

It is then that the hidden things are revealed, and the offerings of substance and self from every land and race and class, these garnered gifts of many hands and hearts, these secret acts of personal devotion, are heaped high upon the golden alms-basin, and borne up in one great act of worship before the throne of God and of the Lamb.

Truly there is nothing like it! So spontaneous, so simple, so sublime. Blessed are all they who have a part therein.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

and

OFFICERS' REPORTS OF 1936



The Fifty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese was held in Grace Church, Buffalo, January 19, 1937.

At 10:00 A. M., Bishop Davis celebrated Holy Communion with the assistance of Rev. G. Napier Smith, Rector of Grace Church, and Rev. Eugene M. Chapman of Randolph, N. Y. About 200 were present.

Bishop Davis made his annual address to the group, in which he expressed his appreciation for the help the Woman's Auxiliary had given him the past year. The Bishop would like much emphasis on the Forward Movement the coming year. First, by ourselves adopting the Rule of Discipleship and getting others to do likewise. Second, by meeting together in small groups for study and prayer. And third, by the Auxiliary as a whole continuing and extending the Retreats, and the Branches observing more Quiet Days.

The business meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Nixon. Hymn No. 268 was sung, after which Mrs. Eversley Ferris led the opening prayer.

Mrs. J. T. Johnson, President of Grace Church Branch, made the address of welcome. Mrs. Nixon responded by saying we were very grateful to Grace Church for their hospitality.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were approved as printed in the Year Book.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Hubbard, read the Treasurer's report, also the report of the Auditor. Motion to accept the Auditor's report was seconded and carried.

Then followed short talks by the various Diocesan officers as to their accomplishments during the past year and their hopes for the coming year.

Reports of all departments of the work will be found in the Year Book.

A motion to send greetings from this meeting to Deaconess Shaw, who is on furlough but has not yet reached Buffalo, was seconded and carried.

A motion to send a message of regret at their inability to be present to Mrs. Dyett and Mrs. Wilson, both of whom were ill, was seconded and carried.

Noonday prayers were led by Rev. G. Napier Smith.

The luncheon hour followed, which this year was an innovation. Each one brought their own lunch, and coffee, tea and milk were furnished by the hostess Branch at 5c per serving. All seemed to agree that, while it was not quite as enjoyable as the old method, it was the better way as it gave the hostesses more opportunity to enjoy the meeting.

During the luncheon hour, the Presidents and Treasurers held a conference, and the Educational and United Thank Offering Secretaries met all who wished to consult them.

The afternoon session was opened by singing hymn No. 526 and prayers by Rev. Mr. Chapman.

Mrs. Walker, First Vice-President, took the chair while the President read her Annual Message, which is also printed in the Year Book.

Miss Elsie C. Hutton of New York, Provincial President, who was present, was asked to say a few words. She expressed the hope that during the remaining months of the Triennium, the U. T. O. would be stepped up so that it would not be so far behind the last Triennium as it at present seems.

The first scheduled speaker of the afternoon was Mrs. Rettig, President of the Inter-Church Council of Women. She stressed the fact that the banding together of women of all denominations was a step forward toward mutual understanding and cooperation, and expressed the hope that there would be a

large attendance at the "World Day of Prayer" to be held in Plymouth Methodist Church on February 12th.

The offering was taken while hymn No. 477 was sung.

Miss Marston, National Educational Secretary, was the next speaker. Miss Marston has just returned from nine months spent in the Orient visiting our missions and missionaries. It is her opinion that the Church is going ahead very satisfactorily in the East. She found the women there, as here, a very vital working part of the Church.

The next speaker was the Rev. Eugene M. Chapman, who told of his rural work in and around Randolph, N. Y. He is trying to co-ordinate the work of Randolph, East Randolph, and Little Valley.

Mrs. Etta Kart, Chairman of Registration, announced that 275 persons had registered. This seemed a small number, but it was quite certain that all present had not registered.

Chairman of Elections, Mrs. Charles C. Bosche, announced 35 votes cast for the following ticket:

The Constitution Committee is composed of Mrs. Julius H. Potter, and Mrs. Clark E. Pfieffer.

The closing prayers were led by Rev. Mr. Chapman, after which the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:

I cannot wait until the end of this message to tell you what a privilege and a joy it has been to serve you and to serve with you in this new relationship of ours in the Woman's Auxiliary. You have been most patient with a new and inexperienced officer and you will never know how much your quiet, loyal cooperation has meant to me.

