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THE PASTORAL A LETTER TO THE CHURCH

Identity, Pilgrimage, and Peace

And they continued steadfastly in the Apostles' doctrine and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and in the prayers.

-Acts 2:42

Grace and peace in Christ Jesus to the clergy and laity of the Episcopal Church, from their bishops.

Hard work and hope have marked our experience at the 67th General Convention. Signs of new life in the Church are clear. We share with you thanksgiving.

Our Book of Common Prayer, embracing now the old and the new, nourishes worship all across this Church in splendid diversity and depth. At this Convention a revised and enriched hymnal was approved and launched. In our time, renewal movements of many names have touched and transformed our personal lives. These in turn have furnished our congregations with new energies for outreach and evangelism. Encouraged by the \$150,000,000 given and pledged in the past six years to Venture in Mission, we have resolved upon new increases in giving.

Under the title of "Jubilee Ministries" we will mount an added outreach to the hungry and aged, to those distressed by sharp changes in public spending priorities, and to those disrupted by unemployment.

Under the title of "Next Step in Mission" we have responded to the call of the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council that each congregation be urged to examine its life together for the renewal of mission and ministry.

We have taken an unprecedented step in behalf of theological education, committing ourselves to enlist support of the Church's seminaries by all our congregations. We hope for 1% of their income each year, given to the seminary of choice.

Such new life is of God, and providential in its very timing. Our social order suffers decayed moral purpose and a dying hope of peace. It needs nothing more urgently than a Christian presence of fresh vigor. We cannot separate life in a reborn Church from life in a decadent and suffering world, but we can be recalled as Christians to our true and enduring identity. In the power of that identity Christians may add life to the world, refusing acquiesence in its destruction and indifference to its pain.

More and more the superpowers race each other for nuclear advantage. The future looks short for the planet. How shall we confront that stark prospect? How shall we claim hope? How shall we offer hope?

Three truths we hold before ourselves and bid our people join us in embracing:

I. Identity

First, we commend the truth of Christian history that hope was highest when the future seemed shortest. When the earliest generation of Christians gathered in devotion to "the Apostles' doctrine and fellowship, for the breaking of bread and the prayers," they lived in daily expectation of the end. History's quick close, in fire and

devastation, was a promise of the Lord. Yet, high-heartedness has never been more keen in all the generations of Christians since.

The young Church demonstrates that hope does not need a sunny future. Hope does not rise from any human power to control. It comes by gift of creation's controlling power, the love of God in Christ. That love, in command of ordinary lives, fashioned heroes, saints, and martyrs who will always be the human measure of what it means to be a Christian.

Hope is thus our heritage, a badge of our earliest identity. Hope in the face of impending calamity is what it was to be young in Christ. Hope is what it is to be young again.

II. Pilgrimage

Second, we commend the truth that for Christians life is a journey. Home is not here. Acceptance of that truth is the plain source of the early Church's lilt in the face of doom. Steadfast in "the Apostles' doctrine and fellowship" their hearts were undismayed. The earth, for all its wonder and beauty, offers no abiding place. Christians are here as pilgrims.

Human nature may know this truth, quite apart from Christian belief. Just to be human seems to set us in search of home. Great moments do give us glimpses of what home ought to be, but harsh reality intrudes: restlessness, suspicion, dread of suffering and loss, human cruelty and derangement, the multiplying weapons of hideous violence on which the arming nations squander their riches.

To be especially deplored, since we were certain it would be otherwise by now, is the determined racism that grows and hardens in the world. No less does racism and discrimination seem to yield to our commitment that they be driven from the Church. Racism festers as unfinished business in the very house of God.

All these intruders coil like the serpent into every Eden. They make any paradise partial, soiled, and often sinister.

The human heart is made for more than the earth knows how to provide, but just a moment of Christian belief can break a feverish clutch upon the world. Believing opens the heart to heaven. It sets the believer free for the hopeful pilgrimage of Christian calling.

The whole Convention experienced such a moment of release. We were gathered, nearly two thousand of us, in the mammoth cavern of an ornate old movie theater. Isolated at the microphone on stage, under a shaft of light, stood a small black man with a radiant face, Bishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa. His government has issued permission to travel, but only long enough to visit our General Convention and a few days longer. In South Africa Bishop Tutu cannot vote. In South Africa the blacks, who are 80% of the population, cannot vote. An 18 year old white male can vote, however, because of "that marvelous biological irrelevance of skin," as the bishop tartly put it.

His courage in confronting injustice comes of knowing his real citizenship. "The government," he challenged, "must know that the Church is not frightened of any earthly power." In ringing sentences he went on to warn his government, and all governments insensitive to justice, what a fearful thing it is to take on the Church of God. "More are for us than can ever be against us. A vast throng no one can count, from every nation and every tribe, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white and bearing palms in their hands, shout together 'Victory to our God.'"

To be enthralled by citizenship with angels and archangels and all the host of

heaven is to bring to earth an invincible meekness that sets the human spirit free. That spirit prevails at last over all the structures of oppression.

When Bishop Tutu finished his address, the thunder of prolonged applause could have cracked the plaster of the old walls around us. We had heard from a great pilgrim.

III. Peace

Third, we commend the truth that Christians are bidden to righteousness. Between the coming of Christ and his coming again, the credibility of the Christian cause is established and sustained by moral earnestness. Moral resolve understands love as action, not simply feeling.

Your bishops perceive the nuclear arms race as the most compelling issue in the world public order. The arms race summons all morally serious people to action. Christians and Jews and all religious people are joined by multitudes of no religious allegiance.

Thus the voice we raise in this Pastoral Letter mingles with a chorus across the earth, in and out of the churches. The chorus mounts each precious day of life on the planet, warning against the strange insanity that grips the governments of the great nations.

We take seriously the lament of the former American ambassador to the Soviet Union, George Kennan, who writes, "We are losing rational control of weapons.... We are becoming victims of the monster we have created. I see it taking possession of our imagination and behavior, becoming a force in its own right, detaching itself from the political differences that inspired it, and leading both parties inexorably to the war they no longer know how to avoid."

Most of the passion for arms in America appears to rise from fear of a predatory power. If Russia would slow down, we would slow down. If Russia would stop, we would stop. Who is free? Who is hostage to whom? From whence shall come the moral freedom to break the spiraling thrall of seeking security in instruments that only purchase a diminished safety for both countries and a mounting insecurity for the entire world?

Does any Episcopalian seriously wish at this perilous moment for a muted Church, unready to risk the corrective clarity of a heavenly citizenship? This citizenship transcends in prophetic judgment all political systems. All human freedom finally depends on the value of human life and the freedom from paralyzing fear that a transcendent allegiance bestows.

We urge upon our people the detachment of penitence and forgiveness. Such detachment quiets our worldly fevers. It reveals our true identity. We are pilgrims with first fealty to the crucified and risen Christ. Holding that identity clearly and firmly, Christians may still disagree on the means of peace. We need not disagree, however, on our need for a dedicated military. We recognize that devoted Christians serve in our armed forces, which forces we need lest the United States signal irresolution. Still, we assert that a morally serious people must consider three aspects of American policy.

• First, it is our understanding that the United States has never disavowed a policy of deterrence that intends the use of nuclear weapons in a massive first-strike against whole cities and land areas should it serve the national interest in warfare. Two hundred population centers are now targeted for such a strike. We ask, how can this policy be squared with a free nation's commitment to justice when it intends the calculated killing of millions of human beings who themselves are not on trial? We hold such an intention to be evil.

• Second, the undiminished production and deployment of nuclear weapons, even if never used, consume economic, technical, and natural resources of astronomically rising proportions. The squandering of such resources constitutes an act of aggression against the thirty children who die every sixty seconds of starvation in the world. It is a callous act of indifference to the 500 million people of the world who are underfed. We declare this to be immoral and unjust.

• Third, American fever to match the Soviet Union weapon for weapon appears to be damaging the personality structure of a whole generation. Current studies show that our children are growing up with a pervasive sense of fear, menace, cynicism, sadness and helplessness. The effect of these eroding inner sensations is to impair the ability to form stable values, a sense of continuity and purpose; and a readiness for responsibility. Insofar as a belligerent nuclear arms policy distorts the spiritual and moral formation of children, such a policy defeats the free nations from within. The decadence that marks our culture may be of our own making. We believe it can only worsen without a tide of peacemaking witness, especially the steady protest of Christian people who claim their first allegiance, declare their true identity, and recover the bravery of pilgrim people.

We believe it to be the responsibility of the United States to take the bold initiative in nuclear disarmament, and to keep on taking it. The United States is the first to possess a nuclear weapon. The United States is the only nation to have used the weapon in war. If it comes to pass that these weapons, which the United States continues to refine and aim and stockpile, are used in war again, it is difficult to believe that any history a surviving neutral nation might record would fail to fix the blame on the United States.

We, your bishops, pledge ourselves and bid our people to the ministry of peacemaking. We pledge ourselves again to weekly fasting and daily prayer for peace. We pledge action in the peace movements that press the world's leaders for swift nuclear disarmament.

We undertake this ministry not because disarmament will save the world. We do it because the world's salvation has already been secured in Christ, and we dare not neglect so great an assurance. From this resource of conquering love the ministry of peacemaking takes its rise, its courage, its dauntless hope, even though we cannot know the future.


Foreknowledge we do not need. The earth is the Lord's. Heaven is his. Both are ours by gift in their due seasons. We make our claim upon them by simple obedience to a pattern of life together laid down long ago.

Our brothers and sisters at the dawning years of the Lord would not have dreamed that pilgrims so long after them would still inhabit a spinning world, history still elaborating the complex drama of contending light and darkness. They would recognize, however, what we do at our best, whatever the language of our liturgy. It was what they did at their best, and life and the future for them were good enough to prompt rejoicing ...

New Orleans, Louisiana September 5-15, 1982

FIRST DAY

Sunday September 5, 1982

This being the day and place designated by the Presiding Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, pursuant to Article I, Section 6 of the Constitution, for the Sixty-Seventh Regular Meeting of the General Convention, the House of Bishops assembled in the Grand Ballroom of the New Orleans Hilton, New Orleans, Louisiana, in the Diocese of Louisiana, at 2:20 p.m. on Sunday, September 5, 1982, with the Presiding Bishop in the Chair.

The Presiding Bishop introduced the Primus of Scotland, the Most Rev. Alastair Haggart, appointed to be Chaplain to the House of Bishops for its 1982 meeting. Archbishop Haggart led the House in devotions.

Secretary and Assistant Secretaries

The Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, the Bishop of Tennessee, nominated the Bishop of West Texas for the office of Secretary of the House. There being no further nominations, the House cast a unanimous vote for Bishop Bailey.

The newly elected Secretary thereupon announced the names of his Assistant Secretaries, and introduced them to the House, being the following:

In Memoriam THE RIGHT REVEREND EARL MILLER HONAMAN

April 14, 1904-March 17, 1982

The Rt. Rev. Earl M. Honaman, D.D., Retired Bishop Suffragan of Central Pennsylvania, died on St. Patrick's Day, 1982.

He became the first and only Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese in 1956, serving in that post with great distinction until his retirement in 1969. He served six parishes in the Diocese before his consecration as Bishop in the Church of God.

An Army Reserve chaplain since 1934, he was called to active duty in 1941 as a chaplain with the famed 28th Division, serving until 1945. He earned the Bronze Star medal and was promoted to the position of Division Chaplain.

Earl Honaman was a man well-schooled in the Faith, but also one who practiced it and was proud of it. Determined and dedicated to the work he was called upon to do, he never shirked his duty, nor did he complain.

In his latter years he suffered much pain. Through it all he was the model of patience. He knew that his Lord had suffered, and he was prepared to do the same. May he rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon him.

5. In paragraph (4), delete the first four words of the first sentence, so that it begins, "Apostolicity is evidenced...."

6. In paragraph (4), change the second sentence to read as follows: "Apostolic teaching must, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, be founded upon the Holy Scriptures and the ancient fathers and creeds, making its proclamation of Jesus Christ and His Gospel for each new age consistent with those sources, not merely reproducing them in a transmission of verbal identity."

7. In paragraph (4), line 10, substitute the words "the Church" for the word "Christendom."

Section 1. A communicant person, ready and desirous to serve the Church as a Lay Communion Minister, may be specially licensed to this extraordinary ministry by the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in which he is canonically resident.

Section 2. Such special license shall be given only at the request, and upon the recommendation, of the Member of the Clergy in charge of the Congregation in which the Lay Communion Minister will be serving. The license shall be issued for a period of time not to exceed three years and shall be revocable at any time by the Bishop, or by the Member of the Clergy at whose request it was granted.

Section 3. Qualifications, requirements, and guidelines for the selection, training, and use of such Lay Communion Ministers shall be established by the Ordinary of the Diocese; Provided, that the functions of the Lay Communion Minister shall be limited to the following:

a) He may administer the consecrated wine at a celebration of the Holy Communion where there is an insufficient number of Priests or Deacons present.

b) After a celebration of the Holy Communion he may, if so authorized by the Member of the Clergy in charge of the congregation, administer the elements

of bread and wine consecrated at that celebration to those members of the congregation who, by reason of illness or infirmity, were unable to be present at the celebration.

Theology

The Bishop of Western North Carolina reported to the House in behalf of the Committee on Theology, and made recommendations as follows:

HOUSE OF BISHOPS' THEOLOGY COMMITTEE REGARDING LUTHERAN EUCHARISTIC PRAYERS

The Standing Commission on Ecumenical Relations has asked the Theology Committee to study the Lutheran Eucharistic prayers for use at "common, joint celebrations of the Eucharist" between Lutherans and Episcopalians to see if those prayers may be so used, in the event Resolution A-37 is adopted.

The Theology Committee has corresponded during the past several months with liturgical scholars in our several seminaries and discussed their comments. The Committee, therefore, would offer the following recommendation to guide the Bishops.

Prayer III in the *Minister's Desk Edition* of the *Lutheran Book of Worship* is based on earlier Byzantine and Roman models and is congruent with Anglican liturgical models.

Eucharistic Prayer #31 is the same as COCU prayer #4, the use of which General Convention authorized in 1979. It should not, therefore, be necessary to make a judgment regarding this prayer again. It is consistent with Anglican liturgical texts.

The Committee can recommend to the House that either prayers III or I of the *Minister's Desk Edition* (prayer I is identical with prayer #31 in the *Lutheran Book of Worship*) be permitted for use at "common, joint celebrations of the Eucharist" with Lutherans.

The Presiding Bishop adjourned the House at 4:45, following announcements by the Secretary.

Dear Bishop Allin,

Some weeks have passed since our Central Committee meeting in Geneva, and you are now in the last preparations for your Convention. I look forward to being with you later this month.

On behalf of the World Council of Churches I want to thank you and the Episcopal Church for the portrait of Bishop Sherrill which you presented to us in July. It now hangs in a place of honour in the Ecumenical Centre, befitting the man who did so much to make our headquarters possible.

Bishop Sherrill's tireless service on behalf of the Council and this building climaxed a ministry of commitment to the ecumenical movement. His leadership in his own Church and nation and in the world is a legacy of trust and an inspiration to us all. We are grateful to God that Henry Knox Sherrill gave so much of himself to the ecumenical movement, and the portrait will be a constant reminder to live up to his example. His humble modesty would, of course, have rebelled at any such memorial, but this, too, is part of his legacy and example.

Bishop Sherrill's autobiography was called *Among Friends*, and we in the World Council of Churches are grateful to have been among that goodly company. His wise countenance will now look down on many meetings so that his faith, his energy and, not least, his humour, will guide us on.

The latest gift from the Scottish Episcopal Church, of course, has been the presence and prayers of the Primus of that Church. For the first time in our history, their Chief Bishop has served as the Chaplain to our Primate and to our House.

The Most Rev. Alastair Haggart has been a genuinely spiritual delight. We have been exposed to the daily meditations of a godly man of strong faith. He radiates, in a quiet steadfast way, a personal knowledge of our Blessed Lord.

Those people, who mistakenly believe that Scots are "dour" and humorless, surely found the Primus to have a keen sense of humor ... and not at all "dour."

On behalf of all the brethren of this House, our grateful thanks go to this distinguished brother—for the gift of himself to us all.

APPENDIX II—DAY I

In Memoriam FREDERICK HENSLEY BELDEN

Frederick Hensley Belden was a rich man. Perhaps because he studied at General Seminary in the early days of the Depression and was ordained deacon and served small churches in the Diocese of Albany in those austere years from 1935 to 1942, he knew that Christians could survive with little, providing they were rich in Christ.

So he was rich in Christ. This became increasingly evident in his seven years as rector in Johnstown, New York, from 1942 until 1949; and then his power as a priest became more apparent, though he never was aware of it, in the 22 years as rector of St. Paul's in North Kingston, R.I. (Quonset Naval Base). Fred's life and manner reflected the gentleness, the caring quality of the Lord he served. Never in 17 years in the same diocese did anyone hear him complain about "the lot" of the parish clergy. Our grandmothers would have called him "a man of God," steeped in prayer, possessing a mystical touch. Because he knew he was Christ's man from beginning to end, he had no identity crisis.

Fred Belden was a very rich man. He was rich in faith. During the decade of the sixties, others, including priests two decades in the ministry, were "tossed to and fro with every vain blast of doctrine"—but Fred remained firmly anchored in the faith of his fathers and ours. He was firm without being rigid, solid without being embedded in concrete. Even while he still served the parish, many young clergy regarded him as father in God. He was confessor and spiritual director for many priests, young and old.

Fred Belden was a very, very rich man. He was rich in his family—his beloved Dorothy, a woman touched with saintliness, who shared 43 years with him; and four stellar sons and daughters, who will remain stalwart pillars of the Church for which Fred, like his Lord, gave himself unstintingly. Those children did not have to look beyond their own household for role models, as so many do. Perhaps Fred would not have been considered a powerful preacher in the eyes of the New York pulpit world. His most powerful sermon was the example of Christian family living which he and Dorothy set forth for several high school generations at the diocesan camp and conference center where he was so often chaplain. Each spring their conference on the "Christian Family" was oversubscribed by teenagers who knew the real thing when they saw it.

Because Fred Belden was such a rich man, as Bishop of Rhode Island from his 62nd birthday in 1971 (September 25) until his heart attack at the Denver Convention, September 1979, he could share with others the immeasurable riches of Christ. His episcopate was marked by tenderness and caring for his clergy and their families. The shield of the Rhode Island Diocese is the anchor, which seemed so appropriate for a bishop who had been firmly anchored in Christ for more than 44 years since his ordination as a deacon. His gentle knock opened doors of ecumenicity, as an editorial in *The Providence Visitor* of the Roman Catholic diocese made ever so clear.

So it is not unrealistic to expect that our Lord responded quickly and welcomed him home to his Father's house on November 4, 1979.

St. Paul was patron of the parish he served 22 years, and his words certainly seem appropriate for the ministry and episcopate of Frederick Hensley Belden:

For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich.

Yes, Fred Belden was a rich man because he was Christ's man; and because he was Christ's man, many who were poor became eternally rich.

In Memoriam JAMES W. F. CARMAN

The House of Bishops is saddened as it recognizes the death of James W. F. Carman, late Bishop of Oregon, and a member of this House for twenty-three years, while expressing its thankfulness for his life and ministry in our midst.

In the Diocese of Oregon, he was known as a builder and pastor. His long episcopate was a response to the Gospel imperative to preach, teach, and heal, as he gave leadership in the building or expansion of churches, hospitals, and schools the better to enable the Word to be proclaimed, the sacraments celebrated, and God's healing accomplished. He was a pastor whose door was always open to those who sought his counsel and guidance.

He was sure that a shared ministry is a productive ministry, and he generously shared responsibilities with his staff, clergy and laity. He recognized the many talents essential to a rich ministry, and he had great ability in seeking out and enlisting skilled lay people in a wide variety of fields.

In the House of Bishops, he was a beloved companion and valued associate, one who could remind us of the joy of our faith and community even in times of stress, one whose sense of humor matched his faith.

In his family, he enjoyed the love, companionship, and strong support of his wife, Phyllis, and the love and admiration of daughter, Kathy, and son, Father Charles. We share with them in their loss, and express to them our sorrow.

May light perpetual shine upon him.

In all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. — Romans 8:37

In Memoriam WALLACE EDMONDS CONKLING

Wallace Edmonds Conkling, seventh Bishop of Chicago, is remembered in his own diocese both as a builder who expanded the Church's ministry and also as one who labored to deepen and upbuild the spiritual life of his clergy and people. In the national Church, he stood as a champion of Catholic faith and order, and it was he, with the late Bishop Dun, who framed the marriage canon which was operative for a generation.

In the years of his retirement, he exercised his gifts of pastoral concern and spiritual direction in a variety of ways, and enriched the lives of hundreds of people.

We thank God for his steadfast witness and pray that he may go from strength to strength in the life of perfect service.

In Memoriam CHARLES PACKARD GILSON

Charles Packard Gilson was born in Portland, Maine, on 3 September 1899, and he died in New London, New Hampshire, on 11 August 1980.

These bare facts might seem to indicate that he never left New England, but the reverse is the case as an outline of his life reveals. After graduating from Dartmouth with a B.S. in 1921, Charles was with the Bank of America for five years, during which time he married Dorothy Alice Jenks, the daughter of an army officer. This was in 1923. Then, for the next twenty years, from 1926-46, Charles was with the Metropolitan Life in New York, Pittsburgh, and Chicago. It was during his time in Chicago that he became a vestryman and then senior warden at St. Matthew's Church in Evanston, when John

Heuss was the rector. During the war years, Charles took a seven-month leave of absence and went with the Red Cross to the Philippines and Japan. It was while he was in the Philippines, and after MacArthur's landing there, that a Japanese colonel and his men surrendered to a surprised Charles who was in a jeep. He thereupon conducted the Japanese to the nearest army stockade, and for this unsolicited exploit he was known as the "American Sergeant York of World War II."

The experience in the Far East had got into Charles' blood with the result that he was appointed treasurer and business manager for the Episcopal Church in China in 1946, and, during his time there, he studied theology with staff members of Trinity Cathedral in Shanghai. Bishop Roberts of that Diocese ordained him to the diaconate in March 1950, but shortly thereafter all foreign missionaries had to leave China. After a few months in New York, the Gilsons settled in Rhode Island where Charles became vicar-incharge of three missions, from 1951 to 1953. It was during this time that Bishop Bennett ordained him to the priesthood in 1952.

By the following year, Bishop Higgins had become Coadjutor of Rhode Island and he appointed Charles vicar of St. Michael and All Angels in East Providence. During that two-year stay, the Church got a new building, and it became a parish. There followed a three-year tour of duty as Archdeacon of Rhode Island, from 1955-58; but by this time the Far East was calling again, and Archdeacon Gilson became priest-in-charge of our Church in Taiwan. After three years in that position, the General Convention, meeting at Detroit, Michigan, in 1961, elected Charles Suffragan Bishop of Honolulu, with residence in Taiwan. He remained there until his transference to Okinawa in 1964. He came back to Rhode Island after his retirement in 1967, and became Assistant Bishop of that Diocese for the final years of Bishop Higgins' episcopate, after which the Gilsons moved to New London, New Hampshire.

The afore "bare bones" do scant justice to the man himself. Ordained comparatively late in life, at the age of fifty-one, Charles Gilson amply justified his late vocation. He was a man with a world outlook, ever the Christian missionary both in the simplest of settings and in the most elaborate. His many and intimate relations with the armed forces in the Far East did credit both to his sagacity and to the Church's mission. Most of all, and best of all, Charles Gilson possessed a profound and unshakeable faith; he was a sensitive reconciler and a faithful pastor. His great gift of friendship was a benediction and an inspiration to many people in so many places who were touched by his life.

Bishop Gilson received honorary Doctory of Divinity degrees from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary in 1961, and from his alma mater, Dartmouth, in 1966. The funeral services were conducted at St. Andrews Church in New London, New Hampshire, by the Rector, the Rev. Frederick Stecker, and Bishop Philip Alan Smith of the Diocese; the homily was given by Bishop Higgins, his friend for fifty years.

In Memoriam JOHN THOMAS HEISTAND

The House of Bishops, meeting in Chattanooga, recalls those of our fellowship who have died since our last gathering.

We note with sorrow the death of our dear brother, the Rt. Rev. John Thomas Heistand, who died November 8, 1979. We render praise and thanksgiving to God for his life, for his example, and for his ministry.

Tom Heistand was a true Central Pennsylvanian. Born in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, he spent his entire ministry in the Diocese of Harrisburg. He had a great sense of mission, and the Diocese prospered under his leadership. His presence was always able to lift the spirits of those whose lives he touched. A true servant of our Lord Jesus Christ, his deep faith was real and infectious.

We give gratitude to God for Tom Heistand and for the privilege that many of us had of knowing him.

We ask God's blessing and his continued comfort upon his wife, Alta, and his daughters, Ethel and Suzanne, and his sons, Hobart and Joseph, our brother in this House.

In Memoriam WALTER CONRAD KLEIN

The Rt. Rev. Walter Conrad Klein, fourth Bishop of Northern Indiana, died on March 1, 1980 following a long illness, in St. Paul's Parish, LaPorte, where he had lived and served as assisting priest since his retirement in 1972.

Born in Brooklyn, New York in 1904, the bishop grew up in Pottsville, Pennsylvania, and was educated at Lehigh University and the General Seminary in New York. He held three degrees from General and the Ph.D. in Semitic languages from Columbia University, and was recognized as one of the outstanding scholars of the American Church.

Ordained to the priesthood in 1928 by the Rt. Rev. Sheldon M. Griswold, Bishop Klein served parishes in New York City; Newark, New Jersey; Norristown and Haddington, Pennsylvania; and was on the faculty of the Philadelphia Divinity School from 1937 to 1942. He then entered the national service as a naval chaplain in 1943. From 1946 to 1950, he was on the staff of the Anglican Archbishop of Jerusalem, and during the latter half of his term there was Canon Residentiary at St. George's Cathedral, Jerusalem.

In 1950, Bishop Klein became professor of Old Testament literature and languages at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary, Evanston, Illinois, acting also as Assistant Dean, 1952-1959. He was chosen Dean of Nashotah House Seminary in 1959.

While there, Bishop Klein was elected Coadjutor to the Rt. Rev. Reginald Mallett, third Bishop of the Diocese, in 1963, and was consecrated on St. Peter's Day, June 29. The service was the first in the history of the diocese to be telecast. On October 28, the Feast of St. Simon and St. Jude, Bishop Mallett concluded his official functions by ordaining three young men to the priesthood in the morning and by surrendering the cathedra (the bishop's official chair) to Bishop Klein at the enthronement ceremony that evening.

During Bishop Klein's nine-year episcopate, a number of significant advancements were made, the most notable perhaps being the total restructuring of the diocesan organization in 1969. Clarification of its legislative and executive functions, and the foundation of a judicial branch, gave the diocese a more efficient and smoothly-running organization which, after ten years, stands as a tribute to Bishop Klein's considerable administrative capacities. The diocesan budget and Northern Indiana's national church quota doubled between 1963 and 1972. A number of new buildings were erected and four missions (two of them parochial) were organized. The bishop's concern for outreach bore fruit in a companion relationship with the Diocese of Costa Rica, and in a markedly increased ecumenical spirit.

In the midst of his many apostolic responsibilities, Bishop Klein continued to be in demand as a conductor of retreats, an area in which he was especially gifted. He was the author of several books, including *Clothed in Salvation*, a manual for seminarians, and a sequel, for clergy, entitled *A Priest Forever*. He wrote also a standard monograph on Jeremiah, in addition to other works dealing with scholarly and scientific questions in the fields of Semitics, Islam, and the Old Testament. A popular meditation on the Seven Last Words, *The Dying Lord*, appeared in 1963.

In October, 1971, Bishop Klein announced to the diocesan convention his intention to resign, effective the following June; and in a special election convention held at the Cathedral of St. James, South Bend, April 15, 1972, the Rev. William C. R. Sheridan, Rector of St. Thomas Parish, Plymouth, was chosen his successor.

With his wife, Helene Rosentreter Klein, Bishop Klein on his retirement (June 24, 1972) moved into an apartment made available to them by St. Paul's Church. Here he was able to continue to celebrate the Eucharist, to preach and teach, and to assist the rector, the Rev. B. Linford Eyrick, in many ways—until a few months before his death.

His Requiem Mass was offered by Bishop Sheridan in St. Paul's, assisted by Fr. Eyrick and the Rev. Canon Bradley McCormick. In attendance and participating in the funeral were the Rt. Rev. Dom Benedict Reid, O.S.B., Abbot of St. Gregory's, Three Rivers, Michigan; the Very Rev. John Reuf, Dean of Nashotah House; the Most Rev. Joseph R. Crowley, Auxiliary Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Fort Wayne-South Bend; and a large congregation of clergy, lay people, and friends. The Rt. Rev. James Montgomery, Bishop of Chicago, officiated at the Absolution of the Body, an office which he had also performed for Bishop Mallett fifteen years earlier. Interment was in the crypt of St. James' Chapel, Howe Military School, where the rector, the Rev. George Minnix, was in charge of the arrangements. An honor guard of Howe School cadets lined the route to the bishop's tomb. The mortal remains of all three of Bishop Klein's episcopal predecessors are buried in the crypt at Howe.

Mrs. Klein, much beloved in her own right, survives the Bishop, and will continue to make her home in LaPorte. Also surviving are a grown son and daughter, John and Katherine, and one grandchild.

In Our Heritage, his book on the first 75 years of the history of the Diocese of Northern Indiana, the Rev. Robert J. Center writes:

"Bishop Klein, with his diminutive frame, close-cropped hair, and concise manner of speaking, gave the impression of one tensely mobilized for an intellectual activity. His Spartan manner and cool exterior belied his human warmth and vulnerability to hurt Rigor and vigor characterized his episcopate, yet he did not behave like a martinet. Ever the scholar, he sought the *mot juste* and spoke with studied assurance, carefully enunciating each phrase. While his twinkling eyes occasionally betrayed the warmth of the man, he studiously avoided close relationships Yet, in his way, the bishop sought to be a true pastor. He was willing to drive for miles to call on a hospitalized priest and many lay persons And one could always get to Bishop Klein with a problem."

