend for three years at a time. Every member should feel an intimate and friendly relation toward her or him. At the time of furlough plans should be made in cooperation with the diocesan chairman for entertainment and to assist in any way possible to make the vacation of profit and delight.

We are, I am sure, thankful for the consecrated leadership of the women on our National Executive Board who so wisely guide us.

The reports that have come in this year from the branches show a live and growing interest and a real effort on the part of Officers and Members to keep up gifts and supply work. The total disbursements of the branches is over \$30,000.00 which very forcefully bears this out.

The Diocesan Officers are giving themselves to the work with a devotion that is far reaching in results. One outstanding contribution is the U. T. O. leaflet gotten out by Mrs. Nixon. 19 thousand of these have gone out upon request to 28 dioceses.

Your executive board has taken action following that of the National to have represented on the board the Church Mission of Help, the Girls' Friendly Society. The Church Periodical Club has so been represented. This will, I am sure, bring closer cooperation, in corporate devotions and services. We welcome Miss Maud Burnett, President of the Girls' Friendly Society. Miss Esther Smith, whose term of office as second Vice-President expired, we are happy to have represent the Church Mission of Help for her knowledge and

unfailing interest in the whole work of the Church is of inestimable value. Mrs. Chas. Cyphers continues for the Church Periodical Club.

The Educational work is showing a steady growth. Branches have reported more program meetings and study and discussion groups on the Bible, Missionary and Social themes. We are, I think, beginning to grasp its wide significance and will be willing to give time for real and deep study of the Mind of Christ, seeking truth wherever it may lead.

We are fortunate indeed that Mr. Elmore McKee has consented to be our Educational Advisor.

The Annual Evening Branch Meeting was held at St. Clement's. It was most successful with over eighty present for supper. It was a joy to have as our Speaker one of our own Missionaries, Miss Helen Lade of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio. She made the work very vivid and we all enjoyed the informal intimate gathering.

The Meetings of the Diocesan Departments of Missions, Social Service and Education have been attended by Auxiliary Officers and we have thus kept in touch with the accomplishments, plans and needs in the Diocese and have been able to give help in many ways.

We are all very grateful for the fine leadership of Bishop Davis. His high ideals, his sympathetic understanding and wise council are being felt through the Diocese and we want him to know that the women of the Auxiliary are eager to go forward with him in the service of the Master.

There are women in every parish who are missing the joy of service that is ours. Would it not be wonderful if, this year, each member would bring one person to share this joy?

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REPORT ON CONTACT WITH OUR WESTERN NEW YORK MISSIONARIES

How many of you read the Woman's Auxiliary page in the Spirit of Missions? In the November number, page 539, you will find, "Missionaries, the Triennial felt, should be in closer personal touch with the dioceses from which they went to the mission field. Diocesan officers of the Auxiliary are urged to establish and maintain this contact, and also to do everything possible to make the furloughs of foreign missionaries and the vacations of domestic missionaries profitable." Resolutions to this effect were adopted, so that other Diocesan Branches will be joining in the effort to create closer friendship and understanding between those who serve beyond their diocese, and those at home who hold up their hands in the battle to advance the Kingdom of God.

In order that each one of us may know who our own Special missionary is, we are printing in this Year Book (pages 12 and 13) the name of the missionary and the names of the branches responsible for friendship with her (or him). Those missionaries unassigned were added to our list after the groups of 1934-1936 had been arranged. Will not some individual, person or branch, adopt one of them as friend and prayer partner for 1935 and 1936, until we change about again, according to our plan? If so, write your new missionary contact officer, whose name you will find on page 3 of this book.

During 1934 we planned acquaintance meetings for those missionaries who were home on furlough. Mrs. E. P. Miller, Jr., of Wuchang, cheerfully chauffeured by Mr. Miller, toured the Diocese, speaking in twelve towns besides five Buffalo parishes. And Mrs. Snyder, Missionary Contact Officer of Rochester, also gave her a warm welcome in our neighboring Diocese. So that not only Mrs. Miller's own Group but many others had the privilege of meeting her, and learning of China, its problems and opportunities. She also gave an interesting talk on the "Status of Women in China," before the Buffalo Branch of the National Woman's Party. Mrs. Miller returned to Wuchang in September, where besides getting her home in order after "the procession of people who

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moved in and out" during her two years absence, she resumed her teaching of English Literature at Boone. On Friday afternoons in October, she held "Open House" for Mr. and Mrs. Norman Garrett, who lived with the Millers until a house on Boone Compound was ready for them.