The reports tell us many interesting things. I have been especially impressed by the determination of the women of the various parishes to carry on under great difficulties due to reduced parish incomes. I love their spirit of devotion to the parish, which is, after all, our first obligation. But I do sense the cheerful and optimistic note and am confident that as God blesses us with increased material blessings, our Church in the Diocese and in the world will again receive the outpouring of gifts in greater abundance than ever before, through the Woman's Auxiliary and the United Thank Offering.

We are happy to welcome into our Diocesan Auxiliary two new branches: St. Paul's, Lewiston and Grace Church, Randolph. There are now 77 active branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese. An Evening Group has also been formed at St. Paul's Cathedral as a part of their Woman's Auxiliary.

These Evening Groups meet the needs of the business women and those who cannot attend afternoon meetings. A special Evening Meeting is held annually for these Groups. The last one was held at Church of the Good Shepherd on March 17th in the face of the most severe snow storm of the year. We shall try to have it late enough in the spring this year to avoid inclement weather.

And that reminds me of a recent suggestion of the National Executive Committee. If we are to pass on the torch from one generation to another, that the Woman's Auxiliary may continue to serve the Church, we must try to interest the younger women of the parish in its program. This is no new suggestion. Will you invite them to join your branch or make an effort to establish an Evening Branch or a Business Women's Club or some other type of group for the younger women of the parish, who will cooperate with the Woman's Auxiliary in its efforts to help in all of the Five Fields of Service—Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World?

An outstanding contribution to the work of the Woman's Auxiliary of the future, in this diocese, is being made in St. Matthew's parish, Buffalo, under the direction of the rector, the Rev. W. H. Crouch and Mrs. Crouch. Beginning with the smallest girls, a Junior Auxiliary has been formed. It is divided into groups, according to age. Each group is named for some Mission or Missionary project, one being called the United Thank Offering Group. Every group is expected to make a small contribution in the Little Blue Box at each meeting. There is a group leader. It is a joy to go into this parish for all the work is coordinated under the name of Woman's Auxiliary.

During the year we have added to the Diocesan Executive Committee a representative from each of the Deaneries. Through these women we hope to bring the various branches of the Auxiliary in each Deanery into closer relationship with one another and with the Diocesan officers. Successful all day meetings were held in each of the five Deaneries in the spring, with Diocesan officers holding conferences and making personal contacts with many women who seldom are able to attend the Annual Meeting.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of New York and New Jersey met in Buffalo in November at the time of the Provincial Synod, holding its annual meeting and conferences, and, upon invitation of its president, Bishop Davis, attending the Sectional Meetings of the Synod, hearing addresses and discussions on Rural Work, Religious Education, Foreign and Domestic Missions and Social Service.

Our newest committee, The Forward Movement Committee, under the leadership of Mrs. John K. Walker, has done excellent work in organizing groups of women for Retreats and Quiet Days. The work of this committee is very dear to the heart of our Bishop.

The reports show that the Auxiliary shared in the World Day of Prayer

and that the Quiet Day for Prayer on Armistice Day was observed throughout the Diocese.

This is Triennial Year. In October our Church will come together at Cincinnati to discuss problems, to gain new vision and inspiration and to make plans for the next Triennium. We ask your prayers for those who will be representing our Diocese in the various meetings.

Truly the Church has a greater and more urgent challenge today than ever before. The Worship of the Golden Calf has taken the place of the worship of Almighty God. Our leaders are calling upon us to come and "serve, worship and share."

Let us then "lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes," consecrating ourselves anew day by day in the service of our blessed Lord, and through constant intercession for our Church and our country, may they receive guidance, and wisdom, and power, and understanding to meet the problems of an unbalanced world. The Christ way of living will solve all of the problems in the world of today.

The United Thank Offering report is encouraging. A united effort of prayer with gifts should result in a glorious offering in October. You all are well aware of my deep interest in the United Thank Offering. I sincerely hope Western New York will rally to the support of the Diocesan Custodian as she redoubles her efforts to make known the message of the Little Blue Box to women who are not "sharing."

The Anything Shower, one of Mrs. Dyett's many original ideas, brought forth quantities of everything under the sun for Mr. Coykendall's Indians.

I should like to call your attention to the special feature of our 1935 Year Book, on page eleven, "The Organization of the Episcopal Church," prepared by the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Burton. It ought to be an inestimable aid to every person who really wants to know about her Church.