Throughout the whole of his ministry, Walter Conrad Klein was a convinced and practicing Catholic, devoted to the faith "as this Church hath received it."

Yet, as Fr. Center notes, he was never "a great admirer of hierarchical protocol nor preoccupied with the trappings of status." It was fitting and characteristic that he should be content to serve out his retirement as a simple priest. And one instinctively feels that the quiet and restrained, yet wholly dignified, rites which commended his soul to God would have had his benison.

Rest eternal grant unto him, O Lord; and let light perpetual shine upon him.

In Memoriam OLIVER LELAND LORING

Be it resolved that this House, keenly aware of the devoted ministry of Oliver Leland Loring, Bishop of Maine, express its appreciation of his labors in the spread of the Gospel and the upbuilding of the Church, and order the following statements to be spread upon the Minutes, copies of which shall be sent to the Diocese of Maine and to Mrs. Oliver Leland Loring.

Oliver Leland Loring was born in Newtonville, Massachusetts, January 5, 1904, the son of the Rev. Richard T. Loring and Mary Amory Leland, and younger brother of the late Richard T. Loring, Jr., sometime Bishop of Springfield. Educated at Harvard and the Episcopal Theological School, and later recipient of honorary degrees from Bowdoin College and the General Theological Seminary, Oliver Loring was ordained deacon in 1930 and priest a year later in the Diocese of Massachusetts. Serving in parishes of that Diocese, he was Rector of Grace Church, New Bedford, in 1941 when elected Bishop of Maine, becoming at that time the youngest bishop in the Episcopal Church. A long episcopate of distinguished service terminated when ill health compelled his retirement in 1968.

For twenty-seven years, Oliver Loring labored faithfully to extend the outreach of the Church in the largest diocese east of the Mississippi, convinced that the far-flung small towns and rural missions of Maine presented an inescapable challenge as the growing edge of the Church. The recruitment of men to undertake the sacrificial ministry this task demanded, and the care and concern for their welfare, held equal place with his zeal for the strengthening and extension of the mission of the Diocese. The weight of such labor was borne almost entirely by the bishop alone, and the accomplishments of his ministry visible in the Diocese today were due to his ceaseless self-giving of energy and time and strength.

This House records with thankfulness the example of faithful ministry Oliver Leland Loring has given to both those of us who were his companions and those who are his successors in the furtherance of the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

Rest eternal, grant unto him, O Lord; and let light perpetual shine upon him.

In Memoriam JAMES MILTON RICHARDSON

The House of Bishops was greatly enhanced on February 10, 1965, when Milton joined us through consecration as the fifth Bishop of Texas. We now take note of his absence from our visual presence with sadness, but at the same time with joyful expectation of a continuation of eternal life with Milton whom we love.

His episcopacy in Texas was carried out with a keen sense of responsibility for the Body of Christ. Institutions of the Diocese which had grown old were made new and moved by his leadership towards perfection. Milton's interest and ability served the Church well beyond the borders of the Diocese of Texas, and his contribution to us all through his many years on the Board of The Church Pension Fund is gratefully recalled. We know that his greatest joy was to serve and to give his life to many, as countless number of clergy, who knew his pastoral care, will testify. He supported all baptized people and nourished them from the store of grace which he had received from his Heavenly Father.

Those of us who had the privilege of knowing the blessings of his home, a haven for many, know that he and Gene shared a joy-filled life which was a wholesome example to his flock.

We who share the grief known by Gene and the children would assure them of our continuing affection and of our conviction that Milton knows eternal peace in the communion of the saints.

In Memoriam HENRY KNOX SHERRILL

"What first comes to my mind was his remarkable combination of forthrightness, with his understanding and consideration for those who differed from him. No one was ever in doubt where he stood personally or what his private opinions were; but he never forced his opinions on others or schemed to get them accepted. He was frequently met with opposition in the House of Bishops; but he never assumed that his point of view must be accepted and was always good natured when he was outvoted. When feelings ran high, his sense of humor broke the tension and restored perspective. There were times when he displayed a "divine impatience," but he kept our vision high and centered on the things that mattered."

This description of Bishop Sherrill by his lifelong friend and colleague, Bishop Frederic C. Lawrence, would be endorsed not only by those who knew him in this House, but by all who knew him anywhere in his ministry, at any time, and by those who disagreed with his convictions as by those who agreed. He was for our Church (and beyond), in his generation, *the* Christian statesman.

Bishop Sherrill died — as was most fitting — at his home in Boxford, Massachusetts, on Sunday, May 11, 1980. The simple funeral service was, in accordance with his wishes, held in Trinity Church, Boston, where he had been rector from 1923 to 1930, and was conducted by the rector of Trinity Church, the Rev. Thom Blair, the Bishop of Massachusetts, and the Presiding Bishop. He would have celebrated his ninetieth birthday on November 6, and the Diocese had planned to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of his consecration shortly before, on October 14.

Words cannot adequately capture the spirit of Bishop Sherrill. Many members of this House were consecrated by him, some have been touched by him, all have heard of him. A graduate of Yale and the Episcopal Theological School, he served as chaplain to the Massachusetts General Hospital Unit during the First World War, as rector of the Church of Our Savior in Brookline and of Trinity Church. He was elected Bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts in 1930 and Presiding Bishop in 1947. Upon his retirement in 1958, he returned to his home in Boxford, where he greeted old friends, heard (and sometimes gave) news of the Church, dug in his garden, and thought deep thoughts of God which he sometimes shared with humor and happiness. He lived and died close to and at peace with his Lord.

He served as first President of the National Council of Churches, from 1950-1952, and as one of the presidents of the World Council of Churches, from 1954-1960. He was a strong administrator, deeply committed to the mission of the Church, an evangelical with social concern.

He is survived by his wife, Barbara. The Sherrills had three sons and one daughter. Their daughter, Barbara Prue, is the wife of the Rev. Mason Wilson, rector of St. Andrew's in Framingham. Their sons, Edmund Knox (Ned), Franklin Goldthwaite, and Henry Williams (Harry), are all clergymen. Edmund Sherrill is the Bishop of Northern Brazil. Franklin Goldthwaite Sherrill is rector of Grace Church in Brooklyn Heights, New York. Henry W. Sherrill lives in Lancaster, New Hampshire.

Throughout his ministry and beneath all his "good works," he was sustained by his personal Christian faith and by his friends. Family and friends sustained and nourished him. The book he wrote in his retirement, autobiographical in nature, was titled *Among Friends*. Here is how he viewed his friends:

"We live in difficult times which are out of joint. I find strength and inspiration in thinking of friends who have had the supreme quality of goodness born of faith in the Christian Gospel. They stand as the shadow of a great rock in a weary land, for goodness, truth and love are eternal beyond and above our temporary vicissitudes." And here is how he viewed his Lord:

"As I anticipate the inevitability of death, it is not without some personal questions. God's ways are not our ways and he has reason for judgment of us all. But in the light of Christ's message of forgiveness and of love, in the hope of the Cross and of the Resurrection, in the fellowship of loved ones who have gone on before, without attempting to imagine any details or circumstances, I look forward to the life of the world to come."

We thank God for the life and ministry of our friend, Henry Knox Sherrill, Bishop.

In Memoriam JOHN VANDER HORST

He was a bishop of the Church of God for twenty-five years, and he knew what it meant to be a bishop. Members of the Diocese of Tennessee always knew where their bishop stood, and over the years their respect for him and for the Church grew because of him. And their affection grew as well.

His strong convictions and forthright manner would sometimes intimidate people, but his extreme sensitivity and strong pastoral instincts would still reach out to them where they were. He numbered among his closest friends many who differed with him on emotional issues of the day. A great sense of humor and a colorful style of speech made him alive and vital to be with. He demanded much of his clergy, he demanded even more of himself; and he had a deep sense of his own humanity and a corresponding joy in God's grace.

The liturgy of the Church was central to the life of Jack Vander Horst. It was high praise when he would say to a clergyman "good worship." He loved the Prayer Book and believed that clergy should use it right. His personal struggles with liturgical change showed the greatness of the man. He was a thoroughgoing traditionalist, and had a hard time being open to change. But he was utterly loyal and accepting of the authority of the Church when General Convention acted.

How appropriate to Jack Vander Horst's life and his death are these words from the Prayer Book he loved:

"Lead us in holiness and righteousness all our days that, when we shall have served thee in our generation, we may be gathered unto our fathers, having the testimony of a good conscience, in the communion of the Catholic Church, in the confidence of a certain faith; in the comfort of a reasonable, religious, and holy hope, in favour with thee our God, and in perfect charity with the world."

SECOND DAY

Friday October 3, 1980

Opening and Devotions

The Presiding Bishop called the House to order at 9:00 a.m. The Presiding Bishop introduced the Very Rev. David Collins, Dean of St. Philip's Cathedral, Atlanta, Georgia and Vice President of the House of Deputies, who led the House in morning worship. He introduced Joseph Cardinal Suenens, retired Roman Catholic Primate of Belgium, who led the first day's meditation.

Following the meditation, the Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 10:00 a.m.

Reconvened

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 10:20 a.m. The Presiding Bishop introduced the Very Rev. Alan Webster, Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, who is to speak at the noon Eucharists throughout the Interim Meeting.

The Presiding Bishop introduced the Most Rev. Edward W. Scott, the Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, who addressed the House on the ecumenical dimension of the Church's mission and the World Council of Churches. Following his address, the Bishop of Kentucky, Chairman of the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, acted as moderator as questions were addressed to Archbishop Scott.

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 12 noon so the bishops could go to St. Paul's Church for the noon Eucharist.

Ecumenical Concerns

The Bishop of Kentucky, Chairman of the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, opened the panel discussions on ecumenical concerns at 2:40 p.m. As a prelude to a more general discussion, position statements were made as follows:

The Bishop Suffragan of Dallas on dialogue with the Orthodox Churches.

The Bishop of Quincy on dialogue with the Consultation on Church Union.

The Bishop of West Missouri on dialogue with the Roman Catholic Church.

The Bishop of Delaware on the National Council of Churches.

The Bishop of Western North Carolina on dialogue with Lutherans.

The Rev. William Norgren, Associate Ecumenical Officer of the Executive Council, addressed the subject of Ecumenism in the Local Church.

The Bishop of West Missouri made a statement about the significance of the Roman Catholic Church's acceptance of ex-Episcopalians into the Roman Communion. Following the presentations, the House divided into groups at 4:00 p.m.

House Reassembles

The House reassembled at 4:35 p.m. after the adjournment of the 10 groups.

Groups 3, 7, and 9 reported their results to the House. The Bishop of Quincy reported for Group 3, the Bishop Coadjutor of Connecticut reported for Group 7, and Bishop Gross reported for Group 9.

Legislative Sessions

The Presiding Bishop opened the legislative session of the House with a reading from scripture and prayer at 5:05 p.m.

Registrations

The Secretary moved that the House change the status of Bishop Putnam, appointing him as Bishop of the Area Mission of Navajoland. Seconded by the Bishop of Central Pennsylvania.

Motion carried.

Retirement

The Secretary moved that the House accept the resignation for retirement of the Rt. Rev. Richard B. Martin. Seconded by Bishop Gosnell.

Motion carried.

The Secretary moved that the House accept the resignation for retirement of the Rt. Rev. G. Richard Millard. Seconded by the Bishop of Massachusetts.

Motion carried.

Forward Movement

The Bishop of Southern Ohio spoke on behalf of the Forward Movement and introduced the Rev. Charles Long, who addressed the House on the same subject.

Higher Education

Bishop Spofford moved a message of greeting to college students on a pilgrimage to the National Cathedral in Washington, as follows:

Resolved, That the House of Bishops extends its greetings and blessings to Bishop John Walker and the pilgrims from many traditions and colleges who, as we meet, are participating in The Pilgrimage of Suffering and Hope in our nation's capital. Since the pilgrimage ends at our National Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul on the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi who asked us always to "sow love," we send warm greetings to Brother Roger of Taizé, and Jim Wallace of the Sojourners Community, who are sharing that celebration with Bishop John Walker. This House applauds the linking of worship, prayer, and spiritual development with the serious problems of the world, in hopes that it will provide inspiration for this House, and the people of this and all churches, to engage in similar linkages and engagements. Seconded by the Bishop of Maine.

Motion carried.

The resolution is to be sent to the leaders of the pilgrimage through the Bishop of Washington.

Resignation of Cursillo Appointment

The Bishop of Louisiana asked to be relieved of his appointment as national liaison to the Cursillo Movement. The Presiding Bishop accepted his resignation. A replacement is to be appointed later.

Church Army Report

The Bishop Suffragan of New York, Bishop Wetmore, gave a report on the Church Army.

Message of Greeting

The Presiding Bishop read a message of greeting from the Regional Religious Education Coordinators of the national Church's Office of Religious Education.

Adjournment

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop adjourned the House at 5:40 p.m.

THIRD DAY

Saturday October 4, 1980

Devotional Period

The Very Rev. David Collins opened the morning devotional period with prayer, followed by singing, the Litany for Ordination, and a reading from scripture. Cardinal Suenens then led the morning meditation.

Following the meditation the Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 10:00 a.m.

Reconvene

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 10:22 a.m.

The Bishop of Tennessee introduced to the House the Most Rev. James Niedergeses, the Roman Catholic Bishop of the Diocese of Nashville, who addressed the House.

The Bishop of Tennessee also introduced the Rev. Owen Campion, editor of the Roman Catholic diocesan paper.

Theology and the Episcopate

The Bishop of Montana, Chairman of the Committee on Pastoral Development, began the House's focus on Theology and the Episcopate. He introduced panel members: the Bishop of Quincy, the Bishop of Massachusetts, the Bishop of Milwaukee, and the Bishop of Oregon. Following addresses by each of the panel members, the House recessed into groups at 11:18 a.m.

Reconvened

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 2:38 p.m. He read from scripture and led the House in prayers.

Nominations

The Bishop of Lexington, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations and Elections, nominated the Bishop of Chicago as Vice-President of the House. No other nominations being made, the Bishop of Lexington moved the election of the Bishop of Chicago. Seconded by the Bishop of Pittsburgh.

Motion carried.

Pension Fund

The Bishop of the Central Gulf Coast, Chairman of the Committee on the Pension Fund, introduced the Bishop of Chicago to address the House on behalf of the Pension Fund. Bishop Burrill also reported to the House on the Pension Fund's work.

Agenda

The Bishop of New Hampshire, Chairman of the Committee on Agenda, moved (B-12) as follows:

Whereas, transportation costs will undoubtedly continue to increase in coming years, necessitating fewer and perhaps longer meetings; therefore, be it

CHATTANOOGA MEETING

Resolved, That this House asks the Committee on Agenda to study the pros and cons of having one interim mid-triennial meeting of this House between 1982 and 1985. instead of two annual meetings; and be it further

Resolved, That a report on this matter be made at the 1981 meeting. Seconded by the Bishop of Massachusetts.

Motion carried.

Next Interim Meeting

The Bishop of New Hampshire, Chairman of the Committee on Agenda, moved (B-5), an invitation for the House of Bishops to meet at Kanuga Center, Hendersonville, North Carolina, in 1981. Seconded by the Bishop Suffragan of New Jersey.

The Bishop of South Carolina moved the matter be reconsidered in consultation with the five bishops in the State of North Carolina. Seconded by Bishop Gosnell.

Motion carried.

Resignations

The Bishop of Bethlehem, Chairman of the Committee on Resignations of Bishops, moved (B-1) to accept the resignation of the Rt. Rev. Edward C. Turner, Bishop of Kansas, for reasons of age, effective May 27, 1981. Seconded by the Bishop of the Virgin Islands.

The House stood.

The Bishop of Bethlehem moved to accept for reasons of mission strategy the resignation of the Bishop of the Central Gulf Coast, the Rt. Rev. George M. Murray, effective April 30, 1981. Seconded by the Bishop of Long Island. The House stood.

The Bishop of Bethlehem moved to accept for reasons of health the resignation of the Bishop of Connecticut, the Rt. Rev. Morgan Porteus, effective August 31, 1981. Seconded by the Bishop Suffragan of West Texas.

The House stood.

The Bishop of Bethlehem moved to accept for reasons of age, the resignation of the Bishop of Arkansas, the Rt. Rev. Christoph Keller, effective February 28, 1981. Seconded by the Bishop of Spokane. The House stood. Motion carried.

Pastoral Development

The Bishop of Montana, Chairman of the Committee on Pastoral Development, moved the following resolution:

Whereas, the demands of the Episcopal Office and the pace of life make it difficult adequately to reflect, free of pressure, on the theological implications of the role and work of a bishop; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Committee on Pastoral Development be instructed to plan regional gatherings for this purpose during 1981 for participation by bishops who might choose to attend.

Seconded by the Bishop of Oregon.

The Bishop of Lexington moved to replace "plan" with "offer" in the Resolve clause. Seconded by the Bishop of Colorado. The amendment failed.

The motion came to a vote.

Motion carried.

Pastoral Letter

The Bishop of Atlanta, Chairman of the Committee on the Pastoral Letter, moved (B-11).

Whereas, within this election year, issues of serious moral significance such as abortion, rights of women, nuclear arms race, draft, and sexuality are being debated; and

Whereas, the major and sometimes only religious voice being heard in this debate is the position known as the "moral majority"; and

Whereas, this voice is often a distortion of the Gospel message as it is a presentation made from a perspective limiting the creative response of individuals and reducing faith and reason to one position of truth; and

Whereas, this voice not only limits the rights of individuals but significant minorities within our nation, brings further strain and isolation of the poor, and claims a set of priorities that are at best confusing; be it

Resolved, That the House of Bishops encourage the Pastoral Letter Committee to concern itself at least in part with the responsibility of the Christian and the role of the Church in this election year.

Seconded by the Bishop of Pennsylvania.

The Bishop of Quincy moved deletion of the Whereas clauses. Seconded by the Bishop of Lexington.

Motion to delete carried.

The amended resolution came to a vote.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Indianapolis moved the Pastoral Letter be limited to the one issue of (B-11). Seconded by the Bishop of Kansas.

Motion carried

Recess

The Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 4:06 p.m.

Reconvene

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 4:25 p.m.

National and International Problems

The Bishop of Hawaii, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Problems, moved the adoption of the following resolution (B-13A):

Whereas, the present national defense policy—with bipartisan support—calls for the building of an immense, multibillion-dollar missile system, usually referred to as the MX system; and

Whereas, present plans locate this system in Nevada and Utah at great economic, social, and environmental cost; and

Whereas, it appears that the rest of the nation is only barely aware of the incredible extent of the project, or of the military strategy controversy related to it, or of the unimaginable and horrible consequences resulting either from its use or from its being attacked; and

Whereas, such consequences are not limited to the states in which the system is to be located, but will affect the whole nation; and

Whereas, the people of Nevada and Utah need the help of all the churches, and other concerned people, in bringing the real effects and potential consequences to the attention of all the people of the U.S. in every state; and

Whereas, time is of the essence since these plans are rapidly being cast in institutional concrete: therefore, be it

Resolved. That the members of the House urge the people and congregations of their respective dioceses to:

1. Prayer for the guidance of the Holy Spirit on this matter, and

2. Study of the MX system, the ability of the system to achieve its purpose of protection and peace, and its potential effect on the people and environment of Nevada, Utah, and the nation; and be it further

Resolved. That the results of such study be communicated to the House of Representatives and the Senate and to the President of the U.S. and the Secretary of Defense. Seconded by the Bishop of Utah.

The Bishop of the Virgin Islands moved to re-refer to the Committee for further clarification. Seconded by Bishop Rose.

The motion came to a vote.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Hawaii moved the adoption of (B-9A), submitted by the Bishop of New York. Seconded by the Bishop of Atlanta.

The Bishop of South Carolina moved that the Whereas clauses be deleted. Seconded by Bishop Gross.

The Bishop Coadjutor of Connecticut moved re-referral for rewriting the resolution. Seconded by the Bishop of Utah.

Motion to re-refer carried.

The Bishop of Hawaii moved the adoption of (B-10A) as follows:

Whereas, the Joint Commission on Peace has been requested to draft a response to the 1962 statement of this House on War and Peace for presentation to the General Convention meeting in New Orleans; and

Whereas, SALT talks affirmed by the 1976 Convention have come to an unfortunate standstill; and

Whereas, the people of the United States are being asked to support a major new expansion of nuclear arms, through the MX missile system; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this House requests that the agenda of its 1981 meeting include a consideration of present and proposed governmental policies relating to continued development of nuclear arms, including development of the MX system, and their consequences for the nation and the world; giving particular attention to pertinent statements of our Communion concerning war, peace, and the arms race; and that the Joint Commission be requested to share its preliminary findings and/or draft proposals. Seconded by the Bishop of Nevada.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Nevada read a statement on the necessity of Christians from Gospel proclamation to be peacemakers, and invited other bishops who wanted to sign the statement to do so.

The Bishop of Hawaii moved the adoption of (B-14A), as follows:

Whereas, we are called by God to be stewards of God's creation; and

Whereas, environmental concerns, as reflected in energy depletion, the disposal of hazardous waste, the utilization of resources in inequitable percentages between the peoples of the earth, are, as a consequence, reflected in issues of war, hunger, poverty, and to the jeopardy of the quality of life for all peoples, including future generations; therefore, be it

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Motion to re-refer failed.

Resolved, That members of this House commit themselves to be responsible conservators and by our actions seek to lead others to the same conviction. Seconded by the Rt. Rev. William B. Spofford.

Motion carried.

Titles

The Bishop of the Virgin Islands moved the Presiding Bishop be given additional titles, such as Archbishop and Primate.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Structure by the Presiding Bishop.

Greetings

The Bishop of Maine moved greetings be sent to the Bishop of Connecticut. Seconded by the Bishop Coadjutor of Connecticut.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Newark moved greetings be sent to Bishop and Mrs. Hines on their 70th birthdays, October 3, 1980. Seconded by the Bishop of Texas.

Motion carried.

Adjournment

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop adjourned the House at 5:13 p.m.

FOURTH DAY

Monday October 6, 1980

Devotional

The Very Rev. David Collins convened the session for the devotional period at 9:00 a.m. Joseph Cardinal Suenens then gave the morning meditation.

Following the meditation, the Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 10:00 a.m.

Reconvened

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 10:22 a.m.

Issues in Ministry

Bishop Sorge from the national Church Center presented the Issues in Ministry section of the Agenda.

Following announcements by the Secretary, the House recessed at 12 noon for the noon Eucharist at St. Paul's Church.

Reconvened

At 2:30 p.m., after the noon Eucharist and lunch, the House resumed addressing Issues in Ministry. Bishop Sorge introduced the first panel which included Mr. Barry Menuez from the Office of Lay Ministry and Women's Ministries; Dr. Fredrica Thompsett from the Board for Theological Education; the Bishop of Nevada; the Bishop of Massachusetts; and the Bishop of Pittsburgh.

After dialogue between members of the panel, the panel responded to questions from the floor.

The House recessed for a break at 3:10 p.m.

At 3:25 p.m. another panel, which included Dr. Thompsett, Mr. Menuez, the Bishop of Indianapolis, the Bishop of Olympia, and the Bishop Suffragan of Chicago, addressed the subject of recruitment. Dialogue began between panel members, and then broadened to include members of the House. Also, the Rev. Frank Turner, Black Ministry Officer for the national Church, spoke at the request of the panel. The panel concluded at 4:08 p.m.

The third panel assembled at 4:15 p.m., including Dr. Thompsett, Mr. Menuez, the Bishop of Minnesota, the Bishop of Southeast Florida, and the Bishop of Bethlehem. The focus of this panel was on Pastoral Care. Members of the panel spoke first and then other members of the House entered the dialogue. Bishop Sorge closed the forum on Issues in Ministry.

New Bishops

The Bishop for the Convocation of American Churches in Europe presented the Rt. Rev. William G. Black, new Bishop of Southern Ohio.

Lay Administration

The Bishop of West Virginia moved affirmation of lay administration of both elements of the Eucharist. Seconded by the Bishop of Olympia.

The Presiding Bishop referred the resolution to the Committee on Ministry.

Resolution referred

Interim Meeting

The Bishop of New Hampshire, Chairman of the Committee on Agenda, presented three options for the next Interim Meeting, as follows:

I. Kanuga, North Carolina;

2. Hawaii;

3. Instruct Bob Wallace to seek a regional site.

The Bishop of New Hampshire moved to hold the Interim Meeting at Kanuga. Seconded by the Bishop of Western Massachusetts.

The Bishop of Newark moved as a substitute Option 3. Seconded by the Bishop of Central Pennsylvania.

The Bishop of Newark moved to take an immediate vote. Seconded by Bishop Gosnell. Motion for immediate vote carried.

The substitute motion to adopt Option 3 won.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Western Massachusetts moved the dates of October 2-9 be agreed upon as the dates for the 1981 Interim Meeting. Seconded by the Bishop of Massachusetts. Motion carried.

The Bishop Suffragan of New York (Wetmore) indicated interest in hosting an Interim Meeting in 1984 to coincide with the 200th Anniversary of the Diocese of New York.

Board for Theological Education

Bishop Spofford, Chairman of the General Board of Examining Chaplains, moved appointment of the following replacements on the General Board of Examining Chaplains to fill vacancies:

Dr. Charles Eldon Davis, Benicia, California, to replace the Rev. Dr. Robert Estill. Mrs. Evelyn Shipman, Seattle, Washington, to replace Dr. William Hudson. The Rev. Ragan-Kelly, Palo Alto, California, to replace the Rev. FitzSimons Allison.

Seconded by the Bishop of Kentucky.

Motion carried.

Miscellaneous Resolutions

The Bishop Suffragan of New Jersey, Chairman of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, moved the adoption of (B-15A), as follows:

Whereas, some 400,000 refugees have been resettled in the U.S. during the past year; and

Whereas, it is anticipated that at least 200,000 will be admitted to the U.S. for resettlement within the next year; and

Whereas, the Episcopal Church is committed, through the Executive Council and the Presiding Bishop's Fund, to the resettlement of at least 6,000 refugees per year; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this House commends the Presiding Bishop's Fund for its work in

aiding the dioceses and parishes of this Church in the resettlement of refugees coming to this country from Asia, Eastern Europe, Africa, the Middle East, South America, and the Caribbean, and calls upon the people of this Church to continue to support this ministry both with ongoing offers of sponsorship in their parishes and communities and with the support of prayer and resources.

Seconded by the Bishop of Oklahoma.

Motion carried.

The Bishop Suffragan of New Jersey moved the adoption of (B-17), as follows:

Whereas, we are living in a time when the largest migration of human beings in history is taking place; and

Whereas, many of these people are seeking political and religious refuge on our shores; and

Whereas, we, as a Church, have already welcomed tens of thousands of refugees and immigrants from the Pacific, finding them homes, material and spiritual, schooling and jobs; and

Whereas, there continues to be a desperate need for the resettlement of Indo-Chinese, Korean, Chinese, and other peoples of the Pacific Basin; and

Whereas, the Center for Refugee Ministries at St. Anselm's Church, Garden Grove, Diocese of Los Angeles (with the assistance of the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief) stands ready to be of service to the entire Church; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this House of Bishops pledge itself to stir the consciences of our communicants to the great need for adopting refugees and immigrants, assisting them in their flight from oppression and in their pursuit of new life in the spirit, and hope for their future.

Seconded by the Bishop of San Joaquin.

Motion carried.

The Bishop Suffragan of New Jersey moved the adoption of (B-18), as follows:

Whereas, St. Andrew's School, near Sewanee, Tennessee, established by the Order of the Holy Cross and now operated by an independent Board of Trustees, observes on October 11, 1980, its 75th anniversary; and

Whereas, the school exemplifies the age-long tradition of Church-sponsored education of high quality; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the bishops of the Episcopal Church, meeting this week in Chattanooga, send to St. Andrew's School, and to all persons related to it, our congratulations on its committed Christian service and accomplishments during the past 75 years and our good wishes for all the years to come.

Seconded by the Bishop Suffragan for the Armed Forces.

Motion carried.

Resigned Bishops

The Bishop Coadjutor of Arkansas moved the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, the resignation of the Rt. Rev. Christoph Keller, Jr. as Bishop of Arkansas, to take effect on February 28, 1981, was accepted by this House on October 4, 1980; and

Whereas, his ministry as layman, deacon, priest and bishop in the dioceses of Louisiana, Mississippi, and Arkansas has been accompanied by the ministry of Caroline Murphy Keller, and they have been known and appreciated throughout the Church as caring, loving people whose lives have enriched the lives of many of us; now therefore, be it

Resolved, That this House of Bishops (and wives) expresses its profound respect and

affection for Chris and Polly Keller, and prays that God will continue to bless us with their presence for many years to come.

Seconded by the Bishop of Bethlehem.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Alabama moved the following resolution:

Whereas, George Moseley Murray has served this Church and its Lord for almost 28 years as a bishop, first as suffragan, coadjutor and diocesan in Alabama for some 17 years, and subsequently as the first diocesan for 10 years of the Central Gulf Coast; and

Whereas, he has served the greater church as a member of the Pastoral Development Committee, The Church Pension Fund Board and Committee, the Executive Council, the Board of Regents of Sewance, and as Chairman of the Committee on Rules and Orders, the Joint Committee on the Church and Human Affairs, and finally as Vice President of this House; and

Whereas, the beauty of his life is seen by many of us in the consistent manner in which he has acted on the basis of his conscience, often finding himself a critic of the administration and occasionally in the minority, but never once failing to have his Diocese carry its full share of the general Church's Program and Budget; and

Whereas, his retirement will take from us a special grace, a gentle spirit, and a tireless worker for Christ in this Church of our mutual obedience, therefore, be it

Resolved. That this House express its profound appreciation and gratitude to him for his work in the vineyard and for the gracious way he has shared his life with us, and pray that God will richly bless him and Beth in all the time to come. Seconded by the Bishop of North Carolina.