Mr. Garrett (Medina) went to Boone a year ago, and this June, Miss Henrietta Hellwig (Medina and Buffalo) went out to marry him. Some of you may have met Miss Hellwig at J. N. Adam's store where she was Consultant for Interior Decorating. Before leaving for China she met St. Mary's Guild, and Mrs. Nixon representing the Executive Board, at a dinner at the Town Club. All present were glad to greet our newest recruit and wish her success and happiness in her new life and work. She has been added to the staff of the School of Arts at Central China College.

St. Mary's Guild, Chairman of Miss Helen Lade's "friends" invited the other members of her group to meet her in St. Mary's "long room", which Mr. Glenn, our interested sexton, had transformed into a Japanese garden --- a surprise even to the committee. A friendly "family" gathering plied "Lade San" with all manner of questions and enjoyed looking at her and the lovely Japanese things she brought with her, especially the dolls. She also talked at St. Clement's to the Evening Branches; warming us with merriment (as St. Clement's did with a delicious supper) at tales of hot baths in Japan, before we faced the biting cold of one of Buffalo's farthest below zero nights! Miss Lade returned to Japan in May, St. Mary's Guild (and doubtless other friends) sending her steamer letters and a book to fill some of the long hours at sea. Don't you think letters and gifts, *with our prayers*, a good way in which to wish all our missionaries God-speed?

On February 1st Miss Alice Larery enters upon a new work as cooking teacher at the House of Mercy, a home and training school for delinquent girls at Washington, D. C. We wish her satisfaction and joy in her work.

Advancement has come to a Western New Yorker. Mrs. Priddis, after a year's excellent but difficult work at Goodhue House, Staten Island, has been appointed Resident Social Worker at the Children's Village, Hartford, Conn. formerly the Hartford Orphan Home. The Village of nine cottages cares for about one hundred children, in age from two weeks to twenty years. Mrs. Priddis will do the case work and investigating and assist the Superintendent administration. She says, "I want to *belong* to all my dear friends in Buffalo. In their prayers will they ask God to help me in His service with little children."

All Western New York missionaries who may read this report, when you plan your summer holidays, *remember* that our room in the Episcopal Cottage at Chautauqua is available to you for a vacation of rest and refreshment of spirit. This past summer only Miss Bingham and Miss Larery were near enough to enjoy it. We hope in the future it may be more widely used.

Many times I have asked those visiting California to call on our retired missionary, Miss Rosa Camfield, 32 Orange Ave., Long Beach. So far I have never heard of any one who has done so. Who will be the first to greet her and let her see that her home Diocese has not forgotten her?

All Western New York Missionaries are now at their posts. This does not seem to be a time for furloughs. "If we be His disciples" let us make it a year of happy sharing and faithful working together, those far off and those nigh at home, in HIS service.

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REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

The Diocese of Western New York is made up of some seventy-nine parishes and missions. In 1932, the U. T. O. was given by sixty-six groups of women from fifty-four parishes. Seventy-three groups from sixty parishes were givers in 1933, while the 1934 Offering was shared by eighty-six groups of women from sixty-nine parishes and missions.

Thirty-seven of these parishes show an increase over their 1933 Offering and all but five of the twenty-two city parishes have increased during 1934. Ten groups gave for the first time and there were two individual gifts.

After three years of careful study and comparison, we find that working with a U. T. O. committee and a custodian for each group of women, results in "more givers" and, incidentally, a larger Offering. May I suggest that every parish group study the United Thank Offering Table of Triennial Totals to be found elsewhere in this book.

The Offering presented at Atlantic City on October 11th, amounted to \$789,561.13. The Diocese of Western New York shared in this Triennial Offering to the extent of \$9,327.56. Although somewhat smaller than that of 1931, nevertheless it represents real sacrifice on the part of many Churchwomen and much hard work by parish and diocesan custodians.

Our 1934 U. T. O. of \$2,949.40, is slightly less than in 1932, but quite a little more than it was in 1933.

