MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING and OFFICERS' REPORTS OF 1937



The Fifty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese was held in St. John's Church, Buffalo, Tuesday, January 18th, 1938, opening with the Holy Communion at 10:00 A. M. Bishop Davis was the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Herbert S. Brown and the Rev. Frank Blackwelder.

In his annual address, Bishop Davis expressed his gratitude to the Auxiliary saying that whatever was asked of the women was given most graciously. The Bishop emphasized the theme of the Triennial—Fellowship in Faith and Work. In speaking of the hundredth year of the Diocese he referred to it as the "first fruits" of the Missionary efforts of the American Episcopal Church. He hopes that the Diocese will take a step forward in Missionary enterprise. The Bishop spoke on the lack of Church attendance, worship, and gifts to the Church, and asked that in every Parish efforts be made to bring in the lapsed and indifferent members. This will depend upon the efforts of the Auxiliary to stimulate the leadership of the Clergy.

The business meeting was opened by the President, Mrs. Nixon. Hymn 205 was sung after which Mrs. John K. Walker led the opening prayer.

Mrs. Chas. Bosche, President of St. John's Branch, welcomed the Auxiliary to the Church. Mrs. Nixon thanked St. John's for their hospitality and greeted all present.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were approved as printed in the Year Book.

Mrs. Hubbard, Treasurer, read her report and her Auditor's report. A motion to accept the Auditor's report was seconded and carried.

In place of their usual reports which are printed in the Year Book, the officers gave very short inspirational talks.

Mrs. Burton used the theme of the Triennial in suggesting a working together of the Devotional and Educational Departments.

We should look at the work of the Church as a whole and call it our work not theirs was the thought given us by Mrs. Searles in speaking of the Supply Work.

Mrs. Walker urged more use of the Forward Day by Day and asked that old unwanted copies be given to her to use in the institutions.

Mrs. Buchanan reported on the U. T. O. Triennial offering.

Mrs. Prophet said that her Social Service Department is cooperating with Social Service agencies. Her special project for this year will be Friendly Visiting.

Mrs. Guyett read an interesting letter from Miss Helen Lade in Japan.

Mrs. Ihde read Mrs. Weaver's report.

Mrs. Burton reported for the Nominating Committee and presented the ballot.

Mrs. Nixon read her report which is printed in the Year Book.

A motion was seconded and carried to send messages of congratulation from this meeting to Bishop Davis, and to Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce. They have been appointed to serve on the National Council of our Church.

Miss Elizabeth Lawrence expressed her desire that the Auxiliary assume the responsibility of giving a subscription of the Spirit of Missions to the Grosvenor Library annually.

Announcement was made of a meeting of the Evening Branches to be held at St. Andrew's Church, April 26th.

The Rev. Herbert S. Brown read the noonday prayers.

Conferences with Officers were held during the luncheon hour.

The afternoon session began promptly at two P. M. Following the singing of Hymn 534, Mrs. Ihde offered a Prayer.

Miss Elsie Hutton, Provincial President, brought a message from the Triennial, emphasizing Fellowship and Unity.

During the singing of Hymn 468 the offering for the China Relief Fund was taken.

Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins was the next speaker and told us of the conference on Church Unity at Edinburgh. She said that the way to Unity is not a side road, but the main road lying ahead into the future. The attitude and spirit of the conference was one of appreciation, understanding, and patience. Women may contribute to the fellowship at which we aim by bringing together small groups of people of different denominations and learn more about each other.

Mrs. Thomas S. Watts, chairman of the Registration Committee reported 379 persons registered, representing 47 Parishes. It was evident that many of our guests had not registered as there was doubtlessly well over 400 present.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS



Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:

The Triennial always gives fresh impetus to our work, and rightly so, for in this great gathering of Churchwomen from every part of the world one finds the very heart of the Woman's Auxiliary. Here, in a spirit of deep humility and consecration, we seek, together, the Mind of Christ.

The Findings of the Triennial, representing as they always do, a cross-section of the thinking and experience of the whole body of delegates and alternates, will serve as a background for a vital parish program carrying out the theme of the Triennial, "Fellowship in Faith and Work."

With the increasing menace of another world war, we must pray more fervently than ever before, for a lasting peace throughout the world, and as Christian women, we must do all in our power to promote peace education and cooperation with the existing peace agencies and movements with which our Church is in accord.