Motion carried.

The Bishop Coadjutor of Connecticut moved the following resolution:

Whereas, Morgan Porteus has given distinguished leadership to this Church in the Diocese of Connecticut for 37 years as a priest and bishop for whom the pastoring ministry has been central and unique as a leader in liturgical renewal, as pastor of pastors and encourager of the ministries of lay persons; therefore, be it

Resolved. That, as the House of Bishops accepts with regret his early retirement, we express our hope that his teaching and preaching gifts will be widely available to the Church in the next chapter of his life and ministry; and be it further

Resolved, That we send affectionate greetings to Martha and Morgan. Seconded by the Bishop of Rochester.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Western Kansas moved the following resolution:

Whereas, Edward Clark Turner has been the Bishop of Kansas for twenty-five years, but his ministry of Episcopate is distinguished not alone by length of tenure; and

Whereas, the respect and appreciation with which he is held in his Diocese is ample evidence of faithful work in the office to which he was called a quarter of a century ago. He has been a pastor to a succession of clergy and to a series of leaders in congregations. He has supported the activities of a series of women, men, and young people. He has nurtured and encouraged many different diocesan programs and plans, and has struggled mightily to adjust and revise and accommodate to the changing moods and needs of the Church over the years, both inside and outside of Kansas. He has been strong to support and defend the program of the national Church, sometimes in spite of personal reservations; and he has been constant in his attendance at the meetings of this House and of the General Convention, (endeavors which I calculate to have taken at least a full year of his 25 years of Episcopate if you consider an average of 12-15 days per year, which would include travel time); and Whereas, this House has known Ed Turner as a quiet and congenial member, serving on committees and assignments as requested and participating in extra-curricular events in every way possible. Virginia likewise has accompanied and supported her husband with a commendable loyalty and devotion; and

Whereas, knowing that Ed's retirement will become effective May 22, 1981 and that he and Virginia plan to live in a newly purchased retirement home in Colorado Springs; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this House offer them our best wishes for good health, some relaxation, and at the same time continued useful service in the Church; and the assurance of our prayers both for their future and that of the Diocese of Kansas which they have loved and served so well.

Seconded by the Bishop Suffragan of West Texas.

Motion carried.

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop adjourned the House at 6:12 p.m.

FIFTH DAY

Tuesday October 7, 1980

Devotional

Dean Collins began the devotional period at 9:00 a.m. Joseph Cardinal Suenens then gave the morning meditation. The meditation concluded at 9:55 a.m.

Communication

The Bishop of New Hampshire, Chairman of the Committee on Agenda, introduced Mr. George Reedy, specialist in the field of communication and professor of Journalism at Marquette University, who addressed the House. Following his address, questions were directed to Mr. Reedy by members of the House.

Following announcements by the Secretary, the House adjourned at 11:50 a.m. for the noon Eucharist at St. Paul's Church.

American Churches in Europe

Bishop Krumm, Bishop Suffragan for the Convocation of American Churches in Europe, filed the report on his work in the European jurisdiction and it is attached as Appendix I of this day's minutes.

Afternoon

The Bishop of Chicago, Vice Chairman, reconvened the House at 2:20 p.m.

Structure

The Bishop of Central Florida, Chairman of the Committee on Structure, presented the report of the Committee on Structure with reference to Companion Dioceses. The report is attached as Appendix II.

The Bishop of Central Florida reported that the matter pertaining to titles for the Presiding Bishop, referred to his committee, is being considered by a Joint Commission of General Convention, and therefore moved to be discharged from the responsibility. Seconded by the Bishop of Eastern Oregon.

Motion carried.

General Board of Examining Chaplains

Bishop Spofford filed the report of the General Board of Examining Chaplains attached as Appendix III to this day's minutes.

Prayer Book and Liturgy

The Bishop of Utah, Chairman of the Committee on the Prayer Book, introduced the Bishop Suffragan of Atlanta to report on the progress in hymnal revision.

The Bishop of Utah moved a substitute B-7 as follows:

Resolved. That this 1980 meeting of the House of Bishops, recognizing the wide-

spread enthusiastic acceptance of the 1979 revision of the Book of Common Prayer, encourages the Standing Liturgical Commission in its continuing study of the language of the Prayer Book, and, in particular, the way language may be used to express more clearly the Gospel's affirmation that in Christ there is neither male nor female. Seconded by the Bishop of New Hampshire.

Motion carried.

Constitution

Bishop Haynsworth, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution, moved the following resolution:

Resolved. That the phrase, "for reasons of mission strategy determined by action of the General Convention or the House of Bishops" in Article I, Section 2 of the Constitution, be construed to refer to bishops serving in jurisdictions who, in their letter of resignation, indicate their resignation to be for reasons of mission strategy, as approved by the diocese from which they are resigning and accepted by the House of Bishops.

Seconded by the Bishop of Maine.

Motion carried.

Metropolitan Ministries

The Presiding Bishop introduced the Bishop of Chicago as moderator for dialogue with the Rev. Jesse Jackson. The Bishop of Chicago, from the Joint Commission on Metropolitan Ministries, introduced the Bishop Suffragan of Chicago, who in turn introduced the Rev. Jesse Jackson. Rev. Jackson addressed the House. Following his address, he answered questions from the press who were in attendance. After the press withdrew, he answered questions from the members of the House.

Pastoral Letter

The Bishop of Atlanta, Chairman of the Committee on the Pastoral Letter, presented the first draft of the Pastoral to the House.

The House was then adjourned by the Vice Chairman at 4:35 p.m.

APPENDIX I — DAY V Report of the Suffragan Bishop in Charge of the American Churches in Europe October, 1980

Six months is not a sufficiently long time, of course, for a bishop in charge, not only of the churches in Europe but also of the "Diaspora" (which means, I guess, anywhere in the world), to make a very exhaustive report or to announce any important conclusions. Some initial impressions, however, may be in order.

My advent in Europe began auspiciously enough with an invitation to march in the procession at the Enthronement in Canterbury Cathedral on March 25th of the new Archbishop, Dr. Robert Runcie. This stopover enroute to Paris also provided an opportunity to join a meeting of five Church of England bishops who have responsibility on the continent of Europe and also for a pleasant and relaxed conference with our own Presiding Bishop, who had come over for the Enthronement.

My first service in the Cathedral in Paris, as Suffragan Bishop, was on Palm Sunday, March 30th, when I preached and assisted in the Eucharist. The new dean, the Very Rev. James Leo, has begun his work in Paris amidst great enthusiasm over his coming. At the door, after the service, I noticed that after only four weeks he knew many of the congregation by name. I could not be happier in having him as a colleague, and he and his wife Patsy I already count as very close and warm friends.

Within a few days I began my travels, leaving on the train for Stockholm, where in the English church I preached on Good Friday and celebrated and preached on Easter Day. Since then I have made official visits to nine other countries, the complete list being: Sweden, France, Greece, Egypt, Belgium, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Spain, and Turkey. I have made official visits to all but one of our six American congregations, as well as four congregations of the Church of England, where there are significant numbers of Americans, and also the small American congregation of Episcopalians at the U.S. Naval Base in Rota, near Cá diz in Spain. A visit to Munich in late October will complete my initial round of visitations to our American churches in Europe. In November I hope to attend the Synod of the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East, hoping to discover what the situation is in the ministry of the Anglican Churches and others to the American Episcopalians living in that area. Some 35,000 Americans are estimated to be in Saudi Arabia, for example, at the present time. Christmas I shall spend in Belgrade and Zagreb in Yugoslavia.

One strong impression that emerges from this six months is of a keen interest which many, many Episcopalians show in maintaining their worship and sacramental life while they are abroad. It has proved to be almost impossible to get really accurate figures on the numbers of Americans living abroad. There is, however, a widespread impression that for a variety of reasons the number is smaller than it was, say, ten years ago. Tourism, at least as far as Americans are concerned, has in many places shown a significant drop. American business is not sending as many Americans to Europe as it once did, due in part to the double income tax which American residents abroad must pay. Retired Americans who once might have chosen to live in Europe hesitate to do so because of the unfavorable exchange rate and alarming inflation, a combination that can wipe out even a fairly comfortable annuity or pension. Despite all of this; wherever I go I find Episcopalians anxious to have available the ministrations of their Church, and ready, I believe in most cases, to make the necessary sacrifices for that purpose.

Many of them are being ministered to in a thoroughly satisfactory and happy way by the chaplaincies of the Church of England. Some 100 chaplaincies are listed by the Church of England in Europe, and my visits to such congregations are intended simply to endorse and celebrate the cordial relationship that exists there between our two branches of the Anglican Communion. In July a new diocese came into existence, to be called the Diocese of Gibraltar in Europe. It has been officially admitted as a constituent diocese in the Province of Canterbury. I have been assured that this new arrangement will in no way jeopardize the role that Americans — and other non-Britons — play in these English congregations in Europe. Many English chaplains have told me, incidentally, that the presence of non-Britons (especially Americans and Canadians) has been an incalculable blessing, since they enter so vigorously and generously into the life of the congregation. In several of these English congregations—such as Nice, Brussels, and Belgrade—the number of Americans in the congregation has justified our contributing a substantial amount to the budget.

It must be confessed that there are some strains and tensions between our American churches in Europe and the Church of England. The official national status of the Church of England means that the congregation takes on the air of the British Church away from home. In some cases, the chaplain is officially designated as the Chaplain to the British Embassy. There are also differences in the discipline of the two Churches in the matter of marriage and divorce and - perhaps most controversial of all-over the ordination of women to the priesthood. Incidentally, on the 19th of September in New York City, I ordained to the priesthood the first woman for the Convocation of American Churches in Europe, Angela V. Askew. Although the Roman Catholic and Old Catholic Churches cannot now accept women as priests, I am assured that they understand our reasons for taking this step and that no irreparable damage will be done to our relationships with them as a result. Angela Askew was a candidate for ordination from our church in Rome, and she has been licensed to officiate there-although for this academic year she will serve as a teaching assistant to Professor Richard A. Norris at the Union Theological Seminary in New York City. A woman priest from Virginia is licensed to serve in Emmanuel Church in Geneva, and a woman priest from New Hampshire serves with her husband as co-pastor of the non-denominational American Church in Vienna. In my opinion these women have an important witness to bear in the matter of women in priesthood to the churches in Europe, and some Roman Catholics and one Old Catholic Bishop have expressed their enthusiasm over their presence.

I am glad to say that my distinct impression is that we have clergy in our American churches in Europe of quite outstanding ability. I want to share with the House of Bishops, however, a problem about clergy deployment which is very vexing to us. When a priest has served for ten or twelve years in Europe, it is not unusual that he desires to move back to the United States. Often this is for family reasons. It is very difficult, however, for many bishops, search committees, and vestries to consider seriously a person for a vacancy if that person is as far away as Europe. I can promise you, however, that the Board for Foreign Parishes, which administers the endowment funds for the Convocation, stands ready to provide necessary subsidies so that our clergy in Europe will not be discriminated against in this deployment process. I solicit the sympathetic help of the House of Bishops in this difficult problem of deployment for the clergy in Europe, indeed for any of our clergy who serve on our behalf overseas.

One final observation, and that is that the complexion of our American congregations in Europe is changing rapidly and radically. What once was a fairly homogeneous congregation of Americans is now likely to display a great variety of racial, ethnic, and national types. In Paris and in Rome, for example, black African students make up as much as one-fifth of the congregation on any given Sunday morning. In some places, the people of the country, uncomfortable or unhappy about their Church background, seek out the kind of "reformed Catholicism" which they perceive Anglicanism represents. On the second Sunday of my participation in the service at the Cathedral in Paris, a very agreeable and serious looking young boy was assigned to me as my acolyte. I realized during service that I needed my pastoral staff which I had laid upon the altar, and I leaned over and asked him to bring it to me. He looked at me with bewilderment in his eyes and said, "Comment?" He did not speak English, and I was quite ignorant of how to ask for a pastoral staff in French! Anglicanism has broken through the sound barrier of the English language — as we all learned who went to the Lambeth Conference of 1978—and in Europe this will mean a broadening of our vision of our mission and a reconsideration of our ministry.

Many of these matters you will hear from me on subsequent occasions. It only remains now for me to assure you I am greatly enjoying the task to which you and the Presiding Bishop have called me, to thank you for your support, and to ask your continued prayers for us in the Convocation of American Churches in Europe as we represent you in ministry and mission in an interesting and exciting place.

APPENDIX II – DAY V

Report of the Commission on World Mission Regarding Companion Relationships

This past year the Committee on World Mission of the Executive Council has made a study of the Companion Diocese Relationship. The bishops of this House have been duly surveyed. We thank you all for the excellent response, providing the data which made this report possible.

Basic statistics. 39 dioceses reported having a companion relationship at the present time. Of the 40 dioceses reporting no such relationship, 29 stated that they have had one or more in the past. 18 dioceses are planning to formalize a companion relationship in the near future; 20 have no plans at the present. The dioceses reporting: 67 U.S. continental and 12 overseas, an excellent cross section of the Church.

Our basic inquiry was interested in the *value* of the companion relationship, the ways in which dioceses shared in mission and, of course, the difficulties encountered in accomplishing this vital effort. We share a very brief summary of the survey's findings and then dare to make certain recommendations to the House.

The value of the relationship was basically seen in the personalization of mission. The remarks which summarized this are as follows:

- The way people of two dioceses can work together as partners.

- The realization that the Church is far greater than the local parish.

- The opportunity to understand and experience the Christian faith in a different cultural setting (for each companion).

- A tangible way of sharing Christian mission beyond our borders.

- An awareness of the tremendous Christian work in other parts of the world.

- An awareness that other areas are more Spirit-filled than we of the developed nations.

- An education and awareness of the Anglican Communion.

- Invaluable in expanding the horizons and sense of mission.

- The challenge of accepting help from another who has been the traditional receiver.

Sharing. We discovered that the ways in which we share in Christ's mission differ in direct proportion to our ability to participate in accomplishing mutually agreed upon goals. Comments received varied from sharing only by the bishops of each diocese to a wide participation of lay/clergy in personnel exchanges—i.e., Companion Relationship Committees, clergy, ECW, EYC, teachers (VCS), counselors, and other specialists (lay and clerical). Under the categories WE shared and THEY shared, we report:

Difficulties/problems with the relationships. The following comments summarize the difficulties (challenges) encountered when one part of the Church engages another in accomplishing our Lord's mission:

- 815 should be of more assistance in helping us.

- The major problems are in the area of language. (Remember Lambeth: i.e., a trilingual bishop was one who spoke three languages; a bilingual bishop spoke two languages; a bishop who spoke one was either American or from England).

- Communications: mail and phoning difficult, slow and poor on both ends; geographical/cultural differences.

- "We failed to be humble and sensitive."

--- How to relate (our) great numbers to a small area requires careful planning and patience.

- Economic differences tend to perpetuate "poor" vs. "rich" countries - "lady bountiful or big daddy" syndromes.

- The bishop: "The new one is uncooperative; the former one was a joy." "Our companion bishop cannot say No because he is dependent upon our financial support."

- Petering out of interest was due to no established goals by the dioceses.

- Feeling that the "touch" was put on us by a few individuals who saw an opportunity to exploit the relationship (bishop and clergy).

- No committee (lay/clergy) involvement in the other diocese. We mainly dealt with bishop, although we had a strong but bewildered committee at home.

- Politics presented a problem - revolutions, entrance visas, etc.

Recommendations to the House of Bishops.

1. Before the exchange of personnel or engaging in projects, dioceses entering a companion relationship should take adequate time to arrive at mutually agreed upon objectives/goals to be shared and determine a definite plan (in writing) for implementing the objectives over the period of relationship to be established.

2. Guidelines are needed ("815 should help!"), and guidelines do exist. The guidelines are attached for purposes of planning both for a new relationship and for evaluating what has been the nature of the current one.

3. All planning of goals and procedures should be accomplished by committees (clergy/ lay) of each diocese—not merely by the bishop alone. The guidelines are designed to serve this purpose.

4. The role of Executive Council and the World Mission Committee. Unless some committee coordinates this work, there will always be conflict and difficulties. The World Mission Committee will assist by presenting to Executive Council all requests for formalizing companion relationships. It was discerned in our study that several dioceses overseas had not one, but several, companions, while others had none. The official action of Executive Council in establishing (formalizing for the Episcopal Church) the relationship is needed if the Church is to insure fairness of coverage and an adequate accountability of our stewardship in mission.

5. We encourage creative mission relationships—i.e, a continental U.S. province relating to an overseas province (and parishes to parishes) in order to accomplish agreed upon goals and to realize the objectives of sharing with each other the mission which is Christ's.

APPENDIX III — DAY V Report of General Board of Examining Chaplains October, 1980

In compliance with Title III, Canon 7, Section 8, the General Board of Examining Chaplains is pleased to submit this report to the House of Bishops.

The 1980 General Ordination Examinations were administered to 286 candidates in January and, since then, to two other candidates. Of the 286, all but ten were nominated by the bishops of 72 dioceses. The remaining ten were nominated by seminary deans. Except for three dioceses, the bishops of all the other domestic jurisdictions normally have their candidates take the GOEs, although the smaller dioceses do not have candidates every year.

The General Board of Examining Chaplains was assisted in evaluating the GOEs by 144 readers who met in reading/evaluation conferences with members of the Board in seven areas of the country. This year, two retired bishops served as readers. Again, we commend this participation by members of the House of Bishops.

A new feature of the 1980 GOE was a two-hour "closed book" section. The multiple choice test questions for the part of the GOE titled "The History, Literature, and Vocabulary of the Christian Tradition" were substantially revised this year. The "open book" essay questions required five days of thinking, praying, and writing from the candidates.

Annually, the work of the GBEC, its readers, the administrator employed by the Board, and all phases of the process are reviewed, evaluated, and, it is hoped, improved. Comments and suggestions are elicited from candidates (about one hundred responded), seminary deans, readers, Commissions on Ministry, and bishops. Several members of the Board, including the chairman, have participated in diocesan, provincial, and national conferences on various phases of ministry and preparation for ministry in order to interpret our work and to receive helpful criticism and input.

Questions and subjects/themes to be considered for the 1981 GOEs have been solicited. Again, we believe members of the House of Bishops can assist us greatly in this task of developing and constructing examinations by annually suggesting comprehensive themes and typical questions which you believe might be helpful. In general, the Board has discovered that solid questions on Christian Ethics and Moral Theology, and on Church History, tend to be the most difficult to compose.

The dates for the 1981 GOE will be January 5-9 — which is most compatible with our seminaries' schedules—and will be completed in five days, instead of six. When we meet in October to compile the exams, the GBEC will also make budgetary decisions. The fee per candidate will be in the \$80 to \$100 range, which is the top limit we are allowed to charge.

Of the twenty-one members of the Board, the Canons require that six shall be priests with pastoral cures. Since the General Convention, two of these priests (Robert Estill and FitzSimons Allison) have been called to follow the biblical injunction, "Friend, come up higher," and so now sit in the House of Bishops. We have selected the Rev. Dr. Charles Eldon Davis of the Diocese of Northern California to replace Bob Estill. Dr. Davis is a former member of the GBEC who has continued to assist us by serving as chairman and organizer of the Readers Conference which has been meeting at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. In Fitz Allison's place we have selected the Rev. Sandra Ragan-Kelly of St. Mark's Church, Palo Alto, California. A recent graduate of C.D.S.P., she is a gifted and scholarly person, and has completed the requirements for a PhD, except for the completion of her thesis. We believe that the addition of a recent seminarian and a woman priest with a pastoral cure will broaden the dimensions of the Board's perspectives. Shortly after the 1979 General Convention, Dr. Wellborn Hudson, a lay member of the Board who lives in Minnesota, found it necessary to resign. We asked Mrs. Evelyn Shipman of the Diocese of Olympia to fill this spot. She has been a GOE reader for nine years, has been chairperson of her diocesan Commission on Ministry, and has assisted in organizing and implementing the Readers Conference for several years in Seattle.

You will note that all three additions are from the west since, in geographic distribution, we were suddenly left with no western representatives on the Board following the elections to the Board at the General Convention. The GBEC respectfully requests the House of Bishops to authorize these three persons to fill out the unexpired terms for which they have been selected, in accordance with III. 7.1.

The office of the GBEC remains at Christ Church, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, and the Rev. Emmet Gribbin is still employed by the Board to serve as its Executive Secretary and as administrator of the GOE. Since the logistics of the process are complicated and involve production, management, pastoral, interpretive and judgmental/reconciliatory skills, the Board highly commends the work that Mr. Gribbin does in this key role.

The House of Bishops members on the GBEC are William Sanders of Tennessee, Bennett Sims of Atlanta, and William Spofford, Assistant Bishop of Washington; and they would appreciate your sharing your concerns and criticisms.

Wednesday October 8, 1980

Devotional

Dean Collins began the devotional period at 9:00 a.m. The Presiding Bishop expressed appreciation to Cardinal Suenens as a preface to his last meditation. He also expressed appreciation to Dean Collins and those with him for their devotional ministry to the House each day.

Cardinal Suenens gave the meditation.

The Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 10:00 a.m.

Morning Session

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 10:22 a.m.

Metropolitan Areas

The Bishop of Chicago, of the Standing Committee on Metropolitan Areas, presented a panel from the Urban Bishops' Coalition.

The Bishop of New York addressed the role of the local congregations in the urban setting. The Bishop of Southeast Florida addressed the special problems of the urban setting in Miami, Florida, in the aftermath of recent riots there. The Bishop of Pittsburgh discussed working with local officials and groups.

Following these presentations, members of the House directed questions to those on the panel. Included with the panel were personnel from the national Church office, including the Rev. Frank Turner and Mrs. Alice Emery.

The Bishop Coadjutor of Connecticut reported on the Indianapolis Conference sponsored by the Urban Bishops' Coalition. He introduced the Rev. Lloyd Casson, President of the Episcopal Urban Caucus, who addressed the House.

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 12:03 p.m.

Group Workshop

Following lunch, and beginning at 2:00 p.m., the bishops attended two out of three workshops on Communication. The three workshops offered between 2:00 and 3:45 p.m. were:

- 1. Diocesan Communication
- 2. Radio/Television
- 3. Media Relations

Reconvened

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 3:57 p.m., reading from scripture and leading the House in prayer.

Stewardship

The Chairman for Dispatch of Business introduced the Rev. Thomas Carson, Executive Officer for Stewardship, who addressed the House, giving a report on Venture in Mission.

Birthday Greeting

The Bishop of Western Missouri led the House in singing Happy Birthday to the Rev. Charles J. Dobbins, Assistant Secretary of the House.

Social and Urban Affairs

The Bishop Suffragan of Chicago, Chairman of the Committee on Social and Urban Affairs, introduced the Bishop of Texas who moved (B-16), as follows:

Whereas, the 66th General Convention of the Episcopal Church passed a resolution condemning the resurgence of the activity of the Ku Klux Klan and similar racist hatred groups which continue to engage in outrageous acts of terrorism and bodily harm in the several United States of America; and

Whereas, five black women citizens of Chattanooga, Tennessee, were gunned down by admitted Klansmen on the night of 19 April, 1980, which is further evidence of the marked increase of Ku Klux Klan activity; and

Whereas, the Diocese of Tennessee, through its office of Metropolitan Ministry, is actively involved in efforts of reconciliation and harmony in the Chattanooga community; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the House of Bishops assembled in Chattanooga, Tennessee, strongly condemns the terrorism of the Ku Klux Klan as a moral outrage, totally contrary to God's laws and the teachings of Jesus Christ, as well as an affront to all civilized persons; and be it further

Resolved. That the House of Bishops offers its continued prayers for the Chattanooga community and in particular for the victims of Ku Klux Klan terrorism and for those engaged in efforts of reconciliation, as well as for the individuals who perpetuated this violence; and be it further

Resolved. That the House of Bishops calls upon the House of Representatives Sub-committee on Civil and Constitutional Rights for Congressional Investigation of Ku Klux Klan Terrorism; and be it further

Resolved, That the House of Bishops calls upon the Justice Department of the United States to enforce vigorously the existing statutes which protect the civil rights and civil liberties of the victims of Ku Klux Klan terrorism; and be it further

Resolved. That the House of Bishops calls upon its membership and other religious bodies to witness against the Ku Klux Klan publicly and privately; and be it further

Resolved. That copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, the members of Congress, the Justice Department, the Governor of Tennessee, and the Mayor and City Council of Chattanooga, Tennessee.

Seconded by the Bishop of Minnesota.

Motion carried.

Housing

The Chairman of the Dispatch of Business moved the House accept a late resolution on Housing. Seconded by Bishop Gosnell. It received the necessary 2/3 majority.

Motion carried.

National and International Problems

The Bishop of Hawaii, Chairman for the Committee on National and International Problems, moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the House of Bishops send its greetings to our brother, Desmond Tutu, and the South African Council of Churches, commending them for their ministry of justice and reconciliation amidst great suffering and danger, and assuring them of our constant prayers as they continue in this costly ministry.

Seconded by the Bishop of Rochester.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Hawaii moved (B-9A), as follows:

Whereas, the past several years of history have raised doubts as to the efficacy of certain aspects of our foreign policy in establishing national security and world peace; and

Whereas, this policy has involved an ever increasing participation of our country in the selling and supplying of arms to nations regardless of their concern for human rights; and

Whereas, the annual world expenditure on arms approximates 600 billion dollars which drains resources which could reverse the trend of increasing poverty and suffering within the developing nations and amongst our own rural and urban poor; therefore, be it

Resolved. That the House of Bishops urge the leaders of our nation to direct our foreign policy so as to seek our national security by developing with emerging nations economic relations which are mutually beneficial and not exploitative; granting them aid instead of arms; and supporting the worldwide struggle for human rights; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to the President, Secretary of State, and appropriate committees.

Seconded by the Bishop of Fond du Lac.

Motion carried.

The Bishop of Hawaii moved the following resolution (B-19A):

Whereas, the 66th General Convention adopted a resolution asserting "its opposition to peacetime conscription or any form of compulsory national service, unless a national emergency is declared by the Congress"; and

Whereas, the President of the United States, without evidence of a national emergency or action by the Congress to declare such, has nevertheless instituted a registration of all male citizens upon the attainment of their 19th year, as a basis for calling them into military service should a draft become necessary; and

Whereas, the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church and the Episcopal Church Center staff have sought to assist young members of this Church in their anxiety and conscientious struggles in the face of being required to register, by making resources available to young people, clergy, and others throughout the Church; and

Whereas, the Joint Standing Commission on Peace established by the 66th General Convention is not expected, until the next General Convention, to present plans which will provide direction in this situation; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the House of Bishops

1. Express its continued support of the resolution of the 66th General Convention regarding peacetime conscription;

2. Encourage the Executive Council and the Church Center staff to continue and expand its program of providing resources to assist young persons and those who counsel them in this difficult period in their lives;

3. Inform the President of the United States of its opposition to peacetime conscription, unless a national emergency is declared by the Congress;

4. Request the President and the Congress to establish alternative volunteer national service, in addition to military service, so that young people may demonstrate their desire to serve their country in a variety of ways.

Seconded by the Bishop of Arizona.

The Bishop of Western Massachusetts moved the deletion of the second Whereas clause. Seconded by the Bishop of Arizona. The amendment carried.

The motion to adopt (B-19A), as amended, came to a vote.

Motion carried.

Ministry

The Bishop of Pittsburgh, Chairman of the Committee on Ministry, asked to be discharged from (B-20) because such action, in the opinion of the Committee, should be taken at the time of General Convention. Seconded by the Bishop of Nevada.

Motion carried.

Ecumenical Relations

The Bishop of Kentucky, Chairman of the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, moved to be discharged from (B-8), referring it to the A.R.C. Seconded by the Bishop of Oregon.

> Motion carried. Question referred.

Housing as Mission

The Bishop of Pennsylvania, previously having secured the permission of the House to submit a late resolution on Housing, moved the following:

Whereas, the 65th General Convention (in Resolution B-172) declared that housing is a mission of the Church; and

Whereas, shelter costs have now risen to such a point that less than 20% of this nations newly formed families can now obtain mortgage financing; and

Whereas, over 50% of this nation's renters must spend in excess of 25% of their income for shelter costs; and

Whereas, this nation is now experiencing a net loss of 3% of its rental stock per year as a result of urban renewal, condominium conversion, and obsolescence; and

Whereas, the number of Federally-assisted housing units proposed in the administration's 1981 budget is not only decreased by over 10% but also directed toward higher income groups; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the House of Bishops

1. Expresses concern over the deteriorating housing conditions facing the lowincome residents of this nation; and

2. Reaffirms its intention to mobilize the resources of PECUSA to address these problems; and

3. Takes note of the position of the Roman Catholic Bishops' Conference (Statement of November, 1975) and affirms our belief that housing is among our nation's foremost social problems and a pastoral imperative for the Church; and

4. Encourages the development of local parish and diocesan housing interest groups; and

5. Supports the work of the Executive Council Housing Organizing (ECHO) Subcommittee; and 6. Encourages the expansion of the Interreligious Coalition on Housing (ICH).

Seconded by the Bishop Suffragan of New York (Wetmore).

Motion carried.

Recess

The Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 5:20 p.m. He reconvened the House at 5:33 p.m.

Offerings

The Bishop of New Jersey moved that the offerings from the noonday services be given to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, with the intent that it be given for Haitian relief in the Miami area. Seconded by the Bishop of Oregon.

Motion carried.

Pastoral

The Bishop of Atlanta, Chairman of the Committee on the Pastoral, after full discussion and changes from the floor on the draft proposed by the Committee, moved the Pastoral be adopted. Seconded by the Bishop of Pennsylvania.

Motion carried.

