THE ORGANIZATION OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

The governing body of the Church is the General Convention.

The Chairman of the General Convention is the Presiding Bishop. He is elected for a term of six (6) years by and from the House of Bishops, and confirmed by the House of Deputies.

The House of Bishops is made up of Bishops, Bishop Coadjutors and Suffragan Bishops. Every Bishop having jurisdiction has a vote. Bishop Coadjutors have a vote. Suffragan Bishops may have a seat, but not a vote.

The House of Deputies is made up of four (4) clergymen, four (4) laymen from each Diocese, and one (1) clergyman and (1) layman from each Missionary District.

The National Council is the central Executive Body of the Church. It is made up of four (4) Bishops, four (4) Presbyters, eight (8) Laymen, eight (8) Provincial Representatives, and four (4) Women. The National Council has no power of legislation. Its function is to carry out the policies and plans of the General Convention. It is the Board of Directors of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society.

The Presiding Bishop is the Chairman of the Board of Directors.

The President of the National Council is elected by the House of Deputies, subject to confirmation by the House of Bishops, and shall hold office for three (3) years. He is the executive and administrative head of the Council, and appoints heads of Departments.

The Departments of the National Council work in two sections. The first section has four Departments: Foreign Missions, Domestic Missions, Social Service and Religious Education. The second section has three Departments: Finance, Publicity and Field.

The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America was established and incorporated in 1820, and includes all persons who are members of the Church. It holds all funds of the Church.

The Church in the United States, and its possessions, is divided into eight groups called Provinces. The Provinces are divided into small groups called Dioceses and Missionary Districts. Within the Dioceses and Missionary Districts are the separate congregations, known as Parishes and Missions.

The Diocese of Western New York is in Province 2 - - called the Province of New York and New Jersey. It comprises the Dioceses within the States of New York and New Jersey, and the Missionary Districts of Puerto Rico, Haiti and the Dominican Republic, and the Panama Canal Zone.

The Provinces act through a Provincial Synod, consisting of a House of Bishops and a House of Deputies. The President of the Provincial Synod shall be a member of the House of Bishops. The Provincial House of Deputies is made up of four (4) Presbyters and four (4) Laymen from each Diocese. These may be increased to six. We have six (6) in Province 2. The Provincial Synod meets once a year. It has no power of legislation. Its purpose is educational.

Dioceses are governed by the Diocesan Convention, or Council, which meets

once every year with delegates from the Parishes and Missions.

Parishes are governed by the Rector, together with the Vestry, which is elected by the Parish.

A Vestry is the Executive Body of the Parish. It consists of the Rector, two (2) Wardens, and three (3) or more Vestrymen, depending upon the size of the Parish. The Rector is ex-officio President of the Vestry. In his absence one of the Wardens or a Vestryman may preside.

A Bishop is the leader of a Diocese or Missionary District. He is elected by a special Diocesan Convention of Priests and Laymen. His election must be ratified by a two-thirds vote of Standing Committees of all the Dioceses of the Country.

A Bishop Coadjutor is an assistant to the Bishop, who succeeds to the Bishopric when the Bishop retires or dies.

A Suffragan Bishop is an assistant to the Bishop, without the right of succession.

A Dean is appointed by the Bishop to preside over the clergy in a certain district, or to administer the work of a Cathedral. The heads of theological schools are usually called Deans.

A Canon is a priest, or a deacon, appointed by the Bishop or Dean on the staff of his Cathedral.

An Archdeacon is appointed by the Bishop to represent him in a certain territory for missionary work.

A Rector is the head of an organized Parish.

A Curate is an assistant to the Rector.

A Vicar is an official representative of a Bishop or of a Rector. Usually he is Minister-in-charge of a Mission under the direction of the Bishop, or the Minister-in-charge of a Chapel under the direction of the Rector.

A Priest-in-charge is the temporary head of a Parish or a Mission.

A Locum Tenens is one temporarily in charge of a Parish or a Mission.

The Standing Committee of a Diocese is elected by the Diocesan Convention as a body of official advisers for the Bishop.

A Council of Advice serves the same purpose for a Missionary District as a Standing Committee for the Diocese.

The Cathedral Chapter is the Committee which supervises and directs the policy of a Cathedral. It may be composed of both clergymen and laymen.

