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
FOREWORD

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

Fiftieth Anniversary

1889-1939



MRS. RICHARD H. SOULE

One of the great spiritual forces in the life of the women of the Church, the United Thank Offering, had its inception in the heart and mind of a devoted Churchwoman, Mrs. Richard H. Soule. October 3, 1939, will mark the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of this Offering.

On February 17, 1939, Mrs. Soule celebrated her ninetieth birthday at her home in Brookline, Massachusetts. During her long and fruitful life, Mrs. Soule, born in Boston as Ida Whittemore, has lived in thirteen dioceses and entered actively into the life of her Church wherever she happened to make her home. For four years Mrs. Soule lived in Buffalo, N. Y., at the southwest corner of Allen and North Pearl Streets and attended Trinity Church.

The United Thank Offering grew out of a Corporate Communion Service, for as the women of the early days began their meetings with a service of thanksgiving, they felt that it was not complete without an offering of thankfulness. In 1883 the Holy Communion was administered for the first time to the women of the Auxiliary gathered together as a representative body.

In 1886, Mrs. Soule went to the General Convention at Chicago, from the Diocese of Western New York. About five hundred women attended the Service, with which the Auxiliary began its General Meeting. When the Service was over, Miss Julia Emery, Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, asked Mrs. Soule to help count the Offering. It was less than one hundred dollars! This was a great disappointment to Mrs. Soule and she felt that it was because no one knew for what purpose the offering was to be used.

Before it was time for the next Triennial, Mrs. Soule, then in the Diocese

of Pittsburgh, wrote Miss Emery suggesting that she choose and publish in the Church papers at least one month before the Meeting, some work for which the offering at the Meeting might be used. Mrs. Soule's letter, signed simply, "A Member of the Auxiliary," was printed in the September issue of the Spirit of Missions, together with a few lines by Miss Emery suggesting the offering be used to erect a Church building in Alaska and to send a woman teacher to Japan, and that each project would require \$1,000.

The offering presented October 3, 1889, at Church of the Holy Communion, New York City, fell short of this goal. At the afternoon meeting Miss Emery announced that the amount would be sufficient only to send Miss Lisa Lovell to Japan for one year, and then she read the following note: "Dear Miss Emery, please let me build the little chapel all myself. Please tell the ladies, but please do not tell them who I am"—and there was a check for \$1,000. And so Christ Church, Anvik, Alaska, was built and the United Thank Offering established.

The growth of this unique Offering has been steady, reaching its highest point at Washington in 1928, when \$1,101,450.40 was poured out upon the Great Golden Almsbasin. The reason this Offering has such an outstanding appeal is that it expresses in concrete form the outpouring of the thanksgivings of the women of the Church from every corner of the world and is given by women for the use of women missionaries in helping to spread Christ's Kingdom to all parts of the world. At the 1937 Triennial the "Ida W. Soule Pension Fund of the United Thank Offering" was established in honor of the founder of the Offering. This Fund will provide a retiring allowance for women workers in the Field.

We note in the Spirit of Missions for November, 1895, the amount of the first Offering presented by Western New York was \$1,727.94. The first Custodian for our Diocese was Mrs. Theodore White of Rochester, 1901-1908. Other women who have carried on this consecrated work are Mrs. William L. Davis of Rochester, who was the mother of the Rev. Alanson Davis, rector of St. James' Church, Batavia; Mrs. Herbert P. Woodward of Batavia; Mrs. C. A. Champlin of Hammondsport; Mrs. Martin Schang of East Aurora; Miss Elizabeth Lawrence of Buffalo whom we love for her splendid inspiration and leadership; Mrs. E. C. Way of Rochester who carried on the work during the three years preceding the division of the Diocese of Western New York; Mrs. Frank H. Nixon of Buffalo, 1932-1936, first Custodian of the newly divided Diocese, and the present Custodian, Mrs. Ross G. Buchanan of Lockport.