Time does not allow me to mention the splendid work done by other members of the Executive Committee. I want to express my grateful appreciation of the work done by all of the officers and chairmen, and their faithful and untiring devotion in helping to carry out the program for the year. They have given me their sincere friendship, courteous attention and loyal support. Whatever we may have accomplished has been done through the combined interest and work of all the members of the Executive Committee.

I cannot close without saying a word about the retiring officers. Mrs. Dyett, who has given more than fourteen years of devoted service to the Auxiliary as a member of the Diocesan Executive Committee, has been a tower of strength to those of us who have been privileged to serve with her. She is now lending her executive ability and her wise counsel to the Church Mission of Help. We congratulate the Church Mission of Help, but we are secure in the knowledge that the Woman's Auxiliary will always retain the interest and loyalty of Mrs. Dyett, regardless of where the call to service may take her. Mrs. Berry has done quietly but most efficiently the arduous task of editing the Year Book, in addition to being a patient and efficient Recording Secretary. Mrs. Wilson, who, loving the Advance Work so dearly, has gone on to the completion of her year's work, although too ill to be with us at any of our meetings. It is such women as these who make the Woman's Auxiliary a vital, living and helpful force for the extension of Christ's Kingdom in the world. We shall miss them from our meetings and we part with them with sincere regret.

I know you will want me to express to Bishop Davis our grateful appreciation for the part he so graciously takes in our meetings and we would like the busy clergymen who come in for awhile when we have Diocesan meetings, to know that their presence among us always encourages and heartens us.

And now may God bless us every one as we adventure forth into 1937. It is not given to any one of us to know what the year will bring forth. If we be His Disciples we shall have abundant faith and sufficient courage—for is not ours a call to a high service, both broad and deep and very far-reaching?—to "serve, worship and share" that Christ may be made known unto all men everywhere.

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Forward Movement Report for 1936

The first meeting of the Forward Movement Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary in our Diocese of Western New York was held on Friday, February 7th, 1936, at the home of the Chairman. Our first duty was to see to the ordering and distributing of the "Forward Day by Day" booklets, by the churches, through contacting the clergy and devotional leaders in each church in the Diocese. We also distributed, during the year, 1,450 "Forwards" to the following institutions: Buffalo General Hospital, Millard Fillmore Hospital, Deaconess Hospital, County Home, Home for the Friendless, Doctors' offices and individuals, and we were influential in getting the booklets into the Church Home, Wheel Chair Home and City Hospital. We have also spoken at many meetings. In the Diocese over 18,000 copies of the Lenten issue were distributed, which means over one to a family, as there are 11,000 families in the Diocese of Western New York. We have fallen down since last Lent and each one must make a special effort to not only reach this fine record, but exceed it. However, we do not feel that numbers are what we are striving for in this Forward Movement, but increased Spiritual growth—a deepening of our Spiritual Life, a God-consciousness in our daily life.

To develop this God-consciousness we have had more Quiet Hours and Quiet Days in many of our churches. We have been helping with the Retreat Movement and many women have attended Retreats in Toronto and Peekskill, besides the Woman's Auxiliary Diocesan Retreat held at the home of Mrs. Charles M. Kennedy at East Aurora, September 28th to October 1st. Seventeen women were present, two others attended part time. Nine different churches were represented, and it was interesting to note that two of these were Presbyterians. Dean Hale conducted the Retreat, his theme being "The Glory of God." We hope to be able to accommodate more people this year, as we have had many requests for more Retreats.

Remember that the Forward Movement is the developing of a truer sense of responsibility on the part of every member of the church. We need to be revitalized. Are you helping in this revitalizing? We have made a small beginning in the Disciples Way. "The first effort was for Life Within, along the lines of Turn, Follow, Learn and Pray. The time has come for action to Work Out on the lines of Service, Worship and Share." I beg of you, radiate Joy as you go about this work and take Christ with you wherever you go, for Christ as Joy abides within you. Be aware of His joyful presence and abide in His fullness of Joy.

Report of the Educational Secretary

"Give therefore thy servant an understanding heart"

Believing that—To do the work our Lord expects of us, we need the best preparation of heart and mind, and that unless we know, we cannot give whole-hearted aid to any cause, and that the aim of all Christian education is the development of the individual for effective Christian service—our endeavor is to make clear and deep our convictions that it is not possible to attain the highest type of Christian character without sympathy of heart for all mankind. In order to do this we must take the time and effort to make education effectual—we have to know what we are talking about. To be of any use to God, we must have an appreciation of the great program of the church—a knowledge of where and what the needs are, and how best we can share in her unresisting and unending movement to "go forward into all the world."