The Rt. Rev. Cameron J. Davis, D. D. preached the sermon at the Triennial Diocesan Service, held at St. Paul's Cathedral, Sunday, June 3rd, at 4 P. M.

The United Thank Offering is the most wonderful thing that the women of the Church are doing. To share in it is a rare privilege. After the pledge to the Parish has been paid and countless contributions and donations made in answer to the many calls received, constantly, by women of the Church, then these women make a still further sacrifice. But this time it is an OFFERING not a donation --- a Thank Offering, over and above all else that they do. THIS is the UNITED THANK OFFERING, our very best gift to Almighty God for His gift to us of His beloved Son, Jesus Christ, Our Saviour!

We are charged by the Triennial of 1934 to "hold the U. T. O. before the women of the Church with more zeal than ever before as an ideal expression of their personal devotion and gratitude to the living Christ, and as a means of forwarding the missionary work of the Church through well-equipped women."

There still remain many women to be won for the U. T. O. May we, of the Diocese of Western New York never lack in zeal as messengers of "The Little Blue Box."

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SUGGESTIONS FOR SUPPLY SECRETARIES

When supply work is received in the Fall, Branches will please appraise, and if for any reason your Branch is not able to fill the allotment, please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary before January 1st.

Branches receiving Personal Family boxes for Missionaries, or \$5.00 Christmas gift letters for Missionaries will please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary of their acceptance as soon as possible in the Fall, and will report the sending of these not later than December 15th.

Branches sending Personal Family boxes should communicate with the family to whom the box will be sent, giving them the date of shipment, and telling whether sent by parcel post or freight or express.

Branches working for Institutions, Missions and Hospitals will send boxes directly to the Mission for which they are working, enclosing a self-addressed return post card, in order that they may be notified of its safe arrival.

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Branches are privileged to use the Standard of Values sheet, which may be obtained from the Diocesan Supply Secretary, in order to estimate the cost of making garments, which may be added to the cost of material, thus obtaining the full value.

There is no valuation on second-hand articles of clothing.

When allotment is finished please list all articles on the blue sheet and the pink sheet and the white sheet. Compute all values, including postage, on the blue sheet and the pink sheet, sending the blue sheet to the Diocesan Supply Secretary as soon as possible, and keeping the pink sheet carefully on file to be used later in making out Supply report to Diocesan President in December. The white sheet is sent with articles in box, with no values attached.

All work for the year should be finished and sent, and blue sheets returned to Diocesan Supply Secretary by May 1st at the latest.

Under no consideration should work be carried over until the next Fall.

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REPORT OF ADVANCE WORK FOR 1934

The rebuilding and repairing of the buildings on the Cattaraugus Indian Reservation where services are held was the Advance Work for 1933. The completed amount, \$316.79, was raised for this purpose.

The Advance Work for 1934 was devoted to the remodeling of the rectory at Youngstown where Mr. Harold Kellerson is in charge.

Through their own splendid effort in raising a generous Easter offering for the project, and with the added help of \$250.00 from the Advance Work fund the repairs have been finished and Mr. Kellerson is carrying on his fine work with the added advantage of greater convenience.

The Advance Work for 1935 will be outside of our Diocese. We are going to Eastern Oregon to a small settlement called Antelope, where we plan to supply their little church with an altar and furnishings, instead of a plain table which they are using now. They are so desirous for something better and long to fix up their church.

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SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT FOR 1934

Reports show us the burden heaped on the shoulders of social service workers and their treasuries have been heavier than ever before, also, that in nearly every parish those needs have been met. The work covers every branch of social service connected with one or more social agencies. Special work consisting of distribution of clothing, food, medicines, flowers, Christmas stockings and baskets, serving for hospitals, Red Cross and Church Mission of Help. Donations of money to the Church Home, Diocesan organizations, not forgetting the Home at Chautauqua. Furniture, rugs, curtains and quilts have been sent

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to institutions and families. Surgical appliances, knitted articles for children in the Parish and communities are also included in work done.

I want to thank the 34 parishes who either have social service chairmen of committees or both. Few reports were returned blank, 34 with social service secretaries, 33 Parish work, 29 work done in the Community, 22 in the Diocese, 30 work in cooperation with one or more social service agencies, 9 with other communions. I would like to compliment especially the Church of Ascension and St. Paul's, Buffalo, not only on their complete reports, but also on the immense amount of work accomplished during the past year.