The Altar in Church of the Holy Communion, Buffalo, is the altar on which the first United Thank Offering was presented, and was given to the Buffalo Church by Church of the Holy Communion, New York City, in 1915. It is marked by a bronze tablet erected in 1933 by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western New York. In commemoration of the Fiftieth Anniversary, the women of the Diocese will present their Offering on this historic altar on October 3, 1939, at a special Anniversary Service, and will receive Communion kneeling at the same rail at which those women who gave the first Offering knelt just fifty years ago. The Rev. Benjamin S. Sanderson, rector emeritus of St. Mark's Church, North Tonawanda, is the only person to our knowledge now living in this Diocese who was present at that Service.

The thought comes to one of what this Offering really might be if all the women of the Church were "shareers" and it kindles our imagination! Surely there is no woman who cannot spare something to send the gospel message to others. There is no gift so worthy to be offered as that which will carry to His children the knowledge of His love. May we celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the United Thank Offering by trying to reach every woman and girl "that ALL may give thanks and share."

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

and

OFFICERS' REPORTS OF 1938



The Fifty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Western New York was held in Trinity Church, Buffalo, Monday, May 15th, 1939, opening with the Presentation of the United Thank Offering and Corporate Communion Service. The Rev. Wm. Thomas Heath was celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Napier Smith.

We regret the inability, due to illness, of Bishop Davis to attend this meeting.

The business meeting was opened by the President, Mrs. Nixon. Hymn No. 492 was sung and Mrs. Eversley S. Ferris led the opening prayers.

Mrs. James H. Dyett, President of Trinity Branch, welcomed all to the Church. Mrs. Nixon thanked Mrs. Dyett and Trinity Church for their hospitality and greeted all present.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were approved as printed in the Year Book.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Hubbard, read her report, and the report of her Auditor. A motion made to accept the Auditor's report was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Buchanan read the U. T. O. Annual Report and told of the plans for celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the U. T. O. this fall.

Mrs. Weaver reported a total of \$437.06 in the Centennial Reserve Fund.

In reporting on the Supply Work, Mrs. Guyett asked that more second-hand clothing be sent to the Missionaries.

Mrs. Senior reported for the Nominating Committee and presented the ticket.

Mrs. Julius H. Potter presented the amendments to Article V, Sec. 1 and 2 of the Constitution and Sec. 3 to be added to Article III of the By-Laws. These amendments were adopted and the Constitution was accepted as amended. The Resolution governing the Centennial Reserve Fund was adopted.

Mrs. Nixon read her report which is printed in the Year Book.

Impressive Noon-day devotions were led by Miss Grace Lindley on the subject of Fellowship in Faith and Work.

During the luncheon hour Officers' Conferences were held which proved most helpful to both Diocesan and Branch Officers.

The afternoon session opened at 2:15 with the singing of Hymn No. 483 and prayers by Mrs. Weaver.

The first speaker was the Rev. Harold Kelleran of North Tonawanda who told of the work among the isolated. To a large extent, the Diocese is rural and it has become quite a problem to reach all the people who are out of touch with religious education. By means of the Church School Advent Offering, weekly letters from the Bishop have been sent out, at first to 150 and now to nearly 300 people. These letters contain a suggested service, a sermonette, and a closing prayer. Mr. Kelleran's report shows definitely a step forward in Religious Education.

During the singing of Hymn No. 480 the offering was taken which was given to the Missionary Shortage.

Miss Grace Lindley, National Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was the next speaker. Using for her subject three important topics—tests Christianity must meet today; what the Woman's Auxiliary has to offer at this time and some things to do immediately. She said that Christianity must be alive in America or it cannot be exported. Dr. Lindley

said that the Auxiliary must take its share in meeting the responsibility upon our Church today.

Mrs. John Caldwell, chairman of the Registrations, reported 285 people had registered from fifty branches.