A PASTORAL LETTER FROM THE BISHOPS October 8, 1980

As bishops of the Episcopal Church, meeting in the early autumn of an election year in the United States, we wish to speak of Christian responsibility in exercising the right to vote. In focusing on a national issue, we are mindful of our brothers and sisters of this Church whose citizenship is in other countries. We hope that what we say will be of relevance and stimulation to them. We hold them in our prayers, and ask for theirs in our forthcoming national decision-making.

Two matters concern us chiefly. Both represent extremes of religious response to the problems of political choice.

I. Our first concern is apathy. Hardly half the American people entitled to vote do so. For Christians, this withdrawal from political responsibility is faithless and immoral. To fail to vote, or to be uninformed in voting, is a denial of the biblical faith that Jesus Christ is Lord: the Lord of politics, economics, education, and social systems, as well as of our personal and family lives.

Christians are not relieved of political decision-making just because political choices involve fallible candidates, or because political choices must face debatable positions and points of view. To think so and act so betrays a hands-off-the-world assumption about God and his Christ which scripture denies. Our God of the Old Testament is a political intervener, because the cosmos he commands is moral at the core. No earthly sovereignty can violate that morality and endure. However, as scripture declares, "If a king judges the poor with equity, his throne will be established forever" (*Proverbs 29:14*). In the New Testament, God's intervention takes the form of a self-offering in crucifixion for the very life of the world.

Political withdrawal of Christians creates a vacuum that invites the tyranny of those who would use power for discrimination, oppression, and economic barbarism. That is the immorality of political apathy.

But it is not enough simply to vote. We urge informed voting, making choices on the

grounds of a first principle that is biblical and basic to Christian conviction. This first principle is the sacredness of human life. From it, other guideposts rise for our decisionmaking, all of them anchored in scripture.

Since we hold that human life is sacred, our political choices need to reflect the best judgment we can make as to the people and platforms that honor all persons — that respond to the needs of the aged, the unemployed, and the disadvantaged; that uphold racial and sexual equality; and that resist irresponsible and indiscriminate abortion as a heedless, casual birth control option.

Our political choices also need to reflect a moral resolve that American economic structures reduce the extremities of arrogant wealth and gross poverty which mark doomed societies. Callous biblical kingdoms were brought low by God's wrath. Contemporary societies are likewise under judgment for greed and indifference to human need. "What do you mean by crushing my people, by grinding the face of the poor? says the Lord God of hosts" (Isaiah 3:15).

A further imperative that flows from the sacredness of human life is Christ's call that his disciples be peacemakers. Wherever possible, our voting needs to call to account the iniquity of a runaway arms capability that supplies small nations with lethal weaponry, much of it American. Our political action must deplore the daily and deadly addition that America makes to the absurd stockpile of nuclear warheads. We now have atomic megatons adequate to kill everybody in the Soviet Union twenty times over.

Since nuclear armaments here and in the Soviet Union have created a world in which the whole can nowhere be protected against its parts, our own national security has reached the zero point. The issue is no longer the survival of one nation against another. We stand now in mortal danger of global human incineration. A computer error could trigger mutually assured destruction. American responsibility for the world beyond us compels a moral outcry against the arms race.

As a way of moving us all from apathy and toward responsibility, we have offered biblical guideposts to political decision-making. It is to be expected that we will disagree on candidates and political direction. Disagreement expresses both our freedom and the ambiguity of all choices made by sinful people in a fallen world. But at a deeper level of truth, political involvement by informed voting expresses the irrepressible hope of Christians that in spite of all alarms God is the Lord of history, and that human life is a gift to be claimed from his hand, here and hereafter.

11. Our second chief concern in this election year is the opposite extremity to apathy. It is the sudden emergence of aggressive religious partisanship in the political arena. We insist that the use of religious radio and TV and local pulpits in support of particular candidates in the name of God distorts Christian truth and threatens American religious freedom.

As Christians, we share some important commitments with the so-called Moral Majority: to the home, to the family, to the Bible — though our understanding of reverence for scripture compels us to resist any narrow or bullying use of biblical texts. But, with our brothers and sisters of the popular TV ministry, we too cherish God and country. The stars and stripes of our national banner are conspicuous in many Episcopal churches, and we offer Eucharist on the 4th of July.

As your bishops, we speak out now because the silence of the conventional Churches is partly to blame for the impact of this new coalition of strident voices. But we do not form a power lobby — for two reasons.

First, because we are American traditionalists with regard to religion. The founders who fashioned our Constitution of the United States had great respect for the spiritual core of all human experience. But they believed the religious reality, at bottom, is intense-

ly personal. They were also close in time to some events in American colonial history which saw Churches snarling at each other, unable to tolerate a pluralist denominational social order. Therefore, if the individual right to religious belief and practice were to be upheld, Americans had to be protected, not only against an authoritarian anti-religious state (as has emerged in Communism) but also against a tyrannical religious monopoly.

The American colonial period is filled with instances of denominational control of parts of the colonies where deviation from territorial orthodoxy was punishable — and often cruelly.

Puritan Massachusetts banished Quakers from their state on pain of death. In Quaker Pennsylvania, during that period, all citizens were subject to religious restrictions. An act passed in 1700 required all citizens to attend church on Sunday or prove they had been at home reading the scriptures. Failure to do so was subject to fines.

Anglicans in Virginia, at about the same time, pushed through a law which defined orthodoxy for Christians. Denial of Old and New Testament authority was illegal. Offenders could be barred from public office.

Although Maryland was opened initially to Roman Catholics under Lord Baltimore, elsewhere in the colonies life for many of that Church was hindered by the weight of repressive legislation and popular contempt.

When it came time to document religious freedom with Constitutional guarantees, the founders, well versed in history and human behavior, denied the government all power to establish religion. Also denied was the power of the government to interfere with the free exercise of religion. Our founding fathers' argument was never against faith, but against monopoly and political power under religious auspices.

Our refusal in 1980 to entangle religion in partisan politics, and our wariness of contemporary movements that do, is rooted in a wise American tradition of avoiding the almost certain risk of political tyranny in the name of God.

Our second reason for warning against a religious power bloc in the political arena is our certainty that "power" is not the last word in our relationship with God. In the wilderness struggle of Jesus, "power" is the Devil's final word, not God's. Satan's trump temptation is to deliver into Jesus' hands "all the kingdoms of the world and the glory of them" (St. Matthew 4:8).

The response of Jesus to this third seduction defines forever the Christian's relationship to the world: not control, but ministry. Our Lord scorns a mastery founded on any sovereignty but servanthood. Servanthood means the readiness of love to sacrifice and to suffer.

Christ bids us take up the cross, not a cudgel. We therefore summon ourselves and our people to cheerful service in Christ's love. Be courageous in conviction, tolerant of diversity, and thankful for a political heritage that is ours by gift of human struggle and divine mercy.

The Bishop of Newark moved an expression of appreciation to the Bishop of Atlanta and to members of the Committee on the Pastoral. Seconded by Bishop Gosnell.

Motion carried.

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop adjourned the House at 6:52 p.m.

Thursday October 9, 1980

The Presiding Bishop called the House to order at 9:11 a.m. He read from scripture and led the House in prayer.

Secretary of General Convention

The Chairman for Dispatch of Business introduced the Rev. Canon James Gundrum, Secretary of the General Convention and Executive Officer of General Convention, who addressed the House.

Religious Communities

The Bishop of Milwaukee, Chairman of the Committee on Religious Communities, addressed the House, reporting on his committee's work. See Appendix I: "On Private Vows to a Bishop."

Theology

The Bishop of Western North Carolina, Chairman of the Committee on Theology, reported on his committee's work.

New Directions

Bishop Cox addressed the House on the work of New Directions and the Church in Small Communities.

Recess

The House took a brief recess at 10:17 a.m., and was called to order again by the Presiding Bishop at 10:30 a.m.

Statement

The Chairman for Dispatch of Business, on behalf of the Bishop of Utah, moved the Nuclear Arms Statement be spread upon the minutes of the House. Seconded by the Bishop of Virginia.

Motion carried.

STATEMENT ON NUCLEAR ARMS

We, the undersigned bishops of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America: •Believing that war is contradictory to and inconsistent with the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, who calls us to be peacemakers; and

•Reaffirming all the statements about war, peace, and violence made in the past century by the General Convention, House of Bishops and Lambeth Conference; and

•Observing the Faustian proportions of the international nuclear arms race, and the paralyzing effects — personal and economic — resulting from the fear on which it is based; and

•Questioning the validity of the theory of mutual deterrence which underlies the nuclear arms race; hereby

•Join other persons throughout this nation who are requesting the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union a mutual nuclear weapons moratorium, by which the United States and the Soviet Union agree to halt immediately the testing, production, and further deployment of all nuclear warheads, missiles, and delivery systems.

APPENDIX I — DAY VII

On Private Vows to a Bishop

The Bishop of Milwaukee reported Father Bede Mudge's comments on Private Vows to a Bishop:

I cannot find anything in the tradition of either East or West to support a public profession of the monastic vows outside of the context of a religious community. There certainly is a tradition in both Eastern and Western Churches of private acts of commitment of various kinds, and these have sometimes had official stamps of approval. It is possible, for instance, for any Roman Catholic who desires it to make a private vow of celibacy or a consecration of virginity, and such a vow can be received by any parish priest. The Roman Missal even provides a mass for such an occasion. But this is regarded much more as a private devotional act than an official one, and is not identified as religious profession. Even the Orthodox, who normally sit much lighter to these things, do not, I understand, attempt to administer religious vows without a person's having some connection with a specific community. This is complicated, obviously, by the need for a man to be in religious vows in order to be an Orthodox bishop, and further complicated by the fact that "Orders" as we know them are not known in Orthodoxy, and that each monk or nun has some claim on any monastic community by virtue of his or her profession. But even with all these qualifications, it remains true that some connection with a community - even if only a formal one - is part of the profession of religious vows in the East.

The Church of England carefully regulates the administration of religious professions through the regulations of the *Directory of the Religious Life*. The *Directory* makes no provision at all for the administration of religious vows outside of communities, making it clear that the profession of solitary vows is regarded as an individual, not an official, matter. I am told, in fact, that one of the primary reasons for the formation of the English Advisory Council on the Religious Life in the first place was to stop the administration of such vows to individuals outside of community.

All of this is much clearer, and much sterner, than anything I had expected to find. So I think the Committee will want to discuss first of all, then, what they think is being done when a bishop accepts "religious vows" from an individual not living in a community. Is this, in fact, a purely private affair that does not involve official ecclesiastical status? If this is to be our position, it will have some effects. For instance, the wearing of a habit is often a prominent part of such schemes. We cannot, of course, pretend to control what people wear, but does the Committee want to make recommendations about this? I will just observe that special ecclesiastical dress usually goes along with official status, though Anglican tradition is fuzzy on this. In addition, if such a commitment is to take the form of vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, what is the form of the "poverty" being professed, and to whom is the "obedience" owed? There has always been wide latitude for the interpretation of these in different communities, but free-floating commitments that are impossible of fulfillment are often destructive rather than helpful.

A guide in individual cases:

1) A reminder that careful discernment is often necessary here. Hasty admission to a form of vows has, in the past, brought scandal to the Church, and can do damage to the individual concerned. A consecration such as this is not just a minor pious act, to be undone at will.

2) It would be helpful to have a list of people available who are known to be able to help in this discernment process. Such a list need not necessarily be made public, but it could be helpful to know where to apply for help.

3) If the person concerned has been a member of a religious community, it is well

to consult the community about their experience with him or her. This has to be done bearing in mind that a person with a vocation to a solitary commitment often will of necessity have had considerable difficulties living with a community. But such a person often has a very different perception of what the problems were than the community has, and it is often useful to know both sides of these stories before proceeding.

4) Provision for competent ongoing spiritual direction is essential.

5) I think the Committee needs to recommend that a careful testing process be part of the normal consideration; and that a bishop ought not to begin by accepting a life commitment, but rather proceed more cautiously, through more temporary commitments, in line with the experience of the Church through many centuries.
6) It would also be useful to have a list of established communities who are willing to undertake a ministry to people with a vow such as this. Holy Cross already does this, and others may, or may be willing to begin.

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APPENDIX I — DAY I

In Memoriam RICHARD HENRY BAKER

Be to the flock of Christ a shepherd, not a wolf; feed them, devour them not. Hold up the weak, heal the sick, bind up the broken, bring again the outcasts, seek the lost ... that when the Chief Shepherd shall appear, you may receive the never-fading crown of glory. —Presiding Bishop's charge to a new bishop. 1928 Prayer Book

Of all of Bishop Baker's qualities — humility, patience, a constant recognition of his own humanity, among others — his pastoral concern marked, above all others, both his priesthood and his episcopate. It was not hard for him to accept the charge to be a shepherd to the flock of Christ, for this is what his ministry was about, from beginning to end. His retirement as bishop did not conclude his pastoral ministry; it just gave him more time for it, and allowed him greater freedom to extend it beyond the parish, the diocese, and the denomination.

Born in Norfolk, Virginia, in 1897, Baker attended the Episcopal High School in Alexandria, the University of Virginia, and graduated from the Virginia Theological Seminary. He interrupted his college education for two years of military duty in France during World War I, where he served as a driver with a French ambulance unit operating on the front lines. France awarded him the Croix de Guerre, her highest military honor, for bravery under fire.

In an interview in 1959, Bishop Baker said, "The ministry is people. It should have no other consideration than the needs of people, the needs of the whole man."

Bishop Baker was loved as a friend and a pastor by all who knew him. You could not meet anyone with a greater love of people. It was this strong pastoral side of his ministry that gave the Church of the Redeemer the strong start it needed to become one of the larger parishes of our Church. During his twenty years as Rector of the Baltimore parish, church membership increased six-fold, and enrollment in the church school jumped from 248 to 2,119.

He was always a trusted friend and a source of support to others. The whole Church shall greatly miss him.

In Memoriam C. KILMER MYERS

We give thanks for the life and episcopal ministry of C. Kilmer Myers, the sixth Bishop of California. His ministry provides insight into the mystery of God.

From his earliest academic ministry, Bishop Myers sought a deep pilgrimage into the nature of God, the Holy Trinity; and explored the liturgy as the celebration of the unity of God with his people. His later interest in eastern and Native American theology and spirituality showed his sense of the way God has revealed himself in diverse cultures. In later years, Bishop Myers' theology concentrated upon the cross: the mystery of the incarnate God at Calvary, identifying himself with all human suffering. This theology of the cross impelled him to be a prophetic, articulate voice for the suffering, the poor, and all whom the world despises.

Bishop Myers often spoke of Jesus' passage to the Father. His own pilgrimage revealed a man well aware of his own human limits, a theologian sensitive to God's self-revelation, and a bishop faithful to catholic truth and alive with prophetic zeal. That life, lived in intimate relationship with Jesus, is now reunited with the Author of all life and the Source of hope for the people of God.

In Memoriam AUSTIN PARDUE

On April 28, 1981, the Rt. Rev. Austin Pardue, D.D., Bishop of Pittsburgh from 1944 until his retirement in 1968, died and went to a greater life of eternal joy with his Lord and Saviour.

Bishop Pardue's ministry reached out to people from every walk of life. He was a choirboy in his Chicago parish; and reflected his Christian values as a football player, record breaking swimmer, and organizer of the first Golden Gloves match for young men in Chicago.

A sensitive spirit, cast in a physical body of imposing strength, blessed with vision to "look ahead," Austin Pardue's life was dedicated to beginnings, encouraging others to continue — and never, never to bury the potential he so astutely recognized in them.

He was one of the founders of the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer, a group that has continued and flourished internationally. During the early 1940's, Bishop Pardue, then Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral in Buffalo, New York, began Lenten radio broadcasts that reached into homes coast to coast; he continued broadcasting after coming to Pittsburgh. He was cited by the Armed Forces for his ministry to those overseas during World War II, and also during the Korean War; he once spent six weeks with the troops in Greenland.

Bishop Pardue authored many publications. His Create and Make New was listed as Harper's book for Lent in 1952. A Right Judgment in All Things was selected Pulpit Book of the Month in 1954.

He married Dorothy Klotz in 1926; she at that time was listed as the third ranking woman golfer in the United States. They were the parents of Peter Austin and Nancy Pardue, and grandparents of four children.

A leader, gifted speaker, and universally read author, the life, ministry and love of Austin Pardue remain a blessed part of the Diocese of Pittsburgh and the communion of the Episcopal Church he served so faithfully.

Tuesday October 6, 1981

Eucharist

The daily Eucharist was celebrated at 7:00 a.m. Celebrant was the Bishop of San Joaquin, assisted by the Bishops of Western Kansas, Ecuador, North Carolina, and the Bishop Coadjutor of Central New York.

Devotional

The Presiding Bishop called the House to order at 9:00 a.m. Following a hymn, prayer, and scripture, Dean O'Driscoll led the morning meditation.

Following the meditation, the House recessed at 9:55 a.m.

Reconvened

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 10:20 a.m. He introduced Mrs. Margaret Bush Wilson, Chairman of the Board of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, who addressed the House.

Following her address Mrs. Wilson entered into a period of dialogue with members of the House.

Prayers

The Presiding Bishop announced to the House the confirmation of the death by assassination of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. Noting President Sadat as a peaceseeker, the Presiding Bishop led the House in prayer for peace and for all peacemakers.

Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief

The Bishop of New Hampshire commented on the film *Hope for New Life*, which was then shown to the House.

Recess

Following announcements by the Secretary, the House recessed at 12:03 p.m. for lunch, and for group meetings—which were to convene at 1:30 p.m.

Vice Chairman

The Secretary reconvened the House at 3:35 p.m.

The Bishop of Vermont, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, moved that the Bishop of Chicago be elected as Vice Chairman of the House. Seconded by the Bishop of Louisiana.

Motion carried

The Vice Chairman took the chair in the absence of the Presiding Bishop.

Communication

The Secretary noted that the House had received communications from several bishops absent from the Interim Meeting. A telegram from Bishop Crittenden was read, and also a communication from the Diocese of Fond du Lac.

Bishop Gordon moved that greetings be sent to Bishop Bentley on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of his ordination as a bishop. Seconded by the Bishop of West Virginia. Motion carried

Referral

The following resolution was referred to the Theology Committee as input for the New Orleans General Convention:

STATEMENT OF GUIDING MORAL AND THEOLOGICAL PRINCIPLES

The House of Bishops is sometimes suspected of framing its statements on human and environmental issues in response to and in terms of the questions most recently raised in the public media. We believe, on the contrary, that we usually are responding upon theological principles applied to current concerns.

It is necessary that this House, the members of this Church, the religious community, and the public at large, understand what are the roots in Holy Scriptures and in the living main stream of the Christian theological traditions of our human and environmental concerns.

We therefore resolve that the Theology Committee of this House be asked to prepare for our next meeting a statement, clearly referenced in the Holy Scriptures and in that main stream of theology, setting forth the authentic moral and theological principles against which our actions and statements are tested.

Prayer Book

Bishop Dimmick, Chairman of the Committee on Prayer Book and Liturgy, moved the resolution as follows:

Resolved, That the House of Bishops Meeting in San Diego, 6 October 1981, believes that it is not the intention of the 1979 Prayer Book to permit a bishop of the Episcopal Church in the United States to receive a person without the laying on of hands who has not already received the laying on of hands by a bishop of recognized apostolic order.

Seconded by Bishop Rose.

Motion carried

National and International Affairs

The Bishop of Ohio, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Affairs, moved the adoption of B-11 (Ending the arms race).

- Whereas, Christ's blessing upon the peacemakers, and his commandment to love our neighbors and our enemies, obligates the Church to pursue a strategy of peace; and
- Whereas, several nations of the world, including our own, now have the capacity to destroy all human life on this planet; and

Whereas, members of the Church are called, not simply to lament this evil possibility but to work urgently for a new way; now therefore be it

Resolved. That the House of Bishops, meeting in San Diego, declares its support for steps to slow, stop, and reverse the nuclear arms race; and while it affirms the right of any nation to defend itself against aggression, it urges members of the Episcopal Church to do all within their power to promote the Church's mission of peacemaking, and to seek fresh initiatives leading to the abolition of the weapons of war; and be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be communicated to the President of the United States and members of the Congress, and that they be urged to take immediate steps toward negotiations for the control and reduction of nuclear arms. Seconded by the Bishop of Rochester.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Ohio, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Affairs, moved the adoption of B-6 (Support for two clergy in Cuban boat lift).

Resolved, That the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church, meeting in San Diego, California, October 2nd to October 9th, 1981, notes with distress the legal action pending against the Rev. Joe Doss and the Rev. Leopold Frade of Grace Episcopal Church, New Orleans, priests in good standing in our Church and respected in their community; and states our conviction that Fathers Doss and Frade acted in the highest humanitarian manner—consistent with Christian principles, the American tradition concerning refugees, and the spirit of our Government's initial policy in dealing with the Cuban refugee crisis of 1979—when they brought a boatload of known Cuban families to the United States from Cuba, all of whom have been resettled responsibly in New Orleans, with the support of the Hispanic and non-Hispanic communities of the Episcopal Church in New Orleans; and we further urge that charges against Fathers Doss and Frade be dropped; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to each of the appropriate persons involved in the litigation.

Seconded by the Bishop of Louisiana.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Eau Claire proposed the following:

Resolved, That upon completion of pending litigation involving Frs. Doss and Frade, this House urges a proper Congressional investigation of government officials responsible for the persecution of these priests, and the suspension or removal of such officials. The Vice Chairman referred this to the Committee on National and International

The Vice Chairman referred this to the Committee on National and International Affairs.

Agenda

The Bishop of New Hampshire, Chairman of the Committee on Agenda, moved the following report:

Resolution B-12, adopted by the Interim Meeting of the House of Bishops in Chattanooga, Tennessee, 1980, reads as follows:

"Whereas, transportation costs will undoubtedly continue to increase in coming years, necessitating fewer and perhaps longer meetings; therefore be it

Resolved. That this House asks the Committee on Agenda to study the pros and cons of having one interim mid-triennial meeting of this House between 1982 and 1985 instead of two annual meetings; and be it further

Resolved, That a report on this matter be made at the 1981 meeting."

Your Agenda Committee, while appreciating the economies that would be realized by having one interim mid-triennial meeting of the House of Bishops between 1982 and 1985 instead of two annual meetings, nevertheless, recommends that the House of Bishops continue its present practice of annual meetings. Thereby, that closer contact such annual meetings provide can be continued. This is especially desirable in these times when hard issues requiring our consideration arise so frequently, when so many new bishops are joining the House each year, and when overseas bishops have particular need to be in contact for their own benefit as well as for that of the domestic bishops.

Seconded by the Bishop of California.

Report approved

The Bishop of the Rio Grande moved reconsideration of the Agenda. Seconded by the Bishop of Los Angeles.

The motion failed by a vote of 72 for to 51 against, not the required two-thirds majority.

Motion failed

Liberia

The Bishop of Liberia reported to the House on the political situation in Liberia.

Companion Dioceses

The Bishop of Dallas announced that Bishop Rose has become the coordinator for companion diocese relationships.

American Churches in Europe

The Bishop Suffragan for the Convocation of American Churches in Europe presented a report on the church in his European jurisdiction.

The Bishop Suffragan for the Convocation of American Churches in Europe moved the following:

Resolved, That this meeting of the House of Bishops felicitate the Rt. Rev. Fernando Soares as he assumes on October 24, 1981 the responsibility of serving as Bishop of the Lusitanian Church in Portugal, and assure him of our prayers for his episcopate. Seconded by the Bishop of Long Island.

APPENDIX I — DAY V

Report by the Suffragan Bishop in Europe and the Diaspora

Since my last report, the usual heavy routine of visiting congregations—both of our own Convocation and of the Church of England in Europe—has continued. There have also been some visits outside the borders of Europe, and several others are planned. I have made visits to fifteen countries in the past year (not counting the United States!). Seven of these countries were visited for the first time: Cyprus, Austria, Roumania, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Norway, Soviet Union, and East Germany. Some of these visits need some further comment.

First, however, let me say that the cordial relation with the English clergy in the places I have visited has cheered me enormously. In most places they are caring helpfully and thoughtfully for Americans; and in Nice, Waterloo, Naples, and Belgrade, we have persuaded the Board of Foreign Parishes to supply some financial assistance to raise the level of the very inadequate stipends that Church of England clergy on the continent receive. Wherever American Episcopalians are present in any considerable number, the uneasiness about this deplorable situation has led them to increase their own giving, stimulated by matching funds promised from us.

Unexpectedly, I have been asked to visit, at least annually, the clergy of the Episcopal Church in the United States now living in Great Britain. We have met together on two occasions; and there has been a request for a visit this fall on October 28th, when I will celebrate the Holy Communion for them at St. John's Church, Hyde Park Crescent, London—where one of our clergy is the Vicar—and have lunch and a brief discussion with them afterwards. The purpose of these gatherings is to keep the priests, temporarily living in England, in touch with what is going on in the United States. If any bishop reading this has such clergy on his rolls I should appreciate having the name and address.

At Christmas time I made a visit behind the Iron Curtain. The English chaplain who covered Bucharest, Sofia, Belgrade, and Zagreb could not, obviously, provide Christmas services in all these places; so I undertook to do so, beginning in Bucharest, with a confirmation, eucharist and sermon on the Fourth Sunday in Advent. That Sunday afternoon I flew to Sofia—just in time to lead a Service of Lessons and Carols at the British Embassy for an overflow congregation. The next morning I celebrated the Holy Communion for about fifty communicants at the residence of the United States Ambassador, a keen churchman, who with his wife entertained a group at lunch. Included in the lunch party was the Minister of Religious Affairs of the Communist government of Bulgaria. He was the life of the party and knew more anecdotes about ecclesiastical figures than anyone I ever met!

That afternoon (December 22nd) I flew to Belgrade, where I was the house guest of Lawrence Eagleburger, the then United States Ambassador. On the next morning I made a 24-hour trip to Zagreb, where I celebrated the eucharist and preached to about 30 people. Christmas Eve, back in Belgrade, I led another Service of Lessons and Carols for about 125 people, including children who posed in appropriate scenes from the Christmas story for each lesson. On Christmas Day we had a eucharist and sermon for about 50 people in the French Roman Catholic Church, after which I was hurried off to a Christmas Day meeting with the Serbian Patriarch, His Holiness German. Thanks to the Julian calendar it wasn't Christmas Day for him, but we had a long and pleasant discussion. I borrowed some ideas from Arthur Vogel about "filioque"—which impressed the Patriarch very well indeed. I wish I had fully understood what I said! A full Christmas celebration; I am glad it comes but once a year.

The other great festival, Easter, was also celebrated behind the Curtain, in this case in Moscow. There is an interdenominational chaplaincy arrangement there, and the current chaplain is an American Baptist. He was most cordial and welcoming. We concelebrated on Easter. I preached on Good Friday. The Good Friday service was held at the Embassy of Kenya, with about 100 people present. The Easter service was held at Spasso House, the residence of the U.S. Ambassador, with about 200 present. I preached also on Easter night (Palm Sunday in the Russian liturgical calendar) at the Russian Baptist Church. The church was packed with about 1300 people, many standing throughout the two-hour service (mine was one of five sermons). I was told that although many older women (babushkas) were present, that they go home and repeat the substance of the sermons to members of their family-who do not dare appear themselves in church. I also visited in the U.S. Embassy the eight Pentecostals who have taken refuge there. We took them the flowers from our Easter altar, and joined in singing a rousing Salvation Army Easter hymn, which miraculously I was able to remember, called "Up from the grave he arose." The Pentecostal pastor and I both gave an Easter blessing. I was able to bring the greetings of the Presiding Bishop to His Holiness the Patriarch Pimen in an audience the Baptist chaplain and I had with him. He is a shrewd and wise man. He showered me with gifts, including the Patriarchal Easter egg. I also had a visit with the Syrian Orthodox representative in Moscow. My greatest accomplishment was mastering the Cyrillic alphabet and thereby getting around on the Moscow Metro without assistance.

In November I visited in Cyprus, primarily inquiring about the possibility of a visit to Americans in the Persian Gulf, an area which forms a part of the Diocese in Cyprus and the Gulf. The visit was timed to coincide with the meeting of the Central Synod of the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East, which includes (in addition to Cyprus) Egypt, Iran, and Jerusalem. The Bishop in Cyprus and the Gulf, the Rt. Rev. Leonard Ashton, has launched an appeal for funds, part of which will make possible an expansion of work in the Gulf area. Since some of these congregations are overwhelmingly American in constituency (Dhahran being one) Bishop Ashton hopes to place one or two American priests in that area as soon as funds are available. The Presiding Bishop and I are both sponsors of this fund drive. Bishop Ashton may be visiting the United States in February and March of 1982; and, if any bishop knows of business leaders whose enterprises include branches in the Gulf area, it would help greatly if I could have their names for inclusion in this drive.

The major clergy change in the Convocation congregation since the last meeting of the House of Bishops has been the retirement of the Rev. Wilbur C. Woodhams as Rector of St. Paul's-within-the-Walls, Rome, on Easter Day. I have known Bill since before his ordination in California in 1949; and it has been a great joy to have him as a colleague in Europe. His tenure of service in Rome was a long one—20 years. He has been keenly interested in liturgical renewal, ecumenical contacts, and counseling; and has also found time to concern himself with the activities of the Convocation, especially on the Commission on Ministry. He was a deputy to five General Conventions. We (not only the episcopal "we" but the whole Convocation) will miss his presence and many contributions to our life here in Europe.

