The Bishop's Message

*To the Women of the Church in the Diocese of
Western North Carolina:*

As we press forward in our great Forward Movement toward the goal unto the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus, let us see if practicing "day by day" will not not only make us more effective in work but also make us happier in what we do. What we do regularly and frequently has a great effect upon our lives. If religion is to mean much to us it must have regular and frequent expression. Here it is that work of the Auxiliary presents the opportunity for varied, and at the same time, methodical exercise of our Christian life. What a difference it would make in one's life if each night one would plan what he would do for God the next day, and then when the day was done see what was accomplished and what could be carried over to the following day to be added to the new duties! A few suggestions as to what one might plan to do: Read an article in the Spirit of Missions, write a friendly letter, make a call in the name of the Church perhaps to leave a "Forward Movement" booklet, to invite some one to Church or to find a child to be brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord; and so on. Great fortunes have been built in the five and ten cent business. Great accomplishments can be realized in the many acts of kindness and love offered to God day by day. The Sunday duties are taken for granted. May it be said of us all in the words of the hymn: "Day by day thou find us doing what we can."

Suggestions for Leaders:

1. These programs are only suggestive. Every branch should have a Committee to arrange a program for the year adapted to its own needs. Refer to W. A. 49 and 55. Your Diocesan Chairman of Religious Education will be glad to assist you. Use her.
2. The person who presents the program should have a conviction about the subject and approach it with earnestness and enthusiasm.
3. Promote discussion; it helps to interest people if they have a chance to express themselves.
4. See that the sick or shut-ins or isolated are informed of the program and ask them to share through the ministry of intercession.
5. We are seeking to build a Christian world order. It is an impossible task for any other agency than the Church of the Living God. Let us believe it IS possible for the Church, but only for a Church whose members are informed and spiritually alive. "The things that are impossible with men are possible with God." (St. Luke 18:37).

I. FELLOWSHIP WITH CHRIST IN FAITH

(Epiphany to Lent)

What are the principles which must characterize a Christian world fellowship? "We believe in a God . . . who cares about each member of His human family and seeks relationship with him." "We believe in a God who cares about the kind of beings you and I are and become." "We believe in a God who cares about all our relatednesses." "We believe in a God who has made us for an immortal destiny." "So God loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, to the end that all that believe in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Our Lord Jesus Christ teaches us: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, with all thy mind, with all thy

soul, and with all thy strength; this is the first and great Commandment. And the second is: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." This is the faith by which the Church must live. From this gospel grows the Christian Fellowship in Faith and Work.

PRAYER: O God, who hast made of one blood all nations of

men for to dwell on the face of the whole earth, and didst send Thy blessed Son to preach peace to them that are far off and to them that are nigh; grant that all men everywhere may seek after Thee and find Thee. Bring the nations into Thy fold, pour out Thy Spirit upon all flesh, and hasten Thy kingdom; through the same Thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Practical Suggestions:

Rededication of the whole life to Christ and witnessing wherever and whenever opportunity comes. Prayer and intercessions for missions. Attendance at meetings and Services where the Christian Mission is proclaimed and reports given of its effect upon the world today.
2. For Parish Groups: Same as above.
Cooperate with other Christian bodies in Interdenominational days of Prayer, Lenten Services during Holy Week, etc. Invite members of other Christian churches to share in Quiet Day for Prayer for Peace (Nov. 11).

THROUGH STUDY:

1. For the Individual and the Family:
Read the SPIRIT OF MISSIONS and other Church periodicals. Join Reading Circles or Mission Study Classes. Be informed of the share your Parish has in the General Church Program. Read: Volunteer Work in the Church, by Miss R. M. Gordon, 5c.
2. For Parish Groups: Same as above.
Study the Partnership Plan of the Church. Start Missionary Library or Book Shelf. Present Missionary Pageant, drama, or illustrated talk.
Study Courses: (a) The Program of the Church. (b) The Fellowship in the Church; In the East, by Bishop Azariah, 5c; In Latin America, Bishop Salinas, 5c; In the United States, Rev. P. Roberts, 5c. (c) 1937-38 Mission Study Courses: Forward in Rural America; The Moslem World. (See separate suggestions below).

THROUGH SERVICE (Including gifts):

For the Individual, Family and Parish Groups:

By systematic and sacrificial sharing of time, talents and money to forward the whole Program of the Church. Re-

cruiting Workers. Providing scholarships at Church Conferences. Cooperating intelligently with workers in the field. Sharing in work of Supply Department, Church Periodical Club, United Thank Offering, Birthday Thank Offering, Lenten Offering. Volunteer Motor Corps to provide transportation to Services and Meetings. Trying to interest the indifferent or uninterested woman, (Definite suggestions for this will be mailed upon request to the Educational Chairman).

THROUGH FELLOWSHIP:

For the Individual, Family and Parish Groups—in worship, study and service.

III. FELLOWSHIP WITH CHRIST IN WORSHIP (Easter to Trinity)

Corporate Communion once a month on Sunday preceding meeting. Quiet day, hour, and retreat. Form Prayer circle. Intercessions for definite needs and problems. Cooperate in Interdenominational World Day of Prayer and other services whenever possible. Attend Presentation Services for Birthday Thank Offering, Lenten Offering, United Thank Offering.

(Trinity to Fall)

The theme of the Triennial, Fellowship in Faith and Work, has received a new meaning and fresh power out of the Oxford and Edinburgh Conferences. In the light of this we are asked to consider the following subjects: (a) Christian Unity and Cooperation. (b) War and Peace. (c) Social and Economic Life. (d) Church and State.

Instead of giving detailed suggestions for programs on these subjects we suggest:

First, that you read the "Report of the Committee on Findings and Plans" in the "Minutes of the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary". (Free)

Second, that you read the following reports: Fellowship in Faith and Work, Oxford, 1937, Mrs. Pierce, 5c; Fellowship in Faith and Work, Edinburgh, 1937, Mrs. Stebbins, 5c. (Obtained from Woman's Auxiliary, 281 Fourth Ave., New York.

Third, that you plan special study courses on these subjects as outlined in: The Oxford Conference Study Series. Prices, series of six booklets, 75c; single copies, 15c.