The Chairman of Elections, Mrs. Charles MaGuire, announced fifty ballots cast for the following ticket:

The President declared these officers elected.

Mrs. Lawrence Sparfeld read the report of the Resolutions Committee which was adopted and is appended.

A telegram from the women of the Rochester Diocese sending greetings to this Convention, and best wishes to Miss Smith were read.

Mrs. Nixon very graciously gave the gavel to the newly elected President, Miss Smith, who thanked Mrs. Nixon and then gave a short address using as her motto:

"Expect great things from God
Attempt great things for God."

Miss Smith appointed Mrs. Frank H. Nixon and Mrs. Charles M. Kennedy on the Nominating Committee. Mrs. Eversley Ferris, Mrs. William E. Townsend and Mrs. William Edgley were appointed from the floor.

The Constitution Committee is composed of Mrs. Julius H. Potter, Dr. Frances N. Boynton and Mrs. Cameron J. Davis.

Mrs. Frank C. Weaver and Mrs. Richard H. Reading were named on the Finance Committee.

On motion the meeting was adjourned and closing prayers were read by the Rev. Mr. Kelleran.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western New York:

How fortunate are those of us who have been privileged to serve in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary during these closing years of the first century of the Church in Western New York and are now adventuring forth into the beginning of a new century, with its visions of glorious things still to be accomplished for the coming of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

Reports from the branches tell a graphic story of deep and abiding faith and great courage with which the women of the parishes have faced the ever increasing problems of a changing world order. My heart goes out to all of you in gratitude for the splendid way in which you have shown your loyalty to the cause of Christ thru an increased devotion to His Church.

You have responded to my plea of last year for strengthening the devotional life by reporting more devotional leaders. I hope more branches will appoint someone to take charge of this very important part of our Auxiliary program. I do wish, so much, that we might spend more Quiet Hours and Quiet Days together in Our Father's House, gaining thereby, added strength so badly needed in these days. The Forward Movement Committee continues to serve by placing "Forward Day by Day" in hospitals and other institutions.

The number of branches doing Educational work increased during 1938, and there were quite a number of groups reporting Study classes on *India* and the *City Church*. In October we joined with the women of other Communions in a world Institute for Missions. A very good attendance of Episcopalian was reported for the two days.

Under the efficient leadership of the new Supply Secretary, Mrs. Guyett, and in spite of cuts in the gifts of money used to purchase supplies for hospitals and other institutions in the Mission Field, the Supply work has been kept up to the standard. We hope you will not only continue your interest and help in this much needed work, but will try to do more than you did last year.

Filled with enthusiasm for the United Thank Offering, Mrs. Buchanan has worked tirelessly trying to reach every woman in the diocese with the message of the Little Blue Box. I am sure we are very happy to hear her report an increase both in our own diocese and in the Church at large. The year 1938 seemed to be filled with the joy of anniversaries—the 50th of the C. P. C. and 100 years of the Diocese of Western New York. And now we are to have another 50th Anniversary. How splendid that Mrs. Soule, the Mother of the United Thank Offering, is still with us at ninety years of age, and that she is to be honored throughout the Church during this Anniversary Year of the U. T. O.

At last our dream of a permanent trust fund has become a reality. May I thank you all for your generous support in the founding of the Centennial Reserve Fund. It is to be hoped that this is only a beginning and that it will grow thru the years by added gifts and legacies. We were made very happy at the time of the Diocesan Centennial Celebration by a gift of \$100 from Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins of Rochester, a former president of the Western New York Branch. We are grateful to Mrs. Stebbins for her continued interest in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in Western New York.

In connection with the Diocesan Celebration, last May, the Woman's Auxiliary sponsored a meeting for the women of the diocese at Trinity Church. Miss Helen Brent was the guest speaker. A number of our former friends and associates from the Rochester diocese were also our guests. Greetings from the Rochester Branch were brought to us by the president, Mrs. Frederick J. Tunmore, and Mrs. Harry E. Clarke of Syracuse, president of the Central New York Auxiliary, brought us the good wishes of the women of her diocese.