Fortunately, we have already found a replacement—one whom the vestry chose with enthusiastic unanimity—the Rev. Douglas Ousley, since 1978 assistant and Canon at the Cathedral in Paris. Previous to his moving to Europe, he had been assistant at St. Thomas' Church, New York City, from 1973. His facility in European languages and his sharp theological mind (which in Paris has been exercised in a number of informal Anglican-Roman Catholic discussions) make him an ideal choice; and it will be my great pleasure and privilege to install him as Rector on Sunday, October 25th. It remains a serious problem as to how to facilitate the movement of American clergy from overseas back to the United States. Travel for an interview is expensive, and although the Board of Foreign Parishes stands ready to assist in financing such visits, the casual exploratory visit, the more concentrated Are-you-really-interested visit, the Lastround-up visit—all of this incurs a bill that is too much for us to handle. All I can do is to say: (1) that we have an extraordinarily fine group of clergy at this time; and (2) the European experience is not a hindrance but a help in ministering to Americans in the U.S. at this time. So try to be helpful.

Since our last meeting of the House the ecumenical dimensions of my task greatly increased. I have already mentioned some of my contacts with the Orthodox. Sitting as I do on the Board of the Anglican Center in Rome, I have stimulating contacts with Roman Catholics—especially members of the Secretariat for Christian Unity. On my June visit to Brittany, thanks to the invitation and enterprise of Miss Elizabeth Hannay of Dinard, I had a most interesting lunch visit with the Cardinal Archbishop of Rennes. He was a wonderful host; and the conversation revealed a keen interest in the Episcopal Church in the U.S. He was especially interested in whether we had any black bishops in our church in America; and when I said we did and counted on them greatly, he said, "We must do that in France also." He was also, without any apparent hostility, interested in the experience we had had with women in the priesthood. He did not, however, say "We must do that in France."

Two experiences have been especially stimulating and productive. One has been with the Old Catholic Church. I was designated to represent our Church in the U.S. at the celebration of the Bonn Agreement between the Anglicans and Old Catholics in 1931. The 50th anniversary was marked on the Anglican side by a splendid dinner at Lambeth Palace and on the following day (July 2nd) a concelebrated eucharist in Westminster Abbey—followed by a lecture by the Bishop of Chichester, whom I have come to know as a good friend, despite our clear differences on the subject of the ordination of women. As was to be expected, he referred to this topic and linked it with the Anglican establishment of intercommunion with the Church of South India and the recent approval by the General Synod of the Church of England of the "Covenant" agreement with Reformed and Methodist bodies as actions which were taken unilaterally, without sufficient consideration of their impact among the Old Catholics. The Old Catholic celebration of the 50th anniversary will be held in Utrecht in November.

More extensive have been my contacts with the World Council of Churches. Along with the Presiding Bishop, the Rev. William Norgren, the Rev. William Weiler, and Dr. Cynthia Wedel, I attended the Central Committee meeting of the World Council of Churches in Dresden, East Germany, August 17-27. I am convinced the World Council gains its bad press from the fact that it faithfully represents the wide variety of its constituency. A body which includes Soviet and East European churchmen, Asia and African churchmen, and Latin American churchmen, will often say and do things which are unwelcome and disturbing to North American (and British and west European) churchmen. The fact is the Lambeth Conference and even our own General Convention have often taken similar positions. An ecumenical body somehow seems a fair target, whereas an attack on an Anglican body would seem to be disruptive of family unity. It seems to be a matter of how widely the "family" is defined! It is clear that the American Episcopal presence in Europe must take seriously the fact of the representative character of the World Council and take the lead in supporting it in the Episcopal Church. I am delighted that Dr. Philip Potter, the General Secretary, will be an honored guest of our next General Convention. He addressed a dinner meeting of our convention in Geneva in May of this year, and his thoughtfulness and fairness in answering questions impressed everybody.

The theme of our May convention was "Stewardship." Since getting representatives of all our congregations together is expensive, we are combining the business sessions, which are not very time-consuming anyway, with a conference on some topic of current concern to our clergy and people. Stewardship is important for almost everyone these days, but our European churches are especially concerned because they have not really been carrying their fair share of the national budget of the Episcopal Church (which budget includes a \$30,000 item for the support of the episcopate). I am glad to say that the Convention last May accepted in principle a fair share quota for the national budget. The result of this would be to triple the amount sent by the European churches to New York. This cannot be undertaken all in one year, but our Council of Advice meeting later this month will make plans for phasing in this larger amount in our giving. Our leader last May in the conference on Stewardship was the Bishop of Alabama, the Rt. Rev. Furman Stough, who was assisted by his staff member for stewardship concerns, the Rev. B. C. Caradine. Their forcefulness and eloquence had a great deal to do with creating the mood which led to the decision about a fair share quota to the national Church.

My year-and-a-half in Europe (and parts adjacent) has been stimulating and exciting—and I hope useful and productive for the mission of the Church to our people overseas. I am grateful for your support, and hope to see many more of you as visitors in Europe in the time that remains of my tenure.

Reconvened

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 10:30 a.m.

Music Commission

The Bishop Suffragan of Atlanta presented to the House the report of the Standing Commission on Church Music. He introduced Mr. Raymond F. Glover, General Editor of the Hymnal, who addressed the House.

Ministry to the Deaf

The Bishop of Pennsylvania, on behalf of the Ministry to the Deaf, introduced the Venerable Cam Desmarais, Archdeacon for Deaf Work in the Diocese of Alabama and President of the Episcopal Conference of the Deaf, who addressed the House.

The Bishop of Pennsylvania then introduced the Rev. Arthur Steidemann, Executive Secretary of the Episcopal Conference of the Deaf, who also addressed the House.

Acknowledgment

The Presiding Bishop recognized the Rev. William Johnson, who is engaged in ministry to the blind, and who was attending this session of the House.

Board of Theological Education

The Bishop of Massachusetts, referring to B-127 of the 66th General Convention, and following its mandate to study methods for financial support for theological education, commented on progress of the study—which is to be formalized and presented to the 67th General Convention. He introduced the Bishops of Minnesota and Pittsburgh to speak further on this study.

Resignation

The Bishop of Arkansas, Chairman of the Committee on the Resignation of Bishops, moved B-3:

Whereas, Dean T. Stevenson, fourth Bishop of Central Pennsylvania, has notified this House of his desire to resign on June 1, 1982 in order to retire at the age of 66; and

Whereas, he has served this Church as curate of the Cathedral Church of the Nativity, wartime Chaplain in the United States Army, Dean of Leonard Hall at Lehigh University and Archdeacon of the Diocese of Bethlehem; and

Whereas, he has served as a member of the House of Bishops for 15 years, providing leadership on many of its working committees, including Program and Budget; and

Whereas, he has served in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania as a caring and loving shepherd, leading that diocese, during the difficult decades of the 1960's and 1970's, into ministries of renewal, operation understanding, and church growth; and

Whereas, for the past year he has shared his episcopacy unselfishly with his coadjutor as a brother, imparting to him strength and guidance; and

Whereas, his faithful obedience to our Lord, his warm and understanding love, and his robust joy for life provide a model of Christian living for laity and clergy alike; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That his brother bishops accept with much regret Dean T. Stevenson's resignation of jurisdiction on June 1, 1982; and be it further

Resolved. That we rejoice that his ministry will continue in the Church assisting the fifth Bishop of Central Pennsylvania with confirmations, godly counsel, and such other responsibilities as may be mutually agreed upon, and that he will continue to serve as a beloved and valued member of this House.

Seconded by the Bishop Coadjutor of Central Pennsylvania and the other bishops in the state of Pennsylvania.

Motion carried

General Board of Examining Chaplains

Bishop Spofford reported on the activities of the General Board of Examining Chaplains and filed a report on the board's work.

(See Appendix I — Day VI)

Bishop Spofford moved that the Rev. Jerre W. Feagin of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Buffalo, New York, be elected to fill a one-year unexpired term on the board. Seconded by the Bishop of Western New York.

Motion carried

Haitian Refugees

The Bishop of Southeast Florida moved the following:

Whereas, Haitian refugees continue to come to our shores by the hundreds, seeking asylum; and

Whereas, the United States Government has not given them official status and consequently they are unable to work or receive aid; therefore be it

Resolved, That the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church act as a body to urge the Immigration and Naturalization Service to accord Haitians the same status as other refugees who reach our shores.

Seconded by the Bishop of Southern Virginia.

Motion carried

Adjournment

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop adjourned the House at 12:30 p.m. for the noon Eucharist. At the Eucharist the Bishop of Los Angeles was celebrant. He was assisted by the Bishops of Liberia, Northwest Texas, New York, and the Bishop Coadjutor of Central Pennsylvania.

APPENDIX I — DAY VI

Report of the General Board of Examining Chaplains

The tenth annual General Ordination Examinations were administered in 1981 to 279 candidates from 79 dioceses. Each year the number of dioceses participating in the GOE has increased, and at present all but two dioceses seem to require candidates to take the GOE's. Small dioceses do not have candidates every year. The total number of candidates examined in the past decade is about 2,650.

In several years there have been more than 300 candidates. For this number, 150 readers must be enlisted to work on the evaluations. Additional people involved in a substantial way are members of the GBEC, local administrators in all Episcopal seminaries—and a half dozen other seminaries as well as 15 or 20 other places—typists (who are often wives of other seminarians), seminary librarians, and those who house and feed the two-day conferences of readers and chaplains. Last year, five of these area conferences were held in our seminaries, and three in other places. The GOE enterprise involves about 700 people each year. This count does not include bishops and commissions on ministry, and concerned bystanders such as spouses and seminary faculty members.

The 1982 GOE will be given January 4-9. The multiple choice test, titled "The History, Literature, and Vocabulary of the Christian Tradition," is being completely recast, using questions submitted at our request by thirty scholars—several of whom are bishops.

We were saddened in the spring by the death of the Rev. Dr. Charles Elden Davis of Northern California, a valued member of the GBEC. Our Executive Committee respectfully requests you approve its selection of the Rev. Jerre Feagin of Western New York to fill out Dr. Davis' term. Fr. Feagin, a General Seminary graduate of 1973, served several years as the "recent seminary graduate advisor" to the GBEC.

The terms of a third of the Board members will expire at the next General Convention. The Chairman, William Spofford, is the bishop whose term will end. We respectfully request the House of Bishops choose as his replacement a bishop interested in participating in this vital work. The other two bishops on the GBEC are Bennett Sims and William Sanders. These bishops will welcome questions and comment about the General Ordination Examinations and the work of the GBEC.

Eucharist

The Presiding Bishop called the House to order at 9:10 a.m., and introduced Dean O'Driscoll for the last day's meditation. Following a hymn and prayer, Dean O'Driscoll presented the meditation.

Following the meditation, the Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 10:20 a.m.

Guest

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 10:35 a.m. He introduced the Rev. Dr. Massey H. Shepherd, Jr., retired Professor of Liturgics at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, who addressed the House.

Following his address we entered into a period of dialogue with Dr. Shepherd.

Pastoral

The Bishop of Atlanta, Chairman of the Committee on the Pastoral Letter, presented the first draft of the Pastoral Letter to the House.

The Bishop of Albany moved the substance of the first draft of the Pastoral be adopted. Seconded by the Bishop of West Virginia.

Motion carried

Recess

Following announcements by the Secretary, the Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 12:30 p.m.

Reconvened

The Presiding Bishop reconvened the House at 2:00 p.m.

National and International Affairs

The Bishop of Ohio, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Affairs, moved that the following resolution (B-17) be referred to the Presiding Bishop:

Resolved, That, upon completion of pending litigation involving Frs. Doss and Frade, this House urges a proper Congressional investigation of government officials responsible for the persecution of these priests, and the suspension or removal of such officials. Seconded by the Bishop of Colorado.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Ohio, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Affairs, moved the adoption of the following resolution (B-7 A):

Whereas, the 66th General Convention passed the following resolution:

"Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 66th General Convention of the Episcopal Church endorse the Equal Rights Amendment and urges the several states in their legislatures to ratify the ERA; and be it further *Resolved*, the House of Bishops concurring, That this action be communicated to the legislatures of the several states"; and

Whereas, the period for consideration and ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) to the Constitution by the several States of the United States terminates on June 30, 1982; and

Whereas, thirty-five States have thus far ratified the ERA, which represents three States short of the necessary number required for final ratification and inclusion as an amendment to the Constitution; and

Whereas, in spite of the political and highly emotional distortions publicized about the ERA, it simply states:

Section 1: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

Section 2: "The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this Article."

Section 3: "This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification." Be it therefore

Resolved. That the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church, assembled in San Diego, California, in October of 1981, recalls and reaffirms the action of the 1979 General Convention, and does call on all Church members within those states who have yet to ratify the ERA to urge in every way possible the members of their State legislatures to act speedily in the ratification of this amendment to our Constitution—which is a symbol of justice and equal opportunity for women in our society.

(ADDENDUM: The following are the states which have yet to ratify the ERA: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Missouri, Nevada, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Utah, Virginia, and Mississippi.)

Seconded by the Bishop of the Rio Grande.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Ohio, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Affairs, moved the adoption of the following resolution (B-10):

Resolved, That, in view of the tragic and deteriorating situation in Namibia, the House of Bishops

I. Calls upon the Episcopal Church to assist the Diocese of Namibia to rebuild the Anglican Seminary, churches, and other buildings destroyed by war, and assures the newly elected first African Bishop of Namibia, James H. Kauluma, of its continuing prayers and support; and

II. Calls upon the Episcopal Church and other Christians to continue and intensify efforts to achieve a peaceful solution for Namibia by

1. Renewing its efforts to convince governments to adhere to the provisions of the United Nations Security Council resolution 435 (which provides for a United Nations-controlled cease-fire, followed by United Nations-supervised elections leading to independence) as the basis for a negotiated settlement of the war in Namibia;

2. Providing increased moral and material support for the Namibian Council of Churches, headed at this time by the Anglican Bishop of Namibia;

3. Distributing educational materials on the detailed provisions of the relevant United Nations decisions and on developments in or affecting Namibia;

4. Giving increased attention to the plight of Namibian refugees in Africa and our own country, providing increased material and other support to the host countries and to their churches as they minister to the needs of these refugees.

Seconded by Bishop Mosley.

The Bishop of Rochester moved the words "and particularly the government of South

Africa" be added to II, paragraph 1. after the word "governments." Seconded by the Bishop of Pennsylvania.

Amendment carried

The Bishop of West Missouri moved that the following Resolve paragraph be added: III. Calls the people of this Church, assisted by the World Mission staff at the Episcopal Church Center, to monitor and evaluate the efforts of the United States Government to attain its professed goals of peace and self-determination for Namibia. Seconded by the Bishop of Indianapolis.

Amendment carried

The motion, as amended, read:

Resolved, That, in view of the tragic and deteriorating situation in Namibia, the House of Bishops

I. Calls upon the Episcopal Church to assist the Diocese of Namibia to rebuild the Anglican Seminary, churches, and other buildings destroyed by war, and assures the newly elected first African Bishop of Namibia, James H. Kauluma, of its continuing prayers and support; and

II. Calls upon the Episcopal Church and other Christians to continue and intensify efforts to achieve a peaceful solution for Namibia by

1. Renewing its efforts to convince governments, and particularly the government of South Africa, to adhere to the provisions of the United Nations Security Council resolution 435 (which provides for a United Nations-controlled cease-fire, followed by United Nations-supervised elections leading to independence) as the basis for a negotiated settlement of the war in Namibia;

2. Providing increased moral and material support for the Namibian Council of Churches, headed at this time by the Anglican Bishop of Namibia;

3. Distributing educational materials on the detailed provisions of the relevant United Nations decisions and on developments in or affecting Namibia;

Motion carried

The Bishop of Ohio, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Affairs, moved the adoption of the following resolution (B-13):

Whereas, there is a clear escalating spiral in the proliferation of nuclear armaments which threatens the whole created order; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, bishops of the Episcopal Church, meeting in San Diego, California, commit ourselves to a weekly act of fasting and prayer for the peace of the world—until we meet again a year from now at General Convention; and we call upon our clergy and people to join us in this act of devotion,

1. Praying that the responsible leaders of this nation and all the world may be led to reverse this acceleration by taking bold initiatives to control and disarm nuclear forces; and

2. Praying that the people of this nation and this world may be granted a vision of an earth no longer traumatized by the threat of a nuclear holocaust, but instead be empowered by a lively hope in the possibilities of peace; and be it further

Resolved, That this House encourages and supports the Presiding Bishop in his current efforts with other religious leaders of the nation to keep before the President and members of the Congress the concern of Christians throughout America for peace; and if it seems wise, invite him to summon any of us to join in Washington, D.C. at a time appropriate to make a common witness there.

Seconded by the Bishop of West Virginia.

The Bishop of the Rio Grande moved the original language of the Committee, reading "the first Friday of each month," be restored.

Seconded by Bishop Cox.

Amendment failed

The original resolution was put to a vote (B-13).

Motion carried

The Bishop of Ohio, Chairman of the Committee on National and International Affairs, moved the adoption of the following resolution (B-15):

Resolved, That this House of Bishops, meeting in San Diego in the fall of 1981, compelled by the Gospel imperative to be agents of reconciliation, convey to the President of the United States our support of the creation of a National Academy of Peace and Conflict Resolution, as signifying our nation's earnest concern for the establishment of peace; and be it further

Resolved, That we call upon the people of our congregations to lend their support to the establishment of this Academy by writing their representatives in the Congress and inviting their favorable response when appropriate legislation comes before the House and the Senate; and be it further

Resolved, That we invite the Joint Commission on Peace to consider bringing this proposal for a Peace Academy to the attention of the next General Convention.

The motion was seconded by the Bishop of Pennsylvania.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Arkansas, Chairman of the Committee on Resignation of Bishops, moved the following (B-1):

Whereas, the Rt. Rev. Morris Fairchild Arnold has submitted his resignation to the Presiding Bishop and the House of Bishops, with the reluctant consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese of Massachusetts; and

Whereas, he has served this Church with distinction as a Chaplain in the United States Army Reserve during the Second World War in the European theater, as Rector of parishes in Saugus and Belmont in the Diocese of Massachusetts, and for many years as Rector of Christ Church, Cincinnati; and

Whereas, he has served ten years as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts, where he has earned the respect and affection of the clergy and lay people of the Diocese by his wise counsel, concerned pastoral care, and unfailing good temper in the exercise of his Episcopal ministry; and

Whereas, he has been to the present Diocesan Bishop for five years a gentle pastor, a circumspect counselor, fantastic friend, an extraordinary bearer of grace and absolutely perfect suffragan; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this House accept, for reason of age, the resignation of the Rt. Rev. Morris Fairchild Arnold on January 31, 1982, with regret and with thanksgiving for his ministry.

Seconded by the Bishop of Massachusetts.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Arkansas, Chairman of the Committee on Resignation of Bishops, moved the following resolution (B-2):

Whereas, the Rt. Rev. Gray Temple has served faithfully and diligently in this House of Bishops for twenty-one years; and

Whereas, he has shown a remarkable blend of steadfast loyalty, candid courage, and persistent courtesy—amid the crises of diocesan and national affairs; and

Whereas, during his episcopacy the century-long inhibition of segregation was lifted from his Diocese, a bankrupt Porter Academy was merged, moved, and established as a leading preparatory school in the southeast, Voorhees Junior College became a four-year institution provided with the leadership and backing to fulfill the purposes of its founding; therefore be it

Resolved, That his resignation due to age, and to be effective in December, 1981, be accepted by this house with thanks to Almighty God for his ministry. Seconded by the Bishop Coadjutor of South Carolina.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Arkansas, Chairman of the Committee on Resignation of Bishops, moved the adoption of the following (B-4):

My brother, John, and brothers of this House;

Whereas, the Bishop of San Diego, Robert Munroe Wolterstorff, has decided to retire at the end of 1982; and

Whereas, he believes he will have achieved an age (68) where he can adequately and wisely conduct himself with decorum and dignity as a senior (in age only) member of this House; and

Whereas, Roberto (El Obispo de San Diego) a dedicated, devoted parish priest who was moved to tears when elected the first Bishop of the most southwest of all dioceses in ECUSA late in 1973, and who, with great courage, determined that his consecration would be according to the then trial rites of the Church, and further that service was held in the Roman Catholic Chapel (The Immaculata) at San Diego University, making an ecumenical breakthrough of valuable proportion; and

Whereas, as first bishop of this jurisdiction he has shown himself to be a pastor of the pastors, a shepherd of some very errant sheep, a Germanic guide to a contrary crop of clergy who knew better than he regarding change in the Church; and

Whereas, he has held the tiller of this seaside diocese with firmness, and has served the larger Church on the Executive Council; and

Whereas, I am his older brother and neighbor (in service only, mind you), I look forward to sharing the Valley of the Shadow, and maybe even Death Row; therefore be it

Resolved, That we wish Bob and Helen well in retirement.

Seconded by the Bishop of Los Angeles.

Motion carried

The Bishop of Arkansas, Chairman of the Committee on Resignation of Bishops, moved the adoption of the following (B-5):

Whereas, John Brooke Mosley, Jr. will reach the chronological age of 66 years and the episcopal age of 28 years this month; and

Whereas, Brooke, our brother, has faithfully and courageously exercised and expressed Christ's ministry of peace and freedom, justice and mercy, as layman, deacon, priest, and bishop in many places and in several dioceses amongst a great variety of peoples; and

Whereas, Brooke, our friend, is rightly respected and recognized as pastor and prophet, educator and administrator, throughout the whole Church and ecumenical community; and

Whereas, the Bishop of Pennsylvania is eager to continue to engage and utilize the episcopal ministry of Brooke, our colleague, though retired as of December 31, 1981, for regular episcopal visitations and consultations; be it

Resolved, That this House express its good wishes and love to Brooke, our companion, and to his loving and caring wife, Betty, as they move over to another lane labeled: "re-tired for continued service and better mileage."

Seconded by the Bishop of Pennsylvania.

The Bishop of Olympia, in behalf of the Committee on Social and Urban Affairs, moved the adoption of the following (B-8):

Whereas, the Federal Government is cutting back on many programs for the poor; and

Whereas, these cutbacks will have a direct effect on people whom the Church now serves; be it

Resolved, That the House of Bishops urge our Church and other churches to increase their efforts in social service and social action in those areas where hardship is encountered; and be it further

Resolved. That the bishops and other members of the Church do all they can to persuade the private sector to increase its charitable giving, not only to particular institutions, but to churches which serve persons without regard to their religious affiliations; and be it further

Resolved, That the private sector be urged to intensify its effort to ease unemployment and to work with Government to establish businesses in areas of high unemployment.

Seconded by the Bishop of Western Kansas.

The Bishop of Olympia, in behalf of the Committee on Social and Urban Affairs, moved the adoption of the following (B-12):

Whereas, in the current Congress of the United States several different pieces of legislation have been introduced, all of which seek to restrict or prohibit medical procedures intended to effect an abortion; and

Whereas, two successive General Conventions of this Church (1976, 1979) have adopted identical resolutions setting forth a Christian approach to the agonizing ethical and moral issues involved in an abortion, which resolutions both concluded with this paragraph:

"That the Episcopal Church express its unequivocal opposition to any legislation on the part of the national or state governments which would abridge or deny the right of individuals to reach informed decisions in this matter and to act upon them." therefore be it

Resolved, That this House of Bishops meeting reaffirm the sense of the entire resolution, appended hereto, and communicate it to the members of this Church and members of such committees of the House of Representatives and of the United States Senate as are considering these legislative proposals.

Seconded by the Bishop of Oklahoma.

The Bishop of Olympia, in behalf of the Committee on Social and Urban Affairs, moved the adoption of the following (B-18):

Whereas, the New Testament witnesses to the ministry of Jesus among the handicapped of Judea and Samaria; and

Whereas, the Church has attempted to be faithful to its mission to further the spiritual, intellectual, moral, and physical development of the people it serves; and

Whereas, the Episcopal Church has traditionally committed itself to ministries with the blind, deaf, the emotionally and physically handicapped, and the developmentally disabled; and

Whereas, the United Nations has declared 1981 as the International Year of the Disabled Person; and

Whereas, the World Council of Churches has affirmed and committed the Council to support this declaration; therefore be it

Resolved, That the International Year of the Disabled Person be promoted by the bishops of the Episcopal Church during the remainder of 1981; and be it further

Resolved, That information about resources and educational materials be made available for diocesan and parish use; and be it further

Resolved, That dioceses and parishes be reminded to develop capacities to have their buildings, worship services, and programs accessible to the handicapped and disabled persons.

Seconded by the Bishop of Southwest Florida.

Motion carried

The Presiding Bishop recessed the House at 3:15 p.m.

Whereas, the Board of Examining Chaplains and the system of General Ordination Examinations have been in operation for a decade, and would surely have, therefore, accumulated data on the nature of the quality of the academic training of our seminarians which would be of immense value to bishops, standing committees, commissions on ministry, and the seminaries of our Church; therefore be it

APPENDIX I — DAY VIII Pastoral Letter APOCALYPSE AND HOPE

Grace to you and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

We, the bishops of the Episcopal Church, send greetings to all with whom we share the ties of membership in this branch of the Body of Christ.

According to our annual custom, we have met for a week of listening and searching. We have sought to measure the present moment in the light of history and God's word. Even as we met, violence struck down one of the world's great peacemakers, Anwar Sadat. Despite the spread of such strident alarms, we witness to our hope. Ours is a resurrection faith. It rises from that historic death at the center of history. It prevails as a victory of life in the Risen Lord over all that oppresses the human spirit.

Christians are called in that hope to confront the problems revealed by the intense light of any apocalyptic moment. Apocalypse is the term our tradition assigns to eras of special turbulence and change — when Christians are given things to say and things to do.

First, we are compelled to say that never before has it been so clear that reason forbids the use of violence, or the threat of it, as a means of securing one society against another. We know now that massive nuclear overkill poised for instant use represents deadly insecurity for the superpowers, and for the whole world. We know now that the real unit of security in the nuclear age is not the nation, since none can be secure by means of war. The real unit of security is the totality of the human family. The only security available to any nation is the security of all the nations together.

From the appearance of the first cudgel for bashing a predatory neighbor in the next cave, up to the conventional weapons of World War II, there appeared to be some cogency in last-resort reliance on weapons for security. With violence so deeply rooted in human behavior, it becomes an agony of growth to shift to another means of security. It remains far easier to rely on instruments of mutually-assured destruction than to negotiate in patient nonviolence for the means of mutually-assured survival.

We are therefore prompted, as religious leaders, to impose upon ourselves the obligation for making this moral shift. We pray the Holy Spirit to change our hearts, moving us from violence to nonviolence. We call upon our people to join us in that prayer. The shift itself is obedience to an old commandment. Christians are bidden to mutual regard for all in the human family as expressing the sincerity of our love for God. "He who loves me will obey my commands." (St. John 14:15)

Thus the word of the Lord anticipates by 2,000 years the necessity now made inescapable by apocalypse. The Christian tradition does not understand peace in the world to mean the absence of conflict. It means instead the abandonment of violence as a way of resolving even the most severe differences.

That our actions may reflect a new resolve of leadership in peacemaking, we; your bishops, have committed ourselves to a weekly act of fasting and prayer for the peace of the world, until we meet again a year from now at General Convention. We call upon our clergy and people to join us in this act of devotion.

And we pledge repeated challenge to the leaders of the United States and other nations of the world that they repudiate reliance on military threats in favor of the more demanding discipline of military restraint and negotiation for arms control. We call upon our people to join us in this challenge to world leadership, urging them to press the issue with elected officials at all levels of government.

Second, we are compelled to say that the adequacy of spontaneous, private caring for the poor was outgrown long ago. Since the industrial revolution, human society has been increasingly organized. The developed nations function through large institutions structured for education, health care, government, multinational business, and the like. The care that Christians are commanded to extend the poor and the hungry cannot be accomplished apart from serving institutions.

This complex kind of caring is a heavy difficulty. The imperfections of organized, governmental help are easy to identify. Reforms are clearly in order. But we bishops affirm the rightness of this development, despite abuses in welfare, medicare, food stamps, and such.

What we warn against is any sentimental or cynical retreat to a simpler era of sharing, as if history were reversible. The needed reforms now underway in social services may hide such a retreat to one-on-one, pre-institutionalized caring. We trust not. We await results before judging. But it needs to be made clear now that conservative economic policy has no more saving power than liberal economic policy.

The reason for this is that money does not rescue the human soul nor the human enterprise. As a tool, money is indispensable. As a savior, it is an idol.

Still, there is high-mindedness in conservative supply-side economics. It insists on thrift and a balanced budget. It risks a faith in people—that they will not squander their tax savings but share and invest, and so help reduce inflation and multiply jobs.

And there is high-mindedness in liberal economic policy. It insists on the worth of every human soul, demanding that human systems be servants of human dignity.

But both economic policies are flawed by the absence from both of sturdy biblical realism about our natural greed. By nature, all of us understand self-preservation in terms of getting, not sharing. "Me first" is the earliest cry of the human spirit. Only the deepest spiritual and moral turn about discloses that self-interest is served by self-giving, the whole fabric of the social order gaining thereby. So it is that our Lord's first public word is Repent. (St. Mark 1:15) Repent. Turn about. This claims the kingdom.

Taxes to government enpower a public institution to provide for the common good. Budget shifts to increased military spending have meant government withdrawal from some sectors of social caring, and reduction in other sectors. Instantly, the Church and other serving institutions must move to a higher level of involvement with the poor.

As bishops we cordially urge business and industry to advance their charitable giving, as a moral response to the looming increase in human privation. We commend their leaders for such steps already taken.

To boost the capability of our dioceses to meet this new urgency of human need, we, your bishops, pledge an increase in our own regular giving, making use of our tax savings in 1981 as part of that increase. We invite our people to join us. Taxes thus saved will be taxes turned to the very serving from which the federal government withdraws. This could forge a new collaboration between public and private institutional serving, to the enhancement of the servant effectiveness of both.

The most important gift that Christians bring to an apocalyptic moment is the certainty that God reigns — no matter what the intensity of social disorder. God creates from chaos and void, not from ingredients laid out neatly beforehand. God redeems by means of an ugly execution on Calvary, not in response to the sunny hosannas of a grateful public. What this means is that the great moments of history are plausible only in retrospect. Who could have guessed that a high-hearted movement with its arms around the earth was aborning in the carnage of a crucifixion?