May I once more ask that the presidents appoint their Social Service Chairman, and that she appoint her committee promptly, that the coming year may prove more efficient than the past.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY FOR 1934

This year the Corresponding Secretary had the privilege and joy of being sent as a delegate to the Triennial Convention at Atlantic City. I was present at all of the meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary. Never before have I realized what a significant and glorious part the Women's Auxiliary plays in the work of the General Church, how many things we have accomplished and what untold opportunities lie before us to further the work and truly try to be "His Disciples".

My work this year comprised the writing of the usual letters and the mailing of the annual report blanks and Year Books. Seventy-four report blanks were sent to the Presidents of the Branches, and all but six responded with the complete information asked for.

Of the 74 Branches in the Diocese of Western New York, 32 are in the City of Buffalo, 42 out of town. Of the 74 Branches listed, 19 are Evening Branches.

According to the records of the Corresponding Secretary the oldest Branch in the Diocese is St. Peter's, Westfield, organized in 1866, sixty-nine years ago. It became an Auxiliary in 1881, and today has a membership of 46. Our youngest branch is the Charles H. Smith Auxiliary of the Church of the Holy Communion, Buffalo, an Evening group with a membership of 12.

I have had letters of appreciation and gratitude for inspiration derived from the Year Book from many of the Branches. I was also asked to speak at three meetings about the Triennial and General Convention.

During the year the Director has written 516 letters and 207 post cards; and has addressed 18 Auxiliaries. Many times the opportunity to address Auxiliaries has come from the marvelously cooperative spirit of Mrs. James H. Dyett.

Practically every institution without denominational restriction has benefited through the Church Periodical Club. No request has gone unheeded. Our Branch, No. 96, Westminster Presbyterian, collected 960 Christmas cards which, after reconditioning, were used by the Rev. Mr. Cosbey in the County Home and Hospital, and by the Rev. Mr. Coykendall on the Reservation. Branch No. 11, Saint John's, gave 150 new Christmas cards to The Rev. Mr. Tutton for his Church school. Branch No. 62, Saint Simon's, gave two large Bibles, one of which is now a proper lectern Bible in a mission of the Genesee Deanery where only a prayer book had been available.

Nineteen branches gave money sufficient to buy as Christmas gifts 108 subscriptions to Woman's Home Companion and 6 subscriptions to American, to be mailed direct by the publisher for one year.

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THE ELIZABETH LAWRENCE VISITORS

We have done very little during the year 1934, not because the spirit is unwilling or the flesh weak, but because we have had so few cases reported to us, and often by the time they are reported the patient has left the hospital.

We beg the Clergy of the Diocese outside of Buffalo to notify us immediately of anyone coming to the city hospitals for operations or treatment, for experience has taught us that our services are most acceptable; let us cite our last case, in November 1934, which is a good one to illustrate what the "Elizabeth Lawrence Visitors" stands for:

A lady from Long Island whose husband had been having treatment in East Aurora, N. Y., finally brought him to a hospital in Buffalo and we were notified; the man was very ill so there was little we could do for him except to send him flowers and see him occasionally, his wife however was alone with her sorrow and needed our sympathy.

They were ardent Episcopalians and appreciated our attention and also that of the Rev. James Cosbey, whom we notified, he going to the hospital nearly every day. The husband did not live, passing away early one evening and the wife got in touch immediately with Mr. Cosbey, who assisted her in every way, making all arrangements, secured her travelling accommodations so that she was able to leave that night, he taking her to the train.

Does not this prove that it is worth while to let the "Elizabeth Lawrence Visitors" do the work for which it stands? Please send word of all cases to the Chairman, Mrs. Howard L. Osgood, 147 North St., Buffalo, N. Y., Telephone GRant 9860.

REPORT OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

In reviewing the work of the Girls' Friendly Society in the past year one finds much activity in all its departments, the outstanding features of which have been a deeper study of missions, with special emphasis on Japan and its St. Barnabas' Mission at Kusatsu to which the society contributed towards the G. F. S. national pledge of \$2,000.00; work towards International Friendship and Understanding, which was brought to a climax in a joint entertainment with some of the foreign groups of the International Institute, at the time of the Easter Box Packing Party, held at St. Simon's Church, and attention has been focused on the work of our church in the cause of World Peace and given further value through a special G. F. S. service at the Cathedral with this as the central theme, in an address by Dean Hale; and at a recent meeting of the society, Miss Helen Becker gave a talk on the same subject.