This year, Friendly Visiting was the special objective of the Social Service Chairman. We believe this type of visiting, under the direction of the rector,

can be of infinite help to him in discovering the needs of the various members of his parish. A pamphlet on Friendly Visiting is to be published shortly, the outcome of an Institute held last fall at Diocesan House, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Prophet.

The Interchurch Council of Women has been reorganized as the Women's Department of the Buffalo Council of Churches and we are to be represented on the Board by Mrs. Charles M. Kennedy. Let us give to this new Federation of Churchwomen in our city our loyal co-operation. On May 4th the first of a series of May Day Luncheons was held in all parts of the country, sponsored by the National Committee of Churchwomen, and at the Buffalo May Day Luncheon, at the Consistory, the speaker was Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins of Rochester.

A forward step was inaugurated early last year by the Diocesan Treasurer, in the hope that we might increase the Auxiliary Budget thru increased pledges. More than half of the branches increased their pledge and others became pledgers for the first time. Your Diocesan officers wish me to express their sincere appreciation for your generous response. The resignation of Mrs. J. Edward Hubbard as Diocesan Treasurer was accepted with regret as she has been a faithful and conscientious custodian of the diocesan funds thru a period of great financial difficulty. We are deeply grateful to her for these years of service.

In the closing of St. James' Church, Buffalo, the Auxiliary lost two strong and loyal branches—the Senior Auxiliary and the Harriet Hayes Smith Guild. We welcome for 1938, two new branches, the Bishop Brent Guild of Trinity Church, an Evening Branch, and the Martha Scott Auxiliary of St. Stephen's Church, Niagara Falls. Another Evening Group is being formed at St. Philip's Church and a group of younger girls has been organized at St. Jude's Church. We shall hear more about these later.

The eighth Annual Meeting of Evening Groups was held at St. Mary's-on-the-Hill, April 13th, with a larger attendance than ever before—well over two hundred were present to welcome Bishop and Mrs. Davis, our guests for the first time. A full report of this meeting will be found elsewhere in this Year Book. May I suggest that you use the reports and other material found in this Year Book at your fall meetings.

We are pleased to report the appointment of Mrs. Mervyn F. Clark, the former Kathryn Bartlett, as liaison officer between the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Y. P. F., the G. F. S. and other groups of younger women in the diocese. Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce, member of the National Council, and Miss Margaret Jefferson, Field Secretary of the G. F. S., were guests at the November Board Meeting. We were glad to learn more about the National Council and the program of the G. F. S. and to hear ways in which we might, thru our interest, bring into the work of the Auxiliary, the younger women of the Church.

A very successful presidents' conference was held at the Church of the Ascension in January. It was an informal discussion group and everyone contributed something either thru questions or by suggestions and ideas. All present agreed it would be helpful to have more such small conference groups during the year.

Eight members of the Board were privileged to attend a two-day conference of the officers of the Auxiliary in the four dioceses in the western end of the state at Watkins Glen, in June. This conference was sponsored by the officers of the Second Province and was made possible thru the kindness of Miss Elsie C. Hutton, president of the Second Province. Much in the way of inspiration was gained thru an interchange of ideas and methods.

I should like to pay a loving tribute to the memory of Miss Alice G. Bingham who went from Buffalo to be a teacher at the Blue Ridge Industrial School at Bris, Va., many years ago, and whose untimely death in March, 1939, came as a great shock to those of us who knew her. We shall remember with grateful thanks her beautiful and unselfish life of service for others.

I wish to record my deep appreciation of the splendid service rendered by the five Deanery Chairmen. They did a most commendable piece of work in

planning and organizing the meetings for women held under the auspices of the Auxiliary, in connection with the fall Deanery Meetings under the direction of Bishop Davis. These Chairmen have been helpful to the diocesan officers in many ways and have become a vital part of the diocesan work.