A closer contact with the Girls' Friendly Society will be sought by the Woman's Auxiliary through which the women and girls of the Church may be united in a program for carrying on the Mission of the Church. A meeting of the National Executive Boards of these two organizations has been called to plan such a program.

The organization of more Evening Branches of business women and girls and young mothers of small children, is another objective of the Woman's Auxiliary for the next three years. The Diocese of Western New York has a well established and steadily growing group of Evening Branches and Business Women's Clubs. Each year, following the Annual Meeting, a Supper Meeting for these Evening Groups is held, at which time the program of the women of the Church is presented for their information. The last and largest meeting so far, of this Evening Organization was held in April with the Business Women's Club of the Church of the Ascension as hostesses.

We welcome today into our Diocesan Auxiliary three new Evening Branches—the Bishop Davis Guild of the Church of the Advent, Kenmore; the Bishop Brent Guild of St. Philip's Church, Buffalo and the Cathedral Evening Branch of St. Paul's. I believe that an Evening Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary is being formed at Trinity Church, Buffalo. Another Branch to be known as the Episcopal Guild of Chautauqua has also joined the Diocesan family.

Under the splendid leadership of their respective Chairmen, the work in the five Deaneries shows steady and healthy advancement. Deaconess Shaw was the honored guest and speaker at a meeting in each of the Deaneries in the Spring, while a series of successful meetings were held in November through which the delegates to the Triennial were able to bring messages and inspiration from the Triennial to every part of the Diocese.

The United Thank Offering from Western New York showed an increase for 1934-1937. This was a great joy to all of us. Next year, in 1939, the United Thank Offering will celebrate its 50th Anniversary. Let us mark this happy occasion by a gift from every woman in the Diocese. Begin now to pray for this and ask every woman in your parish to help us make the 1940 Offering 100% in sharers.

Fifty years ago, on January 10, 1888, eight women gathered together at the Church of the Holy Communion, New York City, and inaugurated the work of the Church Periodical Club, whose loving efforts have made possible for those who are unable to provide for themselves, many much desired and needed periodicals and books. We felicitate the Church Periodical Club on its 50th birthday and pledge our continued interest and support.

Not all of the reports of the Branches have been received as yet, but most of those that I have had show increased effort and gifts. This is most gratifying as many parishes have been working under great handicaps—the obligations have remained with them but the incomes have been reduced. No one realizes that this is so more than your Diocesan Officers. So when we see an

increased volume of work that is being done and find some Branches restoring the cuts in pledges made necessary by smaller budgets, and a few other Branches report substantial increases in their pledges for 1937, we are much encouraged with the outlook for the coming year. I wish we might make our major objective for 1938 an increase in the devotional life of every parish Branch. "Let us seek FIRST the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all the rest shall be added unto us."

All Saints' Day, next, will round out a full century of life for the Church in the Diocese of Western New York. We have been celebrating Centennial Year ever since the Diocesan Convention in May, which was the 100th Convention. Still greater festivities are being planned for the coming Spring and Fall. It is indeed an unusual and exciting event for all of us—to be 100 years old! And, as this is such a very special milestone in the Church's history, I am wondering if you would care to consider a Centennial Offering in which every parish Branch may share? You may be thinking about this and your Executive Board will tell you of their plans a little later on.

I am deeply appreciative of the loyalty and cooperation of all of the Diocesan Officers and Deanery Chairmen. No president was ever blessed with a more understanding and patient band of fellow-workers. Without their untiring efforts and encouragement, the work of the Woman's Auxiliary could never have shown the progress that you will find recorded in their reports in the Year Book.

We are called on to part with our capable and efficient Supply Secretary, Mrs. Karl N. Searles, who has served in that capacity since the division of the Diocese in 1932 and also for one year previous to that, as Supply Secretary of the Buffalo District. Mrs. Searles made the Supply Department live for us as she brought to parish groups, stories of the Missions and Hospitals and even of the Missionaries for which we were working through the Supply Department. She has made for herself a warm place in our hearts and we are going to miss her gentle personality at our meetings.

To our Bishop and all the clergy of the Diocese we are most grateful; for their readiness to cooperate with us; for their understanding of our problems; for their wise counsel and encouragement. May I say a very special "thank you" to the Deans of the five Deaneries who gave so unstintingly of their time in helping to make the Spring and Fall Meetings such a success.