Let it be remembered of us, by any who read the pilgrim chronicle of our time, that those who joined hands for the journey in Christ sang their way through darkness and found it pierced by light. And the pilgrimage goes on.

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That, to provide a focus for ECUSA's celebration of the Seabury Bicentennial, the Standing Commission on World Mission be encouraged to support and co-sponsor a Pan-Anglican Symposium in 1984 — with the Dioceses of Connecticut (Convenor), Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and the Church in Scotland, and with cognizance of the Presiding Bishop's Special Committee for the Seabury Bicentennial — to search for a shared theology of the Church as mission, of all churches as missions, and all Christians as Christ-commissioned missionaries.

On any question, the vote of a majority of the Deputies present shall suffice, unless otherwise ordered by this Constitution; or, in cases not specifically provided for by the Constitution, by Canons requiring more than a majority; or unless the Clerical or the Lay representation from three or more Dioceses require that the vote be taken by orders. In all cases of a vote by orders, the two orders shall vote separately, each Diocese and Missionary Diocese having one vote in the Clerical order and one vote in the Lay order; and the concurrence of the votes of the two orders shall be necessary to constitute a vote of the House. No action of either order shall pass in the affirmative unless it receives the majority of all votes cast, and unless the sum of all the affirmative votes shall exceed the sum of other votes by at least one whole vote.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the following proposed amendment having been made known to the several Dioceses and Missionary Dioceses and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution, the 67th General Convention adopt the following amendment to Article VII of the Constitution, to wit:

Convocation of the American Churches in Europe to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or the Missionary Diocese Convocation or the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding regular meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all Dioceses and of all Missionary Dioceses and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders, each having the vote provided for in Sec. 4 of Article I.

A Bishop shall confine the exercise of his office to his own Diocese, or Missionary Diocese, unless he shall have been requested to perform episcopal acts in another Diocese or Missionary Diocese by the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof, or unless he shall have been authorized by the House of Bishops, or by the Presiding Bishop at its direction, to act temporarily in case of need within any territory not yet organized into Dioceses or Missionary Dioceses of this Church.

2. Amend the last sentence of Section 7 of Article II by striking the last 16 words thereof so that said last sentence as amended will read:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the following proposed amendments having been made known to the several Dioceses and Missionary Dioceses and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution, Section 1 of Article V of the Constitution, the 67th General Convention adopt the following amendments to Article V of the Constitution, to wit:

1. Add the word "existing" before the word "Dioceses" where such word first appears in the second sentence of Section 1 of Article V, and strike the last sentence of said Section and substitute a new sentence therefor, so that said Section 1 as amended will read:

ARTICLE V.

Sec. 1 A new Diocese may be formed, with the consent of the General Convention and under such conditions as the General Convention shall prescribe by General Canon or Canons, (1) by the division of an existing Diocese; (2) by the junction of two or more *existing* Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses; or (3) by the erection into a Diocese of an unorganized area evangelized as provided in Article VI.

The proceedings shall originate in a Convocation of the Clergy and Laity of the unorganized area called by the Bishop for that purpose; or, with the approval of the Bishop, in the Convention of the Diocese to be divided; or (when it is proposed to form a new Diocese by the junction of two or more *existing* Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses), by mutual agreement of the Conventions of the Dioceses concerned, with the approval of the Bishop of each Diocese. In case the Episcopate of a Diocese be vacant, no proceedings toward its division shall be taken until the vacancy is filled. When it shall appear to the satisfaction of the General Convention, by a certified copy of the proceedings and other documents and papers laid before it, that all the conditions for the formation of the new Diocese have been compiled with and that it has acceded to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be admitted to union with the General Convention.

After consent of the General Convention, when a certified copy of the duly adopted Constitution of the New Diocese, including an unqualified accession to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, shall have been filed with the Secretary of the General Convention and approved by the Executive Council of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be in union with the General Convention.

The Church in cach Diocese which has been admitted to union with the General Convention shall be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than four Presbyters, canonically resident in the Diocese, and not more than four Lay Persons, communicants of this Church, having domicile in the Diocese, and not more than four Lay Persons, communicants of this Church, having domicile in the Diocese; but the General Convention by Canon may reduce the representation to not fewer than two Deputies in each order. Each Diocese shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

The Church in each Missionary Diocese beyond the territory of the United States of America, which shall have been established by the House of Bishops or by the Constitution, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, shall each be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies equal to that of other Dioceses, subject to all the qualifications and with all the rights of Deputies, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution. Each such Missionary Diocese, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

The Church in each Diocese which has been admitted to union with the General Convention, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, shall be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than four ordained persons, Presbyters or Deacons, canonically resident in the Diocese and not more than four Lay persons, communicants of this Church, in good standing in the Diocese but not necessarily domiciled in the Diocese; but the General Convention by Canon may reduce the representation to not fewer than two Deputies in each order. Each Diocese, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

No person shall be ordered Priest or Deacon to minister in this Church until he shall have been examined by the Bishop and two Priests and shall have exhibited such testimonials and other requisites as the Canons in that case provided may direct. No persons shall be ordained and consecrated Bishop, or ordered Priest or Deacon to minister in this Church, unless at the time, in the presence of the ordaining Bishop or Bishops, he shall subscribe and make the following declaration:

"I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and do solemnly engage to conform to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Episcopal Church."

Provided, however, that any person consecrated a Bishop to minister in any Diocese or Missionary Diocese of an autonomous Church or Province of a Church in communion with this Church may, instead of the foregoing declaration, make the promises of Conformity required by the Church in which he is to minister.

If any Bishop ordains a Priest or Deacon to minister elsewhere than in this Church, or confers ordination as Priest or Deacon upon a Christian minister who has not received Episcopal ordination, he shall do so only in accordance with such provisions as shall be set forth in the Canons of this Church.

No person ordained by a foreign Bishop, or by a Bishop not in communion with this Church, shall be permitted to officiate as a Minister of this Church until he shall have complied with the Canon or Canons in that case provided and also shall have subscribed to the aforesaid declaration.

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Article X of the Constitution be amended by striking therefrom references to Missionary Dioceses and the Convocation of American Churches in Europe, so that said Article X will read:

The Book of Common Prayer and Administration of the Sacraments and Other Rites and Ceremonies of the Church, together with the Psalter or Psalms of David, the Form and Manner of Making, Ordaining, and Consecrating Bishops, Priests, and Deacons, the Form of Consecration of a Church or Chapel, the Office of Institution or Ministers, and Articles of Religion, as now established or hereafter amended by the authority of this Church, shall be in use in all the Dioceses and Missionary Dioceses, and in the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, of this Church. No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed in one regular meeting of the General Convention and by a Resolve thereof be sent within six months to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, and of the Convocation of every Missionary Diocese and of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or Convocation of the Missionary Diocese or of the Convention of the American Churches in Europe, at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding regular meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clorical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies and all the Missionary Dioceses, and of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, voting by orders, each to have the voteprovided for in Article I, Sec. 5. a vote by orders in the House of Deputies in accordance with Article I. Sec. 4, except that concurrence by the orders shall require the affirmative vote in each order by a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies.

But notwithstanding anything hereinabove contained, the General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Diocesses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, and all the Missionary Diocesses, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, voting by orders as previously set forth in this Article:

(a). Amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the Psalms;

(b). Authorize for trial use throughout this Church, as an alternative at any

time or times to the established Book of Common Prayer or to any section or Office thereof, a proposed revision of the whole Book or of any portion thereof, duly undertaken by the General Convention.

And *Provided*, that nothing in this Article shall be construed as restricting the authority of the Bishops of this Church to take such order as may be permitted by the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer or by the Canons of the General Convention for the use of special forms of worship.

A Bishop exercising jurisdiction as the Ordinary, or as the Bishop Coadjutor, of a Diocese, may be elected as Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, or Suffragan Bishop, of a Diocese or Missionary Diocese another Diocese; Provided, that he shall have served not less than five years in his present jurisdiction; and Provided always, that before acceptance of such election he shall tender to the House of Bishops his resignation of his jurisdiction in the Diocese in which he is then serving, subject to conditioned on the required consents of the Bishops and Standing Committees of the Church to his election, and also, if he be a Bishop Coadjutor, his right of succession therein, and such resignation, and renunciation of the right of succession in the case of a Bishop Coadjutor, shall be consented to by the House of Bishops.

Sec. 5. The vote on all questions which come before the House of Deputies shall be governed by the following provisions, supplemented by such procedural provisions as the House of Deputies may adopt in its Rules of Order:

Unless a greater vote on any question is required by this Constitution or by the Canons in cases not specifically dealt with by this Constitution or unless a vote by orders on a question is required, the affirmative vote of a majority of all of the Deputies present and voting shall suffice to carry any question. A vote by orders on any question shall be taken if required for that question by this Constitution or by the Canons or if the Clerical or Lay representation from three or more separate Dioceses shall so request at the time of the call for the vote on that question. In all cases of a vote by orders, the vote of each other, Clerical and Lay, shall be counted separately, each order in each Diocese shall have one vote, and a vote in the affirmative by an order in a Diocese shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the Deputies present in that order in that Diocese.

To carry in the affirmative any question being voted on by orders requires concurrence in the affirmative by both orders and, unless a greater vote is required by this Constitution or by the Canons in cases not specifically dealt with by this Constitution, concurrence in the affirmative by an order requires the affirmative vote in that order by a majority of the Dioceses present in that order.

In order for the disregard or disobedience of a pastoral definition to constitute a violation of ordination vows the pastoral direction must have been a solemn warning to the Presbyter or Deacon; it must have been in writing and set forth clearly the reasons for the pastoral direction; it must have been given in the capacity of the pastor, teacher and canonical overseer of the Presbyter or Deacon; it must have been neither capricious nor arbitrary in nature nor in any way contrary to the Constitution and Canons of the Church, both national and diocesan; and it must have been directed to some matter which concerns the Doctrine, Discipline or Worship of this Church or the manner of life and behavior of the Presbyter or Deacon concerned. Upon trial under any such presentment the question of whether the disregard or disobedience of the pastoral direction specified constitutes a violation of ordination vows is a matter of ultimate fact upon which testimony may be offered.

All such members in good standing who have been confirmed by a-Bishop of this Church or a Bishop of a Church in communion with this Church, or, who have been received into this Church by a Bishop of this Church, and who shall, unless for good cause prevented, have received Holy-Communion at least thrice during the next preceding year, are communicants in good standing.

All communicants of this Church who for the previous year have been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and have been faithful in working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God, are to be considered communicants in good standing.

Sec. 4(a). A communicant or baptized member of this Church in good standing; removing from one Parish or the congregation in which his or her membership is recorded, to another, shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the Parish or Congregation of his or her last enrollment or, if there be no Rector or Minister, from one of the Wardens, a certificate of membership addressed to the Rector or Minister of the Parish or Congregation to which removal is desired, stating indicating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled recorded as a communicant or baptized member (or adult member) in the Parish or Congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred, and recorded as a "baptized member" or "confirmed member" of this Church and whether or not such a member:

1. is a communicant;

2. is recorded as being in good standing;

3. has been confirmed or received by a Bishop of this Church or a Bishop in communion with this Church.

the Rector or Minister or Warden of the Parish or Congregation to which such communicant or baptized member may remove shall enroll him or her as a communicant or baptized member when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to produce such certificate through no fault of such communicant or baptized member, sufficient in the judgment of said Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such Parish or Congregation to which such communicant or baptized member shall have removed shall be sent by the Rector or Minister thereof to the Rector of the Parish from which the communicant or baptized member is removed.

Upon acknowledgment that a member who has received such certificate has been enrolled in another congregation of this or another Church, the Minister or Warden issuing the certificate shall remove the name of the person from the parish register.

(b). The Minister or Warden of the congregation to which such certificate is surrendered shall record in the parish register the information contained on the

presented certificate of membership, and then notify the Minister or Warden of the congregation which issued the certificate that the person has been duly recorded as a member of the new congregation.

Whereupon the person's removal shall be noted in the parish register of the congregation which issued the certificate.

(c). If a member of this Church, not having such a certificate, desires to become a member of the congregation in the place to which he or she has removed, that person shall be directed by the Minister of the said congregation to procure a certificate from the former congregation, although on failure to produce such a certificate through no fault of the person applying, appropriate entry may be made in the parish register upon the evidence of membership status sufficient in the judgment of the Minister or Warden.

(d). Any communicant of any Church in communion with this Church shall be entitled to the benefit of this section so far as the same can be made applicable.

Sec. 4. Every communicant or baptized member of this Church shall be entitled to equal rights and status in any Parish or Mission thereof. He shall not be excluded from the worship or Sacraments of the Church, nor from parochial membership;

Sec. 5. No one shall be denied rights or status in this Church because of race, color, or ethnic origin.

Sec. 6. When a A person to whom the sacraments of the Church shall have been refused, or who has been repelled from the Holy Communion under the rubrics, or who desires a judgment as to his or her status in the Church, shall may lodge a complaint or application with the Bishop, or Ecclesiastical Authority. No Minister of this Church shall be required to admit to the sacraments a person so refused or repelled without the written direction of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority, it shall be the duty of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority, it shall be the duty of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority may in certain circumstances see sees fit to require the person to be admitted or restored because of the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the Minister. If it shall appear to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority that there is sufficient

cause to justify the refusal of Holy Communion, however, appropriate steps shall be taken to institute such an inquiry as may be directed by the Canons of the Diocese, and should no such Canon exist, the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority shall proceed according to such principles of law and equity as will insure an impartial investigation and judgment. decision; but no Minister of this Church shall be required to admit to the sacraments a person so refused or repelled without the written direction of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority.

Sec. 7. No unbaptized person shall be eligible to receive Holy Communion in this Church.

and be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing amendment shall take effect on the first day of January, 1986.

2) Recognize now the Lutheran Church in America, the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, and the American Lutheran Church as Churches in which the Gospel is preached and taught;

3) Encourage the development of common Christian life throughout the respective Churches by such means as the following:

a) Mutual prayer and mutual support, including parochial/congregational and diocesan/synodical covenants or agreements,

b) Common study of the Holy Scriptures, the histories and theological traditions of each Church, and the material of LED I and II.

c) Joint programs of religious education, theological discussion, mission, evangelism, and social action,

d) Joint use of facilities;

4) Affirm now on the basis of studies of LED I and LED II and of the Anglican/Lutheran International Conversations that the basic teaching of each respective Church is consonant with the Gospel and is sufficiently compatible with the teaching of this Church that a relationship of Interim Sharing of the Eucharist is hereby established between these Churches in the U.S.A. under the following guideline:

a) The Episcopal Church extends a special welcome to members of these three Lutheran Churches to receive Holy Communion in it under the Standard for Occasional Eucharist Sharing of its 1979 General Convention. This welcome constitutes a mutual recognition of Eucharistic teaching sufficient for Interim Sharing of the Eucharist, although this does not intend to signify that final recognition of each other's Eucharists or ministries has yet been achieved.

b) Bishops or Dioceses of the Episcopal Church and Bishops/Presidents of the Lutheran Districts and Synods may by mutual agreement extend the regulations of Church discipline to permit common, joint celebration of the Eucharist within their jurisdictions. This is appropriate in particular situations where the said authorities deem that local conditions are appropriate for the sharing of worship jointly by congregations of the respective Churches. The presence of an ordained minister of each participating Church at the altar in this way reflects the presence of two or more Churches expressing unity in faith and baptism as well as the remaining divisions which they seek to overcome; however, this does not imply rejection or final recognition of either Church's Eucharist or ministry. In such circumstances the eucharistic prayer will be one from the *Lutheran Book of Worship* or the *Book of Common Prayer* as authorized jointly by the Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese and the Bishops/Presidents of the corresponding Lutheran Districts/Synods.

c) This resolution and experience of Interim Sharing of the Eucharist will be communicated at regular intervals to other Churches of the Lutheran and Anglican Communions throughout the world, as well as to the various ecumenical dialogues in which Anglicans and Lutherans are engaged, in order that consultation may be fostered, similar experiences encouraged elsewhere, and already existing relationships of full communion respected;

5) Authorize and establish now a third series of Lutheran-Episcopal Dialogues for the discussion of any other outstanding questions that must be resolved before full communion (communio in sacris/altar and pulpit fellowship) can be resolved between the respective Churches, e.g., implications of the Gospel, historic episcopate, and the ordering of ministry (Bishops, Priests, and Deacons) in the total context of apostolicity;

and be it further

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That in Resolution A-37A on Lutheran-Episcopal Relations, Paragraphs 4a and 4b, the word "or" between the words "Eucharist(s)" and "ministries" ("ministry") should be taken in the conjunctive sense so as not totally to separate the doctrine of the Eucharist from the doctrine of the Ordained Ministry.

2. In paragraph (1), delete the first four words of the first sentence so that it begins, "The Holy Scriptures of the Old...";

3. In paragraph (2), delete the first four words of the first sentence so that it begins, "The Apostles' and Nicene Creeds...";

4. In paragraph (3), delete the first four words of the first sentence, so that it begins, "The Church is the sacrament..." In paragraph (3), in the first line, change "God's presence to the world" to "God's presence in the world";

5. In paragraph (4), delete the first four words of the first sentence, so that it begins, "Apostolicity is evidenced...";

6. In paragraph (4), change the second sentence to read as follows: "Apostolic

teaching must, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, be founded upon the Holy Scriptures and the ancient fathers and creeds, making its proclamation of Jesus Christ and his Gospel for each new age consistent with those sources, not merely reproducing them in a transmission of verbal identity";

7. In paragraph (4), line 10, substitute the words the Church for the word Christendom.

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 67th General Convention of the Episcopal Church re-affirm the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral as found on pages 876-878 of the Book of Common Prayer as a statement of basic principles which express our own unity, and as a statement of essential principles for organic unity with other churches, and affirm the following as an explication of that basic document without denying anything contained therein: that

(1) The Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the word of God as they are witness to God's action in Jesus Christ and the continuing presence of his Holy Spirit in the Church, that they are the authoritative norm for catholic faith in Jesus Christ and for the doctrinal and moral tradition of the Gospel, and that they contain all things necessary for salvation.

(2) The Apostles' and Nicene Creeds are the forms through which the Christian Church, early in its history under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, understood, interpreted and expressed its faith in the Triune God. The continuing doctrinal tradition is the form through which the Church seeks to understand, interpret and express its faith in continuity with these ancient creeds and in its awareness of the world to which the Word of God must be preached.

(3) The Church is the sacrament of God's presence to the world and the sign of the Kingdom for which we hope. That presence and hope are made active and real in the Church and in the individual lives of Christian men and women through the preaching of the Word of God, through the Gospel sacraments of Baptism and Eucharist, as well as other sacramental rites, and through our apostolate to the

world in order that it may become the Kingdom of our God and of his Christ. (4) Apostolicity is evidenced in continuity with the teaching, the ministry, and the mission of the apostles. Apostolic teaching must, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, be founded upon the Holy Scriptures and the ancient fathers and creeds. making its proclamation of Jesus Christ and his Gospel for each new age consistent with those sources, not merely reproducing them in a transmission of verbal identity. Apostolic ministry exists to promote, safeguard and serve apostolic teaching. All Christians are called to this ministry by their Baptism. In order to serve, lead and enable this ministry, some are set apart and ordained in the historic orders of Bishop, Presbyter, and Deacon. We understand the historic eniscopate as central to this apostolic ministry and essential to the reunion of the Church, even as we acknowledge "the spiritual reality of the ministries of those Communions which do not possess the Episcopate" (Lambeth Appeal 1920, Section 7). Apostolic mission is itself a succession of apostolic teaching and ministry inherited from the past and carried into the present and future. Bishops in apostolic succession are, therefore, the focus and personal symbols of this inheritance and mission as they preach and teach the Gospel and summon the people of God to their mission of worship and service. And be it further

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That this 67th General Convention commend to the Anglican Consultative Council this commentary as an explication of the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral to guide this Church in its ecumenical dialogues.

Whereas, after a period of seven decades, the House of Bishops of the ECUSA, meeting in October 1971 in Pocono Manor, Pennsylvania, granted the request of the Church in the Philippines for the division of the Missionary District into several episcopal jurisdictions; as well as concurred with the intent of the Bishop and Suffragan Bishops of the Missionary Diocese formerly called Missionary District, as expressed in the preamble of "A Plan for the Establishment of a National Missionary Church and Ultimately an Autonomous Philippine Episcopal Church."; and

Whereas, subsequent to the creation into three Missionary Dioceses, the Philippine Episcopal Church has conducted itself during the decade of the seventies as a "National Missionary Church," with a National Convention and Canons as adopted by the National Convention, and with a Prime Bishop, as well as a National Church Office; and

Whereas, in response to the suggestion of the Executive Council of the ECUSA, the Prime Bishop of the PEC created an Ad Hoc Committee to undertake a study of the possibility and implications of "A Covenant Relationship," which will articulate a new relationship between the PEC and the ECUSA; and

Whereas, upon elevation of the matter to the National Convention of the PEC, the Prime Bishop's Ad Hoc Committee was elevated into a Standing Committee on Church Autonomy and was charged to draw up a plan for an autonomous church province; and

Whereas, after separate consultations with Bishop Howe of ACC, representatives from ECUSA, the National Commissions of the PEC, and discussions on the diocesan level, the National Council approved the recommendation of the Standing Committee on Autonomy that a Covenant relationship be considered an integral part of the plan towards the establishment of an autonomous church province; and

Whereas, the PEC projects that the proposed General Constitution and Canons of the province shall be presented for first reading in the National Convention in 1984 and second reading in 1986; the PEC has set 1988 General Convention of the ECUSA as the earliest possible date for constitutional autonomy; therefore be it

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That in view of, and as a necessary stage in, the desire for the ultimate establishment of an autonomous churchprovince of the Anglican Communion in the Philippines, the Philippine Episcopal Church in National Convention enter into covenant with the Episcopal Church in the United States of America in General Convention, of which we are presently a part—whereby a new level of relationship for mission in the region is established with commitments and responsibilities as follows:

1) That the PEC confirms its intention to become an autonomous province of the Anglican Communion;

2) That there shall be established a Joint Committee on Consultation to be made

up of members from the PEC and the ECUSA. The task of the Committee will be to consult, cooperate and offer advice on missionary activities which shall include, but not be limited to, Partners in Mission; spiritual renewal; stewardship; development plans; education, health and agricultural programs; the training and development of clergy and lay theologians; ecumenical agreements, commitments and involvements; and other shared problems;

3) That until such time that PEC attains Constitutional Autonomy, the Bishops of the PEC shall continue to be members of the House of Bishops of the ECUSA; and that deputies of the PEC dioceses shall continue to have seat, voice and vote in the House of Deputies of the ECUSA;

4) That during the Covenant period the PEC shall provide ECUSA with a completed copy of the Constitution and Canons of the Autonomous Church Province as envisioned, and in accordance with the regulations of the Anglican Consultative Council;

5) That the PEC shall evolve a Book of Common Prayer which shall be authorized for the use of the Church Province;

6) That the PEC shall continue to contribute to the general apportionment to ECUSA while at the same time developing its own national church apportionment; and will develop a five year program and budget projection in cooperation with the Treasurer of the Executive Council in accordance with the guidelines set by this Convention;

7) That PEC may seek and ECUSA will encourage the development of companion diocese relationship programs between PEC or its constituent dioceses and the dioceses and provinces of the ECUSA;

8) That the ECUSA will continue to promote the Venture in Mission Project in the Philippines and it will carry out the financial assistance as shall be outlined by the Joint Committee on Consultation;

9) That because of the historic nature of Saint Andrew's Theological Seminary (SATSEM) as an Anglican Institution of higher theological education in East Asia and the South Pacific, the ECUSA will continue to give moral and financial assistance to PEC in its support to said Seminary;

10) That the ECUSA shall continue to support the PEC commitment in its conciliar relationship with the Philippine Independent Church (PIC);

11) (*This paragraph was not passed but referred to The Church Pension Fund*) That prior to its becoming an autonomous church province, the PEC with the assistance of ECUSA will develop a pension scheme for PEC clergy and lay employees, and that meanwhile the present pension scheme of the ECUSA be retained;

12) That this Covenant shall take effect upon approval by both the PEC and National Convention of 1982 and the ECUSA General Convention of 1982;

13) That this Covenant relation shall be subject to review not less than once every two (2) years to enable changes and modifications as may become necessary, and will continue in force until agreement by both parties terminate; and be it further

Resolved, That the members of the Joint Committee on Consultation of the ECUSA be appointed by the Presiding Bishop; and be it further

Resolved, That the review shall include any reports and recommendations made by the Joint Committee on Consultation referred to in Item 2 of the Covenant.

Planning is done cooperatively, in the national Church, by the Executive Council, with the Presiding Bishop (Church Center staff) and General Convention interim bodies, and through our official representatives to the Anglican Partnersin-Mission Consultation, the Anglican Consultative Council, the World Council of Churches and other international ecumenical groups of which we are members—in anticipation that independent organizations of the Church will do the same.

Any assistant Minister selected shall serve at the discretion of the Rector but may not serve beyond the period of service of the Rector except that, pending the call of a new Rector, such assistant Minister may continue in the service of the Parish if requested to do so by the Vestry of the Parish and under such conditions as the Bishop and Vestry shall determine.

-(c). In case of the election of an Assistant Minister the name of the Elergyman

-whom it is proposed to elect shall be made known to the Bishop, and sufficient -time, not to exceed thirty days, shall be given him to communicate with the Rector and Vestry thereon.-

(b): (c). For the purposes of his office and for the full and free discharge of all functions and duties pertaining thereto, the Rector shall, at all times, be entitled to the use and control of the Church and Parish buildings, with the appurtenances and furniture thereof.

(d). In a Missionary Cure the control and responsibility belong to the Priest who has been duly appointed to the charge thereof, subject to the authority of the Bishop.

Whenever the Church in any Diocese shall desire the ordination and consecration of a Bishop-elect, if the election shall have taken place within three months before a meeting of the General Convention, the Standing Committee of the said Diocese shall, by their President, or by some person or persons specially appointed, forward to the Secretary of the House of Deputies evidence of the election of the Bishop-elect by the Convention of the Diocese, together with evidence of his having been duly ordered Deacon and Priest, and also a testimonial, signed by a constitutional majority of such Convention, in the following words, *viz*:

"We, whose names are hereunder written, fully sensible how important it is that the Sacred Order and Office of a Bishop should not be unworthily conferred and firmly persuaded that it is our duty to bear testimony on this solemn occasion without partiality or affection, do, in the presence of Almighty God, testify that the Reverend A.B. is not, so far as we are informed, justly liable to evil report, either for error in religion or for vieiousness of life; and that we know of no impediment on account of which he the Reverend A.B. ought not to be ordained and consecrated to that Holy Office. We do, moreover, jointly and severally declare that we believe him to be of such sufficiency in good learning, of such soundness in the Faith, and of such virtuous and pure manners and godly conversation, that he is apt and meet to exercise the Office of a Bishop to the honour of God and the edifying of his Church, and to be a wholesome example to the flock of Christ.

(Signed)_

The Secretary of such Convention shall certify upon this testimonial that it has been signed by a constitutional majority thereof. There shall also be forwarded, with the testimonial and other documents, certificates from two medical doctors, who shall be chosen by the Presiding Bishop, that they have thoroughly examined the Bishop elect and have not discovered in his physical, mental, or nervous condition any reason why it would not be wise for such person to undertake the work for which he has been chosen.

The Secretary of such Convention shall certify upon this testimonial that it has been signed by a constitutional majority thereof. There shall also be forwarded with the testimonial and other documents, certificates from two recognized and licensed professionals, appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese with the approval of the Presiding Bishop, that they have thoroughly examined the Bishop-elect as to such person's physical and mental conditions and have not discovered any reason why it would not be wise for such person to undertake the work for which such person has been chosen. The forms for medical and psychiatric reports prepared by The Church Pension Fund shall be used for this purpose.

The Secretary of the House of Deputies shall lay the said testimonials before the House, and if the House shall consent to the consecration of the Bishop-elect, notice of such consent, certified by the President and Secretary of said House, shall be sent to the House of Bishops, together with the testimonials aforesaid.

A person of Christian character, proven fitness, and leadership in his community, who is willing to serve in the capacity of Deacon without relinquishing his secular occupation, may be proposed and recommended to the Bishop, for *admission* as a *Postulant* by the Minister and Vestry of the Parish in which his service is desired, or (should the Parish be without a Minister) by the Vestry and some other Presbyter of the Diocese in good standing, or (if it is intended that the *Postulant* should serve outside, or apart from, an organized parish) by one such Presbyter and six Lay Communicants of this Church in good standing who are well informed regarding the area or circumstances within which it is proposed that the *Postulant* should serve. This recommendation shall be in writing, and shall include a statement indicating whether the person is being proposed for the Diaconate only, or for the Diaconate and subsequently for the Priesthood. Such a *Postulant* may be admitted as a Candidate upon the following conditions:

(1) He shall have reached the canonical age for Deacons, and attained such maturity as the Bishop, Commission on Ministry, and Standing Committee *shall* find acceptable for ordination.

(2) The requirements of Canon III.2. Secs. 1, 2(c) and (d), 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, and of Canon III.3 except for the provisions as to time contained in Sec. 2(b) of Canon III.3 shall be fulfilled in such manner as is pertinent to the circumstances.

(3) Fulfillment of the requirements of subparagraph (c) or (d) of Sec. 6 of Canon 111.2 shall suffice as educational qualification for admission as a Candidate.

At the General Convention in which these provisions are adopted, two Bishops, one Presbyter or Deacon, and three Lay Persons shall be appointed to serve for one-half of a regular term and one Bishop, two Presbyters or Deacons, and three Lay Persons shall be appointed to serve full terms. At each succeeding regular General Convention one-half of the membership shall be appointed to serve full terms.