To all the officers who have served with me on the Executive Board during the three years that I have been your president, and to everyone of the loyal members of the Woman's Auxiliary in all of the parishes, I want to say a word of grateful thanks and sincere appreciation. It has been a wonderful experience and a very great joy to have served with you in this intimate relationship. The Bishop and clergy of the diocese, too, have stood by me in such a fine manner giving advice and helpful co-operation whenever I have called upon them. I am filled with thanksgiving for these good years that we have had, working together, side by side, in the service of our Master. I know you will give to your new president the same loyalty and support.

In closing I would like to recall to your mind several of the outstanding thoughts and themes given to us by our leaders in the work. There is a curious and purposeful coherence, it seems to me, in these various themes, and I am constrained to put them together in the following manner, for your consideration, as you go on to greater things in this new century, just beginning.

"If we be His Disciples let us pray more and love more and let us put our love into deeds, that we as Christian women, through fellowship in faith and work, may help to bind the world together so that the Kingdoms of this world may become the Kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ."

He expressed his surprise and gratification at finding so large a membership, especially as their work was so intimately tied up with the work of the Diocese in all its departments. He cited the diversity of work accomplished by means of a unified program of worship, education and service.

The amount of the offering for the evening was \$23.30. It was voted to send the offering to the Bella Vista Home for Children, Panama City.

The following members of the Executive Board of the Auxiliary, gave brief reports of their work: Mrs. John K. Walker, Mrs. Charles M. Kennedy, Mrs. Frank C. Weaver and Mrs. Ross G. Buchanan.

Mrs. Nixon introduced the Rev. Harold Kelleran, rector of St. Mark's Church, North Tonawanda, who explained the work of the Department of Religious Education in respect to "work among the isolated" of which he is the Chairman.

Mrs. Frank L. Janeway, who was the guest speaker, gave a most interesting address on "Christian Unity."

After the closing prayers by the Rev. Mr. Kelleran, the meeting was adjourned.

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Report of the Educational Secretary

At the Golden Anniversary of the Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary held in Rochester in May, 1931, Mrs. S. Denness Cooper in her history of Our Fifty Years said: "Since its earliest days the Auxiliary has stood for education, and this perhaps is a Department that requires more special training than the others, and the most difficult in which to maintain a high standard on account of the constant change in educational methods and the distaste on the part of many to read and think. We must 'know to grow' so let us with increased knowledge hope our work in the future will go far beyond our really fine achievements of the past."

What we pray for we must have the faith to work for. True prayer is followed with action. We are working with God when we try to get His will achieved in the Church, in the community, in the state, and in the world as we build the world community. There are four paths to certainty—authority, intuition, reason and experiment. The Woman's Auxiliary is an educational force in the Church. For many years it has helped to create public opinion for the Church's work. Through the use of many educational methods, interest in the Church and devotion to its Mission is increased.

The 1938-1939 Year Book lists eighty-three Parish Branches. Fifty-three of these Branches list an educational secretary. The report sheets were sent to all the Branches listed in the Year Book. Seventy report sheets were returned. Of these, fifty-seven Branches reported some educational work during the year. Thirteen Branches returned blank sheets—with nothing but the name of their Parish Branch to identify them. Thirteen of the Branches listed in the Year Book made no report of any kind. Thirty reported the use of the Mission study recommended by the National Council.

The special missionary emphasis for 1939-1940 will be Christ and the World Community, against a background of the meeting of the International Missionary Council at Madras. The book specially recommended for group study is "Through Tragedy to Triumph." "Homeland and Harvest" is the book recommended for supplementary reading on the Christian missionary enterprise in this country; and there is an excellent series of programs on World Peace, Christian Unity and Supply Work prepared and recommended by the Program Committee of the National Executive Board.