The Chancellor of the Diocese is the Bishop's legal adviser in matters pertaining to the Diocese, and is appointed by the Bishop.

The Woman's Auxiliary is auxiliary to the National Council. The Executive Offices are at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City.

The governing body of the Woman's Auxiliary is an Executive Secretary, nominated by the Woman's Auxiliary at its Triennial Meeting, and appointed by the Presiding Bishop, to serve three (3) years; and an Executive Board made up of eight (8) members at large, elected at the Triennial Meeting; and one (1) member from each of the eight Provinces; and one (1) representative each from the Church Mission of Help, the Girls' Friendly Society and the Church Periodical Club.

Four women are nominated by the Triennial and elected by the General Convention to membership on the National Council for a term of three years.

Each Diocesan Branch is entitled to five delegates and five alternates to the Triennial.

Each Missionary District Branch is entitled to five delegates and five alternates to the Triennial.

The Church Mission of Help is the Church's only national social case work agency, professional in the best sense of the word, laying special emphasis on the essential importance of the Christian religion in building and re-building character.

The Girls' Friendly Society was founded over fifty years ago to unite for the Glory of God, in one fellowship of prayer and service, the women and girls of the Nation to uphold the Christian standard of honor and morality.

The Church Periodical Club was founded in 1888 to bring together those who need reading matter and those who have such material and are willing to pass it on. Emphasis is laid on the personal touch through individual sending. This is a true act of Christian fellowship.




Minutes of the Annual Meeting and Officers Reports for 1935

The Fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western New York was held in Trinity Church, Buffalo, Tuesday, January 28, 1936, opening with the Annual Corporate Communion of the women of the Diocese, at 10 A. M. Bishop Davis was the celebrant, assisted by Rev. Elmore M. McKee, Rector of Trinity Church and Rev. Thomas Heath.

Bishop Davis in his address, thanked the women in his usual gracious manner for their cooperation in the past year and paid a very appreciative tribute to the retiring President, Mrs. James H. Dyett, for her most understanding helpfulness during her term of office. Speaking on the Forward Movement, the Bishop referred to it as the most significant thing the Church has undertaken since the Oxford Movement. Its importance to the life of the Church cannot be over-estimated. Its objectives are to deepen the spiritual life of the individual and to bring into active membership in the Church those who are now only nominal members. Following the service, the meeting was called to order for the business of the day by the president, Mrs. Dyett.

Rev. Mr. McKee led the opening prayer. Mrs. Harry H. Larkin, president of Trinity Branch, made the address of welcome. A motion to accept the minutes of the last annual meeting as printed in the Year Book was seconded and carried.

The president asked the members to stand for a few minutes in memory of Mrs. Nicholas, first president of the Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and honorary president until her death, and our own beloved Mrs. Hippler, who gave so many years to active and devoted service in this Diocese, lastly as Educational Secretary. At the close of the silence Mrs. Dyett led in prayer.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Buchanan, read her report, also the report of the Auditor. A motion to accept the Auditor's report was seconded and carried.

The several Diocesan officers read reports of the year's work, all of which are printed in the Year Book for your reference.

The President announced that the following resignations had been received and acted upon by the Executive Board: Mrs. Tornow, 4th Vice-President in charge of Social Service, Mrs. Nixon, U. T. O. Custodian and Mrs. Buchanan, Treasurer.

The Executive Board has made the following appointments to fill unexpired terms: Mrs. J. Edward Hubbard, Buffalo, Treasurer, Mrs. Ross Buchanan, Lockport, U. T. O. Custodian, Mrs. Allan L. Burton, Buffalo, Educational Secretary, and Mrs. James H. Dyett, Buffalo, 4th Vice-President, in charge of Social Service.

Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce, our Provincial representative on the National Executive Board was our guest speaker of the morning session. We are very grateful to Mrs. Pierce for coming to bring us a message from the National Board. She spoke on the three topics given at the General Convention for our Spiritual guidance during the Triennium, namely, "Christian Citizenship", "Missions in this Age," and "The Life of the Spirit". The speaker brought out how they finally all merged into one—Christian Citizenship. If we be His Disciples, we will give our lives to the task of making this world the Kingdom of God.

The following extract from one of the reports of the National Board was read.

WHAT IS CHURCH WORK?