The Second Province has been signally honored by the election of our Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Cameron J. Davis and Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce of New York as members of the National Council. We congratulate them both on achieving this high honor and privilege which is also a great responsibility. We also extend a warm welcome to our new Provincial Representative on the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. Franklin S. Chambers of New Lisbon, New Jersey, and look forward to a happy relationship with her during the coming Triennium.

As the new year begins to unroll before us, I am constrained to quote from the Triennial Findings—"Let us keep in mind that Christianity itself never fails nor can it fail, but we fail in our witness—the first step in evangelism must always be a renewing of our own faith." Have we a faith strong enough to inspire an effective witness? Christian fellowship in faith and work can be all of that—and more. Jesus said—"Ye shall be my witnesses. Go ye into all the world."

Osgood, 147 North Street, telephone Grant 4912, of any of their parishioners who are ill and in one of our Buffalo Hospitals for treatment or for an operation, we will gladly visit them and try to cheer their shut-in hours.

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Forward Movement Report for 1937

Need one explain the Forward Movement? We should be like a Mighty Army—Forward March! I fear with some it is Forward Halt! And regret to state that others have joined the ranks of deserters of the army. The Forward Movement is a re-enlisting of all our forces to go forward each and every day.

Bishop Davis wishes us to stress Personal Visitation on the lapsed and indifferent members and to bring them back into the Church. We should put the Missionary spirit into our own parish work, re-enlist all our forces. To carry on, start the day by reading Forward Day by Day.

We have again placed 1,450 new booklets and about 500 old issues in the various Hospitals and the different Homes, etc., in Buffalo. In nearly every case we have been asked for more Forwards.

We would like your old booklets. Do not throw them away; give them to me or your Church Periodical Club Secretary. A small request but it will bring much happiness to many, especially in the hospitals.

We also distributed 150 different pamphlets of "My Own Steps Forward," "Forward Into All the World," and Calendars. All these are helpful but you know that it is the Spirit back of it all that really counts, the time we take for relaxing and going apart awhile.

It was my great privilege last summer to go to Norway, four hundred miles beyond the Arctic Circle to the North Cape. Words cannot describe the gigantic grandeur of that country:

"It's the great big broad land way up yonder,
It's the forests where silence has lease,
It's the beauty that thrills one with wonder,
It's the stillness that fills one with Peace."

We can find beauty and stillness all about us right here if we are willing to seek. "Seek and ye shall find." On January 9th in Forward Day by Day is this prayer: "O God, as I seek thee today, help me to know that thou art seeking me." So let us Seek and we shall Go Forward in 1938.

Report of the Devotional Chairman for 1938

What can the Devotional Secretary do? There are certain definite duties in the Parish and in the Diocese.

In the Parish, the devotional secretary: (1) Provides for the opening of branch meetings with prayer (especially those from the Forward Bible Reading folders). The secretary herself need not be the person who leads the opening but she should see that someone is prepared. (2) Promotes Corporate Communions in co-operation with the president who requests the rector to take action. (3) Aids in the distribution of the Forward Day-by-Day folders where the rector can use such assistance. This work applies especially to shut-ins. (4) Sponsors an observance of Armistice Day, November 11th, as a time of prayer for peace in collaboration with the rector.

In the Diocese the devotional secretary: (1) Informs her branch after consultation with the president and rector in regard to letters received from the Diocesan chairman. (2) Encourages attendance at the interdenominational World Day of Prayer which always comes on the Friday following Ash Wednesday; the Diocesan Quiet Day which this year was conducted by Bishop Davis on March 16th in St. John's Church, Buffalo; and a three day Retreat for women which was held in 1937 at Conesus Lake with Father Chalmers, O.H.C., as conductor for the sixteen women present.

The only way to judge the value of such Diocesan gatherings is by attending them.

Report of the United Thank Offering

The complete report of the United Thank Offering of all branches in this diocese, for the past three years, will be found in the Comparative Table elsewhere in this book. Please give it your careful consideration. If your branch has no star, which means no increase, won't you help to see there is an increase next time?

We had two diocesan presentation services in 1937. The spring ingathering was on May 18th at the time of the 100th Diocesan Convention at Trinity Church, Buffalo. It was a corporate communion service with our own Bishop Davis as celebrant. The Girls' Friendly Society acted as ushers and the custodians met together at luncheon and a "round table" discussion followed.