The Society has been honored by visits from three of its National Officers, including Miss Brent, the national president, who brought a message of inspiration and encouragement.

The G. F. S. cooperated in the service for social workers of the diocese, held at the Church of the Holy Communion last June under the auspices of Rev. Mr. Sundin.

The annual Candlelight Service in memory of Bishop Brent was held as usual at the Diocesan House in November with Bishop Davis officiating.

The society's thirteen Branches and its Senior Members' Club sent to St. John the Evangelist's Mission at Boonesville, Va., a large box of layettes and hospital supplies, valued at \$137.75 and 5686 gauze dressings, valued at \$54.30, were sent to the General Hospital at Hankow, China.

Supplies of various kinds were contributed to the G. F. S. Holiday House on Conesus Lake, which is owned jointly with the G. F. S. of the Diocese of Rochester where 232 of our members spent their vacations in July and August and where 14 girls, who were out of work, were sent for an outing, as guests of the G. F. S. of Western New York.

To the St. Barnabas' Mission at Kusatsu, Japan; the G. F. S. Holiday House; and All Saints' Memorial fund, for the National Endowment Fund; and for the National Maintenance fund, the society has given a total of \$383.54 in 1934.

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All the branches have given generously of their funds and their time in social service and the general work of their respective churches and parishes and to St. Clement's Branch was awarded the banner for outstanding work in all departments of activity in the year's program.

The G. F. S. is deeply appreciative of the value of the Diocesan House, its staff and equipment in facilitating the work of the society, for there, in the past year they have held 14 supper meetings, 1 afternoon tea, 2 card parties and 4 general business meetings, 21 meetings in all.

CHURCH MISSION OF HELP AT WORK

Church Mission of Help is your Diocesan Social Service case working agency. Its purpose is to assist young girls in any kind of need. During 1934, 163 girls and 57 children were brought to its attention and 43 young men were contacted. The age groups in which there were the greatest number of girls were 16, 17 and 19. This is understandable in that this is the time when emotions are apt to be at the highest pitch and judgment often at the lowest.

What are the problems that bring these girls between the ages of 16 and 25 to the Church Mission of Help? Hopelessness and frustration over unemployment, or a wage insufficient for maintenance; rebellion against parental authority; the tragedies resulting from broken homes; serious mental and personality difficulties; the breaking of the moral code often resulting in unmarried parenthood and all the emotional strain this engenders. All these, and more, are the daily portion of the Church Mission of Help.

To meet this challenge, first is necessary an absolute belief in the worthwhileness of each individual; a marshalling of all the resources of the community and the church to understand and assist this individual with the major emphasis on the individual developing within herself the power to function satisfactorily.

It can be thankfully reported that during the year many of these young people have developed the power to function satisfactorily and have taken their places as useful members of society. This transformation in these lives was only possible because of the splendid backing given the professional staff by the Board, the Church Mission of Help Council, the Woman's Auxiliary, the Child Welfare Committee of the Church Home, the Katherine Hebard Auxiliary of St. John's Church, and church people and volunteers generally.

Twenty-four active volunteers have served in varying capacities as friendly visitors, case workers, keeping office and other clerical services, motoring, and writing publicity. One woman, who runs a business school, gave a complete business education to one girl who has become entirely self-supporting. Over 800 articles of clothing were received from various branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Church Mission of Help Council, the Needlework Guild, and interested friends; and nearly 1200 articles were distributed where most needed.

The Church Mission of Help especially needs at the present time second hand dresses for girls in sizes 14 to 20.

Girls have been referred from five of the seven counties of the Diocese, and one day a week has been spent in Niagara County with an office at St. Peter's Parish House, Niagara Falls, as headquarters.

Dean Hale as Chaplain has contributed much to the spiritual development of the work, and has done a fine pastoral work with the young women and young men who have been sent to him for advice.

Church Mission of Help should be better known in the church and used more widely. It should be reaching more young people with problems, particularly high-type girls with personality difficulties.