(e). Positions on the Board which become vacant between regular meetings of the General Convention shall be filled by appointment of the respective Presiding Officers, and those appointed shall serve until the next regular meeting of the General Convention. Vacancies which exist at the time of the General Convention shall be filled by appointment as provided in Subparagraph (b) above and those appointed shall serve until the end of the term of the position which was vacant.

Sec. 2. The duties of the Board for Church Deployment shall be:

1. To oversee the Church Deployment Office.

2. To study the deployment needs and trends in the Episcopal Church and in other Christian bodies.

3. To issue and distribute such reports and aids concerning deployment as it deems helpful to the Church.

4. To cooperate with the other Boards, Commissions, and Agencies of the Church which are concerned with ministry, and particularly with the Executive Council.

5. To report on its work and the work of the Church Deployment Office at each regular meeting of the General Convention.

6. To report to the Executive Council at regular intervals as a part of its accountability to the Council for the funding which the Church Deployment Office receives.

7. To direct the executive of the Church Deployment Office to work in cooperation with the Church Center staff, especially with those concerned with the Ministry and Mission of the Church.

8. To fulfill such other responsibilities as may be assigned to it by the General Convention.

Of Religious Orders and Other Christian Communities

Sec. 1(a). A Religious Order of this Church is a society of Christians (in communion with the See of Canterbury) who voluntarily commit themselves for life, or a term of years: to holding their possessions in common or in trust; to a celibate life in community; and obedience to their Rule and Constitution. (b). To be officially recognized, a Religious Order must have at least six (6) professed members, and must be approved by the Standing Committee on Religious Orders of the House of Bishops and be registered with said committee.

(c). Each Order shall have a Bishop Visitor or Protector, who shall not of necessity be the Bishop of the Diocese in which the Order is established. If, however, the Bishop Visitor or Protector is not the Bishop of the Diocese in which the Mother House of the Order is situated, he shall not accept election without the consent of the Bishop of said Diocese. He shall be the guardian of the Constitution of the Order, and shall serve as an arbiter in matters which the Order or its members cannot resolve through its normal processes.

(d). Any persons under vows in a Religious Order, having exhausted the normal processes of the Order, may petition the Bishop Visitor or Protector for dispensation from those vows. In the event the petitioner is not satisfied with the ruling of the Bishop Visitor or Protector on such petition, he may file a petition with the Presiding Bishop of the Church, who shall appoint a Board of three Bishops to review the petition and the decision thereon, and to make recommendation to the Presiding Bishop, who shall have the highest dispensing power for Religious Orders, and his ruling on the petition shall be final.

(e). A Religious Order may establish a house in a Diocese only with the permission of the Bishop of the Diocese. This permission once granted shall not be withdrawn by him or any succeeding Bishop.

(f). The Constitution of every Religious Order shall make provision for the legal ownership and administration of the temporal possessions of the Order and in the event of dissolution of the Order, or should it otherwise cease to exist, to provide for the disposition of its assets according to the laws governing non-profit religious organizations in the State wherein the Order is incorporated.

(g). It is recognized that a Religious Order is not a Parish, Mission, Congregation or Institution of the Diocese within the meaning of Title 1, Canon 6, Sec. 3, of these Canons, and the provisions thereof shall not apply to Religious Orders.

Sec. 2(a). A Christian Community of this Church under this Canon is a society of Christians (in communion with the See of Canterbury) who voluntarily commit themselves for life, or a term of years, in obedience to their Rule and Constitution.

(b). To be officially recognized such a Christian Community must have at least six (6) full members in accordance with their Rule and Constitution, and must be approved by the Standing Committee on Religious Orders of the House of Bishops and be registered with said Committee.

(c). Each such Christian Community of this Church shall have a Bishop Visitor or Protector, who shall not necessarily be the Bishop of the Diocese in which the Community is established. If, however, the Bishop Visitor or Protector is not the Bishop of the Diocese in which the Mother House of the Community is situated, he shall not accept election without the consent of the Bishop of said Diocese. He shall be the guardian of the Constitution of the Community, and shall serve as an arbiter in matters which the Community or its members cannot resolve through its normal processes.

(d). Any persons under full commitment in such a Christian Community, having exhausted the normal processes of the Community, may petition the Bishop Visitor or Protector for dispensation from that full commitment. In the event the petitioner is not satisfied with the ruling of the Bishop Visitor or Protector on such petition, he may file a petition with the Presiding Bishop of the Church, who shall appoint a Board of three Bishops to review the petition and the decision thereon, and to make recommendation to the Presiding Bishop, who shall have the highest dispensing power for Christian Communities, and his ruling on the petition shall be final.

(e). Each such Christian Community may establish a house in a Diocese only with the permission of the Bishop of the Diocese.

(f). The Constitution of every such Christian Community shall make provision for the legal ownership and administration of the temporal possessions of the Community and in the event of dissolution of the Community, or should it otherwise cease to exist, to provide for the disposition of its assets according to the laws governing non-profit religious organizations in the State wherein the Community is incorporated.

(g). It is recognized that each such Christian Community is not a Parish, Mission, Congregation or Institution of the Diocese within the meaning of Title 1, Canon 6, Sec. 3 of these Canons, and the provisions thereof shall not apply to such Christian Communities.

Whereas, the Scriptures defined God's Reign as a society of shalom, of peace and justice for all people; and

Whereas, Jesus defined his mission to be "to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives, new sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free" (Luke 4:18-19); and

Whereas, Jesus identified so completely with poor and oppressed people that he told his followers that to meet or fail to meet the needs of the hungry, the stranger, the one without clothing, the sick, or the prisoner is to serve or not serve Jesus himself (Matthew 25); and

Whereas, the mission of the Church in this and every age is to embody faithfully the mission of Jesus Christ in the Time of Jubilee, the New Creation of Shalom; therefore be it

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 67th General Convention affirms that a ministry of joint discipleship in Christ with poor and oppressed people, wherever they are found, to meet basic human needs and to build a just society, is at the heart of the mission of the Church; and be it further

Resolved, That the Executive Council is directed to implement and coordinate with other programs of the Church the following functions of a priority ministry commitment by this Church to be called "The Jubilee Ministry":

1). Consciousness Raising. To challenge and confront the members of the Episcopal Church and other churches, through conferences, seminars, study materials, Christian education programs, and this Church's seminaries to understand the facts of poverty and injustice, encouraging them to take an active role in meeting the needs of poor and oppressed people and in the struggles against the causes of such suffering.

2). Designated Jubilee Centers. Through a sub-committee of the Coalition for Human Needs to locate and affirm as Jubilee Centers those congregations, including ecumenical clusters, already directly engaged in mission and ministry among and with poor people, so that their experience can be studied and the learnings used by other parishes to become Jubilee Centers.

3). Training. For leadership of, and involvement in, Jubilee Ministry, through academic-year field training for clergy and seminarians, summer work programs, seminars and classes for clergy and lay volunteers, including poor and oppressed people and indigenous leaders, sabbaticals, shared work between parishes in partnership, and utilization of retirees.

4). Human Resources. To identify persons with gifts and skills helpful in Jubilee Ministry, establish a retrieval system, and match personnel with Jubilee Center needs.

5). Research and Evaluation. To select particular Jubilee Ministries with significant potential as models, and to communicate their work and methodology to the whole Church.

6). Publications. To publish a quarterly journal at a nominal price to report on issues which affect the poor, public and church policy related to those issues, theological reflection, and local models of Jubilee Ministry, as well as occasional papers and books on related concerns.

7). Network for Public Policy. To cooperate closely with such organizations as the Episcopal Urban Caucus, the Standing Commission on the Church in Small Communities, the Appalachian Peoples Service Organization (APSO) and

Coalition Fourteen (C-14) and others, in developing an active network able to respond quickly and significantly on public issues of peace and justice.

8). Evangelism and Congregational Development. To seek and implement additional ways of urban and rural evangelism, especially in the formation of non-caucasian congregations.

9). Jubilee Ministry Grants. To be made by the Coalition for Human Needs commission through the Executive Council, in accordance with the procedures and guidelines in the report of the Standing Commission on the Church in Metropolitan Areas, representing, in sum, a concrete expression of the priority commitment made by this Church in the foregoing resolution.

D. That each of these Seminaries shall present to the Board for Theological Education prior to each General Convention a report regarding its mission and goals, and progress in fulfilling them;

E. That these Seminaries, their Boards of Trustees, and the Council of Deans shall take the initiative to strengthen the partnership between the Church and its Seminaries and to improve the dialogue with congregations and Dioceses by providing them with current information about the Seminaries and listening with equal concern regarding the mission, goals, and quality of theological education; and by reporting directly to Dioceses and congregations about their expressed concerns;

F. That Dioceses, parishes, and missions be encouraged also to support other

programs and institutions of theological education that are of importance to their educational and missionary goals;

Resolved, That this Convention calls upon the Clergy and Laypersons in our provinces, dioceses and local congregations to encourage in their several communities a freer acceptance of refugees and immigrants, especially in areas of high employment potential or other feasible places; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention urges the President of the United States and the Congress to welcome by a uniform federal code to our shores refugees and immigrants in proportion as our nation is able to provide shelter, training, education and sustenance on a continuing basis, without discrimination as to race, geographic origin, nationality, sexual orientation or language, and in particular to cease the inhuman treatment accorded in recent years to refugees from Haiti and El Salvador; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention further urges the President of the United States and the Congress to enact refugee and immigrant related legislation, rules and procedures after seeking consultation, coordination and cooperation with other nations which would be impacted by such legislation, rules and procedures; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention recognize that future refugee and immigrant problems cannot disappear without active work for the improvement of the quality of life in developing countries, and therefore, urge enlarged support for long-term developmental programs within Third World countries; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention urges the President and the Congress to adopt policies that will grant permanent resident status to overstayed/undocumented persons who have resided in the United States for a definite and reasonable period of time and have come here because of political economic stress.

2. Urge the President and the Congress to proceed, without delay, to draft and enact legislation to promote the judicious use of our land resources and to develop and declare a national Land Use Ethic.

The initial agenda for each Committee might include:

1. To study, identify, and confront the root cause of racism in all people, systems, and institutions; to produce educational programs and to advocate economic and political reforms, working with religious and other groups in the community;

2. To lend support for truly desegregated communities, schools, and houses of worship;

3. To encourage, recruit, and deploy minority people in all professions on a non-discriminatory basis, particularly within the Church;

4. To apply a collective imagination for the creation of new jobs, including training programs in job skills and work discipline, that are characterized by equality of opportunity—from top to bottom;.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That this 67th General Convention urge that the present immigration laws be amended to allow Amerasian children fathered by American servicemen to come to the United States, and encourage the Dioceses, congregations, and families of the Church to provide for them, and make them welcome; and be it further

Resolved, That we urge the Presiding Bishop to initiate practical steps to encourage the transporting and sponsoring of these children and young adults coming to our country, as we recall that He taught us, "as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me (Matthew 25:40)."

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That The Episcopal Church recognize the life-giving benefits of organ, blood, and tissue donation and encourage all Christians to become organ, blood, and tissue donors as part of their ministry to others in the name of Christ, who gave his life that we may have life in its fullness.

1. That, in addition to economic and competitive factors, such decisions take into consideration the common good of the community measured by whether the decisions:

a. Serve the goal of optimal employment for people;

b. Maintain wage and salary standards for all employees;

c. Support principles of collective bargaining;

d. Contribute to the stability of affected communities; and

2. That such decisions take into consideration long-range as well as short-range consequences, including whether the decisions:

a. Strengthen the existing industrial base or replace it with a substantial and equivalent alternative;

b. Contribute to the rational use of the industrial potential of workers in the affected community;

c. Make efficient use of increasingly scarce resources such as air, water, land, ores, minerals — particularly the non-renewable resources; and

3. That such decisions avoid increasing the concentration of power and wealth as is consistent with both biblical teachings about justice and American democratic traditions; and be it further

Resolved,

1. That each congregation of this Church be encouraged to undertake serious discussion of economic decisions by government, private corporations, and unions with respect to the above criteria, drawing upon the theological resources of Christian faith and the integrity of biblical teachings about justice; and

2. That the Secretary of this Convention is instructed to send copies of this resolution to the President of the United States and to appropriate members of the Administration; including the Secretaries of Commerce and Labor; to the President of the AFL/CIO and other appropriate labor officials; and to the Presidents of the United States Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers; and

3. That the Bishops of the several Dioceses be requested to send copies of this resolution to selected company presidents and labor leaders residing in their jurisdictions; and

Whereas, the Church believes and affirms the teaching of Holy Scripture that "the body is the temple of the Holy Spirit," and affirms that human sexuality is a gift of God that blesses and enriches the whole of life, and that sexual union is a holy bond of commitment and fidelity between man and wife through the blessing of the holy estate of Matrimony; and

Whereas, pornography lacks respect for the body, debasing and soiling this good gift of God by advertising deviate forms of vice, which tend to increase the amount of addiction to such vice; and

Whereas, pornography undermines the holy estate of Matrimony and the divinely ordered family life, equating human sexuality with temporary pleasure, disregarding the responsibility and abiding affection that distinguishes sexuality from promiscuity, prostitution, and degeneracy; and

Whereas, pornography has created an insatiable lust which now extends to the use of children, exploiting and debasing them, and advocating incest and sexual relations between children and adults; therefore be it

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 67th General Convention reaffirms the Church's biblical conviction that human sexuality is a gift of God intended to bless and enrich the whole of life, and urges all priests, educators and parents to provide an ethos in which children may mature in a healthy and

responsible understanding of their sexuality, counteracting the dehumanizing influence of exploitive pornography.

[B-9S]

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the following principles and guidelines adopted by the 65th General Convention (1976) and reaffirmed by the 66th General Convention (1979) be reaffirmed by this 67th General Convention:

1. The beginning of new human life, because it is a gift of the power of God's love for his people, and thereby sacred, should not and must not be undertaken unadvisedly or lightly but in full accordance of the understanding for which this power to conceive and give birth is bestowed by God.

2. Such understanding includes the responsibility for Christians to limit the size of their families and to practice responsible birth control. Such means for moral limitations do not include abortion for convenience.

3. The position of this Church, stated at the 62nd General Convention of the Church in Seattle in 1967, which declared support for the "termination of pregnancy" particularly in those cases where "the physical or mental health of the mother is threatened seriously, or where there is substantial reason to believe that the child would be born badly deformed in mind or body, or where the pregnancy has resulted from rape or incest" is reaffirmed. Termination of pregnancy for these reasons is permissible.

4. In those cases where it is firmly and deeply believed by the person or persons concerned that pregnancy should be terminated for causes other than the above, members of this Church are urged to seek the advice and counsel of a Priest of this Church, and, where appropriate, penance.

5. Whenever members of this Church are consulted with regard to proposed termination of pregnancy, they are to explore, with the person or persons seeking advice and counsel, other preferable courses of action.

6. The Episcopal Church expresses its unequivocal opposition to any legislation on the part of the national or state governments which would abridge or deny the right of individuals to reach informed decisions in this matter and to act upon them.

Resolved, That the central theme of such reexamination shall be the redemptive and sacramental nature of Holy Matrimony; and as a point of departure for the considerations of the diocesan Commissions, the working paper attached, prepared by the Standing Commission on Human Affairs and Health, is offered for earnest consideration; and be it further

Resolved, That the charge to the diocesan Commissions shall include, but not be limited to, consideration of: means of revitalization of the sacramental and redemptive qualities of marriage; existing Canons on marriage; counseling, advice, and spiritual support for prospective partners in the sacrament; continuing education procedures and practices for clergy and laity, including children and young adults; the role of the clergy and the marriage partners in the failed marriage; prenuptial guidance and instruction; continuing parish support for the married pair; guidance in childbearing and rearing; and other appropriate matters; and be it further

Resolved, That the findings of the diocesan Commissions shall be forwarded to the Standing Commission on Human Affairs and Health in time to permit that Commission to study and review the findings during the triennium preceding the 69th General Convention and to make legislative proposals to that Convention.

Whereas, new biomedical diagnostic techniques now allow the detection of a wide range of medical abnormalities in the unborn child; and

Whereas, the gender of the prospective newborn can also be determined by the same techniques; and

Whereas, such information gives use to the need for serious and difficult decisions of continuing a pregnancy; therefore be it

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, **That the 67th General Convention of** the Episcopal Church strongly condemns the act of abortion when the sole purpose of such action is the selection of the sex of the child; and be it further

Resolved, That this new ability to diagnose serious abnormalities in the fetus before birth is a welcome gift to reduce pain and sorrow in the parents and suffering in the newborn, but that abortion after the diagnosis of non-serious or trivial abnormalities, or abortion in a case where purely cosmetic abnormalities are discovered, is also strongly condemned.

a) Establishing appropriate diocesan or provincial Committee(s) to assure that the customary decision-making process is in place, being sensitive to the culture and customs of the jurisdiction;

b) Accounting, reporting, and external control procedures necessary to manage and safeguard the funds of the Diocese or Province. This would include audits and reviews as necessary to ensure the normal checks and balances;

c) Develop a five-year program and budget projection with the appropriate authority in the Diocese or Province, the text of which would describe in detail the goals and objectives of the Diocese or Province during this period. The Treasurer of the Executive Council and the Executive for World Mission are to attach to the goals and objectives any commentary they feel is necessary, including adequate planning for clergy pensions;

d) The Treasurer of the Executive Council and the Executive for World Mission must assure the Structure Committee of General Convention and World Mission and Finance/Administration Committees of Executive Council that the procedures stated in paragraph 2 are in place;

e) Appropriation from the Program Development Budget be given subject to a contractual agreement to ensure stability in the finances of the Diocese or Province during the three-year trial period(s); and be it further

Resolved, That the Structure Committee shall then recommend to General Convention one of the following:

1. The request be granted;

2. Extension of the trial period be granted for no more than one additional three-year period;

3. The request not be granted at this time.

b) The Western Diocese shall include 23 counties: Wichita, Archer, Young, Stephens, Eastland, Brown, Mills, Hamilton, Comanche, Erath, Somervell, Palo Pinto, Jack, Clay, Montague, Wise, Parker, Hood, Bosque, Hill, Johnson, Tarrant, Cooke, and the portion of the City of Grand Prairie located in Dallas County. and be it further

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That this 67th General Convention receive the following evidence supporting this resolution:

1. Certified copy of the resolution, duly approved by the Diocese of Dallas, committing the Diocese to its division and to the formation of a new Diocese;

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Title I, Canon 8, Sections 1, 2a, 2b, and 7, and Title I, Canon 10, Section 3g be amended and that a new subsection be added to Title I, Canon 10, Section 2, as follows:

TITLE I.

Canon 8.

Sec. 1.... The Eighth Province shall consist of the Dioceses within the States of Idaho, Utah, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, California, Arizona, Alaska, and Hawaii, the Dioceses of this Church in the Philippines and Taiwan. *and the Area Mission of Navajoland*.

TITLE I.

Canon 8.

Sec. 2(a). When a new Diocese or Area Mission shall be created wholly within any Province, such new Diocese or Area Mission shall be included in such Province. In case a new Diocese or Area Mission shall embrace territory in two or more Provinces, it shall be included in and form a part of the Province wherein the greater number of Presbyters and Deacons in such new Diocese or Area Mission shall, at the time of its creation, be canonically resident. Whenever a new Diocese or Area Mission shall be formed of territory not before included in any Diocese *Province*, the General Convention shall designate the Province to which it shall be annexed.

TITLE I.

Canon 8.

Sec. 2(b). By mutual agreement between the Synods of two adjoining Provinces, a Diocese *or Area Mission* may transfer itself from one of such Provinces to the other, such transfer to be considered complete upon approval thereof by the General Convention. Following such approval, Canon I.8.1 shall be appropriately amended.

ŤITLE I.

Canon 8.

Sec. 7. Each Diocese and Area Mission within the Province shall be entitled to representation in the Provincial House of Deputies by Presbyters or Deacons

canonically resident in the Diocese or Area Mission, and Lay Persons, communicants of this Church having domicile in good standing, but not necessarily domiciled in the Diocese or Area Mission, in such number as the Provincial Synod, by Ordinance, may provide. Each Diocese and Area Mission shall determine the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

TITLE I. Canon 10.

Sec. 2(f). An Area Mission which shall have been undertaken under the sole auspices of this Church, with a Bishop of this Church assigned to give episcopal oversight, shall be entitled to representation in the Provincial House of Bishops and the Provincial House of Deputies in the Province of which it is a part. TITLE I.

Canon 10.

Sec. 3(g). At the request of the Convention of a Missionary Diocese, accompanied by the Bishop's written resignation of his permanent jurisdiction therein, the General Convention may alter the status of a Missionary Diocese to that of an Area Mission, under such terms and conditions as may be stipulated by the House of Bishops in accordance with Canon I.10.2(a); and in such case, its right to representation by Deputies in the General Convention *and the Provincial Synod* shall cease.

(The Committee agreed that the change was an inadvertent omission in the text, and that it was not necessary to obtain reconcurrence by the Bishops)

Whereas, the efforts of the Episcopal Church and other Anglican bodies contributed to the development in 1912 of an indigenous Province of the Anglican Communion, the Chung Hua Sheng Kung Hui; and

Whereas, following the end of the Cultural Revolution in the Peoples Republic of China, the Clergy and Lay members of the Chung Hua Sheng Kung Hui have joined with other Christians throughout China to put into practice the movement for self-government, self-support, self-propagation; and

Whereas, Christians in China are attempting to work together through a new national structure, the China Christian Council, to strengthen the pastoral work of their Christian communities and to face the basic question of the relationship between God and man and of the fulfillment of God's purpose for society; and

Whereas, the Christian leaders of China, in recent meetings with Christians outside China, have indicated their readiness to renew relationships with the wider Christian church; and

Whereas, the Archbishop of Canterbury, on his recent historic visit to China, commented on the "painful and difficult period during the Cultural Revolution," and added that it was good to see them "working together so effectively to give the Christian faith an authentic Chinese face"; be it therefore

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 67th General Convention call upon the membership of the Episcopal Church to be alert to what God may be trying to teach us through the experience of Chinese Christians and to join with them in mutual prayers of intercession for one another; and be it further

Resolved, That the Christian send greetings to our brothers and sisters in Christ in China, through the China Christian Council, assuring them of our prayers and our willingness to assist them in any way they deem appropriate and within our power; and be it further

Resolved, That the staff of the Episcopal Church Center be instructed to explore ways in which further cooperation with Chinese Christians can be developed, whenever possible coordinating these efforts with other Anglican bodies and partners in the ecumenical movement.

FIRST DAY

Sunday September 5, 1982

This being the day and place designated for the meeting of the Sixty-seventh General Convention, the President of the House of Deputies, Dr. Charles R. Lawrence, of New York, called the House to order at 2:34 P.M. at the Rivergate Convention Center in New Orleans, in the Diocese of Louisiana.

Appointment of the Chaplain

The President announced the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Charles Price, Clerical Deputy from Virginia, to be Chaplain in the House of Deputies for this Convention. The Chaplain led the House in prayer.

The President invited the clerical and lay deputation from the Diocese of Louisiana to accompany the Bishop of Louisiana to the platform.

The Rt. Rev. James B. Brown, Bishop of Louisiana, extended greeting to the House.

Quorum

The Chair requested the Secretary to certify if a quorum were present. The Secretary so certified:

I hereby certify that, pursuant to Section 4 of Article I. of the Constitution, the clerical order being represented by at least one deputy in each of a majority of the dioceses entitled to representation in this Convention, and the lay order being likewise represented by at least one deputy in each of a majority of the dioceses entitled to representation, there is an undoubted quorum of this House present for the transaction of business.

James R. Gundrum Secretary

The Hon. George Shields, of Spokane, Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, presented Committee Report #5 and moved that the calling of the roll be dispensed with.

The President's Address

The President thanked the many volunteers and others who had made the 67th Convention a reality. He then addressed the House.

Sisters and Brothers:

We enter this 67th General Convention of the Episcopal Church with an appropriate combination of mutually-supporting, as well as conflicting, emotions. We are *thankful*—thankful to be among old friends; thankful for the many

evidences of God's work in His world; and thankful for personal and corporate blessings beyond reckoning.

We are *excited*—excited by the ambience of expectation that always surrounds this great gathering of the Episcopal clan; excited with the ambivalent feelings that we know when an agenda carries the possibility of conflict; enjoying on the one hand, the prospect of a good fight, and on the other, having the typical American middle-class aversion to overt conflict.

We are *determined*—determined to give our best as deputies, as exhibitors, as lobbyists, to seek that toward which we firmly believe we are being led by the Holy Spirit; and most of us are also equally determined, by God's grace, to work for an amicable resolution of our differences.

As people in the world of 1982, we are *fearful*—fearful of the worldwide economic dislocation; its domestic manifestation in unemployment rates higher than we have known since the Great Depression, in 30,000 homeless men and women sleeping in the streets and train stations of New York City, and in the eyes of formerly self-sufficient men and women, as they find themselves reduced to the prospect of dependency in a nation that seems less and less committed to corporate compassion. We are fearful of nuclear destruction in a world which spends more than a half-trillion dollars per year on increasingly sophisticated and increasingly uncontrollable instruments of mass destruction.

In our excitement and determination, and in spite of our fear, we are *hopeful*. We have grounds for hope in several trends even in our own little Church itself—in the modest, but significant, convergence of evangelism on the one hand, and social witness on the other; in the renewed commitment to stewardship of time, talent and treasure reflected in Venture in Mission; in a broadening and deepening dialogue with other Communions and stronger partnership relationships within the Anglican Communion. We see further signs of hope in increasing sensitivity to human suffering and in the widespread protest against world armaments and nuclear madness, particularly within the Churches. Most important of all, we continue our hope in Him who is the hope of the world and whose Gospel is eternal hope.

Experiencing as we do these emotions of thanksgiving, excitement, determination, fear and hope, we embark upon this 67th General Convention.

About half of you who sit in this House are here as deputies for the first time. Those of us who are veteran members welcome you and assure you that we share much of the excitement and some of the confusion that you inevitably feel. We also hold a great affection for one another, for you, for the work of the House of Deputies as it plays its co-equal and reciprocal role with our Fathers-in-God in the Episcopal order.

We welcome those of you who are visitors and observers in this House and this Convention. We urge those of our own Province of the Anglican Communion to monitor us to see that we perform as good stewards of your business. We extend a special welcome to our ecumenical observers, knowing that we, like you, are embarked upon a common task in our Lord's vineyard. Let me remind all of you that our committee sessions are announced in advance, open to all, and that anyone is invited to register and give testimony in committee hearings.

Our Sisters of the 37th Triennial have chosen as their theme: "Go Forth into the World." In this General Convention, the world is very much with us. We ignore it at peril of our immortal souls, for it is our Father's world.

There is much work to be done in fewer days and hours than we have had in the past. To accomplish it will require disciplined work in committees, and debate on the floor that is full and fair without being overextended.

Our Lord demands neither heroics nor success. He does demand faithfulness. May we be faithful to his calling!

Evidence of the foregoing is as follows:

b. Signed certificates from the Secretaries that the said proposed amendments have been made known to the said jurisdictions.

5. Article II, Sec. 7: Election of a suffragan bishop in charge of chaplains in the armed forces of the United States.

6. Article II, Sec. 8: Eliminate reference to missionary diocese.

7. Article VII: Eliminate words "Missionary Diocese" in reference to provinces.

8. Article X: Eliminate "and Missionary Dioceses, and in the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe" in first paragraph in reference to *The Book of Common Prayer*.

9. Article X: Eliminate "and all the Missionary Dioceses, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe" in second paragraph in reference to The Book of Common Prayer.

10. Article I, Sec. 2: Include assistant bishops in House of Bishops.

11. Article V, Sec. 1: Admission of new dioceses, approval.

12. Article I, Sec. 4: Deacons entitled to representation in House of Deputies.

13. Article I, Sec. 4: Delete words "and Missionary Diocese" in reference to vote by orders.

The reading was from John 12:31: God deals with the suffering of the world—not by denying it, not by removing it—but by sharing that suffering and transforming it with His love; the cross is the symbol of that love.

The Rt. Rev. Charles J. Child, Jr., Bishop Coadjutor of Atlanta, and a member of the Standing Commission on Church Music, led the assemblage in singing hymns 467, 516, 459, 309, and 93 from the proposed *Hymnal*, 1982.

The Honorable George Bush, Vice-President of the United States, addressed the Joint Session.

After singing hymns 452 and 440, the Joint Session viewed the film report of the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council, entitled *The Next Step*.

The session adjourned at 12:05 P.M.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed thereafter to prepare in uniform fashion a biographical sketch of each nominee based on the information provided to him, which sketches are to be arranged in alphabetical order by name of nominee and distributed to the members of the House no later than 10:30 a.m. on September 8, 1982; and be it further

Resolved, That this House set a Special Order of Business at 2:30 p.m. on September 8, 1982, for the purpose of electing a President of the House to take office pursuant to Canon 1, Title I, Section 1(b); *Provided*, that, at the discretion of its presiding officer, the House may proceed to conduct other business during the balloting for such election; and be it further

Resolved, That, following the election of a President, a similar procedure be followed in the election of a Vice-President, with:

a. A Special Order of Business immediately following the election of the President for the purpose of receiving nominations under the same procedures; b. The distribution of similar biographical sketches prior to 10:30 a.m. on September 9, 1982; and

c. A Special Order of Business at 2:30 p.m. on September 10, 1982, to elect a Vice-President of the House for the same term under the same proviso; and, be it further

Resolved, That the President of the House be requested to appoint a Chairman and 10 Tellers of Elections to serve the House on the occasions of each of its several elections.