The fall presentation service was held on September 19th at St. Andrew's, Buffalo. It was a beautiful vesper service with the Rev. Charles C. C. Carver, rector of Christ Church, Rochester, as special preacher. There was an informal reception and "get acquainted" meeting after the service. Of the 79 branches who gave in 1937 to the United Thank Offering, 70 gave in the spring, 48 in the fall and 39 to both. We were much pleased with this new venture and thank you all for your loyal cooperation. We learned at the Triennial the great majority of dioceses have two such ingatherings each year.

The total amount of money presented from all dioceses at that beautiful corporate communion service on the morning of October 7th at Cincinnati, Ohio, was \$861,693.07. Ten percent of this whole offering plus all over \$800,000 has been added to the fund for retired U. T. O. workers to be known as the Ida W. Soule Pension Fund in honor of her in whose heart and mind originated this great offering of the women of the Church, the 50th anniversary of which we will celebrate in 1939.

The Diocese of Western New York shared in the Triennial Offering to the amount of \$9,426.14. We were happy to present an increase, although small. But now we must begin at once to make sure of a still greater offering in 1940. Begin with this first year of this new Triennium, help make your parish total for 1938 exceed 1937. It can be done if you will help show *every* girl and woman in your parish it is a duty and privilege to use a little blue box. "If thou hast much, give plenteously, if thou hast little, do thy diligence to give of that little."

Report of the Supply Secretary

Our women of the Diocese of Western New York paid a splendid tribute to the memory of Bishop Brent, when they responded so promptly and zealously to the need for supplies at Brent Hospital, Zamboango, Philippine Islands. Many made surgical dressings of all kinds, while others, by contributing liberally to the Supply Fund helped to buy the hospital gowns, blankets, and bedding which were needed.

Others helped in the very worthy work for the Emerald Hodgson Hospital, at Sewanee in the mountains of Tennessee, while many others made or sent substantial well-made garments to our southern missions.

Few people realize the many fine things which are being done by our Supply Secretaries who have charge of the sending of Christmas boxes to our missionaries' families. Their thorough investigation as to the needs of these missionaries, and the painstaking preparation of these boxes is a proof of the high calibre of these Supply Secretaries.

It has been a continual pleasure to work with the women of our Diocese of Western New York who give so generously of their time and money. I am most grateful for the privilege of participating in a work so far-reaching and so fine. I feel that I can never adequately thank all those whose encouragement and constant kindness has meant so much to me. Suggestions for Supply Secretaries

When supply work is received in the Fall, Branches will please appraise, and if for any reason your Branch is not able to fill the allotment, please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary before December 1st.

Branches receiving assignments for Personal Family boxes will please notify Diocesan Supply Secretary of their acceptance as soon as possible in the Fall and will report the sending and the value of these not later than December 15th.

Branches sending Personal Family boxes should communicate with the missionary's family to whom the box will be sent, asking them whether they prefer money, or the articles requested. They should tell them, approximately, when the box will be shipped, and whether by parcel post, freight or express.

Branches working for Institutions, Missions and Hospitals will send boxes directly to the Mission for which they are working, enclosing a self-addressed return post card, in order that they may be notified of its safe arrival.

Branches are privileged to use the Standard of Values sheet, which may be obtained from the Diocesan Supply Secretary, in order to estimate the cost of making garments, which may be added to the cost of material, thus obtaining the full value. Please mark sizes on all garments.

Please send one or more boxes of second-hand clothing to the mission field each year—as early in the year as possible. There is no valuation on second-hand articles of clothing.

When allotment is finished please list all articles on the blue sheet and the pink sheet and the white sheet. Compute all values, including postage, on the blue sheet and the pink sheet, sending the blue sheet to the Diocesan Supply Secretary as soon as possible, and keeping the pink sheet carefully on file to be used later in making out Supply report to Diocesan President in December. The white sheet is sent with articles in box, with no values attached.

All work for the year should be finished and sent, and blue sheets returned to Diocesan Supply Secretary by May 1st at the latest.

Under no consideration should work be carried over until the next Fall.