"WHEREAS, There are many women and girls in the parishes who are not affiliated with any Church organization, and whereas there seems to be a question in the minds of some as to what is woman's work in the Church,

"BE IT RESOLVED: That the National Executive Board recognize as Church work (provided the worker herself accept it as such) any form of work that is done as an expression of a woman's religion, and we quote the Massachusetts Platform for Woman's Work in the Church:

1. Local Parish Maintenance, which is not an end in itself but a means for building up a fellowship in Christ in order that the Church may complete her Mission.

'2. Work which reaches outside the parish and which is undertaken and directed by the Church in the community, diocese and world as a missionary responsibility.

'3. Work in welfare and other enterprises not under the auspices of the Church but undertaken by members of the parish in places where service is a fulfillment of Christ's mission.

'To sum up; we believe that the Christian religion is a way of life according to the teachings of Jesus, and that Church work is our expression of that life for the highest good of humanity.'

A motion to carry this message back to the Branches to be accepted by them was seconded and carried.

At 12 o'clock, noon-day prayers were led by Rev. Mr. McKee.

The few minutes remaining before lunch was occupied by Rev. William Baxter of Gowanda. He told very interestingly of his rural and institutional work in his community.

During the luncheon period there was a conference of Presidents and Devotional Chairmen, led by Mrs. John K. Walker, Chairman of the Forward Movement Committee of the Auxiliary.

The afternoon session was called to order promptly at 2:15 and Rev. Thomas Heath led the prayers.

The first speaker of the afternoon was Rev. Daniel A. McGregor, Ph. D., Executive Secretary of the Department of Religious Education. His topic was "Youth Education". The thing he considers most important in the education of our children is a Christian example in the home. Children are great imitators, and if they live in a home where love and kindness and forbearance are the ruling factors, they will grow up with these characteristics. He also said, the price of bringing up children in this age, is everything you've got.

The next speaker was Rt. Rev. Henry W. Hobson, D.D., Bishop of Southern Ohio, and chairman of the Forward Movement Commission. He told in detail what the Commission hopes to accomplish, namely making the Church a more vital force for good in the community and the world. To do this, Church members must be made more aware of their duties as evangelists and must be inspired to activity along this line. No one could hear Bishop Hobson without catching some of his enthusiasm, and I'm sure most of his hearers went away with a determination to get behind the movement in every possible way. The Bishop closed his address with the prayer for the Forward Movement which is printed elsewhere in the Year Book for your use, all joining with him. During the singing of "Holy Offerings" the collection was taken.

The Registration Committee reported 385 persons registered, representing 50 branches. The weather was probably responsible for the rather small attendance compared with last year and it was evident that many came after registration closed.

The Elections Committee reported 43 votes cast for the following ticket: President, Mrs. Frank H. Nixon; 5th Vice-President in charge of Devotional Work, Mrs. Charles D. Broughton (Mrs. Broughton has since resigned and Mrs. Eversley S. Ferris has been appointed in her place); Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. John L. Ihde; Educational Secretary, Mrs. Allan L. Burton. The ticket was declared elected by the President.

The retiring President, Mrs. Dyett, made a brief address, then turned over the gavel to the new President, Mrs. Nixon, who gave a short address "Looking Forward", suggesting as our motto for the coming year, "Be Christlike---Give Thyself".

Mrs. Ihde read the report of the Resolutions Committee which was unanimously adopted and is appended.

Mrs. Nixon announced the names of three ladies to serve on the Nominating Committee: Mrs. Charles Guyett, Chairman, Mrs. Searles and Mrs. Dyett. Two others were elected from the floor, Miss Esther Smith and Miss Edla Gibson.

The Constitution Committee is composed of Mrs. Julius H. Potter and Mrs. John G. Tropman.

Announcement was made that the annual meeting of the evening branches would be held in the Church of the Good Shepherd some time in March, also that a new evening branch had been formed at St. Andrew's.

A motion to adjourn was seconded and carried and the closing prayers were led by Rev. Champe B. Lucas.

In the evening at 8 o'clock, Bishop Hobson made a second address to a congregation that comfortably filled Trinity Church. Again his dynamic personality must have inspired all who heard him. His topic was "The Church Today and Tomorrow." He took as his text, Is. 40:31—"They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." He pointed out the Forward Movement was for that purpose, to get closer to God, find out what God's task for us is, and so renew our strength to carry on to greater things than the Church has yet accomplished.