We have been very fortunate in the Diocese of Western New York this past year. We have had two visits from Miss Margaret Marston, our National Educational Secretary. Her visits to us have aroused greater interest and enthusiasm in our missionary work. Miss Christine Nuno's visit has also helped us to a keener realization of our need to know more about our church in the world.

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Your Diocesan Educational Secretary has visited twenty of the Branches and attended five Deanery meetings. The Educational Conference on November 17th was very helpful. Forty-two Parish Educational Secretaries attended. Out of a possible seventy-four reports, forty-two reported the use of the Mission Study Book, "Latin America" or "Mexico." Sixteen reports were returned blank, thirty reported program meetings, seven had Bible Study groups, nine have a lending Book Shelf, and twenty-four use the Spirit of Missions as a basis for Missionary study. At this writing about thirty Branches are using the Missionary study "The Negro," some the American Negro and some the African Negro. Many of the Branches are using both.

Many groups have followed the suggestions made last year to know a little more about our Prayer Book, our own Parish Church, the beauty of the stained glass windows in the Diocese, the history of the Diocese, and especially the Hymn Book. Through our reverent and thoughtful study of the beautiful hymns of our church, we are gaining a new appreciation of the strength and greatness of God, and we are finding out that "All of one's life is music if the notes are touched right and in tune."

Report of the Devotional Chairman

A parish devotional secretary is the guide to see that a definite program is carried out in her Branch. She will arrange for the opening of meetings of the Auxiliary with prayer and either lead these herself, or, better still, appoint different individuals to whom she gives suitable prayers. These prayers should be chosen to fit the subject of the meeting so that a real sense of God's interest and guidance during the ensuing discussion may be fostered.

In cooperation with the rector and Branch President the devotional secretary arranges for Days of Intercession when constant prayer is offered in the church. We cannot measure the value of such interceding for the chosen subject, but we can perceive the value in spiritual experience to the intercessors themselves. This year one such day was suggested for Lent and another for Armistice Day.

The Devotional Secretary is also concerned in promoting Corporate Com-munions of the members of her Branch when the experience of a united group kneeling before God and remembering each other in prayer uplifts the individual.

The Diocesan Auxiliary affords the opportunity for a three-day retreat which this year was held the end of September and a report on this is given by the Committee on the Forward Movement. In conjunction with the Church Mission of Help and the Girls' Friendly Society, a Quiet Day was held in the Church of the Ascension, Buffalo, on March 24th, conducted by Sister Lois of the Community of St. John the Divine, Toronto. On October 16th our Diocese joined with the women of the Episcopal Church throughout the world in a Corporate Thanksgiving for the sixty-fifth anniversary of the formation of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Remember that the pulse of a Branch can be tested by the degree of emphasis and participation which is given the devotional program.

Report of the United Thank Offering

The United Thank Offering for 1936 was about thirty dollars more than last year, but not nearly as much as we had anticipated. As this is the year of the Triennial, we all must try very hard to see that our parishes are well informed about the United Thank Offering and that our women and girls have an opportunity to use the Little Blue Box. Many parishes have a U. T. O. Custodian for each organization of women and girls—others have a large committee to canvass the parish, making personal calls on every confirmed woman and girl. They do bring results!

The diocesan U. T. O. service was held at Grace Church, Buffalo, on Sunday, June 7th, at 4 o'clock, with Rev. Alfred Williams of St. Mary's-on-the-Hill, Buffalo, as guest preacher. Since that service it has come to our attention that most dioceses have two ingatherings and we hope this can be worked out in Western New York, especially the year of the Triennial. Many parishes already have spring and fall ingatherings and we are asking every parish to do so this year. We do want to send to Cincinnati, this fall, an offering of which Western New York will be most proud.

We are pleased to know many of you are working in the U. T. O. Poster Contest sponsored by the National Executive Board. We are very proud that our president, Mrs. Frank Nixon, has been chosen one of the judges. The contest closes April 1, 1937.

"One warning we have received is that in reaching more women it is the personal motive of thanksgiving that is often emphasized but that sometimes little is said about the missionary motive for giving. Any woman can find her own cause for thanksgiving, but does she always realize that her thankful gifts are to be blessed to the coming of the Kingdom through Jesus Christ our Lord?"

Suggestions for Supply Secretaries

When supply work is received in the Fall, Branches will please appraise, and if for any reason your Branch is not able to fill the allotment, please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary before December 1st.