Report of the Girls' Friendly Society

The G. F. S. goes forward into 1938 with a good record of work accomplished in 1937. The mission activities were stimulated by our study of the Negro, for the Mission Object of the national G. F. S. was the contribution of \$2,000 towards the work of Bishop Demby among the Negroes of the south, to which sum our diocesan society contributed a portion.

Three Lenten boxes with a goodly supply of clothing and hospital supplies were sent off to the Galilee Mission, Creswell, N. C.; St. Philip's Mission, Little Rock, Ark., and Brent Hospital, Zamboango in the Philippines, the valuation of which was \$85.48.

The society has made donations to the amount of \$364.77 for the National Mission Object, the All Saints' Memorial Fund for National endowment of the G. F. S., the Contributors' Fund for extension field work, St. Faith's Mission, Hangkow, China, and a Bontoc Scholarship; and for our own Holiday House, owned jointly with the Diocese of Rochester.

The season at the Holiday House was of outstanding success and 100 girls and women from our diocese spent their vacations there during July and August. This has become one of our most important projects and we cordially invite those outside the society to avail themselves of this vacation spot with its recently modernized facilities and its delightful situation on Conesus Lake. It is also available out of season to other groups for meetings and conferences.

At our annual banquet we were most fortunate in having as our speaker Deaconess Shaw to whom we presented a gift of \$25.00 for her work in Bontoc. For the Semi-annual Meeting we had interesting reports of the General Convention from Miss Gunning and Miss Sparrow, two of our members' group who attended that inspiring conference.

Our new Branch at All Saints, Lockport, is now strengthening our organization with a very large group of members, probationers and candidates and we are most happy to welcome them as a vital factor in our fellowship.

For our touch with rural work The Record is going each month to Miss Viele who finds it helpful in her work with young people of the communities where she is carrying on the work of our church with such marked success. This service is available to all other rural workers who will just ask us for it.

The annual All Saints' Memorial Candlelight Service in memory of Bishop Brent was held as usual in the Diocesan House conducted by the Rev. J. S. Carrie.

As I now am on the list of past presidents this is my final report so I want to take this opportunity to express to the Woman's Auxiliary our very hearty thanks for their continued interest in our society and to say how helpful their cooperation is, for we feel, increasingly, that we are working on so many parallel lines that the more contacts we have with their fine organization the more we grow in strength as one of the important groups in our church for our corporate life and work in carrying on His work.

When a group of our younger girls in white dresses and blue veils took up the United Thank Offering at the service held at Trinity last spring we indeed felt ourselves a part of the Woman's Auxiliary and we hope we may continue to cooperate in such a personal way in the future.

We now commend to you our new president, Miss Florence Linke of St. Clement's Branch, one of our earnest workers over a period of years.

Social Service Report for 1937

Fifty-six branches or groups have done social service work and fifty have chairman. This is an increase of seven more groups and nine more chairman. Two thousand five hundred ninety-seven dollars and thirteen cents was given for social service which is an increase of over seven hundred dollars. In addition to the projects of the preceding year, money or sewing or clothes or assistance was given to the Grenfell Mission, the Goodwill Industries, the Charity Organization, Union Relief, County Hospital, Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Service Club for Underprivileged Children, Flood Relief, and Girl Scouts; providing musical programs for institutions and Braille books for the blind; and cooperating with the Children's Agent and the Children's Court; and promoting and organizing a council for social agencies.

Report of the Educational Secretary for 1937

The Diocesan educational activities for 1937 have been encouraging. Fifty Parish Branches have reported some educational work.

While the general sentiment seems to be an opposition to the Mission study books, there has been a great advance of interest in many other vital religious studies. Many of the Parish Branches are making a very great effort to promote adult education generally, and the Woman's Auxiliary has taken a leading part in Parish programs, and, interest in adult education in the Church has shown a marvelous growth and development.

In a number of Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary every meeting includes in its plan for the day some aspect of the many problems confronting the world today, thus promoting and strengthening our Christian World Fellowship.

The Triennial addresses on Fellowship in Faith and Work, the Minutes of the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, the movement for Christian unity growing out of the Oxford and Edinburgh conferences, our attitude toward the problems of War and Peace, Social and Economic Life, Church and State, are being studied by the majority of the Branches.

The Mission study for this year is interesting. Rural America is a subject very much in the minds of all the Nation, from our "First Lady" to the most isolated woman in our Land. The rural work in our Diocese is intensive, and should be the concern of each and every Auxiliary woman.