"Today," he said, "we stand at the threshold of a great spiritual revival. Will we hear and obey?" Thus ended a most helpful and inspiring annual meeting, the results of which should be felt throughout the Diocese.

We trust that a much needed change and rest will bring her back to her own sweet self before long. She is now staying with Miss Bingham's sister, Mrs. Burr, at Glenwood, N. Y. She would be glad to hear from her many friends.

At last we have arranged a sponsor for Mr. and Mrs. Norman Garrett at Boone School, Wuchang, China. We hope they will be much benefited and enjoy this contact with Western New York. Mrs. E. P. Miller, also at Boone School, will be able to realize this same joy as activity is now revived in her behalf in the Batavia area.

Rev. Timothy E. Woodward of the Philippine Islands was fortunate in having a sponsor come forward and assume such good care of him. We appreciate this action, which means that every one of our Missionaries are now being taken care of.

Every Group Chairman reported having sent Christmas remembrances of money and other gifts to their special Missionaries. Many other courtesies too numerous to mention were extended during the past year. We know this activity has been appreciated because of the many lovely letters received telling us about them. Now that we have a space on the Annual Budget Sheet, I trust all branches will have their representative make proper use of same. Please refer to your new Year Book for any changes in the schedule.

We hope all Western New York Missionaries will remember that our room at the Episcopal Cottage at Chautauqua is available to you for a vacation of rest and refreshment of spirit. This past year, Mrs. Priddis and Mr. Sundin were able to enjoy it. Kindly get in touch with me if you can arrange to get there.

During the past year the correspondence consisted of 105 form letters, 110 individual letters, 20 post cards, 15 each Birthday, Easter and Christmas cards.

Let us all resolve to follow up the contacts we have started by continually remembering the Missionaries in our prayers, recognizing their birthdays, etc. with greeting cards, perhaps setting aside one whole meeting during the year in their behalf. Originate some way of your own to make this friendship between those laboring in the Field doing God's work, and ourselves in Western New York holding up their hands in the advancement of His Kingdom, thus obeying the command "Go Ye into all the World and Spread the Gospel to every Creature".

I wish to express my appreciation and thank you all for your encouragement and cooperation during the past year and will assure you of my continued interest and help.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

The United Thank Offering for 1935 is almost as much as last year but about \$500 less than we had on hand at the end of 1932. Seventy-nine branches representing sixty-two parishes, shared in this offering, thirty-one of these groups showing an increase over 1934, and there were three individual gifts.

No matter how much we may dislike to do it, we must face the fact that the United Thank Offering shows a decrease both in our own diocese and in the sum total from all dioceses. A recent report from New York, comparing 1935 with 1932, tells of a decrease in the offering. This is an alarming state of affairs. We dare not fail our U. T. O. missionaries!

Therefore, we must put forth double effort to build up the U. T. O. during the remaining two years. The only way in which we can hope to increase the amount will be by reaching those women who do not yet know of the Little Blue Box or who are indifferent to its call. The most effective way of doing this is to organize a Committee and to make a personal contact with every

woman in the parish. I feel certain we have not even reached a fair average of the women of the diocese.

The Diocesan Service was held at St. Simon's Church, Buffalo, N. Y., Sunday, June 2nd, at 4 P. M., the preacher being the Rev. Albert A. Chambers, Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral. The sermon preached by Canon Chambers was printed as a leaflet entitled, "Thankfulness", and distributed throughout the diocese.

A new U. T. O. Poster to replace the one used during 1932-34, has been printed. We hope that it will be displayed in the vestibule of every parish Church and also in the parish house, to help stimulate interest in the United Thank Offering.

It is with great regret that I relinquish my office as U. T. O. Custodian. I have never so thoroughly enjoyed anything before. I deeply appreciate the loyal cooperation of all the parish custodians who have worked with me in such a consecrated manner as messengers of the LITTLE BLUE BOX, during the four happy years of my Custodianship. I wish for my successor the same happiness and the same loyal cooperation.

REPORT OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY FOR 1935

The records of the year show the G. F. S. marching forward with a well-balanced program of Service to the Church, work for Missions at home and abroad, Social Service, Education and Recreation.

We regret to report the disbanding of our St. Matthew's Branch, but are happy to announce that a new and large Candidates' Class has been started at St. Stephen's.