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Social Service Report for 1938

Sixty-six branches or groups have done social service work, and fifty-nine auxiliaries have social service chairmen. This is an increase of ten branches or groups, and nine chairmen. Three thousand forty-one dollars and eighteen cents was given to social service work, four hundred and forty-four dollars more than the amount given last year. This means gifts of actual money, for the many gifts of food supplies, clothing, flowers, furnishings, and the time spent in sewing, transportation, providing programs, and visiting cannot be computed in terms of dollars and cents. Much more social service work is reported this year which is most encouraging.

We have had friendly visiting as our special project, and this has also increased this year. Last fall the committee on parish social service, of which I am chairman, of the Diocesan Department of Social Service, sponsored an institute for training volunteer friendly visitors at the Diocesan House for five successive Monday evenings. There were two sessions on "How can we do friendly visiting" by Miss Marjorie Wallace, chief probation officer of the Erie County Juvenile Court; one session on "How can we discuss religion in friendly visiting" by the Very Rev. Frank Patterson, rector of Trinity Church, Warsaw; one session on "How can we use community social resources" by Dr. Niles Carpenter, Dean of the University of Buffalo School of Social Work; and the last session on "How can our church use friendly visitors in the diocese and

parish" by Rev. Sigfrid Sundin of the Church Extension Society. All the parish social service chairmen in the Diocese were invited, rectors were asked to invite any others they desired, and there was a total attendance of fifty. From the notes taken at this Institute, we have compiled a short, concise hand book with titled paragraphs, which I hope will be useful to those desiring suggestions for friendly visiting.

Report of the Devotional Chairman for 1938

The report of the Devotional Chairman can show certain statistics compiled from the forms returned by the Woman's Auxiliary branches, but the real progress in the development of the devotional life cannot thus be measured. We all know that this development is a test of vigor and the real motivation of all branch activities.

The parish devotional secretary is an important person judged by her activities which include planning for the opening of meetings with prayer, promoting Intercessions and Corporate Communions of the women, and in the observance of Armistice Day and the World Day of Prayer. She is active in arranging for attendance at diocesan Quiet Days like that held this year on March 22nd at St. Mary's-on-the-Hill, Buffalo, with the Rev. George N. Luxton of St. Catharines, Ontario, as conductor.

The branch reports bring out the need for greater cooperation in taking advantage of the diocesan Quiet Days. Less than half of those reporting were represented in 1938. Also let us stress the value and importance of Corporate Communions this year as the proper beginning for any season or endeavor in the branch program.

The following are statistics given on the annual report blanks: 60 Branches reported. 5 Reports not filled in. 33 Branches joined in World Day of Prayer. 40 Branches observed Armistice Day. 22 Branches attended the Diocesan Quiet Day. 116 Corporate Communions held. 23 Parish Quiet Days. 118 Parish Days of Intercession.

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Report on Contact with Our Western New York Missionaries

It has taken a year for your chairman to get her new work in hand and become acquainted with its plan. The efficient set-up as handed over to her by Mrs. Guyett deserves special commendation. It has been my desire to carry it on that same way.

Everything seems to be going on smoothly for our missionaries in this country, their work, of course, curtailed by lack of funds. Our deepest sympathy lies with those in China and Japan, especially in China where so much hardship and grief have come through the devastation of war. Extensive refugee work is going on by these strong, self-sacrificing men and women serving in God's vineyard. I mention especially Rev. Robert E. Wood and Mrs. E. P. Miller, Jr. Fr. Wood has written long letters picturing vividly the horrors and tragedies as the result of the war, and the difficulties the missions and schools are having in carrying on the work of the Christian Church.

Chairmen of branches have faithfully directed the sending of birthday, Christmas and Easter cards to their respective Prayer Partners. Many letters have also been written assuring them of our confidence—our appreciation and our prayers.