The Moslem World is proving a most fascinating subject for study, and is having a wide appeal. This is also a "front-page" subject, and there is much available and popular material in magazines, newspapers and libraries, which make for more general, intelligent and easy discussion and reading.

The program of women's work for the Church is broad enough for every woman to find her place in it, and the lack of regimentation leaves each local group free to adapt the program to their own peculiar circumstances. Human beings are the most interesting objects on earth, and to know ourselves and each other in a fellowship in faith and work is the ultimate aim of each and every one of us.

All Missionaries received their \$5.00 Christmas gift, and on time, thanks to all branches co-operating. We have received many grateful acknowledgments proving these gifts are very much appreciated. Please include your \$1.00 in next year's budget and send it to your Diocesan Chairman as early as possible.

Our Aim is still to have representation in each Branch. There seems to be more interest shown each year. Our Annual Report blank will help you in recording your activities. Appoint someone in your Branch to co-operate with your Group Chairman if you have not already done so.

Miss Alice Bingham visited Buffalo this Summer. She was an inspiration to those who were fortunate enough to see her at that time.

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Garrett have been reported to have left China and retired from Missionary service. It is believed the climate did not agree with them.

Deaconess Shaw, being on furlough from the Philippine Islands, spent a month in Western New York from April 20th to May 20th. We arranged a

busy itinerary for her and every section was given an opportunity of seeing her and hearing about her work. Her sweet and charming manner won its way into the hearts of all of us and we were able to get a very good picture of her wonderful work. An inspiration to all. She returned to the P. I. on October 30th, expecting to be on the job before Christmas.

We regret that Fr. Wood was obliged to shorten his furlough and return to China. He expected to visit Western New York, but was only able to spend a short time at his home in Batavia. Our prayers will follow him.

Let me especially urge your indulgence with Foreign Missionaries in China and Japan. They are experiencing many hardships and cannot reply to your letters as readily as you might hope. Postage alone is double since last year and they are having to sacrifice a great deal just now. Write them often. They need your moral support.

The following will give you an idea of the scope of correspondence necessary to carry on the work during the past year: 93 Personal letters, 79 form letters, 136 Post cards, 14 Birthday cards, 13 Easter cards, 13 Christmas cards and 1 sympathy card.

It is with much regret that I leave this Missionary Contact work after three such pleasant years of association with you, but I do want to thank you all for your help and encouragement. I feel very much enriched for this beautiful experience, and let me urge you to continue this same loyalty to my successor.

Youth Consultation Service of Church Mission of Help

A Church Case Work Agency for Youth

To all who so loyally supported the organization through 1937 with their gifts, their prayers, their volunteer services of many kinds and their warm interest, it is a pleasure to report that we came through the year without a deficit. This in spite of the fact that the Diocesan appropriation was of necessity cut to \$250.00, while our expenditures were \$6,150.00.

On this amount we were able to provide service to a total of 340 individuals. Of this number 151 were girls in need of intensive work over a period of months. Seventy-nine were children and 44 were young men, while 66 were short contacts. All adolescents today are finding the world a difficult place in which to get a foothold and this is particularly true of the group which come to the doors of CMH, sent by churches, social agencies, schools, hospitals, courts and individuals. The help they need is not relief alone, although that is often the first step, but it is the more intangible thing of understanding and friendliness, of "mental" and "spiritual" relief. To have a part in extending such help is a very blessed privilege.

The work of Dean Hale as Chaplain was outstanding in personal relationships with these young people and with the staff. Monthly celebrations were held at the Cathedral with prayers of intercession. In combination with the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society a "Day of Devotion" was held March 16th in Christ Chapel, Trinity Church, with Bishop Davis as conductor. On Sunday afternoon, October 31st, a well attended service was held at St. Paul's Cathedral with the Rev. Almon R. Pepper, National Executive Secretary of CMH preaching on social service as exemplified in the work of the organization.

A step forward in cooperation within the church was voted recently by the Church Charity Foundation to take effect in January, 1938. This provides that the Child Welfare Committee shall function through CMH, its funds being used for a limited number of girls and children for whom the Committee will assume special responsibility. This gives to CMH the valuable counsel of a group, within the church, long familiar with social work problems.