Christian Citizenship and the Forward Movement are being stressed in our work and also Rural work. We are sending our G. F. S. magazine, the "Record" to Miss Viele to use in her work at Warsaw with the young people.

The boxes of Lenten sewing and dispensary articles sent to Holy Cross Mission, Aston, Va., and to Thompson Orphanage, North Carolina, were valued at \$138.37 and made a fine exhibit at the Box Packing Party at St. Clement's Church last March.

The society has made contributions to the amount of \$301.33 for St. Faith's Mission School at Yangchow, China, All Saints' Memorial Fund for National G. F. S. Endowment, The Contributors' Fund for National Extension work and for Holiday House.

The Diocesan Organization sent "Cut Outs" to Mother Ursula for her chil-

dren at the House of the Merciful Saviour, Wuchang, China, and Easter cards to Deaconess Shaw's G. F. S. branch at Bontoc, Philippines.

Eleven girls were sent to Holiday House for a vacation last summer as guests of G. F. S.

The G. F. S. joined with the Y. P. F. in a mass meeting at the Church of the Good Shepherd in October when the Bishop gave a talk on the Forward Movement.

The National Head of Worship, Mrs. Edsall of Geneva, was our speaker at our annual banquet, speaking on Christian Citizenship. On this occasion the G. F. S. banner was awarded to the St. James' Branch, Batavia, for the outstanding branch of the year.

Our annual All Saints' Memorial Candlelight Service, in memory of Bishop Brent, was held at the Diocesan House and conducted by the Rev. James Cosbey.

The Diocesan House is in constant use by the G. F. S. and with much appreciation of its facilities.

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CHURCH MISSION OF HELP AT WORK IN 1935

The Church Mission of Help is the only piece of social work in the Diocese that deals directly with individuals one by one, attempting to understand and treat their needs of whatever sort. Its specific field is the young girl between 16 and 25, but the work with the girls often includes children and young men.

284 girls, boys and children received service in 1935, many of them over long periods of time and carried over to 1936. The majority of the girls were between 16 and 19 years --- immature, insecure, eager for life and love.

Why did these young people come to us? The principal causes may be listed as unemployment, economic insecurity, need of educational equipment and vocational opportunities, broken homes, personality and behavior difficulties, pregnancy, marriage tangles, conflict with parents. Note how many of these causes put the girl in the protective, not the delinquent group. These requests for service along preventive lines are increasing. C. M. H. is eager to reach this group of young people for which the church can do so much to prevent disaster and to insure better adjustment to life problems. When we try to summarize services rendered it is very difficult for it is the intangible thing that can not be tabulated that counts most. The struggle to know the true situation, the instilling of courage, independence and self-respect, the long slow pull toward an existence that contains the elements of what we call normal life. Through such service as finding temporary shelter or a boarding home, finding work, clinic care, legal services, religious contacts, educational and recreational opportunities --- the case worker gets closer to the girl --- makes her aware that some one and the church represented cares in a very personal way. The craving for real affection and personal interest in these young people is often tragic.

What can you as church members do? With conditions as they are in the world today there is nothing more worthwhile than helping to answer the cry for help of our Youth everywhere. Do you know or care how a large part of the young people of your community live? You can get closer to them and help them by supporting C. M. H. with your prayers, your intelligent interest and your offering of money and service.

Quoting Bishop Davis, "I feel so strongly that everyone of you should be an interpreter of this Agency in the Parish to which you belong and to your friends in the community."

Less than half of the absolutely necessary budget comes from the Diocese, the rest must be met from individuals or group memberships.

If we know, we care. We give of ourselves and our money to that which we are convinced is worthwhile.

Will you think and talk of C. M. H. in the coming year? If you do, you will wish to be a backer in a very real way for this work which your church is doing among young people in this Diocese.

The staff of the Church Mission of Help consists of: Executive Secretary, Mrs. Wilma A. Vanderwall; Case Worker, Miss Ellen Stone Johnson; Office Secretary, Miss Lois E. Jones. Its office is located at 237 North Street.

