1. Parish Churches; 2. Mission Churches; 3. Communities without Churches; 4. Diocesan Schools and their Communitities; 5. Institutions; 6. Colored Churches.

Sources of information listed on inside back cover. The Diocesan Educational Secretary will print additional material and suggestions in the Highland Churchman. Visits to missions and from missionaries will give first hand information.

Conduct classes and prayer services for nearby groups without the privileges of Church services. The Bishop and clergy of the Diocese need lay help in many places where there is no Church work. Seek out isolated Churchwomen, inviting them to attend services and classes. Do some definite missionary work as teaching and Christian Social Service, securing attendance on mission services. Every woman can be a missionary. "a messenger of His grace, an ambassador of God among men, a doorway through whom Christ may enter into the world."

MAY

To guide our feet into the way of peace.

Programs on Peace for Auxiliary and other parish groups.

Education for Peace is a worldwide movement and the task of every "Church Awake."

"The carrying out of a constructive program for peace, and the use of our best efforts and strongest influence towards the promotion of international and inter-racial goodwill" is the last injunction of the Message "to which we are dedicated and committed."

Therefore the study of Peace should form part of the program of every Auxiliary. "The Search for Peace" furnishes excellent outlines for discussion classes, with suggested readings on international relations and world problems.

Church Periodical Sunday is the 1st Sunday in May. Request your Rector to speak of the work and use the C. P. C. prayer.

Many of the missions of the Diocese are situated in the most beautiful parts of our mountains. Make visits to these a part of your summer recreation.