Branches receiving assignments for Personal Family boxes will please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary of their acceptance as soon as possible in the Fall and will report the sending and the value of these not later than December 15th.

Branches sending Personal Family boxes should communicate with the family to whom the box will be sent, giving them the date of shipment, and telling whether sent by parcel post or freight or express.

Branches working for Institutions, Missions and Hospitals will send boxes directly to the Mission for which they are working, enclosing a self-addressed return post card, in order that they may be notified of its safe arrival.

Branches are privileged to use the Standard of Values sheet, which may be obtained from the Diocesan Supply Secretary, in order to estimate the cost of making garments, which may be added to the cost of material, thus obtaining the full value. Please mark sizes on all garments.

Please send one or more boxes of second-hand clothing to the mission field each year—as early in the year as possible. There is no valuation on second-hand articles of clothing.

When allotment is finished please list all articles on the blue sheet and the pink sheet and the white sheet. Compute all values, including postage, on the blue sheet and the pink sheet, sending the blue sheet to the Diocesan Supply Secretary as soon as possible, and keeping the pink sheet carefully on file to be used later in making out Supply report to Diocesan President in December. The white sheet is sent with articles in box, with no values attached.

All work for the year should be finished and sent, and blue sheets returned to Diocesan Supply Secretary by May 1st at the latest.

Under no consideration should work be carried over until the next Fall.

A woman of deep spiritual devotion, widely travelled and of education and culture, she was still able at 87 to carry on faithfully and well into the very last week of her life. We pray that she may go on from strength to strength in the perfect service of His heavenly kingdom.

Report of the Girls' Friendly Society for 1936

The outstanding event of the year in the G. F. S. was the Triennial Conference of the National organization held at St. Louis from October 26th to November 1st, for which our Branches worked hard to raise a fund to send our member delegate, Miss Ruth Sparrow, to represent the Members' Group in this diocese. The president also had the wonderful experience of attending that inspiring conference, a report of which was given by Miss Sparrow at the Woman's Auxiliary annual meeting on January 19th, which gave a picture of our very forward looking program for the next three years. Our theme is "Knowing Our World" with special study on such subjects as: "The World at Peace," "Woman's Place in the World Today," "The Church Finds Its Community" and "Race Relationships." These subjects were conducted in Group Discussions by outstanding leaders.

Our Mission study for the year was Mexico and Mrs. Eversley Ferris came to us with her interesting message about her work in Mexico City.

The boxes of Lenten sewing, well filled with layettes and hospital supplies valued at \$119.19, were sent to St. Mary's and St. Anne's Mission, Washington, North Carolina, and to The Blessed Sacrament and St. Anne's Mission, Green Bay, Wisconsin, and medical supplies went to St. Luke's Mission, Ponce, Porto Rico. Some sheets were sent to the Episcopal Cottage at Chautauqua.

The society has made contributions to the amount of \$308.45 for St. Faith's Mission, Yangchow, China; All Saints' Memorial Fund for National Endowment Fund of the G. F. S., the Contributors' Fund for National Extension Work and for the Holiday House on Conesus Lake.

For our annual banquet our speakers were Bishop Davis and the National Head of Activities, Miss Jeannette Boothe.

The annual Candle Light Service in memory of Bishop Brent held at the Diocesan House was conducted by the Rev. E. L. Tiffany.

Youth Consultation Service of Church Mission of Help

We bring to your attention the extension of the name. At the Annual Meeting of the National C. M. H. Council it was decided to add "Youth Consultation Service" to the name Church Mission of Help in order to more clearly express the service offered to adolescent young people by the organization.

Fifteen years of work have just been completed in this Diocese. During

these fifteen years nearly 2,000 girls, most of them under 20, have had services ranging from short time advice to long term case work. Some 500 children and a considerable number of young men have also received help and often the families of the girls have also needed understanding assistance. Increasingly, young girls lacking parental guidance and equipment for life are being referred and they present a tremendous challenge. Each must be studied individually and planned with according to her need. The emotional and spiritual difficulties of many of these girls are tragic.

The small staff of case workers have been able to function only because of the loyal backing of the Board of Directors, the Council, composed of parish representatives, the clergy, and the assistance rendered by the volunteer professional services of doctors, lawyers, psychiatrists, etc.

What the next fifteen years will bring none can predict. We know that unless society is radically modified the need for our services will continue and increase. May we be given the courage, the wisdom and the support to meet the challenge with all church members whole-heartedly working in this field of Christian Social Service.