During the year 1935, seventy-five Branches together with the Girls' Friendly Society, have helped in some way with the Supply work of our diocese, either by sewing and making surgical dressings, sending second-hand clothing and altar hangings, or by contributing money to the Supply Fund, for the wholesale purchasing of articles needed for our missions, schools and hospitals.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUPPLY SECRETARIES

When supply work is received in the Fall, Branches will please appraise, and if for any reason your Branch is not able to fill the allotment, please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary before January 1st.

Branches receiving assignments for Personal Family boxes will please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary of their acceptance as soon as possible in the Fall and will report the sending *and the value* of these not later than December 15th.

Branches sending Personal Family boxes should communicate with the family to whom the box will be sent, giving them the date of shipment, and telling whether sent by parcel post or freight or express.

Branches working for Institutions, Missions and Hospitals will send boxes directly to the Mission for which they are working, enclosing a self-addressed return post card, in order that they may be notified of its safe arrival.

Branches are privileged to use the Standard of Values sheet, which may be obtained from the Diocesan Supply Secretary, in order to estimate the cost of making garments, which may be added to the cost of material, thus obtaining the full value. Please mark sizes on all garments.

There is no valuation of second-hand articles of clothing.

When allotment is finished please list all articles on the blue sheet and the pink sheet and the white sheet. Compute all values, including postage, on the blue sheet and the pink sheet, sending the blue sheet to the Diocesan Supply Secretary as soon as possible, and keeping the pink sheet carefully on file to be used later in making out Supply report to Diocesan President in December. The white sheet is sent with articles in box, with no values attached.

All work for the year should be finished and sent, and blue sheets returned to Diocesan Supply Secretary by May 1st at the latest.

Under no consideration should work be carried over until the next Fall.

SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT FOR 1934

The great need for relief continues unabated and the members have responded. Forty-eight branches reported, and we feel sure others have given aid. The sick and needy have been visited, drifters were contacted and given help and advice, the unemployed given free meals, entertained and classed held for them.

The following is a list of types of service rendered: Fuel, food, medicine, bedding, treats, furniture, house furnishings, clothing of all kinds, rent paid, nursing service, hospital care, glasses, surgical apparatus, surgical dressings, toys, playing cards, books, cards and flowers, positions secured, all day outings given, roof repairs, Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets, Christmas stockings, servant supplied while mother was in hospital.

The following organizations and institutions were given assistance—The Church Mission of Help was mentioned on twenty reports---we should like to see it on all---as well as the Indian Reservation, which was mentioned on very few, Buffalo Evening News 50 Neediest Families' Fund, Family Service, Red Cross, District Nursery, Marine, Children's and Millard Fillmore Hospitals, Camp Fire Girls, Seaman's Home, County Home, Episcopal Cottage at Chautauqua, Protective Service Bureau, Church Home, Salvation Army, Goodwill Industries, Protestant Home for Children, Warner Home for Aged, Agnes Home for Girls, Niagara County Infirmary, I. O. O. F. Home, Tuberculosis Sanitarium, Wyndham Lawn Orphan Home, Legion Auxiliary, African Methodist Church Grenfell Mission, St. Barnabas Home at North East, Health Camp, County Nurse, Joint Charities, International House, Council of Churches.

We hope to have a similar Retreat annually and want to interest more of our women in it. This year there were six Parishes represented with an attendance of seventeen, and though it was new to most of us, we all came away feeling that we had been distinctly helped and uplifted by the experience, and confident that such a Retreat is very much needed in our Diocesan Program.

Armistice Day was observed in many churches with a special service sent out by the Forward Movement, and the day made one of Prayer and Meditation.

Let us try in the year that is before us, to draw nearer to Christ in these special ways which are provided for our spiritual welfare.

The great number of old books collected (some two thousand of them by Mr. Coykendall) for the Junior Branch of the New York Librarians' Association, who held old book sales to raise funds for the purchase of the right books for a circulating library on the Cattaraugus Reservation, now functioning under librarians trained by professionals, it is of the greatest help to our priest in charge - - -

And an extra-diocesan request that we supply about four hundred good books for a library for a lumber camp at Atwell, N. Y., The Rev. Mr. Byron Curtiss, a retired priest of our Church, works there with zeal and devotion; and he wanted the books available to be carried in gunny sacks from one camp to another by the tote teams. He wrote "the 'boss', the 'walking boss' and even the 'straw boss' all promise to see that the books are properly cared for and transported; and the Head of Woodlands Operations, a member of our Church at Forestport, will see that they keep their word."