Each missionary received a Christmas gift of \$5.00. I am grateful for the prompt response to this fund. Acknowledgments show this gift to be greatly appreciated. Already a few contributions for this year's gift-fund have been received. Please include this \$1.00 in your budget and send it as soon as it is convenient.

The following is a report received from Mrs. George F. Ames:

"During the current year the Auxiliaries of St. Paul's Cathedral, the regular and evening branches, St. Thomas' Church, St. Jude's Church, and St. Matthew's Church, which form the Missionary Group, of which I am Chairman, have assisted our Missionary, Miss Alice G. Bingham, of the Blue Ridge Industrial School, Bris, Va., in the following ways:

"The two branches of St. Paul's have made and sent eight dozen napkins, two dozen dust cloths and have sent Birthday, Easter and Christmas greeting cards as well as contributing \$1.00 toward a Christmas gift. In addition to this there was also sent to one of the school girls, Joyce Bryde, a complete outfit of clothes for wear at Confirmation.

"The Auxiliaries of the other Churches in the group have each sent Birthday, Easter and Christmas greeting cards as well as contributing \$1.00 each toward a Christmas gift."

I would like other reports as praiseworthy as this one. We regret we have so few personal contacts with our Prayer Partners. Through our intercessions we meet in a very spiritual way. Let us be truly faithful.

Deaconess Bedell visited Buffalo in the Fall. Many sympathetic and interested friends had the opportunity and pleasure of hearing more about her work among the Indians.

A great shock came to us in March, 1939, when the very sad news came of the sudden death of Miss Alice G. Bingham at Elkton, Va. The funeral was held at All Saints Church where she had been a member during the years she lived in Buffalo. She gave up her teaching here to devote her life as an instructor of Home Economics at Blue Ridge Industrial School, Bris., Va. She served faithfully for many years. In the height of her unselfish service, her life came abruptly to an end. "Well done Thou good and faithful Servant." The many lives she touched were gladdened and strengthened by her influence.

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Report of the United Thank Offering

Western New York has made a fine start in this new Triennium. Although the total 1938 offering of \$3,191.78 is about two hundred dollars less than 1937, it is several hundred dollars more than the corresponding year of the last Triennium.

Our Spring presentation service was held at All Saints' Church, Buffalo, Sunday, May 29, at 4 o'clock with the Rev. William Otto, assistant rector at Trinity Church, Buffalo, as guest preacher.

On October 26, at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Buffalo, we held an all-day conference for parish custodians and others interested in the work of the U. T. O. The day began with a Corporate Communion at 10:30 A. M. with the Rev. James Cosbey as celebrant. Following the service the group met in the parish house for conference and blackboard discussion with the Diocesan Custodian. The results of this discussion are now available in printed form. After luncheon Mrs. John Prophet, Jr., custodian at Trinity Church, Buffalo, presented a group in a clever playlet "The United Thank Offering Box Convention." This was followed by an interesting talk on "The U. T. O. and the Missionary Life in Hawaii" by Mrs. Joseph Mason of All Saints Chapel, Lockport. It was a grand day!

The largest parish offering for 1938 came from St. Paul's, Buffalo, with \$535.64. Several branches showed an increase in 1938. The largest was St. Mark's, North Tonawanda. They increased from \$54.50 in 1937 to \$105.50 in 1938. It is interesting to note that they have two parish presentation services. A letter was sent out by the Rector in the Spring to all the women of the Church announcing he Spring presentation at a Corporate Communion service. After luncheon all met for a short business meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary followed by a U. T. O. play, a missionary speaker and one on the U. T. O. An ideal arrangement! The custodian at All Saints', Lockport, sent a letter with a fresh blue box to all the women on her list. St. Stephen's, Niagara Falls, also sent out letters for the first time and made a nice increase. Many groups started their friendly house to house visiting and many rectors mentioned the U. T. O. in their "Parish News." Congratulations to you all!