That this House set a Special Order of Business at 2:35 p.m. on September 9, 1982, for the purpose of electing two presbyters or deacons and six lay persons for a term equal to twice the interval between regular sessions of the General Convention each until his successor is elected, and of electing two presbyters or deacons for a term equal to the interval between the 67th and the 68th General Conventions;

4. The Secretary shall prepare a ballot listing alphabetically by order the names of all persons nominated;

5. On each ballot, each member shall vote for the number of presbyters or deacons and lay persons to be or remaining to be elected, and any ballot with votes less than or in excess thereof shall be void;

6. In the clerical order the two persons for each term receiving the largest number of votes cast shall be deemed elected, and similarly in the lay order the six persons receiving the largest number of votes cast shall be deemed elected, provided that votes equal to or in excess of a majority of the ballots cast on any ballot shall be required for election. Balloting shall continue until the required number has been elected, provided that on the third ballot in each order there shall be retained on the ballot from those persons receiving the highest number of votes only that number of nominees equal to twice the number to be elected in such order. In the event of a significant tie election shall be by lot cast by the Secretary.

7. The House, at the discretion of its presiding officer, may proceed to other business during the balloting for these elections.

Wednesday September 8, 1982

Minutes of Joint Session #2

Joint Session #2 of the 67th General Convention was called to order by the Rt. Rev. John M. Allin, Presiding Bishop of the Church, at 9:10 A.M., in the worship area of the Rivergate Convention Center. The Presiding Bishop opened the Joint Session with prayer, followed by brief introductions of the principal speakers who comprised the panel: Mrs. Margaret Dehqani-Tafti; Mrs. Louisa Kennedy; Mrs. Coretta Scott King; and the Honorable Sandra Day O'Connor, Justice of the United States Supreme Court. Bishop Allin expressed regrets that Mother Teresa and Mrs. Anwar Sadat were unable to accept his invitation to be present. Mother Teresa was in Beirut, Lebanon, tending the sick, and Mrs. Sadat is still in the period of mourning following the tragic death of her husband, in October, 1981.

Louisa Kennedy served as moderator of the panel, and introduced the theme of "Justice and Peace." Each participant made an introductory statement in which she recalled experiences of crisis in her personal life. Following these opening statements, Mrs. King and Mrs. O'Connor responded to a question from the moderator, by expressing their views on the changing role of women in today's society. The assembled bishops and deputies, along with delegates to the Women's Triennial, guests, and visitors, expressed their appreciation to the panel by prolonged applause.

At the conclusion of the Joint Session, the Rev. John MacNaughton, of West Texas, Chairman of the Standing Commission on Stewardship and Development, gave a brief historical sketch of "Venture in Mission." The Presiding Bishop closed the Joint Session by presenting plaques to several persons who have offered outstanding service to Venture in Mission, which to date has raised some \$150 million in gifts and pledges.

The Joint Session adjourned at 10:20 A.M.

The Committee on Structure presented its report to the House on the status of the Convocation of American Churches in Europe, as follows:

I. Structure Committee has not received any formal legislation on this matter.

II. However, we received informal word of the concern, and took the following actions:

(a) The Rev. Linda L. Grenz conferred with the Canons Committee, which informed her that canonical change was possible.

(b) The Committee discussed the possibility of giving the Convocation of American Churches in Europe a vote, but felt this was inadvisable because:

1. There were a number of extra-provincial dioceses. Why enfranchise one and not the others?

2. Their size would give them disproportionate representation.

3. There is continued discussion on the relationship of the Convocation of American Churches in Europe to the American and English Churches, and it would be best to wait until those issues were settled before acting on something which makes canonical changes.

(c) Mr. Albert Bishop spoke to Bishop Krumm about the conclusions of the Structure Committee and he was comfortable with this.

(d) Mr. Bishop also spoke to the Convocation of American Churches in Europe individuals identified by Bishop Krumm as the persons most concerned about this matter.

Thursday September 9, 1982

Minutes of Joint Session #3

The Rt. Rev. John M. Allin, Presiding Bishop, called Joint Session #3 to order at 9:09 A.M., on Thursday, September 9, 1982. Members of the House of Bishops, clerical and lay deputies of the House of Deputies, delegates to the Triennial of the Women of the Church, guests, and visitors assembled in the worship area of the Rivergate Convention Center for this session.

The Presiding Bishop opened the Joint Session with a prayer composed by the Rt. Rev. Hassan Dehqani-Tafti, Bishop of the Anglican Church in Iran. The prayer was originally offered on the occasion of the assassination of the son of the Bishop and Mrs. Dehqani-Tafti. The congregation joined the Presiding Bishop in the Lord's Prayer.

The Joint Session was called for the purpose of hearing a panel of distinguished Christians addressing themselves to a scenario of moral and political issues raised by conditions in the hypothetical countries of Umbria and Wassa in West Africa. The panel facilitator was Dr. Thomas Franck, Director of the Center of International Studies, New York City. Members of the panel were the Rt. Rev. Hassan Dehqani-Tafti, Bishop of the Anglican Church in Iran; the Rt. Rev. R. H. Eames, Bishop of Down and Dromore in the Church of Northern Ireland; Moorehead Kennedy, Executive Director of the Cathedral Peace Institute in New York and former Acting Economic Counselor in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran during the period of the takeover, Dr. Davidson Nicol, Under-Secretary General of the United Nations and permanent representative of Sierra Leone to the U.S.; and Andrew Young, Mayor of Atlanta, and former U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. The frequent interruptions for applause, and the standing ovation at the conclusion of the discussion, attested to the appreciation and gratitude of the Joint Session for the contribution of these outstanding people. The content of the presentations was both challenging and timely, as well as tremendously informative.

Bishop Allin acknowledged with thanksgiving the presence of the panel, and declared the Joint Session adjourned at 10:26 A.M.

Courtesy to Dr. F. Bland Tucker

The Rev. Edward Kryder, of Western New York, Chairman of the Committee on Church Music, requested privilege to present a resolution of courtesy to the Rev. Dr. F. Bland Tucker, the only surviving member of the Standing Commission on Church Music which produced the *Hymnal*, 1940. The present Committee escorted Dr. Tucker to the platform.

The entire deputation, clerical and lay, of the Diocese of Georgia, seconded the motion of courtesy.

The tribute to the Rev. Dr. F. Bland Tucker was read as follows:

The Epistle to the Ephesians admonished the early Christians to "address one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart." In countless places and through all ages, the Church has continued this ancient tradition of praising God in music. The works of unnumbered poets and musicians, some known but many unknown, have provided the people of God with a goodly heritage of sung praise. Our own branch of the Church in this century has had the uncommon privilege to have among us one of the great hymn writers of this, or any, age: Francis Bland Tucker.

Born on the Feast of the Epiphany in 1895 in Norfolk, Virginia, this 13th child of the Rt. Rev. Beverly Dandridge Tucker and Anna Maria Washington Tucker has shone as one of the brightest and best of the stars in the firmament of that distinguished family of churchmen. In the tradition of his native state, he received his undergraduate education at *the* university in Charlottesville, and attended *the* seminary in Alexandria (which later honored him with a Doctor of Divinity degree), and he served in the American Expeditionary Forces in World War I. His first parishes were in the Diocese of Southern Virginia; later he served for twenty years as rector of St. John's Church, Georgetown, in the District of Columbia, and then for twenty-two years as rector of Christ Church, Savannah, Georgia; and he is fond of pointing out that he is the successor to John Wesley in that position.

His distinguished career in the parish ministry would have been enough for most people, but Bland Tucker, through his hymns, has served as a pastor to his national

Church and to Christians throughout the world who worship in the English language. Merely to catalogue his contributions to the *Hymnal*, 1940 is to demonstrate how greatly we would be impoverished without him. Where would we be without:

No. 68 "Alone thou goest forth, O Lord"

and that greatest hymn in the English language on the Christian family, No. 504, "Our Father, by whose name all fatherhood is known."

But the genius of Bland Tucker has consisted not only in his originality, but also in his recognition and promotion of the best work by others. As a member of the committee that produced the *Hymnal*, 1940, he was instrumental in bringing into our book the best new works coming out of England, especially the texts and tunes in the collection called *Songs of Praise*.

But since that time, the hymns of Bland Tucker have kept on coming forth like an ever-rolling stream. In the preparation of the supplements to the *Hymnal*, 1940, produced over the past decade, he has been a sure and true resource for new texts and for effective revisions. His genius for interpretive paraphrase, for example, has given us a wonderful new metrical version of the *Phos Hilarion* to fit into the evening rites of our *Book of Common Prayer*. In the long and exhausting task of compiling the new hymnal that this General Convention has overwhelmingly adopted, his octogenarian vigor, seasoned humor, and artistic wisdom have been an inspiration to all with whom he has worked. He has been in our midst as a living symbol of the richness of our Anglican heritage and of the high calling we have to preserve and enhance our praise of God through hymns.

In recognition of his varied and distinguished contributions to the life of the Episcopal Church, and in thanksgiving for his many gifts and his generosity in sharing them, therefore be it

Resolved, That the members of this House of Deputies of the 67th General Convention of the Episcopal Church express to the Rev. Dr. F. Bland Tucker their gratitude and affection for his many years of faithful service, his glorious hymns, and his presence here today; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this testimonial be spread in the Journal of this Convention as a witness of our enduring thanks.

Balloting shall continue until the required number of members by orders and provinces have been elected, provided that on the third ballot in each order there shall be retained on the ballot from those persons receiving the highest number of votes only that number of nominees equal to twice the number to be elected in such order. In the event of a significant tie, election shall be by lot cast by the Secretary.

4. That the House, at the discretion of its Presiding Officer, may proceed to other

business during the balloting for these elections.

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to each of the appropriate persons involved in the litigation.

Resolved, That, upon completion of pending litigation involving Frs. Doss and Frade, this House urges a proper Congressional investigation of government officials responsible for the persecution of these priests, and the suspension or removal of these officials.

Saturday September 11, 1982

Minutes of Joint Session #4

Joint Session #4 was held Saturday, September 11, 1982 in the worship area of the Rivergate Convention Center for the purpose of receiving the Report of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance for the triennium 1983-85. The session was called to order at 10:03 A.M. by the Rt. Rev. John M. Allin, Presiding Bishop, who, following announcements, offered prayers for Mrs. Marjorie Kientz, a volunteer at the Convention from St. Andrew's Parish, New Orleans, who suffered a heart attack on Friday while working at the Rivergate. Mrs. Kientz died in the ambulance on the way to the hospital. Prayers were concluded with the Lord's Prayer.

The combined Houses of the 67th General Convention, along with guests and visitors, joined in singing Hymn 537 "Christ for the world we sing." Mrs. Lueta Bailey, of Atlanta, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance, introduced the Committee by asking the Committee members, who were seated in the front row, to stand and be recognized.

Deputy Bailey began her presentation entitled "The Bottom Line" by acknowledging that the Committee was of a unanimous spirit in offering its Report of the Program Development Budget and the General Convention Expense Budget for consideration by the 67th General Convention. The plan included four features: 1) Inclusiveness—because God's creation included all people; 2) Transition—to enable us to move from what *used* to be to what *is* to be; 3) Renewal—not for solace only but for strength; and 4) Biblical basing—as it must be.

The Rev. William Burrill, of Northern California, presented the details of the two proposed budgets. The General Convention Expense Budget for 1983-85 is \$3,794,541—an increase of 31.6 per cent. This increase is primarily due to the binds of inflation and rapidly growing travel and hotel expenses. The Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance has voluntarily requested that the size of its Committee be reduced from 36 to 27 members. Neither budget requires any increase in the assessment or apportionment formula.

The Program Development Budget includes funding for two new programs—Peace Ministries and Jubilee Ministry. Development received a high priority in the planning process. Increased regional support has made it possible to reduce some programs, notably the Appalachian Peoples' Service Organization. The Program Development Budget for 1983-85 is \$20,883,000—an increase of 11.5 per cent over the 1979-82 budget. The Joint Commission on Program, Budget, and Finance unanimously endorses these two budgets and presents the report to the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies for their consideration.

The Joint Session adjourned at 10:45 A.M. following the singing of Hymn 261 "O Sion, haste." Printed newspaper copies of the Report of the Joint Committee were distributed as the bishops and deputies left the worship areas.

No motion to lay on the table or otherwise terminate debate on a Title of the report shall be entertained until 10 minutes after the conclusion of final discussion and debate on all paragraphs of the Title under discussion have been completed or until no member of the House desires to speak to the Title, whichever shall first occur.

The General Convention serves the Church, but it is not the Church. The Church is greater than we are, and for that we give thanks to God.

"The most poignant personal memories that all of us have in this House are the associations we make here. We walk with giants. I remember Jackson Dykman of Long Island, Theodore Wedell of Washington, Clifford Morehouse of New York, John Coburn of New York, Oscar Carr, Reynolds Cheney of Mississippi, Donald Wattley of Louisiana, and our own beloved here with us — Fred Scribner of Maine and Charles Crump of Tennessee. We have been blessed by walking with these giants. And yet the greatest blessing has come to us, Mr. President, not from them, but from the association we have with the ordinary folk like myself, the parish priests, and dedicated lay men and women who make up what Gregory Dix used to call 'the holy common people of God.' They — our association with them — are our fondest memory, our richest blessing. I cannot leave these halls without expressing my sincere gratitude to God for letting me be here. It has been a great blessing in my life, and I think in the lives of all those who have served here.

"Thank you, Mr. President, go in Peace."

The President claimed a moment of personal privilege and took note of many who worked in the background, including Dr. Margaret Lawrence. The House gave the President a standing ovation.

The Secretary announced to guests and visitors that copies of the resolutions and assorted papers were available, free of charge, in the Secretariat.

SUPPLEMENTAL REPORTS

The Committee on the State of the Church

In order to provide the Convention with the latest possible data, the Committee on the State of the Church requested the Director of Management Information Systems at the Church Center to prepare this supplement to the Committee's report for presentation at the time of the Convention. It has not been reviewed by the Committee. As usual, the detailed statistics for the triennium will be published in the Journal.

The Episcopal Church reported a total of 2,767,420 active baptized members in domestic dioceses at the end of 1981, compared with 2,784,030 for 1980. Overseas gains absorbed domestic declines, so that total 1981 membership reached 3,020,920 as compared with the 1980 figure of 3,018,880. The 1980 figure was adjusted downward to reflect the loss of the now independent Dioceses of Puerto Rico and Liberia. Since some overseas jurisdictions have failed to provide current reports, further revision may be necessary. Taking the overseas dioceses by themselves, and using 1980 figures for those failing to make timely reports, it would seem that those who are reporting are enjoying a substantial growth -a 7.9% increase in baptized membership, and a .77% growth in communicants. Also, the rise in stewardship in overseas dioceses—from \$.70 per household per week to \$.95—is substantial.

Along with the domestic membership decline of more than half a percentage point, communicant strength also declined slightly—from 1,933,070 to 1,930,680. Confirmations, however, are outnumbering losses by death at a two-to-one ratio, indicating the possible resurgence of a growth pattern. This possibility of growth seems reinforced by a steady increase in baptisms over the past few years. In 1981 baptisms rose to 65,557, with baptisms of children rather than adults accounting for the increase. This contrasted with 1980 when adult baptisms had led the rise. The increase in the number of households followed the national pattern, with more people living alone. The number of families increased by about 3,000 and the number of individuals by 2,000—for a total of 1,146,440 households in 1981 compared with 1,141,260 in 1980.

A new high was reached in stewardship, with receipts in pledge and plate offerings of \$6.34 per week per household in 1981 compared with \$5.69 in 1980. However, this increase only insignificantly outpaced inflation. It should be pointed out that the average represents a broad range. The Diocese of Alabama led the Church with \$10.27 per household per week, while \$3.40 represented the low end of that spectrum.

Overall general receipts once again outpaced inflation, rising at a 12.26% rate. At the same time, parish operating expenses, including salaries, rose by 11.4%. Gross revenue in general parish accounts was at \$725 million, up from \$643 million. Adding receipts from other funds in parish organizations gave a grand total of \$824 million, compared with \$729 million in 1981. Receipts of the dioceses themselves, exclusive of funds provided by parishes or the national Church, rose from \$27,969,849—nearly 50%—to \$41,564,400. Even allowing for only moderate inflation, it would seem that the pattern indicates a billion dollars in gross revenues for the Episcopal Church before the year 2000.

Attendance showed a general rise, by three-quarters of a percent, to 1,757,000 on Easter, 1981.

Once again Church school enrollment dropped—from 489,213 to 484,217. Day school enrollment, however, rose from 79,401 to 86,414, with grade school increases overcoming a decline in high school pupils.

The total number of domestic clergy rose from 12,672 to 12,908. This increase was only slightly more than the increase in retired clergy—from 1,976 to 2,146. The number of women presbyters in the domestic parochial ministry increased from 139 to 190, with the number of women in the diaconate rising from 78 to 92. In non-parochial categories, the number of ordained women remained stable. Overall, in 1980, official reports in domestic dioceses show 438 women clergy, with 497 in 1981. The number in charge of any of the 7,234 parishes and missions grew from 45 to 62.

Parishes gave away 15% of their total revenue to purposes outside themselvesnearly \$90 million. Of this amount \$62 million went to dioceses and to the General Church Program, or 10% of total revenue compared with 11% in 1980, thus continuing a decline in the portion of benevolences which parishes share with their dioceses and the General Church Program. A pattern of increase in "local option" in the designation of benevolences by parishes has become apparent in all major US denominations. And the most sobering note in all our statistics is the fact that while parishes gave their dioceses \$5 million more in 1981 than in 1980, inflation meant that the \$5 million more had a purchasing power of \$1 million less than in the prior year. Parish receipts kept pace with inflation; the dioceses and the General Church Program did not.

Commentary

Despite the difficulty of securing timely data, especially from overseas, of considerable interest is the indication that reports have become more precise over the years. Communicant membership statistics show a measurable error of less than four-thousandths of a percent, while parish treasurers in the aggregate have kept their reports accurately (as indicated by proof totals) to within \$19 per parish—a variance easily accounted for by the fact that figures are rounded out to the nearest dollar in each category.

With precision in the data itself, however, comes a responsibility to treat the figures with the respect their accuracy demands. The one surprising fact that stands out in looking at the figures over a long period—the decade-and-a-half since 1966 when membership had peaked, for example—is the amazing stability and resiliency of the Episcopal Church in the face of what might easily have been overwhelming forces in our society and culture as a whole, to say nothing of what might be termed an Anglican fondness for creating and prolonging dissension from within. The loss of a single soul is a tragedy; but the fact that since 1975 we have been declining at only half the average rate of comparable denominations during that period speaks well for our inner strength.

Taking a cross-section of US denominations of similar size from which comparable figures are available, we find they all shared a common growth pattern from 1950 to 1965, with the Episcopal Church growing most rapidly. They all suffered a decline from 1965 to 1975, with our decline a bit steeper than average. From 1975 to 1980 the rate of decline for all in the group was reduced to a third. The table gives the details.

Whatever the reasons, the Episcopal Church grew much more rapidly than its statistically comparable counterparts from 1950 to 1965, declined at the average rate for its group from 1965 to 1970, and, from 1975 to 1981 declined at one-half the rate for its group.

From 1966, when our domestic membership figure stood at an all-time peak of 3,440,023, until 1981, it had declined by almost 20% to 2,767,440. Assertions that we had ever lost one-third of our members over any period of time (regardless of whether we are speaking of communicants or baptized members and whether we include overseas jurisdictions or not) are simply not true. The huge statistical error introduced by such a statement affects any conclusions drawn from it.

As the chart comparing declines prior to 1975 with current losses indicates, the annual rate since then is half a percentage point. In other words, most of the unfortunate decline in this century took place in the period from 1966 to 1975. If we wish to identify some of the causes for the decline, we need to study the history of the social, cultural, economic, and demographic factors of the sixties, as well as the ecclesiastical facts of life in those days.

Except insofar as current controversies were also current in the sixties, they cannot be blamed for our decline in membership. The obverse is also true. We cannot yet take credit for what seem to be bright spots on our horizon. It is too early to predict a resurgence, still less to say that it is the result of renewed evangelism, or of anything else.

Some of the facts should bring hope. Baptisms, now at 65,565, are more numerous (in the order of 2,000-5,000 more) than at any time since 1972. Confirmations and receptions are greater than in any year since 1976. Marriages taking place in our parishes have increased by 10.6% since 1976. And, considering the possibilities that might have befallen us in view of the sad experiences in some other judicatories, even our declining figures show more stability than most. Triumphalism may have gone out of style. Still, none of the data justifies us in prophesying doom. Average attendance on four key Sundays has averaged between one million fifty and one million sixty thousand during the triennium. Our Church schools have hovered near the half-million mark. The number of communicants has remained at nearly two million for a decade. And our total Church membership, led by advances in some overseas dioceses, is apparently on the rise. All major indicators are within a single percentage point of change—a remarkable achievement in our society.

Presiding Bishop's Advisory Committee On Christian-Jewish Relations

In the fall of 1977, Presiding Bishop John M. Allin appointed a small Advisory Committee on Christian-Jewish Relations. The Committee explores ways in which the Episcopal Church might work toward better relationships with our Jewish neighbors, both unilaterally and in cooperation with other Christian bodies. We are not a program committee, but one which serves as an advisory to the Presiding Bishop in areas of Christian-Jewish relations. Members of the Committee are: The Rt. Rev. John M. Allin, Presiding Bishop; Dr. Cynthia Wedel, Chairperson; the Rt. Rev. John H. Burt, Dr. James Carpenter, the Rev. Lawrence McCoombe, the Rt. Rev. John S. Spong, and the Rev. William L. Weiler, Staff.

Over the past triennium the Committee members have met twice each year to study issues of concern to both our communities. We have frequently invited leaders in the ecumenical world to share with us aspects of Jewish-Christian dialogue. A Working Group made up of Phil Culbertson, Vesta Kowalski, and Robert Morris, under the leadership of Lawrence McCoombe, was convened to explore aspects of Jewish-Christian sharing already under way in our Church, and areas in which we need to promote interfaith dialogue. Mr. McCoombe edited a special edition of the *Ecumenical Bulletin*, devoted to themes of Jewish-Christian conversation. Practical means of interfaith sharing were offered in the *Bulletin*, which also featured guidelines on Jewish-Christian dialogue and resources for interfaith sharing.

The Committee cooperates closely with the Christian-Jewish offices of the National Council of Churches and World Council of Churches. It assisted in the writing of the World Council of Churches' "Guidelines on Jewish-Christian Relations," and promoted the ministry of the Office on Christian-Jewish Relations of the National Council of Churches.

William Weiler represented the Committee at the National Workshops on Christian-Jewish Relations held in Dallas and Milwaukee over the past triennium. Dr. Weiler has worked with the National Council of Churches in the preparation of its Middle East Statement, and with the preparation of the "Guidelines on Christian-Jewish Relations" of the World Council of Churches.

Presiding Bishop Allin has twice invited national Jewish leaders to join him and the Committee at his home for a luncheon and an afternoon of sharing. At his most recent luncheon in May of 1982, ten members of each community shared with the Presiding Bishop aspects of our common concern, including the resurgence of antisemitism, the Middle East peace process, and our common witness in social concerns. Bishop Allin also invited the leaders of five national Jewish agencies with programs of Jewish-Christian relations to attend the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in New Orleans, and to bring greetings to the House of Bishops.

During the coming triennium the Committee will assist the Presiding Bishop in finding ways in which our Church, in cooperation with other Christian bodies, can enhance our dialogue with neighbors in the Jewish community.

TITLE I

THE PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT BUDGET OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

BE IT RESOLVED, The House of Bishops concurring,

 That the Program Development Budget of the Episcopal church for the year 1983, attached to this resolution, is adopted in the total amount of \$20,883,000; and for the years 1984 and 1985, the total amount shall be determined by:

Estimated apportionment Income based on the Formula stated in Paragraph 1.1 and

Estimated Other Income, using each prior year's experience as a guide.

The apportionment to dioceses for the year 1983 shall be \$17,404,000 and for the years 1984 and 1985 shall be arrived at by applying the fixed percentage against the then known Net Disposable BudgetIncome (NDBI) as stated in Paragraph 1.1.

1.1 The quota apportioned to each diocese shall be a fixed percentage of the NDBI of that diocese, as such income is defined in Paragraph 1.2 of this resolution, rounding out the results to the next highest thousand dollars, for each year as follows:

For the 1983 Program Development Budget of the Episcopal Church at 3.97% of the 1980 NDBI.

For the 1984 Program Development Budget of the Episcopal Church at 3.84% of the 1981 NDBI.

For the 1985 Program Development Budget of the Episcopal Church at a fixed percentage not to exceed the percentage used for the previous year, such percentage to be applied to the 1982 NDBI. (Inasmuch as the 1982 NDBI will not be known until September 1983, to estimate what this will be at General convention time is not practical).

- 1.2 The NDBI of the Church in a diocese shall be the sum of parish receipts for general purposes (Items 1751, 1752, 1753, 1755, and 1756 of the Parochial Report) and diocesan endowment and other income for budgetary purposes (A-2 and A04 of the Diocesan Report). The income (NDBI) reported for the year 1980 shall be the basis for the apportionment for the year 1983; that reported for 1981 for the 1984 apportionment; and that reported for 1982 for the 1985 apportionment;
- The Executive Council, in its exercise of the authority vested in it by Title I, Canon 4, Section 6(b), shall be subject to the following restrictions:
- 2.1 Each year, the Executive Council, with the advice of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance shall adjust the Program Development Budget of the Episcopal Church to the assured income of the Council so as to carry out the budget for that year on a balanced budget basis;
- 2.2 Income from trust funds available for budgetary purposes shall be so applied in the year subsequent to receipt, and not in the year of receipt;

- 2.3 Any "lapsed balance" in an appropriation for a fiscal year may be treated as income available for budgetary purposes in the ensuing year, or for the accumulation of a reserve for emergencies, and shall be used for no other purposes;
- 2.4 Undesignated legacies received during the triennium shall be set aside in the General Endowment Fund, of which only the income shall be used for the general purposes of Society;
- 2.5 The Executive Council shall be responsible for officer and employee personnel policies, and for supervising the expenditure of funds implementing such policies;
- 2.6 If in any year the total anticipated income for the support of the Program Development budget of the Episcopal Church will be less than the amount required to support the budget in that year, including those Appropriations for the Joint Committees, Commissions, Boards, and Agencies of the General Convention, they shall share in any decrease necessary to maintain a balanced budget.

TITLE II

THE GENERAL CONVENTION EXPENSE BUDGET

 The detailed budget for the Expenses of General Convention and its Committees, Commissions, Boards and Agencies for the period of January 1, 1983 through December 31, 1985 is adopted in the total amount of

\$3,794,541

2.1 The funding of this expense budget shall be provided by an assessment made pursuant to Title I, Canon 1, Section 8. The Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance shall divide the total to be raised by assessment into annual amounts for 1983, 1984, and 1985. Each year the Treasurer of the General Convention shall compute the assessment for each Diocese on the basis of its Net Disposable Budget Income. The assessment shall be at a uniform rate of (.002571) for each year; however, in the third year of the triennium such rate maybe increased by no more than 5% by action of the Executive Committee of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance. This rate shall be

applied to the Net Disposable Budget Income of every Diocese to determine its assessment for each year. The Net Disposable Budget Income used shall be the same as that used for the apportionment of quotas to support the General Church for the same year. The Treasurer of the General Convention shall notify every Diocese of the amount of its annual assessment concurrently with the transmission of the Diocesan quota by the Executive Council.

- 2.2 The fiscal year for the purposes of the expenses of General Convention shall be the calendar year. The unexpended balance of any budget item remaining at the end of each year shall lapse unless it is made available for expenditure in the ensuing year by action of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance. Such lapsed Balance may be reallocated after consultation with the Committees, Commissions, Boards and Agencies through a challenge process.
- 2.3 All payments to be made under this budget shall be authorized by the Treasurer of General Convention only after the submission to him of documented vouchers or other accounting documents acceptable to the Treasurer.
- 2.4 The Treasurer of the General Convention is hereby authorized and directed to develop and administer a system for the control of the obligation and expenditure of the appropriations made in this budget of the General Convention. This system shall be designed in consultation with the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, and shall be subject to the Committee's approval. The system shall be so designed and administered that funds are expended only for the purposes authorized.
- 2.5 Obligations and expenditures in excess of the amounts appropriated shall not be incurred without prior express approval of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance.
- 2.6 The General Board of Examining Chaplains is hereby authorized to assess a fee for the general ordination examination. All fees received by the Board shall be applied to the expenses of examination, in addition to the amount appropriated by this budget. A candidate for Holy Orders, eligible for examination and so certified by the Diocesan Bishop, shall not be disgualified for examination because the fee has not been paid.

CRITERIA

In order for items to be funded in the General Convention Expense Budget, they must meet at least one of the following criteria:

- A. Be required by canon to be funded in the Expense Budget.
- B. Be responsiblie for preparing legislation for General Convention.
- C. Be Charged with a function of a highly specialized ad hoc nature, such as Prayer Book or Hymnal Revision.

INDEX

To facilitate the use of the *Journal* each section has its own pagination, prefixed by a letter.

Section A contains introductory material and the Directory, including the current Officers of the General Convention, and the present members of Committees, Commissions, Boards, and Agencies, with their addresses.

Section B contains the Roster and Minutes of the House of Bishops sessions at New Orleans, followed by minutes of its prior meetings at Chattanooga and San Diego.

Section C contains the action in both Houses on which concurrence occurred, together with the final text of such action.

Section D contains the Roster and Minutes of the House of Deputies.

Section AA contains Appendices, including Statistics for the triennium, and the reports of the Recorder and the Registrar.

Section BB, published separately prior to the Convention as *The Blue Book*, contains the reports of Committees, Commissions, Boards, and Agencies together with their "A" Resolutions. The letters BB are omitted in its folio numbers.

Section CC, published separately prior to this Journal contains the Constitution and Canons as revised by the 1982 General Convention. That volume is fully indexed, so only those items dealt with in 1982 are included here.

N.B. The Topical Index, beginning on page C-1, should be consulted first for references to legislation on which concurrent approval occurred.

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