We are grateful to be allowed to include in our list the fine library of more than one thousand volumes which the Rev. Mr. Sanderson, retiring, distributed among many institutions and individuals.

LOOKING FORWARD WITH THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Our splendid reports for the past year make this "Looking Forward" a joyful thing. All healthy growth is marked by joy, and we have had healthy growth, and we are now looking forward to another year of study in World Fellowship.

The aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is the education of each and every member as a Disciple of Jesus Christ through worship, friendship, instruction and service, to a deepening responsibility in building up the Kingdom of God.

Dr. McGregor has said: "No person loves God as our Father wishes to be loved who does not love Him with the mind. Study is not a luxury of the Christian life, it is essential to the intelligent Christian life, and no life is fully Christian that is not intelligently Christian. To offer to God a trained mind, a mind which has worked to gain knowledge of His truth and His ways with men, is to offer to Him an acceptable sacrifice."

Every activity of the Church is an educational agency. All activities should aid us in the way of love and Discipleship.

There are many subjects for study to be considered by the Women's Auxiliary, and may I submit the following for your consideration:

I would put first the devotional and spiritual side of our work. An intensive study of the Forward Movement; the Book of Common Prayer and the Hymnal is suggested. A study of the Hymns of the Church and their place in our devotional life is one of the joyful things.

Second - - - A study of your own Parish - - - the Church School, Young People, the Vestry, Problems of your Rector, and at least one neighborhood or regional conference on Christian education.

Third - - - Current Events in the Diocese. A new History of the Diocese of Western New York is most interesting and will lead to a study of many Diocesan and Parish subjects, such as Biographies of the Bishops of the Diocese; History of the Churches in our Diocese; Church Architecture, Stained Glass Windows.

At least one program devoted to a review of the Spirit of Missions will be inspiring, and will lead to a better knowledge of the work of our Church in the World today, and of our Missionaries and Missions.

Book reviews and current events are interesting to all women. There are many books being written today well worth our thought and study. A History of the American Church; Life of Dr. Teusler; The Religion of an Englishman; Ann Lindberg's "North to the Orient" are but a few. Your secretary will be glad to send you a list of many others.

The Study Book for the year is "That Other America" by Dr. John A. McKay. This is a deeply interesting analysis of the Latin American situation, treating the relation of the Christian Church to the social and intellectual movements stirring the countries of South America, Central America, Porto Rico, Santa Domingo, the Isthmus of Panama and Mexico. The aim is to help us to see the World as God sees it, to share our love for the Living Christ, our love for humanity, to establish real World Fellowship, and to feel as did the late Dwight Morrow when he went to Mexico - - - "I don't know what they are like, but I do know that I am going to like them."

And last, I would suggest that our prayers and thoughts be directed to constructive plans for world peace and the friendly understanding between all nations. Our Quiet Days, our World Day of Prayer, and our studies of world conditions will, I feel, lead us to a firm and true understanding of all the peoples of the earth, and we will feel with John Oxenham that

In Christ there is no East or West,
In Him no South or North;
But one great fellowship of love
Throughout the whole wide earth.

In Him shall true hearts everywhere
Their high communion find;
His service is the golden cord
Close-binding all mankind.

Join hands then, brothers of the faith,
Whate'er your race may be;
Who serves my Father as a Son
Is surely kin to me.

In Christ now meet both East and West,
In Him meet South and North;

Perhaps we are the only group of workers who complain of not having enough to do. Our work seems to give satisfaction but the clergy, I fear, put our applications into the scrap basket and forget us.

We are a group of women who visit the sick in the Hospitals, who come from the Diocese *outside* of Buffalo. They come for operations and treatments, usually are lonely and depressed and it is our pleasure to cheer them and as frinds in Christ do all we can to speed their recovery.

One case will suffice to tell of the work:

A young woman, a widow, was sent by her physician, to one of our hospitals for treatment on her hip and was here for several months. She said she had been baptized in the Episcopal Church but had drifted elsewhere indifferently, but we told her that made no difference to us.

Our group visited her constantly, taking to her reading matter, religious and otherwise. One gave her a prayer book, and when Christmas came they did much to make that day a happy one.

On leaving, after expressing her appreciation for what had been done for her, she said: "When I am able to be up and around I will return to my Church in which I was baptized."