Let us strive harder than ever during 1939 to reach all the women of this diocese, that they may know and be given an opportunity to express their gratitude for their many blessings. For this year marks the Golden Anniversary of the United Thank Offering. Elsewhere in the Year Book you will read the story of the U. T. O. written by Mrs. Nixon. Truly we are thankful for the vision that came to the "Mother of the U. T. O." and for these fifty years of service.

Church Mission of Help, Inc. (Youth Consultation Service)

A Church Case Work Agency for Youth

Dr. William Jeffreys says, "Social work owes its very existence to the inspiration of true religion in its finest practical interpretation." C. M. H., during 1938, attempted to give a practical interpretation of true religion. It ministered to both the physical and spiritual needs of some 136 girls in the most critical years of their lives, 16 to 25, with intensive care. In addition some 47 young men and 57 children have been given service along with some 129 short care contacts, making a total of 363 individuals reached.

Girls came to CMH who wanted counsel, who needed employment, who came from broken homes, who were facing motherhood without marriage, who were actually hungry, who had never known a normal family life, who were drifting with no purpose, and girls who saw no future for themselves in the world of today. Time, skill and money were needed to even make a beginning in reaching these varied and serious problems.

The budget of \$6,000.00 was raised largely through voluntary subscriptions, Parish group gifts (mainly Auxiliary) and a Diocesan appropriation of \$500.00.

More volunteer service was rendered than in any previous year, largely by the members of the C. M. H. Council and its Social Service Committee with Mrs. A. G. Sawyer as Chairman. This Council is recruited in the main from the Woman's Auxiliary membership.

Many young people were referred for conferences and special religious needs to the Chaplain, the Rev. William Otto.

Miss Helen Olmstead, after three years of devoted loyal service as President, retired at the end of 1938 and C. M. H. goes forward into 1939 with the Rev. W. Thomas Heath as the leader.

The staff of the Church Mission of Help: Executive Secretary, Mrs. Wilma A. Vanderwall; Case Worker, Miss Adele Boehmke; Office Secretary, Miss Lois E. Jones. The office is located at 237 North Street.

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Report of the Girls' Friendly Society

I take great pleasure in presenting the report of the G. F. S. of the Diocese of Western New York, to be printed in the Year Book of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Our mission activities have been centered around two important mission fields. First: Our 1938 National G. F. S. mission gift of \$2,000 went to the mountain mission of Southwestern Virginia. Two mining camps of Dante and Splashdam. It was divided between a Church-Community House for Splashdam and an automobile for Deaconess Booth and Miss Mansfield. The G. F. members of the Diocese of Western New York were happy to have the opportunity to contribute to this much needed and worthy cause. And second: Four Lenten boxes containing twelve layettes and toilet articles, valued at \$120.49, were sent to St. Mary's-on-the-Mountain, Sewanee, Tennessee.

Gifts of money totaling \$92.31 have been made to the following: National All Saints' Memorial Fund endowment of the G. F. S., gifts to the Church, a Bontoc Scholarship and \$236.15 for our Holiday House at Conesus Lake.

One hundred forty-seven attended our Annual Banquet held at St. Mark's Parish House on Saturday, May 7th. We were fortunate in having Mr. T. E. Wintersteen, Secretary Buffalo Council of Social Agencies, as speaker. (With many thanks to Mrs. E. B. McKenna.)

One hundred attended our Annual All Saints' Memorial Candle-light Service in memory of Bishop Brent, which was held on Sunday, November 13th, at St. Luke's Church. The service conducted by Rev. J. S. Carrie was very inspiring. Mr. H. Redmill, organist.

I wish to thank Mrs. Frank Nixon for the effort she has put forth to bring about a closer relationship between our organizations. The G. F. S. needs the backing of the Auxiliary. I sincerely hope for a better understanding and cooperation with the Auxiliary. It would be a splendid step forward if we could, during 1939, help our younger girls to feel that they are a real part of the great womanhood of the Church.
